#### **School Street and Newcomb Avenue** project continues

The School Street-Newcomb Avenue construction project is on schedule, according to Mayor Gary Cromer, with a rough base coat of blacktop applied Tuesday to the School Street addition in preparation for final blacktopping. The curbs around the Snack Shack parking lot are already in place and the rough base coat for the Newcomb Avenue side should be completed by next week.

According to Cromer, Newcomb Avenue has been inaccessible from Richmond Street since Tuesday for installation of the new curbs on that side of Richmond Street. This will continue through this week. There is also one final telephone pole on the Lambert Property side of Newcomb Avenue that has to be moved.

Residents in the area, workers and visitors at the Rockcastle Hospital and Medical Arts Building and customers of Mt. Vernon Pharmacy will have to use Maple Street, which can be accessed off of Richmond Street next to the health department or High Street, next to the Post Office for both ingress and egress.

Mt. Vernon Drug is the main business that will be affected by the Newcomb Street shutdown, but it will still be accessible from Richmond Street by its drive through lane to the left of the property and also a new entrance off of Richmond Street, to the right of the former Cornelius property. Customers will have to enter and exit the parking lot from Richmond Street.

According to the Department of Highways, a crew is deciding this week the best location for the four posts that will hold the traffic light on Richmond Street. The Department also stated that, hopefully, traffic will be moving again normally in the area in the next two weeks, even though the project will not be completed.

All excess blacktop that is currently being taken to accommodate the new intersection is being put behind the current parking lot of Snack Shack, to give them extra parking that they originally lost in order to make the new School Street addi-

#### Local family involved in crash on Highway 150

A local family was involved in a two-vehicle collison on Highway 150 last Wednesday, resulting in the death of a Tennessee

According to the Kentucky State Police, Bert King, 41, of Mt. Vernon, coowner of Peg's Food Mart, and his family were attempting to merge onto Hwy. 150 from Singleton Road in Lincoln County when he struck a motorcycle being operated by Jackie Haga, 54, of Bristol, TN.

The impact caused both vehicles to leave the road and travel down a nearby

embankment.

Haga was transported to Fort Logan Hospital in Stanford, where he was pronounced dead by the Lincoln County Coroner.

There were no reported injuries to King, his wife Angie or their four daughters, all of whom were in the vehicle.

Reports suggest that low visibility due to heavy rainfall may have played a role in the accident. Alcohol or drug use does not appear to be a contributing factor. The collision remains under investigation by the Kentucky State Police.

#### In celebration of its 200th birthday . . .

#### Many unique reasons to love Rockcastle County

By: Sara Coguer In celebrating Rockcastle County's 200th birthday, the Mount Vernon Signal has decided to compile 200 interesting and unique facts about Rockcastle County.

The project will take place between now and the end of the year and hopefully will have been contributed to by members of our community.

Each week, the Signal will tell twenty things about Rockcastle County that you may or may not have known. However, the completion of this project will be up to our readers to help tell the rich history and stories of our people, the times, the places and the events that have made Rockcastle County the place we fondly call home.

We will share the obvious, those tidbits of information that most of our citizenry should already know. What we would like for residents to do is submit any fact that you think is interesting or unique about anyone, anyplace or anything in our county.

We know that there are 200 facts out there, we are just hoping that you, our readership, will be willing to play along and submit those wonderful memories that you have that helps to make our county special. Nostalgia is welcome here, just try to keep it short and sweet.

To start this project off, here are the first 20 interesting and unique facts about Rockcastle County. All of the facts that we are presenting have come from the book Rockcastle County,

Kentucky and It's People, as well as websites on the internet, including Rockcastle County's very website, www.kykinfolk.com, the Rockcastle Tourism website and the Rockcastle Historical Society website.

1. Rockcastle County was formed in 1810 from portions of Lincoln, Madison, Knox and Pulaski counties. The largest land areas being taken from Lincoln and Madison counties.

2. The geographical boundaries of Rockcastle County changed twice. The first in 1825 in which portions were taken to help form Laurel County and then again in 1858 to form Jackson County.

3. About one fourth of the county is located within the borders of the Daniel Boone National Forest.

4. In 1750, Explorer Thomas Walker noted a rock on a mountain above Livingston that resembled a castle, and in 1767 Isaac Lindsey named this rock Castle Rock. Both the Rockcastle River and later the county took their names from this.

