City Council approves use of ballfield on Hwy. 1326

In a very short regular monthly meeting, the Mt. Vernon City Council approved the use of a ballfield on Hwy. 1326 (Old Brodhead Road) that the city owns.

Joyce Cummins, neighbor to the ballfield, and numerous parents and

ballplayers were at the council meeting to ask for permission to use the ballfield.

According to Cummins, baseball teams in the county have a hard time finding enough fields to practice on especially since there is not a field in the Mt. Vernon city limits to use.

Parent David Fain presented a few statistics to the council, including the fact that Rockcastle County ranks 86th out of the 120 Kentucky counties in obesity/fitness.

Parents told the council that the teams that would use the field would be willing to help with any finan-

cial concerns that arise with the field, as well as labor for upkeep in order to make the field functional.

Fain told the council that parents would be willing to fundraise revenue to make the field usable for both baseball and football. Currently the field is only being used for little league football.

Shea Taylor becomes first amputee sanctioned to compete with prosthesis

The Georgia Athletic and Entertainment Commission awarded transibial amputee, 28 year-old Shea Taylor, his amateur mixed martial arts license, allowing him to compete in the September 23rd MMA event at Wild Bill's Atlanta.

Taylor's licensing marks a ground breaking moment for the sport of MMA, as no previous amputee has been granted a license to fight in a sanctioned event while wearing a prosthesis.

"Other amputees have competed in MMA, but without the ability to wear a prosthetic device," said Taylor. "My drive wasn't to be the first given the right. I'm simply proud to inspire other amputees to pursue whatever avenues they choose."

Taylor, the son of Coy and Linda Taylor of Willailla, chose to amputate his left leg below the knee on December 7th, 2010 after enduring 12 previous surgeries resulting from a motorcycle accident in July of the same year. "I eventually chose to amputate because I was miserable. Saving my leg didn't make me more functional. Amputation would allow me to re-

turn to the intensely active person I had always been," Taylor explained.

Intensity has always defined Taylor's life. One of six boys raised in rural Kentucky on a working dairy turned beef cattle farm, Taylor was obligated to complete farm chores before dawn and after school, and especially prior to playing his favorite sport, baseball.

He was a standout collegiate shortstop at both Lindsey Wilson College and Campbellsville University in Kentucky from 2001-2006. Taylor went on to play in the Manitoba Senior Baseball League as a short stop for the Brandon Marlins.

After baseball ended in 2006, a sales position brought Taylor to Atlanta, where his interest in mixed martial arts began.

"I have always been competitive," Taylor said. "While I love golf, it wasn't something that could give me competitive fulfillment. MMA allowed me to stay in shape and explore my competitive drive." In 2009, Taylor began as a novice at the sport, but by year's end had earned a 3-0 amateur MMA record with one offi-

cially sanctioned fight.

Returning to the gym and cage motivated Taylor after the wreck. On January 20,

Energy company gives presentation to Fiscal Court

Does Watching Football Affect Domestic Violence?

Incidents of domestic violence, where one partner in an intimate relationship hurts another, are affected by watching football on television, but not necessarily in the way one might expect. I have heard and read that Super Bowl Sunday has more domestic violence incidents than any other day of the year. A study done in Idaho in 2005[i] concludes that this is not true, though Super Bowl Sunday ranks third in that state in most instances of domestic violence. New Year's Day and Independence Day rank first and second. Why these three days? The study speculates that the increased use of alcohol on these days may be the reason.

A more recent study found that the volume of calls is affected by whether the home team wins or loses.[ii] This study looked at 763 police departments in six states and checked the call volume after 900 regular season NFL games. The number of domestic violence calls to police increases 10% when the home team loses a game they were expected to win. Calls increase by 20% when they lose to a traditional rival or if they lose in the playoffs.

