SourceHOV will hold Career Fair October 3rd - 4th

SourceHOV, which shut up shop in Rockcastle County in June of this year, has obtained a new government contract which will allow them to re-open the facility and hire around 200 employees.

SourceHOV, a platform-based business process solutions company that helps clients accelerate business performance, will be conducting a career fair at its offices in Mt. Vernon on October 3 and 4.

During the fair, SourceHOV will conduct interviews on the spot and hiring managers will be present to answer any questions. Most positions will start at \$11.63/hour and up, virtually all qualifying for an additional Federal health-and-welfare subsidy of up to \$3.71/hour. Start dates for the initial wave of positions is anticipated to be Nov. 9th with additional training groups beginning monthly through April 2013.

SourceHOV sent out a news release concerning this new development and, according to that release, "the company takes great pride in hiring military veterans and the families of active duty personnel and veterans, so we encourage you to make veterans you know in the community aware of these opportunities. The company will be advertising to area organizations and locations for active-duty military and veterans as well."

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Brodhead man arrested for assault and burglary

A Brodhead man was arrested for assault last Thursday night after police responded to a complaint at a residence on Wallin Street in Brodhead.

Arrested at the scene was Michael Travis Christian, 29, of Brodhead.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, Christian's ex-girlfriend, Brittany Payne, called 911 saying she was being physically assaulted by Christian and that she had a domestic violence order against him.

Once officers arrived, Payne informed officers that Christian entered the home through a raised window.

Officers observed damage inside the home including the kitchen table turned over, a TV in the master bedroom turned over and damage to the master bedroom door. Payne told officers the damage occurred as a result of her barricading herself and her three-year-old son inside the master bedroom.

Officers also observed that Payne had a red mark on her left thigh and bruises on her left arm.

Ms. Payne said that Christian fled from the scene on

Funds still not available for many paving projects

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis said this week that the FLEX funds, which will be used for several paving projects in the county, are still not available from the state.

Carloftis said there is a 12-step procedure that has to be gone through before the actual work begins. "I hope to be able to get the paving projects underway in the next two weeks,"

Carloftis said Tuesday, "but it all depends on getting the first 11 steps accomplished before the 12th step, where I order the work to commence."

Carloftis said that seven steps had been accomplished and the county was now awaiting a written Resolution of Work and Memorandum of Understanding from the state transportation cabinet.

Following receipt of that document, 24 hours must elapse before Carloftis can call a special meeting of the fiscal court. Then, upon approval by the court, the Memorandum and Resolution are returned to Frankfort for their signatures. The documents must then be returned to the county before work orders can be issued.

Several roads in the county are awaiting the ap-

proval, including the entire three miles of Lambert Road. The funds must be spent on roads that have already been paved, Carloftis said.

Besides Lambert Road, improvements will be made to sections of: Poplar Gap Road, New Hope Tower Road, Miller Lane, Low Gap Road, Schoolhouse Mill Road, Lower River Road, McGuire Subdv. Road, Purr-Rigsby Road and Barnett Road.

The county has approximately \$600,000 available from the FLEX funds which are contributions by the state to individual counties and represent several years of contributions for Rockcastle County.

"If I order the work to commence prior to each step having been taken, the county government will receive no funding from FLEX and be required to pay out of its local funds," Carloftis said.

Former RCHS baseball player becomes a college baseball head coach

A former RCHS baseball player is now the head coach of a prominent baseball program in the National Junior College Athletic Association.

Devin Taylor, 27, formerly of Brodhead, was recently named the head baseball coach at Owens Community College in Toledo, Ohio.

Taylor becomes the sixth head coach in the program's history and says he is thankful to have the opportunity to become a head coach on the college level.

"I think it's truly a blessing because not many people my age get this kind of opportunity early on in their career," Taylor said. "I am very thankful and blessed to become the head baseball coach at Owens Community College."

As a player, Taylor was a standout athlete at RCHS where he played baseball, basketball and football for the Rockets. He was starting catcher all four years for the Rockets baseball team and is also a member of the Rockcastle County Football Hall of Fame as well.

After high school, Taylor received a scholarship to play baseball at Lincoln

Trail Community College in Robinson, Illinois. At Lincoln Trail, Taylor was a two year starter as catcher for the Statesmen.

After graduating from Lincoln Trail with an associate's degree in science, Taylor transferred to Indiana-Purdue in Fort Wayne, Indiana where he was also a two year starter as catcher for the Mastodons. While at IPFW, Taylor was the only NCAA D-

I catcher to start every regular season game.

"To be the only catcher to start ever game is like an iron man award," Taylor said. I played through a lot of pain and injuries but I

According to state police reports, officers responded after receiving a 911 call about a small girl walking on Hwy 461 by herself.

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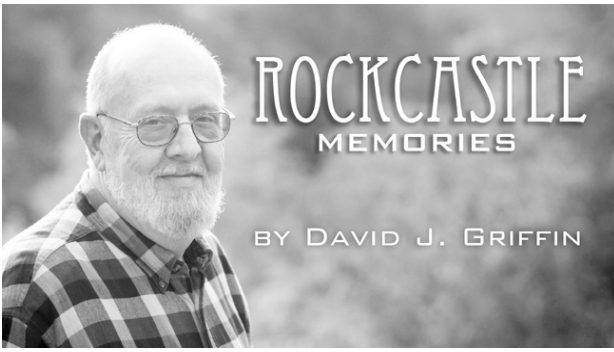
New Chief Deputy...

What happened to Mercurochrome?

Recently my wife was looking through a magazine and noticed an article about mercurochrome and asked, "David Joe, whatever happened to the old topical antiseptic called Mercurochrome?" (Being an old retired chemistry teacher, I am supposed to know the answers to these kinds of questions.) I explained that it was discontinued in the United States by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) because of its mercury content. As I gave her question some additional thought, I decided to do some research and see exactly what scientists have determined concerning the red chemical.

I can distinctly remember my mother (Bee) covering my minor wounds with the flesh staining liquid any time I had injured myself. It burned like crazy when it was applied. (Your mother was expected to "blow on it" until it settled down a little. And then your skin had that tell-tell orangish-red mark until it eventually wore off. I suppose it did destroy the germs, but I don't know about it being worth the "pain and stain.")

The actual name of the chemical antiseptic is merbromin, which is a mercury-containing solution dissolved in ethyl alcohol (tincture). The antibacterial qualities were discovered by Dr. Hugh H. Young in 1918. At the time, he was working as a physician at Johns Hopkins Hospital.

