
At a time when a lot of big city newspapers are shutting down and most people are getting their news electronically, small town newspapers have avoided that trend because they provide a service to their community.

"Headline News from 1962'

Recently, I read a magazine article about the news in the headlines during the year of 1962. Of course, it captured my attention because that year I was a senior at Mt. Vernon High. So I have decided to share the experience with my readers, who may also be interested in some of the events that were newsworthy during that year.

The segments of the articles below are in no particular order, and they are not chronological; they are just interesting to read nearly 50 years later. Do you remember any of these stories?

"US to Inspect Soviet Ships Taking Missiles from Cuba" On October 22, President Kennedy appeared on national television and announced that U-2 planes had detected missiles on the ground in Cuba. He demanded their removal and made the following declaration: "The Soviet missiles must be withdrawn or eliminated. I am proclaiming a naval quarantine of Cuban ports to prevent any additional armaments." The next day the Soviets agreed to remove the ballistic missiles from Cuban soil.

That event was very unsettling to me and most of my male friends because we were already considering the possibility of being drafted into the armed services. I remember discussing this situation with my friend, Bud Cox. However, he was already in college at Berea and I was going to UK as soon as I graduated so we knew that we probably could receive student deferments for at least four

"Mrs. Roosevelt Dies; Famous Pay Tribute" Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, a first lady whose sphere spread from the White House to the world died in her Manhattan apartment on Wednesday. The 78-yearold widow of the nation's 32nd President and niece of the 26th President died from complications with anemia.

Three Prisoners Escape from Alcatraz" Frank Morris, John Anglin, and Clarence Anglin became the only successful escapees from the Alcatraz Island Prison. There is no conclusive evidence that they survived this historic escape.

"Marilyn Monroe Dies from Overdose" The American actress, who was born in 1926, was found dead apparently from an accidental overdose. Many conspiracy theories immediately surrounded her death, involving both John and Robert Kennedy. It is generally believed to have been a suicide, but a lack of evidence prevented it being held so officially.

"Man Going to Moon" President John F. Kennedy delivers a speech at Rice University, reaffirming that the United States will put a man on the moon and bring him home safely by the end of the decade.

"Nelson Mandela Arrested" The South African government arrests Nelson Mandela in Howick and charges him with incitement to rebellion.

"The Rolling Stones Open for Baldry" The Rolling Stones perform their first formal gig at London's Marquee Club.

"Dr. No Opens with Rave Reviews" Dr. No, the first James Bond film, premieres in United Kingdom cinemas.

"Nixon Says Farewell with Attack on Press" An embittered Richard M. Nixon, his hopes for a political comeback in ruins, bade farewell to public life. He indicated that he will not remain in politics. He also accuses newsmen of being unfair.

'Corvettes Now Fuel Injected" The 1962 Corvette received the RPO 582 fuelinjected 327 V8 engine, delivering 360 horsepower. 1,918 Corvettes came with this option, and buyers paid an additional \$482.20 for the ultimate Corvette.

"Beatles Release First Single" Even though the popular English singing group has been playing in London clubs, their first recorded single was released this week. The name of the song is "Love Me Do."

I don't remember most of the profs who led me through college because they were mostly arrogant lecturers better left alone to solve personal problems that I could not begin to comprehend. But I do remember, very fondly, every teacher that I had in high school between 1963 and 1967.

And Mrs. Beulah Back who taught me English 3 and forced Herman Melville and Ernest Hemmingway down my throat for months on end during the school year of 1965 and 1966.

All the women teachers at Letcher High school were married except for Miss Whitaker and she was so fresh out of college that she seemed more like a student than a teacher, but that's another story for another time. But the teachers never made Mrs. this or that sink in and we kids all called them Miss whatever.

So Beulah was Miss Back.

I'm pretty sure that she had Red Badge of Courage, Moby Dick and The Old Man and the Sea committed to memory. And by the end of our junior years in high school we knew the meaning of every word in those three books and we had to read Mark Twain on the side and write book reports.

Her favorite line, and we heard it every single day was "You have to get in the know, boys and girls. You have to get in the know!" And Miss Back knew the English language inside and out, backwards and forwards.

You walked into her classroom and she had ten words written on the chalk board and the first thing that you did was write them down in your notebook and learn to use them in a sentence. I used to think that she had Webster's Dictionary

also memorized.