5. Two major pioneer trails, Boone's Trace and the Wilderness Road intersect in Rockcastle County at Mt. Vernon. This intersection became the fork in the trail as Daniel Boone made his way from North Carolina to Boonesboro.

6. Stephen Langford and his family led the first settlers into Rockcastle County and founded Mt. Vernon, the county seat, in 1790, establishing Langford's Station in 1792.

7. Colonel James Maret, who was born in Garrard County, came to Rockcastle County in 1877 and established the county's first telephone exchange and newspaper, the Mountain Signal. He was also town clerk for 25 years and is buried in Elmwood Cemetery.

8. John Lair, born and raised in Renfro Valley, started the national radio broadcast of the "Renfro Valley Barn Dance" and country music show in November 1939.

9. PFC David M. Smith, of Livingston, is the only Congressional Medal of Honor recipient from Rockcastle County to date. PFC Smith, who served in the Korean Conflict, threw himself on a grenade during a battle to smother the explosion and saved the lives of five men. This display of valor cost him his life on September 1, 1950.

10. In 1798, John Baker discovered a large cave opening from the hillside along Crooked Creek, in what was then still part of Madison County. The next day, Baker, his wife and two children, went back to the cave to explore its depths with the aid of torches. However, the torches burned out and after two days the family finally found their way out. This began the colorful history of the Great Saltpetre

11. Two happenings of the Civil War took place in Rockcastle County. On October 21, 1861, the Battle of Camp Wildcat ensued in the Rockcastle Hills along the border of Laurel County. After the


Now that I have gotten my feet wet a little, my thoughts are coming out of my head a little too fast, but I want to try to make sense of a few of them for you.

I believe a lot of you know that in my previous life I was a teacher. I taught fourth grade for seven years and special education at the high school for a year and half prior to that.

I have had several people just amazed that I would want to leave teaching, but my response has always been that teaching is hard. Not that I wasn't up to the challenge, but I was having a very difficult time juggling my 9-5 job and my job as a mother.

I know a lot of mothers who have managed both, but when the opportunity arose to work with my familv and do something else meaningful, it was really a no brainer for me. After all, the Lord only charged me

The Space Race When I was thirteen years of age, the United States and USSR were involved in a race to explore and control space flight and travel. In those days, the news media kept everyone sitting on the edge of their chairs to see which country would prevail. The very idea was rather unsettling and left U.S. citizens nervous and uneasy about what might happen at any day. The entire world was watching on October 4, 1957 when the Soviet Union successfully launched its first satellite, Sputnik I. It was an event that changed every-

Immediately after the Sputnik launch, the U.S. Defense Department responded by approving funding for its own satellite project. As a result, on January 31, 1958, the United States successfully launched Explorer I. This satellite carried scientific proponents that discovered the magnetic radiation belts around the Earth, which were later named the Van Allen radiation belts. This small satellite weighed a mere 30.8 pounds.

I can also remember watching President John F. Kennedy's inaugural address on January 20, 1961, in which he challenged Americans to strive for higher goals and service to our fellow Americans. Among the achievements he wanted to see fulfilled was one that seemed mighty ambitious: "I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to earth." Not many of us believed that such a feat was possible. However, we had confidence in our new President and if he thought it could be done, then who were we to argue with such a wonderful dream.

As a young teenager living with my mother (Bee) in Rockcastle County, I was enthralled by the scientific advancements that were taking place all around the world. I purchased models of both satellites and hung

them from the ceiling in my bedroom. At night I concentrated on the small spheres slightly swinging from the ceiling light above my bed. It was a thrill to be alive while such miraculous events were taking place in the skies above our small

This was just the beginning of the space race. On April 12, 1961, the Soviet space traveler Yuri Gagarin became the first human to travel in space and to orbit the earth. He was the hero of the Soviet Union. He received medals from around the world for this pioneering tour.

Then, within less than a month, Rear Admiral Alan Barlett Shepard piloted the Freedom 7 mission and became the second person, and the first American, to travel in space. Unlike Gagarin, Shepard had control of Freedom 7 in determining the altitude of his spacecraft. The launch, his return from space, and the rescue by a helicopter were seen live on national television. Headlines the next morning gave Americans reason to be proud of our space accom-



event. For his momentous mission, Armstrong received the Congressional Space Medal of Honor.



Even though the city owns the parking lot, the Fiscal Court agreed to help pay to have the lot black-topped, since the bulk of cars that use the lot are doing business in the county courthouse. Both the city and the fiscal court spent approximately \$6,500 for the blacktopping project.

