# SourceCorp to meet obligation to Industrial Development Board Hopkins also told that

In their regular monthly meeting Monday, RCIDA Executive Director told the board of directors that SourceCorp would meet their obligation to RCIDA to start paying occupational taxes on 200 employees, even though they do not currently employ that many

As part of the agreement for SourceCorp to locate in Rockcastle County, the company agreed to pay for only the employees they had through July 31, 2011, and

would begin paying occupational taxes on 200 employees as of August 1, 2011, even if they did not have that many employees. Currently, SourceCorp employee numbers are well below 200, due to a furlough of the 96 NOAA employees and the end of contracts with other companies that use SourceCorp.

However, SourceCorp is in the process of adding 90 jobs under a new contract, and will be adding 7 jobs from a current contract that they have.

Hopkins also gave the board two items to think about including the idea of a "site" building to help encourage businesses to locate in Rockcastle County. Hopkins told the board that Pulaski County currently owns a "site" building that allows companies, looking to expand, a space they can make their own for the initial startup from where they can grow their business. Hopkins pointed out that Pulaski County had a "site" building available to Safe Auto Insurance who leased part of the building, brought in 48 employees and has now built in their industrial park and has 268 employees. Hopkins also told the court that Lincoln County is in the process of constructing a "site" building in order to attract new business

Estimates for the cost of a 20 to 25,000 square foot building that could be used to attract two to four businesses at a time is in the \$500,000 range. The site building option would allow the Industrial Authorityto have a building already in place that can be modified to the needs of the business without having to build a "spec" building at a much higher cost. Hopkins told the board that a problem with a "spec" building is that many companies who are looking for space have very specific needs that a "spec" building may not address.

# after five month investigation

Seven Orlando residents were arrested Sunday after warrants were issued as a result of a five month investigation into illegal drug activity in Rockcastle County.

All seven were charged with one count of trafficking in a controlled substance first degree. Additional arrests are expected.

KSP Post 11-London Detective Don Sivils and Senior Trooper Jason VanHook are the lead investigators and were assisted in Friday's arrests by other officers from the Kentucky State Police.

# **Fiscal Court approves** final 2011-12 budget

In special session last Thursday, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court approved a \$5,617,273 budget for the coming fiscal year. The total budget revenue estimate is \$6,127,681 which includes surpluses of \$509,408

The main changes in the budget from the its first presentation to the court was a lower-

ing of the surplus in the general fund from \$500,000 to \$350,000 and an increase in a supplement to the jail fund from the general fund to \$475,150 from the \$450,000 originally estimated.

The changes came about because of a 50c per hour increase in pay for county employees approved at the June meeting of the court.

Also at Thursday's meeting, the court approved the closing of Copperhead Lane, a distance of two/tenths of a mile, by request of the property owners.

The advertisement for bids for a new roof and repairs at the courthouse annex was approved. The costs will be paid for by the Administrative Office of the Court.

Several claims were also paid, including \$23,500 to Reynolds excavating for work on Possum Kingdom Road, a FEMA project, through the Soil Conservation Service, and \$3,800 for work at the animal shelter, paid for partly through a grant and an anonymous \$5,000 gift to the shelter.

The work at the shelter consisted of new screw anchors for the metal roof, a shelter roof for the outdoor area and sidewalks. On Wednesday of this week, County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis told the Signal

that he had been in contact with the Department for Local Government as to what affect the reapportionment of magisterial districts would have on the five constables in the county. The reapportionment did not affect the present magistrates.

Carloftis said that according to an attorney general's opinion, the reapportionment of magisterial districts will take effect immediately upon approval of the plan by the court. This item will be on the agenda at next Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the court.

Two of the present constables - districts 3 and 4 - do not live in the newly located districts. However, Carloftis said that, according to the opinion, these constables will serve as constables at large until the next county election when, if they choose to do so, they will have to stand for election from the new district.



The Roots

of Rockcastle



The Chevrolet Corvette I may have been only nine-years-old when the first Corvette rolled off the assembly line in Flint, Michigan, but I remember it happening nonetheless. The year was 1953. The original design was an attempt to mimic the popular European sports cars - Jaguar and MG. General Motors wanted to show the world that it could compete with that market.

The 1953 Corvettes were totally built by hand and were only offered in one color scheme: Polo White with red interiors. This unique car was powered with a Chevrolet 6-cylinder, 235 cubic-inch engine with a three – carburetor design. The motor was aptly named the Blue Flame Special; it generated 150 horsepower.