Many of my high school teachers seemed to wing it in terms of preparing lesson plans. Not Miss Back. She came to her room prepared to teach and she demanded that we learn and every single minute in her classroom was all business. She taught with a fervor that was intimidating at first, until we all got used to it. Education, to Miss Back, was not about having fun. It was about work and she took it oh so

She taught us all to take that attitude and six weeks into one of her classes we learned to adjust our attitudes when we entered the door to room 3. Because we knew we'd better be prepared to

Miss Back lived and breathed her job. She must have put in at least 12 hours a day grading papers and preparing lesson plans and I'm betting that she spent her summers trying to figure out how to make the next year more challenging.

Some of us learned faster than the others but she seemed to always keep our individual paces and I doubt she ever had a student who did not wind up loving her the way that I did by the end of the school year.

And she kept up with us long after we graduated high school. Several times when I was in college, I would get an encouraging greeting card from Miss Back in my mail box. Usually a one liner telling me to keep up the good work and I would go around grinning all day long. That's just the kind of teacher Miss Back was

I just learned that Mrs. Beulah Back passed over to the other side last week. She was 88 years old.

I just wish that I had taken time to catch up and to say



Three Links: One of Rockcastle's Oldest Communities, Part V

As you know, if you are a regular reader of the Roots series, we are visiting the area of Three Links through the memories and writings of Mabel Martin-Davidson. At this time of year, our focus often turns to hearth and home, and those we love. In the following story written on November 30, 1995, we can see an example of the kind of people that lived in the Three Links area, a rural farming community, much like it remains today. 

He married Eula (Jones) and they raised a family of seven children on a farm that joined the farm where he grew up, before moving to a farm near Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, where they lived the remainder of their lives.

Many things come to mind when I think of Uncle Hobert, but one thing that stands out most in my memory is the fact that he was the same Uncle Hobert when he was a child that he was when he was 90+ years old-he even looked the same. As times and many people changed to a more modern way of live, Uncle never changed. You could tell by his conversation and by the way he conducted his life that he loved people and he loved God. Folks would often come to him for help because they knew he would never turn anyone away empty handed. He never lost sight of the golden rule.

Uncle Hobert always had a good pair of mules. He never owned a tractor or modern farm equipment. He preferred to farm with his mules. Vegetables were growing that he had planted when he died at age 92 in 1995. He was blessed with a long life of good health. He had never been hospitalized until shortly before his death.

Uncle loved his mules. His favorites were Blondie and Julie. They became almost like a part of the family—like the family pets. When they were not needed to pull the wagon, they would follow Uncle to work on the farm and stay with him while he worked and then follow him back. With the help of Blondie and Julie he raised enough vegetables to share with his family and friends. He loved to share whatever he had with others.

A few years ago he sold Julie. Then one day when I visited him, he said, "I went to see Old Julie and when she heard my old truck comin' up the lane she commenced bawlin' so I just bought her back". And once again Blondie and Julie were a team. He said he would never separate them again.

Uncle Hobert, Old Blondie and Old Julie became very well known. Folks would come from far and near to see them and photograph them-and he loved every minute of it. He would hook Blondie and Julie to his wagon and go to family gatherings and reunions and take everyone for wagon rides. This was most enjoyable because many of our family had to move away from the farm to earn a living and the wagon rides took them back in time

Due to Aunt Eula's illness it became necessary for Uncle to sell Blondie and Julie, but he always like to keep in touch with them. During a visit with him after he had been diagnosed with terminal colon cancer, I told him that my husband, Armel, and I had been to see Blondie and Julie. At the mention of their names he "perked up" and with a twinkle in his eyes he reminisced about the good times he had with them and how "famous they are gettin' to be"--and he was loving every minute of it.

Uncle was special to me. As far as I am concerned he was a legend in his own time. I love him and I miss him very much.

Hopefully you have enjoyed visiting Three Links and getting to know Uncle Hobert and his mules. Next week we will visit the Three Links community for the last time...for a while, anyway.

Judge says magistrates are eligible for retirement...

Dear Editor,

I want to apologize to County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis for questioning his statement that "some people in this county don't want their neighbors to have services they, themselves, take for granted." (7.22.10 MVS)

Just this Thursday I found out that this is 100% true.

I'm sorry Buzz, you were right.

There are people who want some neighbors to have less than others.

Take, for example, the person who wants certain neighbors to have state retirement benefits that other neighbors do not have, in violation of state law 78.510.

Over 6 months of repeated open record requests to find out who told the state retirement system that magistrates were eligible for benefits were repeatedly put off. Requests were ignored, critical information was purposely redacted and requests were called unclear.

However, eventually the

state sent me one of the records the county claimed not to have.

Don't blame the magistrates. The record showed that "Buzz Carloftis" told the state that all magistrates are full time employees working 100 hours per month.

