KU asks for 6.5 percent increase

Kentucky Utility and Service Commission for Louisville Gas and Electric have asked the state Public permission to raise rates to pay for a series of genera-

tion and transmission upgrades made in recent years.

The proposal is the latest in a series of increases over the past couple of years. For KU customers, the proposal would amount to an increase of \$82.4 million or 6.5 percent. For a residential customer, using 1,000 kilowatt hours on average, a monthly bill would

increase by \$6.98.

"We definitely understand any increase in our customers' bills has an impact on their wallet and budgets," KU spokeswoman Chris Whelan said. "We don't make these choices lightly."

Black bear spotted on I-75

Witnesses driving on I-75 near exit 59 reported sightings of a black bear last Saturday morning.

Drivers on I-75 reported seeing the black bear cub cross all lanes of the interstate in front of them without getting hit. There was also a sighting near El Cazador Restaurant south of Mt. Vernon.

Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife say sightings like this may be more common due to the recent drought and heat wave forcing them to leave their natural habitats to find food.

a traffic stop on I-75 southbound at the 67 mile marker.

Arrested at the scene was Bill Lee Melton, 25.

According to Kentucky State Police Reports, officers observed Melton walking in the southbound emergency lane around 1:15 a.m. Upon further questioning, Melton told officers he needed a ride because his car had broken down.

Before allowing Melton to ride in the cruiser, officers searched him for weapons and found four cellophane wrappers containing one morphine pill, one oxycodone pill, one zip-lock bag of marijuana and one zip-lock bag of white powder, which was later identified as cocaine.

Melton was charged with three counts of possession

\$9 million budget passed by court for 2012-13

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court, at a special meeting Friday, gave final approval to their 2012-13 budget showing total expected receipts of \$9,015,833 and carryover funds of \$271,125 for a total budget of over \$9.2 million.

The budget is larger than in previous years, due mainly to a \$3 million appropriation to the CSEPP fund for a new emergency service center which will be built and totally equipped with federal funds.

There were only minor changes in the budget from the first reading to Friday's approval and those changes involved an addition of \$2,500 to the district health department for costs associated with the spraying of mosquitoes; approving only one-half (through December) the sheriff department's request for a supplement of over \$200,000; adding \$28,000 as a contribution toward the renovation of a tanker for the Brodhead Fire Department and approving an average of the utility bills for the rural fire departments instead of 90% of the bills which was paid the last fiscal year.

In other business, the court transferred \$2,500 to the payroll from from federal funds and \$30,000 from general funds to the jail to supplement the July payroll.

Man arrested for meth making and endangering emergency personnel

A Mt. Vernon man was arrested last Thursday night for manufacturing methamphetamine and endangering emergency personnel, after officers from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department raided a home on Lime Plant Hollow Road in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Jeffery Lynn Owens, 44, of Mt. Vernon.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant received information that Owens was manufacturing meth in a camper at the residence.

Once officers arrived, they found two one-step meth labs and a 30 gallon propane tank containing anhydrous ammonia, one of the main ingredients used in making meth.

Officers called in UNITE detective Joel Cunagin to deactivate the two one-step meth labs and propane tank. While Cunagin was deactivating the propane tank, it started re-

The Kentucky Wildcats men's basketball program made history yet again at the NBA Draft last Thursday night.

The Wildcats became the first school in college basketball history to have the first two selections in the draft as Anthony Davis was the number one pick and Michael Kidd-Gilchrist was the number two pick. The Wildcats also made history by having six players drafted and having the most picks from one school since the NBA draft went to a two-round format in 1989.

I must admit, I am not interested in keeping up with professional basketball and I hardly ever watch a NBA game unless it's during the finals at the end of the season.

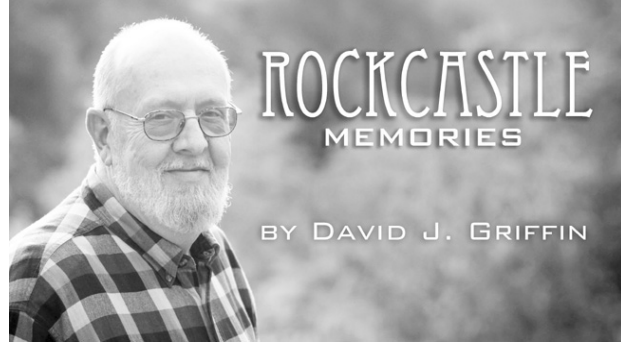
This is what we ultimately want as UK fans, we always want to win every game and win national championships.

ROCKCASTLE MEMORIES

Homemade Sauerkraut

My wife and I had been grocery shopping when I 'took a craving' for some sauerkraut, and I selected a bottle of Claussen from the refrigerated counter. I have always been somewhat of a connoisseur of kraut because of my mother and my grandparents. In my opinion, the Claussen brand is by far the best commercial kraut on the market, but it could not compete with that made by my family. They made homemade sauerkraut every summer in our back yard, and the finished product was like no kraut you ever tasted - it was simply superb!

