## Brodhead mayor asks court for help with new city park

Mayor Walter Lee Cash was at Tuesday's meeting of the fiscal court, to ask for help with the removal of utility lines that are in the middle of a six acre area the city is renovating into a city park. The park will be located across from Citizens Bank.

Cash said that the cost of removal of the pole would be \$25,000 but that he had received a donation of \$12,500 from KU toward the cost and the court voted to approve an additional \$12,000 toward the project. However, Magistrate Ralph Allen, who said he was not against the donation, told the court that they would be "opening up a can of worms with others wanting their part." Allen later voted for approving the funds on a motion by Carloftis, sec-

onded by Magistrate Lee Earl Adams which passed unanimously. Cash said the city had received a \$40,000 grant for the park and that a lot of volunteers were donating time and equipment. In other action, the court received a record-setting check for \$67,137.30 from County Clerk Danetta Allen for excess fees for 2011. Jessica Stringer, an engineer-in-training with the Kentucky Department of

Highways, presented the court with the department's recommendation for the roads to be resurfaced with funds left from the 2012-13 Rural Secondary Road program. Stringer said the county's allotment of funds for the program for 2012-13 was \$1.1 million with \$748,000 to be used for maintenance of the 157.144 miles of state roads in the county. It was the state's

## Four charged with manufacturing meth

Four people were arrested last Wednesday night for manufacturing methamphetamine after officers from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department raided a home on

Coffey Cemetery Road in Brodhead. Arrested at the scene were Chad E. Shaffer, 36, Sheena M. McIntosh, 26, James J. Gleissner, 24 all of Brodhead and Eddie Shane Hopkins, 24 (listed as homeless). Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant reportedly received an anonymous tip that Chad Shafer was "cooking" methamphetamine at his home on Coffey Cemetery Road. Bryant also had an active warrant for Shafer's arrest for theft by deception and theft of services.

Once officers arrived at the residence, Mt. Vernon Assistant Police Chief Barry Adams noticed the rear door of the home was open and could see Shafer inside.

## Fiscal Court allows RCIDA to negotiate lease with Anchor

On a motion by Magistrate Bill McKinney, seconded by Ralph Allen, the fiscal court voted unanimously Tuesday, at their regular meeting, to give the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority to negotiate a lease with Anchor Packaging for the former Plasticware building.

The action came after a long discussion with Holly Hopkins, executive director of RCIDA, who told the court that Anchor had indi-

cated they would like their lease payment on the building to be in the \$200,000 a year range. In order to secure the company, and the eventual 150 jobs when the company is in full production, tentatively set for January of 2013, Hopkins told the court that the county might have to supplement the lease payment with county funds, from the occupational tax. "We will negotiate the best lease terms

## Court holds first reading of ordinance on synthetic marijuana

The first reading of an ordinance, which would stop the possession or sale of four different types of cannabinoids (synthetic marijuana), was approved unanimously by the Fiscal Court during their Tuesday meeting.

The ordinance was presented to the court by County Attorney Billy

Reynolds who said that law enforcement officials in the county had reported to him that the item was being sold in certain areas of the county, including at convenience stores. Reynolds said he presented the ordinance at the urging of Chief Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette. "The courts are seeing a lot

## Locals aiding in tornado relief

Many organizations in Rockcastle County are reaching out to tornado victims in Laurel County and across the state as a result of a deadly storm system that moved across Kentucky on March 2nd.

The Brodhead, Mt. Vernon, Livingston, Pongo, Brindle Ridge, Climax and Western Rockcastle volunteer fire departments have spent numerous days since the storm volunteering their time in helping clean up debris and downed trees in East Bernstadt.

Brodhead Assistant Fire Chief John Dyehouse said that he was amazed when they made it to the East Bernstadt Fire Department and saw the pages of volunteers who had been there

before them. "There were hundreds of volunteers working out in the cold rain helping people they have probably never even met before." Dyehouse said. "It reminded me that Kentucky is still full of truly wonderful people."

Livingston Fire Chief Russell Barron said they were actually turned away from helping last Saturday as authorities told them they had over a 1,000 volunteers helping at the time. "They had so many people helping they had to turn us and many other volunteers away." Barron said. "It is such an amazing thing to actually have too much help at a disaster area and it's often unheard of."