If our county judge executive uncandid Carloftis said it, surely it must be true. But the videotape I have from the last fiscal court meeting - when I asked the magistrates about this - shows otherwise.

Thursday around 4PM, when a third party asked Buzz how he could know that all magistrates were working 100 hours per month, Buzz set the record straight.

Buzz knows all magistrates work 100 hours per month because they could be called at any time. Therefore, they are working 24 hours per day.

I'm sure that this is how your boss pays you. Since it's possible that you could be called to fill in at any time, you get paid for working 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.





"I Wish You Could Know" Author Unknown

I wish you could know what it is like to search a burning bedroom for trapped kids at 3 a.m., flames rolling above your head, your palms and knees burning as you crawl, the floor sagging under your weight as the kitchen below you burns.

I wish you could comprehend a wife's horror at six in the morning as I check her husband of 40 years for a pulse and find none. I start CPR right away, hoping to bring him back, know intuitively it is too late. But wanting his wife and family to know everything possible was done to save his life.

I wish you knew the unique smell of burning insulation, the taste of soot-filled mucus, the feeling of intense heat through your turnout gear, the sound of flames crackling, the eeriness of being able to see absolutely nothing in dense smoke-sensations that I've become too familiar

I wish you could read my mind as I respond to a building fire, "Is this a false alarm or a working fire? How is the building constructed? What hazards await me? Is anyone trapped?" Or to call, "What is wrong with the patient? Is it minor or life-threatening? Is the caller really in distress or is he waiting for us with a 2x4 or a gun?"

I wish you could be in the emergency room as a doctor pronounces dead the beautiful five year old girl that I have been trying to save during the past 25 minutes. Who will never go on her first date or say the words, "I love you Mommy" again.

I wish you could know the frustration I feel in the cab of the engine, squad, or my personal vehicle, the driver with his foot pressing down hard on the pedal, my arm tugging again and again at the air horn chain, as you fail to yield the right-of-way at an intersection or in traffic. When you need us, however, your first comment upon our arrival will be, "It took you forever to get here."

I wish you could know my thoughts as I help extricate a girl of teenage years from the remains of her automobile. "What is this was my daughter, sister, my girlfriend or a friend? What are her parents reaction going to be when they opened the door to find a police officer with hat in hand?"

I would you could know how it feels to walk in the back door and greet my parents and family, not having the heart to tell them that I nearly did not come back from the last call.

I would you could know how it feels dispatching officers, firefighters and EMT's out and when we call for them our heart drops because no one anwers back, or to hear a bone chilling 911 call of a child or wife needing assistance.

I would you could feel the hurt as people verbally, and sometimes physically, abuse us or belittle what I do, or they express their attitudes of "It will never happen to me."

I wish you could realize the physical, emotional and mental drain or missed meals, lost sleep and forgone social activities, in addition to all of the tragedy my eyes have seen.

I wish you could know the brotherhood and self-satisfaction of helping save a life or preserving someone's property, or being able to be there in time of crisis, or creating order from total chaos.

I wish you could understand what it feels like to have a little boy tugging at your arm and asking, "Is Mommy okay?" Not even being able to look in his eyes without tears from your own and not knowing what to say. Or to have to hold back a long time friend who watches his buddy having CPR done on him as they take him away in the Medic Unit. You know all along he did not have his seat belt on. A sensation that I have become too familiar with.

Unless you have lived with this kind of life, you will never truly understand or appreciate who I am, we are or what our job really means to us . . .

I wish you could though.




An Attitude Within The Heart By Howard Coop





Things all changed for Brad in one classless phone call. A Louisville assistant coach (not the head coach) called Brad up and told him the bad news -- his scholarship offer had been pulled by the coaching staff.

Instead of Brad getting mad, he accepted it and moved on. UK Head Coach Rich Brooks heard the news and immediately called Brad and told him he was still wanted at UK. Brad accepted and the rest of the story leaves us UK fans with a big grin on our face

Since 2007, Brad's freshman year, UK is 4-0 against UL. UK has been to three bowl games and is eligible to reach a 4th bowl game this year. UL has been to ZERO bowl games since 2007. Coincidence? I will let you be the judge of that.

To get Brad to say a bad thing about UL and Bobby Petrino is impossible to do. He has been prodded and poked by reporters with the question, but he usually answers it the same way, "Things happen for a reason, and I am glad how things turned out." A classy answer by a college kid, who was told no by a classless adult.

When asked to finally admit there was a bonfire at the Durham home to burn all the Louisville gear when his scholarship offer was revoked, Brad answered: "I can't say anything about that." Again, another classy answer.