The topical application became extremely popular among parents and physicians alike. It was kept in

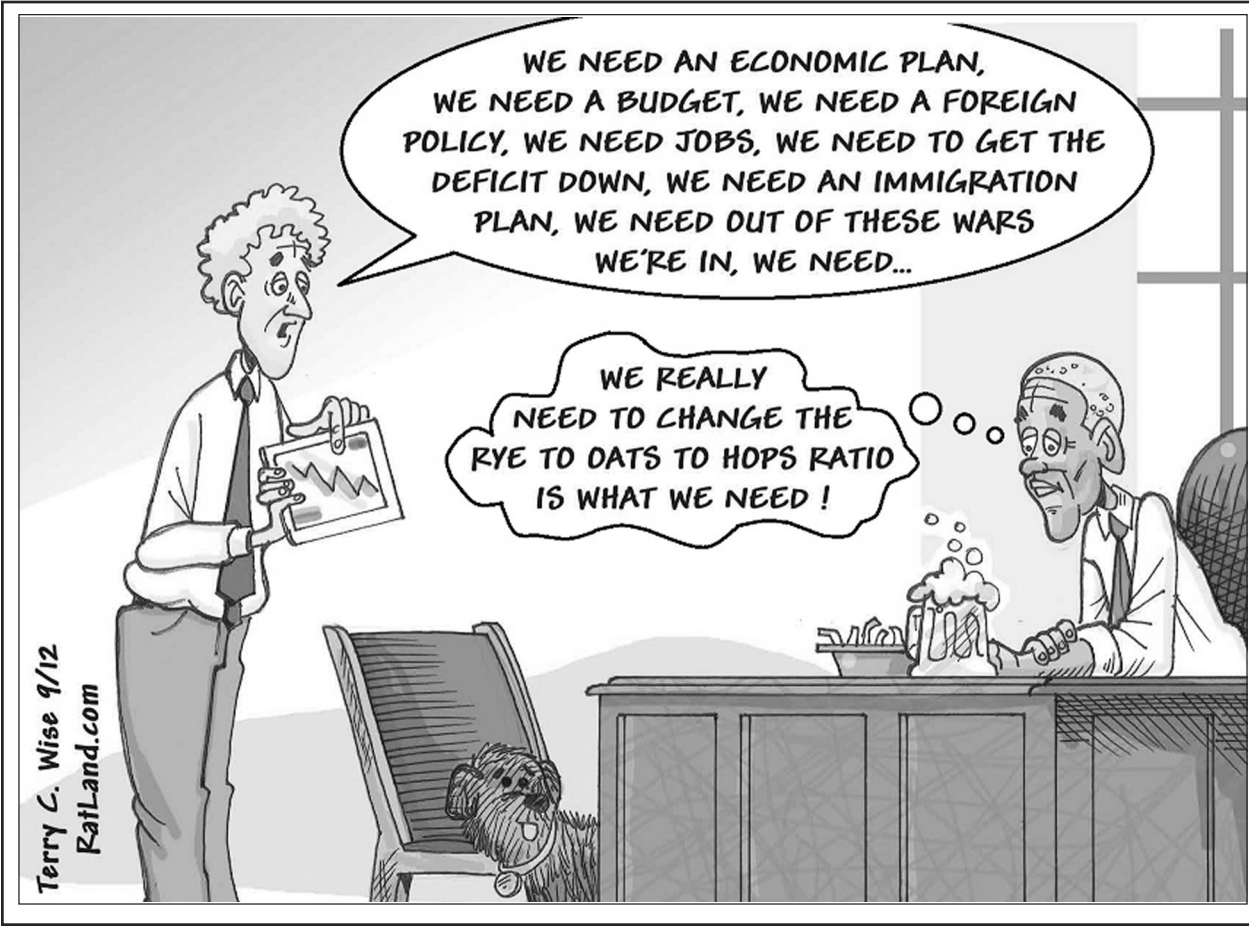
every school medicine kit across the United States, and most students of the 50's came home stained with its dye at some time or another.

I remember falling on the huge metal slide at Mt. Vernon Elementary School when I was in grade school. At the time, I skinned my knee and Mrs. Marie gave my leg a good coating of the red solution. When I got home, Bee noticed the huge stain and began to question my condition. She even called Mrs. Marie to find out exactly what had happened. (I suppose that she was also checking to see if my injury was a result of some misbehavior on my part.) Of course, it was a dull story; just a typical fall for a kid. In a few days, the dye wore off and my abrasion was on the mend.

I asked some of my friends if they remembered the antiseptic and, of course, they did. It was interesting to note that anyone under the age of 30 had never heard of such a thing.

In 1998 the FDA declared that Mercurochrome was "not generally recognized as safe and effective" as an over-the-counter antiseptic and declared a ban on its sale in the US. Mercurochrome and other drugs containing mercury were held up to the spotlight for further scrutiny beginning in 1978 and for good reason - mercury is a poison that adversely affects the brain, kidneys, and especially developing fetuses. At that time, there were several reports of mercury poisoning due to the use of the antiseptic. It was for that reason that the FDA decided to

a thunderous "WHO-WHOOA-----WHO--WHO!!!"

The crowd quieted almost as if someone had hit a switch to turn the volume off. Loretta looked at me, eyes round as saucers and I told her someone had turned a great horned owl loose in the place. But the quiet only lasted no more than ten seconds before the volume knob was turned back up to max.

Three or four minutes went by and it happened again, "WHO-WHOOA----WHO—WHO!!!" Momentary quiet again and three minutes later, the owl belled again but by this time it had no effect on the yell-

"What Is In a Name? A Brief History of the Bustle Family"

Recently, my husband Stanley and I, along with my niece, Karen Adams, paid a visit to a relative, Virgil Bustle, in Rockcastle County. Karen is writing an extensive book about the Bustle family and was on the trail of old stories and whatever she could find, such as pictures.

Virgil's parents were Luther Bustle and Zelda Nicely-Bustle. Luther was a farmer and worked at the Bluegrass Ordinance.

Virgil married his wife, Bessie, on March 5, 1952, in Indiana. They had four daughters: Lillian, Phyllis, Donna, and Joyce. Bessie recently passed away.

Virgil served in the Korean War. He was a truck

driver, and hauled ammunition. The Bustle family has a long tradition of serving in the various wars, going all the way back to the Revolutionary War. There was one interesting story concerning James Bustle, my great-great grandfather's brother, who fought in the Civil War. Evidently many people, particularly in the South, thought the Civil War would only last few days. This was even referenced in the movie, "Gone With the Wind". James Bustle was called to join the fight while plowing a field. He left the mule standing in the field, telling his family that he would be home in a day or so. He fought in the 10th Kentucky on the Missionary Ridge and the Battle of

Longtime businessman, Billy Hiatt dies at 83

Willie L. "Billy" Hiatt, Jr., 84, of Mt. Vernon, died September 21, 2012 at home following a lengthy illness.

He was born August 26, 1928, in Wildie, to Willie Lee and Margie Parsons Hiatt. He graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in 1944 and enrolled in Berea College at 15. He earned a bachelor's degree in commerce and a master's degree in education from Eastern Kentucky University. He taught business and typing at Mt. Vernon High School for seven years before taking over his father-in-law's business, Hilton's 5&10, on Main Street in Mt. Vernon in 1961.

Mr. Hiatt owned and operated the retail variety store as Hiatt's 5&10 for 46 years until his retirement in 2007. Located at the corner of Church and Main streets, the store thrived during the 1960s and 1970s. Mr. Hiatt countered competition from large retail chains by transforming the store into a unique venue for gifts and crafts with a traditional flair. Before the store closed in 2010, it was one of the country's last true dime stores. He recalled that managing the store was "the most natural thing I ever did."

Mr. Hiatt was known for his integrity and sense of humor. He maintained lifelong personal and spiritual connections to Wildie. He served as an elder at Wildie Christian Church for decades. He also fondly recalled playing shortstop for the Wildie Rockies of the Tobacco League, one of Kentucky's last adult baseball circuits, from 1949 to 1955. Wildie won regular-season or playoff titles four times during the

league's existence, which was interrupted briefly by the Korean War.

Mr. Hiatt was preceded in death by: his wife, Barbara Faye Hilton Hiatt; his parents, Willie Lee and Margie Parsons Hiatt; and two sisters, Lucille Bowles and Virginia Younce.

