SourceCorp leaving county on June 8th

At Monday's meeting of the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority, Executive Director Holly Hopkins told the board that it was official that SourceCorp, now SourceHOV, would be consolidating their Rockcastle County operation with their operation in London as of June 8th. Hopkins said it was a move by the company to save money and was necessitated by NOAA not being

funded which was the primary source of jobs in the company's operation in the county. SourceHOV will continue paying the monthly lease fee of \$25,000 for the building through the remaining term of the lease. However, County Treasurer Joe Clontz, who was present at the meeting, told the board that the company was not paying their agreed

Brodhead man arrested for meth lab Thursday

A Brodhead man was arrested last Thursday for manufacturing methamphetamine, after the Kentucky State Police made a traffic stop on Coffey Cemetery Road in Brodhead. Arrested at the scene was Chaz M. Cable, 29, of Brodhead. According to Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant, officers from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department were responding to a possible burglary on Chestnut Grove Road when they observed Cable pulling out of a location nearby.

Trooper Jason Vanhook, who was also responding to the burglary call, made a traffic stop after observing Cable turning around in the middle of the road without using turning signals. Upon receiving consent to search the vehicle, officers found syringes in both compartments of the driver-side and passenger-side doors. Officers observed that one of the syringes was loaded with a liquid and Cable told officers it was pain pills. Inside the trunk, officers found a green duffle bag

Red Hill Horse Camp hosts 37th annual 100 mile ride

The Rockcastle County Saddle Club will hold their 37th Annual 100 Mile Horse Ride at the Red Hill Horse Camp in Livingston next week. The 100 mile ride is a four day event that begins on Wednesday, June 13th and ends on Saturday, June 16th with all proceeds going to the Rockcastle County Saddle Club. The Red Hill Horse Camp was founded by Livingston native Gene Philbeck, who has been an avid horse rider since he was a young child. "All my life I have been involved with horses," Philbeck said. "No matter what kind of new hobbies I tried, I have

always come back to horse riding." Philbeck said he saw the need for a horse camp here in Rockcastle County after having to travel miles away to other horse camps out of the county. "I wanted to create a local camp for horse riders here in Rockcastle County," Philbeck said. "That way they wouldn't have to travel out of the county to go to a horse camp." However, Philbeck said he never envisioned the horse camp growing into what it has become today. "My original intent was to only have a place for our family, friends and local saddleclub to ride," Philbeck said. "Now the camp has grown to where the majority of our custom-

ers are actually from outside the county and state." The horse camp consists of over one-hundred miles of horse trails that go through the Horselick Creek and the White Oak areas in the Red Hill Community. The horse camp has fifty camper and tent hook-up sites with both water and electric available upon request. The camp also features showers, restrooms, horse stalls and a four person cabin to rent for those who choose not to bring a camper or tent. The Red Hill Horse Camp holds four three-day-rides each year and is also open to group rides or single rides year round by reservation only. With more horse riders coming to the camp, along

with a high return rate of previous riders each year, Philbeck says he plans on

expanding the facilities at the camp in the near future. Philbeck is currently

building new horse stalls and also plans on building

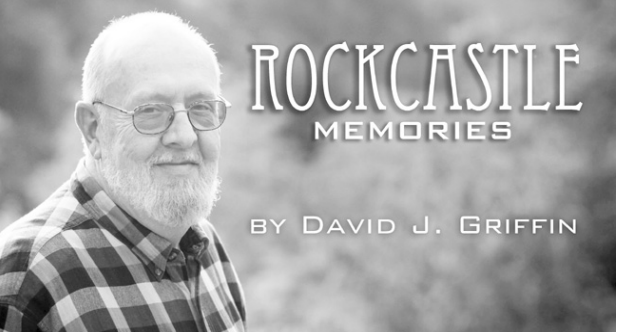

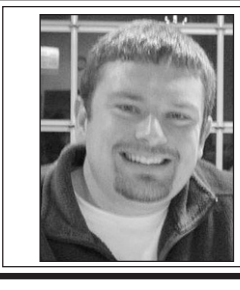
Your Hit Parade

I am occasionally reminded by a few of my readers, especially my brother Al, that there was good music before rock and roll appeared on the scene. Even though I usually concentrate on the music of the late 50's and 60's, I do remember lots of songs that my mother (Bee) and brother listened to in the late 40's. Bee was extremely fond of Perry Como, Frank Sinatra, and Bing Crosby. I can also remember Al listening to Al Jolson on the radio frequently.