After returning home and unloading the groceries, I began to consider a column about the manner in which we actually made kraut in the '50's on our small Rockcastle County farm. My grandfather always loved cabbage, and he knew just how to grow the best heads for the process of making kraut. When Mommie Katie announced that we were making kraut the next day, Pop ventured

out to the garden to select just the right cabbages for the two-week procedure.

The initial step in the kraut-making process is to find a proper crock that has no cracks and is stable enough to withstand the fermenting process. Pop had a crock that he used every year, and as soon as Mommie Katie notified him that it was time, he retrieved his crock from the cellar.

My mother, Bee, was the one to carefully slice the cabbage into the bottom of the crock. She did this after removing the outer leaves of the cabbage head. When there was just enough, Pop began the mashing process. He had a wooden "masher" that he used to crush the cabbage and release the juices in the crock. He then covered the cabbage with the proper amount of salt. When that batch of cabbage had been mashed, Bee would cut another layer of cabbage and Pop mashed it too, adding another layer of salt. This went on until the crock was filled to the proper level, at

The Roots of Rockcastle

The Wondrous William Whitley House Part II

Last week the Roots series looked at the William Whitley house, the first brick house in Kentucky. At one time, Lincoln County contained what would eventually become Rockcastle County, so in a round about way, the Whitley house has its roots connected to Rockcastle.

I recently toured the house and found it most interesting, not only structurally but historically. From this home, the early "society" of Kentucky was entertained. George Rogers Clark and Daniel Boone knew the comforts of this mansion in the wilderness. Many early settlers traveling the Wilderness Road probably took advantage of its comforts, too. (There is a branch of the road that branches off and goes northwest toward Louisville, and the other branch goes toward Harrodsburg.)

The name of the William Whitley estate is "Sportsman's Hill". This undoubtedly is from the horse racing track that was on site. Horse racing was held on a regular basis at the estate. This brought in the aristocratic society of the young Commonwealth. From what I understand, Whitley began the tradition of racing the horses in a counterclockwise direction due to the Revolutionary War that was fresh in the mind of the patriots of the new country, because horses were raced in clockwise direction in Britain. The tradition stands yet today not only in horse racing, but in auto racing as well.

Older homes traditionally have some paranormal activity associated with them, so I had to ask about the Whitley House. One of the tour guides related two stories.

From time to time there are Revolutionary or Civil War reenactors on site and they sometimes even camp on the site. One of the reenactors decided to call out while sitting on the interior steps, "If there are any spirits here, make your presence known!" A few seconds later, footsteps were heard on the second floor loudly crossing the floor. The reenactor and others went to the second floor, not finding anyone. Then the

steps were heard on the third floor. They traveled to the third floor, still not finding anyone.

I had heard earlier there had been a child to die in one of the rooms upstairs shortly after its birth.

There was a railroad track passing about a hun-

When I was growing up, back there in the fifties and sixties, we didn't have fireworks on the 4th of July.

At least not on Blair Branch and, as far as I know, anywhere else in Letcher County.

Fireworks were reserved for Christmas and New Years Eve. And even though it was illegal as bootlegging whiskey and making moonshine, many enterprising folks would make trips to Tennessee and load up the trunks of their cars with firecrackers, cherry bombs and Roman candles.

They would come home and sell these things for more than quadruple what they'd paid for them.

There were at least four vendors on Blair Branch who more or less stayed in business from Thanksgiving until the first of the year. If you had a dime, you could buy a pack of firecrackers. Cherry bombs cost a nickel each and Roman candles fetched a quarter. A pack of six bottle rockets also fetched a dime.

For comparison's sake, you could buy a big Milky

Way or Zero candy bar for a nickel in those days. A twelve ounce bottle of RC Cola cost six cents and you could sell the bottle back for a penny.

Cherry bombs were extremely dangerous. I know two fellows who lost their right hands because they held a cherry bomb half a second too long before throwing it so that it would explode in mid air.

Of course having a a thumb nail blown off by a firecracker was no laughing matter but that was sort of a rite of passage for boys on the holler.

The instructions on a pack of firecrackers said "lay on ground, light fuse and retire quickly."

Of course you were supposed to do that with the long main fuse and set the whole pack off at one time.

But that's not how we did it.

We unraveled the pack of sixteen firecrackers and set them off one at a time. We stuck them in knot holes and the ends of beer cans. We

Waldo Wilson, 84, of Homosassa, Florida, died Friday, June 8, 2012, at the Hospice House of Citrus County in Lecanto.