He is survived by: a daughter, Leigh Anne Hiatt of Lexington; a granddaughter, Sophie May Marina Hiatt of Lexington, by way of Ust-Kamenogorsk, Kazakhstan; a son, Willie Lee Hiatt III of Queens, NY; a brother, Andrew Hiatt of Lexington; and three sisters, Jean Murphy and Betty Shelton of Lexington, and June Stevens of Wildie.

The family wishes to express its gratitude to longtime caregivers Karen Robinson and Becky Smith, whose compassionate care enabled Mr. Hiatt to remain at his home in the woods until his death, and to caregiver Brenda Denney, who was by his side in his final days.

Funeral services were held Monday, September 24, 2012 at Dowell & Martin Funeral Home. Burial was at Hiatt Cemetery in Renfro Valley.

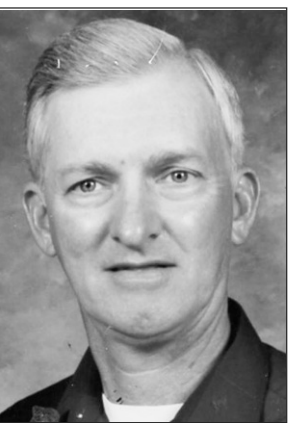

discontinue sale of this chemical. The FDA held that "because of mercury toxicity, the product's risk outweighs the benefits."

Bee - for some unknown reason - began to use Merthiolate instead of Mercurochrome when I was

just beginning high school in 1959. Because she was an avid reader, I suspect that her reading revealed that there were some concerns about the use of mercury and that it had adverse affects on some children. Like any good mother, she did not want her son to be one of the infected individuals. It is also notable that the Eli Lilly Company listed the antiseptic as "...one of the most important drugs ever developed by the company." It was primarily used to kill bacteria and prevent contamination in antiseptic ointments, creams, jellies, and sprays by consumers and by hospitals.

Following a mandated review of mercury-containing food and drugs in 1999, the Centers for Disease Control asked manufactures to remove the chemical from the shelves as a precautionary measure. It was rapidly phased out of most US pharmacies.

It seems a bit odd to me that even after using hazardous chemicals like these, our generation was basically a much healthier group of people than those of today. I'll bet that many of you remember our science teachers allowing us to rub mercury on dimes in our elementary science classes. Can't you just see those sparkling dimes that we coated with our fingers? And yet, our fingers did not become contaminated, nor did we become violently ill because of the exposure to mercury.

Maybe we were just a hardier bunch! But at least our children were spared the "pain and stain" of mercurochrome.

Chattanooga, and was gone for the duration of the war.

From what can be learned, all of the Bustles in Southeastern Kentucky originated with the line of Revolutionary War patriot, Matthew Bustle. The came

here from Virginia by way of North Carolina to Tennessee, and finally, into Kentucky.

Matthew is buried in Tennessee. His son, John, who fought in the War of 1812, came to Kentucky settling in Hazel Patch, just across the Rockcastle River in Laurel County. His descendants still live in this area. The name was originally spelled Bustle, but has variations today: Bussell, Bussel, etc.

ing crowd.

In the meantime I was scanning the rafters and trying to figure out where the bird was until someone finally yelled into my ear that it was coming from the Raptor Rescue and Rehabilitation exhibit located at the back of the pavilion. At that point I was thinking that it must be a recording that they were amplifying with a good set of loud-speakers to call attention to their display.

Not so. We finally got up close to the large exhibit where several handlers were showing off numerous hawks, falcons, golden and bald eagles, a variety of owls in various shapes and sizes and other birds that had suffered accidental physical damage by running into car headlights, power lines or even being shot. Injured to the point that they couldn't survive in the wild. While other folks ooohhhed and ahhhhed over a very friendly and curious bald eagle named Liberty who seemed to be getting a kick out of all the attention he was getting while perched on his handler's arm, the show stopper for me was Roscoe, the great horned owl.

He was perched on an old, dead oak snag they had erected especially for him in the display and, for whatever reason, he had decided to show his stuff in broad daylight, oblivious to the thousands of humans milling around below him. No microphone was involved and when he bellowed out his call, the handlers simply shrugged and explained that he was totally unpredictable and that he did that any time the mood struck him.

About a week ago Loretta and I had just turned in when we heard the distinctive "WHO-WHO-O-A----WHO-WHO!" coming from up the branch in the woods across the way. We looked at each other, simultaneously nodded our heads, and said in unison, "State Fair."

I crawled out of bed, went to the front porch, cupped my hand over my mouth and did my best owl imitation as loudly as I could muster. Not quite as loud as the big guy up the road but good enough to pique his curiosity. I echoed his call a few times and within ten minutes he was in the huge tulip poplar directly in front of our house, about 150

yards away.

He has been there for several hours every night since but I have been unable to entice him any closer.

Loretta says he's already close enough to keep her awake, but the truth is, she's just like me. Neither of us would take a bundle of money for the pleasure we get from that owl. We have our fingers crossed that he's not just passing through and that he's going to stick around all winter.

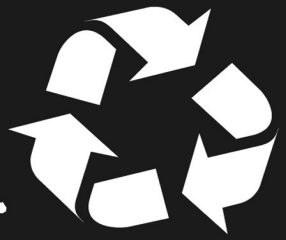

Yards to Paradise

Backyard Wildlife Habitats
Get Results

I have seen a lot of baby birds lately—over a dozen nests in trees I've planted within the past year. (Planting some diverse trees for folks has produced some spectacular results!) Have also seen young wild turkeys galore lately. When wildlife has suitable habitat that provides safety from predators, plus ample food supplies and a place for each diverse species to do the reproduction thing, you get successful wildlife families. All critters need a place to live, and then they can function as instinct or judgment dictates, for better or worse.

I happen to subscribe to the Genesis account where man was given dominion over animals. But part of that includes stewardship for the welfare of the animals. And just as a cattle rancher selectively culls and sells excess animals, so too it needs to be with wildlife, otherwise the wildlife might take over like in the novel, Animal Farm.

Humans have raised families and multiplied rapidly over the centuries. In fact it could be stated that electricity, running water, the telephone and the internet are detrimental to the future of human beings—instead of families of six or twelve kids, there's about one and a half today. (Even if we count aborted little ones, the count would still be down.) So, when life was slower and difficult, people found more time to "get busy" than in today's rushing around and always-on-the-go lifestyles. One wonders if this narcissistic generation is not far less civilized despite our prodigious increase of knowledge and gadgets.

Anyway, back to habitat and wildlife. A yard without weeds, with no trees, with few shrubs, with clean fence rows, is a yard hostile to wildlife of most every kind. Grass, weed and brush killers, as well as lawn mowers have made life difficult for most critters. From worms to spiders to frogs to bees to birds to deer—it's a rough life with houses thickly planted and nothing but short-mowed grass to live on.

Look at birds again: they

need shelter from storms, a secure place to raise babies, a place to bathe and wash away dander, dirt and lice. They need a choice in food, not just the bagged stuff from China in the big box store.

(Incidentally, bird feeders will never keep a family of robins happy...they love to eat worms!)

Look at butterflies: they need to get away from windstorms and rain as their bodies are so frail, they need their favorite plants on which they will lay eggs to raise their babies (the eggs turn into worms that eat up the leaves on your trees and shrubs—but that is what happens if you lure lovely butterflies and they decide to try growing a family in your yard!), they need lots of flowers that provide nectar all summer long, and they also need sunshine, water and salt.