I don't know what I was expecting last Saturday morning, but a crowd of over 1,300 people walking the grounds at Keeneland exceeded both my own and the organizers' expectations by about 800 walkers.

I was, of course, participating in the "Step Out" walk to stop diabetes along with 3 year-old grandson, Tyler Kane Ochs and 15 members of his family and his friends. Not only was the crowd huge, but the weather, though much cooler than normal, was perfect. I had to wear a jacket over my "Team TKO" t-shirt but I hobbled and wobbled over the mile-long course without falling down or even stopping to rest.

A representative from the American Diabetes Association (ADA) who has been attending these walks, all over the nation, for years said that the Bluegrass walk was easily the largest turnout she had ever seen.

I suspect the crowd was even larger than announced, because over 1,300 walkers actually registered in and a lot of people were not bothering to do that.

On behalf of Tyler and the rest of Team TKO, I want to extend a heartfelt Thank You to my readers who made donations to our cause! In fact, donations to ADA are still coming in the mail to my home address so I don't yet know how what

Team TKO's total contribution amounts to but I believe we have reached our goal of \$1,500 in donations to help fight diabetes.

When we left the grounds around 10:00 AM, more than \$200,000 had already been turned in. When all is said and done, it is safe to predict that the Bluegrass "Step-Out" walk will have generated over a quarter million dollars to help find a cure and provide services to victims of this terrible disease.

If you made a donation to ADA through Team TKO, you know who you are so please also know that Tyler and I are oh so grateful for your generosity.

In other news, I have been getting tons of email, snail mail, phone calls, queries to both Loretta and me on the street as to how my stroke recovery is coming along. And the answer is; not nearly as well as I'd like.

I am not a patient person, but I am having some complications that seem to be getting worse instead of better. Lots of pain, especially in the morning, in every joint from my shoulder to my fingers and inadequate blood circulation that is causing lots of swelling. My left hand is nearly twice as large as my right hand. It is difficult to determine how much of this to attribute to

The Roots of Rockcastle

Rockcastle's Civil War Hospitals, Part II

In the last issue of the Roots series, the subject of Civil War hospitals was discussed. There were several major hospitals located within the state, but none here in the county, only field hospitals.

The major hospitals were located in the larger cities of Lexington, Louisville, Ashland, Bowling Green, Covington, and others. The hospitals were always located near railroads to allow for the transportation of the soldiers and supplies.

However, smaller field hospitals sprang up throughout the countryside of Kentucky and other states. Almost any structure was used; schools, churches, private residences, and public buildings served the wounded.

Probably the most-noted field hospital in Rockcastle was located at the Great Saltpetre Cave. The cave was discovered in 1798 by John Baker and has gone through several owners and served many purposes during the years.

The cave was rich in calcium nitrate, a chief component of gunpowder that was used not only in the War of 1812 but the Civil War, as well.

During the Civil War, there were miners of the calcium nitrate who are said to have lived on-site. Also on-site, there was the hospital that treated numbers of wounded soldiers in the area. There is said to be a small stream of water running through the cave that benefited its dwellers and the wounded at the hospital.

Another field hospital of the day was the private residence of a Dr. Cooper in Livingston. He was the first doctor in the Livingston area.

Before the War, Dr. Cooper had built a white, two-story clapboard-sided house just across the river in Livingston where he would tend the wounded from Camp Wildcat. The house changed owners over the years. One owner was Bill Moore, who sold it to Faye Hacker. Over the years, someone put red brick over

the white siding. Around 2006 the house burned, and no longer exists.

Another site that served the injured was "Hospital Rock" located between Livingston and Wildcat Mountain in Laurel County. It is a rather large, flat-topped rock in the vicinity of Wildcat Mountain where the injured were treated even before going to the field hospital in Livingston.

Another Civil War field hospital still stands in the northern portion of the county where Rockcastle, Madison, and Jackson counties converge. It, too, is a white two-story frame house located on Burnt Ridge Road, near a cemetery. The house in being used as a tourism center at the present time.

