Rep. Ford announces retirement

Danny Ford, R-Mount Vernon, now serving in his 31st year in the Kentucky House of Representatives, has announced his retirement.

Mr. Ford is the longest serving representative in the Republican Party since 1900. During his tenure he has played integral roles in helping establish the Kentucky Music Museum and Hall of Fame; worked to upgrade Highways 27, 150 and 461; worked to upgrade and improve school facilities and assisted in bringing public water service to over 96% of the 80th legislative district that currently includes Rockcastle and Lincoln Counties, and a portion of Pulaski County.

During his years in the House of Representatives he has been honored as National Republican Legislator of the Year and served as the Minority Whip in 1993-1994, and the Minority Floor Leader from 1995-2000, and is currently the Minority Whip.

Ford will retire at the end of his term which ends December 31st and plans to continue his work with the family real estate and auction company and spend more time with his family.

On Tuesday, Rep. Ford

released the following statement to the *Signal*.

"After careful consideration and prayer, I have decided to retire from the legislature at the end of the term, in order that I may devote more time to my family and business. I offer my deepest gratitude and want to personally thank my many supporters and my district for allowing me to serve as your state representative over the past 30 years. It has truly been a pleasure and an honor to have been a servant of the people of Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski counties as well as the other areas I have served over the years. The feelings of pride and respect that I have for my district and its people cannot be expressed in words.

Local retired naval officer will seek Ford's office

It didn't take long, after Rep. Danny Ford announced his retirement from the state legislature for a local man to toss his hat into the ring, U.S. Navy Captain Roger Coldiron (Ret.) of Mt Vernon announced Tuesday that he will seek the Republican nomination for Kentucky's 80th legislative district in the May primary being vacated by Ford's retirement.

Coldiron, the son of

Carmon Coldiron of Mt. Vernon and the late Edison Coldiron, is a native of Madison County but has lived in Rockcastle "longer than I have lived anywhere except at sea," Coldiron said. He is married to the former Sylvia Vaskova and they have a son, James Michael. He is a member of First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon.

Coldiron spent just over 34 years in the United States Navy, starting as a Seaman Recruit in 1971 and retiring in 2009 with the rank of Captain.

As an enlisted sailor, he served as a Hospital Corpsman with the First and Third

Berniece McHargue, secretary of the Rockcastle Cemetery Preservation Board, has put out a call for volunteers to update the "cemetery book."

The book lists all cemeteries, known at the time of its publication, and those buried in the cemeteries.

However, McHargue said that the book had not been updated for 25 years and "we need volunteers to walk the cemeteries and list the new graves since 1985."

McHargue said that County Coroner Bill Dowell estimated that there

Redistricting plan moves Rockcastle to 2nd District

A first round of petitions have been presented to Representative Danny Ford in opposition to Rockcastle County being moved from the 5th District to the 2nd. Among other counties in the second district would be:

the western part of Pulaski County, Edmonson, Green, Jessamine Mead, Monroe, Metcalf and part of Jefferson.

The petition drive, which has collected 1500 signatures thus far, was organized by RCHS students: Caroline Green, president of the Young Democrats Club; Hannah Eaton, president of the Teen Republican Club and co-captain of the RCHS UNITE Club, Ashton Arvin, current KYA president and co-captain of the UNITE Club and Brianna Copenhaver, UNITE member.

One reason the petition were circulated was that the redrawing would result in Rockcastle not being able to participate in Operation UNITE. Rockcastle County's elementary,

middle school and high school all presently carry the designation of Outstanding UNITE Club in the state.

In an effort to raise awareness of the need to fight this redrawing, the four students met with the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce Tuesday to seek their help. It was pointed out by Eaton, that passage of House Bill 2 would impact the lives of every person in Rockcastle County.

Arvin told the group that "nearly 30 students from RCHS who are Rogers Scholars are in college because of scholarships they received as Rogers Scholars. The Rogers Scholars program for high school and the Rogers Explorers program for middle school students would be totally

eliminated if we are removed from the Fifth." Arvin went on to point out that "we would also lose the PRIDE program, Forward in the Fifth and numerous programs and grants made available through the Center for Rural Development. He added that there are many economic grants and tourism grants that only counties in the Fifth can apply for and for which Rockcastle would be ineligible if moved to the Second District.

Eaton told chamber members that "we currently have over 30 people from Rockcastle County in drug treatment programs, thanks to vouchers from Operation UNITE. However, those vouchers are available only

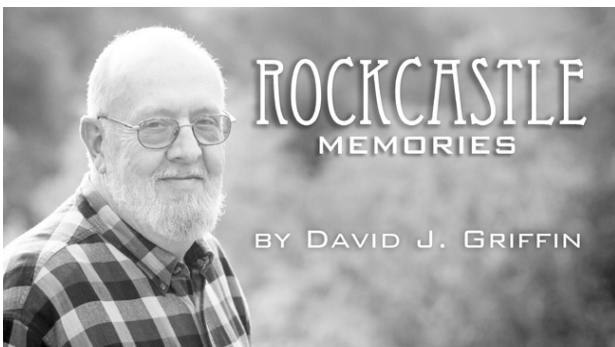
In fact, I was just beginning to envision an annual trek to Florida with the rest of the "snow birds" but, instead, I had to dust off my limited reportage skills.

