

White enters Alford Plea in road rage case

An elderly man, who is charged with murdering his sister on a Rockcastle County roadway, recently accepted a

Clyde White, 79, of Corbin entered an Alford Plea to his second degree manslaughter charge in Rockcastle County District Court on Monday. An Alford Plea is a guilty plea where a defendant may

choose to plead guilty, not because of an admission of guilt but an admission that the prosecution has enough evidence to convince a judge or jury to find the defendant guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. It's commonly referred to as the "I'm guilty but I didn't do it plea."

White was also charged with two counts of first degree wanton endangerment but these charges will be dropped as a part of the plea deal.

According to state police reports, Clyde White, 79, of Corbin was originally charged with murdering his sister, Dorothy Whitaker, 83 of Lexington in August of 2011 after he chased a van she was riding in along I-75 into Mt. Vernon. White's brother, Lawrence White, 82, of Lexington was the driver of the van that eventually wrecked on Hwy 461 in Mt. Vernon after Clyde White rammed it several times.

Cox Hardware closes its doors after 106 years

One of the last, and most longstanding businesses in Mt. Vernon, has closed its doors. Cox Hardware ceased operation last Thursday, February 28th, after 106 years.

Martha Cox, who has worked in the store since 1976 and managed the business by herself since her husband, Jim's, death

in 2009, said her decision to close the store "was one of the hardest things I have ever done, next to losing Jim." She went on to say, "It was a heartbreaking decision but absolutely necessary at this time. We've outlived our customer base.'

The store came into existence in the early 1900s when Claude C. Cox, and his two brothers, Robert and Edward, opened a general store in the old Joplin Hotel on Main Street in Mt. Vernon. Sometime before 1907, the building burned along with all their merchandise. The brothers built the present

building in 1907 with a hardware store on one side, a dry goods store on the other and an undertaker business upstairs. After a period of time, the undertaker business was moved. becoming the present Cox Funeral Home in Mt. Vernon.

Claude's son, John began working in the store upon his return from serv-

ing in World War II and worked there until his death in 2001, at which time Jim and Martha took over the store. John also served as chief of the Mt. Vernon Fire

Department for many years.

Part of a press release Martha issued at the time of the closing says, "Many employees have come and gone at the old store...many family members have enjoyed the people in the community while taking care of their hardware needs.

Over the years, the store has become a meeting place, behind the coal-burn-

ing stove located in the back. Many tales have been told while sharing a lunch or just standing on a soap box, discussing the times and the changing world. Tourists have passed through, enjoying the old atmosphere and young school children have also been brought through to see the things of long ago."

The store has been featured in several magazine articles and on KET's Kentucky Life, a documentary still shown periodically on the educational channel.

One of Mt. Vernon's oldest family-owned businesses closed its doors last Thursday after being open since 1907.

Owner Martha Cox decided to close Cox Hardware on Main Street in Mt. Vernon decided to close the store because, she said, our society has changed since the store's opening and she believed the store had outlived their customer base.

I understand Martha's reasoning but I must admit that I was still saddened when I heard the news about the store's closing.

When I went with Martha to take some pictures inside the store, we reminisced about the "good ole days" and she shared some of her most cherished memories about the store. I was intrigued by her stories as I have always been a history buff, especially when it comes to Rockcastle County's history.

A lot of her stories were memorries of a simpler time decades ago. A time when the main streets of Mt. Vernon, Livingston and Brodhead were filled with "mom and pop" stores that were similar to Cox Hard-

Many of you might find it hard to believe but one of the most troublesome things that I've had to overcome in my life is the fact that I was not born and raised in the "good ole days" that Martha shared with me during our photo op. Very few people in my generation had the chance to experience the streets filled with "mom and pop" stores that we hear described by people around forty years or older.

I believe the reason these changes happened is because sometime during our society's history, a moral and social decay started to occur. Large business corporations like Wal-Mart started opening new stores in every state, spreading through the country like a plague forcing many "mom and pop" stores to close their doors.

When I talk to people who have never heard of Rockcastle County before, the first description I give to them is "We are the only county in Kentucky on I-75 that doesn't have a Wal-Mart."

After they chuckle at my description, they always ask me why our county doesn't have a Wal-Mart since we have one of the country's major interstate systems running right down the middle of our county. They ask me if it's because our county is economically underdeveloped or maybe because our county's population can't support a Wal-Mart. While these reasons may hold some truth, I still don't believe it's the main reason.