These are the most-noted sites for the treatment of the wounded during the battles of the Civil War here in the county. There may have been even more on a smaller scale, but they all played an important role in the history and growth of the county.

Travel safe and smart this summer

Summer is upon us, and for many, the season means at least one family vacation or weekend getaway. According to a 2011 TripAdvisor survey, 90 percent of Americans were planning to take two or more leisure trips within the next year and 24 percent were planning five or more trips. Of those surveyed, 79 percent said they plan to spend at least \$3,000 on these vacations. As you start planning your next vacation, you can take precautions to keep yourself, your family and your finances safe when you travel.

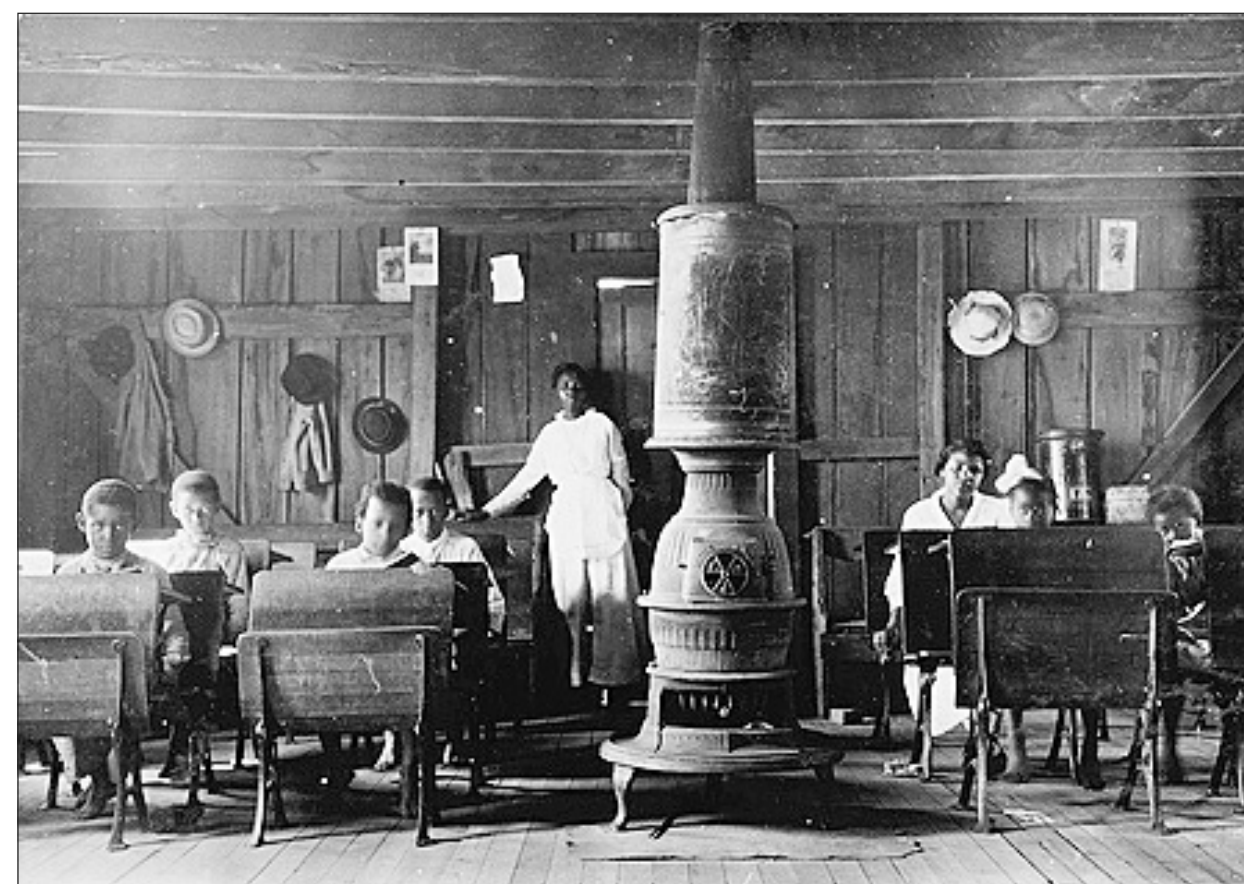
Whether you plan your own trip or use a travel agent, you should watch out for travel fraud. Ask friends and family for referrals when looking for a reputable travel agent. When working with an agent, always ask about the items that are not included in the travel package so you can plan for those extra expenses. Remember that companies or individuals that cold-contact you are often scam artists. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Using your credit card to book a trip or pay for a travel package can allow you to dispute any scams.