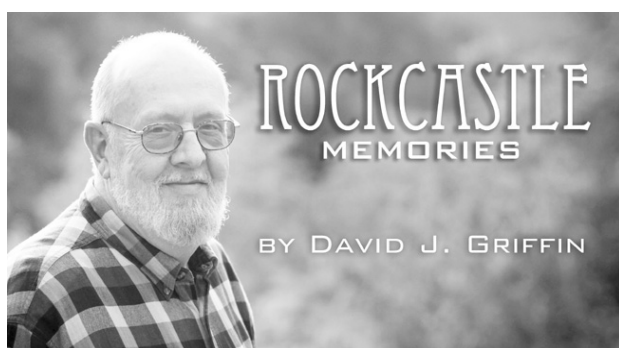
**And, on a completely unrelated subject...**

Somehow I retained sense enough to gouge Loretta awake and slur out:

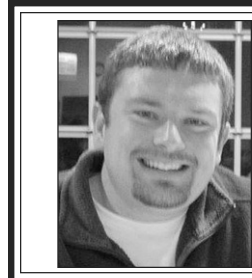
Stroke!!:

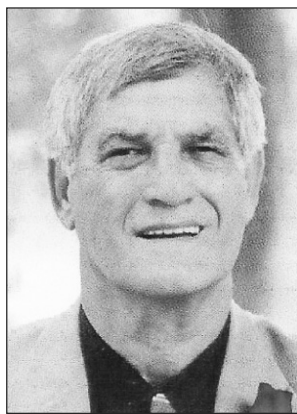
## Kenneth E. Smith, Jr.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by two brothers, Douglas and Curtis Norman.

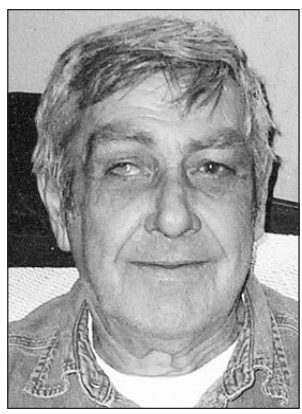

## Economic impact of a YES vote...

Dear Editor,

The economic impact of a YES vote in the April 3rd election is broader and farther reaching than has been addressed thus far. The KRS STATUTE 243.075 does address regulatory license fees, pertaining to policing, regulatory or administrative expenses. The realistic picture is what these taxes are able to provide to the community.

The example of the city of Danville taking in over \$21 million in eighteen months shows the impact possible for our county and cities. The City of Danville has brought in over \$100,000 per quarter from the taxes levied on the sale of alcohol that is earmarked for use by law enforcement.

The taxes are allowing the Danville City Police to provide new dashboard cameras for all 34 cruisers, the cameras cost from \$5,000 to \$6,000 each, among other items that have already been provided. These additional funds have also freed up money in their general fund that allowed them to reinstate two officers that had been laid off. They have also been able to pay overtime to officers choosing to participate in "alcohol patrol" where the officers conduct regular checks on stores selling alcohol. It also helps pay the ABC administrator's salary.

The Danville City Police now employ a school resource officer who goes to various schools and instructs alcohol abuse awareness programs. The teens participate in a simulation of the impairment of alcohol on the body by wearing special goggles. The education program also allows them to experience a drunken driving simulator (go cart) to feel the effects of the impairment of alcohol while driving. The program has been successful in deterring teens from drinking and driving. They are planning to expand the program with additional

simulators to show the effects of texting and driving. These revenues could certainly help the county in addressing the growing costs of the jail in Rockcastle County, with costs that increased by \$400,000 in last year's budget. This is money that could be put back into the general fund to go to much needed projects throughout the county.

Alcohol exists in Rockcastle County. It would be much more beneficial to have it regulated and controlled. Why allow those revenues to benefit other communities? Why allow youth to have access to alcohol through bootleggers that do not card? Why not give our county and cities an opportunity to have more jobs?

Some will say, "We are not Danville." That is a true statement. We have more opportunities than Danville because of our location and access to I-75. Make the most of those opportunities and VOTE YES!

## ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE POSSESSION OR SALE OF AM CANNABINOIDS, CP CANNABINOIDS, JWH CANNABINOIDS AND HU CANNABINOIDS

### ARTICLE 1: PURPOSE, DEFINITIONS, PROHIBITIONS AND PENALTY

#### SECTION 1. Purpose

The purpose of this ordinance is to stop the possession or sale of AM cannabinoids, CP Cannabinoids, JWH cannabinoids and HU cannabinoids. These substances are harmful if consumed and present a significant public health danger that can result in hospitalization or death.

#### SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS

1

- 2.1 "AM cannabinoids" means any synthetic cannabinoids created by Alexandros Makriyannis or his research group including but not limited to AM-087; AM-281; AM-356; AM-374; AM-381; AM-404; AM-411; AM-630; AM-661; AM-678; AM-679; AM-694; AM-855; AM-881; AM-905; AM-906; AM-919; AM-926; AM-938; AM-1116; AM-1172; AM-1220; AM-1221; AM-1235; AM-1241; AM-1248; AM-2201; AM-2212; AM-2213; AM-2232; AM-2233; AM-2102; AM-4030. The term shall not include synthetic cannabinoids that require a prescription, are approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, and are dispensed in accordance with state and federal law;
- 2.2 "CP cannabinoids" means CP-47,497; (C6)-CP-47,497; C(C8)-CP-47,497; (C9)-CP-47,497; CP-50,556-1; CP-55,244; CP-55,940; CP-945,598. The term shall not include synthetic cannabinoids that require a prescription, are approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, and are dispensed in accordance with state and federal law;
- 2.3 "HU cannabinoids" means any synthetic cannabinoids synthesized at the Hebrew University including but not limited to HU-210; HU-211; HU-243; HU-308; HU-320; HU-331; HU-336; HU-345. The term shall not include synthetic cannabinoids that require a prescription, are approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, and are dispensed in accordance with state and federal law.
- 2.4 "JWH cannabinoids" means any synthetic cannabinoids created by John W. Huffman or his research group including but not limited to JWH-007; JWH-015; JWH-018; JWH-019; JWH-030; JWH-048; JWH-57; JWH-073; JWH-081; JWH-098; JWH-116; JWH-120; JWH-122; JWH-133; JWH-139; JWH-147; JWH-148; JWH-149; JWH-161; JWH-164; JWH-166; JWH-167; JWH-171; JWH-175; JWH-176; JWH-181; JWH-182; JWH-184; JWH-185; JWH-192; JWH-193; JWH-194; JWH-195; JWH-196; JWH-197; JWH-198; JWH-199; JWH-200; JWH-203; JWH-205; JWH-210; JWH-213; JWH-229; JWH-234; JWH-249; JWH-250; JWH-251; JWH-253; JWH-258; JWH-300; JWH-302; JWH-307; JWH-336; JWH-350; JWH-359; JWH-387; JWH-398; JWH-424. The term shall not include synthetic cannabinoids that require a prescription, are approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, and are dispensed in accordance with state and federal law;
- 2.5 "Person" means individual, corporation, government or governmental subdivision or agency, business trust, *estate*, trust, partnership or association, or any other legal entity;
- 2.6 "Possession" means to have actual physical possession or otherwise to exercise actual dominion or control over a tangible object;
- 2.7 "Traffic" means to manufacture, distribute, dispense, sell, transfer, or possess with intent to manufacture, distribute, dispense, or sell a controlled substance; and
- 2.9 "Transfer" means to dispose of a controlled substance to another person without consideration and not in furtherance of commercial distribution.

#### SECTION 3. PROHIBITION OF POSSESSION OR SALE OF AM CANNABINOIDS, CP CANNABINOIDS, JWH CANNABINOIDS OR HU CANNABINOIDS

##### 3.1 Trafficking in AM cannabinoids, CP cannabinoids, JWH cannabinoids or HU cannabinoids

A person is guilty of possession of AM cannabinoids, CP cannabinoids, JWH or HU cannabinoids when he or she knowingly and unlawfully traffics in AM cannabinoids, CP cannabinoids, JWH cannabinoids or HU cannabinoids.

##### 3.2 Possession of AM cannabinoids, CP cannabinoids, JWH cannabinoids or HU cannabinoids

A person is guilty of possession of AM cannabinoids, CP cannabinoids, JWH Cannabinoids or HU cannabinoids when he or she knowingly and unlawfully Possesses AM cannabinoids, CP cannabinoids, JWH cannabinoids or HU cannabinoids.

#### SECTION 4. PENALTY

Any person violating section 3.1 or 3.2 of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not more than \$500.00, or imprisonment for not more than 12 months, or both, for each offense. If current or future Kentucky law(s) (KRS, etc.) prohibits any substance(s) contained in this ordinance, the Kentucky law(s) (KRS, etc.) shall be applied instead of this ordinance for both prosecution and penalty.

#### SECTION 5. CONSTITUTIONALITY

If any article, section, sentence or part of a sentence in this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional, it is the intent of the drafter to strike only the unconstitutional provision(s) and for the remainder of the ordinance to remain in effect.

#### ARTICLE II: EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption.

recommendation that the remaining funds be spent resurfacing:

KY 1955 from its intersection with Dougherty Ridge Road at milepost 8.100 and extending 2 miles to milepost 10.100;

KY 2614 from milepost 4.400 and extending 1 mile; and

KY 2108 from its intersection with Hemlock Circle at milepost 0.500 and

extending 0.790 miles to milepost 1.290.

