Fugitive found in abandoned house last Thursday

An Orlando man, who had escaped custody from the Lincoln County Sheriff, was found in an abandoned house on Water Tank Hill in Brodhead last Thursday.

Kentucky State Police received an anonymous tip that James "Cody" Spoonamore, 24, was in the home. When police arrived, they surrounded the house and found Spoonamore hiding. Spoonamore escaped June 23rd from Lincoln County Sheriff Curt Folger when they tried to serve him with a warrant. Spoonamore shoved away from police and ran off from a recycling yard in Crab Orchard.

In addition to the warrant from Lincoln County, Spoonamore was charged with probation violation on a third degree burglary charge and resisting arrest.

Spoonamore is lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center under a \$10,000 cash/property bond and was in court Wednesday to answer to the charges. Spoonamore's court appearance was after press time Wednesday.

School physical clinic to be held

The Rockcastle County Health Department will have a clinic at the Rockcastle County Middle School on Thursday, July 7th and Tuesday, July 12th, from noon to 6 p.m. for all students who will need a school physical.

There will be three nurses on site to do physicals and administer vaccines. Parents /guardians must be present to sign the consent forms. Due to regulations of the Kentucky Vaccines for Children Program, vaccines can only be administered to those children who have Medicaid, no insurance, or insurance that does not pay for vaccines.

To my extreme pleasure, she has done it again – and did a bang-up job. My new acquisition is called Roy Orbison – The Monument Singles Collection (1960 – 1964).


While recently shopping on Amazon.com and looking for a CD that my wife had requested for her birthday, I was prompted by a personal message to me from Amazon. It was a reminder that one of the artists who I had listed as my favorites had recently released a new CD, which was, of course, this Roy Orbison disk. After reading a brief synopsis of its contents, it quickly made its way into my shopping cart.

When this new discovery arrived, I could not wait to sit down and be carried back to my teenage years, listening to one of the best voices ever to record in the rock and roll era. I was not disappointed in the least. The three-disk set is filled with the Nashville-based Monument Records (founded in March of 1959) that actually made Roy famous. Even the back-up band is outstanding, including: Boots Randolph, Floyd Cramer, Charlie "Mr. Harmonica" McCoy, Bob Moore, Buddy Harman, Harold Bradley, Hank Garland, and the Anita Kerr Singers.

Barbara Orbison turned this set into a special collector's item. She loaded the first disk (called the A Sides) with many of Rov's most undeniable hits. Several of these "hits" were penned by Roy himself, inciuaing: in Dreams, "Working For The Man," and "Falling." Other hits on the disk are: "Only The Lonely," "Blue Angel," "Crying," "Dream Baby," "Oh Pretty Woman," "It's Over," and many others. All of the songs are recorded, true to the times, in their monaural format. If you close your eyes, you are immediately transformed to the AM radio days of the early 60's.

The second disk is called the B Sides and includes several songs that also went on to hit the top of the charts. I am sure you remember: "Pretty One," "Candy Man," "Leah," and one of my favorites, "I Can't Stop Loving You."

I can distinctly recall Roy climbing to the number two

The house that I grew up in started out as a work in progress. As best I can tell it started out as a small log cabin with one chimney in 1880 and then my Aunts and Uncles started getting born and pretty soon there was nine of them plus Pap and Mam.

By the time my Mom came along the original cabin was an L shaped contraption with ten large rooms, three large halls, two stories high and three chimneys. Three fireplaces and flues for two cook stoves were scattered about. It was not a mansion but it had grown to be, by far, the biggest house on Blair Branch. At some point in the late

nineteen teens or early twenties, Pap helped start a saw mill and covered up all the logs with poplar weather boarding which he painted white. The clapboard roof was replaced with rolled as-

phalt roofing and the chimneys all sealed in. Very attractive and quite cozy for the times according to my relatives who grew up there. And, for that matter, I didn't have any known reason to complain until I entered high school and discovered that most of my class mates had indoor plumbing and far better ways to cook and heat.