Leadership Rockcastle has purchased approved ramps for the park and those

are also awaiting installation.

Fencing for the project has been purchased and will be installed in the next week or so. Mayor Cromer reported that less than \$10,000 has been spent by the city for the park, which includes the shared cost of the blacktopping and the fencing.

ready and asked that the council table the discussion until November. The council agreed to table the issue until their November meeting.

The last new item that was up for discussion was to accept changing the provider of the city's worker's compensation insurance from Kentucky League of Cities to Van Meter Insurance. The change would save the city more than \$19,000 on their worker's comp premiums for the upcoming year.

Van Meter Insurance also will become the carrier for the city's other insurance needs, saving the city \$3,864 over the year for those premiums.

When Mayor Cromer asked for a vote on changing

the insurance carrier, Councilman Don Jones asked if they had to vote on it at this meeting and Mayor Cromer said yes, in order for the premiums to take effect November 1, they would have to be voted on during this meeting. With the exception of Jones, who voted no because he "didn't like to be rushed into voting for anything." the council approved the changes to their insurance carrier.

Police Chief Terry Jackson gave his monthly report, saying that the force had received the three vehicles that they had requested through a grant with a 50/50 match, and had also received three AR15 assault rifles for the force that he had requested months ago through a military surplus giveaway.

Fire Chief David Bales reported that the fire department made 16 runs in September, using 16,500 gallons of water.

In other business, Councilman Wayne Cromer reported that the All-American Club had picked up 85 bags of trash recently.

Parkey gave credit to his offensive line for opening up running lanes for his backs, "This was the second week with this particular lineup and they looked good opening holes. We look for them to only get better as October winds down."

After the opening touchdown by the Raiders, the Rocket defense got some redemption on the very next offensive series as the Rockets' Nick Thomason recovered a Raider fumble at the Central 43 yard line.

Clark Rowe then added his second touchdown of the night by breaking through the Raider secondary and scoring from 18 yards out. The two point conversion was added by Brock and Rockcastle was on top 14-6 with 2:40 to go in the first.

Rockcastle's defense then forced Central into a three and out to give the ball back to the offense. The offense wasted no time getting to pay dirt. The Rockets only needed 15 seconds and two plays that ended with a Zach Ream's touchdown run of 50 yards.

Reams, the leading receiver on the team, took the hand-off on an end around play for the score. Parkey welcomes the opportunities to get the ball into Reams's hands more,"Reams is a guy we look to get the ball to in space. He has great speed as he has shown in the last two weeks on his two long TD's." Going for two, Brock hit Luke Allen in the end zone to make the score 22-6 at the end of the first quarter.

After a scoreless second quarter, the Rockets took the opening possession of the third and continued to move the ball on the Raider defense. The result was a five play drive that covered 48 yards and was capped off by a John L. Saylor two yard touchdown run. The two point conversion was good with Brock hooking up with Saylor and the Rockets were in control 30-6 with 10:17

left in the third. Another three and out by the Raiders gave Rockcastle the ball back at their own 47. The Rockets then went seven plays that ended with Brock getting his only touchdown pass of the night, finding a wide open Luke Allen. The scoring drive was set up by another nice pass play between Brock and Allen that covered 25 yards.

Both he and Reams have to keep improving and be seen as a threat to the defense."

After giving up an opening drive touchdown, the Rocket defense was stingy, giving up only 92 yards of total offense on the road in-


Parkey was impressed with the play of B.B. Bradley who was in on seven tackles. "Bradley set the tone for us early with aggressive tackling.'





12. Early Lincoln County tax lists and land grants have settlers in this area before 1790.

13. After the Civil War, and due to the railroad, both Pine Hill and Livingston were more populated than Mt. Vernon.

The 14. original Rockcastle County Courthouse burned to the ground in 1873, destroying all local records to that date. This event has made researching early information in Rockcastle very challeng-

15. From 1835 to the early 1900's the Rockcastle Springs Hotel, located about 5 miles from the Rockcastle River, was a popular summer resort.

16. In 1873, Pine Hill, during its height as a coal and lumber town, had a population of six hundred residents.

17. The Great Saltpetre Cave sheltered both Union and Confederate troops during the Civil War.

18. Skaggs Trace was named for Henry Skaggs, a Long Hunter. Many famous pioneers, including John Floyd, Benjamin Logan and William Whitley traveled over it.