1931 Model A Ford

While having a discussion with my friend Bud Cox about some of the automobiles we owned when we were young, I made the connection that he was the proud owner of a 1931 Model A Ford and that my grandfather (Pop) had purchased his own '31 when the vehicles first arrived on the scene. Pop had told me several times that he purchased his brand new Model A for a mere \$600.

Pop was enormously proud of his new automobile, and he strived to keep it spotlessly clean. One afternoon, one of Pop's neighbors asked if he could "hitch" a ride to Mt. Vernon. Pop graciously said that he could. As they rode toward town, the gentleman needed to spit his tobacco juice. Because the windows were so clean, he thought that the passenger window was rolled down and tried to spit

out the window. To his dismay and Pop's horror, the spittle splattered on the glass and ran down into the interior of the door. Pop never forgot this sordid incident about his new car.

Bud explained how he had located and purchased his own '31 Model A in 1961, "Jess Baker was working on a house in Jessamine County when he noticed the automobile had a for sale sign on the window. Henry Hines, Billy Jackson, and I drove over to take a look at the car. I made an offer, and the owner accepted my bid. After several unsuccessful attempts to get it to start, we decided to pull the car back to Mt. Vernon with a chain. The next day, I cleaned out the gas tank and it started right up."

When asked what he did to the vintage automobile, Buddy replied, "I drove it! I eventually changed the wheels and covered the seats." I can remember riding with him on many occasions in that vehicle when we were in high school together. One particular trip that I remember was when we drove the back roads from Mt. Vernon to Renfro Valley. Everyone that saw us passing by would look at the vehicle as if it was a special ride, and indeed it was.

The Ford Model A was produced from 1928 until 1931. During that time, 4,849,340 Model A's were manufactured. Prices for the Model A ranged from \$385 for a roadster to \$1,400 for

The Roots of Rockcastle

The Pride of the Lions Club History in Rockcastle, Part II

After taking a look at the Lions Club International's history last week, the Roots series will focus more on the local Lions Club in Livingston this week. This is because there is presently a new club forming in Livingston that will be known as the Livingston Community Lions Club.

Last week, I had mentioned that the old club in Livingston was one of the oldest in the state. After some further reading, I've found that isn't the case. The first club to form in Kentucky was in Paducah on April 16th, 1920. It was followed by a club in Mayfield, Owensboro, Louisville, and Lexington in the same year. Hazard's was formed in 1922, and Frankfort's in 1923. Ashland and Fulton's clubs were formed in 1924. Maysville joined in 1929. In 1931, Bowling Green, Paris,

Winchester, Richmond and Harrodsburg joined. These were the fifteen earliest clubs in the state. The Livingston Lions Club was formed in September of 1940. They met twice a month on Tuesday nights at the school. It was founded by Dr. Robert Webb. Over the years, there were several members that would come and go. Some that came to mind other than Dr. Webb, were Willard Whitaker, Harold Durham, Forester Mullins, Calvin Webb, Charles Parsons, Jerry Mink, Bobby Webb, Carlo and Buzz Carloftis, Dell Ponder, Bill Kelsey, Cleo Bryant, and Bobby Wilson. Cleo Bryant's husband, Edgar, served as club president for many years.

During the peak years, the club had a membership of ten to fifteen members. They had an active club that did quite a bit of good in the

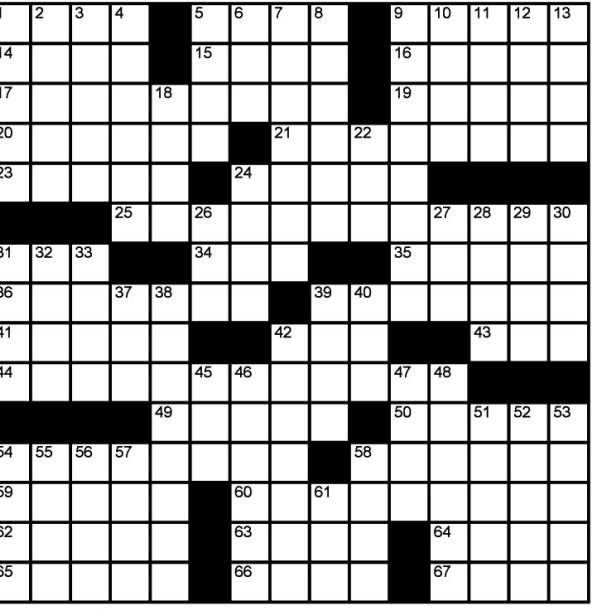

the top-of-the-line Town Car. The engine was a water-cooled L-head 4-cylinder with a displacement of 201 cubic inches. That engine provided 40 horsepower and had a top speed of 65 mph.

The Model A's fuel tank was located in the cowl, between the engine compartment's fire wall and the dash panel. It had a visual fuel gauge, and the fuel flowed to the carburetor by gravity. A rear-view mirror was optional. Buyers could purchase an aftermarket cast-iron unit to place over the exhaust manifold in or-

der to provide heat to the cab. Adjusting the amount of hot air entering the cab was a small door. I remember Pop talking about how hard it was to adjust the temperature in the automobile when it was very cold outside.