After their presentation, Cash asked the state group about West Street in Brodhead which Cash said was heavily damaged by state trucks while the new 150 was being built. Cash said he was told at the time that the street would be blacktopped. William Lucas, Section Supervisor-Stanford, told Cash he was not aware of the promise but would make inquiries.

The court also heard a presentation from Rockcastle County Sheriff Mike Peters about an interlocal agreement with several surrounding counties. The agreement would allow sheriff’s departments in each county to cross county lines to pursue lawbreakers or when needed to assist local law enforcement.

Peters told the court that the agreement was being used in several northern Kentucky counties and that he would be attending another meeting concerning this next week.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds told the court that he would like to research whether the agreement would be constitutional and the court tabled the matter, pending more information from Peters.

The court also approved \$250 for five scholarships for the upcoming Entrepreneurs Class which will be run by MACED of Berea.

The classes will be limited to 20 participants and will be for those interested in starting a business and those who have been in business for less than two years.

The classes are a joint enterprise of RCIDA, the Chamber of Commerce and Adult Education.

David Meade, candidate for State Representative for the seat being vacated by the retirement of Danny Ford spoke to the court.

Meade, from Lincoln county, told the court of his background as an electrical engineer technician and seven years in his present occupation as a realtor/auctioneer. He said he was running for the office because he truly wanted to help people in the district and that Ford had been a “ter-

rific representative” for the last 31 years. He listed as his qualifications his broad range of career experience, that he is pro life, pro second amendment, for job creation, lower taxes and less government regulation.

Meade and his wife of 11 years have one five-year-old son and they are in the process of adopting a little girl from Korea.

The court tabled a request from the Brodhead Head Volunteer Fire Department for \$25,000 to rebuild a tanker truck.

In financial matters, the court transferred \$110,000 from occupational tax funds to the general fund from which \$50,000 will be transferred to the jail and.

The court also approved payment of \$8,102.16 for use of the \$500 medical cards issued to each employee enrolled in the county’s health insurance program.

at the scene and found a small plastic bag containing suspected methamphetamine in his front jeans watch pocket.

Inside the house, officers noticed a strong chemical odor and found JOB rolling papers along with a loaded Ruger P89 semi-automatic pistol on the kitchen table.

After officers noticed the items, Shafer then requested to use the restroom inside the house. While checking the restroom for weapons, officers found a small plastic bag with a coffee filter containing suspected methamphetamine in the bathtub. Another small bag containing methamphetamine-like substance was found in the floor in front of the sink.

Outside on the porch, officers noticed flames coming from an open grill. Near the grill was a partially burned container with burned coffee filters and other remnants of various materials used in the meth manufacturing process. Officers then observed a partially opened blue bag that contained a coil of copper tubing.

Officers also found a small plastic bucket inside a chrome grill on the back patio. A one quart jar containing a one-step meth lab was found in the plastic bucket.

All four were charged with manufacturing methamphetamine and conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine.

Shafer was also separately charged with two counts of possession of a controlled substance.

All four remain lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$60,000 cash/property bond. The preliminary hearing for all four is set for Monday March 19th.

After the arraignment of the four on Tuesday, Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said he is happy with the results.

“I appreciate Judge Wood allowing the bond for these charges to remain at \$60,000,” Reynolds said. “It sends a message that these offenders will be dealt with severely.”

of people under the influence of the drug and it needs to be stopped before it gets a foothold in our county,” Reynolds said.

The ordinance expands two state laws which, according to Reynolds, are not clear.

The penalty for violation of the ordinance, by either the sale or possession, is a misdemeanor and carries a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than 2 months, or both, for each offense.

for the county we can,” Hopkins told the court, “but you all might have to pay \$2,000 to \$3,000 a month on the loan.” Hopkins pointed out that when the company is in full production, it is estimated an additional \$66,000 a year will be generated for the county from the occupational tax. “The numbers on this project will not be negative in the end,” Hopkins added. She noted that this incentive for Anchor was not unusual. “Other states give away building, land, everything. Ohio is stealing jobs from Louisville everyday. They are doing whatever it takes.”

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis told the court that, besides needing the revenue in order to pay the expenses of county government, economic development was the major reason the occupational tax was passed. “The ability to move forward with a project like this would not be possible without our passing the occupational tax,” Carloftis asserted.

The question of how to finance purchase of the building, which is owned by Citizens Bank, was then discussed and Carloftis told the magistrates that interim financing (three months) was needed because of the length of time it takes to secure long-term financing (a 20 year loan). “The building needs some work, such as cleaning, replacing ceiling tiles, painting, etc.” and we can’t do this until the building is owned by the county,” he said.