No one is suggesting that watching football "causes" domestic violence. Many men watch pro football and are never abusive to their partners. The increased tension and disappointment of an unexpected loss, how-

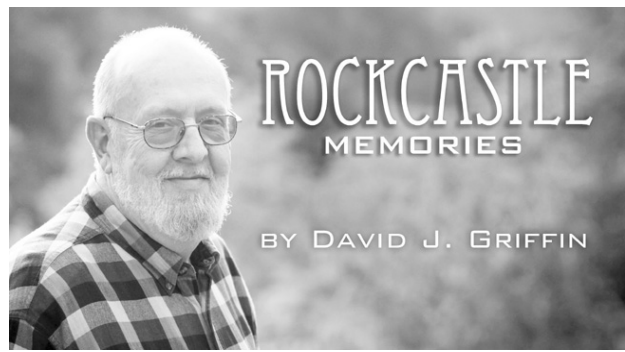
ever, may bring out the violence that already exists in one partner. Also, the frequency of alcohol consumption while watching football may increase the number of abusive incidents. Again, alcohol does not "cause" domestic violence but may trigger the expression of violence in someone who is already on the edge.

Unfortunately, the study found no beneficial effect on domestic violence calls if the home team wins. Calls to police did not decrease if the home team won, even if it was in a big game or was an upset.

What kinds of families are affected by "football violence?" The authors of the study say that it is impossible to pinpoint exactly what types of families are affected, because the study looked at calls and not actual arrests. Based on the limited data that the authors did find, they felt that the violence cut across racial and economic lines and applied to all types of families.

Domestic violence is still the leading cause of injury to women in the United States. One in four women will be a victim of domestic violence at some time in her life.

Mommie Katie's Pocketbook

My grandmother (Mommie Katie) always referred to her purse as her pocketbook, and she used that term often. All of her life she was a stay-at-home housewife and maintained her home exquisitely. Her home was her castle, and she alone was completely in charge. One large chest of drawers in the guest bedroom was filled with her "unmentionables," and in the very back of that same drawer, she kept that big old pocketbook well hidden. No one else ever opened that drawer, and none of us was actually sure of what she kept hidden there.

Mommie Katie was always coming up with new ideas to position her furniture, even that special chest of drawers. Sometimes after the rest of the family was fast asleep, she would get out of bed and re-arrange the furniture in one room or another. You never knew where things were to be found when you got out of bed for breakfast. It was her beloved domicile, and she wanted it to be just as she desired. About the only items that were secure were the living room couch and the easy chairs, because they always were pointed toward the television. It had to be located close to the antenna, which was positioned on the roof of the house.

As the breadwinner of the family, my grandfather (Pop) customarily gave Mommie Katie cash each time he received a check from Aubry Feed Mills or Louisville Grocery, where he worked for over forty years. Of course, none of us ever knew how much he gave her each month - nor did we even consider asking about it. We just knew that each time he handed her money, she quietly walked to the guest bedroom and pulled out that old pocketbook.

Mommie Katie used her "stash" for her own purposes; there was never a discussion about it. After many years of observation, the rest of the family knew that she used most of that money for gifts, charity, and her weekly tithe to the First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon.

It was long-established that the pastor of our church would come home with the family after Sunday services - it was relatively rare for this not to occur. Of course, he also made home visits regularly. Every time he was ready to leave, Mommie Katie would exclaim, "Don't leave yet!" She then made her way to that chest of drawers, and as she shook his hand goodbye, she discreetly handed him some cash. She never made a

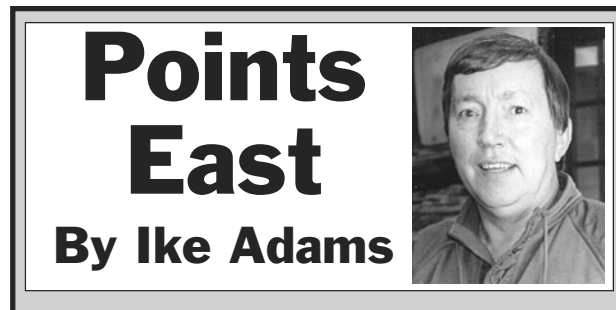
spectacle out of it; she simply wadded up a handful of cash and placed it into his hand. Even Pop knew not ask how much money she gave to the pastor on his visits to our home.