I remember Bud's Model A well - and how fast it could get moving from a standing start. As Bud would say, "It would get gone quick!" Once he told me that he believed he could beat almost any car of the early '60s if the race was only 25 feet. I always loved it when Bud suggested that we take his Model A for a ride in the country. It was a fun car in which to ride.

Bud and I have shared many interests over the past 50 years, and one of them has been vintage automobiles. Presently, he owns a 1959 Cadillac hearse that he is restoring. I cannot wait to take a ride in this classic beauty. I am sure that when this interesting project has been completed, Bud will give me a call and we will try it out. Mamaw's Kitchen

REGINA'S LASAGNA

This has become our traditional Christmas dinner. All my family likes this—even the pickiest ones. Christmas of 2010 I made two huge pans full and it was all gone in two days. I asked them if they were tired of it yet. They wanted me to make another one!

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 pound sweet Italian sausage
- 53 ounces of your favorite spaghetti sauce
- 1 cup shredded parmesan cheese, divided
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup mozzarella cheese, divided
- 1 cup ricotta cheese
- 8 lasagna noodles
- Preheat oven to 350°.
- Crumble beef and sausage in large skillet. Cook until no pink remains. Stir in spaghetti sauce. Heat thoroughly and turn off heat.
- Mix eggs with ricotta cheese, 3/4 cup mozzarella cheese and 3/4 cup parmesan cheese. Spray lasagna pan with non-stick spray. Layer as follows:
- 2 cups sauce in bottom of pan
- 4 lasagna noodles, uncooked

- Half of cheese mixture
- Half of remaining sauce
- 4 lasagna noodles, uncooked
- Rest of cheese mixture
- Rest of sauce
- Remaining 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese
- Remaining 1/4 cup parmesan cheese
- Bake for 1 hour 15 minutes at 350°. Remove from oven and let sit for 15 to 30 minutes before serving.

OLIVE FLORET SALAD

- 1 med head cauliflower, small florets
- 1 bunch broccoli, small florets
- 2 cups grape or cherry tomatoes, halved
- 2 medium carrots, thinly sliced
- 1 can (6 ounce) pitted sliced ripe olives, drained
- 1 pack Italian salad dressing mix
- 1 cup crumbled feta cheese

In a large bowl, combine the cauliflower, broccoli, tomatoes, carrots and olives. Prepare the salad dressing according to package instructions; pour over vegetables and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Just before serving, toss again and sprinkle with feta cheese.

County-wide Stride will be each month

Most small communities have at least one run/walk event in a year. Some have more, maybe three or four at most. In 2012, Rockcastle County will have 12, one in each month of the year.

The initiative, called the 2012 County-wide Stride, is being led by Rockcastle Regional Hospital.

"We want to be a spark that keeps the community moving, and this is one way to do that," said Stephen A. Estes, hospital president and CEO.

The year kicks off with the Snowball Express 2-miler at the Lake Linville Recreation Area on Jan. 28. It's a fundraiser for the American Cancer Society, but, like all the races, it's a chance for the community to come out and engage in physical activity in a fun atmosphere.

Studies show that Kentuckians (and Rockcastle Countians) do not get enough exercise, and experts have long known that exercise is essential to good health. The County-wide Stride series will consistently give runners and walkers an incentive to complete at least some of the recommended exercise. In addition to muscle strengthening activities two or more

days a week, the Centers for Disease Control recommends one hour and 15 minutes of vigorous-intensity aerobic activity such as jogging and running, or two and half hours of moderate-intensity aerobic activity such as brisk walking.

Entry fees are inexpensive. Giveaways and age-division trophies are given to participants. There are incentives as well. Those who complete seven of the 12 events will receive a free long-sleeve County-wide Stride T-shirt. Participants get the shirt and a \$25 gift certificate for completing 10, and an additional personalized plaque for finishing all 12 races.

A publication called Rockcastle Strides, which highlights the races and local runners and walker, is also being distributed this week throughout the community. 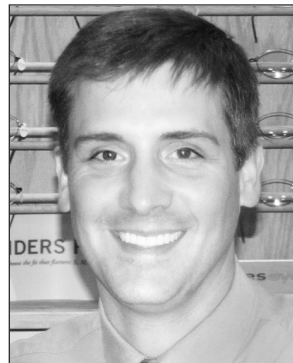

Annual contracts are required to be signed to receive program benefits. All signatures of producers receiving a share in DCP and ACRE payments are required by June 1, 2012.

On Saturday night, the Rockets will travel to East Jessamine for a game and will host Madison Southern on the Tuesday, Jan. 24th.

