Scaffold Cane teen critically injured after hit and run

An RCHS high school student was the victim of a hit and run accident around 2 a.m. last Saturday on Scaffold Cane Road.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, Jared Johnson, 17, of Mt. Vernon was walking to a friend's home on Scaffold Cane Road when a vehicle allegedly struck him and then left the scene.

Police believe 15 to 20 minutes elapsed before another driver spotted Johnson on the road and called 911.

The accident is still under investigation by the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Deputy Joe Rush is in charge of the investigation.

WLEX 18 reported that "police said a pick-up truck hit Jared, kept going, then stopped, turned around in a driveway and kept going past him the other way." However, Rush said this information is false and that he never spoke with WLEX 18.

Rush said WLEX 18

misinterpreted claims made by Johnson's grandfather Bruce Waddles who said he saw a truck stop and turn around in a driveway about 1 a.m. while he was standing on his front porch. Rush said as of right now they have no suspects and they aren't sure if the truck Waddles saw was the vehicle that hit Johnson.

Johnson was transported by ambulance from the scene to the UK Medical Center where he is currently being treated for serious injuries.

Possible re-startup of SourceHOV discussed at Fiscal Court meeting

Rockcastle County Industrial Authority Executive Director Holly Hopkins told the fiscal court, at their regular meeting Tuesday,

that SourceHOV, former SourceCorp) had received a contract with the Veterans Administration and expected to start up production at the local plant soon with

full production in November.

Hopkins said that employment at SourceHOV would be between 225-275 with applications being taken at the school board's adult education center. The jobs are expected to pay \$10.50-\$11.50 per hour with a \$3 per hour addition because it is a federal contract. Hopkins also told the court that some minor changes to the building would have to be made such as carpet removal from some floors and windows blacked out or boarded up with changes to the alarm system.

The contract is for three years with two one year renewals.

Another company received part of the same bid and will need to hire 30 employees. That company has contacted Hopkins for assistance in finding a facility and she told the court that she planned to show them the original SourceCorp (Deaton) building to see if it suited their needs.

As to Anchor Packaging, Hopkins said that all 600 applications had been shipped to the company's home office in St. Louis and were being "gone through" prior to hiring beginning at the end of September. There will be 50 employees hired to start, she said, with full production scheduled for December.

Brodhead City Council raises water/sewer rates

Brodhead citizens will have to pay a larger water and sewer bill in the near future.

A first reading of an ordinance to raise water rates 37% and sewer rates 10% was held at the Brodhead Council meeting Monday night.

The ordinance provides those who live in the city limits will pay the base rate of \$19.61 a month for 2,000 gallons or less, \$5.92 per thousand for the next 8,000 gallons, \$5.66 per thousand for the next 40,000 gallons and \$5.32 per thousand for all over 50,000 gallons (all per thousand). For example, if you use 8,000 gallons a month, your bill will be \$55.13.

Outside the city, customers will pay the base rate of \$25.83 for 2,000 gallons or less, \$8.26 per thousand for the next 8,000 gallons, \$6.51 per thousand for the next 40,000 gallons and

\$5.78 per thousand for all over 50,000 gallons.

The base sewer rate for customers using 2,000 gallons or less will be \$22.83 up from \$20.75. For customers using over 2,000 gallons, the sewer rate will be \$4.11 per thousand.

Brodhead Clerk Becky Bussell said the new rates will show up on the customer's October bill. Bussell said the increase in the water rates was necessary because of the recent bulk rate increase the city received from their supplier, the City of Mt. Vernon.