The Corvette became an immediate hit with sportscar enthusiasts and with young people all over America. Just a few years later, I remember shopping

at Helton's Five and Dime on Main Street in Mt. Vernon and finding a model car kit of the '55 Corvette. I was thrilled that I could make the purchase, and I spent the next few weeks in a labor of love with my special new model. When it was finally complete, it took its place on the dresser in my bedroom along with my other fine automobile models. I even positioned the lamp on that piece of furniture so it would showcase the '55 Vette.

In those days, I was assisting my father (Hobe) with his service station in Mt. Vernon. He allowed me to stand on a wooden box and clean windshields while he filled the cars with gasoline and checked the oil. (Remember gas stations were called "service stations" for a reason.)

I took great pride with my first job in the automobile industry. Each window was carefully cleaned with great care. When I began this new chore, Dad kept on eye on what I was doing, "David Joe," he'd say, "You missed a spot here!" I would quickly retrieve my box and do the job over until he was satisfied. In no time I had learned how to complete this task to his satisfaction without having to repeat any

One day while I was on my window-washing duty, I looked out of the window of the station and noticed a Corvette approaching. I high-tailed it out of the station and dashed to get my rag and window cleaner. I not only cleaned the windshield, I cleaned every window on that hot automobile. Daddy asked why I was being so complete with this particular car, and I replied -"It's a Corvette!" That was probably the first time I actually touched one of these special cars.

In 1959, Raymond "Red" McClure purchased a new Corvette, which I believe was the first one in Mt. Vernon. Every time he parked his "ride," droves of teenagers gathered around to check out its distinctive features. Red often was kind enough to take the time to answer our questions and even to let us get a peek under the hood.

The following year, when I was finally able to get my driver's license, Raymond allowed me to drive his fine car. He sat in the passenger seat and directed me on where and how fast I could go. I will never forget my experience as a youngster with this classic automobile. The sheer power of the vehicle, in addition to its cool design, made me feel like someone special. Somehow, it sort of took hold of me.

When I was in college, one of my friends owned a '60 Vette, and we spent a lot of time cruising around

Rockcastle County is now offering a recycling drop-off program. Recyclables may be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Recycling Center on US 25 South (2528 South Wilderness Rd.) during the hours of 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. Monday thru Friday (closed major holidays).

The following items may be recycled:

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, books & catalogs, office paper, junk mail, phone books, plastic bottles & jugs (#1-7) (any size soda and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid and alcohol bottles (please rinse out jugs), metal cans (rinsed), empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, sheet glass, ceramics, computers, radios, phones, vacuum cleaners, clocks, cameras, camcorders, vcr/dvd players and satellite boxes. Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools,

cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled), cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. If its says rechargeable on it, then it's recyclable! Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County

Road Department during regular business hours.

Recycling trailers are also available at the following locations: City of Brodhead (gravel lot across from Citizens Bank), City of Livingston (gravel lot across from old Livingston Gymnasium), Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department (at Conway) and at the Pongo Volunteer Fire Department. The trailers will only be pulled out to empty them and will then be taken back to the same location. Please help us make this a successful venture by being clean and/or neat with our recycling habits. Do not put anything in the individual bins except what is labeled on them. Do not leave recyclables on the ground! If you drop something on the ground, pick it up. Absolutely no trash is to be put into the bins! 

Virginia. She had brought a bounty of various treats to us that she had gathered along the journey. Among the treats were some thoughts of her growing up here in Rockcastle County that she had written prior to the trip. The following is a portion of those memories.

My dad was and still is the most handsome man I have ever known. He was 6 foot, wavy black hair and the Irish blue eyes that twinkled all the time when I was little. He was very proud to have been a Fireman first class in the Navy during WWII. I did not know what that was until after he died and a patient of mine was impressed and I asked him what that was. Fireman first class was responsible for keeping the ship and submarine engines trouble free. I was told they were very important to all.

I can see daddy standing straight in our old house in front of the fireplace that really did not warm unless you were almost in the fire singing "Anchors Away". He would be saluting, then he'd start marching and sing "From the Halls of Montezuma". Daddy loved to sing and by the time I was 6 or 7 I knew all the verses. After our song fest, he'd put potatoes in the fireplace ashes to roast. While they were roasting, he cracked walnuts for us kids to eat. This only happened when it was really cold and snowing and he couldn't do out

I was his right arm. We sawed wood together with a cross cut saw, shelled corn to take to the mill for cow feed and shelled corn to make cornmeal. He taught me to milk cows, drive the

tractor and chop corn and tobacco at a very young age. I had a stump of wood that I stood on to make gravy on our wood stove (I was about 7). When the moon was full in the fall, he and I would gather corn and I'd chase newborn mice, most of the time they were white.