I believe the main reason why Rockcastle County doesn't have a Wal-Mart is simply because the majority of its citizens and small businesses don't want something that will force a lot of our "mom and pop" stores to close their doors.

law, Dock Mitchell, was another February gardener. But with Dock, the obsession was precise. There was no just before, just after or close as you could come to it. Peas had to be planted on February even if it fell on a

Keeter swears that on at least two occasions when the ground was frozen too hard to till on Valentine's Day, he hauled Dock to the farm supply store where he bought a few bags of pot-

He then spread his seed on top of the frozen ground and covered them with a couple inches of his brought-on dirt.

My Uncle Stevie Craft planted peas in the fence row between his yard and the road going up Blair Branch. I've seen him use a red-hot fire-place poker to punch a few holes in frozen soil so he could drop in pea seed. Uncle Stevie, however, harbored no superstitions about February 14. His goal was to be the first one on the holler to claim that he'd planted his peas even if it was just a dozen hills or so.

When I was growing up, you did not buy pea seed. They had to be saved from year to year. What we call snow-peas today, were called salad peas. What we call Sugar Snaps today were called snap peas. You simply could not find them in the stores and nothing I could find to sell door to door had a tender hull. And nobody, at least on Blair Branch, believed that shelling out peas was worth the effort when you could buy Jolly Green Giant's, 12 cans

We thought canned shell peas were a big treat for special Sunday Dinners but I've heard my Mom say many a time, "I know they have to have a special machine because I wouldn't shell out that many peas by hand for fifty cents a can."

Anyway, I have not planted my peas but I spoke with Ralph King tonight. Ralph and I used to grow snow peas commercially. We both plan to have peas in or gardens this year and we'll probably have them in the ground before the end of

also the gas commonly added to water to make soda beverages. Mr. Baker went on to ex-

plain that we had to be very careful not to touch the "dry ice" because of its extremely cold temperature - minus 109.3 degrees Fahrenheit. We watched as he used thick gloves to carefully handle the substance. He explained further that "If the ice comes in contact with your skin, it will cause severe skin damage through frostbite." One of the reasons that

Mr. Baker brought the ice to our classroom was to demonstrate its acutely cold properties by freezing familiar items in order to see how they would react to the super-low temperatures. His first demonstration was to allow a ping pong ball to come in contact with the "dry ice." Using the massive gloves, he placed the ball onto the surface of the ice and then immediately flung the ball against the blackboard. It exploded into a million pieces. You can only imagine the reaction of teenagers-we were awed and fascinated. I can still hear the shrill squealing coming from the girls. Mr. Baker then advised us, "Tomorrow each of you bring in something that you want to freeze using the dry ice."

Because of the time that has elapsed since 1961, I am unable to correctly identify which of my classmates brought in which items, but I do remember some of the objects that were part of the next day's demonstration. Although I cannot possibly recall all of the members of that class, I am fairly certain that the following students were enrolled: Charles Shivel, Marion Whitehouse, Sandy Murrell, James Cope, Wayne Ballinger, Lee Price, Dorcus Woodall, and Dwight McNew.

Some of the items that we brought to class reacted more violently - like the ping pong ball, while others were just solidly frozen masses. One of us brought a small carrot, and I remember it also broke into a zillion pieces when Mr. Baker hit it with a hammer. One member of the class wanted to see what would happen to a quarter, and Mr. Baker explained that it would just remain frozen for a while and then simply thaw out and return to its original state, which it indeed did.

Personally, I wanted to see what would happen to a Milky Way bar and to see if it was edible after being frozen. Mr. Baker hit one end of the candy bar with his hammer, and it flew all over the room. The other half was placed in the window to thaw. After it returned to room temperature, he suggested that I take a bite and tell the class what I discovered. Guess what? It tasted like a regular Milky Way bar. (A fellow former teacher

described the use of "dry ice" as being like "Halloween in the classroom.") The lesson throughout

the demonstration was cool, and we returned to the lecture part of the class. Mr. Baker took the rest of the period to explain the chemical nature of the demonstration. One fact that I remember is called sublimation. Dry Ice morphs directly from a solid to a gas in normal room temperatures without going through a wet liquid stage – which is where it came by the name "dry ice." I also remember that frozen carbon dioxide sublimates faster than regular

ice melts so it has to be kept in some type of cooler if it is to be kept for a while.