The Council also approved the first reading of their 2012-2013 budget showing total expected receipts of \$653,464.38, total transfers of \$459,000 and

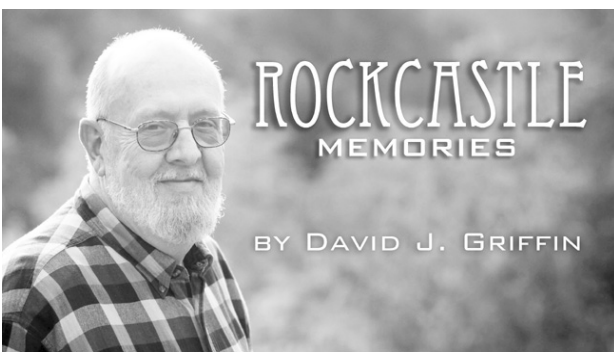

ROCKCASTLE MEMORIES

"The Motown Sound"

When Motown Records got its start in 1960, I had just started to drive and had purchased my first automobile. This new form of music caught on quickly and became the rage of radio stations all over the Eastern United States. My friends and I loved to drive around Rockcastle County as we listened to its soulful sounds.

Its beginnings originate with Barry Gordy, Jr., who founded the company on April 14, 1960. He got his start as a songwriter that same year with a dynamic singer known as Jackie Wilson. Wilson's first single, "Lonely Teardrop," became a huge success, reaching the number 7 spot on Billboard's Hot 100. Gordy used the money from the song to finance his new company, Motown Records. And Jackie Wilson continued to issue forth hit after hit.

Motown played a vital role in the racial integration of popular music when artists' songs began to crossover onto the rock and roll charts. The popularity of the "Motown Sound" sprang from the fact that it incorporated elements of soul music, blues, jazz, and rock. After signing Jackie Wilson and cashing in on his success, Gordy discovered one of his most famous and successful groups, The Miracles. Their first hit, "Shop Around," peaked at number two on the Billboard Hot 100 also in 1960.

This new wave of artists had a sound all their own, and its rhythms easily caught the attention of the teenage crowd. My friends and I loved to hear our favorites on AM Radio, and we became big fans of Motown. That remained the case into our early adulthood. Some of the artists who we treasured were: The Marvelettes, The Coasters, The Four Tops, Marvin Gaye, Stevie Wonder, The Supremes, The Temptations, and Gladys Knight and the

Pips. I suppose that my most favorite of these artists was either Gladys Knight, Marvin Gaye, or The Temptations.

In the late 60's, I attended a concert in Louisville to see The Temptations perform. When they launched into their popular release "My Girl," the response was nothing short of breathtaking. The house exploded, and everyone stood throughout the entire song. That song became the Temptations' first number-one single and remains their signature song even today.

That recorded version of "My Girl" was the first Temptations single featuring David Ruffin on lead vocals, who became a large factor in their early success. Smokey Robinson had originally intended for The Miracles to record the song but changed his mind when he heard Ruffin perform. The rest, as they say, is history. Ruffin's voice is easily identified, crisp and melodic, he sang:

I've got sunshine on a cloudy day.

When it's cold outside I've got the month of May.

I guess you'd say

What can make me feel this way?

My girl (my girl, my girl)

Talkin' bout my girl (my girl).

I've got so much honey, the bees envy me.

I've got a sweeter song than the birds in the trees.

I guess you'd say

What can make me feel this way?

My girl.

I don't need no money, fortune, or fame

I've got all the riches baby one man can claim.

I guess you'd say

What can make me feel this way?

My girl.

Gladys Knight and the Pips was also a special group to me from the very beginning. Their most notable hit was the wonderful "Midnight Train to Georgia."

Actually catching or even treeing a coon when I was growing up there in the head of Blair Branch back in the sixties was sort of like hitting a hole-in-one off a short par three with a flat and level green with the flag right in the middle. It still didn't happen all that often but it could be done if you stayed at it long enough and it was still some reason to brag about, however relatively easy it might seem to regular players.

I once hit a hole-in-one at the Berea Country Club's second hole only to be told later in the day that it had already been done that morning but I still qualified for a free beer. I'd been playing every weekend for a couple of years and usually saved my Mulligan for # 2 if I'd had anything less than a double boggie on the first hole so I got it on the second shot.