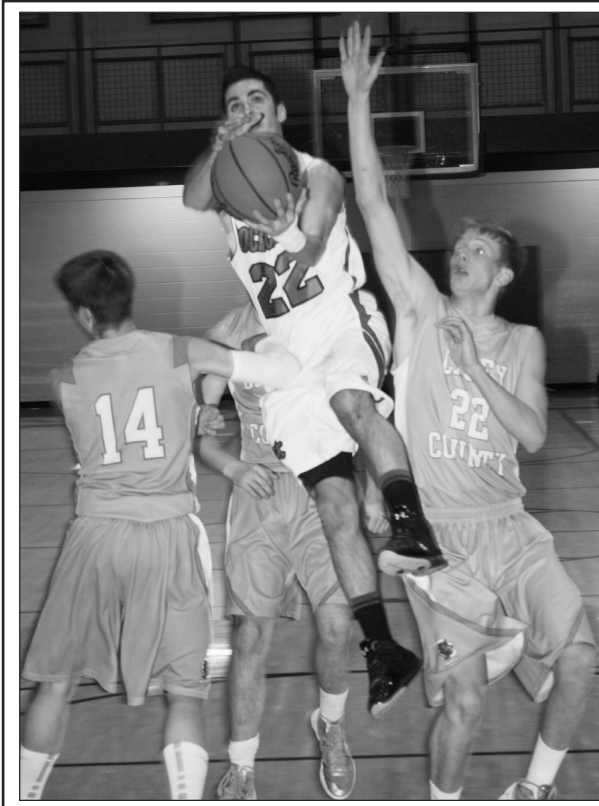

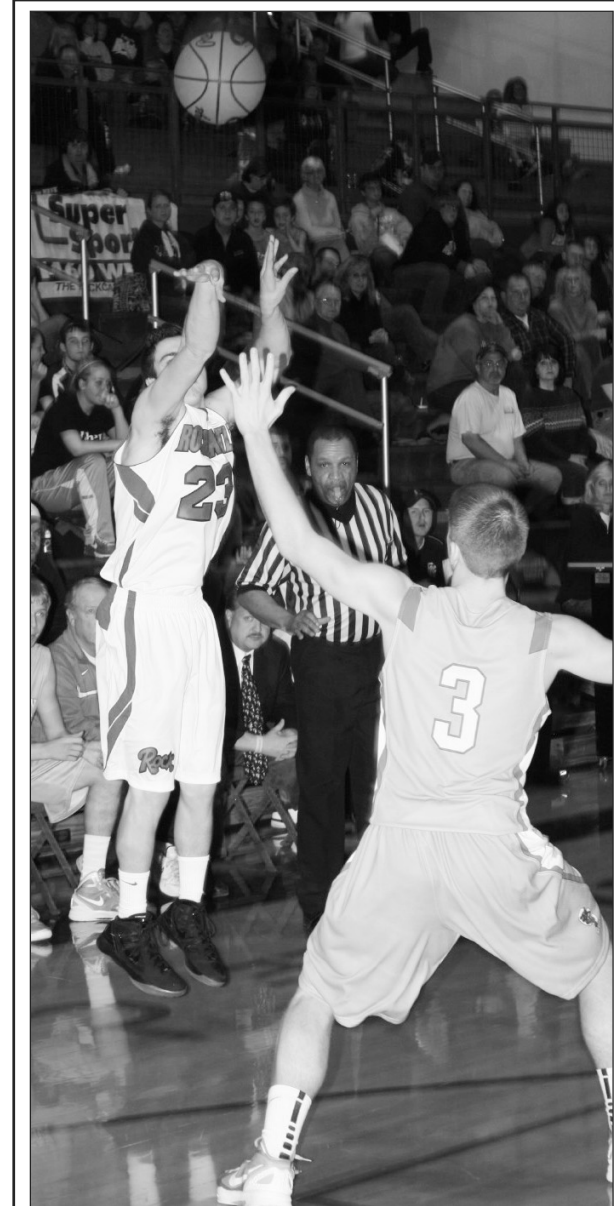

Marine Divisions in California, Okinawa, and Southeast Asia. He participated in the evacuation of American citizens from Cambodia when the government there fell to the Khmer Rouge, the evacuation of Saigon when the North Vietnamese overran that country and participated in a helicopter assault of Koh Tang Island in Operation Mayaguez when a U.S.-flagged merchant ship was seized by the Cambodian government in May of 1975.

After his release from active duty, Coldiron attended the University of Kentucky where he earned his Bachelor's Degree in Chemistry, graduating in December of 1978. In September of 1979 he was commissioned an ensign after graduating from Officer Candidate School. He decided to become a Surface Warfare Officer. His first shipboard assignment was in a Spruance Class destroyer, USS Moosbrugger, homeported in Charleston, South Carolina. He made his first deployment to the Mediterranean Sea on Moosbrugger.

Following his tour there, he was assigned to Combatant Hydrofoil Squadron Two in Key West, Florida as the Squadron Operations Officer. Although an experimental program for the Navy, the Hydrofoils, which were capable of 50 knot speeds, proved instrumental in fighting drug trafficking in the Florida Strait.

He then taught at the Surface Warfare Officers' School in Newport, Rhode Island for two years before attending Department Head School and reporting to USS Dahlgren a guided missile destroyer homeported in Norfolk, Virginia.

While on Dahlgren, Coldiron deployed to the Persian Gulf in 1988 and was involved in the so-called Tanker War. Dahlgren spent 117 straight days at sea, patrolling primarily in the North Arabian Sea and the Strait of Hormuz, escorting unarmed merchant ships warding off the threats from Iranian small boats and land-launched missiles.

Coldiron went from Dahlgren to become the Surface Operations Officer for Commander, Carrier Group Two which was homeported in Norfolk, though he saw little time in the United States during that tour.