Of course, the most common use of dry ice at a high school was always to create the illusion of fog at a formal dance. It was not easy to get the adults permission to use it because it is so dangerous, but enough begging and pleading would usually

So, there is your chemistry lesson for today. Now that wasn't so bad, was it? Don't ever lose sight of the fact that a good teacher is hard to find and often harder still to keep. Without question, Mr. Baker was a keeper.

Legislative Update...

By David Meade, State Representative Past the Halfway Point of 2013 Session, and Major Issues Left to Address

The Kentucky General

Assembly passed the half-

way point of the 2013 Leg-

islative Session this past

week, yet several major issues are left to be resolved. On Thursday the House State Government Committee heard testimony on Senate Bill 2, which deals with much needed reforms to our state and local government public pension systems. However the committee

only discussed the proposal,

and didn't vote to pass it out of committee. Each day we wait to take action on our public pension system, which has an unfunded liability of more than \$33 billion and continues to grow, the deeper the hole we dig for our Commonwealth. In addition one of the other major issues Kentucky must address, comprehensive tax

reform, won't be addressed

during this session. It is troubling that some continue to allow these problems to grow and fester in our Commonwealth because of a lack of leadership. We must stop this tactic of delay and deny, and we owe it to you as your representatives to address these issues immediately.

Despite the continued delay, we did get several bills passed over the week. The first bill to gain approval from both the House and Senate was House Bill 7, which authorizes the issuance of bonds to pay for construction and renovation projects at most of Kentucky's public universi

original bill was to ban the schools from raising tuition to pay for construction and renovation of the 11 authorized projects, which include a major renovation of Commonwealth Stadium at the University of Kentucky, and academic buildings and dorms at other colleges. Another bill that gained


approval this past week is one that will be beneficial to Kentucky's agricultural industry. House Bill 273, sponsored by Representative Bart Rowland of Tompkinsville and a host of House Republicans and Democrats, would allow the operation of mini-trucks on Kentucky's public highways. The proposal treats mini-trucks the same as ATV's, and would allow farmers to drive on roadways for short distances to transport supplies from one farm to another.

With two weeks to go, bills dealing with human trafficking, allowing farmers to grow industrial hemp in Kentucky, and now redistricting in the House remain to be addressed. It appears the end of the 2013 session may only be the beginning to addressing these and other major issues mentioned before the close of

this year. I welcome your comments and concerns for the upcoming session. 





and that her pupils were constricted. He also observed that Krutz appeared intoxicated while performing field sobriety tests.

After initiating the field sobriety tests, Stallsworth used K-9 Laky to search Krutz's vehicle and Laky alerted Stallsworth to a purse in the front passenger seat. The purse contained two different prescription pill bottles with several different types of pills inside.

The two pill bottles contained 4 Alprazolam (Xanax) tablets, 18 Dextroamphetamine ADHD tablets, 23 Watson migraine tablets and 3 Baclofen muscle relaxer tablets.

One bottle was in Krutz's name for Oxycodone 10 mg and the other bottle had a generic homemade label on it. However, no Oxycodone pills were found in the two bottles.

Krutz told also Stallsworth that she was wearing two Fentanyl pain patches. While speaking with Krutz, Stallsworth noticed that she was chewing on something. When he asked her what she was chewing on she said it was "some kind of gum a friend gave her."

Stallsworth noticed that the substance Krutz was

chewing appeared to be plastic and had red specks on it. He would later learn that Krutz was chewing on another Fentanyl pain patch.

Krutz was charged with DUI, three counts of possession of a controlled substance, two counts of illegal possession of a legend drug and drug paraphernalia. She was lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center where she was later released on a \$5,000 10% bond.

Scruggs admitted to officers that he had stolen the batteries from the Mt. Vernon Rite Aid. He also told officers that he thought he stole a pair of pliers as well but that he was not sure since he couldn't find them.

After searching the vehicle, officers found two packs of Sure Comfort syringes and one box of Claritin-D pseudoephedrine tablets inside a Rite Aid pharmacy bag.