But this column is not about golf. It's about coons and the dogs that chase them. And you can take my word for it or not, but a few decades back, it was pretty hard to tree a raccoon even if you had a high dollar dog. And I've seen red-bone, black and tan, blue-tick- and treeing-walker coon hounds change hands for well over \$1,000 on numerous occasions.

There was a time, not long ago, when coons were scarce critters in the woods of southeastern and central Kentucky and tracking them down with dogs was high sport among those of us who still don't understand why football is supposed to be interesting and entertaining.

Just this morning, between Paint Lick and Richmond, there were four dead coons on 52. All of 'em killed trying to cross the road in the dead of night. So you have to wonder, if four got killed, how many more actually made it? Crossing 52, in the dead of night, is not like running a gauntlet. Oh sure, you have a car every minute or so, but an attentive blind person on crutches could safely cross the road without getting hit. And coons, are pretty fast, and from my experience, pretty attentive critters.

As recently as 20 years ago, a coon-hunter would have flagged down traffic, called a constable, and put up road blocks to recover the carcass, if he'd seen one dead on the road, so he could use it to train his dog. But that almost never happened.

Twenty years ago, you simply did not see dead coons on the road in central and eastern Kentucky. And forty years ago you didn't see coons, period, unless you had a good light and one heck of dog.

I grew up with such dogs. I never actually owned one

until the early eighties but I had a hound or two in my early years that didn't know a coon from a ground squirrel. But Lovell Blair, there in the head of the holler had twin black and tan named Ted and Joe and Lovell, ten years older than we boys, who acted like everybody's big brother would lead a pack of adolescent boys through the woods and across the ridges that separated Blair Branch from all the other hollers and all night long those two worthies hunted for a coon to chase.

And if and when the coon was scented and worn to a frazzle and the dogs were viciously trying to climb while barking up the tree, Lovell would turn on his flashlight and search the limbs until we'd see the coon out there on a limb with it's eyes glowing amber in the reflection and he'd tell us that it was time to call off the dogs and let that coon rest for another chase.

Sometimes we'd drop off

The Life and Times of Dr. Robert Gladstone Webb in Livingstone, Part III

In this series of the Roots of Rockcastle, we will take a look at the year 1952 through the eyes of local doctor, Robert Webb, as 1951 was revisited last week.

New Years Day found the doctor hard at work serving eleven patients, the first being Joe Clark. On the 8th, he traveled to Lexington and attended the chamber meeting in Mount Vernon. On Monday, January 14, he closed the theater. There evidently must have been a flu outbreak, as on the 19th, there were over twenty office calls with most receiving a shot and medicine. There was \$31.00 paid in cash, \$19.50 charged, and \$20.25 received on account.

Dr. Webb had been a smoker, but quit the habit at 12:00 noon, Monday, February 11th. On the 19th, he helped clean up the theater. February was a leap year.

By March, the flu was still raging with twenty or more patients seen almost every day. Dr. Webb even

succumbed to the flu, and was home the 14th and 15th.

On April 1, Fern Mullins began work. The total cash for the month was \$2752.54. He paid Fern Mullins \$10.00 a week and \$4.15 to the utility company. There was a new roof put on the office for \$68.25.

On May 28th and 29th Dr. Webb traveled to Boston. Other than the trip out of town, May looked routine.

Tuesday, June 24th through Friday, July 11th, Dr. Webb went to the hospital in Lexington. There are no entries July 13th through July 17th, as well as several dates in July.

In early August, on the 4th, Dr Webb traveled to Boston again, and had a slight accident on the way. He traveled to and from Boston several times in August.

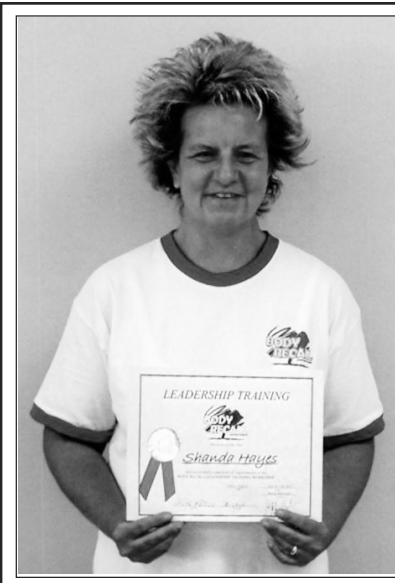
Dr. Webb was a member of the school board and attended a meeting September 4th. He also traveled to Boston again.