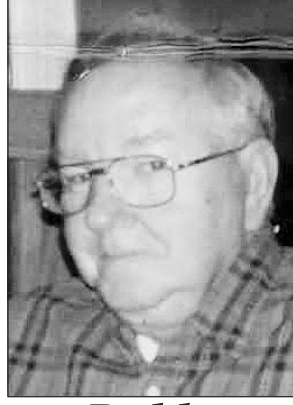
Mr. Wilson was a former Chief of Police for Mt. Vernon and was related by marriage to Jean Shoemaker of Mt. vernon.

They are not meant to be seen as manuals for how a boyfriend or girlfriend should treat you.

Just as it is important not to take the silliest of love songs seriously, it is also important not to model your life after the scary love songs. Many popular songs try to make it seem like it is normal or even romantic for a boyfriend or girlfriend to want to know where you are at every moment. They try to make threats of suicide seem romantic by saying things like "I would die without you" or "I would die for you." Being controlling is not a sign of love. If someone tells you that they would die or kill themselves if you ever broke up with them, do not think they are being romantic. They are being manipulative and need mental health help. Remember: love is not control. Love is respect.

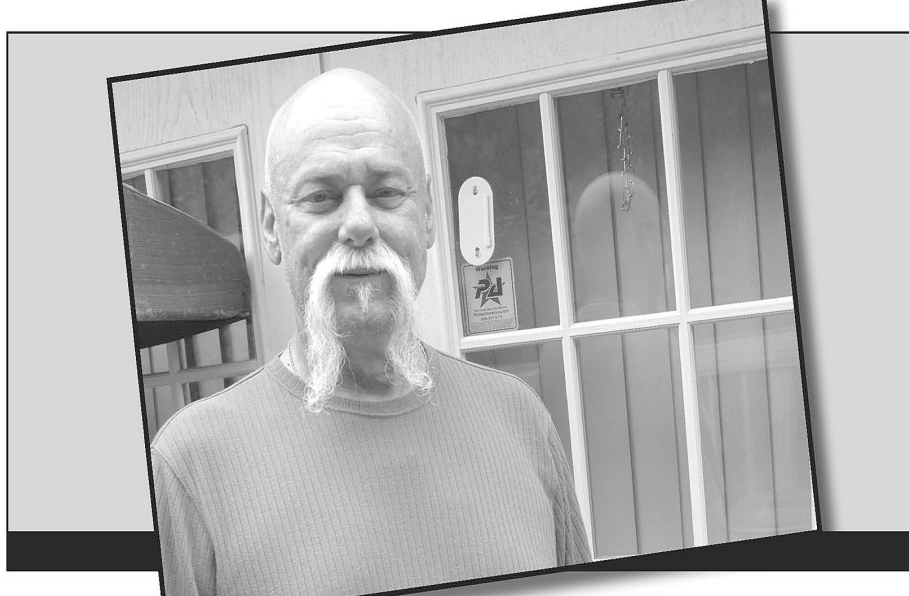

For example, children run around man-hole covers in the outfields to catch fly balls! We have been lucky that no serious injuries have been incurred.

Today, we have around 250 kids playing t-ball and competitive baseball/softball with unsafe playing surfaces, poor parking, outdated facilities and no land left to expand.

This letter was not written to place blame, but let's face it; parents and players come and go. Meanwhile, new families get introduced to the issues that they feel helpless to change. It is imperative that this effort be coordinated through our county government. This ensures that a VISION is clear and accountable focus is maintained for next generations as time passes.

That being said, we know that this cannot be accom-

plished in one day, but numerous families are willing to fundraise, donate time, write grants, or whatever it takes to build up a parks and recreation system for Rockcastle County. Some may think little league play is over for this year, but our softball league is in progress. Baseball and softball have become quite the year-round sport.

Yet come rain or come shine, August is approaching, time again for the league fields to be covered with cars, trucks, and horse trailers as parking for the Little World's Fair. It is very discouraging to know we will get the fields through "one more season" in order to dig out muddy tire ruts and repair pitching mounds next spring...it has become a shameful WASTE of time, effort, and money.

Congress needs to repeal Obamacare

The Supreme Court's disappointing decision on Obamacare makes one thing clear: Congress must act to repeal this misguided law. Obamacare will not only limit choices and increase health care costs for Kentucky families, it has also made it harder for businesses to hire.

The Supreme Court decision does nothing to diminish the fact that Obamacare's mandates, tax hikes, and Medicare cuts should be repealed to clear the way for common-sense, step-by-step reforms that protect Americans' access to the care they need, from the doctor they choose, at a lower cost.

The American people never wanted to be where we ended up today. Two and a half years ago, President Obama and liberals in Washington teamed up to force through legislation that we the people never asked for—even amidst an economic recession, a spiraling federal debt, and growing increases in government health spending.

We were promised lower health care costs. Instead, they're going up. We were promised lower premiums. They're going up. Most Americans were promised their taxes wouldn't change. They're going up, too.

