According to police, Tommy Reynolds, Jr., 31, of Crab Orchard, was arrested and charged with driving under the influence, possession of drug paraphernalia, possession of a controlled substance 1st degree and other drug and traffic

During the stop, troopers located a cosmetic container on the roadway that had reportedly been thrown from the vehicle. Troopers found several items of drug paraphernalia and approximately 3.5 grams of methamphetamine.

Reynolds, who was lodged in the Rockcastle Detention Center, was due in court Wednesday.

If you haven't eaten at the Back Porch Restaurant in the Village at Renfro Valley, you need to. My two companions and I (that's how they say it in real restaurant reviews, but it was just Jason and Spencer) went there last Thursday for lunch and wow, it was good.

They serve barbeque just about any way you want it. We all three got the pulled pork on a plate (instead of a bun) with two sides and a roll. This all comes for under \$6 and it was well worth it in both the taste and amount of food. We had four of their sides and I tasted each (baked beans, coleslaw, potato salad) but the fried potatoes were to die



Renfro Valley responds to Letter to the Editor...

Dear Editor,

I am the Special Events Manager at Renfro Valley Entertainment Center and have worked in this department for eleven years. I am writing this letter in response to Mr. Hunt's Letter to the Editor (May 26, 2011). There are two sides to every story.

One of the responsibilities of my position is to oversee the backstage area of our New Barn facility where concerts are held. Our company's policy is to keep this area very secure for the protection of the headliner performers. In fact, many of the headliner performers require extra security. Each Road Manager provides me with a guest list for the backstage area. Exile did not give me a backstage listing, so I assumed no one was to be permitted backstage. Standard contractual

policy at Renfro Valley is to allow each headliner performing a fixed number of complimentary concert tickets plus complimentary dinner tickets for their band and crew members. Road Managers also provide me with a listing for their complimentary tickets and meals. Mr. Hunt and his family were not listed as guests; however, they informed us at our Ticket Counter that they would pay for his tickets should he desire to see the concert. They did purchase him tickets, which later was refunded back to Exile for Mr. Hunt declined to come to the show. Where the food was concerned, I told Exile that Mr. Hunt was welcome to eat even though he wasn't on the list.

Renfro Valley had no problem with Mr. Hunt and his family attending the show or with them eating at the Lodge Restaurant. At no time was he or his family confronted by any staff member or owner from Renfro Valley and asked to leave the New Barn Theater or the Lodge Restaurant.

leave our premises by anyone from Renfro Valley. However, Renfro Valley has a strict backstage policy and not even Renfro Valley employees are allowed backstage when we have a headliner concert. We do this out of protection and privacy for the members of the band, and Renfro Valley has expensive equipment in the backstage area. Due to some miscommunication I believe this incident completely got out of hand. I didn't realize there was a problem and if anyone had just asked I could have cleared up any miscommunication and fixed the problem. However, if I am unaware there is a problem I cannot begin to even try to find the solution.

Renfro Valley would like to stress that everyone is welcome here. There are policies and procedures that we all must follow, but we would like to extend a welcome not only to Mr. Hunt and his family but to the community as well.

would take a book to write about them. Suffice it to say, we had some great ones (and a few that were not). Teachers they truly were and I remember them fondly. Sometimes I can recall some of the wise and profound things they would say; for instance when Paul Holbrook ask me if I would please get his topcoat from the cloak room because he had just ripped his pants! One of the "hardest" teachers I ever had was Mrs. Jane Smith. It was very difficult to be in her class. I hate to admit it but there were times when I would ask for more help and she would turn me down because it wasn't fair to the other students in my class!!! But you know what, I really did respect her more for that and it taught me some valuable lessons. Mom was one in a

million...(yes, I was partial.) Livingston, in general, was a nice town in which to grow up. The people were friendly and everyone knew everyone else. Some of those people I remember so well were merchants. Remember Sam and Pearl Halcomb and the drugstore? A good spot for kids and for ice cream. I remember when my family wanted ice cream, I would go to the drugstore, get 6 dips of ice cream (in a bowl that I brought from home--yes I did) and it would cost 25 cents.---Now, don't that just

kill you? Bingham's Restaurant was probably the number one hang out for the kids. Mr. Dewey and Mrs. Bertha were like everyone's Mom and Dad. I get "warm fuzzies" just thinking about that place and all the good

times we had there. Of course we had grocers, Mr. Foster Mullins, Calvin Webb, Lee Mullins and Pauline and P. L. Poynter. It sure wasn't Wal-Mart but we spent a lot of our money with them.