Bluebirds nest in cavities (hollow stumps, posts, trees—or birdhouses). Those maple trees and taxus shrubs will never be home to bluebirds. Swallows like the eaves of buildings to nest in. Just as there are hundreds of bird species, each one has differing habitat needs and food needs. Some like thickets, some evergreen trees, some tall trees, some prefer little shrubs for nest building. Diverse habitat attracts diverse critters.

Hedge rows, fence rows, woods edges along a field or clearing are all prime habitat areas for the most diverse of wildlife. It is no wonder that weed killers and pesticides reduced songbird populations in the past. Also, with added habitat and supplemental feeding, it's not a surprise that wildlife numbers are growing today.

Big farm fields with one crop, with clean-sprayed fence rows, with lots of chemicals in use, it's a wonder more species aren't extinct. But a lot of critters adapt to changing conditions—just think of the raccoon—he can't find a persimmon tree, but he finds dumpsters and trash cans. Ditto with bears who find people food more interesting than hunting fish or wild bee honey or wild blueberries.

So, what are some simple steps to improve wildlife habitat in your

yard? Allowing some violets, clovers and dandelions to grow is probably a good beginning (although you might be surprised to hear that from a landscaper). Several kinds of shrubbery, not just all evergreen or all deciduous. More than one kind of tree. A wet or "soft" area, both sunny and shady areas would be nice. Leaving an old stump or log or tree would be helpful if you can safely do so. Trees with nuts, fruits, cones—these all are eagerly discovered by wildlife.

Add a water source, a pile or stones, some weeds left to produce seeds. Now your yard may be the most interesting one on the block to various wildlife. What more could a critter want?

The more diverse the environment, the more diverse the inhabitants.

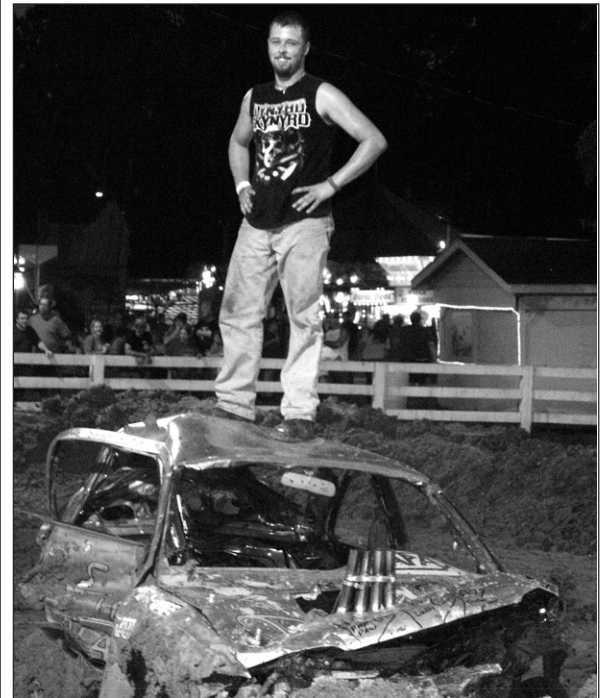

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Rockets fall to Perry Central during Homecoming/UNITE Bowl

The Rockcastle County Rockets lost to the Perry Central Commodores at home last Friday night 40-24 during their Homecoming and the annual UNITE Bowl.

Last Friday night's game was the first time the Commodores have defeated the Rockets in football.

The Commodores were first to get on the board, scoring the only touchdown in the first quarter after Austin Pray punched the ball in for a one yard touchdown run. The extra point was good giving the Commodores the early 7-0 lead.

But the Rockets struck back on offense early in the second quarter with a 5 yard touchdown by senior running back Damien McDaniel. However, the Rockets failed to convert on the extra point attempt making the score 7-6.

The Commodores would score three unanswered touchdowns on the Rockets in the remainder of the second quarter and the Rockets trailed the Commodores 26-6 at halftime.

In the third quarter, the Rockets were first to score when junior quarterback Corey McPhetridge punched the ball from the one yard line. But the extra point attempt failed again cutting the lead to 26-12.

The Commodores would be next to score on a 90 yard touchdown pass from Austin Pray to wide receiver Nathan Pray. The extra point attempt was good extending their lead to 33-12 late in the third quarter.

In an attempt to stay in the game, the Rockets scored on their first possession in the fourth quarter when McPhetridge connected with a 3 yard touchdown strike to senior Tyler Smith. The extra point attempt was no good keeping

the Commodores ahead 33-18.

The Commodores put the game away in the fourth quarter when wide receiver Tyler Fugate pulled in a 20 yard pass from Pray for a touchdown. The extra point attempt was good making it 40-18.

The Rockets would score again late in the fourth quarter on a 15 yard pass from McPhetridge to tight end Boone Saylor making the final score 40-24 after a failed two point conversion.

McPhetridge finished the game 13 of 19 passing for 109 yards and two passing touchdowns with one interception. McPhetridge also picked up 58 yards on the ground and had one rushing touchdown as well.

McDaniel led the rushing attack with 85 yards and one touchdown. Senior running back Jacob Bussell rushed for 50 yards on 15 carries and senior fullback Tommy Shaffer rushed for 22 yards on two carries. Sophomore Chance Ansardi also carried the ball one time for 3 yards.

Saylor caught a total of three passes for 25 yards and one touchdown. Smith also caught two passes for 12 yards and one touchdown.

Other Rockets making catches were senior Eli Haddix with two catches for 37 yards, junior Brandon Jones got three receptions for 13 yards, sophomore Isaiah Adams with one for 11 yards, McDaniel with one for 7 yards and Shaffer caught one for 4 yards.

Junior Jared Lake had the best game of his career as he led the Rocket's defensive effort with a total of eight tackles.

Other Rockets picking up tackles and assists were Ansardi with seven as well as one sack, Smith got six tackles as well as an assisted sack, McPhetridge had five tackles, Saylor also got five

as well as an assisted sack, Bussell and Chris Wren with four each, Shaffer and Haddix with three each, and Jones with two. McDaniel and Adams were also credited with one tackle each.

Head Coach Scott Parkey said that even though they lost the game, he felt the offense had one of its best games all season by putting up 327 total yards on offense with 218 rushing yards and 109 passing.

"Offensively, we played much better than in previous weeks," Parkey said. "Our blocking at the line of scrimmage was much better and allowed us to create more running room for the backs."

However, Parkey said the Rockets defense proved to be the Achilles Heel during the game as the Commodores offense put up a staggering total of 429 yards on the night with 200 yards on the ground and 229 yards through the air.

Parkey said the majority of the Commodores success on offense came from their dual-threat quarterback Austin Pray who was 7 of 11 passing for 229 yards and three passing touchdowns. He also led the Commodore's rushing attack with 88 yards and one rushing touchdown.

"One of the hardest things to defend is a quarterback like Pray who is savvy enough to run and pass equally well," Parkey said. "When we collapsed on him to slow his runs, he would pass them over our heads for big plays."

The Rockets will begin district play this Friday night when they travel to Russell County for a match-up with the Lakers. Game time is set for 7 p.m. central time and 8 p.m. eastern time.

Parkey said the Lakers are a very talented team and are really good on both sides of the ball.

"By returning ten starters on both offense and defense, they will be very tough this year," Parkey said. "However, we are also better than we were at the beginning of the year. But we have to continue to improve in practice this week if we want to leave Russell County with a win."