Daddy only had a fifth grade education because the children were expected to work on the farm in his youth. It was his unspoken command that we stay in school. (We did). Two of us went on to college and two of us did not. He taught us to respect others, to be honest and generous. He taught us this by example.

It was a bit shocking at \$69,000!





# Benefit singing for Rockcastle KARST Conservancy group

History will be repeated at historic Great Saltpetre Cave when country and bluegrass music rings from Echo Auditorium on Saturday, August 20th, 2011,

A ninety minute concert titled Music In the Mountain will feature the Renfro Valley Performers doing their fun filled "Front Porch Pickin" show in the cave's natural auditorium with proceeds to benefit the Rockcastle Karst Conser-

Rockcastle residents have a unique and rich heritage of enjoying this cave resource. RKC continues this tradition by opening The Great Saltpetre Cave Preserve to the public a few times a year, annually in May for Open House and by special arrangement for educational school field trips and scout groups. This year an additional date has been added for the Music in the Mountain

Great Saltpetre Cave will open the gates to ticket holders on August 20th from 10 am to 6 pm. The Music in the Mountain performance begins at noon. Come early to enjoy the property and picnic on the grounds. Tickets must be purchased in advance.

It was on July 27, 1941, that John Lair did his first live radio broadcast of the Renfro Valley Barn Dance on station WHAS from inside the cave. Mr. Lair, from Rockcastle County, was a musician, DJ, musical promotor, and entrepre-

Lair worked at radio stations WLS in Chicago and WLW in Cincinnati before moving back to Kentucky in 1939 to develop the Renfro Valley Entertainment complex.

The Renfro Valley complex thrives today, giving people a taste of the traditional culture that was rooted in the hills of Ap-

palachia. In 1939 he became part owner in Great Saltpetre Cave. After acquiring the cave from his partners he set out to develop a tourist attraction to share the history of the region with visitors.

Lair transformed Great Saltpetre Cave from an abandoned saltpeter mine into a tourist cave complete with trails, stairs, bridges, electric lights, a museum area, and even a stage for entertainment. Over the years, Echo Auditorium, the largest room in the cave, has been the setting for music shoes, church services, weddings and a movie, among other things.

For the past six years, the 300 acres that make

up The Great Saltpetre Cave Preserve has been owned by The Rockcastle Karst Conservancy (RKC), a nonprofit organization. This is the only community based nonprofit organization in Kentucky dedicated to protecting cave and karst environments and is made up of the same group of volunteers who have managed the Great Saltpetre Cave for over

25 years. RKC's mission is to protect caves through wise stewardship and ownership. The group recently acquired another cave property in the area to protect its significant bat population. For more information about RKC, please visit rkci.org.





# Ronnie Milsap returns to Renfro

Ronnie Milsap was born January 16, 1944, in the Appalachian town of Robbinsville, North Carolina. Blind since birth, Milsap spent his early childhood in an impoverished farming community.

With financial support from his grandparents, he attended the Morehead State School for the Blind in Raleigh, where he was schooled in classical music and learned to play the piano, violin, and guitar.

Milsap continued his education at Young-Harris Junior College in Atlanta, where he studied political science. After his graduation, he was offered a scholarship to Emory University, but instead chose to pursue a professional career in

In 1964, at the age of 20, Milsap released his first single, "Total Disaster." The following year, he relocated to Memphis, where he fronted his own rhythm and blues band.

In 1970, they recorded the pop single "Loving You is a Natural Thing." The following year, Milsap released his eponymous debut album for the Warner Bros. record label.

In 1972, Milsap moved to the country music epicenter of Nashville, Tennessee; in 1973, he signed with RCA Victor. A slew of hit singles followed, including "I Hate You" (1973), "Pure Love," and "Please Don't Tell Me How the Story Ends" (both 1974). For the latter single, Milsap was awarded a Grammy for Best Male Country Vocal Performance.

Furthermore, the Country Music Association named Milsap male vocalist of the year in 1974, 1976, and 1977.

Most recently, Milsap released the album Then Sings My Soul (2009).

To date, Milsap boasts 40 No.1 country hits, six Grammy Awards, and eight Country Music Association Awards.

# Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Garden: July Not Too Late To Start One

The price of produce and just about everything else we all buy and enjoy continues to escalate.

What with wars, protests, national debt crisis, tainted produce killing people in other places (and much of the produce for sale locally is from farflung places), not to mention that it can be fun, more nutritious, more convenient and more safe and sure to go to the backyard to get the fixings for salad, the tomatoes to slice for sandwiches, and the okra and squash and green tomatoes for frying right outside the home; let's start a garden if we haven't already, for July is not too

There's perhaps 90 days before a frost, and lots of veggies have less than 80 days to maturity from planting. There are varities of beans, tomatoes, squash and so on that even mature in 60 days. Plus lettuce, cabbage, broccoli and so on that will grow right on through the early frosts to produce a fine harvest. So, today I am encouraging each of you who will read this to start a garden so that you may enjoy both the experience and it's fruits. The fruits of a little bit of your own labor.