Seniors were promised Medicare would be protected. It was raided to pay for a new entitlement instead. Americans were promised Obamacare would create jobs. But the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office has estimated it will lead to hundreds of thousands of fewer jobs. And Americans were promised they could keep their health care plan if they liked it. Yet millions have since learned they can't under Obamacare.

And the president himself promised that the core of Obamacare—the requirement that every American purchase health insurance, or send a check to Uncle Sam—was somehow not a tax. Now the Supreme Court has spoken: The core element of Obamacare is a massive tax.

The damage Obamacare is doing to Kentucky isn't just speculation—it's reality.

Small businesses are seeing their health premiums go up more than they can afford to pay, threatening to put them out of business. Kentucky hospitals have been forced to lay off employees because Obamacare raided Medicare to pay for a massive new government program. And too many Kentucky businesses are hesitant to hire new employees until they know how much more Obamacare will force them to pay—the last thing we need at a time when unemployment in Kentucky is still above the national average.

pushed them into the ends of corn cobs and tossed them high in the air. We placed them between thumb and forefinger and flipped them up, hence many a lost thumb nail.

Many a time through the holidays, I've blown a whole week's profit from my GRIT newspaper route on firecrackers.

While most vendors were into firecrackers solely for the profit, my cousin, the late Melvin Adams simply used the proceeds from whatever he sold to underwrite his personal Christmas and New Year's Eves fireworks displays.

Melvin's house sat back against the side of the hill. He had a high front porch that overlooked a big, sloping front lawn. When he made his trip to Tennessee, Melvin bought several pieces of everything they had in the fireworks store. Not just firecracker and bottle rockets and such. Melvin procured shells and bombs and rockets that would rival a modern fireworks display.

Of course he also had long rolls of firecrackers that had maybe a thousand individual crackers each. He'd have like a dozen Roman candles all going off at once on the ground while shells and rockets soared up and exploded high in the air and his goal was to have as much stuff going off at one time as he could manage.

To call it awesome would be a vast understatement. But if Melvin ever had fireworks on the 4th of July, I missed the show.

which time Pop then secured the lid with a large rock to make sure no insects could disturb the fermenting process.

I, of course, wanted to sample the kraut before it was time, but Pop was determined that none of us was to lift the lid until he had declared that the mixture was cured. He placed the crock in our cellar. That process took a full two weeks until we could sample the new batch of kraut.

When the two-week fermentation process had been completed, Pop carried the

crock back into the yard. He carefully lifted the lid, exposing the nastiest layer of crud that you can imagine. The first time I saw this mold, I thought the sauerkraut had been ruined. Pop just laughed at my response and began to remove the top layer. Underneath was his special blend of kraut, which our family would consume over the next several months.

At this point, Pop had completed his hand in the process; it was now up to Mommie Katie and Bee to proceed. They placed the fermented kraut into quart Mason jars. Bee always inserted a cabbage stalk into the middle of the jar. This stalk would become a delicious pickle when the jar was opened (which my brother and I would fight over). They then screwed the lids on the jars and placed the quart containers into a large pan filled with water, boiling the jars for about fifteen minutes. Each jar would seal during this boiling stage.

When the jars had cooled and Mommie Katie had in-

spected each container in order to determine if the lids had properly sealed, she then carefully placed the jars on the shelves in our cellar. They probably canned a total of twelve to fifteen jars each summer. It was common for kraut to be on the table at our house on a regular basis — no matter what else was being served.

I have never tasted any kraut like my family made. It was always crisp, tart, and very salty. In my opinion, Pop's process was the standard by which all home-made kraut should be judged. I have tried super-market kraut for most of my adult life, only to be disappointed until I tried the Claussen brand. Claussen is the closest commercial kraut to my family's special blend that I have ever found. However, nothing can compare to my family's backyard recipe. Oh, how I wish I had just one single quart of that delicious sauerkraut!

Food Drive

Acreage Certification

Time is nearing for producers to certify their 2012 acreage. Filing an accurate crop acreage report for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage and prevented planting acreage, can prevent the loss of benefits for a variety of programs.

Failed acreage must be reported within 15 days of the disaster event and before disposition of the crop. Prevented planting must be reported no later than 15 days after the final planting date.

Crop acreage reports are required for many FSA pro-

grams and NAP. Reports are due in the county office by July 15th for crops.

2012 County Committee Election

The election of agricultural producers to the Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees is important to all farmers and ranchers, whether beginning or long-established, large or small operation. It is crucial that every eligible producer participate in these elections because FSA county committees are a link between the agricultural community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

County Committee (COC) members are a critical component of FSA operations. The intent is to have the COC reflect the makeup of the producers and to represent all constituents. This means wherever possible, minorities, women or lower income producers need to be on the committee to speak for these underrepresented groups.

County Committee members provide local input for FSA programs, and operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws. County committee members apply their judgment and knowledge to make local decisions.

On June 15, 2012 - Nomination period begins for the 2012 COC Election.