Many travel agents and certain websites may suggest that you buy travel insurance. Travel insurance is not a requirement, but can pro-

tect you in the event that you need to cancel your trip or have any unforeseen expenses, such as medical problems or emergency evacuations, while vacationing. Your Hit Parade's familiar closing theme was "So Long For A While." The lyrics were:

So long to Your Hit Parade, And the songs that you picked to be played.

So long!
Once American Bandstand had been established in the nation's living rooms, the big band program began its rapid decline. The show moved from NBC to CBS in 1958. Your Hit Parade had not been able to deal with the rock revolution, and the last show was aired during the fall of 1959. My mother was sad. On the other hand, my friends and I now had our own show so we did not miss Your Hit Parade. Rock and roll was here to stay!

We do not support the soring of horses and we will NOT tolerate

sored horses on our show grounds. We put on our shows for fun to help raise money to help support associations or individuals in our community or surrounding area. Our show was designed to give people who do not sore their horses a chance to partake in friendly competition and above all have fun. We are not affiliated with any large associations nor do we support the soring of horses; the JHAC was put together by a group of friends from right here in Rockcastle County who love horses and want to share with others the joy and fun you can have with such an amazing creature.

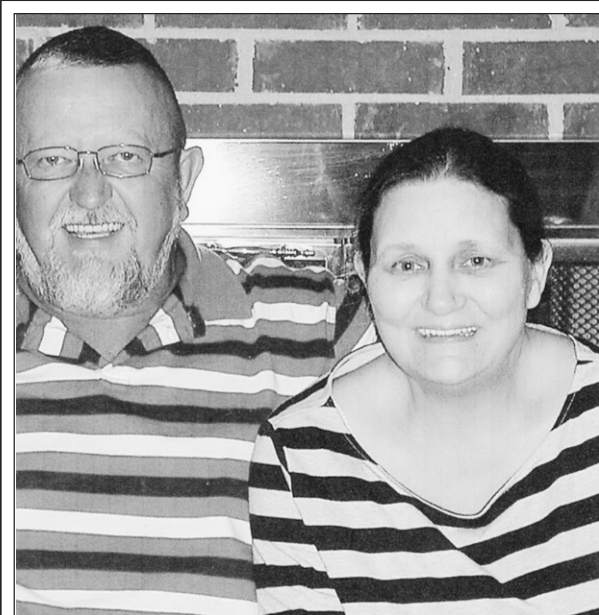

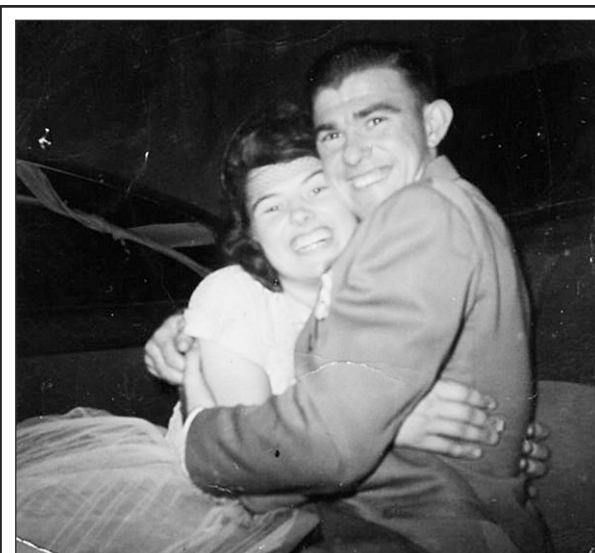

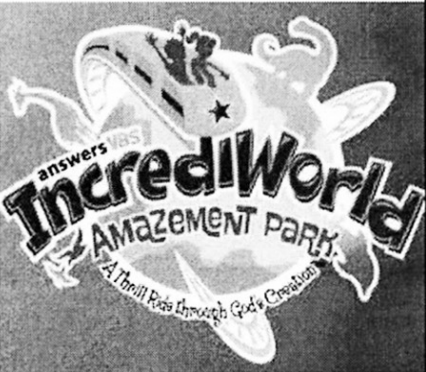

Bible Talk

This Sunday and every Sunday will be a time when Christians remember the one who died for them so long ago on Calvary: *"And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight."* Ac.20:7. This verse reveals the pattern of when the Lord's supper is to be done, upon the first day of the week. How often does the first day of the week come? Every week of course. In Luke 22:19, Jesus said *"This do in remembrance of me"* when he instituted the Lord's supper and demonstrated that his people should follow this example. The 2 emblems in the Lord's supper should bring to mind the tremendous sacrifice that Jesus made for our sins. As we eat the bread, we remember the body of Christ, which was given for us. And as we drink the cup, we remember the blood of the covenant, which was shed for the remission of our sins. There are 4 views in partaking of the Lord's supper:

Backward - As we partake of the Lord's supper, we look back to the death of Jesus on the cross of Calvary. All the suffering and pain he endured is brought to remembrance as we ponder the 2 emblems in the Lord's supper. Our minds should flood with the images that the gospel accounts describes of the arrest, the trials, the beatings, the vicious words and Jesus being nailed to the cross.

Inward - We are to look into our own hearts as we partake, so that we do it in a worthy manner. 1Cor.11:28, *"Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup."* If we fail to look inwardly and partake in a worthy manner we are warned, *"Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning the body and blood of the Lord."* 1Cor.11:27.