19. Brodhead High School, the first public school in Rockcastle County, was established in

20. Native Americans used the Rockcastle area as hunting grounds and temporary camps. There is evidence in two different parts of the county, East Fork of Skeggs Creek and on Eagle Creek along the Rockcastle River, of a permanent settlement or at least of returned-to encampments.



1963 Red Devils bowed to no one on the grid iron

#### The best Rockcastle football team you never heard of

When attention turns to football each August, we begin to speak the pigskin language, including how the coaches and players will handle the upcoming sea-

In turn we like to reminisce about past seasons and players. Four Rockcastle County teams are usually considered the standard to judge others by.

Coach Tom Larkey's two state runner-up teams from 2001 and 2002, his 1991 team and Coach Glenn Polly's 1977 team. As great as those teams were, there is only one team from Rockcastle County to go undefeated; Coach Larry Travis' 1963 Mt. Vernon Red Devils.

1963 was the era of President John F. Kennedy who coined the phrase, "Ask not what your country can do for you but what you can do for your country."

Evidently that phrase had caught on with Rockcastle Countians. Plans were laid for the building of a new courthouse and a county- wide high school.

Meanwhile Larry Travis, football coach at Mt. Vernon High School was preparing to take his team into a new era. The Blue Grass Football Conference, of which Mt. Vernon was a member, was an eight man conference had voted to become an eleven man conference in 1963.

When asked about the step up to eleven man football, Travis reported that his hand was forced when the conference voted for the change. "When the conference voted to go to eleven man, we had to step up or step out," said Coach Travis.

When asked to speculate on his team's chances for a successful season, he admitted it would be hard for his squad, made up of 22 players, and they would have to play "Iron Man football."

Travis said that he, and assistant coach Wayne Berry, would have the team to practice, practice, and practice some more to have a chance to beat teams such as Madison Central and Paint Lick.

Practice they did. Senior Tommy Hodges, who was a pulling left guard, stated, "Coach Travis and Coach Berry, who was an ex-marine, were strict taskmaskers and ran us to death. We knew those plays forwards and backwards." favorable season. Having a good bunch of experienced seniors, led by quarterback Bobby Hays and speedy

In spite of having gone 3 and 5, as an eight man squad the previous season, there were reasons to hope for a

halfback Shannon Hellard, the Devils could put points on the board. The question, however, were how the younger players would perform, especially on defense.

The Red Devils opened their season at home against Burgin High and came out flat, not able find the end zone for the first three quarters while the defense, in turn, shut down the Burgin offense.

In the opening minutes of the fourth quarter, Burgin struck pay dirt off a five yard run but failed to convert the extra point (in 1963 there were no two point conversion) to take a 6-0 lead.


The crowd was reported to be downhearted, but Hodges gave the Devils the spark they needed. Catching the ball on the twenty yard line, he ran the kickoff back for an 80 yard touchdown. The extra point at-

tempt failed, and the score was tied at six all.

The Red Devils kicked off to Burgin and held them to three and out after which half back Shannon Hellard returned the punt for a 65 yard touchdown. Quarterback Bobby Hayes then found end Jerry Makin in the end zone for the extra point to take a 13-6 lead.

Following the Red Devils kick, Burgin was unable to obtain a first down and had to punt. The Red Devils advanced the ball down the field where end Charles Machal swept left for a 35 yard touchdown. Hayes then hit Bill Price for the extra point for the final score of 20-6.







The Devils early success provided them with confidence and they effectively shut down the Indians highpowered offense and shocked Central again in the second quarter when Hellard hit pay dirt from 40 yards out. Quarterback Bobby Hayes then hit end Jerry Makin for the extra point for a 13-0 spread.

The Red Devils continued to keep the potent Indians offense at bay and moved the ball effectively, eating the clock, and in spite of two touchdown runs by Chock Machal being called back, the Red Devils were unable to tally another touchdown and the final score was 13-0. The Devils were now 4-0 and had defeated the best team on their schedule.

After the game, Coach Kidd approached Coach Travis and stated he would like to have Machal on his team, "That guy knows how to play football," Kidd said.

Travis' red hot Red Devils then traveled to Harrodsburg for a rematch of their season opener with Burgin. Half back Nicky Williams lit the score board up with three touchdown runs of 80, 60, and 45 yards while Chock Machal and Shannon Hellard added extra points for a half time score of 20-0.