Hopkins told the court that local banks had been contacted and two had agreed to split the cost of the building, one at 3.5% interest and one at 4.6%. Carloftis is currently dealing with 5/3 Bank, through KACO, to obtain long term financing which will probably come in at somewhere around 4.6%. The interest rate on loans for private business is higher than for infrastructure projects, such as water or sewer systems, etc., Carloftis noted.

Even to obtain interim financing, Carloftis said, Wednesday, that a hearing with the Department for Local Government was not required for interim financing and long as it is repaid by June 30th. The process for long term financing could take at least 45-60 days and would involve a public hearing and approval by the Department for Local Government.

Hopkins said that Anchor plans to begin taking applications early in April for the first 60 employees.

McKinney made a motion, seconded by Magistrate William Denny to allow interim financing to be put in place so purchase of the building can proceed.

Anchor Packaging will have the option of buying the building at any time for the balance on the amortization schedule.

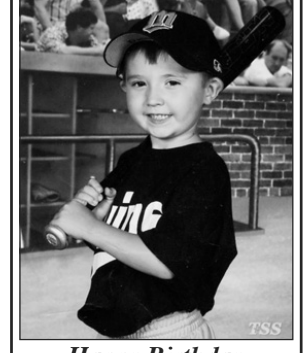

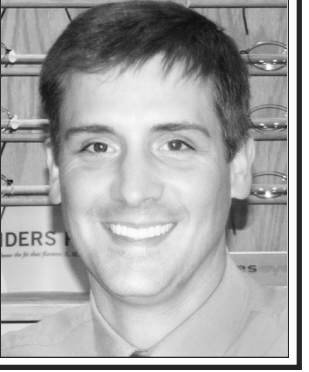

PRIDE funds for Spring Cleanup in April

## Rockcastle County to receive up to \$5,500

PRIDE will reimburse Rockcastle County, Mt. Vernon, Livingston and Brodhead up to \$5,500 for leading the local PRIDE Spring Cleanup Month in April.

Rockcastle County is eligible for \$4,750. Mt. Vernon, Livingston and Brodhead are eligible for \$250 each. The funding levels are based on the number of road miles in the county and cities.

The PRIDE funds will offset costs to the county

and cities for removing litter and free trash drop-off events. The funds also may help communities clean up debris from recent storms.

PRIDE also will give the county and cities T-shirts and cleanup supplies to distribute to Spring Cleanup volunteers.

"Volunteers have such a good time cleaning their community together, and they are really successful at picking up litter," said Tammie Wilson of PRIDE,

the nonprofit organization that organizes the annual Spring Cleanup campaign in 38 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky.

"Disposing of the trash volunteers collect costs money, and that's where the Spring Cleanup Funds come in," Wilson continued. "The funds also help local governments pay contractors to remove dumps that are too big or dangerous for volunteers."

"This is the 15th anniversary of PRIDE, and we can celebrate a visible difference in our region," Wilson added. "PRIDE volunteers have picked up 699,442 bags of trash since 1997, and 2,869 illegal dumps have been eliminated from our landscape."

"It all starts with one cleanup and one volunteer — you," Wilson said. "Please answer the call for volunteers as your local leaders announce Spring Cleanup events. Stay tuned to your local media and [kypride.org](http://kypride.org)."

During PRIDE Spring Cleanup Month in April, PRIDE works with communities to create a clean, healthy environment just in time for new recreation and tourism seasons. Local governments organize Spring Cleanup events, and PRIDE provides cleanup supplies, T-shirts and funding assistance.

All local governments in PRIDE's 38-county service area are eligible for Spring Cleanup funds, thanks to a grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. To qualify for its available funds, each local government must attend PRIDE training and comply with funding guidelines.

## 30 counties eligible for Farm Service Agency Emergency Loans

On March 6, 2012, President Obama declared seven Kentucky counties as disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by severe storms, tornadoes, straight-line winds, and flooding that occurred from February 29, 2012 through March 3, 2012. Those counties affected are: Johnson, Kenton, Laurel, Lawrence, Menifee Morgan and Pendleton.

As a result of the declaration, 23 Kentucky counties were named as contiguous counties where eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance pursuant to Section 321(a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act. Those counties are: Bath, Boone, Boyd, Bracken, Campbell, Carter, Clay, Elliot, Floyd, Grant, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, McCreary, Magoffin, Martin, Montgomery, Powell, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Rowan, Whitley, and Wolfe.

EM loan applications for physical and production losses will be received through November 6, 2012, and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.