When I became a teenager, Mommie Katie consistently kept herself aware of my needs at that most important stage of life. When she noticed that I was getting ready for a date, she would ask, "David Joe, do you need some money for your date?" Of course, my answer was usually the same - that I could sure use it. She would then proceed to retrieve her pocketbook, and out came a "secret amount" of cash.

She always gave me the same orders: "Here, put this in your pocket and don't tell anyone!" When she handed me bills, they were always wadded up; so I would quickly pocket it and gave her a big hug. As soon as the exchange was complete, she always said, "Now you be careful." The whole deal was kept our secret because that is the way Mommie Katie wanted it. Only after I had gotten into my car did I check to see just how much she had given me. Usually it amounted to fifteen or twenty dollars - no small sum in those days!

You don't hear the term "pocketbook" much anymore - and if you do, it will absolutely be someone elderly woman to utter it. Therefore, whenever I hear that word or even see it written, Mommie Katie immediately pops into my mind. I don't think she ever allowed anyone to leave her home hungry or needing a small amount of cash. I think she was the most gen-

I'm actually going to put in a row of snow peas and late Roma II beans as well as hill or two of Poinsette cucumbers before the week is out.

Yesterday Loretta and I ventured over to the Lincoln County produce auction to fetch a load of bushel baskets. Ralph King has a bumper crop of half runners coming on. We had been hoping to sell them for \$30.00 a bushel. Yesterday at the auction they were selling for \$68.00 to \$75.00 a bushel! If all goes as planned, I will be back at the market come Monday morning with a truck load to sell myself. I do love half runners, but if they are fetching \$75.00 a bushel, I will do without.

In the meantime, if you live in Wind Gap, PA, for example, there's a chance that you can still sow spinach there where the sunflowers used to be and have

a marvelous crop come late winter or early spring. Otherwise, you should give up anything other than cleaning up the residue left this fall from your dead and dreary stalks----assuming you live in northern Pennsylvania or thereabouts.

And not many of you readers, other than Fred Beste, choose to live such a northern and desolate life style but I do know that FF passes the column along and I feel obliged to offer you free gardening advice if you live there on the swampy tundra or on the salty flats of the normally miserable east coast.

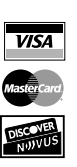

Just Imagine....

You are a 50-60 year old male or female head of household or even 35 year old male or female head of household and the last time that you can remember seeing a doctor or nurse practitioner was 5-10 years ago. You know that you do not feel well and there are days that you have experienced dizziness, chest pain and shortness of breath. You also know that the rent and utilities are past due. There is little food in the refrigerator or on the shelves and you have to make a decision how to divide the food so that the entire family can eat. What do you do? What should you do?

Berea Health Ministry

knows that there are many people in the communities that we are committed to serve that are living in desperate situations like this one every day. The Health Ministry's response to situations like the one mentioned above was to open a rural health clinic in Berea on November 23, 2003. The clinic has been in operation for seven years and eight months. The clinic has also extended its hours of service to include evening hours and weekends. Our thanks to Catholic Health Initiatives, Saint Joseph, Berea Hospital, that made this possible. However, there is still the need for additional financial support and we are coming to the community asking for your help.

This ministry is solely dependent on donations from individuals in the community, like you, contributions of churches, corporations, and grants. With the current economic climate there are increasing numbers of uninsured people and less and less individual, church, corporation and grant dollars to go around. The cost to operate the clinic is an average \$24,278. per month. The annual cost is \$291,345.