To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign nomination form FSA-669A. The form includes a statement that the nominee agrees to serve if elected. This form is available at USDA http://www.fsa.usda.gov/Internet/FSA_File/fsa0669a_committeelectform.pdf

Nomination forms for the 2012 election must be post-marked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1, 2012.

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in an FSA program may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as a candidate. Additionally, organizations representing minority and women farmers or ranchers may nominate candidates. Nomination forms are filed for the county committee of the office that administers a producer's farm records.

Mamaw's Kitchen

PAOLI CANNOLI PIE

I saw a recipe similar to this in a magazine, but I tweaked it some to reflect my tastes. We were living in Paoli, PA at the time—hence the name.

1 box Jello No-Bake® cheesecake with crust

1 cup cold milk

1 container (15 ounce) ricotta cheese

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

1 tub (8 ounce) whipped topping, thawed

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels

Prepare crust from cheesecake mix according to package directions. (Sometimes I used a pre-made chocolate cookie crust and keep this package of crust for another day). Disregard the package directions for the cheesecake. Instead, in a medium bowl, beat ricotta cheese and milk with wire whisk until well blended. Add DRYcheesecake mix and lemon peel. Beat with wire whisk for 2 minutes (mixture will be thick). Gently stir in half of the whipped topping and chocolate morsels. Spoon into crust. Refrigerate 4 hours or until set. Garnish with remaining whipped topping.

NOTES: Use chopped pis-

tachio nuts, candied or dried fruit or other nuts instead of the chocolate morsels. My favorite is the chopped candied cherries and pineapple like they put in fruitcakes.

BOSTON CREAM PIE

CAKE

2 cups plus 1 tablespoon cold milk, divided

1 box (3.4 ounce) instant French vanilla pudding mix

1 cup hot fudge ice cream topping

1 prepared angel food cake

In a large bowl, using a wire whisk, mix 2 cups milk and the dry pudding mix for 2 minutes. Set aside. Using a serrated knife, split the cake into three horizontal layers. Place the bottom layer on a serving plate. Spread half of the pudding over that layer and repeat with second layer. Do not spread any of the pudding over the top of the cake, but if you have extra pudding, put it in the hole of the cake. Heat the hot fudge with the 1 tablespoon milk in the microwave for 30 seconds or so until a spreadable consistency is reached. Drizzle over cake and let some drizzle down sides. Serve with some extra hot fudge topping if desired. If there are any leftovers, refrigerate.

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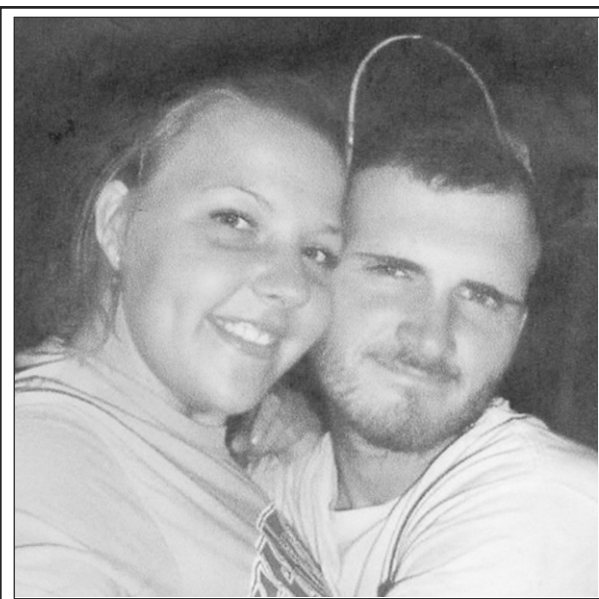

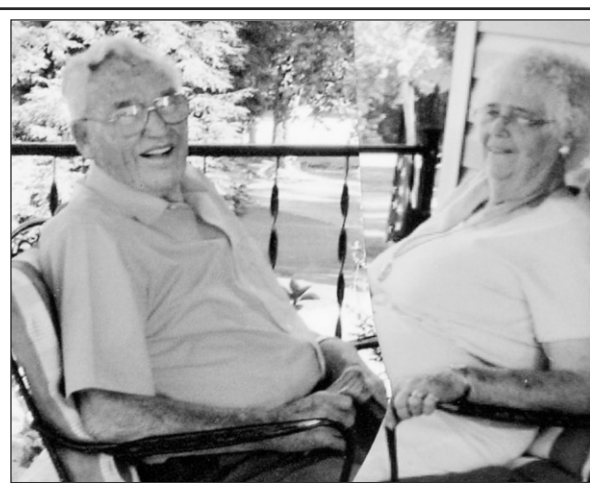

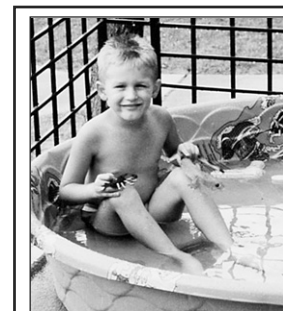

Our study this month is from the words of Jesus in John 5:28-29, "Do not marvel at this, for the hour is coming in which all who are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth, those who have done good to the resurrection of life, and those who have practiced evil to the resurrection of condemnation."