Brad has been a big part in breaking down some doors at UK during his tenure. His freshman year, he played in all 13 games and was the only freshman offensive lineman who saw any playing time.

He was part of some great victories. UK beat then-ranked UL in the opening game. They took down the eventual national champion LSU tigers in a gutwrenching overtime win, and ended with another bowl win against Florida State.

However, Brad says one of the best highlights that year was getting to play on the same side of the offensive line as fellow Rockcastle County native Jason Leger, against Eastern Kentucky. "I know there was a lot pride Rockcastle County when that happened. To have two kids from Rockcastle playing together in a college football game at the same time was great, but to do it side by side, was even bet-

His sophomore year, Brad started four games and played in all 13. UK beat UL, again, and got another bowl win.

I have to think though there was a little self-pride in the victory against Arkansas that year. Remember Bobby Petrino, the coach who pulled the scholarship from Brad? He left UL after the 2006 season, to head to the NFL Atlanta Falcons.

Thirteen games into the season, Petrino quit the Falcons job, by leaving notes to his players in the locker room on a Tuesday, and accepting the Arkansas Razorback job at a late night press conference that same night. Did I say this guy is classy?

In Brad's junior season, he started four games and played in all 13 games. UK beat UL again, and they got two big time SEC road wins, at Georgia and Auburn. They would go on to make another bowl game, the fourth straight for UK.

So far in his senior season, he has started 9 games and has played in all 11. UK beat UL, again, (it was a recurring theme during Brad's tenure at UK), and he helped snap the dreaded streak against Steve Spurrier and the South Carolina Gamecocks.

"Jail"

House Bill 290, which is the Kentucky State Budget, allows for the continuation of the state's early release policy for sentenced, nonviolent inmates, most of which are housed in county jails like Rockcastle.

So what does this mean for Rockcastle? Budgeted expenses for the jail are based on previous years actual monies spent. In 2009-10 fiscal year, the fiscal court budgeted \$125,397 to transfer to the jail to cover their expenses. The county actually transferred \$255,000 to cover the jail's operating deficits that year.

The jail's main source of revenue for their yearly budget is the monies received for housing state prisoners. In 2009-10, the jail budgeted \$753,550 in revenue from the state, and received \$785,276 because the state sent money that they had owed the jail from the year before.

However, the outlook for the 2010-11 fiscal year is drastically different. Knowing that revenue from the state would be far less, the fiscal court budgeted \$354,212 to transfer from the general fund to the jail to cover expenses. The jail had dropped their expected revenue from the state to \$650,000 and, to date, has only received \$185, 849 in actual monies from them.

With seven months left in the 2010-11 fiscal year, the county has already transferred \$226,100 from the general fund into the jail fund for expenses.

"Our problem is that in order for the jail to be self-sufficient, we only need to house 24-26 county prisoners at a time. However, our current average is 38-40," Jailer James Miller said.

The county is only reimbursed by the state for 12 beds for county prisoners, a rate set by the state in the 1970's before the jail was remodeled and expanded.







Signature Authority for Spouses–Farm Service Agency (FSA) Programs

For FSA and Commodity Credit Corporation programs in which either has an interest, husbands and wives may sign most documents on behalf of each other. This option is automatically available unless a written request for exclusion is made to the county office by either spouse.

These are exceptions to the rule, where spouses may not sign on behalf of each other for partnerships, joint ventures, corporations or other similar entities.

Individual signatures are also required on certain Farm Loan Program and farm storage Facility Loan documents.

Farm Service Agency Administrator Urges Farmers and Ranchers to Vote in County Committee Elections That Began on Friday, Nov. 5

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Jonathan Coppess has announced the 2010 FSA county committee elections will began Nov. 5, with USDA mailing ballots to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is Dec. 6, 2010.

"All eligible farmers and ranchers can make a difference by voting in this year's county committee elec-

tions," said Coppess.
"County committee members will provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of new disaster and conservation programs under the 2008 Farm Bill. I particularly encourage minority and women producers to get involved so that county committees fairly represent the producers of a county or

multi-county jurisdiction."

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and the Department of Agriculture (USDA). Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support loans and payments; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities; emergency programs and payment eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm also may

be eligible to vote. Agricultural producers in each county submitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended on Aug. 2.

Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can obtain ballots from their local USDA Service Center. Dec. 6, 2010, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers. Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than Dec. 6. Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2011.




were entertained by Lady Antebellum and Easton Corbin in a concert exclusively for FFA members at Lucas Oil Stadium.