Officers "MethCheck" to discover that Scruggs had been blocked from purchasing any cold medication containing pseudoephedrine. MethCheck also showed that Campbell had purchased the Claritin-D tablets at a Rite Aid in Richmond earlier in the day.

Both Scruggs and Campbell were charged with unlawful possession of a meth precursor and conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. Scruggs was also charged with DUI, shoplifting, improper display of registration plates and display of illegal/altered

registration plates. Both were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Scruggs remains lodged on a \$25,000 cash/property bond and Campbell was later released on a \$25,000 cash/property

"Patients who have a clear understanding of their after-hospital care instructions, including how to take their medications and when to make follow up appointments, are 30% less likely to be re-admitted or visit an emergency department than patients who lack that information."

The goal of the workshop is to provide patients with the information they need to be cared for safely at home following a hospital stay. Dr. Karen Saylor will be the featured speaker and will discuss the important role patients play in their healthcare team and also ways to prevent re-admission.

The RCMS and RCHS girls' indoor track teams competed in the 53rd Annual Mason-Dixon Games Indoor State Track and Field Championships this past weekend at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center in Louisville. Middle school state took place on Friday evening, while the high school competed in Class 2A State on Saturday afternoon. The RCMS girls' team came into the meet as one of the favorites after a successful run of meets at Mason County this indoor season. The team had also won the previous four indoor state titles.

8th grader Sierra Mercer, according to Coach Mark Brummett, had the greatest middle and high school twoday performance he has ever seen out of a Rockcastle runner in nearly twenty years of coaching. Sierra led RCMS in scoring with a state runner-up finish in the 400-meter dash with an amazing career best performance of 1:04.72. She followed that with a 4th place finish in the 800meter run with an exceptional career best time of 2:37.09.

8th grader Katie Hensley won the long jump state title with an awesome leap of 15'3.5" and just missed former RCMS and RCHS star Heather Hammond's all-time indoor state record by 4.5". She outdistanced her nearest competitor by an unbelievable margin of 1'7".

8th grader Jennifer Mercer placed 7th in the 60-meter dash with an extremely fast start that saw her leave an entire team of Owensboro competitors at the line. She finished with a new career best time of 8.66 seconds.

7th grader Autumn Davidson placed 6th in shot put and scored with an awesome career best performance. Autumn threw the 6 pound shot 25'8.5", while 6th grade teammate Samantha Douglas finished an impressive 11th overall with a nice throw of 23'3.5".

RCMS had several other great performances in many

Out of 168 competitors in the 60-meter dash, 7th grader Jordyn Powell ran a career best time of 9.42 seconds and finished 47th. 8th grader Courtlyn Vanhook placed 61st with a new career best time of 9.63 seconds. 7th grader Alysa Goodman finished 70th with a career best of 9.73 seconds. 8th grader Callie Powell recorded a career best time of 9.81 seconds and finished 80th. 8th grader Michaela Barron placed 82nd with a career best effort of 9.83 seconds. 6th grader Shaylin Howerton placed 100th with a career best time of 10.14 seconds. 6th grader Kensie Sheffield got off to her best start off the year before she tripped and took a very hard fall on the rough wooden track surface. A very tough competitor, Kensie got up an blazed her way to the finish despite

Hispanic and Women Farmers and Ranchers Claims Must be Postmarked by March 25th

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today reminded Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers who believe they have faced discriminatory practices in the past from the USDA have 45 days remaining in the filing period closing March 25, 2013.

USDA urges potential claimants to contact the Claims Administrator for information and mail their claim packages on or before March 25, 2013.

The process offers a voluntary alternative to litigation for each Hispanic or female farmer and rancher who can prove that USDA denied his or her application for loan or loan servicing assistance for discriminatory reasons for certain time periods between 1981 and 2000. As announced in February 2011, the voluntary claims process will make available at least \$1.33 billion for cash awards and tax relief payments, plus up to \$160 million in farm debt relief, to eligible Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers. There are no filing fees to participate in the pro-

Independent legal services companies will administer the claims process and adjudicate the claims. Although there are no filing fees to participate and a lawyer is not required to participate in the claims process, persons seeking legal advice may contact a lawyer or other legal services provider.

Under Secretary Vilsack's leadership, USDA has instituted a comprehensive plan to strengthen the Department as a model service provider and to ensure that every farmer and rancher is treated equally and fairly as part of "a new era of civil rights" at USDA. The claims process provides a voluntary alternative to continuing litigation for Hispanic and female farmers and ranchers who want to use it.