The Resurrection of Life - This is for righteous, they are the ones who will enjoy this blessing, for they were doing "good" which means they were doing the will of God. You may be morally good, you may be a nice person, a friendly kind of guy, but if you are not a faithful Christian you are in fact against the Lord. There is no neutrality with Jesus and his gospel message. God has offered you a way of escape through Jesus Christ the savior of men. Please do not die in your sins.

Finally, the resurrection of life and the resurrection of condemnation, happens at the same hour as Jesus said in our text. There is just one resurrection, as Paul also said, "that there shall be a resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust." Acts 24:15. There is no resurrection of the just and then 1000 years later the resurrection of the wicked. Plainly we see, that there is one resurrection, at the same hour, of both the just and unjust.

Amending Ordinance No 2004-5

The Comprehensive Personnel Manual of the City of Mt. Vernon

The ordinance covers employees, officers, independent contractors and consultants. It contains Anti Nepotism provisions, hours for full and part time employees, compensatory time and prohibits receiving gratuities. It also establishes a drug free work place, sets forth holidays, vacation time, sick leave and other leave. It sets forth a wage schedule, expenses reimbursement as well as Grievance Procedures and Personnel Classification.

Help protect yourself against identity theft

Identity theft can affect anyone — including students. In fact, students under age 18 are often targeted because they often have no reason to check their credit scores to see if someone has been using their Social Security number (SSN). There are several measures you can take to help protect yourself and your identity, according to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). Never provide personal information such as your SSN, bank account or credit card numbers in response to a phone call, fax, letter or email. Shred any documents that contain personal or financial information. Don't respond to emails that claim to be from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). The IRS doesn't contact taxpayers by email. Friends, family members, roommates and contract workers in homes make up a large percentage of identity thieves because they have easier access to

your confidential information. Make sure you don't leave personal information where they can see it. Pick up your mail as soon as possible after delivery or use a locked mailbox. Put outgoing mail in a blue Postal Service mailbox, hand it to a mail carrier or take it to the post office. Never provide bank, credit card or other sensitive data when visiting a website that doesn't explain how your personal information will be protected, including the use of encryption to safely transmit and store data. A site with "https" instead of just "http" at the beginning of the address is a secure site. If you're using an ATM card or debit card, ensure no one standing nearby can see your personal identification number (PIN). On your personal computer, install a free or low-cost firewall to stop intruders from gaining remote access to your PC. Download and frequently update secu-

rity patches offered by your operating system and software vendors to correct weaknesses that a hacker could exploit. KHEAA is the state agency that administers Kentucky's grant and scholarship programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES). eyes?" All I could say was, "Because that's my flag. I'll tell you about it when we get home." On the way home, I was thinking of how I was going to tell Bobby about my flag and why tears come to my eyes each time I see Old Glory being honored. I thought back to the Minutemen at Lexington, Concord and Bunker Hill. I thought about how proudly they must have waved their flag. I thought what a wonder sight she must have been that misty, drizzly morning when Francis Scott Key looked out across the water from the deck of a British ship and saw, through the clearing smoke, that his flag was still flying over Fort McHenry. How he was so inspired by her sight that he wrote a poem which has become our national anthem. I thought about how Lincoln's flag must have shed a few tears at Gettysburg and throughout those horrible four years of our Civil War. Then I thought about how proud Teddy

Roosevelt's flag must have been at San Juan in 1898. And I thought about how Sergeant York carried his flag through the battlefields of Europe of World War I and, at the end of that war, she held her head high again. Then I thought of those servicemen at Pearl Harbor in 1941 and how their flag's honor was tested. How at Iwo Jima, Normandy and many other places for almost four years of World War II, she was raised and flew proudly. I thought about how the flag withstood the battles of a conflict in Korea. Then I thought of how my flag was stomped, burned and disgraced by some of my own so called countrymen, in the riots and protests of the 1960s. A protest against a controversial conflict in Southeast Asia. And I thought of those brave men at all those fire bases in South Vietnam, protecting the honor and the dignity of their flag. But I knew Bobby, being only six-years-old, wouldn't understand all of this if I told him. He wouldn't even understand that the letters F L A G mean - F for Freedom, L for Liberty, A for America and G for the Greatness that America has become. I knew that he wouldn't understand: that the seven red stripes mean the blood of our forefathers shed to keep my flag flying; that the white means the purity on which this nation was founded and that the blue shield with the fifty shiny white stars represents the unity and strength of this great nation. Upon arriving home, I took a flag and explained to Bobby how he must always respect his flag. The next day I took Bobby to a Savannah Braves baseball game. I had tears of joy in my eyes as Bobby stood straight as an arrow, with his hand over his heart, while