Oh, you may say, I don't have a plow, a tiller, or even a hoe. How can I grow a garden?

Or, you may say, yes, but the soil has to be worked and it's too wet, too hot, too dry, etc. Is that a fact?

Certainly, tilling the soil to an adequate depth and breaking up the clods can produce a super medium for growing things. A little manure, rock phosphate and potash, or a little nitrate, or some balanced garden fertilizer of blended organic formula may be needed, and will likely make for a bigger, faster-growing garden of veggies, and perhaps comingled with flowers. Burn a little brush pile on the lawn and use the dead spot where the ashes lay to plant in - works every time! Or, if the spot has lain fallow for the past year, no fertilizer may be required to make a crop of produce. Decomposing organic matter usually has the minimum naturally ocurring nutrients your plants will need. Be it half an acre for experienced gardeners, or a 8 x 8 spot for a new gardener, you can grow some things in your yard and enjoy them on the dinner table later this summer and fall.

But, here is an idea I have used personally with great success—and no tools or tractors are required.

Take a quick trip to the hardware store, buy a small one gallon sprayer and some Roundup or Spectracide and mix up according to directions a batch of weed or grass killer. Spray a designated section of lawn or other ground to kill existing vegetation. (If you're wondering if you'll be able to tell where you've been and not kill things you didn't mean to-use some pond dye or some food coloring in the sprayer along with the chemicals so you can tell exactly where you've sprayed.) And you should be able to begin planting immediately or within 3 to 5 days at the latest, depending on the type plants you want to grow. Isn't that easy so

OK, almost all the food you buy in the grocery store

was grown this way (except for the certified organic or the locally grown that you buy off the neighbor) using Roundup or other herbicide before, at, or even following planting (there is such a thing now as Roundup resistant corn and soybeans—honest). So, for those who always buy strictly organic stuff, you may be offended at this column. But, on with the story for the majority of you.

The best garden I ever

grew was on a dry hilltop in western Rockcastle County, Kentucky over a decade ago, and I did not begin until after the July 4th weekend. I mowed part of what had become a hayfield with a lawn mower, then used weed killer liberally. Then planted beans and corn flat on top of the ground...and used bagged topsoil to cover the seeds. I sprinkled a little 10-10-10 fertilizer on the ground very near the plants as they came up, again lightly covering the fertilizer with just a little bit of soil. There was no trouble with the seed coming up through hard garden soil, and with some watering during dry spells, this produced wonderful results.

The one thing I learned the hard way, tomatoes are very sensitive to weed killer.


So, keep the plants in a temporary container or flowerpot or something for a few days. Within 3 to 5 days the effects of the weed killer will have diminished drastically and not kill the plants after that period.

The decaying grass blades and roots will be fertilizer and mulch to the plants. Just like where farmer Brown bales straw and plants no-till corn on 1000 acres of bottom land via one trip through the field with a tank of weed killer, a corn planter, and a fertilizer application in one pass through the field of stubble and grows a bounteous harvest of corn so too can you grow a no-till garden. And July is not too late to start!

I will allow that in July you may find shrivled tomato plants in tiny pots for sale and a selection of other seeds where perhaps the varities in most demand are sold out. Don't let these obstacles bother you either! If the tomato plant is too old, break off the top, and it will sprout a new plant from the stem. As for the bean seed...if you've never heard of the variety before, try it anyhow. It'll be a learning experience. And most likely you'll enjoy harvesttime just

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




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I Will Give One Piece of Advice

In the comic strip "B.C." there occasionally appears a little guru who sits at the top of a mountain. Other characters climb the mountain looking for words of wisdom. What if you were that guru at the top of the mountain? What if others came to you for advice? What would be the one piece of wisdom that you would share with them? What philosophy of life could you impart to them in a brief period of time that would change their lives?

I know what I would tell them. My one piece of advice that would improve their lives would be very simple: FLOSS. You heard me correctly. I said "floss." No, I am not a dentist nor

am I being paid by a dentist. I am not a shill for the dental floss industry. I think that, when you stop to consider it, this piece of advice makes all kinds of sense.

