Mt. Vernon council approves 2nd reading of water rate ordinance

With little fanfare beforehand the Mt. Vernon City Council approved the 2nd reading of an ordinance which will increase water rates 36% in the near future.

Mayor Mike Bryant prefaced the vote with an explanation of the need for the project which will add over a million gallons storage capacity and allow the water plant to pump at its full capacity of four million gallons daily.

Bryant, who had been presented with a petition on Tuesday that contained 885 signatures against the "City of Mt. Vernon's excessive water rate increase of 36%," headed off the possibility of extensive discussion by some present by stating "We are a city council needing to discuss city business. This is not a town forum." Bryant welcomed everyone present and then welcomed new council member Cliff Mullins, who was appointed at the January meeting to fill the unexpired term of his father, Joe Mullins, who died in January after being a member of the council for 21 years.

During his remarks before the second reading of the ordinance, Bryant said he had been pressured since coming into office in January of last year, by the Kentucky Division of Water, Development, Rural CVADD and other agencies to raise rates because operating costs have risen for the water system and revenue has not kept pace. "During the past year, I have had hours and hours of meeting with experts" and Bryant said the consensus was always the same that rates must be raised just to stay ahead of normal operating

He told the group that, at first, there were no funds available, loan or grant, for the project but that when funds did become available, via a 65-35 KIA loan/grant, he felt it was time to proceed with the project since the present storage tanks are a "threat to (the city) being able to provide water."

Bryant went on to say that he understood the concern of water users. ""I am not unfeeling about the tough economic times. It is the worst time since the depression but we have to do what's best for the town."

The sale was conducted by Special Master Commissioner Bill Gregory and the process took about 40 min-

Only five of the ten registered bidders took part in the sale which started off with a two million dollar bid and escalated from there, by \$100,000 increments to

\$2.7 million. The bids then dropped to \$50,000 increments and finally to \$25,000 increments Hermann's last and successful bid of \$3,170,000.

the ground. The white powder was later identified by Barnett as pseudoephedrine.

Asst. Chief Adams then noticed two Mason jars lying in the floor of the vehicle and found another small bag containing approximately 2-3 grams of methamphetamine along

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, deputies responded to a possible meth lab at the home of Chris Bradley, who was out on bond after being arrested for having a one-step meth lab in his truck last Wednesday.

After arriving at the residence, officers could not locate Bradley inside the house but noticed a strong chemical odor coming from the garage which was locked from the inside.

Once officers got the door opened to the garage, Bradley reportedly fired a shot into his mouth with a .22 rifle.

It's a sad fact but we will always have crime and accidents in our county that we will always report on because it is still news Rockcastle County citizens need to know about what happens in their hometown.



Compassionate Country Doctors

For most of my life, I have been blessed with very good health. As a matter of fact, I had a physical a few weeks ago, and my physician gave me a clean bill of health. We discussed my family's longevity, and he observed that my good health is probably genetic in nature. After leaving his office, I was thanking the Good Lord for my latest report – and for providing me over the years with the three wonderful physicians who have blessed my life.

I cannot recall the first time I was taken to Dr. George Griffith's office as a little boy. Dr. Griffith earned his MD degree from the University of Louisville and then began his practice in Mt. Vernon in 1945. I

about his father's medical practice in those early days. He gave me the following account of his father: "Dad was a 'country doctor' and in the beginning, even road a mule to make his house calls. told the story of his father fighting in the Battle of the Bulge in WWII, "When Dad was fighting on the German border late one night, someone from the enemy's side yelled and asked if there was a doctor among the ranks. Dr. Griffith announced that he was a doctor, and the fighting stopped long enough for him to cross the lines and to deliver a baby. Once he had returned to his unit, the cease-fire was over and the war continued."

I can remember Dr. Griffith coming to our house after his office hours to examine me when my mother (Bee) called to explain how sick I was. In some ways, it was comforting just to see Dr. Griffith coming up the driveway. He not only had a wonderful bed-side manner, but he also brought medicines with him in his little black bag. After he had determined what was wrong with me, he would take out a small bottle of pills and empty them into a small envelope to hand to my mother or he would pull out a syringe for a shot. Our family thought that Dr. Griffith was the finest physician in the land. Even when I was in college at the University of Kentucky, I still came home in order to see Dr. Griffith when I was

During the summer of 1968, I moved to Mt. Sterling to take a position as teacher and coach at Mt. Sterling High School. That was when I was introduced to my second outstanding

I had to drive to Berea from Paint Lick this evening on highway 21 to swap in a couple of lottery tickets and pick up some prescription medication. I am pretty sure that I know what I am doing when I get behind the steering wheel anymore. I know, for sure, when I am in trouble and how to call for help and, so far, I am under my own control without risking my life or yours.

