Thinking About Cleaning Your Carpet? Some things to think about...

What is the best way to clean my carpet, should I use the old technology of steam cleaning or the new technology of dry foam?

Special Olympics Spring Games

The Special Olympics Kentucky Area 6 Spring Games will be held Saturday, April 20, at Meece Middle School in Somerset. The Area meet includes

nearly 225 athletes from Clay, Harlan, Knox, Laurel, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Wayne and Whitley Counties. The event gets underway with Opening Ceremonies, including the parade of athletes, at 9:45 a.m. The competition begins at 10:15. This is the second consecutive year Meece Middle School has hosted the event.

This is the second of four weekends of the Special Olympics Spring Games season, which concludes May 11 in Louisville. The Area 6 Spring Games is one of eight area track and field meets held statewide this year. In all, more than 1,500 athletes with intellectual disabilities throughout the state will participate in regional track and field competitions, making track and field the largest participation event in the Special Olympics program in Kentucky.

Participants in the Spring Games automatically qualify to compete in the Special Olympics Kentucky State Summer Games to be held May 31-June 2 at Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond.

Special Olympics is the world's largest program of sports training and competition for children and adults with intellectual disabilities. Participation in competitive events is open to all individuals eight years of age or older. Training and competition in local, area, state, and national programs is offered year-round in Kentucky in 15 sports. In addition to its traditional sports competitions, Special Olympics also offers early childhood programming through the Young Athletes Program and medical screenings through the Healthy Athletes Initiative. Special Olympics Kentucky has been changing the lives of people with intellectual disabilities in Kentucky for 43 years.

PROGRAM OPTIONS

There are two programs in Rockcastle County that offer free early childhood education services to qualifying four year old children. (Three year old children may be eligible with an identified disability.) The programs are: The Rockcastle County Public Preschool and Kentucky River Foothills Head Start.

WHAT TO BRING FOR REGISTRATION

Please bring your child's state birth certificate, social security card, immunization certificate, proof of income and proof of medical coverage (i.e. medical card or insurance card) to register. Call your school with any questions and to make an appointment to register your child.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

The following health requirements must be met in order to enroll in the early childhood program and kindergarten.

- Physical exam
- Blood pressure and lead screening
- Dental exam
- Vision exam
- Immunizations

Early Childhood & Kindergarten REGISTRATION & SCREENING

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible for **Rockcastle County Public Preschool**, your child must be 4 years old by October 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

1. Be eligible for Free Lunch
2. Have a disability
3. Three year olds may be eligible with an identified disability
4. Non-qualifying four year olds may attend the Early Childhood program as space allows

To be eligible for **Head Start**, your child must be 4 years old by October 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

1. Meet Federal Income Guidelines
2. Have a disability
3. Be eligible for Public Assistance (SSI, K-TAP, Child Care Subsidy)
4. Meet guidelines for being considered a homeless family
5. Reside in a foster home

What is a disability?

A delay in one or more of the following areas is considered a disability:

1. Speech and language
2. Large and fine motor
3. Cognitive skills
4. Social and emotional
5. Self-help skills

Students will only be enrolled by verifying residence within a school's attendance zone.

Mt. Vernon Council names Brian Carter as new chief

Mt. Vernon Police Sgt. Brian Carter, a 9-year veteran of the force, was named chief of police at Monday night's regular meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

In recommending Carter to the council, Mayor Mike Bryant noted that all seven applicants were considered and all were interviewed. "It was a daunting task," Bryant said, "and it was hard to narrow it down to one person."

Bryant went on to say that Carter, who has been filling in as chief since the resignation of Kevin Fletcher in January of this year, had the leadership ability needed for the position and the respect of the other officers. "I hope this appointment will be for a long time and we won't have to keep repeating this process," Bryant said.

Carter's appointment creates a vacancy that will have to be filled, Bryant said. He also told the council that another vacancy exists because of the resignation of Jeff Harness which will be effective April 20th. Harness is leaving to accept a similar position in Berea. "We need to be aggressive in filling these positions," the mayor told the council.

John Craft of Craft, Noble and Co. presented the council with their 2012 audit.

Craft told the council that the audit contained a "qualified opinion" because information from the tourism board audit was not incorporated. Craft said the tourism audit contained "glaring errors" to the extent that it could not be included with the city's audit. "It's no fault of the city or the tourism board," Craft said, "we asked that the audit be reissued but, to date, it hasn't been." Craft said that the problem caused the city's audit to be held up for presentation from December to April. Craft said the audit had to be issued by March 31st because of "bonding issues."

His recommendation to the council was that perhaps Mayor Bryant could talk to the chairman of the tourism board to get the matter resolved. "This could potentially be a real problem," Craft said.

As to the city's audit,

Craft said the city's water and sewer department's assets increased by \$1.63 million while the general fund's assets decreased by \$104,000 because of the payments on the city's fire truck. He told the council that the city was doing well, better than a lot of other cities.

In other action, Mayor Bryant told the council that there was some good news about the insurance premium tax. "There have been five areas of the city that we

The burning ban is part of a statewide ban which makes it unlawful for anyone to set fires within 150 feet of any woodland or brushland areas between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.

