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## Mt. Vernon man dies in accident on Deborde Road

A Mt. Vernon man was killed in a single car accident on Deborde Road in Mt. Vernon around 10:30 last Saturday night.

According to state police reports, Denford D. Cameron, 42, of Mt. Vernon was travelling west on Deborde Road when he lost control of the vehicle and ran off the road before colliding with a tree.

Cameron was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash and was partially ejected from the vehicle. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell.

The accident is still under investigation by the Kentucky State Police and trooper Donnie Foley is in charge of the investigation. Alcohol is suspected to be a factor in the accident.

However, Cameron's younger brother, Dereck Cameron, 25, of Mt. Vernon, told the *Signal* Tuesday that the toxicology report on Denford said he was not drunk when he wrecked.

Dereck said Denford's BAC was below the legal limit and that "he couldn't have had no more than one or two beers."

Dereck said his brother's tragic accident is still a shock to all his family and friends as they all continue to grieve his loss.

"My brother was a good hearted person and an all-around

## Local businessman doesn't like site choice for Climax Fire Dept.

A local businessman is not happy with the site chosen by the Climax Fire Dept. for their new building.

David King, owner of King Bottling at Climax says construction of a new fire department on Loman Hill would pose a danger to the water supply for his

product Climax Water.

The site, chosen by the board of the newly-formed department, is at an elevation of 1464 feet and King has had the flow from the site dye-traced, by geologists from the Kentucky Forestry Service and Morehead University, and the dye has shown up in his bottling plant downhill.

King met with County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis last Thursday and presented him with the results of the dye trace analysis. He also presented the judge with "The Bible," a raw water analysis of the spring which showed how free of pollutants the water is at present. "Climax Springs is one of the top ten springs in North America," King said. "99% of all fresh water in the world is polluted, mainly by humans," he added.

King, who presently has

10 employees, also told Carloftis that he was in negotiations with two much bigger companies to supply bulk water to them which would increase his work force significantly. "We have the potential to put more people to work than any plant in the county," he pointed out.

As to Carloftis' question of what he would do if the fire department did not go on that site and the owner sold it for individual dwellings, King responded that at least it would be an individual posing a threat to his business, "it wouldn't be the fiscal court."

## DEA seizes over \$13,000 in cash during traffic stop

DEA agents seized over \$13,000 in cash Sunday night during a traffic stop on I-75 at the 55 mile marker in Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, officers made a traffic stop of a 2012 Toyota Sienna after observing the vehicle swerve back and forth across two lanes of the interstate.

During the traffic stop, officers developed a reasonable suspicion of unlawful activity and called in a K-9 unit to investigate. The K-9 unit then alerted officers to the back of the van.

Inside the back of the van, officers found a total of \$13,400 hidden inside two separate compartments. When the officers asked who the cash belonged to, no one responded except one person who claimed only \$4,000 of the cash.

Officers then notified the DEA due to the suspicious responses given by the driver and the passengers. The DEA then sent an agent to the scene to seize the cash.

The traffic stop is still under investigation by the Kentucky State Police and no charges have been filed at this time.

## Local college student wins quarter-scale tractor championship

A local college student was a member of the University of Kentucky quarter-scale tractor team that won the international championship this summer.

Jordon Cook, 21, of Mt. Vernon travelled with his other eight team members to Peoria, Illinois to compete in the annual International Quarter-Scale Tractor Competition.

The UK team brought home their first championship since UK started com-

peting in the competition in 1998.

The team is comprised of students from UK's College of Agriculture. Each fall, the team begins building a quarter-scale tractor from scratch and is only given an engine and tires to start production with.

The team spends the rest of the academic year designing and building the tractor they plan on demonstrating at the international competition in the summer.

Judges at the competition evaluate the teams on a written design report, a design inspection and a formal presentation. The final evaluation for the team is operating their tractor in a series of tractor pulls. The team that scores the highest in all four categories wins the championship.

Cook said he was ecstatic after he found out they had won the championship, especially after placing sec-

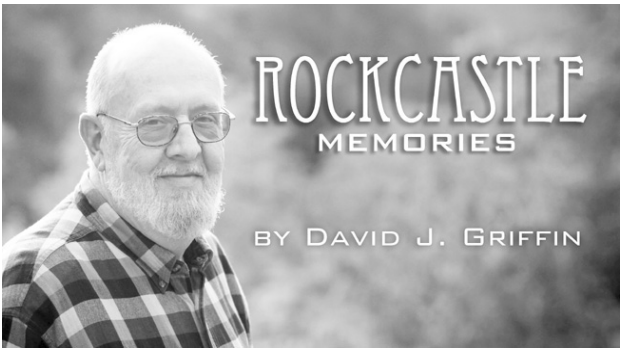

# ROCKCASTLE MEMORIES

### Prices sure have changed (1962 - 2012)

I pulled into a Shell service station in Stanton to fill up my SUV when I noticed that the price of a gallon of unleaded gasoline was \$3.71. My thoughts were on the upcoming reunion at Mt. Vernon High School, and I immediately recalled that when I was a senior, gas was 29 cents per gallon. It is not difficult to remember that you could buy \$3.00 worth of gasoline and drive over the entirety of Rockcastle County without having to refill the tank.