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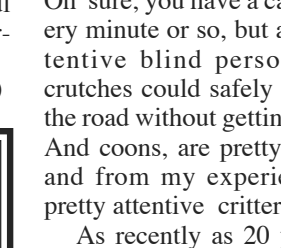

Luther Moore, 77, of Mt. Vernon, died Sunday, September 9, 2012, at the Rockcastle Regional Hospital.

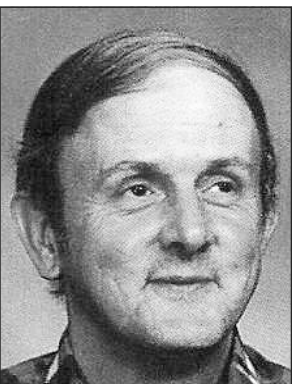

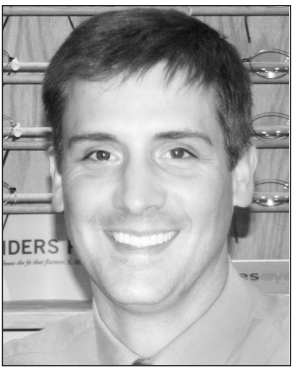

gia," which won a Grammy for the Best R&B performance in 1973. Their other outstanding hit "Neither One of Us (Wants to Be the First to Say Goodbye)" also won a Grammy for Best Vocal Performance.

All in all, Motown has more than 200 number-one hits worldwide. These songs continue to reappear over the years in commercials, on TV shows and in movies. They also remain an influence on today's biggest pop and R&B stars.

It is hard to imagine the musical scene without such songs as "My Girl," "The Tracks of My Tears," "You Are the Sunshine of My Life," and "What's Going On". These are masterpieces that represent some of the best in American music.

The Motown Sound, or soul music as it is sometimes called, played a major role in the development of American society during the sixties. That music brought about changes in the way that young people viewed each other. It linked teenagers, black and white, to each other in a way that nothing else could have. And it helped usher in the civil rights movement that came to the forefront during that turbulent time.

Smokey Robinson expressed it well, saying "We were not only making music, we were also making history. I recognized the bridges that we crossed, the racial problems and the barriers that we broke down with music."

Memories of this style of

music from the sixties range from the early love songs of The Platters to Edwin Starr's protest of the ongoing conflict in Vietnam, "War (What is it good for?)" The sum of Motown music remains a significant form of musical history that is

particularly American in style. And you can thank American teenagers of the sixties for that.

Mamaw's Kitchen

ARTICHOKE NIBBLES
1 small onion, chopped
1 garlic clove, minced
1 teaspoon canola or vegetable oil
2 jars (6.5 ounces each) marinated artichoke hearts, drained and chopped
4 eggs
2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley
1/8 teaspoon each of salt, pepper, dried oregano
Dash of hot pepper sauce, optional
2 cups (8 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
1/3 cup crushed saltines (about 10 crackers)
In a small skillet, sauté onion and garlic in oil until tender. Stir in artichokes. Remove from heat; set aside. In a large bowl, whisk the eggs, parsley, salt, pepper, oregano, and hot pepper sauce. Stir in the cheese, cracker crumbs, and artichoke mixture. Pour into a greased 11 x 7 baking dish. Bake uncovered at 325° for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool for 15 minutes before cutting into 1-inch squares. Serve warm.

