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Thinking About Cleaning Your Carpet? Some things to think about...

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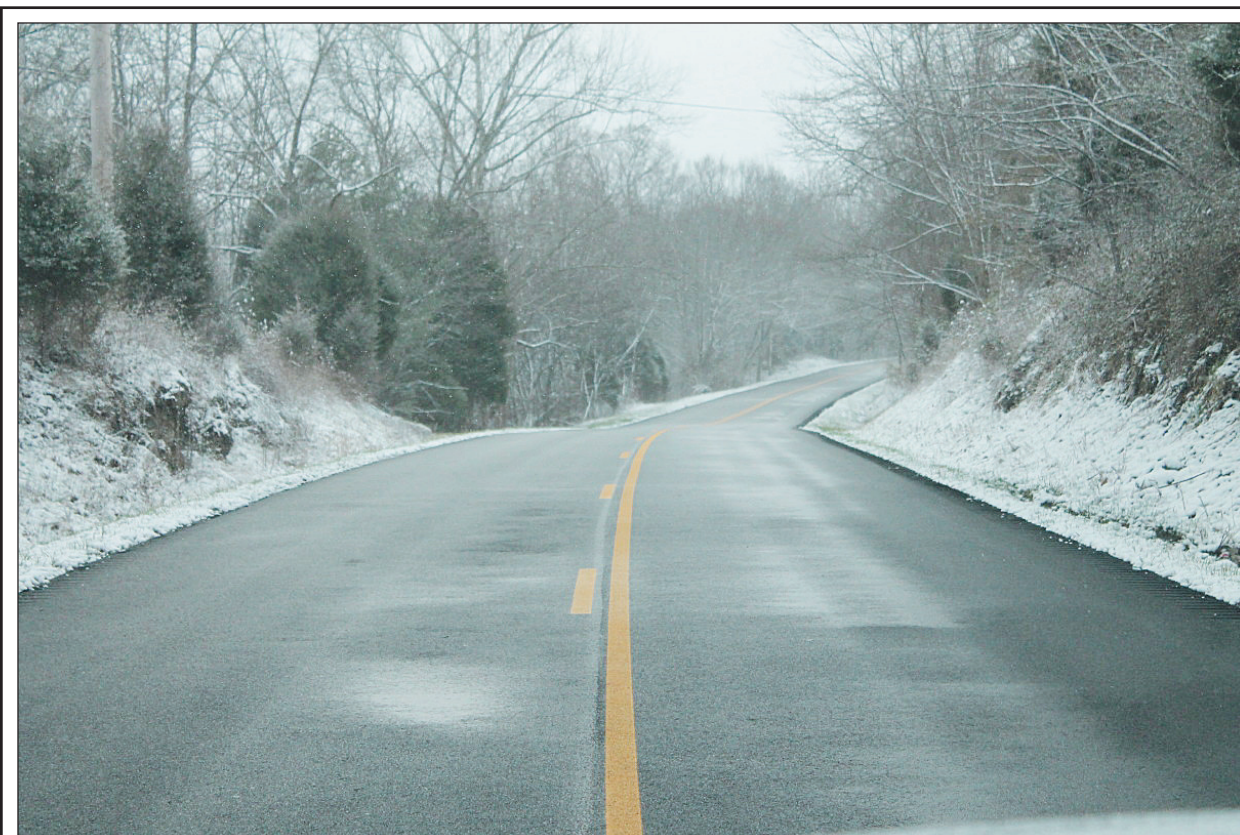
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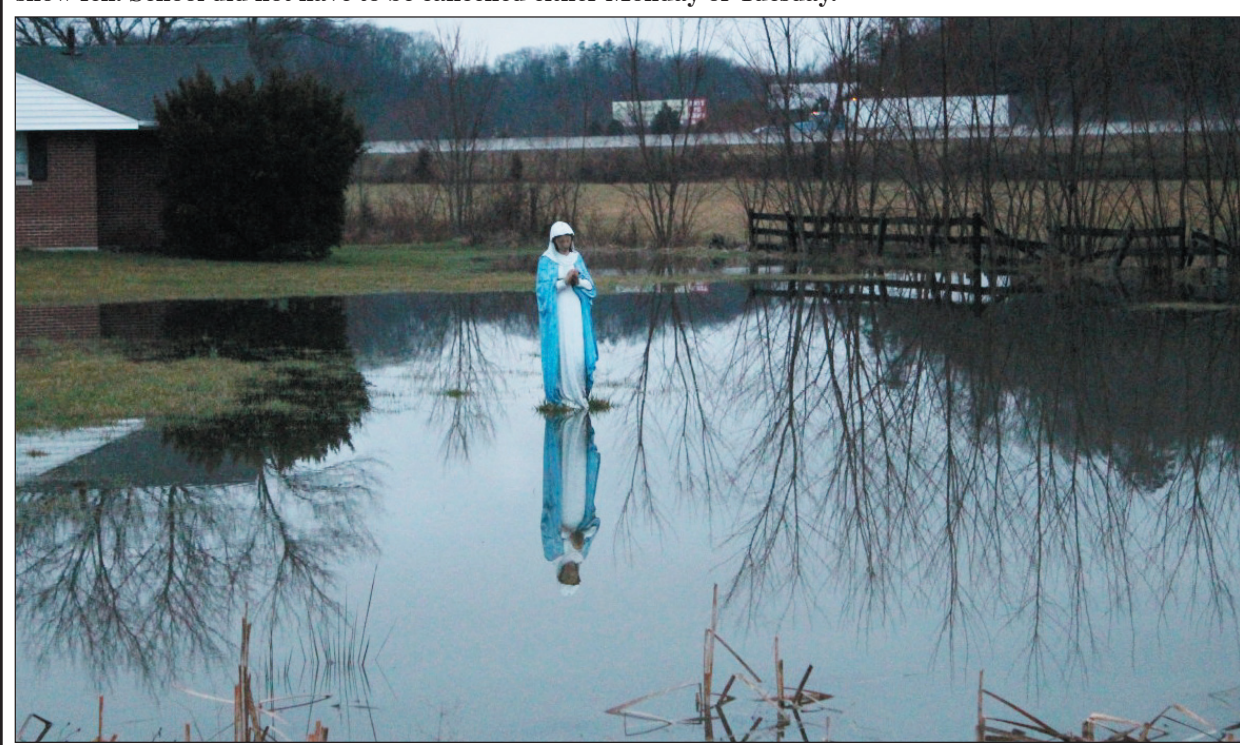