I remember once at Blain Branch Grade School when a teacher asked everyone in the room to hold up their hands if they had running water. She was simply trying to get a handle on her pupils' living conditions. There were 80 or so of us

and my brother Keeter, who had just entered first grade was the only one who held up his hand. The teacher was skeptical so she asked him to describe it. Keith said "when the buckets run dry we run out to the well and draw some more water and then we run it back to the kitchen."

When I entered first grade, the teacher seated us in alphabetical order and l wound up it the first seat of the first row. She asked us to stand up, one at a time. and state our names and tell everybody where we were born. I had to go first and l prided myself at being number one. So I stood up and announced that my name was Ike Reece Adams and I was born in the back room. Miss Ison cracked up and when she and everybody else stopped laughing she clarified the question. She said, "No, what I mean is what town were you born

I explained to her that I'd never lived in town and that I was born in the back room at Pap's house a little over a mile up the holler. She laughed again, but this time she was the only one because everybody else

Cecil Hampton Remembers Rockcastle

Last week, we were given the chance to view Rockcastle County through the memories of Ann Clark-Hampton, who was better known as "Ernestine" during her school days. This week, we'll take a look at Rockcastle through the memories of her husband, Cecil Hampton.

Cecil was born in Western Brodhead in the Negro Creek area in 1936. He was the son of Pearl Hampton who was born in Harlan, Kentucky, in 1901. His mother was Bertha Reynolds-Hampton, born in Berea in 1905. Cecil had eleven brothers and sisters.

Negro Creek was a small,

close-knit community where everyone knew each other and seemed like family, more than just neighbors. This wasn't uncommon in communities all over the country during certain gone-by eras. Other than the Hamptons, the Bishops, Brummetts, Stephenses, Benges, and Chandlers called this place home.

In the fall, when the cane harvest time came along, the locals to the area would gather together in groups of as many as forty, fifty, or more. They would boil the cane into molasses, and this was a time of much anticipated celebration, especially to Cecil. The locals would



Mamaw's Kitchen

I love bread pudding! My friendSteve and I often had lunch together when we both worked at ADP in California. The little cafeteria nearby had bread pudding on their menu every Thursday. As it turned out, this was one of Steve's favorites

BISCUIT PUDDING 4 cups biscuit pieces (day old biscuits, broken into pieces) 2 cups milk

1 1/2 cups sugar 2 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla Pour milk over biscuits and let sit until milk is absorbed. Beat sugar, eggs and vanilla well and add to bread mix-

ture. Pour into greased 3 quart casserole or baking pan. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes. BROWN SUGAR BREAD **PUDDING**

2 cups milk 1/2 cup brown sugar 3 medium eggs 1/4 teaspoon salt 3 cups soft bread pieces 4 tablespoons butter In a medium sized bowl, whisk together the milk, brown sugar, eggs and salt. Beat until the egg is fully incorporated into the milk. You can use stale bread and heels and tear them into small pieces. Arrange the bread pieces in a well oiled 2-quart sized casserole. Pour the milk and egg mixture over the bread. Press the bread down into the liquid so that it sinks a little bit. Cut the margarine into small bits. Dot them on top of the bread mixture. Bake at 350° for about 45 minutes.

2 cups half and half 1 can (15 ounce) pure pump-

bring all kinds of food to eat and the children would play an array of impromptu games. It wasn't unusual for some to bring musical instruments and serenade the others. Their gatherings lasted for two, three, or more days depending on how much cane was to be boiled. The foam that came up to the top was skimmed off and put in another area, usually a pit nearby. This was known as "Joe foam". These cane grindings or molasses stir-offs lasted late into the night, maybe until the wee hours. It sounds like a good way to spend the crisp fall night.