Outward - We also look outwardly in partaking of the Lord's supper. 1Cor.11:26, *"For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink the cup, ye proclaim the Lord's death till he come."* The flavor of this word "proclaim" is seen in the definition: "to announce, declare, promulgate, make known, to proclaim publicly, publish." Each Sunday when Christians partake of the Lord's supper, we are proclaiming to the world that a Savior has died for humanity.

Forward - We also look forward to the return of the Lord Jesus Christ. 1Cor.11:26, *"For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink the cup, ye proclaim the Lord's death till he come."* Christians will faithfully continue this memorial until the 2nd Coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Whether the Lord's return is this month or 100 years from now, the faithful saints will continue to look for the coming of the Savior back to this world. The Lord's supper affirms our faith in this promise.

What a privilege it is to share in the body and blood of the Lord every first day of the week, in this wonderful memorial called the Lord's supper. Let us contemplate these 4 views that Paul speaks about in 1Cor.11 on his discussion of the proper observance of the Lord's supper.

Two RCHS students are Rogers Scholars

Rockcastle County High School students Rebekah Ponder and Madisan Miller have been named 2012 Rogers Scholars and will be eligible to receive exclusive scholarship opportunities from 16 colleges and universities.

The students were selected by The Center for Rural Development to build their leadership and entrepreneurial skills as the region's next generation of leaders and entrepreneurs at this summer's Rogers Scholars program.

Rogers Scholars, an intensive one-week summer youth leadership program, brings together rising high school juniors from across Southern and Eastern Kentucky for a one-of-a-kind experience that past participants often describe as "life changing."

"The Center believes in giving young people in our region a chance to receive leadership and scholarship opportunities so they can seize their potential and become effective, skilled leaders," Lonnie Lawson, president and CEO of The Center, said. "It is our goal that many of these students will return to Southern and Eastern Kentucky to build their careers and transform this region for years to come."

Rogers Scholars—The Center's flagship youth program—was built on a mission started by U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-05) that "no young person should have to leave home to find his or her future."

Now in its 15th year, the Rogers Scholars program is planned, coordinated, and supervised entirely by The Center and its staff. Most activities take place on the grounds of The Center in Somerset and other sites in the Lake Cumberland region.

"We are looking forward to meeting the 2012 Class of Rogers Scholars and working with each participant to develop his or her skills as the region's future leaders and entrepreneurs," Delaney Stephens, youth programs coordinator and community liaison for The Center, said.

"The Rogers Scholars program emphasizes the development of technological skills and builds in participants a sense of leadership,

Students apply for the Rogers Scholars program during their sophomore year and attend the summer prior to the start of their junior year.