The Devils added two more scores in the second half when Hayes hit Machal for a touchdown strike and Makin for the extra point and fullback Doug Rickels ran up the middle for a 17 yard score while the defense pitched their third straight shut out for a final tally of

The Devils' road show then went to Paint Lick to play the pre-season district favorite. They allowed the most points scored on them, but came away with a hard fought 28-14 victory.

Chock Machal, behind terrific blocking, went 40 yards for the first score in that game and Hayes' pass to Jerry Makin was good for

A few plays later Jerry Hines picked up a Paint Lick fumble and scrambled 25 yards for the score then Hayes connected with Machal for a 14-0 lead. Paint Lick scored seven be-

fore the half ended, by way of a 80 yard touchdown pass, and converted the extra point.

The second half began with fireworks when left halfback Chock Machal raced 18 yards to the end zone and quarterback Bobby Hayes sneaked over for the extra point. There was no further scoring until the third quarter when Paint Lick intercepted a Mt. Vernon aerial and ran it in from 35 yards. After converting the extra point the score was 21-14.

The third quarter closed out with Mt. Vernon adding another touchdown when right halfback Shannon Hellard ran off tackle for a seven yard score. Quarterback Bobby Hayes again sneaked over for the extra point giving the Red Devils a 28-14 lead.

That was the final score as neither team hit paydirt in the fourth quarter.

After the game Coach Travis stated, "Our last game is with Camp Dick Robinson at home. You fans come out and watch these boys perform. They are playing great football and if they continue to work hard, it will be a season they shall never forget."

The Red Devils ended their first eleven man season by downing a stubborn Camp Dick Robinson team 14-6 at home. In a tight defensive battle, the Red Devils found themselves down 6-0 at the half when Camp Dick scored on a short run following a blocked punt.

After a half time scolding from Coach Travis, the Red Devils came out with a little more pep in their step and managed touchdown runs of 65 and 25 yards, both from Shannon Hellard.

Quarterback Bobby Hayes sneaked over both times following the touchdowns to convert the extra point. The defense was spectacular in shutting down the Camp Dick offense for the final score of 14-6.

Having gone undefeated, the Devils were the 1963 Bluegrass Region Champions but, unfortunately, were not eligible for the state playoffs. KHSAA rules then required a eight game season to be eligible for

playoff participation. Coach Travis stated he attempted to schedule an eighth game, but could only find one team willing to play his red hot Devils.

Fort Thomas Highlands would agree to play the Devils provided that they traveled to Fort Thomas. Unfortunately this arrangement could not be worked out as the Mt. Vernon administration did not have funds to cover the transportation costs to travel to Fort Thomas

Coach Travis stated the scheduling conflict arose when the Bluegrass Conference voted to become an eleven man conference. Two teams decided to drop out which caused the Devils to lose two games off

Had the Devils been eligible, they would have played, My Old Kentucky Home High School from Bardstown.

Looking back Travis stated he would have loved to have seen his boys play that club. "I believe we could have beaten them and

who knows what could have happened from there."

Recently Joe Mullins and Chock Machal reminisced about that season. "We really didn't know how good we were until it [the season] was over, but gosh we sure would have loved to play My Old Kentucky Home!"



#### **National Teen Driver Safety** Week is October 17th-24th

Gov. Steve Beshear has signed a proclamation in honor of National Teen Driver Safety Week, which is Oct. 17-24. In support of this effort, the Kentucky Office of Highway Safety (KOHS) is partnering with State Farm Insurance to bring awareness of safe driving practices to Kentucky's teenagers.

"Young drivers are four times as likely as adults to be killed in a car crash," said KOHS Executive Director Chuck Geveden. "Driver distraction, lack of experience and skill, alcohol and the lack of seatbelt usage all contribute to the high number of fatalities for this age group."

Last year in Kentucky, there were 28,207 total crashes involving drivers under 21 years of age. These crashes resulted in 9,348 injuries and 136 fatalities.

"Car crashes remain the number one killer of teens and October continues to be our single biggest battleground month," said Lisa Ripley, spokeswoman for State Farm Insurance. "While promoting teen driver safety requires a year-round commitment, the fall time frame is critically important. As teens return to school, attend homecoming and begin managing very busy schedules, we want them to keep safe driving practices at the top of their minds because our data shows this is one

of the most dangerous times of year for teens to be on the road."