ARTICHOKE AND ASPARAGUS SOUP
1 can (15 ounce) chicken broth
About a pound of asparagus
1 jar (about 6 ounces) artichoke hearts in water, drained
2 teaspoons of minced garlic
1/2 cup half/half
2 teaspoons lemon juice
Salt and pepper to taste
Steam asparagus for 20 minutes. Heat broth in large pan. Puree asparagus with the artichokes; add to heated

chicken broth. Simmer for 5 minutes. Add garlic, half and half, lemon juice; simmer for 5 more minutes or until heated thoroughly. Add salt/pepper to taste. Can freeze leftover soup.

BAKED ARTICHOKE PARMESAN
2 cans (14 ounce each) artichokes
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
3 tablespoons freshly grated parmesan cheese
2 tablespoons Italian seasoned bread crumbs
1 teaspoon extra virgin olive oil
Preheat oven to 375°. Spray a 9 inch pie plate with non-stick cooking spray. Drain artichokes, and pat dry with paper towels; quarter and place in prepared pie plate; sprinkle with lemon juice. In a small bowl, mix parmesan cheese, bread crumbs, and olive oil until crumbly. Sprinkle evenly over artichokes. Bake 15 minutes or until topping is golden brown.

Rockets are 2-2 after win over Estill Co. Engineers

The Rockcastle Rockets climbed back to the .500 mark after beating the Estill County Engineers 46-18 at home last Friday night.

The Rockets forced three turnovers on defense and junior quarterback Corey McPhetridge threw two touchdown passes and rushed for two more as the Rockets ran away from the Engineers.

In the first quarter, McPhetridge got the Rockets into the scoring column with a 79 yard touchdown strike to wide receiver Tyler Harper. The Rockets then got the two point conversion with a rush by senior fullback Tommy Shaffer giving the Rockets the early 8-0 lead.

back on offense with a 69 yard run by quarterback Kris Dennis. Estill County failed to make their two point conversion keeping the Rockets ahead 8-6 in the first quarter.

At the beginning of the second quarter, Estill County fumbled the ball away to junior Jacob Bussell resulting in a touchdown which gave the Rockets a 14-6 lead.

The Rockets would score on their next offensive possession after Shaffer punched it in for a one yard TD run. The extra point was good giving the Rockets a 20-6 lead at halftime.

The Rockets were first to score after halftime with an 11 yard run by McPhetridge. The extra point, by junior kicker

John Hughes, was good giving the Rockets a 27-6 lead.

Estill County would fire back at the end of the third quarter with a one yard run by Dennis. However, the extra point was no good only cutting the Rockets lead to 27-12.

The Rockets would score again with only 23 seconds left in the third quarter as Bussell broke free for a 41 yard touchdown run, extending the Rocket lead to 34-12.

In the fourth quarter, McPhetridge connected with receiver John Hughes on a 14 yard TD pass and the extra point was good to extend the Rockets lead to 40-12.

The Rockets would put the game away in the fourth quarter after McPhetridge punched it in for a one yard TD run. The extra point was no good making it 46-12.

Estill County scored again late in the fourth quarter on a 70 yard TD pass from Dennis to receiver Jonathan Collins making the final score 46-18 after a failed two-point conversion.

McPhetridge finished the game 6 of 9 passing for 231 passing yards and two passing TDs. McPhetridge also picked up 31 yards on the ground and had two rushing TDs as well.

Senior Damien McDaniel led the ground attack with 118 yards on 18 carries. Bussell rushed for 48 yards and one TD and Shaffer rushed for 4 yards and one TD. Sophomore Isaiah Adams also carried the ball five times for 19 yards.

Receiver Boone Saylor had a big night catching

two passes for 90 yards. Harper caught a total of two passes for 89 yards and one TD while Hughes caught two passes for 34 yards and one TD.

Defensively the Rockets were led by Bussell who had seven tackles, three and a half sacks and one fumble recovery for a touchdown.

Senior Chris Wren had four tackles, three sacks, and one fumble recovery while Saylor was credited with one interception and one tackle as well as an assisted sack.

Other Rockets picking up tackles and assists were McDaniel and Tyler Smith with six, Shaffer and Brandon Jones with five, Chance Ansardi with four, McPhetridge, Ben Lake and Eli Haddix with three and Hughes, Koty Bengé and Steven Rector were all credited with one tackle.