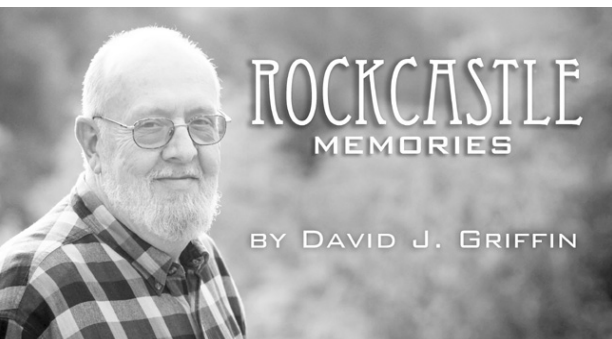

Cox Hardware – The End of a Legend

For my entire lifetime, I have been a customer and devotee of the legendary Cox Hardware store on Main Street in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky. I was recently saddened to learn that the fabled business will be auctioned on April 26 and ending a 106-year-old history of service to countless individuals who have passed through its doors. The Cox family has provided sales, service, and southern hospitality for immeasurable customers, and they will be sorely missed. This marks the end of an era for downtown Mt. Vernon.

My first memory of Cox Hardware is from a time when I was approximately six years old when I accompanied my grandfather (Pop) to purchase a stove-pipe for our home Warm Morning stove. Each time he ventured into the legendary store, he joined several other customers and a few loafers sitting around the big, old potbellied stove inside the store. This time was no different; we settled into the circle of chairs provided by then-owner, John Cox. I loved listening to the stories that were told around that ring of older gentlemen.

Most of the time when I visited the store with Pop, it was to buy some item that we needed on our small farm, which was located in the Pine Grove section of Rockcastle County. Occasionally, Pop simply visited the store in order to chat with his friends who also made their way to the business. Pop always referred to the store as “the hardware store” – as if it were the only one in existence – because to him, it was the only place to go to acquire whatever items he needed. Pop was very loyal to Cox Hardware, and I carried that devotion as if it were something that was handed down to me.

My first pocket knife was purchased in that legendary store. I remember the story very well. Pop and I were sitting under a shade tree in this yard one Saturday afternoon, and I was watching him whittle on a small piece of cedar that he had cut for that very purpose. I asked if I could use his knife to see if I could also learn the art of whittling, and he began to demonstrate to me the safety measures of the manly art.

After watching me for a few minutes, he said, “David Joe, I think it is time you had your own knife. Why don’t we drive down

to Cox Hardware and see if we can find one that you like.” I was overwhelmed with joy at the prospect of having my own knife.

I specifically remember getting into Pop’s 1951 Chevy and driving down to Mt. Vernon to get my first pocket knife. As soon as we walked into the store, John Cox met us at the door. Pop said, “John, I need to buy my grandson a pocket knife. What do you recommend?” Mr. Cox calmly walked behind the counter and then handed to Pop a four-blade, stag-handled, Boker Tree brand knife. Pop examined each blade and carefully inspected the handles. He then handed the knife over to me and asked, “What do you think, David Joe?” You cannot imagine the amount of excitement residing in that eight-year-old boy.

I said, “Can we get it, Pop?” And, of course, we did. When we left the store, my first knife was tucked safely in my jeans pocket. I don’t believe that I have ever been without a pocket knife since that eventful Saturday.

Claude Cox first opened the hardware store in 1907. His son John started working with his father on a full-time basis after he returned from World War II. John spent his entire life in loyal service to his customers. The day that he met his Maker, he was working behind the counter. It was February 6, 2001, and John was 82 years of age.

Following a career in education, John’s son Jimmy began working at the store in 1997 after he retired. His wife, Martha, worked with John beginning in 1976. Jimmy once noted, “Marty actually saved the store.”

Martha loved being involved in the family business. She reflected, “I loved the smell of the hardwood floors and the big old stove, where countless customers and friends have gathered for many, many years. I would not trade the thirty-seven years that I spent at Cox Hardware for anything. I learned that people from all walks of life are very important, and they all have such interesting and valuable stories to tell. I will miss these people and their stories most of all.”

She mused about the closing of the store. “It breaks my heart to have to sell the business. The store has outlived our customers. This was the best place in the world to work. I will

Points East

If you were searching for a Diabetes Poster Family, mine and Loretta’s might, at least, make your list of finalists.

I have type II diabetes, an affliction that ultimately killed my grandfather, as well as one aunt and one uncle. Our son, Christopher has had type I since he was around 10 years old. Now, at the tender age of 35, Chris has had so many, harrowing, comatose, close calls with death that we’ve literally lost count.

Our 4-year-old grandson, Tyler Kane Ochs, was diagnosed with Type I before he reached his third birthday. During the first year of the onset of Tyler’s disease, he had to have at least 6 blood tests a day and as many insulin injections. Try explaining that to a kid who is just learning to talk coherently.