The comparison of gasoline prices gave me the notion to compare other prices of common items when I was a senior. Of course, one of our favorite pastimes in those days was to spend a lot of time in movie theaters and at the Valley Drive-in. The cost of a single ticket at the drive-in theater was 50 cents. The last time that my wife and I actually went to a theater to see a new movie, our tickets were \$8.50 each. That again made me recall the price of other items related to going to the movies. A box of popcorn in 1962 was 20 cents and a Coke was 10 cents. Today, that same box of popcorn is around \$4.75 and a Coke is at least a dollar.

As a young person, one of the things often observed is that old people can complain a lot - especially about prices being "so high." Now I understand why. And I have joined their ranks.

What about the first car that you bought? Mine was a Chevrolet Impala Super Sport. I distinctly remember that when my grandfather and I ordered my new car from Briton Chevrolet, the invoice was for \$3,500. Today, according to GMC, if that vehicle was still available, it would sell for almost \$40,000.

I can almost hear some of you saying, well the dollar was worth a great deal more in 1962 than it is today. And of course that is true. But the comparisons seem truly remarkable. Even something as simple as a doctor's visit in 1962 was only \$5.00, compared to the last routine office visit that I made to my physician, which amounted to \$65.00 - and that was just my portion.

When I signed my first

teaching contract in the mid-sixties, my yearly salary was \$5,800. With that amount, I was able to purchase a two bedroom brick house with a double car garage in a very nice neighborhood for \$16,500. According to the information that I found on the internet, a similar home today would sell for well over \$200,000.

And what about those small everyday purchases? In 1962 a postage stamp was 4 cents. Today first class postage is 44 cents. A good pair of tennis shoes to wear to high school (Converse All Stars) could be purchased at McBee's Department Store for \$5.00. "Tennis shoes" started into the \$100 region while my sons were still young. And even for an adult, it is difficult today to purchase a sound pair of shoes; you are doing well if you can find a decent pair for less than \$55.00.

Even a package of chewing gum in those days cost only a nickel. Try to buy the same item today, and it will cost at least \$1.25.

When I entered the University of Kentucky in the fall of 1962, the tuition for a year was approximately \$1,000. Prices for today's students continue to skyrocket, no matter which school one chooses. But if you can afford to go to Harvard University today, it will run you \$34,976 to attend for one year's tuition, and that does not include room and board. I doubt that I would be a college graduate today if school had cost me that kind of money in 1962. My family would not have been able to send me to college.

I recently had to replace the television set in my bedroom. TV sets are one of those items that can vary greatly in price due to where modern technology has reached at that point in time. Usually you can spend just about any amount of money - large or small - depending on what kind of set you are seek. After we had shopped at several different electronic dealers, I finally purchased a 32-inch, flat-screen model for \$900.00. I remember going with my mother to Bryant's Hardware when she bought our first black and white 17-inch

## Points East

By the time most of you readers get to the column this week, August will be over and we will all be able to commence enjoying the very best thing about August in the first place.

Because the very best thing about August is that it is followed by September, which is rivaled only by May, as my favorite month of the year.

While Labor Day weekend finds most folks out celebrating the last warm weather holiday of the year, I usually spend at least part of mine sowing lettuce, radishes, mustard, collards, turnips, spinach and planting a short row of snow peas or sugar snaps. The peas are a hit or miss proposition but it only takes a few minutes to give them a shot to see if they can survive late heat waves and still beat the first killing frost. I will also set out three or four cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower and Brussels sprouts plants if I can find them.

Turnips, sown now, tend to be small, tender and without any pith when they start getting mature enough to harvest in mid October and they will continue to recover and grow after every cold spell until the first of the year. There's simply nothing

like turnips and greens, fresh from the garden to go with all that turkey and ham stuff that we tend to associate with Thanksgiving and Christmas. Spinach, sown now, will usually survive the winter and, along with turnip greens, be the first thing I get out of the garden come next spring.

The short row of bodacious sweet corn, just now in tassels, and the Bufford Caudill and Black Satin fall beans, fully trestled and just now in blossom should be ready to harvest by the middle of September along with green onions and cucumbers, all of which I planted in mid-July. We should still have plenty green peppers and tomatoes. Before the end of September we should be able to have the best meal that we will get out of the garden all year and hopefully have enough veggies to provide the makings of meals for our daughters and Little Tommy Miller.

By mid-month the katydids and crickets will be in full harmony with the volume turned all the way up. Owls and whippoorwills will occasionally join the chorus. Nights will be just