Head Coach Scott Parkey said he was impressed with the Rockets victory and thought the team did much better on the fundamentals of blocking.

"The line's pad level was low and their footwork was much improved," Parkey said. "Because of this, we were able to do some different things that helped keep the defense on their heels a little."

Parkey said he was also impressed with his team's running game, especially after they opened their playbook to the "wishbone formation" in the second half.

"McDaniel had another good game and Bussell came in showing us he has the ability to make guys miss in the open field,"

Parkey said. "We also went to our wishbone look during the game and Isaiah Adams ran the ball nicely in that formation."

Parkey was also impressed with McPhetridge, who had one of his best games as the Rocket quarterback.

"He made good decisions and delivered the ball on time to his receivers," Parkey said. "We were also able to utilize his running ability which adds another dimension to how teams will prepare for us."

Defensively, Parkey said the Rockets did a good job getting penetration into Estill County's backfield and disrupting their rhythm. Parkey also thought the Rockets did a better job with tackling

than they had in previous games.

"Although tackling has improved, we still prefer having 2, 3, or 4 guys in on each tackle," Parkey said. "That is one thing we are really going to stress in practice this week."

The Rockets will travel to Somerset on Friday night to take on the Pulaski County Maroons. Kick-off is at 7:30 p.m.

Parkey said the Maroons have a good team which relies on fast plays on both sides of the ball. In order for them to win, Parkey said his team must follow the game plan they've practiced all week.

"We have to control the line of scrimmage, gang tackle and win the special team battle," Parkey said.