When he reported to the Group, the staff was embarked in USS Coral Sea operating in the Eastern Mediterranean in response to Syrian threats to shipping and an increase in terrorist activity in Lebanon.

The Group changed ships mid-deployment from Coral Sea to USS America, extending its deployment. The group returned to Norfolk in 1998 but after thirty days in port, was sent to operate with a joint task force in the Caribbean Sea embarked in USS John F. Kennedy. Group Two and Kennedy had just arrived in Norfolk on August 2, 1990 when Saddam Hussein's forces invaded Kuwait.

On August 11th, Group Two was given 96 hours to prepare Kennedy, four cruisers, two destroyers and

a frigate for extended deployment. Kennedy departed Norfolk on August 15th and returned after the final Iraqi surrender in March, 1991.

During the deployment, Coldiron was responsible for the planning, target selection, and launches of the first Tomahawk missiles from the battle groups' cruisers and destroyers.

Coldiron was then selected as the aide-de-camp to Vice Admiral Paul Reason, Commander, Surface Forces, US Atlantic Fleet.

Coldiron then served as Executive Officer or second-in-command in USS Thomas S. Gates, one of the early Aegis cruisers in the Atlantic Fleet.

He was then appointed Chairman of the Professional Programs Department at the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis. While running his own department, he also taught Leadership and Ethics in the Department of Leadership and Law as well as ship handling and navigation in the Department of Seamanship and Navigation.

He then got his first chance at command when he took over as Commanding Officer of the destroyer USS Stump.

His change of command occurred in Augusta Bay, Sicily at the beginning of an eventful deployment. Coldiron took the ship into the Black Sea to operate with ships from countries that were members of the former Soviet Union. After spending three weeks in the Black Sea, Stump's Tomahawks were called upon to launch against Al Qaeda targets in the Sudan after the attacks on the U.S. Embassies in Kenya in Tanzania in 1998.

After his first command tour, Coldiron was assigned to the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island where he earned a Masters Degree in National Security Decision Making. Upon completion of the course, he went back to sea as the Commander of Maritime Prepositioning Squadron One which was permanently deployed to the European Theater of Operations. The five ships in Squadron One held enough equipment to support 17,000 Marines for thirty days in combat. For example, the ships carried among them 60 M1A1 Abrams tanks, several dozen artillery pieces, hundreds of HUMVEEs as well as light attack vehicles.

He was then selected by Admiral Grog Johnson to be the Inspector General for U.S. Navy Forces, Europe. Admiral Johnson as Commander, Sixth Fleet, was Coldiron's direct reporting senior when he commanded the Squadron. Admiral Johnson was then promoted to Commander of all U.S. Navy Forces Europe and took Coldiron with him to his headquarters in London, England.

Coldiron's last tour was as the Defense and Naval Attaché to the Kingdom of Denmark, an office he held from 2006 until his retirement in 2009.

As the senior U.S. military officer in Denmark, Coldiron was responsible for maintaining a close working relationship between the United States and Denmark as well as advising the Ambassador on issues related to the military, including armament purchases and intelligence mat-

ters.

Upon his departure from Denmark, Coldiron was knighted by order of the Queen and made a Commander of the Order of the Dannebrog, the highest honor that can be given a non-Danish military officer.

His other awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, Six Meritorious Service Medals, two Navy Commendation Medals (one for heroism), the Navy Achievement Medal, three Combat Action Ribbons, the Navy Good Conduct Medal as well as numerous campaign and unit awards.

After his retirement in 2009, Coldiron returned to Rockcastle County and started a small business: Kentucky Iron Horse LLC, an auto repair shop.

As to his decision to run for the office of State Representative, Coldiron said, "I've always had an interest in politics. Although I've been gone from Rockcastle County for a long time, I've spent a lot of my life here and came back because I want to continue to serve the people I love in the place that I love. My roots are very deep here and part of me never left the hills of Kentucky."

I started a business here because I wanted to see what business people have to face on a day-to-day basis. Although I still own the building and the tools, I have turned over the business to Johnny Joenborg, a friend from Denmark, a hard worker and very bright man who is thankful, I think, for the opportunities he sees in our country and our Commonwealth.

I sincerely believe that the Navy prepared me well to face virtually any challenge that comes my way. I hope the people of the new 80th District will give me the opportunity to represent them in the Kentucky Legislature.

I have little money, little name recognition, and no political organization but I do have a strong desire to serve. Having none of those things puts me at a distinct disadvantage but it also means I am beholden to no one. I have no favors to return and no borrowed political capital. I can do this job and I can do it honestly. I pledge, if I am elected, to do what is best for the people of the District. I am not doing this for personal gain or for glory—a lot can be accomplished if no one cares who gets the credit.

I think Danny Ford did a great deal of good for the District. I hope I can, as we said in the Navy, steer as steady a course as he did and I would be proud to follow in his wake."

Roger Coldiron is a member of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, American Mensa, the Navy Mustang Association (an organization for officers who have served as enlisted members of the Navy and were awarded a Good Conduct Medal), and is a lifetime member of the Navy Surface Warfare Association.

to residents of the Fifth Congressional District.”

Eaton urged everyone to “not be complacent” and to call and email and sign the petitions “so we can get back to the business at hand -- making our county and our commonwealth drug-free.”