This was just one of few entertainments. The remainder of the time, Cecil spent either going to school or working. At the age of thirteen, he worked in a sawmill, which is hard work at any age. Cecil explained that most people were poor, and were used to hard times and hard work.

When Cecil went into town, which wasn't but once or twice a month, the streets were lined with horses and buggies. This was during the 1930s and 1940s. Of course, there were a few cars, as well.

When Cecil left Negro Creek, he often treated himself to a "night on the town", so to speak. With only a quarter, he could see a movie at the Dan Gray Theater (I hope I got that right) at Brodhead for nine cents, and with the change have popcorn, a Coca-Cola, ice cream, and a piece of Bazooka bubble gum.

The locals often took their corn to be ground at the mill by horseback. Equal amounts of corn was tied over each side of a horse, being careful to keep it bal-

Money was scarce, but that didn't quench the desire to attend the Brodhead Fair each year. Cecil would pick and sell blackberries until he had enough money to attend the fair, and maybe enjoy a few extra treats.

In 1952, when Cecil was sixteen, he went by bus to Lockland, Ohio, just out of Cincinnati to visit his brother, Walter. He learned that Fox Paper was hiring, and he told them that he was eighteen. He worked eight hours the first day, and remained with the same company for thirty-seven years.

Meanwhile, he traveled back to Rockcastle when he

could to see a special girl, Ann. She was a classmate, but upon seeing her looking through a window at what was known as the Block church near Crab Orchard, he knew she was "the one".

In 1953, he came back for her. She was sixteen, and people said that the marriage wouldn't last six weeks. Here it is, fifty-eight years later and they are still doing well. Cecil says the secret is true love.

By the time he was nineteen, Cecil and Ann had three children: Judy (Jeter), Georgina (Smiths) and Timothy, who is a minster in Indiana. They have seven grandchildren. Cecil also served from 1975 to 1992 on the city council before returning to retire to his roots, here in Rockcastle County.

So she asked the class to hold up their hands if they were born at Jeremiah and not a hand went up. Finally I told here that nobody was born at Jeremiah but that's were all of us got our mail and as far as I knew, everybody in the room was born on Blair Branch. She sighed and shook her head and realized right then that it was going to be a long, tough school year.

Nashville. After this concert, Roy made twenty-three world tours, recorded twelve albums for MGM, appeared in a few movies, sang with the Traveling Wilburys, starred in the Black and White Nights concert on American television, received several Grammys, and also appeared on albums of other stars.

In 1987, Orbison received a Grammy for his hit "Crying" with K. D. Lang. In November 1988, Mystery Girl was released, and Traveling Wilburys rushed up the charts, earning him yet another Grammy That album spent 53 weeks on the US charts - that is more than a full year.

When Roy died in 1988, he still had two albums reigning in Billboard's Top 5. That made Orbison the first musician since Elvis to have two albums in the Top Five at the same time. Roy had already been inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame the previous year.

On December 6, 1988, at the age of 52, Orbison was having dinner at his mother's home in Tennessee when he died of a heart attack. His death, like only a handful of others, was an international news event. It was carried on the front page of the New York Times.

Orbison was a one of a kind - there will never be another. The music that he wrote and played was distinctively his own - made even more so by his unique voice. Having given inspiration to countless successful artists in the development of rock and roll, he

will never really be gone. Thanks, Barbara.

Financial Aid Tip of the Month

Money for college through KEES

Kentucky students can earn money for college through the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES) program, administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). The program rewards students for making good grades in high school and doing well on the ACT or SAT. The awards may be used upon graduation from high school. No application is necessary. KHEAA will send the funds to the eligible college once the school verifies student's enrollment.

Students may use their KEES awards at any public college or university in Kentucky, at most private colleges and universities in the state and at many of the state's trade schools. If a major isn't offered in Kentucky, students may be able to use their KEES awards at out-of-state schools that offer that major and belong to the Academic Common Market. These majors must be approved by Kentucky's Council on Postsecondary Education, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio schools are not eligible because those states do not participate in the Academic Common Market.