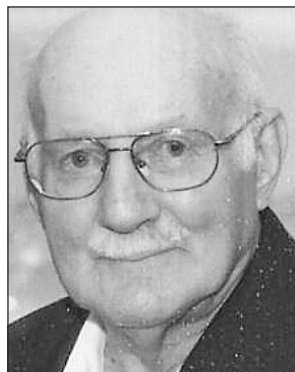

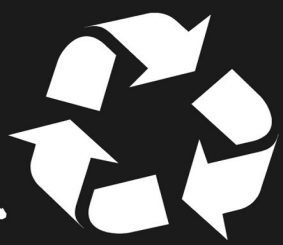

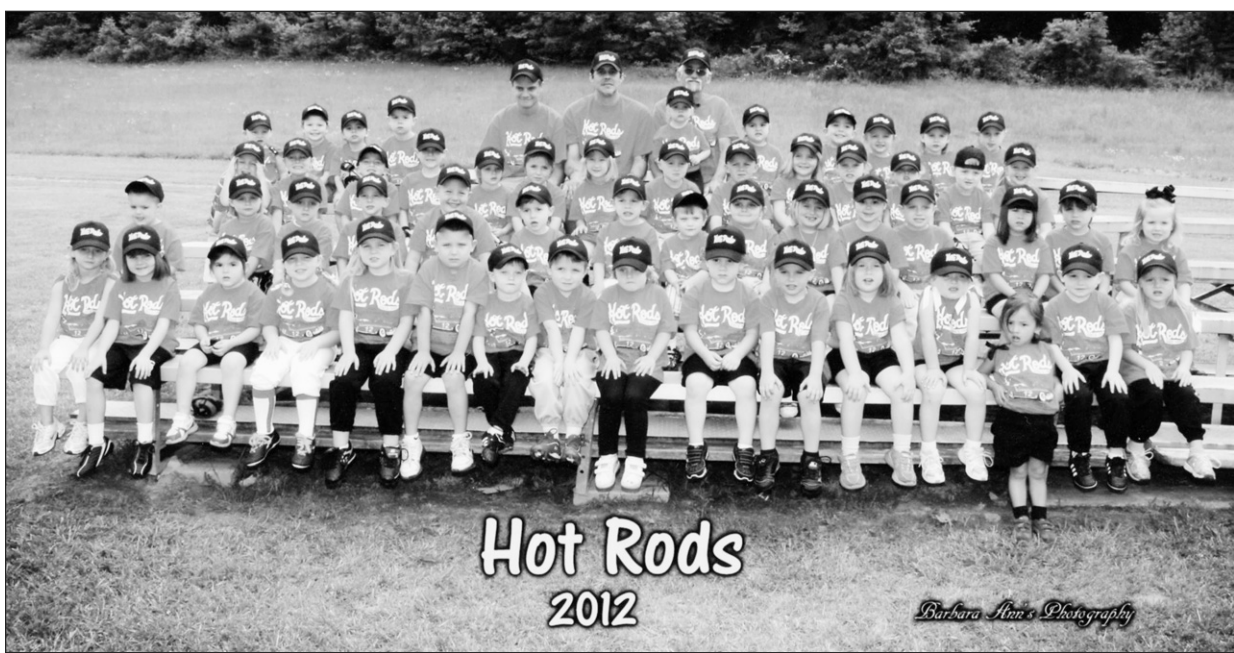

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# Rockets fall to Frankfort in the Jamboree Bowl

The Rockcastle County Rockets lost to the Frankfort Panthers at home last Friday night 42-27 in the annual Jamboree Bowl.

Last Friday's game was only the second time in the Jamboree Bowl's 22 year history that the Rockets lost.

The Rockets were first to get on the board, scoring on their first possession of the game with a 60 yard run and then a 5 yard TD run by running back Damien McDaniel. Quarterback Corey McPhetridge passed to Eli Haddix for the two point conversion giving the Rockets an early 8-0 lead.

But Frankfort struck back on their first play on offense with a 66 yard pass from quarterback Chris Hawkins to All-State wide-receiver Aaron Jackson. Frankfort failed to convert on a two point conversion keeping the Rockets ahead 8-6 early in the first quarter.

Frankfort would be next to score on another 66 yard pass from Hawkins to wide receiver Jalen Washington. However, Frankfort would again fail to convert on their second two point conversion attempt making the score 12-8 late in the first quarter.

On the Rockets next possession, they drove the ball all the way to Frankfort's 5 yard line before Frankfort defensive back Teantre McGee recovered a Rocket fumble and raced 98 yards for a Frankfort touchdown. Hawkins connected with wide receiver Dre Scott on a two point conversion giving Frankfort a 20-8 lead.

At the end of the first quarter, Frankfort would score again on a 67 yard pass from Hawkins to Washington. Frankfort also converted on their two point conversion making the score 28-8 after one quarter of play.

However, the Rockets fired back at the beginning of the second quarter with a 20 yard scoring pass from McPhetridge to wide receiver Tyler Harper. Kicker Zach Lunsford's kick was good to cut the lead to 28-15.

But Frankfort came back to score again on their next possession with another 22 yard pass from Hawkins to Jackson that extended Frankfort's lead to 34-15.

In an attempt to stay in the game, the Rockets scored on their next possession in the final seconds of the first half with a two yard run by running back Jacob Bussell cutting the lead to 34-21 at halftime after a failed extra point attempt.

The third quarter proved to be a defensive battle between the two teams with neither offense putting any points on the board.

The next scoring drive would come from Frankfort early in the fourth quarter when Hawkins punched it in for a 1 yard TD run. Frankfort also scored on another two point conversion putting them ahead 42-21.

The Rockets scored again, late in the fourth quarter, on a 1 yard run by fullback Tommy Shaffer making the final score 42-27.