When I was preparing to leave Mt. Vernon to attend college at UK, Mommie Katie took me for a walk into the woods behind her house. I could not help but

notice that she brought along her big old pocketbook on our walk, so I was pretty sure of what she had in mind. When we had ventured far enough to be out of sight of anyone, she reached into that big old purse and handed me a small roll of cash. She instructed me, "Put some of this away for emergencies and use the rest when you need a good meal." We hugged there in those woods, and a tear rolled down my cheek because I knew she was making a sacrifice because she loved me so much. Even when she was older, she would tell my mother, "Ruby, get me my pocketbook. David Joe needs some cash."

Every time I came home from UK, Mommie Katie made sure that we took a walk in the yard before I returned to Lexington. She never failed to send me back to school without some cash in my jeans pocket. She always asked, "Is there anything special that you need this time?" I would let her know if there was something unusual going on at UK.

It seems strange to me now that the use of the word "pocketbook" can bring back such fond recollections of my wonderful grandmother. She was one of the most dedicated Christian women that I have ever known. She made a tremendous difference in my life, and for that I will always be thankful. Her Christian influence followed me all the rest of my life. And I could never forget the times she "bailed" me out of financial problems as a young man. Even after she has been gone all these many years, I still miss her presence in my life - and I don't mean just her pocketbook.

more perfect time will happen for late lettuce, radishes, and name your favorite greens.

But if you have a big piece of plastic or a tarp to cover them come frost warnings, there's no reason you can't have green beans from the garden for Thanksgiving. Same thing for your cucumbers and maters and peppers. I have mine planted, but we did cucumbers on Labor Day last year and had them crisp for Thanksgiving. Along with fried green tomatoes.

I spent most of the cool hours of the day on Saturday plowing and then sowing about a dozen different varieties of lettuce, mustard, beets, turnips, squash, kale and beans. All I need right now is a good hard rain and I will have a good fall garden.

The wind and rain and early frost may get it yet but I'm betting that that my late fall vegetable garden will be better than anything that anyone had come on in July.

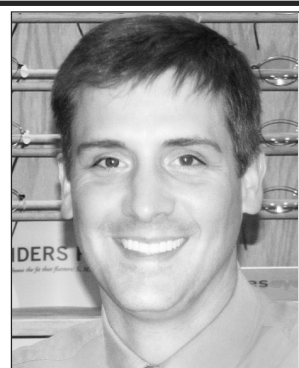

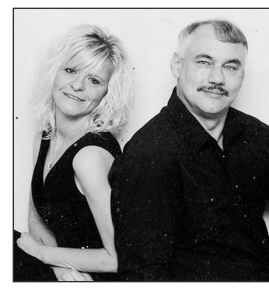

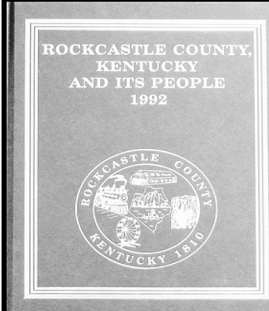

Waterfowl blind drawings will begin this month

Dates are now set for the waterfowl blind drawings for Doug Travis, Lake Barkley, Barren River Lake, Green River Lake and Sloughs Wildlife Management Areas (WMA).

Hunters interested in participating in the drawings for waterfowl blind sites must be at least 18 years of age. Hunters must possess a valid 2011-2012 Kentucky hunting license, a Kentucky waterfowl permit and a federal migratory bird permit (duck stamp) at the time of the drawing.

The waterfowl blind drawing for Doug Travis WMA in Carlisle and Hickman counties is Saturday, Aug. 27. It will be held at the WMA office, located a half mile south of Berkley on KY 123. Registration occurs at 9 a.m. Central time with the drawing at 10 a.m.

The Lake Barkley WMA drawing is Monday, Sept. 19. It will be held at the shelter on the east side of the Cumberland River, located at Lake Barkley Dam off U.S. 62 near Lake City. Use the Power House entrance then turn right toward the drawing location. The drawing occurs at 8 a.m. Central time.