Parkinson"s Disease is not something that any one wants diagnosed or have to deal with.

But crap happens and I'm dealing with it. And I believe myself to still be somewhat sane and capable.

All of which is beside the point. The point being that just before I got to Dean's Bridge, there on 21, I saw the red fox hunkered over a cow pile with dinner on his mind. I glanced in the rear view mirror, no car in sight, and slowed my truck down to a crawl and the fox, scant feet away, and I came to a gentle stop there on the asphalt.

The fox paid me no atten-

The fox paid me no attention as I cried and moaned to myself that I didn't have a camera and he, or she as the case may be, nosed the dried manure pile and suddenly a mouse jumped out. I'm pretty sure that death was instant when the fox snatched the mouse in its teeth, leapt across the creek and disappeared into the trees that point toward Berea.

I sat there in the right lane of road, pulled off onto the shoulder, stock still, looking for the fox, until somebody beeped their horn behind me, flashed their head lights, and drove around, full throttle, and sped off up the road. And it occurred to me that if I had come upon a vehicle stopped on the road,

I would stop myself, and see if something was the matter. But whoever passed me in their blue sedan was in one helluva a hurry and had no interest in foxes and wanted nothing to do with a stranded stranger.

I knew, for sure that the driver was not a local neighbor. We stop and help each other, if we can, if there is any hint of trial or trouble. That's just the way we are here in Paint Lick. We care about one another but we are not above gossiping about out-of-towners who drive too fast and ignore us on 21.

I am, for example, pretty sure that the car that whizzed by me without concern or question, belongs to a certain woman in Berea but I am not naming names. Blue Honda is all I will say

So I did the pharmacy trip to Knight's there in Berea where they fill my prescriptions at about half what they cost at name your chain or big box and treat you like they want you to come back instead of doing you a favor.

On the way home, nearly dusk, I was driving slowly as I entered the woods and pastures on 21 and eased across Dean's Bridge and I pulled off the side of the road and tried to remember the red fox. Then, all of a sudden, he/she/it came dancing up the far side of the creek with a young rabbit dangling from its cheeks. Tail alert. Confident. Ultimate red fox in the twilight. Breathtaking. Beyond

I am reasonably sure that we have a Fox family in the making here in Paint Lick and that they will soon be eating young turkey of which we have so many or highway 21 between here and Berea. I will get pictures.

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The Battle of White Oak
and Big Hill

Through his memories, Tony Smith took us on a visit to Jepp Hill last week. Jepp Hill is in the east-southeast portion of Rockcastle County off the Red Hill Road. Also in the general vicinity of Jepp Hill is White Oak, where a school and general store were located as noted last week, and Big Hill (not to be confused with Big Hill near Berea).

As we well know, the Civil War was fought throughout Kentucky, the most notable local battles being the Battle of Wildcat Mountain and the Battle of Richmond. However, there were smaller battles in the area. About halfway between Wildcat Mountain and Richmond lies White Oak and Big Hill. I was unable to find an exact date of these minor battles, but I personally suspect they

line of the two other major battles.

There is an area, a bank

about half a mile long, near Big Hill where there is a rich deposit of "mini balls", spent rounds left from the Civil War battles. Ernie Smith, Tony's brother, has recovered several such memorabilia from the site.

Several stories have been told and passed down through the generations of the various families who can trace their roots to the area. One such story is that of the Union Army passing through Jepp Hill. As they passed through before a battle, they took what they needed, depleting the local farms of their livestock, canned good, or anything else they desired, with a haughty attitude. After a battle, if they were defeated, they would come back through with a more humble attitude and would ask for what they needed.

One farmer of Jepp Hill, a Daugherty, resorted to hiding his cattle in a cave or under a cliff to keep the Union Army from butchering them for food. There is also a Daugherty Ridge in the Jepp Hill area, probably named for him or his family. Tony Smith recalls that the main road originally came out on Daugherty Ridge and then went on to the points north such as Richmond.