The Rocket offense was led by Shaffer with 172 yards and one TD, McDaniel rushed for 104 yards and one TD and Bussell rang up 42 yards and one TD.

McPhetridge was 9 for 13 passing for 48 yards. He threw one touchdown pass and two interceptions.

Receiver Tyler Harper caught one pass for 20 yards, McDaniel one for 16 yards, Boone Saylor caught one pass for 6 yards and Shaffer and Eli Haddix both caught passes for 3 yards.

Defensively the Rockets were led by McDaniel who had four tackles and one interception. Bussell led the group in tackles with eight as well as one and a half sacks.

Other Rockets picking up tackles and assists were Jared Lake with five tackles as well as an assisted sack, Saylor and Shaffer with four, Chris Wren and Chance Ansardi with three, McPhetridge, Brandon Jones and Tyler Smith were all credited with one tackle.

Head Coach Scott Parkey said that they knew coming into the game that Frankfort was a quality team with lots of speed and playmaking ability.

"We knew they relied heavily on the big play to score," Parkey said. "We tried to take that away but were unsuccessful."

Parkey said Frankfort was able to come up with their big plays to gain momentum in the game where the Rockets missed their opportunities.

"The big turning point of the game was their 98 yard fumble recovery for a touchdown," Parkey said "Their twelve point swing within a couple of minutes really hurt our momentum."

Parkey said that it's not the end of the world for the team, even though they hate to lose. He said although the loss hurts, they still learned a lot and gained valuable experience for the games ahead of them.

"We were able to establish Shaffer as a valuable running back and we also found out more about our offensive line as well," Parkey said. "We are now able to determine