The Green River Lake WMA drawing is Saturday, Sept. 24. It will be held at the Green River Lake Corps of Engineers office, located off KY 55 approximately seven miles south of Campbellsville. Registration is 9 a.m. Eastern time with the drawing at 10 a.m.

The Sloughs WMA drawing is Tuesday, Sept. 27. It will be held at Union County Middle School, off U.S. 60 in Morganfield. Registration begins at 6 p.m. Central time with the drawing at 7 p.m.

The Barren River Lake WMA drawing is Saturday, Oct. 1. It will be held at the Barren River Lake Corps of Engineers office at Barren River Lake dam, located off KY 252. The drawing is from 7 to 9 a.m. Central time

Hunters drawn for blinds on Doug Travis, Lake Barkley, Green River, Barren River Lake or Sloughs WMAs are responsible for locating, preparing and maintaining the blind site for the duration of the 2011-2012 waterfowl seasons. Each drawn hunter may select a co-owner of the blind site for use in the absence of the hunter drawn. The co-owner must be present at the drawing.

Hunters may construct a

permanent blind, use a boat or use a portable blind. Regardless, each blind site must be permanently pinned with a permanent marker identifying permit holders for the site. Those

hunters selected hold first rights for use of the blind site, but these blinds sites open to public use if the selected hunters are not in the blinds by 30 minutes before shooting time.

ral gas field that takes the gas, converts it into electricity, amounting to one megawatt a year, and transmits it to an electric transformer for use by Jackson Energy. The county would receive credits for the converted electricity from the utility company that could go directly into the county treasury or used as another incentive for manufacturers to locate in the county or for an expansion of existing industries. The county's only source of energy is electricity, is extremely costly and is one of the first questions asked by potential employers, according to Holly Hopkins, RCIDA Executive Director.

The company has set up a demonstration pod in Jackson Co. which generates 375 kilowatts and actually is hooked to Delta Natural Gas's pipeline.

RCIDA Chairman Corey Craig, who was at the presentation, said this ideal was “one more amenity” that could give the county a “competitive edge” over other business parks.

After the presentation, Carloftis said that the ideal was certainly worth exploring but would take a “lot more investigation” by the fiscal court, including talking to Jackson Energy officials, before an investment of this size could be made.

The meeting was held as a first training session for the members of the department and was facilitated by the County's CSEPP director, Howell Holbrook.

According to Dyehouse and Branham, state law permits four methods by which departments may be formed, and each must have a board of directors to oversee the operations and establish by-laws. The four types are: a special taxing district to support the department; a county-controlled department; city-controlled department and a rural department that stands alone.

Of the present six fire departments in Rockcastle County, three are under city management (city councils are the boards), and three are stand-alone departments with their own boards. (It should be noted, however, that Rockcastle's fire de-

partments receive substantial financial assistance from the county fiscal court in the form of debt payments on buildings and equipment, insurance, loans, fuel, radios, maintenance, and 90% of their utilities.)

Judge Carloftis believes the fiscal court will do everything it can to help the new department realize its goals, and supports the construction of a building in the area. The other department that he believes is in great need of a new building is the Livingston Fire Department.

Holbrook thanked the fire chiefs from the other departments for attending the meeting (Livingston and Brindle Ridge). According to Dyehouse, the new department's board will have to meet with the Livingston, Brindle Ridge, and Mt. Vernon departments to draw new boundaries because those departments presently serve the areas around Climax. If the departments fail to reach an agreement on new boundaries, the issue will be decided by Carloftis.

Over 30 citizens attended the meeting. Another meeting will be advertised in the *Signal* and held Friday, September 9th at 7 p.m. to allow citizens to elect a board of directors for the department.

ter facilities”, Fain pointed out. “We, as parents, are just asking for Mt. Vernon to have a place for kids to play baseball.”