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) is designed to provide financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters.

To be eligible for NAP assistance and other FSA Disaster Assistance Programs, producers harvesting crops must purchase NAP coverage for which the catastrophic risk protection level of crop insurance is not available.

The natural disaster must occur before or during harvest and must directly affect the eligible crop. An eligible natural disaster is any of the fol-

- damaging weather, such as drought, freeze, hail, excessive moisture, excessive wind or hurri-
- an adverse natural occurrence, such as earthquake or flood; or
- a condition related to damaging weather or an adverse natural occurrence, such as excessive heat, disease or insect infestation.

The deadline to purchase NAP date for Vegetables and Soybeans is March 15, 2013.

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP) - 2013

The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, enacted on Jan. 2, 2013, amends the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 and provides for a one-year extension of the Direct and Counter-Cyclical (DCP) program. To be eligible for direct and counter-cyclical payments, producers must enroll their farms in DCP during the sign-up period which began on Feb. 19, 2013 and ends on Aug. 2, 2013.

Frankfort Report...

With only eight legislative days left, the 2013 General Assembly Session has come to a

has come to a major turning point. As I have reported in the past, Kentucky faces an immense un-



funded liability in our public employee pension system. Senate Bill 2, a product of a bipartisan, bicameral task force that heard from stakeholders, retirement experts, and independent researchers, was drafted to protect tax-payers as well as current employees' and retirees' retirement from insolvency, passed the Senate in an overwhelming bipartisan vote. (SB 2 does not apply to teachers' retirement and would not impact pensions for current employees and retirees.) The House of Representatives removed any structural changes to the strained system and proposed to pay for it with revenues from expanded lottery sales, Keno, and Instant Racing instead of discussing this part during the normal budget process of 2014. They refuse to discuss the bill with us in conference committee if we don't accept their flawed financial plan. The time for gotcha politics is over; we must have a sober discussion about this very impor-

on unemployment insurance and corrections reform. The Senate is still working and we want bipartisan consensus. Structural changes can be made now to the pension system that will strengthen the entire fund. We are hopeful that the House Leadership will come to the table on this issue that affects all Kentuckians.

The Senate is also doing what we can to put our own house in order. Senate Bill 7 seeks to close the loophole in the state retirement system that had allowed some legislators to significantly increase their state pensions. Incidentally, Senate Bill 2 directs that any new legislators must be in the regular state employee system. Both these bills together work to make sure that state employees are treated similarly whether you work in the Senate or on a state road.

In other news, the Senate continued working on other bills involving elections, gun rights, and education. My Senate Bill 129, which protects our Second Amendment rights by clarifying that the federal government cannot encroach on Kentuckians' right to bear arms through unconstitutional acts, was passed in the Senate with huge bipartisan support. The bill, which also takes a stand for our Tenth Amendment rights, now awaits action in the House of Representatives. We also passed Senate Bill 150 which makes

it easier to obtain a concealed-carry license. A companion bill to these bills is Senate Bill 80 which protects Kentuckians' rights from any outside liberal influences, specifically the United Nations Agenda 21 which seeks to strengthen a government's power of eminent domain.

There are several pro-

grams in place to help kids who may not necessarily learn in the traditional manner or need more help than their peers to understand their lessons. But there are also students who are motivated and prepared enough to want to continue pushing themselves and these children need our support too. Senate Bill 61 would allow for early graduation for qualified students who meet set requirements. Senate Bill 64 allows students who graduate early to still access their full KEES funds.

Voting is at the foundation of our republic. Senate Bill 1 makes it easier for military and Kentuckians living abroad to receive election ballots. Especially for our servicemen and women, voting is a particularly meaningful action and

we should make it as easy and available as possible. Electronically transmitting the ballot gets the ballot in the hands of voters earlier so it can be filled out and returned on a timely basis. The bill also establishes a group to study the possibility of electronically returning the ballots. Right now, the county clerks are concerned that the integrity of the ballot and the anonymity of the voter may be compromised if transmitted via email or fax.

Senate Bill 55 will move the election date of constitutional officers to presidential election years. This has two great benefits: it increases voter participation because more people vote in presidential years. It also saves both local and state governments, and you the taxpayer, money.