Some of the places we lilked to go to were sorta off-limits (don't tell) like Trolley Inn and Wes Settles place because we could dance there.

There were a few places in town where people could get jobs and not have to leave Livingston. Several service stations, repair garages, the casket factory, the merchants, the school and the theater. Dr. Webb started a movie house and it was just the place to be. Many happy hours whiled away there. Until you turned 12 years old, you got in to see a movie for 9 cents. But, when you were all grown up, you had to pay 40 cents. Dr Webb gave me my first job, I was an usher and concession stand attendant. I could see free movies and a salary of \$2.00 a week. And,

I only had to work nights and week-ends—oh well. Mrs. Webb opened a clothing store and that was a big plus for us.

Of course, there were several churches in town and all were well attended on Sunday mornings.

At one time, we had a skating rink in Livingston. Just one more thing to add to our happy days. No one can remember Livingston and not think of the Blue Devils, the very best basketball team/s ever!! What great times we had at the ball games. GO DEVILS.

And I know no one has forgotten Dr. Webb's office; the good old Doctor and his needle is something I will never forget. I say his needle, because I think he only had one...

I know it is hard to believe, but in the good ole days, Friday and Saturday nights were the nights when everyone went to town. It was hard to find a parking spot anywhere near town and the restaurants (we had four) were just packed and running over. I can remember at least 6 of us in one booth and the person on the outside end had someone sitting on their knee. A quarter got us 6 songs on the juke box and a five cent Coke would last most of the

Not many of our gang had cars, but when one was available, we would all chip in for gas and have a great time, just riding around. We spent a lot of time at --"Do Better"-- my, oh my...By the way, 50 cents in gas sometimes was enough for Friday and for Saturday night, too!!

Like a lot of other people, I left Livingston after I graduated from high school and only went back for visits. Over the years, as I saw all of the changes in the town and the loss of people who had been so much a part of my life, I realized that it's true, "nothing stays the same": oh that it would. Wouldn't it be great to have just one more 'good ole day"?

Gee I hope I didn't get carried away with all the memories. I also hope that perhaps a name or a place has triggered a pleasant memory for you and that Livingston will always be remembered fondly.

ber one of the 500 greatest songs of all time by Rock and Roll Magazine. This Hall of Famer is still going strong and releasing new recordings after performing for five decades.

Another favorite "oldie" of mine is Neil Diamond, who also turned 70 this year. He is another singer/song writer who produced hits in every one of the last 4 decades. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame this year. I have been fortunate enough to see Neil in concert on three separate occasions, and he is, in my view, one of the finest performers ever, period. Some of his greatest hits include: Kentucky Woman, Holly Holly, Song Sung Blue, Cherry Cherry, Brother Love's Traveling Salvation Show, and You Don't Bring Me Flowers, which he sang with Barbara Streisand. Neil Diamond continues to "bring the house down" at his concerts.

Eric Clapton is the only three-time inductee to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. He is now my age - 67. Since the early 60's I have listening been "Slowhand," as he is called, sing and play his amazing guitar. Rolling Stone Magazine ranked Clapton as number four in the list of the 100 Greatest Guitarists of All Time. It seems that he just gets better with age. His most recent CD's have continued to reach the top of the charts. It is difficult to find tickets for his often "sold out" concerts. His song Wonderful Tonight would rank in my personal Top 10 of all rock and roll songs.

Another of my all-time favorites is Bob Seger. He too is my age. I was fortunate enough to see him live at Rupp Arena in 1976. Then Kathy and I saw him a couple of years ago when he returned to Rupp. Seger too has been singing, writing, and performing for over 40 years and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2004. Three of his songs continue to be on my top 20 list including, Night Moves, Like A Rock, and of course, Old Time Rock and Roll, which has been charted as the second-most played Jukebox Single of all time. Raspberries and blackberries

The raspberry and blackare brambleberries. brambleberries are a valuable addition to the diet. They provide fiber and are a good source of potassium and vitamin C. One cup of raw berries contains 70 calories and no fat. The sweet ripened berry is tasty without added sugar and combines well with other fruits.

Look for plump fruit that is uniform in color and appears fresh. Berries should be free of stems or leaves. Avoid fruit that is moldy, crushed, or bruised. Store unwashed and covered berries in the refrigerator. Use within two days.