The KOHS is visiting 10 schools throughout the week with various programs, demonstrating the dangers of distracted driving and the benefits of seat belt use. Representatives from KOHS and State Farm will visit Western Hills High School in Frankfort on Tuesday, Oct. 19, at 1:30 p.m. EDT with the signed proclamation. Students will also participate in the KOHS Distracted Driving (D2) simulator, which gives lifelike exposure to the dangers of distracted driving without putting teenagers at risk by mimicking and displaying the handling characteristics of a vehicle. Drivers can receive and send phone calls and text messages while attempting to obey the rules of the road.

In 2009, teenage drivers accounted for 14,505 distracted driving related crashes, resulting in 4,531 injuries and 40 fatalities on Kentucky roadways.

Kentucky's new texting law bans texting for all drivers while the vehicle is in motion. For drivers under 18, use of all personal communication devices such as cell phones and pagers is not allowed while the vehicle is in motion.







#### **Ordinance #2010-3**

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

Whereas, KRS 83A, 130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance, provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and;

Whereas, KRS 132.487 and 132.488 requires submission to the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet prior to October 1 of each year the annual tax rate to be levied on motor vehicles and motorboats.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

**Section One: Tax Levy** - Motor Vehicles and Motorboats A. An ad valorem tax rate of <u>16.7</u> cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of motor vehicles and motorboats subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty A. All ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall be collected by the Rockcastle County Clerk in accordance with the provisions of KRS 134.800 and other applicable statutes

B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS 134.810 and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

#### **Ordinance #2010-2**

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes, and,

Whereas, KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance, and,

Whereas, KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, the city has calculated the tax rate(s) for real and personal property in accordance with KRS chapter 132. Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon,

**Section One: Tax Levy** - Real estate and personal property A. An ad valorem tax rate of <u>16.5</u> cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of 16.5 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes. Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty

All said taxes shall be due and payable at the City Offices as set forth on the tax bill. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a two percent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at the face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a ten percent (10%) penalty.

#### Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof

This ordinance applies to the 2010 calendar year tax assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2011 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

#### The Battle of Wildcat **Mountain Reenactment**

The Laurel County Home Guards, organizers of the 21st annual Civil War reenactment at Camp Wildcat, were pleased with the visitor and re-enactor turnout this past weekend, which brought several hundred people to the area. According to Laurel Home Guard President Juanita Westerfield, there were 462 reenactors and an estimated 2,000 spectators at both days' events.

Camp Wildcat (the first major engagement of regular troops in Kentucky) is held on the third full weekend in October each year. The event takes place on the site of the original Confederate Camp. The battle was fought on the mountain about two miles above the reenactment site. Some of the original earthworks are still visible at the battle site. A kiosk with information about the battle and several memorial stones are located at the mountain top were the Union Camp was located.

The Battle of Wildcat Mountain occurred October 21st, 1861when Confederate forces under General Felix Zollicoffer, commanding District #2, East Tennessee Brigade of the Army of Tennessee attacked the Federal, 1st Brigade of the Army of the Cumberlands, commanded by General Albin Schoepf atop Wildcat Mountain. During the battle Zollicoffer had artillery fire placed on the entrenched Federals and assaulted the mountain three times but failed to break the Federal stronghold.

The Battle of Camp Wildcat occurred during the first year of the war and spelled, "A dark and bloody chapter of our states' storied history." Though the casualties were small as compared to later Kentucky Battles such as Mill Springs, Richmond, and Perryville, the conflict at Wildcat Mountain was a significant historic event in that it occurred early in the war and denied the Confederacy a foothold in Kentucky when crucial political events were shaping Kentucky's role in

Attention to details and a knack for historical accuracy make the reenactment one of the states' best. Unit commanders are asked to inspect their units and make sure uniforms and weapons are period correct and worn correctly. The event has become one of the fastest growing Living History events in the country. Henry Smith, Vice-President of the Laurel Home Guard, stated that polls received from reenactors the past few seasons have ranked the reenactment second only to the Sacramento event near Bowling Green, Kentucky. Smith went on to say, "This was the biggest and best reenactment we have ever had. We hope to top this next year because it will be the 150th year anniversary of the battle." Juanita Westerfield also stated she would like to have more area schools participate in the School Day Program that occurs on Friday. Several local Rockcastle Countians participated in the event such as the RCHS JROTC Cadets, Long time reenactors Bobby Wilson, Darrell Doan, David Owens, B.J. Thompson and rookies Jerry Hensley and Willie Martin. #### Yards to Paradise

Plan for Fall Planting Now

As the days grow shorter and nights have a little chill in the air, it is not too early to make plans to plant this fall. Whether it be fall cabbage and kale, new shade trees or shrubbery, or even a new lawn, fall is an ideal time to accomplish these tasks. Begin planning now, as from first frost until the ground freezes is a great time to do landscape plantings.