Since 1998, approximately 806 high school students have graduated from Rogers Scholars. College scholarships valued at more than \$7.5 million are available to program graduates.

The program, which is supported solely through financial contributions, fundraising events, and program sponsors, is provided free of charge to participants and their families.

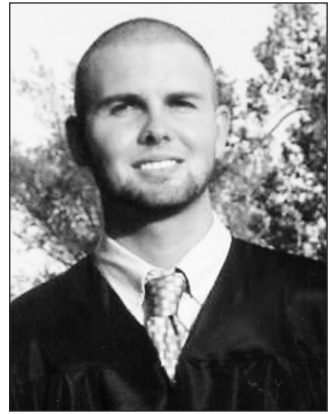

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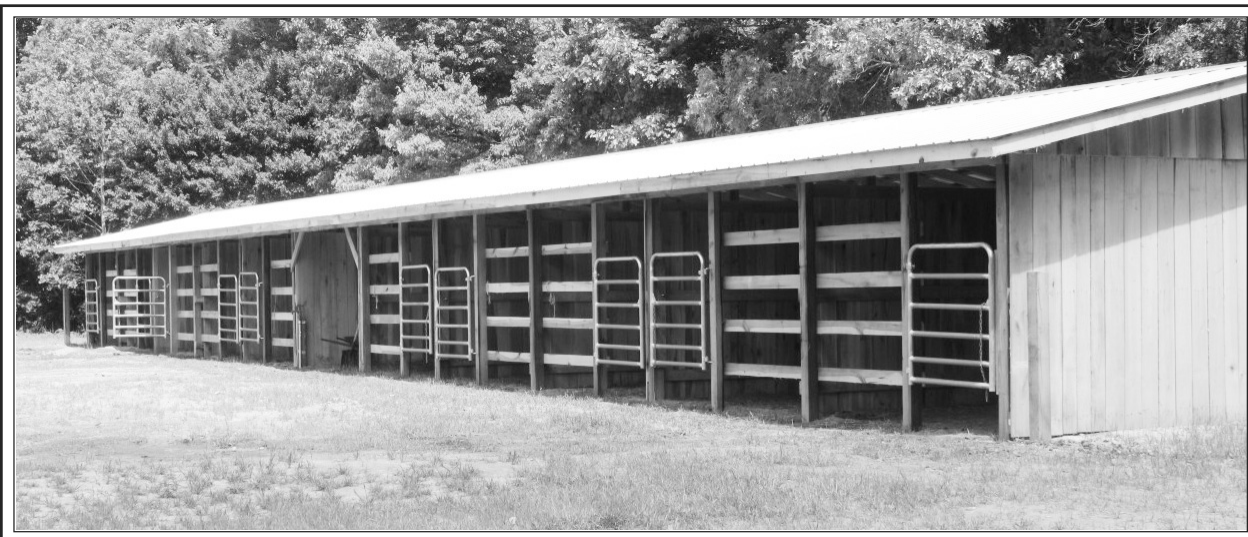

amount for occupational tax. In the contract between RCIDA and the company, SourceHOV agreed to pay the tax for 200 employees from August of last year, regardless of the number of employees they had.

Hopkins said she had been told, by court clerk Patricia Martin, that the company was fulfilling this obligation but Clontz held firm that they were not and Hopkins agreed to communicate with the company about the discrepancy.

Hopkins told the court that Anchor Packaging was “overjoyed” with the progress of the clean-up of the Plasticware building and that Anchor is in the process of getting the machinery up and running.

The executive director said that a grand opening, with tours of the facility, was tentatively scheduled for June 26th, in conjunction with state officials.

Over 500 applications have been received at the adult learning center for positions with Anchor, which has helped give the center a Star Facility designation because of the KEES testing that is being done for potential employees, Hopkins said.

Hopkins told the board that she was “super excited” about a marketing trip to Boston, Mass. June 11-15 which will give her a chance to meet with manufacturers, particularly in the auto and tool and die industry.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony is also being planned for Weltrans, Inc. which is in the process of completing their facility, getting signage installed, etc. No date has been set for the ceremony.