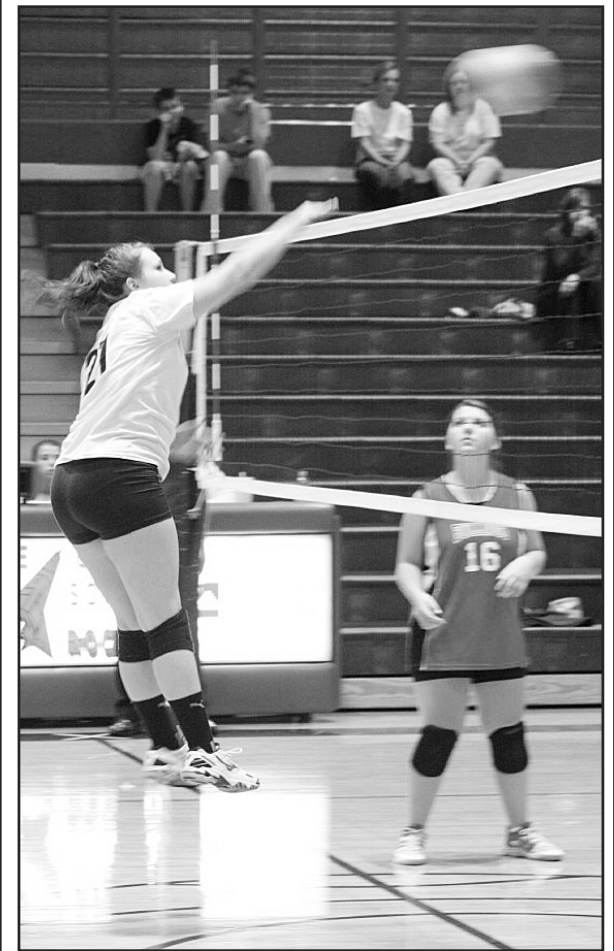

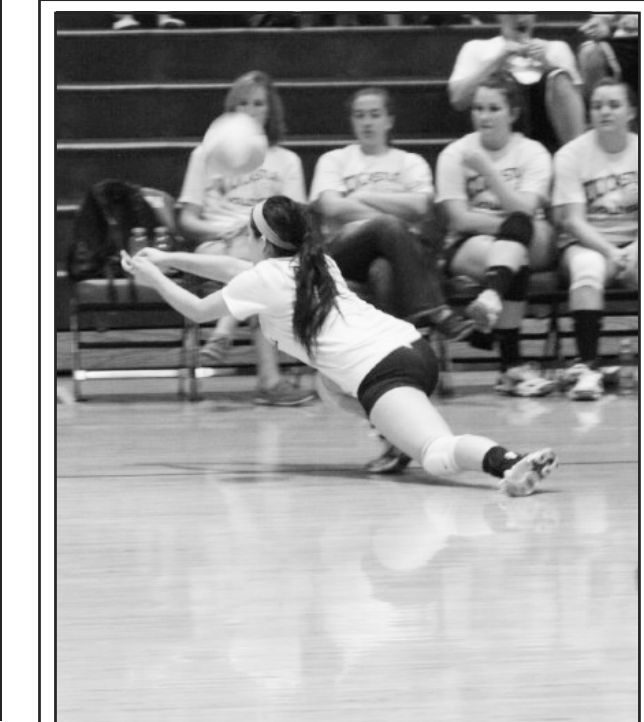

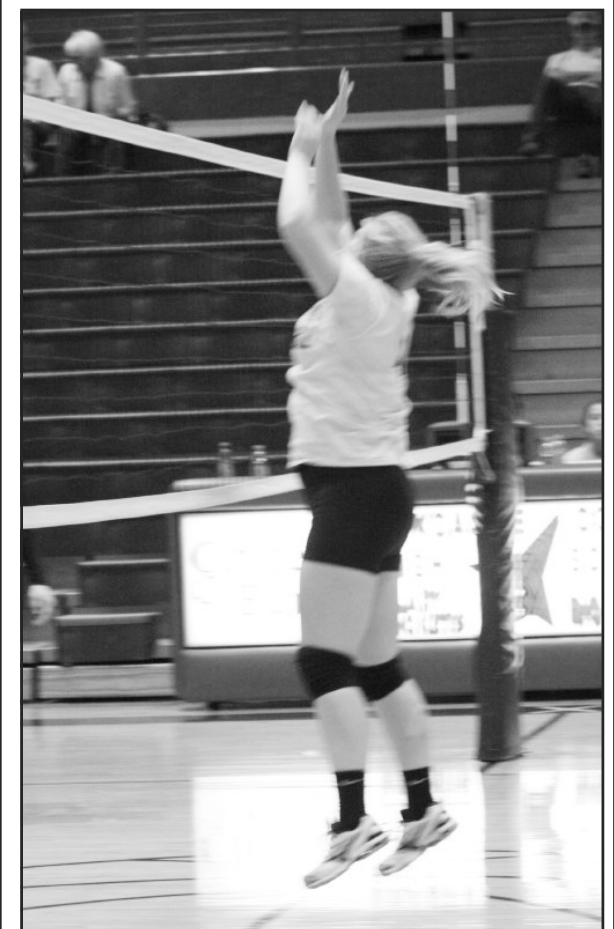

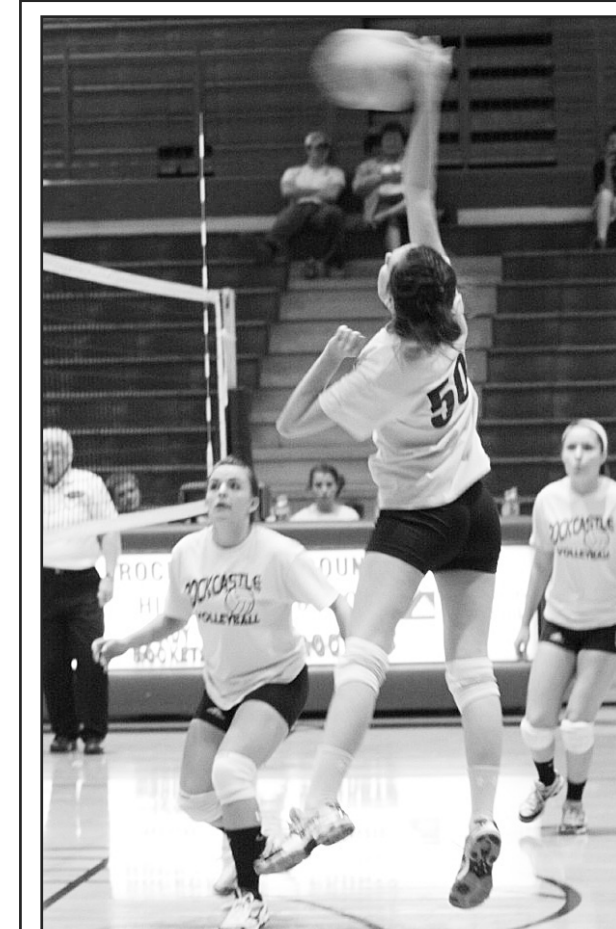
Junior wide receiver Brandon Jones is makes a catch during last Friday night's loss against Perry Central. Jones made three receptions for 13 yards.