The cliffs in the area, such as the one that sheltered the cattle, were used for the building of local's chimneys. Farmers used the materials such as timber and

the council."

The lease was due to be renewed January 1st and Mayor Bryant told the council they basically had three options: renew the lease with Mullins, put the lease up for bids or to make it a city-controlled operation. The matter was tabled until the March meeting.

During the meeting Asst. Police Chief Barry Adams gave the council the following report of his department's activity during February: 59 total arrests; 37 wanted persons arrested; 12 DUI arrests; 19 total drug charges; 23 other criminal charges; 22 traffic citations; 19 traffic accidents investigated/6 accidents with injuries; 17 criminal investigations opened; 446 total calls for service.

Mt. Vernon Fire Chief David Bales also reported to the council that in February, his department made 24 runs and used 13,900 gallons of water. The runs were broken down as follows: three accidents with injuries and possible entrapment; four accidents with injuries; one vehicle fire; two structure fires; three brush and grass fires; two smoke investigations; one investigation of hazardous materials of propane/gas odor; three fire alarm activations; one EMS assist with lifting; two special detail - traffic control for funeral procession and two special detail - high pressure washing settling tanks at water plant.



Our Study this month is on the evils of alcohol and booze.

In 1 Pet.4:2-3 we read, "That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God. For the time past of our life may suffice us to have wrought the will of the Gentiles, when we walked in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine, revellings, banquetings, and abominable idolatries:" Peter uses 3 phrases in connection with drinking booze, "excess of wine, revellings, banquetings." Let's discuss each one.

Bible Talk

Excess of Wine - This describes the person who has drunk so much that they may be nauseated. They are "inebriated" with booze. How many times is drunkenness condemned in the scriptures? Consider Gal.5:19-21, 1 Cor.6:9-10, Rom.13:13. Observe the problems that booze and alcohol causes in the home, in society, in automobile accidents, in homicide, etc. Almost every family has been affected adversely by alcohol abuse by a family member. Most will concede that drunkenness is sinful, yes even drunkards will acknowledge such also.

Revellings - This characterizes the fellow that is about half drunk. They may be loud and boisterous. Consider this definition on the word "revellings" from Thayer. "A nocturnal and riotous procession of half drunken and frolicsome fellows who after supper, parade through the streets with torches and music in honor of Bacchus or some other deity, and sing and play before houses of male and female friends; hence used generally of feasts and drinking parties that are protracted till late at night and indulge in revelry." This also is sinful behavior: revellings.

Drinking Parties - Finally there are" banquetings" as the NAS translates it: drinking parties. This describes the person that is just drinking a few, a social drinker. Many do not think just drinking one or two is all that bad. Yet, in all 3 categories of drinking booze, it is described as "doing of the will of the Gentiles." The true child of God wants no part of this sinful lifestyle. Our desire is to spend our time in doing God's will for we have wasted enough of life serving the flesh! Listen to the wise man in Proverbs 20:1, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink a brawler, and whoever is led astray by it is not wise." May we be people who are wise in our ways, to be sober and clear minded as we are exhorted to do, 1 Pet.4:7, I Thess.5:6, "So then let us not sleep, as do the rest, but let us watch and be sober."

Bradley was released on bond while Spoonamore remains lodged in the Rockcastle

County Detention Center.

Bradley was involved in another meth lab raid on Monday night. (see related front page story).

On Friday night, a Mt. Vernon man was arrested after officers from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department raided an apartment at Rockcastle Villa Apartments in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Johnnie Renner, 65, of Mt. Vernon.

According to the Sheriff's Office, Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant received an anonymous tip that Renner was manufacturing methamphetamine in an apartment at the Rockcastle Villa Complex.

Once officers arrived at the scene they found a black garbage bag on the kitchen table that contained an active onestep meth lab in a drink bottle.

Firefighters from the Mount

Vernon Fire Department evacuated eight other apartment units located near the apartment while authorities dismantled the meth lab.

Arrested at the scene was Billy J. Spoonamore, 56, of Brodhead.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, officers allegedly knew to make the traffic stop after using "MethCheck" and noticed Spoonamore purchasing a large quantity of pseudoephedrine in Stanford earlier in the day.

When officers arrested Spoonamore, he also allegedly had plastic tubing and another small bag containing methamphetamine in his coat pocket.