Students earn a KEES base award for each year they achieve at least a 2.5 grade point average (GPA) at a certified Kentucky high school. Students who earn at least one base award can also earn a bonus award for scoring 15 or higher on the ACT or 710 or higher on the SAT. Students who qualified for the free or reduced lunch program during any year of high school may also earn bonus awards for scoring at least a three on any Advanced Placement (AP) exam or at least a five on International Baccalaureate (IB) exams.

After their first year of college, students must meet renewal GPA requirements and make progress toward college graduation to remain eligible for their KEES awards. For more information about renewal requirements, visit www.kheaa.com.

Helpfulness permeates our culture By Howard Coop






I was surprised when she called me by my name,

Our study this month is about the spiritual war that we are engaged in, the good fight of faith.

The War- "For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh: (For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;)" 2 Cor.10:3-4. Also in I Tim.1:18, "This charge I commit unto thee, son Timothy, according to the prophecies which went before on thee, that thou by them mightest war a good warfare;" Yes, the people of God are in a war. We must fight and battle against the foes of darkness. "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." God has given us the equipment to fight this battle.

m The\ Armor\ of\ God}$ - "Put on the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil . . . Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God:" Eph.6:11, 14-17. Notice that we have armor to protect every part of the body except the back. We are not to run cowardly away from the devil and his servants in the battle of right and wrong. Taking the Lord's armor will allow us to meet the enemy face to face.

PRIDE volunteers have worked hard to educate our community members about the value of putting trash in its proper place and the importance of recycling. All the hard work is paying off and we invite more people to join PRIDE again this

The Get Five for PRIDE challenge set the goal of a five-percent increase in the number of volunteers who served during the 2010

Spring Cleanup. Rockcastle County met the challenge by recruiting 1,088 volunteers in April 2011. Livingston also increased its volunteers by more than five percent, reach a total of 54.

The goal also was surpassed by the region as a whole, with more than 33,100 volunteers. In fact, the 2011 Spring Cleanup saw the largest volunteer turnout since PRIDE began organizing the annual cleanup campaign in 1998.

The month-long Spring Cleanup campaign removed 32,840 bags of trash and 27,513 tons of trash from the region's landscape. Ten tons of junk appliances and 52 tons of other materials were recycled. 203 tons of old tires were gathered for proper disposal.

The annual Spring Cleanup is hosted by Eastern Kentucky PRIDE, a nonprofit organization that encourages environmental cleanup and education in a 38-county region. Local governments organized the cleanup activities, and PRIDE provided supplies, volunteer T-shirts and funding assistance.

a supplement to the jail fund from the general fund to \$475,150 from \$450,000 originally esti-

The changes came about because of a 50c per hour increase in pay for county employees approved at the June meeting of the court.

Also at Thursday's meeting, the court approved the closing of Copperhead Lane, a distance of two/ tenths of a mile, by request of the property owners.

The advertisement for bids for a new roof and repairs at the courthouse annex was approved. The costs will be paid for by the Administrative Office of the

Several claims were also paid, including \$23,500 to Reynolds excavating for work on Possum Kingdom Road, a FEMA project, through the Soil Conservation Service, and \$3,800 for work at the animal shelter, paid for partly through a grant and an anonymous \$5,000 gift to the shelter.

The work at the shelter consisted of new screw anchors for the metal roof, a shelter roof for the outdoor area and sidewalks.





For their service, EKU SERV Corps members receive a living stipend and an education award that can be applied toward past or future college expenses, free health care, child care benefits if eligible, and forbear-

ance on educational loans during their service period. The biggest benefit, though, may be the extensive service and professional experience and contacts with schools, agencies and communities that prove helpful in starting a career.

"Almost invariably,"

Thames said, "our AmeriCorps members go on to good jobs after their AmeriCorps service. It definitely opens doors."