Each member was given a petition and asked to gather signatures and return them to the high school early Friday morning so they can be forwarded to Frankfort, hopefully before the Senate vote on HB2.

Nancy Hale, UNITE Club sponsor, whose husband, John is chairman of the Rockcastle/Unite Coalition, told chamber members that the redistricting plan could end up in court because of the number of counties divided (6) but the volume of response from the counties affected will be one of the most important parts of getting HB2 defeated.

State Representative Danny Ford told the *Signal* Tuesday “I think it will get changed (HB2) and we’ll wind up back in the 5th.” Ford’s 80th district was realigned. It now runs from the Kentucky River, taking in a wedge of Madison County, a shoestring section of the northern part of Pulaski County and all of Rockcastle and Casey Counties. Lincoln County was taken out of his district entirely.

USDA Announces Disaster Assistance Sign up for 2010 Crop Losses

If you suffered 2010 crop losses, you could be eligible to receive benefits under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE). SURE is available to eligible producers who must have either of the following:

Farms in counties with Secretarial disaster declarations, including contiguous counties, that have incurred at least a 10 percent crop production or quality loss, or both, on all crops grown by

a producer nationwide, except grazed crops

Farms in which, for the crop year, an overall loss on the farm because of disaster-related conditions is greater than 50% of the actual production the farm compared to normal production for that crop year.

All Kentucky counties received a disaster designation during 2010, EXCEPT these counties: Clay, Floyd Harlan, Johnson, Knox, Lawrence, Leslie, Letcher, Martin and Pike.

To meet program eligi-

bility requirements, producers must have obtained a policy or plan of insurance for all insurable crops through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and obtained Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage on non-insurable crops, if available, from FSA. Eligible farmers and ranchers who meet the definition of a socially disadvantaged, limited resource or beginning farmer or rancher do not have to meet this requirement.

Signup for the 2010 SURE program will continue through June 1, 2012.

FSA provides assistance for livestock losses

Livestock producers who have begun the LIP (Livestock Indemnity Program) application process for 2011 must submit all the necessary documentation required and complete the application by January 31, 2012.

Kelly Gentry honored by 12th Region officials

If you went to a 12th Region girls or boys basketball game last week, you may wonder why game officials were all wearing black/pink shirts and using pink whistles.

It's a way for them to honor Brodhead's Kelly Gentry, a fellow official who was diagnosed with cancer late last summer and died in November.

"We were shocked when we found out it had progressed so rapidly. He absolutely loved officiating basketball, football and baseball," said Danville's Scott Bottoms, a long-time 12th Region official and member of the Lake Cumberland Basketball Officials Association.

If you have been to 12th Region games, you have seen Gentry work. Maybe you did or did not agree with his calls, but that's part of the job he had. However, he had a passion for high school sports.

"He had a great sense of

humor and always had something funny to say. He enjoyed UK sports and was an avid fox hunter," Bottoms said. "The LCBOA really felt strongly about doing something to honor him during this season. After discussing this with the officials and our supervisor, we came up with the idea to wear pink whistles during all varsity games this week throughout the 12th Region."

It's a fitting tribute and also a way to remind all of us just how precious life can be. Certainly Gentry's fellow officials had to think he was going to be calling basketball, football and baseball game for many, many more years. With his passion for the sports, it was likely he would have officiated 30 more years. He loved it that much.

Schools in the region have agreed — as they should have — to read this short tribute to Gentry before each game this week:

"The Lake Cumberland Basketball Officials Association would like to take a moment to honor a member of its association, Kelly Gentry. Kelly lost his battle with cancer on Nov. 10, 2011. Kelly was also a member of the Lake Cumberland Football and Baseball Associations. Kelly is survived by his parents, Glen and Glenda Gentry, and a sister, Shandra Gentry Rowe.

The officials in tonight's game are wearing pink whistles to honor Kelly and cancer survivors and victims."

Be reverent during the tribute. Then applaud like crazy. Gentry would want that because he would not have wanted any tribute to him to take away the enthusiasm for the game he loved so much.

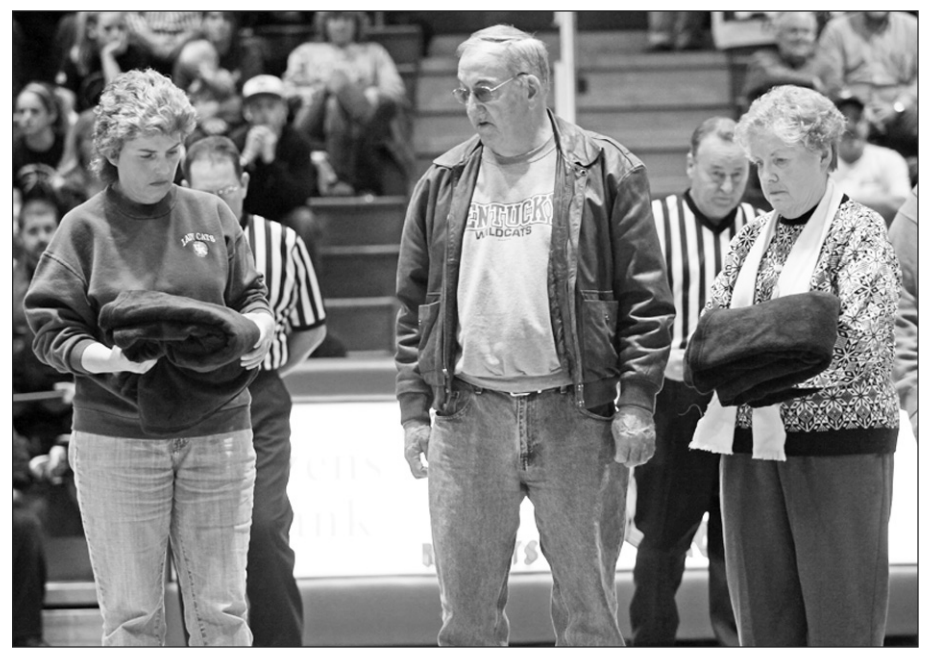
In fact, maybe fans should take time this week to thank officials for the jobs they do. None of us ever do that. Instead, we second-guess calls the officials make and normally leave convinced there were many more bad calls than correct calls.