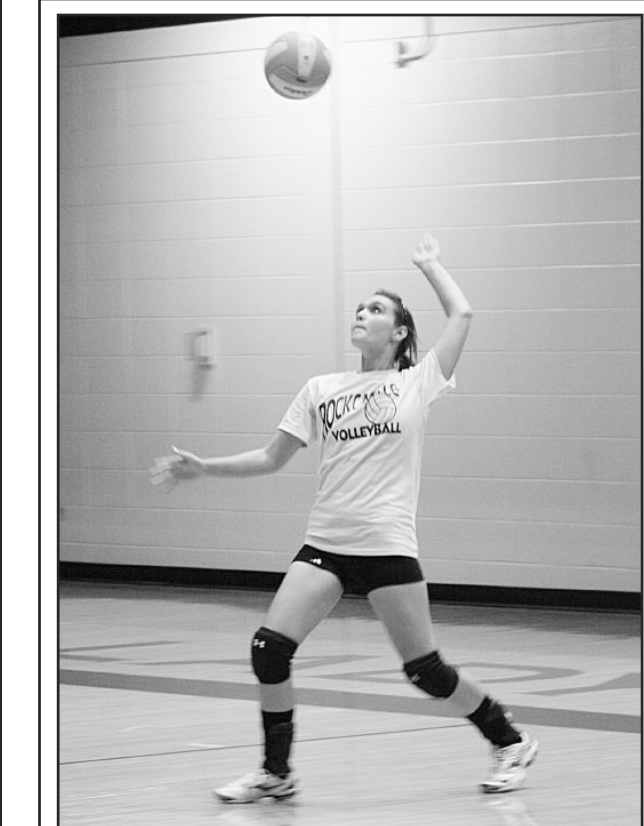
Junior Gabby Miller is shown getting a dig during her team's varsity game last Thursday night against Burgin. The Rockets are now 6-13 on the season.



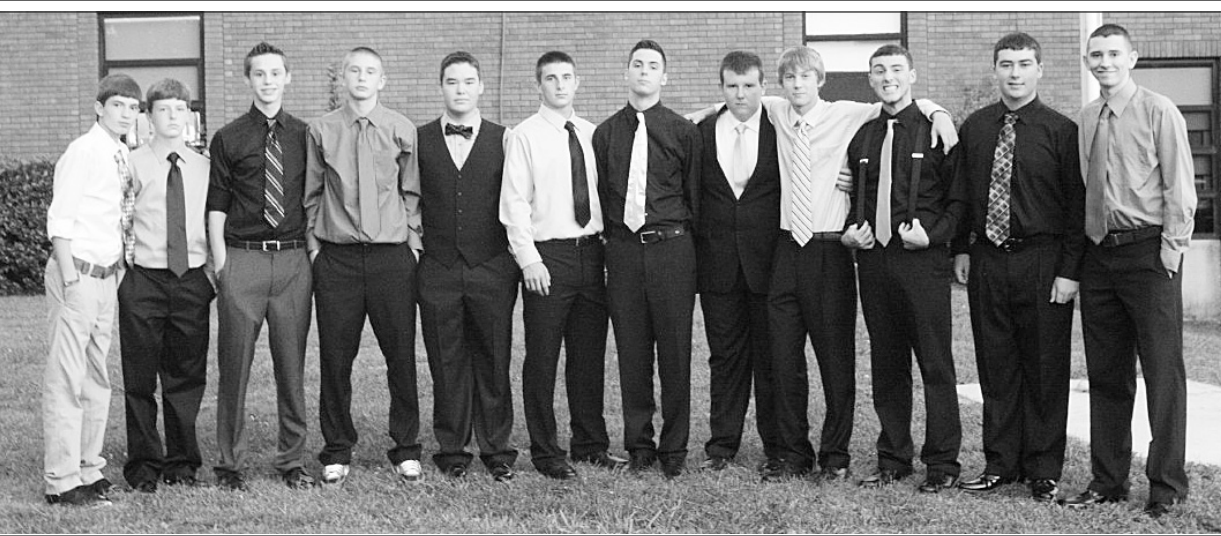

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Two arrested for burglary

After exiting the building, Bryant observed two males inside a brown Saturn car traveling on McClure Street before turning onto Mahaffey Hill Road.

Upon making the traffic stop and receiving consent from Sack to search the vehicle, Bryant found a small gold plated picture frame and an Axion brand CD/MP3 player in the passenger floorboard. Bryant also found a pair of metal bolt cutters in the back seat and another set of metal bolt cutters in the trunk.

The items found in the car were later identified by Mrs. Mink as part of her store's inventory and she told Bryant that she hadn't sold them to anyone.

Both Sack and Robinson were charged with possession of burglary tools and burglary, third degree.

Sack and Robinson were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center and were both later released on a \$5,000 unsecured bond.

Hispanic and Women Farmers Can Seek Compensation to Resolve Discrimination

If you believe that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) improperly denied farm loan benefits to you between 1981 and 2000 because you are Hispanic or a female you may be eligible to apply for compensation.

The claims periods will open on Monday, September 24, 2012 and remain open for 180 days ending on March 22, 2013.

If you think you might be eligible to file a claim, access the Hispanic and Women Farmer and Rancher Center at 1-888-508-4429 or visit the website at www.farmerclaims.gov.

Emergency Loans

On August 15, 2012, Secretary Vilsack declared 68 Kentucky counties including Rockcastle County as disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by drought that occurred on April 1, 2012, and is continuing. The declaration code for this disaster designation is S3349.

EM loan applications for physical and production losses will be received through April 15, 2013, and applications pending on that date may be processed and completed.

Changes Being Made for IRS Reporting as of Calendar Year 2012

Internal Revenue Code section 6041(a) and section 6041A(a) state that reportable payments made to any recipient of the payments during a calendar year totaling less than \$600 are not required to be issued IRS Form 1099-G or IRS Form 1099-MISC.

This rule does not apply if withholding was withheld from payments. If voluntary withholding or backup (involuntary) withholding was withheld and payments were less than \$600, then IRS Form 1099-G or IRS Form 1099-MISC will be issued.

Beginning with calendar year 2012 IRS reporting, Kansas City will not generate and mail IRS Form 1099-G and/or IRS Form 1099-MISC to producers if the total of reportable payments for each tax identification number is less than \$600.

However, if voluntary withholding or backup (involuntary) withholding was withheld from a payment and total payments are less than \$600, then the appropriate IRS 1099 form will be issued.

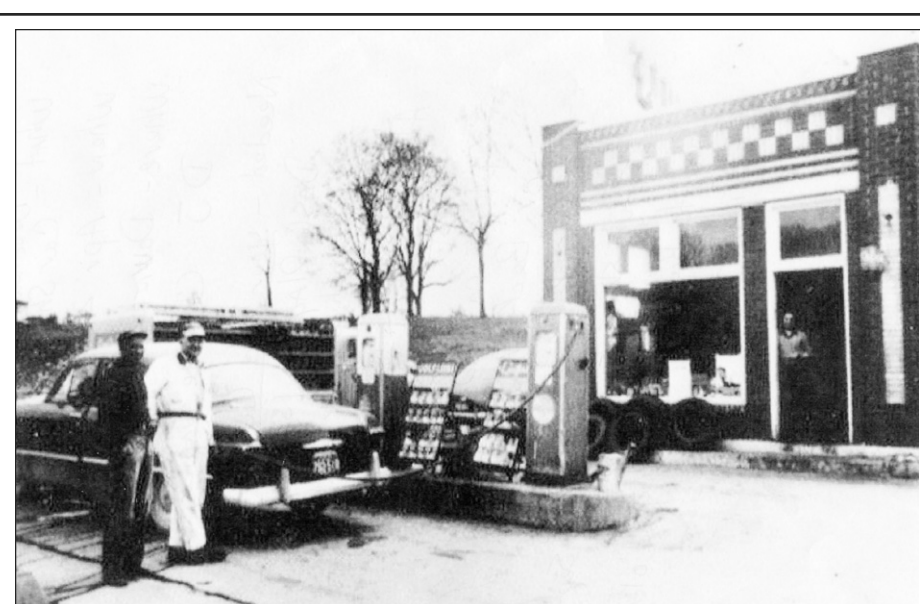


Miss Kentucky Teen

Money Tips for Students

Don't hide from your bills

If you are having trouble paying a bill, contact the company immediately to work out a payment plan. Whatever you do, do not ignore letters and calls from your creditors, according to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA).