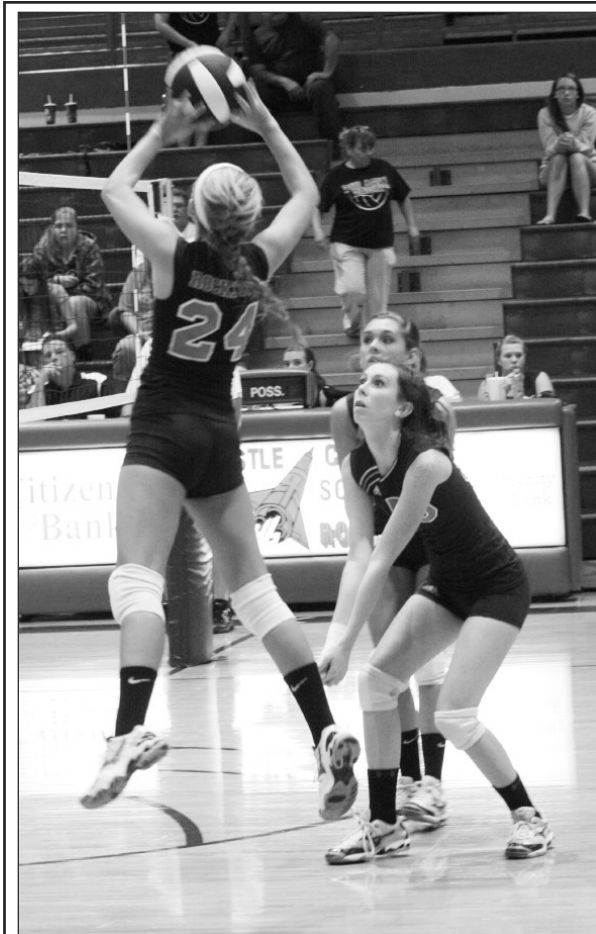

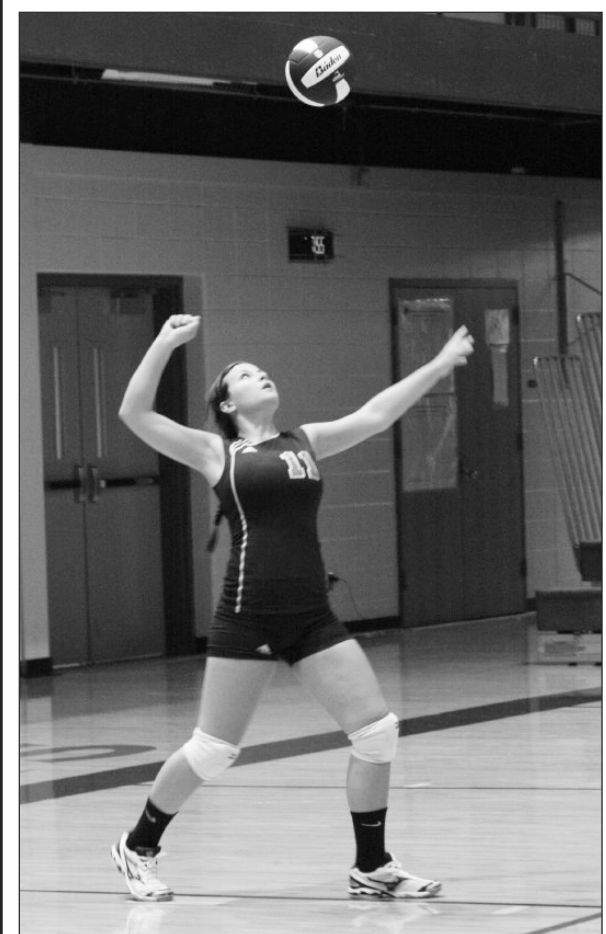

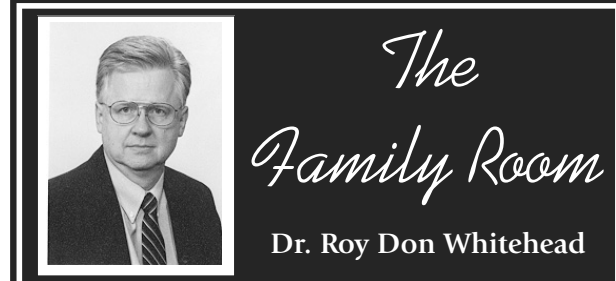

Dina did not know where to turn for help. Her husband of nine months who had been so kind to her had become abusive. For the past two weeks, he would slap her for no reason at all. One night he would not let her leave the house because he believed she was going to see another man. He would leave with his friends but order her to stay at home. She was afraid of what he might do.

One night when he was gone, she called 911. He had bloodied her lip that day and threatened to do even more. The 911 operator asked if she needed the police to come. The operator said they could take her to a safe place and she could file for a protective order. Dina did not know there were shelters for women who were abused and had never heard of protective orders. At that moment she decided she needed to get out and get help.

What Dina learned that night may have saved her life. She discovered that a victim of domestic violence may file for an Emergency Protective Order. She can file at the sheriff's office, the circuit court clerk's office or at the county attorney's office. This involves filling out a form describing the abuse and listing the reasons that she is afraid. Usually, there must be physical abuse or the threat of physical harm in order to be granted a protective order.

After the victim of abuse completes the form, it is sent to a judge who signs it, as long as there is legitimate cause for fear. The EPO then goes to the sheriff or police who serve it on the abuser. It is not in effect until it is served. This can be a difficult process if the abuser hides or leaves the county. Once it is served, the abuser and victim are bound to abide by it.

The EPO will require the abuser to remain a certain distance (often 500 feet) from the victim at all times. The EPO may also grant temporary custody of any children and make other provisions necessary for the victim's safety. The EPO is good for 14 days. Before it expires a court date is set for a judge to hear the case. Both victim and abuser are required to be in court that day. A worker from the local abuse shelter will be there in court to support her. She may also retain an attorney to go with her to court (though this is not required).

In court the judge will listen to both sides and to any witnesses. The judge will review any evidence such as phone recordings that the victim brings to court. The judge will then decide whether to grant a Domestic Violence Order. The DVO is in effect for up to three years and may require the abuser to stay 500 feet away from the victim and to have no contact by phone, letter or third party. The judge may also award temporary custody of any children along with temporary child support.

If the abuser violates the DVO, the victim may take him back into court by filing a "show cause motion" with the circuit court clerk. In this paper she describes how he has violated the protective order (phone calls, driving by the house, following her, etc.). Another court date is set and both go back to court. The judge decides whether or not the DVO has been violated and what the penalty should be (jail or fine).

A domestic violence shelter will provide a worker to help with any part of this process. If you have questions, call Family Life Abuse Center at 800-755-5348. The life you save may be your own.

ond at the competition the previous two years.

"My mom and FFA advisors at RCHS taught me to never give up and even if you don't win that you are still a winner in their eyes," Cook said. "They always encouraged me to go after my dreams and not let anyone stop me. Whether it be going to college, working on cars or farming."

Cook said he plans on staying with the team for his last year in college and also plans on bringing home a second consecutive championship in the 2013 competition.

"Runner-up my first two years of college and champions my last two years would be great," Cook said. "I couldn't ask for anything better than that!"

building site.

King also told the judge that he had been the object of some personal attacks by board members of the fire department, one of whom posted on face book, that he should "get the h... out of the county." He said he was willing to cooperate with the department, having already offered a site for the building which was later found to be in a flood plain, but that if another site could be found he would purchase it for the department. He also pointed out that if the water became polluted, people who get raw water

from the springs would be affected.

Carloftis noted that the fire department had offered to install an enclosed septic tank which would be safer than a regular tank with bleeder lines. The county judge/executive also told King that the court, which has not approved the site as yet, would have to decide if the risk outweighed the benefit to the community.

Climax Spring averages around 225,000 gallons per 24 hours. 210,000 gallons is currently available for bulk sales. The spring is the largest continuous flowing spring in the state of Kentucky, according to the KY Division of Water.

## Police Department obtains Radar Speedcheck Sign

The Mount Vernon Police Department now has access to an electronic radar speedcheck sign for use in areas where traffic calming is needed in the city.

The display consists of a handheld radar unit, a LCD digital display with a YOUR SPEED sign attached. The handheld radar unit also can be attached to an adjustable height tripod. The handheld unit is battery operated and transmits speeds to the LCD display in a wireless manner.

The radar unit is designed to alert motorists of their speed, and promote safer vehicle driving practices. Radar speedcheck signs are used to "calm" traffic in school zones, safety work zones and any area where speeding traffic is of particular concern.

A recent study prepared for the Utah Department of Transportation by Brigham Young University found that radar speedcheck signs reduced the average speed from 44.5 to 35.3 mph and reduced the number of vehicles exceeding school zone speed limits from 95.3 percent to 34.1 percent.