As trees cease to grow new leaves as days get short and frosty nights nip any tender shoots before they get a chance to "harden off", fall planting works well for most trees and shrubs because the ground temperatures are still warm and the roots can still grow some. This gets a partial year's start for the new plantings versus waiting until spring to plant.

Usually a landscape professional is not quite as busy in the fall as in the spring and can get to your project sooner. This would be another good reason to plan on fall planting of major landscape items.

Often, folks will make impulse decisions when they see a pretty tree. They'll see a flowering cherry in the neighborhood that takes their breath away, maybe it's a Forest Pansy redbud, or even the ubiquitous Bradford pear. Then, they have to get the new tree they have a fancy for planted somewhere. This delimma can lead to troubles on down the road. Maybe there should have been amendments added to the soil, maybe the new tree should have been planted farther away from the house or the street. Mistakes of various nature are made when decisions are made without a plan. I strongly encourage the ho-

meowner to make a plan (or hire one prepared by a professional if you prefer). so that mistakes are avoided.

Forethought also avoids the wrong tree in the wrong spot—or, perhaps that's the right tree but the wrong spot?

Let me illustrate that point further. Suppose you've bought a hemlock tree, but your soil has a pH of 7.0 and you don't consider that. The new tree will not thrive, and may not even live. Or, suppose you dig the planting hole for your new maple tree and water begins to ooze in and fill the hole. If you've already bought a tree that does not like "wet feet", will you plant it in this soupy hole anyhow? Big mistake!

Having though out in advance the trees you want, the shrubs and perennials you want, then take your list and your sketch and check it with things like soil conditions, exposures to sun and wind, the ultimate size your plant choices will grow to be, etc. If some don't seem to pass this type of test, you may want to think about substitutions rather than the trees you first thought you wanted. Alternatively, you may want to build a raised bed and plant in new and amended soil condi-

As you can see, a little planning in advance can make a substantial difference in the ultimate success of your landscaping. Do your homework, and happy planting this fall.



#### **Exercise-Induced Asthma**

As the weather becomes cooler, we enter the season when many athletes have a greater chance of developing exercise-induced asthma. This is a form of asthma that is commonly brought on by exercise. It is caused mainly by the drying out of secretions in the airways, which then causes more irritation and spasm in a person's

lungs. Another factor is that the cooler air also appears to directly exacerbate asthma.



symptoms are often quite vague, such as fatigue or a stomach ache, especially in children. Exercise-induced asthma may also simply present as a decrease in an athlete's performance.

Exercise-induced asthma is diagnosed by lung function tests which show a decrease in air flow after exercise. Fortunately, treatment is very effective. For most people, all that is needed is an oral inhaler, such as albuterol, taken five minutes before exercise. If a couple puffs are not fully effective, it may be helpful to add a second drug.

If you think you become more short of breath than you should with exertion, you should see your doctor for an exam and lung function tests before and after exercise to answer the question.

With proper treatment, most asthmatic patients not only can participate in sports, they can excel--asthmatics have won medals in every Olympiad for the last forty



### Don't be taken in by something that sounds too good to be true

Parents of college-bound students may be hearing a lot of sales pitches from companies that promise to help find financial aid to pay for college.

There is no need to pay for this kind of information, according to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). It can be obtained free by working with your guidance counselor, checking out sources in the library, doing free online scholarship searches or contacting the financial aid office of the college you plan to attend.

If you decide to use a company to help find financial aid, make sure you're dealing with a reputable one. The Federal Trade Commission cautions students to be especially skeptical about scholarship search companies and websites that make false claims. Examples include:

•"We'll do all the work." It's highly unlikely that the company will fill out all the applications for all the financial aid sources it sends you.

•"I just need your credit card or bank account number to hold this scholarship." Never give these numbers to a person or company you're not sure about. You could find your credit card maxed out and your bank account cleaned out.


•"This scholarship will cost some money." Some legitimate scholarships do have up-front fees, but they should not exceed \$5 or \$10.

•"You're guaranteed to get money for college or your money back." Read the fine print. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