ERWA strives to be more transparent to their customers

A Rockcastle County water association has vowed to remain more transparent to the public and their customers in the future.

The reputation of the Eastern Rockcastle Water Association has been tainted with controversy in the past after the association

closed their monthly meetings to the public. Many customers on Green Pond Ridge Road in Climax were also upset about not having water available to their homes.

ERWA President Michael McGuire said the board has since decided to keep their monthly meetings open to the public in hopes

of retaining a better relationship with their customers. McGuire also said the association recently completed their Green Pond Ridge Road project in the Climax area, which was started in 2009.

"The project only cost us \$18,000 and provided water for all of our five customers on Green Pond Ridge Road," McGuire said. "We were also grate-

ful that the fiscal court donated their backhoe and saved us approximately \$20,000." Currently, McGuire said, ERWA serves around 600 customers in Brush Creek, Orlando, Climax, Red Hill, Sand Hill, Trace Branch, Sand Springs and Pongo. He said the association has approximately 100 miles of

Fiscal Court hits \$11K snag with Climax and Livingston Fire Depts.

Because of a new law passed by the state in October of 2012, Rockcastle Fiscal Court will have to cough up \$11,000 for construction drawings for the Climax and Livingston Fire Departments.

At a special called meeting of the fiscal court Monday morning, County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis told the magistrates that the drawings could be done by Berea Central Kentucky Design and would cost the county \$6,000 for Climax and \$5,000 for Livingston. The

lesser amount for Livingston is due to the fact that the building is around 700 square feet smaller.

The Livingston Fire Department is 95% complete and has been approved by a state building inspector, Carloftis said and the ground is prepared for construction for the building at Climax.

Carloftis said that if the county had its own building codes in place, the state law would not have applied.

The court approved the contracts with Berea Central Kentucky Design.

Mt. Vernon Council accepts sewer plant bid

At a special meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night, a bid for repairs at the sewer plant was accepted.

The bid of \$27,937, for installation of an influent (intake) meter, from K. Hayes Limited of Lexington was the lowest of the three bids submitted and the company was recommended to the council by Eddie Brown, an engineer with Kenviron. Brown told the council that he had checked all of the company's references and they had all highly recommended the company. The bid closest to

the winning bid was from Herrick Co., Inc. of Lawrenceburg for \$35,700.

The council also accepted a bid of \$5,000 from K. Hayes for installation of an effluent (outgo) meter, which was not mandatory but is needed, Water Superintendent Dennis McClure told the council. This brought K. Hayes total bid to \$32,937. The influent meter will measure the amount of raw wastewater being taken into the sewer plant making sure it does not

This famous biblical story coined the phrase that many use today when they say people should be careful not to "cast the first stone." The phrase is so widely used that I have even heard atheist use the term in their conversations.

We have all committed acts that would require forgiveness from others. Maybe you have committed adultery and you are currently seeking forgiveness from your spouse or maybe you have neglected one of your children and you are seeking forgiveness from them as you are wanting to be a part of their life now. The list of examples can go on and on...

Truth is, no one has ever had the right to cast the first stone and I believe Napier understands this phrase in its entirety. She realized that Smallridge made the mistake of driving drunk and that if he could relive the scenario, he would have called a cab or found another way home.

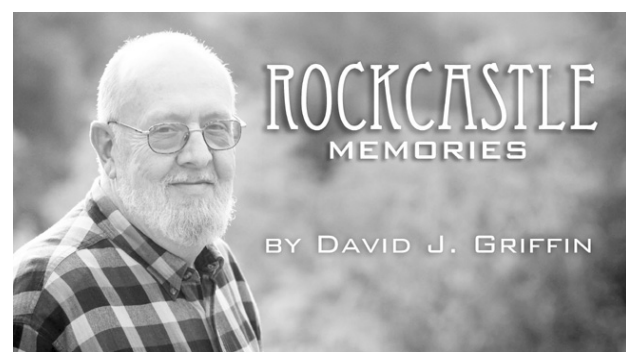
Napier also realized that Smallridge needed forgiveness for his mistake just as much as she needed forgiveness for mistakes she had made in her life.