According to Police Chief Kevin Fletcher, the sign will be utilized particularly in school zones and areas where speeding traffic is of concern. The unit is on loan to the city for an unspecified time.

## Locals fare well in Run, Bike or Hike

The 3rd Annual Rockcastle Regional Hospital Run Bike and Hike attracted 170 participants from across Kentucky and other states. It was the event's largest turnout, and this year's field of duathletes was the strongest ever.

## Fall squirrel season is underway in Kentucky

Kentucky's fall squirrel season, a 193-day split season that kicks off the calendar of fall hunting, has opened.  
The season opened Sat., Aug. 18 and runs through Nov. 9. The season re-opens Nov. 12 and closes Feb. 28, 2013.  
The daily bag limit is six squirrels.  
"Hunters will find plenty of squirrels this season, but populations could be slightly down in some areas," said Ben Robinson, small game biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Last fall's mast crop was rated good overall, but hickory and white oak production was poor."  
There's a close relationship between a year's mast production and the following year's squirrel population levels.  
Since 1953, department biologists have been gauging mast production based on an annual survey of the nuts on hickory, white and red oak and beech trees. The nuts of these trees comprise the most important foods for Kentucky's forest wildlife — squirrels, white-tailed deer, wild turkeys and bear.  
Biologists walk the same route every year and estimate the year's mast crop based on what they observe.  
"This year's survey began August 15 and will continue for about two weeks," said Robinson. "After this information is compiled, we'll have a clearer picture of the impact of the summer drought."  
Weather extremes, such as late frosts and heavy rains in spring or summer droughts, can limit the amount and quality of mast.  
Drought conditions in western Kentucky are expected to affect squirrel behavior this fall in the region.  
"I expect squirrels to be on the move looking for food," said Robinson.  
Late winter is the time

when food availability becomes most critical to squirrels and can impact their body condition heading into the breeding season. Hickory nuts begin to mature in August. Acorns and beechnuts mature in September and October.  
Squirrel hunters can help management efforts by taking part in the Squirrel Hunting Cooperator Survey. The voluntary program, which started in 1995, supplies information that biologists use to monitor squirrel population trends in Kentucky.  
Hunters record information about their hunts as the season progresses. This information includes the county hunted, hours afield, number and species of squirrels seen and harvested, number of hunters in the party and the number of dogs used to find squirrels.  
When hunters are finished hunting for the season they simply mail in their survey. Logs are available online at [fw.ky.gov](http://fw.ky.gov) by clicking on the "Hunting, Trapping & Wildlife" tab, then the "Small Game" tab, followed by the "Squirrel" tab. Hunters may request a log by calling (800) 858-1549. Logs must be returned to the department no later than May 31, 2013.  
Each year, after the survey information is compiled and analyzed, a report is mailed out to squirrel hunters who shared the details of their hunting activities from the previous season.  
Last season, the survey detailed 1,144 squirrel hunts in 76 Kentucky counties. Hunters reported that they saw nearly five squirrels per hunt and bagged almost two squirrels per hour.  
Hunting success was highest in the month of September and 68 percent of the hunts occurred in the first three months of the season.

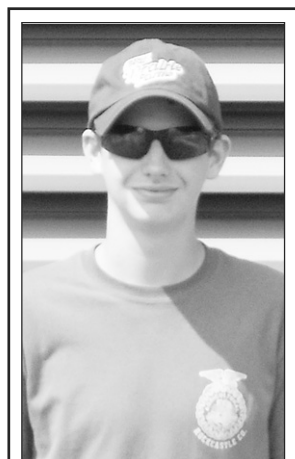

**Emergency Loans**  
 On August 15, 2012, Secretary Vilsack declared 68 Kentucky counties including Rockcastle County as disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by drought that occurred on April 1, 2012, and is continuing. The declaration code for this disaster designation is S3349.

EM loan applications for physical and production losses will be received through April 15, 2013, and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

**Schedule of Public Forums**  
 The Kentucky Ag Council has been in the process of developing the 5 year plan for Ag in Kentucky and forums are intended to get input from farmers and Ag interest groups.

This a critical part of the planning process, seeking input from the agricultural community and interested folks at large. Forums are being held at 7 diverse locations across the state and one for this area is scheduled for Tuesday, September 4, 2012 at the Laurel County Extension Office Room C, 200 county Extension Rd., London, KY. from 7:00pm to 8:30 pm EDT.

**CRP Signup**  
 The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) announced that continuous sign-up for the Highly Erodible Land (HEL) Initiative under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) started on July 23, 2012. Kentucky received a total allocation of 39,400 acres to enroll in the HEL CRP program. Offers will be accepted until either the state acreage allocation limit is reached or September 30, 2012 whichever occurs first.

This initiative will accept offers with an erosion rate of at least 20 tons per acre per year for new cropland or CRP acres that expire on September 30, 2012; however, existing grass stands that are not considered expiring CRP will not be considered eligible for enrollment. Eligible cropland

must also have a history of being cropped 4 out of 6 years, 2002 through 2007. Landowners enrolled in CRP receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long term, resource conserving covers on eligible farmland. Incentive payments are not authorized under this initiative.