It is best to explain everything in a letter so you have a written record. Before writing the letter, look at your finances to come up with a payment amount you can handle. That lets your creditor know you still plan to pay what you owe and will pay as much as possible during your financial crunch.

Most companies will work with you if you are up front about your difficulties. Ask if your creditor will waive any penalties and will extend your payment period if you are temporarily in a

tight money situation. KHEAA is the state agency that administers Kentucky's grant and scholarship programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES). 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October is National Fire Prevention Month

Is your family prepared for a fire emergency? October is National Fire Prevention Month and it serves as an excellent time to examine your preparedness. The history of National Fire Prevention Week has its roots in the Great Chicago Fire, which occurred on October 9, 1871. There are many things that people can do to improve their safety at home, school, or work from a FIRE!

On average in the United States in 2010, someone died in a fire every 169 minutes, and someone was injured every 30 minutes (Karter 2011).

In 2010, fire departments responded to 384,000 home fires in the United States, which claimed the lives of 2,640 people (not including firefighters) and injured another 13,350, not including firefighters (Karter 2011).

Smoking is the leading cause of fire-related deaths (Ahrens 2011).

October is National Fire Prevention Month and this year's theme is "Protect Your Family From Fire." Here are three important steps to help you prepare for a fire emergency:

1. Install The simplest and most effective forms of fire protection are smoke alarms (or fire detectors) and fire extinguishers. Installing and maintaining a working smoke alarm and fire extinguisher cuts the risk of dying in a home & business fire in half. In addition to working smoke detectors, every family and business should have UL certified fire extinguishers strategically placed in rooms such as the kitchen,

garage or workshop. Fire extinguishers are your second line of defense behind a smoke detector and can be the difference between a small inconvenience and a life-changing event.

When installing smoke alarms and fire extinguishers, keep in mind:

There should be an alarm in every bedroom, outside of each sleeping area and on every level

Keep the alarms away from windows, doors and ducts – drafts can interfere with proper operation

Do not paint over or place stickers or decorations on smoke alarms – this can compromise the alarm's performance.

If a fire breaks out, your first step is to call the fire department and get everyone out of the house. If the fire is not spreading and is confined to a small area, use the appropriate type extinguisher for the fire. Know both your limits and the fire extinguisher's limits. An employer should provide portable fire extinguishers and should mount, locate and identify them so that they are readily accessible to employees without subjecting the employees to possible injury.

Periodically inspect your extinguishers to determine if they need to be recharged or replaced. Extinguishers need to be recharged or replaced after each use – even if you haven't used all the extinguishing agent. Inspection and recharging of fire extinguisher should only be performed by certified technician (See Superior Protection Fire Safety for your local needs and ser-

VICES). When using a portable extinguisher, keep your back to an unobstructed exit that is free from fire.

A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives; but portable extinguishers have limitations. Because fire grows and spreads so rapidly, the number one priority for residents is to get out safely.

2. Plan Now that the smoke alarms and fire extinguishers are in place, it is important to develop an emergency escape plan.

Each room should have two exits.

Everyone should know how to open any windows, doors or gates in the exit paths.

Decide on a safe meeting place for everyone.

3. Test This step is two-fold. First, test your fire detector or smoke alarm at least once each month by pushing the test button on the unit. It is also important that the batteries are replaced at least once a year. Periodically inspect your extinguishers to determine if they need to be recharged or replaced.

Next, practice your escape plan. Have a few easy walkthroughs and make sure that each person knows the exits from each room. Once everyone is comfortable with the exit routes, set up an unscheduled fire drill or two. Go over any issues that arise and repeat.

Eyes are the key to learning for children

Parents do all they can to provide their children with the best educational opportunities. But too often one important learning tool may be overlooked -- vision.

As much as 80 percent of learning occurs through the use of children's eyes, so good vision is a key to their ability to succeed in school, said Dr. Dan Bowersox, an optometrist who practices in Shelbyville.

With school back in full swing, reading, writing, chalkboard work and using computers are among the visual tasks students perform daily. Children's eyes are constantly in use in the classroom and at play. When their vision is not functioning properly, education and participation in sports can suffer.

"As children progress in school, they face increasing demands on their visual abilities," Bowersox said. "The size of print in schoolbooks becomes smaller, and the amount of time spent reading and studying in-

creases significantly. Increased class work and homework place significant demands on children's eyes. Unfortunately, the visual abilities of some students aren't performing up to the task."

The Kentucky Optometric Association advises that when certain visual skills have not developed, or are poorly developed, learning is difficult and stressful, and children typically will:

- Avoid reading and other near visual work as much as possible.

- Attempt to do the work anyway, but with a lowered level of comprehension or efficiency.

- Experience discomfort, fatigue and a short attention span.

Some children with learning difficulties exhibit specific behaviors of hyperactivity and distractibility. These children are often labeled as having Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). However, undetected and untreated vi-

sion problems can cause some of the very same signs and symptoms commonly attributed to ADHD. Due to these similarities, some children may be mislabeled as having ADHD when, in fact, they have an undetected vision problem.

Because vision may change frequently during the school years, regular eye and vision care is important. The most common vision problem is nearsightedness. However, some children have farsightedness and astigmatism. In addition, problems with focusing, tracking and eye coordination may affect school and sports performance.

"Unfortunately, parents and educators often incorrectly assume that if a child passes a school screening, then there is no vision problem," Bowersox said. "However, many school vision screenings only test for distance vision. A child who can see 20/20 can still have a vision problem. The vision skills needed for successful reading and learning are much more complex. And, the earlier a vision problem is detected and treated, the more likely treatment will be successful."

Eyeglasses or contact lenses may provide the needed correction for many vision problems. However, a program of vision therapy may also be needed to help develop or enhance vision skills. Vision therapy trains the brain to process information more effectively and to coordinate eye movements better. This, in turn, allows for improved school performance and/or sports performance.

Vision changes can occur without your child or you noticing them, so the Kentucky Optometric Association recommends that children should receive an eye examination at least once every two years -- more frequently if specific problems or risk factors exist, or if recommended by your eye doctor. Campbellsville University recognizes local students

Campbellsville University recognized area residents at Central Kentucky Scholars' Day, Saturday, Sept. 8.

Rockcastle County High School students Rylan Cromer, and Raychel McKinney were recognized. Both reside in Brodhead.