Spoonamore was charged with possession of a controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Spoonamore remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

A Mt. Vernon man was arrested Sunday afternoon after the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department raided a home on Crab Orchard Road in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Stephen Dwayne Blair, 45, of Mt. Vernon.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, officers responded to the scene after receiving an anonymous tip that Blair was manufacturing methamphetamine at the home.

Officers allegedly found Xanax, Oxycodone and other drugs, along with a plastic bag of pseudoephedrine. Officers also found another small bag of methamphetamine on Blair at the time of his arrest.

Blair was charged with manufacturing methamphetamine and two counts of possession of a controlled substance.

Blair remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

A Brodhead man was arrested Tuesday afternoon after Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department raided a home on Day Street in Brodhead.

Arrested at the scene was Ricky Hale Jr., 29, of Brodhead.

According to the Sheriff's Department, officers responded to the scene after officers received an anonymous tip that Hale was manufacturing methamphetamine at the home.

Hale reportedly had glass tubes for smoking meth and pseudoephedrine tablets in his coat pocket. Hale also had a small bag of methamphetamine in his waistband.

Two Mason jars containing one-step meth labs were also found in a storage building at the residence along with another pop bottle containing a one-step meth lab in the back yard of the residence.

Hale was charged with manufacturing methamphetamine and two counts of trafficking a controlled substance.

Hale remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Mt. Vernon Asst. Police

Chief Barry Adams reported this is one of the largest number of meth lab busts within one week in Rockcastle County.

"I've been doing this since

"I've been doing this since 1998 and I can't recall us busting this many labs in one week," Asst. Chief Adams said. "Unfortunately we are only beginning to put a dent in it."

ORDINANCE NO. 2012 - 1

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY ESTABLISHING RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE USE OF AND THE SERVICES RENDERED BY THE MUNICIPAL WATER SYSTEM OF THE SAID CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF SUCH RATES AND CHARGES

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky (hereinafter referred to as the City), has determined and declared it to be necessary and conducive to the protection of the public health, safety, welfare and convenience of the City to collect charges from all users of the City's Water Treatment Facility and Distribution System (hereinafter referred to as the Water System); and

WHEREAS, it is necessary in connection with collecting the charges that a system of user charges be established in order to provide funds needed to pay for the operation, maintenance and replacement and debt service expenses associated with the City's municipal water system;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, that the following users charges are amended for the City's municipal water system.

SECTION 1. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

It is the purpose of this Ordinance to establish user charges in the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky to provide funds needed to pay for the operation, maintenance and replacement (OM&R) and debt service expenses associated with the City's municipal water system.

SECTION 2. MONTHLY WATER CHARGES

The charges for the water services by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, are hereby fixed and established on a monthly basis as follows:

2.I Minimum Monthly Water Bill for Residents of the City

The minimum monthly bill for the service to residents of the City, which minimum bill entitles each customer to 0 gallons of water each month for such minimum charge, shall be seven nine dollars and four fifty seven cents (\$7.04) (\$9.57).

2.2 Monthly Water Rate for Residents of the City ·

The following monthly rates for the water service for all resident water customers of the City's municipal water system shall be based on the customer's monthly water consumption and shall take into account (a) the operation, maintenance and replacement costs of the municipal water system; and, (b) the debt service requirements of the bonds and loans issued on behalf of the City's municipal water system.

The monthly water rates for residents of the City are as follows:

Rate per 1000 gallons \$2.77 \$3.77 \$2.74 \$3.73 \$2.68 \$3.65

First 8000 gallons Next 40,000 gallons All over 48,000 gallons

Minimum Monthly Water Bill for Non-Residents of the City

The minimum monthly bill for non-resident water customers of the City's municipal water system, which minimum bill entitles each customer to 0 gallons of water each month for such minimum charge, shall be nine-thirteen dollars and nine fifty-nine cents (\$9.99)(\$13.59).

2.4 Monthly Water Rate for Non-Resident Water Customer

The following monthly rates for the water service for all non-resident water customers of the City's municipal water system shall be based on the customer's monthly water consumption and shall take into account (a) the operation, maintenance and replacement costs of the municipal water system; and, (b) the debt service requirements of the bonds and loans issued on behalf of the City's municipal water system; and, (c) the higher cost of performing maintenance work outside the boundaries of the City as opposed to maintenance inside the city limits.