New land contracts approved during this continuous sign-up initiative will become effective the first day of the month following the month of approval and are valid for 10 years.

Eligible CRP contracts set to expire on September 30, 2012, may be offered for consideration and approved contracts will become effective October 1, 2012. The contract duration is also 10 years.

# Kentucky's deer season to open September 1st

When Kentucky's 2012-2013 deer season opens with the beginning of archery hunting Sat., Sept. 1, there will be plenty of reasons for hunters to be optimistic.

Last deer season was arguably the state's best ever. A record 68 bucks taken in Kentucky qualified for entry into the Boone & Crockett record books, a record for the state.

Kentucky hunters also posted the fourth best overall harvest with 119,656 deer, the highest total since the 2008-09 season. In 96 of Kentucky's 120 counties,

hunters bagged more deer than in the 2010-2011 deer season.

"If you manage with an eye toward overall herd quality, the trophies will come," said Tina Brunjes, deer and elk program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Good habitat, aggressive doe harvest and the one-buck limit are thought to be the main reasons why Kentucky has developed a quality deer herd with ample hunting opportunities in all 120 counties.

The trophy deer taken in Kentucky last season included 52 bucks with typical antlers scoring 160 or higher and 16 bucks with non-typical antlers scoring 185 or higher. The deer came from 44 different Kentucky counties: from Fulton County in the west to Pike County in the east. A decade ago, Kentucky produced just 34 Boone &

Crockett record book deer. Weather, one factor that biologists can't control, often has a big impact on how many deer are available to hunters and how many are harvested.

It's too early to fully assess the impact of this summer's drought, which has affected about two-thirds of the state. "Early on we had good conditions for fawning. The spring was warm and wet, with lush undergrowth," said Brunjes. "But drought conditions may have compromised most production and the availability of green forage in some areas."

The Aug. 14 Drought Monitor issued by the National Weather Service categorized the Jackson Purchase Region of Kentucky and parts of 18 counties directly to the east of that region in exceptional or extreme drought. Central Kentucky counties range from moderate drought to abnor-

mally dry, but parts of more than 35 southern and eastern Kentucky counties have received normal rainfall levels.

Brunjes speculated that if the dry conditions persist in western Kentucky, it could impact the deer harvest there. "A poor mast crop compounded by corn and soybean fields shriveled up would put deer on the move looking for food. That could mean harvest totals will be higher than usual," she said.

In parts of central and eastern Kentucky that have received near-normal rainfall levels, Brunjes encourages landowners to continue pre-season mowing of their hunting areas. "Even though our fields are dry, there's still a lot of clover out there," said Brunjes. "August is a good time to cut back the dead grass, to stimulate re-growth."

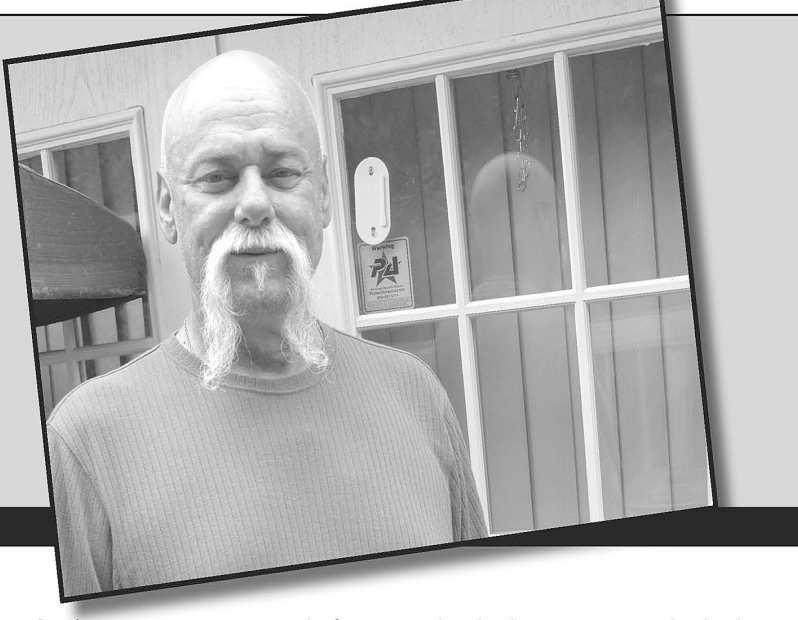

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# The Roots of Rockcastle

The Life and Times of Dr. Robert Gladstone Webb in Livingston

At the heart of any small, rural town in eras past is a handful of citizens who held the lifeline of that town; the school teacher, the minister, the general store owner, the sheriff, and the doctor. Without these individuals the day-to-day life would have been difficult.

The local doctor, with his rustic remedies and equipment by today's standards, was uniquely important. He delivered generations of children, tended the sick, and even lost a few patients along the way.

Livingston had a doctor, who after over fifty years of service to the area, had endeared himself to every family. Dr. Robert Gladstone Webb was born and raised in Clay County and studied medicine at the University of Louisville. In 1906, Dr. Webb rode a horse from Clay County to the town of Livingston to begin his practice. In the early days, he relied on his horse to serve the patients in the hills and "hollers" that surrounded the town. This would have probably included Red Hill, Mullins Station, Lamero, Sand Hill, Calloway, Pine Hill, and all the areas in between. As the years passed, he travelled by buggy, then by car.