Water Department Superintendent Dennis McClure reminded the council that with the Rose Hill Sewer Project getting underway, a pump station will be located near the field, and now would be the time to do something in the way of bring water to the field and restrooms.

The council approved a motion to allow scheduling for baseball and for parents to be able to groom the field.

Mayor Mike Bryant updated the council on three projects, including the Rose Hill Sewer Project, which is scheduled to break ground September 1st. The grant from Healthy Communities to refurbish the tennis courts at the city park has been completed. Tennis clinics will be conducted there in the future, Bryant said. 2010, seven days after taking his first steps on a prosthetic leg, Taylor appeared before the Georgia Athletic and Entertainment Commission, petitioning the seven member board for approval to fight with a prosthetic leg.

In order to earn a license, the board set several requirements for Taylor. Over the next seven months, Taylor submitted videos of training in a prosthesis to show his physical capabilities. The board required the prosthetic device to pass criteria for safety set by their doctor, orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Jeff Traub.

Finally, to show his skill level and receive the license, Taylor fought several rounds with board executive director and former professional UFC competitor, Andy Foster. “I was impressed by Taylor's ability,” said Foster. “From a stand up perspective, I see no activity that he cannot perform. From a grappling perspective, he is above average and moves very well.”

Foster is not the only one impressed by Taylor. “Shea's amazingly fast rehab is a testament to many

facets, the number one being his unwavering focus,” said Taylor's licensed prosthetist, Stephen Schulte of ProCare Prosthetics and Orthotics. Schulte added, “Shea has taken the mental conditioning that comes with limb loss and has applied it to his competitive side. For Shea this means not only is he physically strong, but equally, he is mentally strong.”

In preparation for his September MMA fight,

Taylor has been training in the Atlanta area at Saraiva MMA, Bedard's Elite MMA, and Off the Ropes Boxing.

He also pursues any opportunity to speak to other amputees. “It's a blessing to be able to inspire others and show that being an amputee is simply an aesthetic difference,” said Taylor. “I want to prove that the only limits in life are ones we set for ourselves”.

Cox installed as First Vice President of NACDL

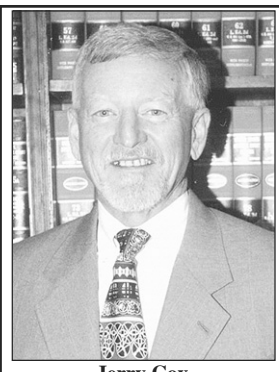

The following items may be recycled:
 Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, books & catalogs, office paper, junk mail, phone books, plastic bottles & jugs (#1-7) (any size soda and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid and alcohol bottles (please rinse out jugs), metal cans (rinsed), empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, sheet glass, ceramic computers, radios, phones, vacuum cleaners, clocks, cameras, camcorders, vcr/dvd players and satellite boxes.

Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools, cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled), cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. If its says rechargeable on it, then it's recyclable!

Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department during regular business hours.

Hispanic and Women Farmers Can Seek Compensation to Resolve Discrimination

If you are a female farmer or rancher or a Hispanic farmer or rancher and you believe that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) improperly denied farm loan benefits to you for certain time periods between 1981 and 2000 because of your gender or race, you may be eligible to apply for compensation.

Potential claimants can register to receive a claims package by calling the Farmer and Rancher Call Center at 1-888-508-4429 or visiting website address www.farmerclaims.gov.

Claimants have until August 25, 2011 to register to receive a claims package.

FSA provides assistance for livestock losses

Livestock producers who incur eligible livestock death losses due to the recent extreme temperatures and other adverse weather events may be eligible for the USDA Farm Service Agency's Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). LIP provides assistance to livestock owners and contract growers for death losses in excess of normal mortality due to adverse weather, including losses due to hurricanes, floods, blizzards, disease, wildfires, extreme heat and extreme cold.