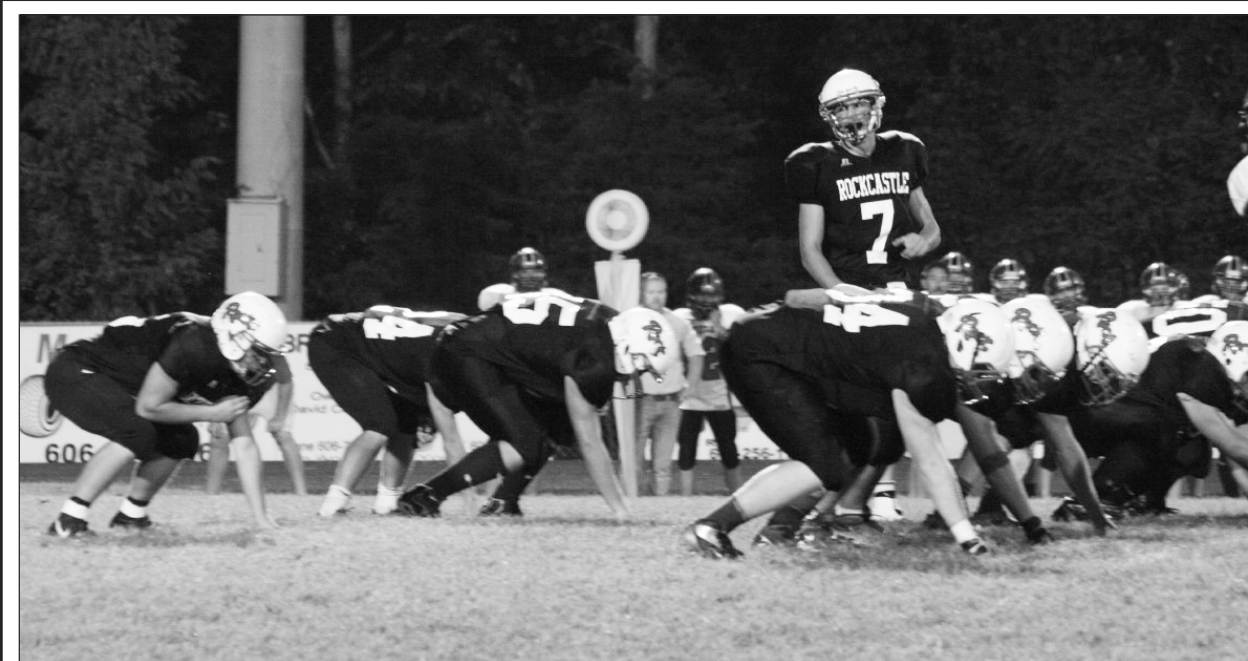

reimburse Citizens for the expenditure. Counting the roof, the county put in over a million dollars in renovations and cleanup but saved over \$550,000 on the project by using work release inmates for the major part of the project and by Citizens Bank being able to bid the roof, keeping the county from having to pay the prevailing wage rate.

Hopkins said the warranty for the roof had been delivered to the county and covers labor and materials for 20 years. She also said that there were zero leaks detected during the last big rain.

The county will also receive \$218,859 from the CDBG fund, controlled by RCIDA, and will use the funds to defray their costs of renovation and cleanup.

In other business, the court approved a \$5,000 donation to the Rockcastle Youth Football League at the request of Scott Parkey, head coach at RCHS. Parkey told the court that it would cost about \$6,500 to cover officials, equipment and assistance to parents who have trouble paying the \$40 per child registration fee.

There was very little discussion of the donation, with Lee Earl Adams making the motion and Bill McKinney seconding it. McKinney said he approved because if you “can get children involved in sports that’s one step further away from their being involved with drugs.”

Roger Coldiron, a member of the Daniel Boone American Red Cross committee, was before the court to give them information as to the Red Cross’s assistance in our county from July of 2011 to June 2012. Coldiron said that, during that period, the ARC spent \$6,655 assisting victims of 15 house fires.

In contrast, Coldiron said that in Lincoln County, which has a larger population than Rockcastle, there were 7 house fires and \$33,808 expended on assistance and in Madison County, which has five times the population of the county, less than twice the funds were expended.

Coldiron said that most fires were electrical in nature and suggested that a volunteer inspection program in the county by fire departments might be helpful.

Coldiron did not ask for a donation from the court to the ARC but said that might be a possibility in the future.

The court also donated \$500 to the Southeast Kentucky Antique Engine and Tractor Association which will have their annual show in Renfro Valley Oct. 4, 5 and 6.

Rip VanWinkle with the association told the court that the show had been held in that location for the past 17 years and that there had never been a rent charge made by Renfro Valley until this year. However, this year, there is a \$1,000 charge upfront and they must dispose of their own trash but the association gets to keep the gate. Price of admission will be \$3 per person with children 12 and under free or \$6 for a three-day pass.

VanWinkle said the show draws tours from all over the country and was a boon for restaurants and motels.

They asked the court for \$1,000 and garbage service but the court decided to go with the \$500 and ask the local tourist commission to provide the additional \$500.

Hal Holbrook, CSEPP director, gave the court an

update on the emergency management building’s progress.

Holbrook said the court needed to decide between a general contractor and a construction management firm for the project. The court decided to go with the construction management firm which will be Codell Construction out of Winchester since they submitted the only bid. Their bid of \$115,000 was the only one submitted which was over the estimated cost of \$78,000. However Holbrook said there was a \$40,000 savings on the architect’s fee which will offset the extra cost.

In other business, the court:

- Approved the purchase of 10,000 stamped envelopes for the sheriff to send out tax bills. Magistrate Bill McKinney, who made the motion, noted that the court is not required to make this expenditure.

- Approved a \$150 donation to the Association of Retarded Citizens.

- Donated \$1100 to the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame Golf Scramble.

- Approved a Unite Interlocal Agreement for law enforcement in the county to participate in a Regional drug Task Force Initiative.

- Approved a \$125 donation to the Cub Scouts. However, it was found after the meeting that \$1,200 was donated last year and County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis said this item would be on the next meeting’s agenda to possibly be increased.

- Approved \$393.72 additional for the new addition to the Western Volunteer Fire Dept and approved payment of 90% of their utilities for a quarter of \$1,755.50.