"Find out what your heart belongs to, and you will be well on your way to determining your legacy," Susan Blevins, a 1984 graduate of Campbellsville University who is a full-time assistant professor of education at her alma mater, said to the best and the brightest of Central Kentucky Scholars Saturday night at Campbellsville University.

Blevins is part of a CU legacy with her father, Jimmy, having graduating from CU in 1962, and her daughter, Anne Russell Blevins, graduating in 2012. All belong to the Manion legacy of teachers.

Blevins told the high school seniors about her life struggles with cancer and the death of her husband, and how she was a high school teacher for 24 years before she retired and "came home" to Campbellsville University where "my heart belongs."

She said she hopes her legacy will include each of the letters in the word legacy: L for life-long learning; E for energetic and passionate; G for generous to future generations; A for authentic, realistic and relevant; C for Christ-centered, and Y for Yahweh, the personal name for God known by Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

She told the scholars: "Whatever is worth doing, young people, is worth doing well" which coincides with her life verse from Colossians 3:23 "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for God and not man."

She advised the students to decide on a college where it "feels right," "it fits" and "consumes your thoughts in the morning."

Shajuana Ditto, a graduate of the class of 2009 who now is a teacher at Meade County High School where she is the head girls' volleyball and basketball coach, said her coming to CU "was the best decision that I have ever made in my entire life."

She said her parents always told her "if I wanted the best in life then I would have to invest in what was best for my life. Making the investment in Campbellsville University has changed my life for the

better."

Ditto said CU helped advance her spiritual life immensely. She enjoyed being able to pray before classes, in the cafeteria and during worship experiences throughout the week.

"What made my college experience so amazing was the unlimited opportunity to engage in extracurricular activities, the motivation to serve others and the amazing staff that supported my growth as an individual," Ditto said.

She told the students she was prepared in her career because of the one-on-one attention that was offered to her and the support from her professors who believed in her.

Dr. Michael V. Carter, who is in his 14th year as president of Campbellsville University, told the students that the university embodies great truth and good Christian integrity and respect.

He told the students it was "absolutely amazing" to see where graduates of CU are now and "there is no better way to look at the final product of a university than her graduates."

Whitney Friedls Mathis, a 2010 graduate of CU who is now an admissions counselor for the Western Kentucky area, told the scholars "we care for you as an individual."

She said she was homeschooled, and "I had the opportunity at CU that I would never have had at a bigger school."

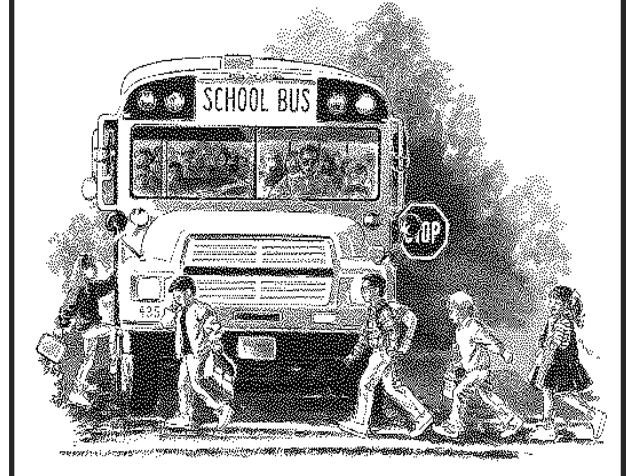

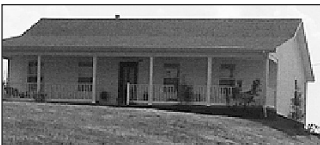

Ordinance #2012-5

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes, and,

Whereas, KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance, and,

Whereas, KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, the city has calculated the tax rate(s) for real and personal property in accordance with KRS chapter 132.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Real estate and personal property A. An ad valorem tax rate of 16.7 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of 16.7 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty
 All said taxes shall be due and payable at the City Offices as set forth on the tax bill. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a two percent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at the face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a ten percent (10%) penalty.

Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof
 This ordinance applies to the 2011 calendar year tax assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2012 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

Whereas, KRS 83A, 130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance, provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and;

Whereas, KRS 132.487 and 132.488 requires submission to the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet prior to October 1 of each year the annual tax rate to be levied on motor vehicles and motorboats.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Motor Vehicles and Motorboats A. An ad valorem tax rate of 16.7 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of motor vehicles and motorboats subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty
 A. All ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall be collected by the Rockcastle County Clerk in accordance with the provisions of KRS 134.800 and other applicable statutes.

B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS 134.810 and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

ORDINANCE NO. 2012-1

An ordinance of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, establishing rates and charges for the use of and the services rendered by the Municipal Water and Sewer System of the said city, and providing for the collection and enforcement of such rates and charges.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky (hereinafter referred to as the City), has determined and declared it to be necessary and conducive to the protection of the public health, safety, welfare and convenience of the City to collect charges from all users of the City's Water Distribution System (hereinafter referred to as the Water System); and City's Sewer Sanitation System (hereinafter referred to as the Sewer System); and

WHEREAS, it is necessary in connection with collecting the charges that a system of user charges be established in order to provide funds needed to pay for the operation, maintenance and replacement and debt service expenses associated with the City's municipal water systems;

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, that the following users charges are amended for the City's municipal water and sewer system.

SECTION 1. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

It is the purpose of this Ordinance to establish user charges in the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, to provide funds needed to pay for the operation, maintenance and replacement (OM&R) and debt service expenses associated with the City's municipal water and sewer system.

SECTION 2. MONTHLY WATER CHARGES

The charges for the water services by the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, are hereby fixed and established on a monthly basis as follows:

2.1 Monthly Water Rates for residents in city limits

The following rates will apply to all water customers of the City's municipal water system shall be based on the customers' monthly water consumption:

Rates for in city residents will be as follows:

2,000 gallons or less	\$19.61
Next 8,000 gallons (per thousand)	5.92
Next 40,000 gallons (per thousand)	5.66
All over 50,000 gallons (per thousand)	5.32

2.2 Monthly Water Rates for Outside City Limits

The following rates will apply to all water customers of the City's municipal water system shall be based on the customers' monthly water consumption.

Rates for residents outside city limits

2,000 gallons or less	\$25.83
Next 8,000 gallons (per thousand)	8.26
Next 40,000 gallons (per thousand)	6.51
All over 50,000 gallons	5.78

SECTION 3: MONTHLY SEWER CHARGES

The charges for the sewer services by the City of Brodhead, Kentucky are hereby fixed and established on a monthly basis as follows:

3.1 Monthly Sewer Rates for Sewer Customers

The following rates will apply to all customers of the City's municipal sewer system and shall be based on the customers' monthly consumption:

Rates will be as follows:

2,000 gallons or less	\$22.83
All over 2,000 gallons (per thousand)	4.11

EFFECTIVE DATE FOR WATER AND SEWER CHARGES

The foregoing water rate and sewer rate charges shall be effective as to existing water customers on the City's municipal water system after the effective date of this Ordinance and shall be effective as to the respective premises of new customers beginning on the date on which each customer connects their premises to the water line made available to such premises.

SECTION 4: SEVERABILITY

If any clause, provision, paragraph or section of this Ordinance is ruled void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder hereof is intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

SECTION 5: ALL FORMER PROVISIONS REPEALED

Any City ordinances, orders, resolutions, motions or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, are repealed.

SECTION 6: EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effective from and after its passage, approval, recording and publication as provided by law.

This Ordinance as stated above is hereby enacted this 17th day of September, 2012.