Producers who suffer livestock losses in 2011 have 30 days after the livestock loss become apparent to file a notice of loss to FSA or no later than Octo-

ber 31, 2011. Producers must provide the following:

- Beginning inventory of livestock must be submitted when the first LIP application is filed
- Proof of death
- Rendering truck receipts or certificates
- Veterinary records or a picture of the dead animal
- Including the date of death and documentation for cause of death
- Third party certification provided by a person who is not affiliated with the farming operations who can verify the beginning and ending inventory livestock records.
- Documentation must provide sufficient data that identifies:
 - Kind/type/weight range of livestock
 - Number of livestock

Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA)

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) regulations specify that when a foreign person acquires or transfers an interest in U.S. agricultural land, such transactions shall be disclosed to the Secretary of Agriculture on AFIDA Report form ASCS-153 or FSA-153. The report must be filed with the County Farm Service Agency (FSA) Office within 90 calendar days of the date of the transaction.

To assist you in determining whether your land is considered agricultural land, agricultural land is: All crops, ranch, and timberland more than 10 acres in size in the aggregate and forestland.

Failure to return the completed AFIDA Report within 90 calendar days of the date of the transaction could result in a civil penalty of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the interest held in the agricultural land. The AFIDA Report shall be considered to have been filed in a timely manner if received at this office within 90 calendar days of the date of the transaction. Contact your local FSA Service Center for additional information on this and other matters.

Mamaw's Kitchen

WINNIE'S THREE BEAN SALAD

A co-worker at the Bank of Oak Ridge shared this recipe with me way back in 1981. She couldn't remember where she got the recipe, but she gladly shared it with me.

- 1 can (15 ounce) green beans - not French cut
- 1 can (15 ounce) yellow wax beans
- 1 can (15 ounce) red kidney beans
- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 4 tablespoons water
- 3 or 4 chopped celery stalks
- 1 chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- Paprika

Drain and rinse beans. In bowl mix the vinegar, sugar, oil and water. Add beans, onions, celery and green pepper. Toss gently to cover all vegetable with marinade. Sprinkle with paprika. Best if made night before.

NOTE: Winnie said this was best if made the night before, but I like it right af-

ter it's been made almost as much as if had set overnight. Either way, this is one of the best three bean salads I have ever eaten.

BROCCOLI SALAD

- 1 bunch broccoli, cut into small pieces
- 2 cups chopped celery
- 1/2 cup raisins

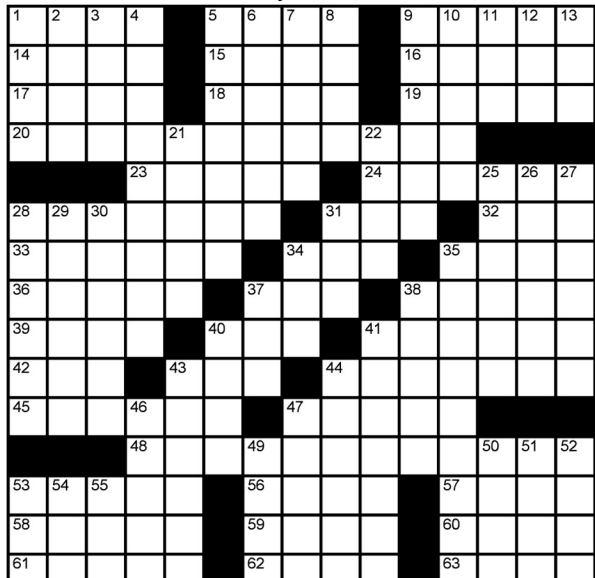

Local officer receives award

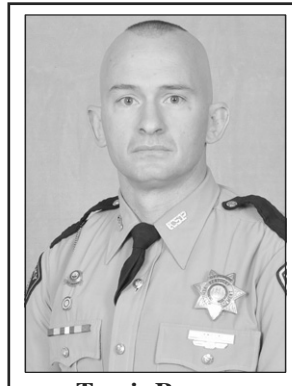