I tip my hat to Napier and the lesson of forgiveness that she reminded us all about. It's important for us to remember that the power of forgiveness can not only save the condemned but it can save the condemners as well.

I've just finished reading the best full-length novel by a Kentucky Author that I've seen in a decade or longer. So good, in fact, that it's hard for me to believe I'm just now hearing about it and that it has not had any mention in our big city and regional press.

Had it not been for an alert bookseller in Pound, Virginia, I probably would not have discovered 'The Dark And Bloody Ground,' (DBG) written by Roberta Hayes Webb, copyright 2006, 381 action packed pages and published by TurnKey Press of Austin, Texas.

Please do not confuse this book with a 1993 work by Darcy O'Brien that has the same title. Any similarity between the two begins and ends with the titles. When I told Brenda Salyers, astute proprietor of Heritage Nook Books, there in Pound, that I'd read it, she had to point out the differences in authorship before I realized I hadn't seen Webb's book. And boy am I glad that Brenda is so persistent because this one has been a can't-lay-down, up-all-night, page-turner.

Webb's book is a fictional account of the early discovery and settlement of the uppermost reaches of the Big Sandy River Valley near what is now Jenkins, in Letcher County, Kentucky. The book traces the lives and adventures of 4 generations of the fictional first family, from 1800 through about 1950, to settle in the head of Elkhorn Creek, Kentucky headwaters of the Big Sandy.

The geographic settings and historical events are remarkably accurate. Despite a few name changes here and there and the liberal use of her poet's license, readers of Webb's DBG will consistently have a realistic

sense of when and where they are. Several of the Civil War episodes are literally hair raisers.

The reading experience is an emotional roller coaster ride that comes as close to capturing the Appalachian experience as anything I've ever read. Readers familiar with and appreciative of our culture will find themselves at home-- but do keep a handkerchief or a box of tissue handy on the one hand and be equally prepared to run to wherever you go when you're terribly frightened. And keep in mind, however difficult it may be at times, that you are reading fiction. DBG is sometimes love story, sometimes thriller, sometimes action/adventure and always intriguing.

The author, Roberta Hayes Webb was born and raised in Burdine, Kentucky where she walked to grade school before riding the bus to Jenkins High School from which she graduated in May of 1945. Much of DBG is devoted to living in a coal camp and a company town. Suffice to say that the author knows of which she speaks.

After high school Roberta spent a brief stint in Oak Ridge, TN as a lab technician on the team that developed the atomic bomb. In 1949, she completed a degree in psychiatric nursing at Knoxville General Hospital by which time she was married to Dr. Jim Webb who was completing his residency in psychiatry at the University of Georgia.

Both Jim and Roberta Webb enjoyed long, successful and storied medical careers throughout a marriage that lasted 59 years before Jim's passing to the other side six years ago. Along the way, they had 4 children and lived in Georgia.

slipped into the bed and crashed.

I will never forget one late February afternoon when Lloyd called me and asked if I wanted to ride with him to Manchester to pick up a load of coal. Lloyd's dad, Jim Fain, had a 1955 Chevrolet dump truck that could haul approximately seven tons of coal, and Lloyd needed to get a full load.

Since it was about a two-hour drive in those days, we needed to get on the road in order to arrive before the coal company shut down for the night. I told my mother, Bee where we were going, and she slipped a \$20 bill in my pocket "in case of an emergency." I drove down to Pine Hill to meet Lloyd.

In those days most families that I knew used coal to heat their homes, and many of them, including my grandparents and my mother, even cooked with a coal-burning stove. Lloyd's dad kept my family stocked with coal year around. We had coal piles in back of our houses in the Pine Grove section of Rockcastle County. Lloyd reminded me last week that most folks purchased their coal supply in the summer months because it could be bought for about \$3.50 a ton. (If you waited until winter, the price could go up to \$9.00 a ton.) My family always bought block coal, using a hatchet to break it into pieces that would fit the different stoves that we used at the time. As a teenager, it was my duty to keep the coal buckets at our house and my grandparents' home filled with coal that had been broken into the correct sizes. Sometimes when a large piece of coal was shattered, inside you might find an assortment of fossils. It was common to find imprints of leaves or small fish in the broken pieces.

So on that February afternoon, Lloyd and I began our journey to the mountains of Eastern Kentucky to fetch a load of "black gold" and

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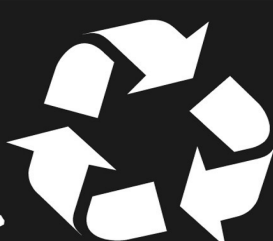

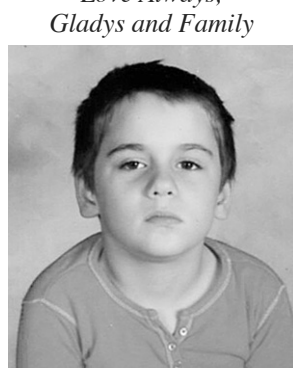

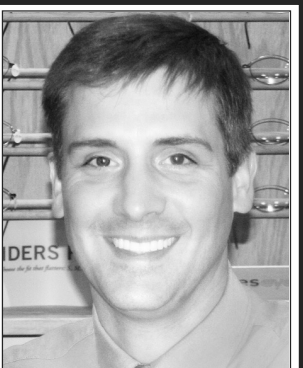

bring it safely back to Rockcastle County. I still remember that trip as clearly as I would if it was yesterday. We talked about everything that teenagers usually discuss, and we even listened to my pocket-sized transistor radio as we made our way to Manchester. Occasionally, we stopped to rest and to pick up a Royal Crown Cola and a bag of salted peanuts - thereby momentarily quenching the hunger that teen boys maintain nearly 24-hours a day. We were no exception.