Handle all berries gently. Raspberries are more delicate and perishable than other brambleberries. Wash berries by covering them with water and gently lifting the berries out. Remove any stems and drain on a single layer of paper towels. Serve berries over cereal with milk or use in recipes for salads, pies, breads, and desserts.

Berry Cobbler 2 cups berries 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg, well beaten Mix together in a greased pie pan or. baking dish. Topping: 11/2 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 cup sugar 1 egg, well beaten 1/2 cup low-fat milk 1/2 cup melted margarine

Combine flour, baking powder, and sugar in a mixing bowl. Mix egg, milk, and melted margarine together. Stir gently into the flour mixture. Spread over the top of the berries. Bake for 30 minutes at 425°F.



Bible Talk

Our study this month will be on the New Testament priesthood of Jesus and our priesthood.

The Priesthood of Jesus - It was prophesied in the Old Testament, "The LORD hath sworn, and will not repent, Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek." Psalms 110:4. We see this fulfilled in Jesus, "So also Christ glorified not himself to be made an high priest; but he that said unto him, Thou art my Son, to day have I begotten thee. As he saith also in another place, Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedec." Heb.5:5-6. Jesus did not assume this role; for God called Jesus to this place of honor, as he did Aaron under the Old Testament. Here are

- 3 reasons why Jesus' priesthood is superior to the Levitical priesthood under the law of Moses. 1.) Those priests died, but Jesus has an unchangeable priesthood, for he ever liveth now, Heb.7:23-25.
- 2.) They offered sacrifices for their own sins and then the sins of people. But Jesus was holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners, he was the sinless Son of God, Heb.7:26-27.
- 3.) Animal blood just could not take care of the sin problem. Heb.10:4, "For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins." Only the blood of Christ has the real power to take away sin, Heb.9:25-26, Rev.1:5!

The Priesthood of Every Believer- In 1 Pet.2:5 & 9 we read, "Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ . . . But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should show forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light:" In this passage Peter is affirming the priesthood of every believer. For the book was addressed to the Christians scattered abroad, chap.1:1. In the New Testament order, there is not a separate group of the saints that serve as priests for the rest, as was in the Old Testament, (and as seen in churches of men). No, every child of God has the exalted privilege of becoming a part of this holy priesthood, this royal priesthood. Priests are those that offer sacrifices to God. Now we "offer up spiritual sacrifices" today under New Testament practice, by Jesus Christ our high priest. The Hebrew writer put it this way about these spiritual sacrifices, "By him therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips giving thanks to his name. But to do good and to communicate forget not: for with such sacrifices God is well pleased." Heb. 13:15-16. We become a part of this priestly order when we believe and obey the gospel of Christ. Have you turned to the Lord Jesus Christ in faith and obedience?

Track finishes 5th; Hunter wins 3 state titles

The RCHS girls' track and field team finished up another very successful season with an impressive 5th place finish at the Class 2A State Track and Field Championships held at the University of Louisville this past Thursday. Highlands won their 4th straight state title followed by runner-up Louisville Central. Elizabethtown finished 3rd and North Oldham 4th, just ahead of RCHS. 45 teams qualified for state and scored in the meet with approximately 90 teams com-

Sophomore Michaela Hunter had a totally dominating performance at state finishing with an amazing 38 of a possible 40 total points in the meet. She led all scorers in Class 2A, as well as both Class A and 3A. Michaela won three individual state championship titles and finished as state runner-up in another.



came the 400-meter dash and multiple state title winner Alisha Adair of Western Hills. What was anticipated as potentially the race of the day in Class 2A turned out to be no contest. Michaela began to pull away at the 200-meter mark and kicked it into high gear down the stretch running straight into a substantial head wind. She won her third straight state title in the event, finishing in 58.60 seconds, over 1.5 seconds ahead of Adair.

After a strong rain came and finally began to dissipate, Michaela began preparations for the triple jump competition. With the 200-meter dash coming up, Michaela rushed to get a couple jumps in before having to leave the competition. On her second attempt, she hit what would turn out to be the winning effort, leaping an incredible 36'11.25" which was less than 9" from the state record. Michaela didn't receive her last two attempts since she was competing in the 200-meter dash. Since she had technically already won the event by 2'4", the triple jump judges closed the event, denying her a couple more opportunities for the record. Nevertheless, she recorded her third state title win on the day.