I began flossing my teeth late in life. Two things made me start. One was a particularly thorough cleaning by my dental hygienist. I must have said "Ouch!" four hundred times during that cleaning. When the dentist came in, I mentioned that this was the most painful cleaning I had ever experienced, thoroughly expecting him to chastise this woman for her rough treatment of his valuable patient (me). Instead all he said was, "If you would floss regularly, the cleanings wouldn't hurt." At that moment I decided flossing sounded like a very good

The second event that began my regular use of a dental floss was my discovery of a new kind of floss called Glide. My teeth are very difficult to floss. The floss hangs up and breaks and I end up with little pieces of floss stuck between my teeth. I am worse off when I finish than when I began. But not since I discovered Glide. This stuff is amazing! It does not break but slips easily between my teeth, which are much too close together. Glide makes flossing a breeze.

It takes less than a minute to floss, yet many of us do not take that time. We offer many excuses. Some floss only occasionally. Others who floss regularly skip the teeth that are difficult to reach. (One local dentist was asked, "Do I have to floss all my teeth?" He replied, "No. Floss only the ones you want to keep.")

What does flossing have to do with improving the quality of life? First, you get to keep your teeth longer. For those of us who grew up with no fluoride in the water or in the toothpaste, we need all the help we can get. I hope to end life with my natural teeth intact.

Second, flossing means that we are taking the time to take care of ourselves. Taking that one minute means that we will stop what we are doing long enough to do something beneficial for ourselves. For many of us this is quite an accomplishment. We may labor long and hard in the service of others but take little time for

Who knows what might happen if we began to take good care of ourselves? We might begin to exercise! To eat well! To get enough sleep! To have regular physical, dental and eye exams! To stop abusing our bodies with alcohol and other drugs! To spend quality and quantity time with our children and spouses! To take time to enjoy life! To cultivate the spiritual component of our lives! The possibilities, as they say, are endless!

Could all of this happen just because we take the time to floss? Yes, it could. Flossing is just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to taking care of ourselves, but we have to start somewhere. How about it? Will you floss tonight? If you climb my mountain, that is what I will recommend.

the same. Resist growing corn if you only have room for a couple plants, as two plants wide in all directions is a minimum to get a full set of kernels on each cob or ear. But, beans, tomatoes, squash, okra, cabbage, eggplant and many other edibles can be grown from now until frost. Even as late as September you can plant

turnips and mustard and kale and get fine crops in the late fall.

Deadline for SURE is here Signup for the Supplemental Revenue Assistance

Payments (SURE) program for the 2009 losses opened on January 10, 2011.

To be eligible for SURE a farm must have:

At least a 10% production loss on a crop of economic significance

A policy or plan of insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for all economically signifi-

Been physically located in a county that was declared a primary disaster county or contiguous county by the Secretary of Agriculture under a Secretarial Disaster Designation, Without a Secretarial

Disaster Designation, individual producers may be eligible if the actual production on the farm is less than 50% of the normal production on the farm due to a natural disaster. Producers considered socially disadvantaged, a

beginning framer, or a limited resource farmer may be eligible for SURE without a policy or plan of insurance or NAP coverage.

Remember: July 29, 2011 is the deadline and NO late filed applications will be accepted.

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# **Growing Together**

So you think you know petunias

Petunias, that staple of grandma's sunny garden. These prolific bloomers have been a part of the gardens of Kentucky for generations. Maybe you've gotten away from using petunias, what with the proliferation of newer varieties of annuals that have seemingly taken the place of these standbys. Traditionally, petunias have required "cleaning" meaning removing the old flower heads and have sometimes not stood up to heat as well as we'd like.

Several years ago all that changed when the plant world was taken like a tsunami by the first Wave® petunia. These magenta show-offs spread like a ground cover and bloomed profusely all season with little help from the gardener. There soon followed additional colors in the Wave<sup>TM</sup> brand and petunias were front and center again.

On the basis of that success, petunia breeding went into high gear. Perhaps the hottest recent introduction is "Pretty Much Picasso" with its magenta center and neon green border on the flower. This beauty is especially eye-catching in a hanging basket or planter. A combination called "Picasso's Fantasy" puts the striking petunia in combination with a white alyssum called "Snow Princess" and a matching green Sweet Caroline compact sweet potato plant for a spectacular combination.

"Raspberry Blast" is another new introduction with all the color the name implies.

Perhaps the most unusual introduction for 2011, however, is a variety called "Black Velvet." The name says it all. In combination with the white "Snow Princess" or another contrasting color, the black flowers against striking green foliage create a sophisticated presentation. And, just to add one more dimension to the black motif, a variety called "Phantom" features yellow stripes on the black blossoms.

So, if you've passed the petunia section at your local garden center by lately for newer and more interesting offerings, take a second look at plants your grandmother would have been wowed to have on her sunny porch.