"KU" (Cont. from front) ments she cited was \$338 million spent on generation upgrades, including costs related to the opening of a 586-megawatt unit at the company's Trimble County plant. Also included is an upgrade to KU's hydroelectric station at Dix Dam. The company also has added 175 jobs, including many at a new customer call center in Morganfield to help reduce the number of complaints that spurred a PSC audit of the utility's customer service. The proposal is the latest in a series of changes and future changes for KU customers: •In May, the PSC approved KU's request to spend about \$800 million to build natural gas-fired power generators to replace older coal-fired units that are being phased out because of stricter federal environmental regulations. KU expects eventually to ask for a 4 percent increase in rates to pay for the new units. •In December, the PSC approved an increase in KU's monthly environmental surcharges to pay for upgrades to its existing plants to comply with more stringent environmental laws. The monthly environmental surcharge increased 0.89 percent beginning this year and will jump 9.65 percent higher by 2016, according to KU. For a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours a month, the monthly increase will be 69 cents in 2012, rising to \$7.47 by 2016. •In July 2010, the PSC approved a base-rate increase that increased monthly bills by \$7.31 for a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours. Among other things, the increase allowed the utility to recover the cost of repairs caused by a windstorm in September 2008 and an ice storm in January 2009. Often in rate cases, utilities meet with other interested parties in the case, including industrial customers, environmental groups and the state attorney general's office, which represents consumers. Those meetings often result in a lower proposed increase, to which the utility agrees. The

groups then present that lower rate proposal to the PSC, which then rules on it. For instance, the original proposed 2010 rate increase was \$135.2 million, but KU settled for \$98 million. The PSC has 10 months from the time KU's rate application is deemed complete to make a ruling on the request. PSC spokesman Andrew Melnykovich said. Because of that timing, the utility will be in compliance with a condition set on it when it was bought by Pennsylvania-based PPL in 2010. At that time, the company agreed to a moratorium on base-rate increases until Jan. 1, 2013. 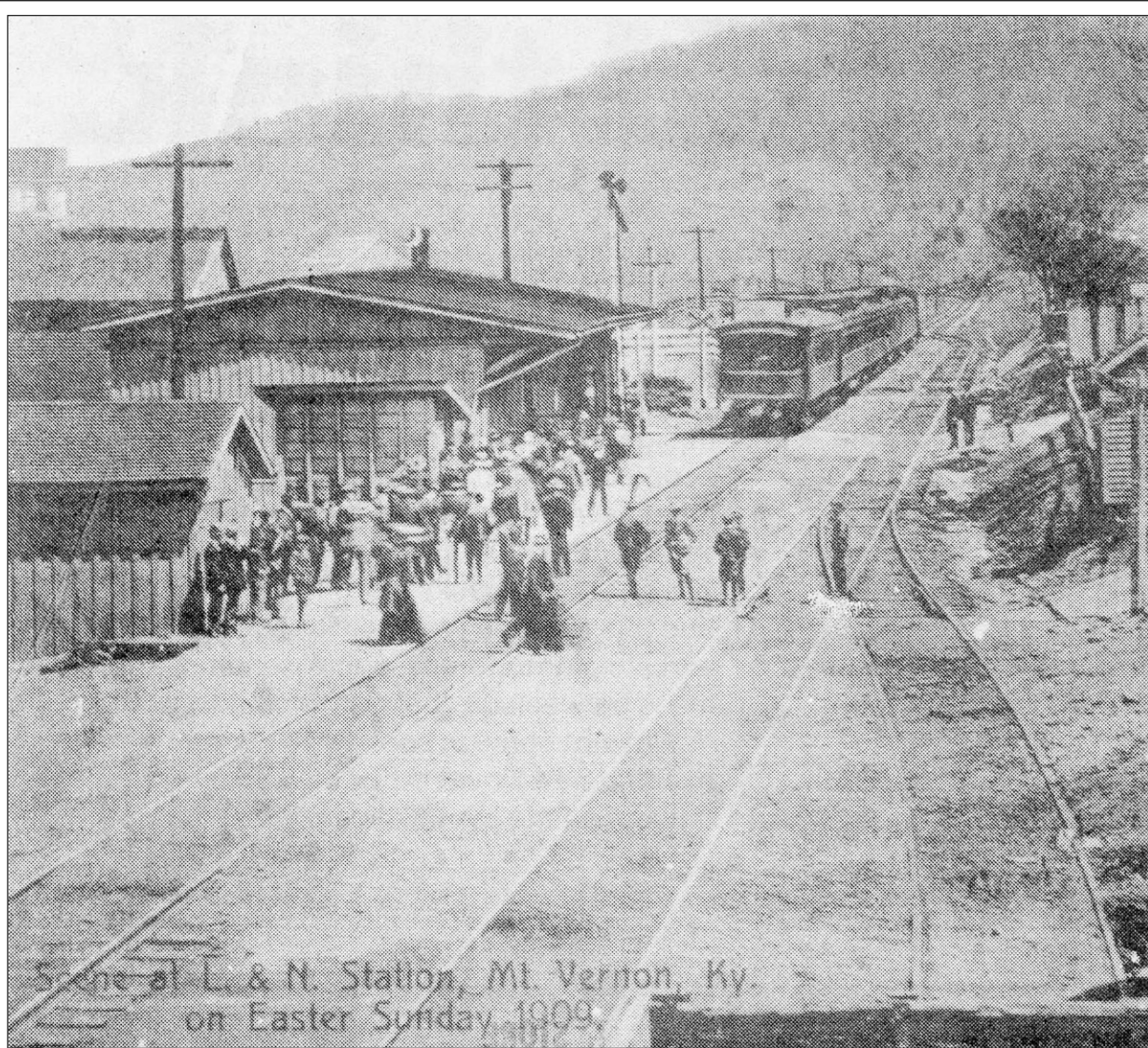