I can remember how that empty truck felt as we drove the curvy roads of the mountains. The engine was an in-line six cylinder that was designed to pull heavy loads. The big six-cylinder engine could pull a load with no trouble, and Lloyd knew exactly how to drive that Chevy. There was a huge difference coming back with seven tons of coal in the bed. I thought to myself, Lloyd is extremely capable of getting us back home safely. And indeed, he did.

It was dark when we made our way back home. Before we reached Rockcastle County, we stopped at a truck stop and bought some burgers and fries. Stigmata, A Most Unusual Occurrence, Part II

Last week, as Passover and Easter approached, the subject of stigmata was discussed. We will continue to look at this most unusual of circumstances that may effect the human body.

Stigmata is a term used to describe the body marks, sores, or sensations of pain in locations corresponding to the crucifixion wounds of Jesus Christ. It is primarily associated with the Catholic faith with 80% of those affected being women.

The first specific case ever recorded is that of St. Francis of Assisi. In 1224, two years before his death, on a journey to Mount La Verna for a forty day fast, he encountered a six winged angel. The angel had been crucified. He was humbled by the sight and when the angel was gone, he was left with the stigmata.

More recently, Padre Pio of Pietrelcina was affected by the occurrence. His wounds were examined by

I learned how to make this in high school Home Economics (June Stevens was the teacher), a class that in the 1960's, all females were required to take before they could graduate.

1 box (6 ounces) strawberry Jello®
2 cups boiling water
2 boxes (10 ounces each) frozen strawberries
1 can (14 ounce) crushed pineapple, drained
2 bananas, diced
1 cup sour cream
1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Three easy ways to prepare for Spring storms

Now that we are into spring, storms are a good likelihood and Kentucky Utilities Company and Louisville Gas and Electric Company provide simple ways for customers to plan for severe weather. KU takes steps year-round to prepare for the effects of inclement weather and offer customers the following tips and suggestions to plan ahead and also prepare, so they can be safe during storm events:

1. Plan ahead: Visit www.ready.gov to make a

plan and learn how to build an emergency supply kit, which should include items such as prescription medicines, weather radio, important phone numbers, a first aid kit, flashlights and extra batteries, to name a few.

Before severe weather strikes, KU prepares by monitoring weather conditions, placing field crews and contact centers on alert and readying operating equipment and material. Throughout the year, KU

makes infrastructure investments and performs regular system maintenance such as tree trimming and hazardous tree removals to enhance system reliability.

2. Stay informed: During outage situations, system and restoration updates are provided through LG&E and KU's automated phone system, online outage map and outage map app. At the beginning of a widespread restoration event, the companies must first assess damage to the electric system before repairs can be prioritized.

Keeping customers informed of the companies' progress is an essential part of LG&E and KU's emergency response plan. In times of widespread power outages, general restoration information and safety tips are provided on LG&E and KU's Facebook page, Twitter feed and official company blog.

3. Be safe: Always assume any downed wire is an energized power line. Stay away and report it immediately. KU customers should call 1-800-981-0600. Visit www.lgeku.com/storm for important safety information concerning portable generators, food storage and electric service.

In responding to major power outages across the utilities' service territory, a priority is given to critical-

care organizations, such as hospitals, fire and police stations and nursing homes. At the same time, KU crews focus on restoring service to utility infrastructure like water and sewer pumping stations as well as schools and airports.

KU must repair any critical infrastructure that might be damaged from the storm, like the transmission lines and substations that carry electricity into neighborhoods and commercial areas, before power can be restored to those locations.

The goal then is to fix a problem that will restore power to large groups of customers simultaneously, so hundreds or even thousands of customers come back online with one repair job. Crews then move on to where they can get neighborhoods restored and continue until they address outages that affect individual streets and homes.

Customers' experiencing a power outage should report it to the company by either using the online outage reporting system or by calling KU at 1-800-981-0600.

While every storm is unique and presents distinct challenges to utility crews, KU remains committed to restoring power safely and as quickly as possible and keeping customers informed every step of the way.

exceed its 372,000 gallon daily capacity.

The renovation was necessitated by a Notice of Violation issued in September of 2011 by the Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection, Division of Water.

The city budgeted \$20,000 for the project in their 2013 budget. The additional funds will come from money budgeted into other accounts which was not used and is available.

Major Barry Adams gave the council the police department's report for February activity. That report showed: 390 total calls for service, including 17 non-injury accidents, 4 injury accidents, 26 total arrests, 2 DUI arrests, 18 drug charges, 35 traffic violations, 26 total criminal charges, 18 warrants served, 3 criminal summons served and 15 investigations opened.