Often we can convince ourselves that the officials might have even cost our favorite team a chance to win the game.

Gentry and his fellow officials accept that. It's part of an official's life.

"The LCBOA has lost a dear friend and fellow official. It truly has made each of us realize how fragile life is and to cherish each day that we have," Bottoms said. "Thanks so much for helping with this."

Graves inducted into Ky. Teacher Hall of Fame

The first question Clark-Moores Middle School history teacher Sharon Farthing Graves asks her students at the beginning of each school year is: "What have you heard about me?"

Several kids get brave enough and say, "I heard you're mean." To which Graves replies, "I'm not mean, I'm strict. There's a difference."

Despite her reputation, Graves can barely make it to her classroom without hugs, high-fives and vocal status updates from various students in the crowded hallways.

"I'm the 'mean one', remember? They quickly get over that," said Graves, who was inducted into the Louie B. Nunn Kentucky Teacher Hall of Fame at Western Kentucky University. Graves, a graduate of RCHS, was one of three teachers selected for this statewide honor.

The inductees are chosen on merit and not based on where they teach, said Cathie Bryant, representative from WKU's College of Education and Behavioral Sciences.

"I have found very few teachers — in my lifetime — that have the kind of rapport and association with students that she does," said Ed Ford, retired Berea College public relations director, who sent a letter of recommendation to WKU as part of her nomination.

"She's like a drill sergeant. She's really tough on the students, but she does it

in a tough-love sort of way," he said.

Graves has taught early American history for 23 years, 22 of those at Clark-Moores.

The Kentucky Hall of Fame induction is her fourth state honor as a teacher, having previously won the Daughters of American Revolution (DAR) Kentucky History Teacher of the Year in 2005, Kentucky Department of Education Teacher of Excellence in 2008 and the Kentucky Historical Society Award of Merit in 2009.

For six years, she coached girls basketball but would take two flashlights with her to away games to grade papers on the bus ride home. However, she gave that up so she could be more involved in other student activities.

"I could be a better teacher, but I was never going to be a better coach. I loved it, but there were people who could do it better than me," said Graves, who was a basketball player in high school.

Graves is now a coach for the school's mock trial team, which won the Kentucky Mock Trial Championship last year. The winning middle school team went on to compete in the high school tournament, during which her students defeated four high school teams.

She is also a student council sponsor. Each year, students in each grade compete for the chance to go to a UK basketball game with Graves by collecting the

most box tops.

Every four years, Graves takes a group of 8th graders to the Presidential inauguration.

After 23 years of teaching, she draws motivation from her passion for history and the moments when she has seen the "proverbial light bulb lighting up", over top of her students' heads, she said.

In five years, Graves will be eligible for retirement. Though she always envisioned that she would "just keep on teaching," working in the education system can wear a person down, she said.

However, during trying times, there are moments that make the stress worthwhile.

Graves reflected on her favorite memories as a teacher. While she fought off tears, she recalled a moment when a student said to her, "You teach everybody. You teach every profession. That's why you're important, because you teach all of us."

Graves is the daughter of Thelma Mullins and Buck Farthing, both of Rockcastle County.

In Rockcastle, Jackson and Clay

Environmental liaison brings PRIDE to schools

Wonda Hammons is bringing PRIDE to Clay, Jackson and Rockcastle Counties' elementary schools, thanks to partnerships among local agencies and PRIDE.

As the counties' PRIDE Environmental Education Liaison, Hammons visits local classrooms to lead fun, hands-on activities that will prepare students for state science tests and life-long environmental stewardship.

She has worked with 1,842 students in the three counties so far this school year.

Hammons was hired through the PRIDE Environmental Education Outreach Program. The program increases children's environmental knowledge by providing curriculum-based lessons, which complement teachers' classroom instruction, and by involving students in cleanup activities. It targets third, fourth and fifth-grade classes, with an emphasis on fourth-graders, who take the annual state science test. Examples of topics covered by the

program's liaisons include native plants and energy conservation.

PRIDE offers the program in 38 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky. In each county, local leaders pay a fee, based on student population, to enroll their schools. During the 2010-2011 school year, 19 counties enrolled in the program, and liaisons reached 26,796 students.