Her final event, the 200meter dash, came down once again to her and Adair of Western Hills who had a great day of her own. A close race throughout, Adair edged Michaela in a photo-finish by three hun-

For her amazing performance, she was recognized as recipient of the KHSAA Class 2A Sportsmanship award given to the state competition's most outstanding competitor who must also have displayed appropriate poise and sportsmanship throughout championships. Michaela was the third RCHS recipient of the award in the last four years, following former RCHS state champions Morgan Thacker in 2008 and Samantha Smith in 2010. Michaela will be automatic first team all-state for winning the 400-meter dash, long jump, and triple jump, and will likely make first team all-state in the 200meter dash as well.

Sophomore Johnson also scored for RCHS despite the rainy, wet weather conditions that made it nearly impossible to spin in the discus competition.

Jessica led the girls' 1600-meter relay team of 8th grader Tanika Chasteen, sophomore Bryonna Cromer, and 8th grader Alyssa Cox to a season's best performance. The team ran an amazing race an finished 14th overall in a season's best time of 4:29.77.

The girls' 3200-meter relay team of Jessica, 8th grader Rachel Cain, Bryonna, and Alyssa Cox also ran a spectacular race, finishing 14th overall in an impressive 10:44.05. Their best time this season would have placed them 10th in the competition.

The girls' 400-meter relay team of freshman Jalia Parker, Tanika, freshman Lyndsey Abel, and Bryonna ran an awesome race at state. The foursome




Perkins earns SBC honors



NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY RECOVERY BY ENVIRONMENTAL SURCHARGE OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY'S 2011 ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE PLAN

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on June 1, 2011, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") filed with the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") in Case No. 2011-00161, an Application pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute 278.183 for approval of an amended compliance plan ("KU's 2011 Environmental Compliance Plan") for the purpose of recovering the capital costs and operation and maintenance costs associated with new pollution control facilities through an increase in the environmental surcharge on customers' bills beginning January 31, 2012 under KU's existing Electric Rate Schedule ECR, also known as the environmental cost recovery surcharge.

Federal, state, and local environmental regulations require KU to build and upgrade equipment and facilities to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KU is seeking Commission approval of Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity ("CPCN") to construct new Particulate Matter Control Systems to serve all units at the Ghent Generating Station in Ghent, Kentucky, and to serve all units at the E.W. Brown Generating Station in Burgin, Kentucky, to comply with the national emissions standards for hazardous air pollutants proposed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA"). The Particulate Matter Control Systems are also being installed to comply with EPA-imposed sulfuric acid mist and opacity requirements. Additionally, KU is seeking recovery of costs associated with these environmental projects, which are necessary for compliance with the federal Clean Air Act, the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, and other current or proposed environmental laws and regulations, and enforcement actions. These additional projects primarily relate to installing Particulate Matter Control Systems to serve all units at the Ghent Generating Station, installing Particulate Matter Control Systems to serve all units at the Ghent Generating Station, converting the main coal combustion residuals treatment basin at the E.W. Brown Generating Station to a landfill and other pollution control facilities. The capital cost of the new pollution control facilities for which KU is seeking recovery at this time is estimated to be \$1.1 billion. Additional operation and maintenance expenses will be incurred for these projects and are costs that KU is requesting to recover through the environmental surcharge in its application.

The impact on KU's customers is estimated to be a 1.5% increase in 2012 with a maximum increase of 12.2% in 2016. For a KU residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month, the initial monthly increase is expected to be \$1.13 during 2012, with the maximum monthly increase expected to be \$9.46 during 2016.

The Environmental Surcharge Application described in this Notice is proposed by KU. However, the Public Service Commission may issue an order modifying or denying KU's Environmental Surcharge Application. Such action may result in an environmental surcharge for consumers other than the environmental surcharge described in this Notice.

Any corporation, association, body politic or person may, by motion within thirty (30) days after publication, request leave to intervene in Case No. 2011-00161. 

Thinking About Cleaning Your Carpet! Some things to think about...

What is the best way to clean my carpet, should I use the old technology of steam cleaning or the new technology of dry foam?

Test results from Consumer Report, 2008.

Option 1: Steam Cleaning-How does it work? A. Steam Cleaners saturate your carpet and floor pad with hot (150* degree) soapy water containing lye and beach to

help dissolve stains. B. After your carpet reaches its maximum saturation point the solution is then extracted by means of a commercial shop

vacuum. The results: Removes less than 20% of the soil from the carpet driving the remainder down deeper into the carpet fibers. The lye/bleach solution used by steam cleaners to dissolve stains fades carpet colors. Drying time is 1 to 5 days depending on the carpet texture.