On question, Mayor Mike Bryant said that several applications for the vacant Mt. Vernon police chief position had been received and he would make a recommendation to the council at the regular meeting in April.

According to Mt. Vernon Police reports, officers received a complaint of a domestic situation at Dr. Callie Shaffer's office in Mt. Vernon.

Upon arrival, social workers and doctors informed officers that Oakes' daughter had numerous bruises on her face. Doctors also said that Oakes would not let them examine her infant baby.

Oakes told officers that her daughter received the bruises because she "falls down all the time." She said that her daughter had visited neighbors and had returned home with a cut on her foot. She also said that she took

her daughter to the ER the next day and they said they couldn't glue the wound back together.

Oakes then went on to tell officers that the bruises on her daughter's face were caused by her jumping on the bed and from her falling down the steps.

However, doctors told officers that the bruises were consistent with abuse and not accidents. Officers also noticed that bruises on the girl's face were similar to the wedding rings that Oakes wears on her left hand. Both children were then placed into protective custody with social services.

Oakes was charged with first degree criminal abuse. She was lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center where she was later released on a \$7,500 cash/property bond.

According to Solid Waste Coordinator James Renner, Rockcastle Countians can drop off their unwanted household garbage, furniture, tires, mattresses, dryers, washers and refrigerators. However, Renner said they would not accept any gas tanks, propane tanks or any other liquid/hazardous materials.

Story of forgiveness to be portrayed at UNITE celebration

An unforgettable story of forgiveness will be portrayed at the annual UNITE Leadership Rally and Community Celebration Dinner on Saturday, April 11th at the Rockcastle County Middle School gymnasium at 5:30 p.m.

The keynote speaker for the event will be Renee Napier, who founded a non-profit organization dedicated to the memory of her daughter, Meagan, and her friend Lisa Jo Dickson who were killed in a vehicle accident caused by drunk driver Eric Smallridge in May of 2002.

In her presentation, Napier tells her story of how she eventually forgave

Smallridge for driving under the influence and causing the accident that claimed her daughter's life.

After the accident, Smallridge was sentenced to twenty-two years in prison and was later granted permission from the Florida Department of Corrections to share his testimony via Skype during Napier's presentations around the country.

Smallridge was released in November, 2012 after Napier asked the judge to reduce his sentence, saying she believed Smallridge was truly sorry for what he had done and that he deserved leniency.

The story of Napier forgiving Smallridge for her daughter's death and asking for his reduced sentence, inspired Christian musician Matthew West to write his song "Forgiveness," which is currently listed as one of

the top 10 songs on several Christian music charts.

The UNITE event is also being held to recognize several Rockcastle County churches, businesses, elected officials, parents and students for the great work they are doing in the fight against alcohol and substance abuse in Rockcastle County.

UNITE Clubs from Brodhead, Mt. Vernon and Roundstone elementary schools, Rockcastle County Middle School and Rockcastle County High School will also be recognized during the event and will be joined by a UNITE club from Page School Center from Bell County in a community choir performance.

Along with the school UNITE Clubs, the men's choir from Chad's Hope Treatment Center will share their testimonies of recovery with special music.

Mullins was charged with DUI, possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. He was lodged at the Rockcastle County Detention Center where he was later released on a \$2,000 unsecured bond.

Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share applications being accepted

The Rockcastle County Conservation District is now accepting Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Applications on a continuous basis. This continual sign-up is designed to make the program more "landowner friendly" and help address the needs of a landowner at any time during the year. As landowners plan conservation projects with the assistance of their local conservation district, they will be able to apply for financial assistance for those projects without having to wait for a designated sign up period.

Thousands of Kentucky landowners have received state assistance through the Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share program. Known informally as state cost share, the program was created in 1994 and helps landowners implement best management practices to protect soil and water resources on their property. Since the program's inception, more than \$129 million has been approved for use in implementing best management practices through more than 15,000 submitted applications. This money has as-

sisted landowners in all of Kentucky's 120 counties.

Many state cost share practices are offered through the state cost share program. Some examples are: agriculture and animal waste control facilities, streambank stabilization, animal waste utilization, vegetative filter strips, integrated crop management, pesticide containment, sinkhole protection, pasture and hay land forage quality and heavy use area protection. A list of all practices is available at <http://conservation.ky.gov/Pages/StateCostShare.aspx>.

The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share program is funded through the Tobacco Settlement Funds and the Kentucky Department of Agriculture. For the 2013 program year, \$2.5 million will be available to landowners across the state.