In Clay County, the U.S. Forest Service's Red-bird Ranger District enrolled local schools in the program for the 2011-2012 school year.

The Jackson County Fiscal Court enrolled its school system.

In Rockcastle County, the annual enrollment fee was paid by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Rockcastle County School System and Appalachia Science in the Public Interest.

"We are so pleased these local partners are supporting the program, and we appreciate the cooperation by the superintendents, principals and teachers," said PRIDE's Tammie Wilson.

"Ms. Hammons is an experienced PRIDE liaison," she added. "She works well with teachers to support them and reach as many students as possible. She is a talented artist and integrates art into many lessons."

When Hammons was Jackson County's liaison for the 2009/2010 school year, she spearheaded a contest to create student-designed road signs with environmental messages. The signs are now visible across the county, and the project won a PRIDE award. She is an active

member of the Jackson County PRIDE Committee.

PRIDE is a nonprofit organization that promotes "Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment" in southern and eastern Kentucky. PRIDE works with communities to improve water quality, clean up solid waste problems and increase environmental awareness. PRIDE was founded in 1997 by Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5) and James Bickford, former Kentucky Secretary of Environmental Protection.

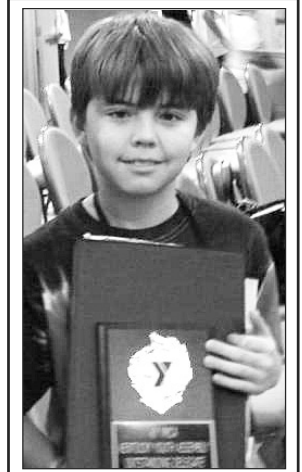

4-H Sewing Projects at elementary schools

The 4-H Sewing Projects will again be offered after school at each of the elementary schools. Sewing projects will be different than past years. There will be NO first class meeting; we will begin the classes on the appropriate dates listed below. This year the sewing projects will be conducted by local leaders and the Family & Consumer Sciences Agent. Following is the date and location of the first meeting at each school.

NOTE: Middle School and High School students may meet with the elementary school of their choice.

•February 13th-16th - Roundstone Elementary School

•February 21st -February 24th - Mt. Vernon Elementary School

•March 5th-8th - Brodhead Elementary School

Rockcastle County is now offering a recycling drop-off program. Recyclables may be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Recycling Center on US 25 South (2528 South Wilderness Rd.) during the hours of 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. Monday thru Friday (closed major holidays).

The following items may be recycled:
 Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, books & catalogs, office paper, junk mail, phone books, plastic bottles & jugs (#1-7) (any size soda and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid and alcohol bottles (please rinse out jugs), metal cans (rinsed), empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, sheet glass, ceramics, computers, radios, phones, vacuum cleaners, clocks, cameras, camcorders, vcr/dvd players and satellite boxes.
 Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools, cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled), cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. If it says rechargeable on it, then it's recyclable!
 Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department during regular business hours.
 Recycling trailers are also available at the following locations: City of Brodhead (gravel lot across from Citizens Bank), City of Livingston (gravel lot across from old Livingston Gymnasium), Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department (at Conway) and at the Pongo Volunteer Fire Department. The trailers will only be pulled out to empty them and will then be taken back to the same location. Please help us make this a successful venture by being clean and/or neat with our recycling habits. Do not put anything in the individual bins except what is labeled on them. **Do not leave recyclables on the ground!** If you drop something on the ground, pick it up. **Absolutely no trash is to be put into the bins!** Remember, camera surveillance is utilized in Rockcastle County and it is illegal to improperly dispose of trash.

Thinking About Cleaning Your Carpet!

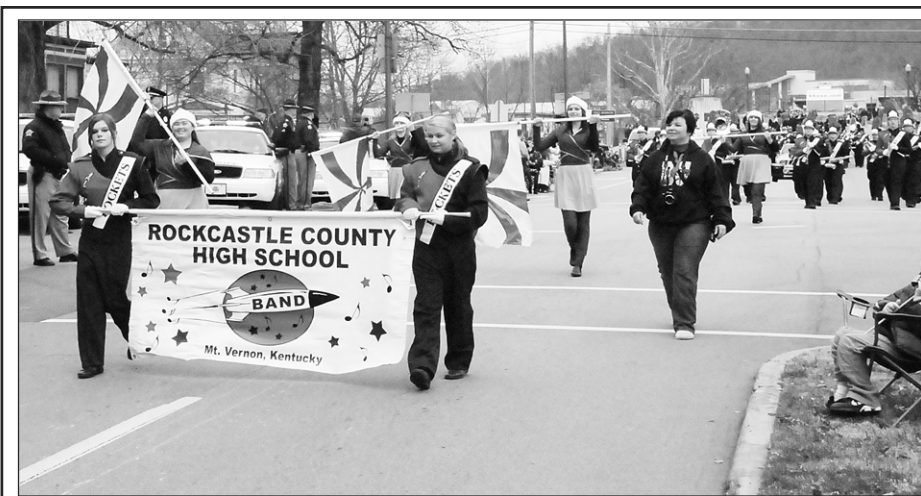
What is the best way to clean my carpet, should I use the old technology of steam cleaning or the new technology of dry foam?