Dr. Webb's work involved surgery, the delivery of babies, or anything else that required his attention. It is believed he delivered

over five hundred babies, maybe getting close to five thousand.

He was a true humanitarian. He often accepted a chicken, produce, or other items as payment of his service, and perhaps nothing at all if he knew the circumstances.

Dr. Webb had a wife, Lauda, but they had no children. His brother, G. H. was a doctor, as well. Their father was Samuel Webb, who farmed in Clay County and fought in the Union Army during the Civil War. Dr. Webb died in 1961, and is buried in Elmwood Cemetery.

Dr. Webb was a member of the Masons and a founding member of the Livingston Lions Club. While serving the town with his medical skills, he kept a journal concerning his patient's visits, and other tidbits of history that occurred during his practice in Livingston. His nephew, Bobby Webb, has loaned me a few boxes filled with his journals to be explored. I'm sure they will produce a particularly interesting insight into the life, times, and the "roots" of the county. These morsels of history will be shared in the upcoming columns of Roots.

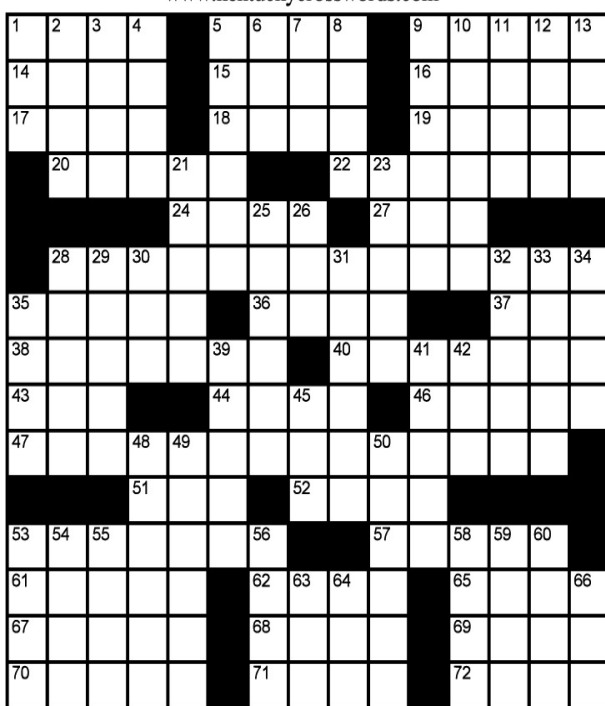

Clover, a cool season legume, is an important food source for deer until heavy frosts come in late October. There's plenty of time left for rains to benefit clover fields.

Pre-season mowing should also include cutting trails and wildlife openings in your hunting area. "You need to be able to easily and quietly get to your treestand or ground blind, and you need to be able to see. In some areas the weeds are really tall this year," she said.

Kentucky's deer herd is now estimated to number about 850,000, down from one million in 2003. "Our herd is now stable," said Brunjes. "A stable herd is a robust herd that can withstand drought and other big changes in weather and food availability."

Although yellow or brown grass covers much of Kentucky, hunters should have many deer available to them when they hit the woods this fall.

# Mamaw's Kitchen

## GRANDMA MICKEY'S BISCOTTI

This recipe came from a young woman that was in a creative writing class that I took in San Francisco. She was intrigued by the idea behind my book. I told her if I ever actually wrote the book, I would include this recipe in it. Here it is, Annie.

- 1/2 pound butter, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 4 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- Cream butter and 1 cup of sugar. Add 1 cup flour with baking powder. Add 2 eggs, mixing well. Add 1 more cup flour, mix well. Add the other 2 eggs, remaining flour, vanilla, and nuts; mix well. Shape into 4 loaves. Mix together the 1 tablespoon sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle on loaves. Bake at 375° for 45 minutes. Remove from oven and cut into slices about an inch thick. Place cut side down on a baking sheet and bake for 15 more minutes.

**HARVEY WALLBANGER CAKE**  
This is named after an alcoholic drink that was popular back when I was in high school. I made this cake for our friends in New Jersey, and the first response I

heard was "This reminds me of the 1970's." Everyone loved the cake and I was requested to make it for every get-together. It was usually the first thing to disappear from the table. If you don't want to use the alcoholic, just use orange juice in its place.

- 1 orange cake mix
  - 1 small package instant vanilla pudding
  - 4 eggs
  - 4 ounces orange juice
  - 4 ounces Galliano
  - 1/2 cup vegetable oil
  - 1 ounce vodka
  - Preheat oven to 350°. Combine cake mix and pudding. Blend in eggs. Add orange juice, Galliano, oil, and vodka. Mix until smooth and thick. Pour into greased 13 x 9 or Bundt pan. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.
- GLAZE:**
- 1 and 1/2 cups powdered sugar
  - 1 and 1/2 ounces vodka
  - 1 and 1/2 ounces orange juice
  - 1 and 1/2 ounces Galliano
  - Mix glaze ingredients until smooth. Spoon over warm cake.