A transfer station at the industrial park on Hwy. 150 was also discussed with Hopkins telling the board that it would be an “incredible selling point” for the park if an area could be developed for semis to load and unload materials from trains on the spur that runs through the park. The cost of the station was estimated at between \$100-\$150,000.

project and there will not be other funds allocated until, at least, the 2013 budget. The widening of the interstate south is included on the plan for the year 2015 with \$1,380,000,000 in funding designated SP (state construction “not” available).

The cover letter from the Transportation Cabinet, detailing the plan, notes “It is necessary to note that the annual funding expectations for this edition of the Highway Plan have been roughly balanced against projects scheduled for that year for every category, except the State Construction Program (SP). As a result of executive and legislative branch decisions, dating back to the year 2000, the SP account has not been fiscally balanced for the past six editions of the highway plan.”

The letter, over the signature of Michael W. Hancock, Secretary, Department of Transportation, goes on to note, “Our efforts to also factor inflation into the costs of projects throughout the 2012 Highway Plan have now yielded an SP account that contains over \$1.95 billion more in projects than funding exists to finance. In truth, the inclusion of SP accounts projects essentially provides a “15 to 20-Year Plan” rather than a “Six-Year-Plan” for state-funded highway projects.”

The last project for Rockcastle, included in the plan, also has an SP designation and concerns a landslide repair on Ky 1329 from Luner Road at the Laurel County Line, northeast to Jct. U.S. 25.

The plan shows \$120,000 for the purchase of right-of-way and utility relocation and \$870,000 in 2013 for construction.

Our water is purchased from Mt. Vernon Water Works, that is located at Renfro Valley, Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water from Lake Linville. The source water assessment has been performed to identify land uses which may impact the water supply. This assessment indicates that the susceptibility of the Mt. Vernon water supply to contamination is generally moderate. Contaminants present in source water may include microbial contamination, pesticides, and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. The primary source of contamination are agriculture, onsite septic systems, and roadways. Activities and land uses upstream of this water can pose potential risks to your drinking water. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mt. Vernon Water Works. The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. The table enclosed is results of our Monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2010, it can be obtained at Brodhead City Hall, 7 West Main Street, Brodhead, Kentucky.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. Mt. Vernon Water that we purchase water from had one Notice of Violation (NOV). The NOV occurred when Mt. Vernon failed to submit the Alkalinity sample date to the Division of Water (DOW) in June 2011. Alkalinity is needed to calculate the treatment technique for total organic carbon (TOC) removal. TOC does not put the public in any danger. If they was a danger, Mt. Vernon Water would have notified the public when the violation occurred and Brodhead Water Works had to also notify their customer also. This was an oversight, Mt. Vernon has made adjustments sending reports into DOW, so this matter will not happen again.

Secondary contaminants do not have a direct impact on the health of consumers and are not required in the Consumer Confidence Report. They are being included to provide additional information about the quality of the water.

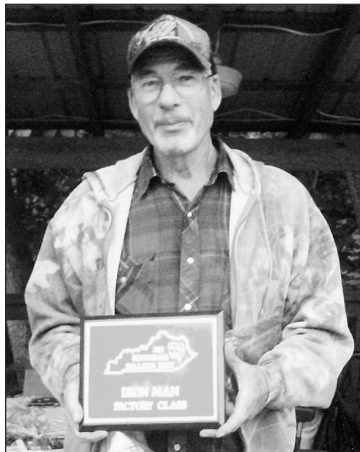
Local shooter wins top honors in gun club contest

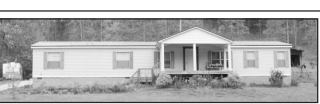

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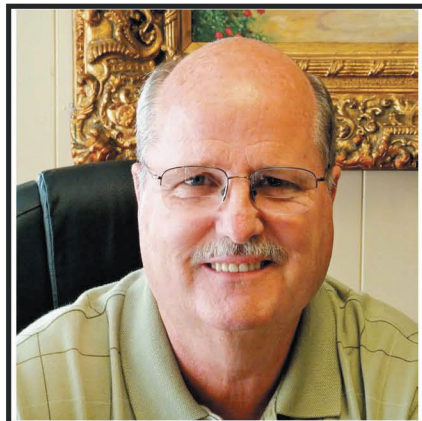