- Approved a rate of 3.6c per \$100 assessment for the Rockcastle Extension Office.

- Approved a claim by J&D Excavating for \$3,100.24 for hauling rock to Lambert Road and a claim by Matt and Levi Northern of \$2,490 for fencing on the road.

The court also approved an easement for the McKinney Cemetery Road which will give easier access to the cemetery.

As one of the last items of business, the court approved a transfer of \$850,000 from the occupational tax fund to the general fund primarily to pay the cost of the new roof at the Anchor Packaging building. The court also transferred \$100,000 from the road fund to the general fund. The road fund had a balance of \$852,422 at the end of August from county road aid state assistance and truck license fees.

Johnson’s mother, Veronica Waddles, 34 of Mt. Vernon said Johnson received a fractured skull and elbow, two broken knees and a lacerated liver.

Since his accident, Waddles said Johnson underwent a successful brain surgery on Saturday to repair his fractured skull and doctors put a splint on his arm for his fractured elbow. Waddles said that doctors say the laceration in his liver and fractured collarbone will both heal on their own.

Waddles said in the next few days her son will undergo more surgeries to repair his two broken knees and other injuries. Waddles said Johnson is responding well by moving his arms and opening his eyes.

Waddles said her heart was touched by everyone in the community who said they are praying for Johnson’s speedy recovery. Waddles said she wanted to thank everyone who has showed their support for her son and her family during the tragic event.

“So many people have been so kind and helpful, we appreciate everything,” Johnson said. “So many prayers are out there that are being answered every day. I want to say thanks for the love everyone has showed that has been never ending since the accident.”

sume the following day and the new licenses will be available to Rockcastle County residents.

To protect citizens from counterfeiters, the new license has multiple layers of security features that are all linked to each other.

The new features include: digital watermark imperceptible to the human eye, bank note-level fine line printing, improved dual-side lamination for greater tamper resistance and durability and hologram with single-color, ultraviolet “ghost” image.

Starting in the fall, new licenses will also feature “veteran” and “organ donor” designations.

Customers are not required to obtain new licenses before current licenses expire, and the process for obtaining or renewing a license will not change. The cost remains at \$20.

carry over funds of \$43,814.38.

Main revenue sources include: \$457,000 from the sale of water, \$49,000 from property taxes, \$24,000 from franchise fees and \$45,000 from the insurance tax.

Ricky Allen Sandusky, 25, of Mt. Vernon.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff’s Department, Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant received a tip from an anonymous caller who said they could smell a chemical odor while traveling on McFerron Street.

Officers responded to the area and could also smell the chemical odor but were unable to locate its source.

After leaving McFerron Street, Mt. Vernon Assistant Police Chief Barry Adams observed Sandusky walking across Sand Springs Road carrying a Gatorade bottle which appeared to contain items used to manufacture meth.

Once Sandusky noticed the officers, he unscrewed the lid from the Gatorade bottle and poured its contents onto the ground.

Sandusky was arrested at the scene and was later decontaminated by members of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department and Rockcastle EMS.

Upon further investigation, Adams confirmed the Gatorade bottle to be a one-step meth lab containing lithium strips, ammonia nitrate, ground-up pseudoephedrine tablets and other ingredients used to manufacture meth.

Sandusky was charged with manufacturing methamphetamine and tampering with physical evidence. He remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.

A Mt. Vernon man was arrested last Tuesday night for manufacturing methamphetamine after police raided a home on T Street in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was David Patrick Snyder, 29, of Mt. Vernon.

According to Mt. Vernon Police reports, Assistant Chief Barry Adams received information that Snyder was manufacturing meth in an outbuilding on the property.

Upon receiving a search warrant for the residence, officers found various items used to manufacture meth throughout the home.

In the back yard, officers found two one-step meth labs next to a burn pile. Inside the outbuilding, officers found another one-step meth lab along with a HCL gas generator.

Snyder was charged with three counts of manufacturing methamphetamine and remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.