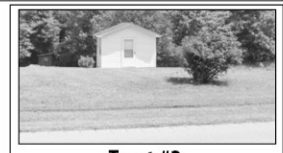

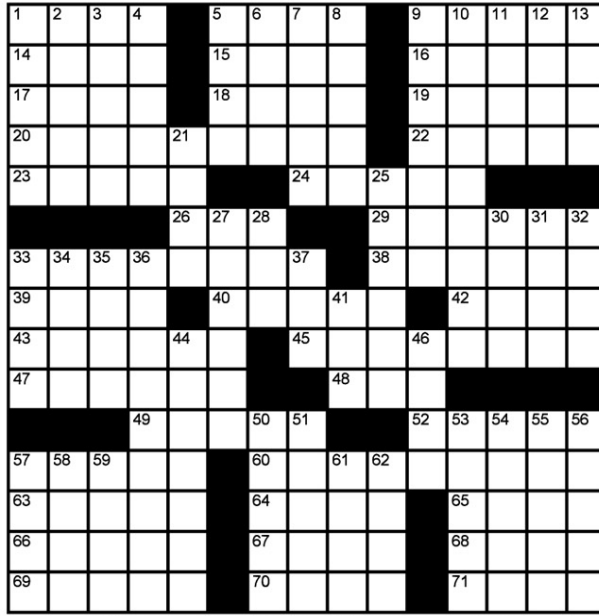

Yards to Paradise

Landscape Watering: Urgent When Temps are High and Humidity is Low
 Rainy summers such as we had in 2011, where cities such as Lexington had record annual rainfall, kept folks from buying watering hoses or giving much thought to the subject. Conversely, as this is being written, things are drying out fast and crops, flowers and lawns are withering. People, too!

be in urgent need of supplemental watering. While it's wonderful to have timely rain all season long, irrigation and hand watering with a hose are necessary chores for saving greenery. When it's not rained even half an inch in a month, and the record heat beats down, it's water them or they die.

So action time! (Or start budgeting for new sod and new shrubbery in the fall or spring.) A gardener on top of his or her game would have begun giving extra water to plantings in advance when dryer weather was beginning to be forecast. For everyone else, it's a matter of trying to salvage what you can.

Lawns can be saved with irrigation. Otherwise, you'll need to re-seed or re-sod this fall.

(Or you could plant a forest, bring in AstroTurf, or gravel it I suppose.)

Gardens can be watered by hand, by soaker hose, or by a system of irrigation sprinkler "trees" attached to a husky sized garden hose.

So, when to water? Automated sprinkler systems should be operated at night. Flowers and vegetables can be watered either evening or morning. Roses and any other plants you may have that are susceptible to leaf diseases should be watered in the daytime, or by soaker hose only if watered late

evenings or at night. Larger trees and shrubs need longer and deeper soakings. Once-a-week thorough soakings are much preferred to daily sprinkles.

If you are being restricted by your utility or your municipality, a long soaking when you are permitted to water should be done.

I would also suggest it may be wise to pay some extra "tax" (otherwise known as a penalty or fine—but the U.S. Supreme Court just labeled it a "tax" with their Obamacare ruling) to keep your greenery alive. We can now use the word "tax" to speak of watering and getting an extra assessment for doing so (if we get caught). Think about it—what did your landscape cost? What will any extra "taxes" cost you? Some readers will see the logic implied in this paragraph.

To sum up, dry spells can wreak havoc on annuals and new perennials and shrubs—any plants except established old trees and drought tolerant species.

We will put off until another time a discussion on rain harvesting, conservation measures, etc. For right now, plants are suffering.

Consider watering today to keep your yard happy. (And you may need a "yard sitter" along with a "pet sitter" if you're going on vacation.)