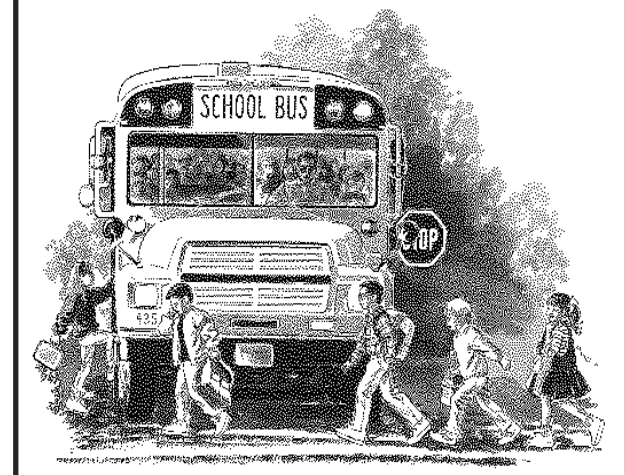

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP) - 2013
 The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, enacted on Jan. 2, 2013, amends the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 and provides for a one-year extension of the Direct and Counter-Cyclical (DCP) program. To be eligible for direct and counter-cyclical payments, producers must enroll their farms in DCP during the sign-up period which began on Feb. 19, 2013 and ends on Aug. 2, 2013.

Crop Acreage Reporting for NAP Producers
 To remain eligible for disaster assistance; producers participating in the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) are required to report acreage for which NAP assistance may be paid. The timeline for reporting such crops is as follows:

The established acreage reporting date which is July 15th for all crops except small grains and value loss crops

15 calendar days before the onset of harvest or grazing of the specific crop acreage being reported.

As a reminder, the final date for reporting of hay and/or pasture land is April 1st. For crops that were intended to be planted and a NAP policy was purchased but was not planted, a zero acreage report is required.

Crop Acreage Reporting
 Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds agricultural producers of the acreage reporting requirements that must be met prior to receiving program benefits. Filing an accurate acreage report for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage and prevented planting acreage, can prevent the loss of benefits for a variety of programs. July 15th is the final date to certify all crops, except small grains.

Producers must report acreages to maintain eligibility for Price Support Programs, Noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP). All cropland on farms must be certified to remain eligible for these programs

CRP Sign-up
 Kentucky Farm Service Agency (FSA) will conduct a four-week Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up beginning May 20, 2013 and ending on June 14, 2013. CRP addresses critical resource issues. In addition to erosion control, CRP provides significant water quality benefits including reduced nutrients and sediment loadings and adverse consequences associated with floods as well as expanded and enhanced wildlife habitat.

CRP is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and enhance wildlife habitat. Producers that are accepted in the sign-up can receive cost-share assistance for planting covers and receive an annual rental payment for the length of

the contract (10-15 years).

Friday Night is "End of an Era" for basketball at MVHS

(Reprinted from Mt. Vernon Signal, February 24, 1972)

The following article was printed during the last year of Mt. Vernon High School as a high school. The information was provided by Ethel Chesnut Owens, former school librarian. David Owens the editor has added some information. This article is part of the forthcoming book; Before Consolidation-The Golden Age of Rockcastle County Basketball.

The end of basketball for Mt. Vernon High School will come this Friday night when the Red Devils take on Williamsburg High School. It will also mark the end of a twenty-five year tenure of Jack Laswell as coach at Mt. Vernon High School. This is the longest career in Rockcastle history and one of the longest in Kentucky High School Basketball at one school.

Basketball really started at Mt. Vernon on the completion of the present high school building in the fall of 1927, and the first basketball team to play in the local gym was a good one, the 1927-28 team with a regular season record of 16-2 and a final mark of 22-3. This team, which won the 26th District, was composed of Robert Sparks, Other Hamlin, Ballard Clark, Carl Davis, Victor Hysinger, and Bill Cox and was coached by Jack Garrett. This team lost to the famous Carr Creek team 22 to 17 in the regional final at Richmond.

In 1930, Mt. Vernon High School won their second 26th district title, Marvin Fairchild was coach. On his team was

Bill Cox, Pete Sowder, Oscar Hayes, Stack Baker, and Bobby Oldham. The best team of the 1930s was probably the 1932 26th District champion team coached by Charlie Perkins. They went to the regional tournament played at Eastern Kentucky Teacher's College at Richmond where they lost in the championship game 35 to 26 to Waco High School. Starting group for this team was Stack Baker, Carl Baker, Oscar Fain, Bobby Oldham, Jim Hansel, Vernon Clark, and Charlie Hines. Another Mt. Vernon team of mention would be Coach Bill Landrum's 1935 50th District champions. They defeated Annville 27 to 20 in the finals. At the regional, played at Union College, they defeated Middlesboro 34 to 22 in the first round and in a rematch lost to Annville 26 to 20 in the region semi-finals. Annville went on to win the 13th region championship beating high powered Barbourville.

Bill Landrum, now an assistant principal at Mt. Vernon, coached from 1934-35 to 1941-42 and his 1940-41 team was outstanding until riddled by sickness and injuries just before tournament time. Despite those setbacks they managed to win the 46th district only to lose by seven points in the semi-finals of the region to defending state champion Hazel Green, a team they had beaten during the regular season. On this team were: Med Noe, Totise Noe, Jim Davis, Buddy Childress, Jim Cox, Curtis Harmon, Robert Harmon, Opp Bussell, and Millard Tallent. Jack Laswell

played at Mt. Vernon during the Landrum era and was Mt. Vernon's all time scorer until his mark was passed by Earl Noe in 1954 and Noe's mark in 1956 by Ken Cornelius. Laswell went on to star at Union College making All-Conference twice.