The monthly water rates for residents outside of the city are as follows:

First 8000 gallons Next 40,000 gallons All over - 48,000 gallons Rate per 1000 gallons

\$3.88 \$5.28 \$3.84 \$5.22 \$3.75 \$5.10

2.5 Monthly Water Rate for Wholesale Water Customer

The following monthly rates for the water service for all Wholesale water customers of the City's municipal water system shall be based on the customer's monthly water consumption and shall take into account (a) the operation, maintenance and replacement costs of the municipal water system; and, (b) the debt service requirements of the bonds and loans issued on behalf of the City's municipal water system; and, (c) the higher cost of performing maintenance work outside the boundaries of the City as opposed to maintenance inside the city limits.

The monthly water rates for wholesale water customers are as follows up on approval by PSC:

All over 0 gallons

Rate per 1000 gallons \$ 2.16 - \$2.93

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE FOR WATER CHARGES

The foregoing water rates and charges shall be effective as to existing water customers on the City's municipal water system after the effective date of this Ordinance, and shall be effective as to the respective premises of new customers beginning on the date on which each customer connects their premises to the water line made available to such premises.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, provision, paragraph or section of this Ordinance is ruled void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder hereof is intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

SECTION 5. ALL FORMER PROVISIONS REPEALED

All City ordinances, orders, resolutions, motions, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, are repealed.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recording and publication as provided by law. And Ordinance # 2008-10 is repealed in its entirety.

This Ordinance, as stated above, is hereby enacted this 27 day of Feb. 2013.

I believe the time has come for Rockcastle County to move forward. A yes vote for the sale of alcohol on April 3, 2012 will be a step in the right direction. After a lifetime of watching Rockcastle County play catch up to not only the rest of the state, but more importantly now to our surrounding counties, we cannot wait longer. Today's economy will not allow us the luxury of remaining a "bedroom" community, while other are progressing around us.

Creating new jobs is one of the many benefits that this community would see from allowing the sale of alcohol. In a five year comparison between the numbers of new or expanded manufacturing jobs in Wet/Moist versus Dry communities, the results were staggering. The study looked at 27 Kentucky counties: the top five counties that recruited 1,500 to 5,000 new jobs were all Wet/ Moist. Of the bottom 15 counties that recruited less than 350 new jobs in that same five year span, 14 were Dry and one was Moist. Companies that consider Rockcastle County from outside the area are put off by our lack of amenities: a wider selection of restaurants (where an alcoholic drink is served), a lack of stores to buy everyday items, or luxury items for that matter, and a lack of quality of life amenities that the tax revenues would afford our county.

There are other new jobs to consider as well, with the opportunity to bring in new restaurants, retail stores and tourism business. Tourists, particularly, expect to be able to have a drink with their meal. According to Hank Phillips, president National Tours Association, "the availability of alcohol makes a difference when tour operators start looking for places to hold meetings and take tourists. If a community wants tourists or meetings and the hotels, restaurants and other things to accommodate them, alcohol is an issue."

I want to make certain that everyone understands how important this decision is to the citizens of Rockcastle County and its future. Vote yes!

physician. His name was Dr. Don C. McFadden. He was a graduate of Duke University and began his practice in 1963. I was totally impressed with his demeanor and his thorough knowledge in his field. I believe he was the most laid-back physician I have ever known. I always got a kick out of his struggle with smoking. He usually had a lit cigarette in each of the examining rooms. I teased him and accused him of only quitting the purchase of cigarettes only to "bum a smoke" from his patients. My initial experience

with Dr. McFadden was before the age of ultra-modern medical technology, and he was an outstanding diagnostician. After an examination, he discussed his findings with his patients; if he himself had any questions, there would be an immediate referral to a specialist. Dr. McFadden was an exceptional citizen along with being a fine physician. He was a member of the Mt. Sterling Board of Education, and he often asked my advice on educational matters. He loved discussing chemistry when I visited his office. Along with being my physician, he became my







The Homestead Exemption

If you own and occupy your home and will be 65 years of age any time during the year, you must file an application with the P.V.A. in order to be eligible for this exemption. If you are already receiving the Homestead Exemption, it will be automatically deducted from your tax bill and it will not be necessary for you to fill out an additional application.

Attention Disabled Persons

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is totally disabled. in order to qualify, you must receive disability payments for the entire calendar year and live on the property. You must sign each year before December 31.

If you have signed for the disability exemption before, you still have to sign each year. If you have not signed for this year, please come sign before December 31st.