From 1942-43 to 1945-46 the Red Devils were coached by Albert Albright. The 1945-46 team won the district over Stanford on their home floor and lost in the regional at Lancaster to Hazel Green 38-34. Members of the team were Billy Kirby, Keith Arnold, Jack Bullock, Douglas Woodall, Millard Tallant, and Buddy Childress.

Coach Jack Laswell came in at the start of the 1946-47 season and it was during the 1950s that Mt. Vernon had outstanding teams, especially during the Earl Noe and Ken Cornelius years. During this period, the Red Devils went to the regional tournament six straight years.

The team that was the pride and joy of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County was the only team to ever represent Mt. Vernon in the state tournament, the team of 1953 composed of: All-State center Earl Noe, Charles Baker, Charles Shepherd, Manuel Shepherd, Earl Pittman, and a freshman starter Kenneth Cornelius. Cornelius was selected four straight years as an All-Regional player and in 1955 and 1956 as an All-State player. He was also selected to play in the 1956 East West Kentucky All-Star Classic.

The 1953 team won the right to go to the state tour-

namment by defeating the region favorite, Lily High School, 77-66. In the state tournament, the Red Devils played a great game against the number three ranked team in the state, Newport Catholic, but lost in overtime. Earl Noe scored 39 points in the game, a tournament record at the time, and made the All-Tournament team. Newport went

on to the semi-finals. Coach Laswell feels that the 1956 team was one of the best to ever play for Mt. Vernon. After winning the district, in the regional they defeated the two favorites but were themselves upset in the finals by former Brodhead Coach Joe Harper's Monticello team. That team which was the first Rockcastle team to

rank in the state's top ten was composed of Ken Cornelius, Billy Gregory, Billy Chaney, John Dale Helton, Keith Kincer, Billy J. Kinsel, and Bobby Sigmon. This team defeated the number one team in the state that year when they beat Berea High School twice in the regular season.

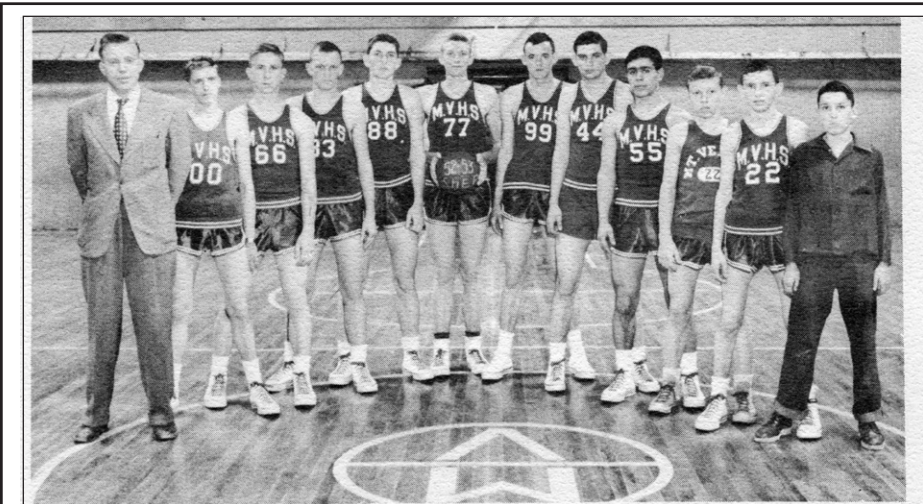

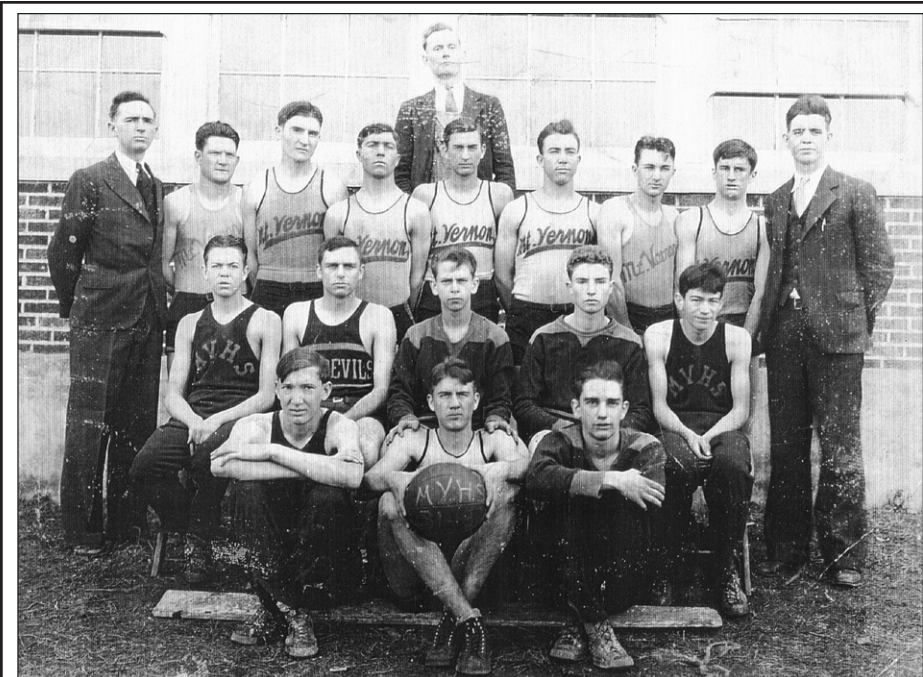

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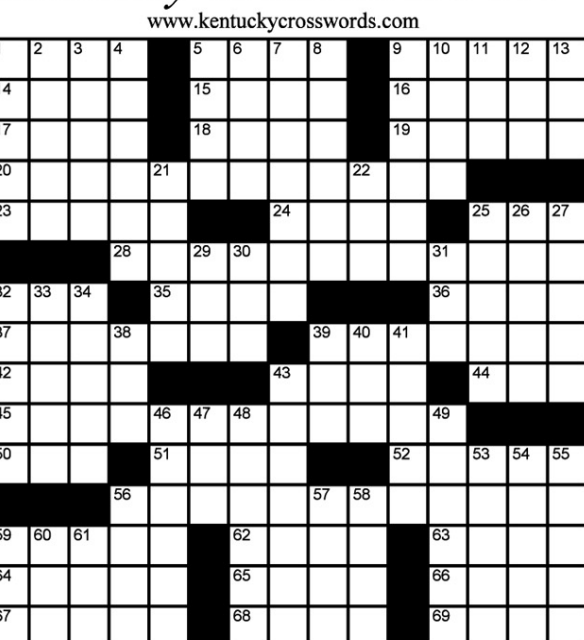

There have been a lot more victories (Laswell had over 300 wins to his credit) than defeats—but to me all boys who played and worked hard to develop their basketball skill were winners. During my years as coach, I have had wonderful cooperation from the administrators such as Clyde Linville, Mrs. Neureul Miracle, Cleston Saylor, and Charlie B. Parsons.” “I certainly appreciate the fine support given my teams through the years by the students of Mt. Vernon High School and the people of Rockcastle County.”

Coach Laswell went on to say. Fans of Mt. Vernon basketball are urged to help make history Friday night by attending the last basketball game of Mt. 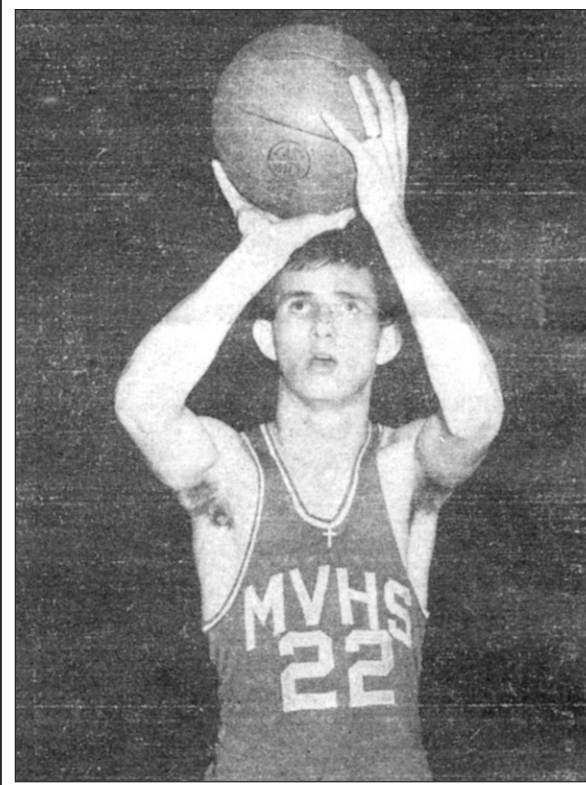

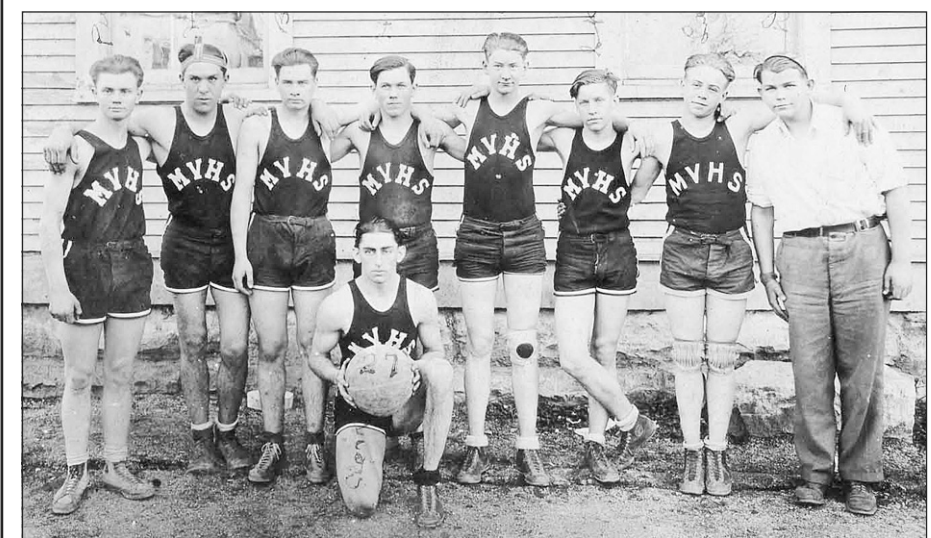