If there is such a thing though, Tyler is one of the lucky diabetic kids. His mom, our daughter, Jennifer is a well-experienced, first-grade teacher, has a master’s degree in early childhood education, and her husband, Kevin Ochs, runs a highly respected physical therapy clinic in Richmond, KY. Suffice to say that Tyler’s parent’s have been understandings of the ways that diabetes affects both his behavior and his physical development.

When Chris was diagnosed, Loretta and I were in states of manageable panic for several years. We read tons of literature published by the American Diabetes Association (ADA), talked to the few other parents we could find and drove several doctor’s crazy with “here’s the situation/what do we do now?” types of calls.

Compared to what the boys have gone through, managing my disease has been nothing more than a minor irritation. Sort of like comparing a gnat bite to a rattlesnake’s. I simply have to watch what I eat and remember to take a pill twice a day. Nothing, at the store, goes into our grocery cart before we’ve read the sugar and carbohydrate content analysis on the container. In the final analysis, except for the daily metformin, I don’t do anything that anyone concerned with healthy living ought to be doing.

Thanks to research and development, mostly spearheaded by ADA, both Chris and Tyler now have access to medicine and medical devices that make managing their diseases far more affordable, convenient, accurate and much less painful than they were just a few short years ago.

Both of them still have to do blood tests several times a day, but even Tyler can do his own. Tyler even has a computerized insulin pump that only has to be changed every couple of days instead of having to have needle injections of insulin 6 times a day. He can also do pretty much anything any other kid his age can manage and he could probably tear up an anvil if he put his mind to it.

Still, diabetes requires that Tyler as well as his parents, his brother, his grandparents, other extended family, teachers and friends be aware and even alert to the fact that he has the disease. Diabetes is a humungous burden for a child to bear and, at least until he reaches adulthood, it’s going to a huge emotional burden for Tyler’s parents and the rest of us who know and love him.

So, we do what we can to support and encourage research that may ultimately lead to a cure for this monster. We also believe that there is not a disease related charity in the world that is doing more to address the purpose for which it was

founded than the American Diabetes Foundation.

As we did last year on the first Saturday in June, Tyler Kane Ochs, his family and several of his and our close friends will assemble at Keeneland as “Team TKO” and join several thousand other ADA supporters in the annual Step Out Walk to Stop Diabetes.

I may well be in a wheel chair, but I intend to manage a least a mile around the trail and Tyler may have to be in my lap if he gets tired.

I’m simply asking readers of my column to make a cash donation and help sponsor Team TKO again this year. Last year you helped Team TKO contribute over \$2,500 to Step Out. We don’t really have a goal in mind this year but we’d like to top last year. The Keeneland walk, last year, raised over a quarter million dollars and was one of the most successful in the nation.

Strange... But True?

The Miraculous Power of the Spear of Destiny, Part II

In the last column of “Strange But True?” we looked at the Spear of Destiny, the spear that is said to have pierced the side of Christ.

This week we will conclude the study into the spear’s historic past and its mysterious power, and those who have sought to possess it.

In the 10th century, the Holy Roman Emperors came into possession of it from the time of Otto (912-973). In 1084, Henry IV had a silver band with the inscription, “Nail of Our Lord” added to it. Constantine is believed to have added a nail used in the Crucifixion to it. Around 1350, Charles IV had a golden sleeve put over the silver band which read, “Lance and Nail of the Lord”. In 1424 the lance and other relics were moved to Nuremberg. During the French Revolution the relics were moved to Vienna for safekeeping. In 1806 the Holy Roman Empire was disbanded and possession fell to the Habsburgs. During World War II, General George S. Patton returned the lance to Austria.

In 2005 Dr. Robert Feather, an English metallurgist and technical engineering writer, was given

special permission to test the lance for a documentary. He removed the delicate bands of gold and silver to discover that the spearhead is probably from the 7th century. Discovered in the same study was the nail that was supposedly used in the Crucifixion. The nail, indeed, did prove to be consistent in length and shape of a 1st century Roman nail.

The third lance (the first was discovered in the previous column was in Rome) is in Armenia. It is thought to have been brought there by the Apostle Thaddeus. In 1655, the French traveler, Jean Baptiste Tavernier was the first westerner to see the relic. In 1805, it was moved to Georgia and then later back to Armenia. The Holy Lance has a diamond shaped iron open work, a Greek cross. Therefore, this lance could not be the lance used at the time of the Crucifixion.

Antioch claims to have a Holy Lance, as does Krakow, Poland. Many accounts attribute mystical powers to the lance. Adolph Hitler was obsessed by the spear, and started World War II in order to capture it. According to legend, losing the spear would result in death. That was fulfilled when General George S. Patton gained the spear and Hitler

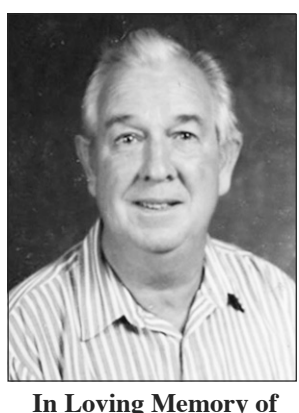

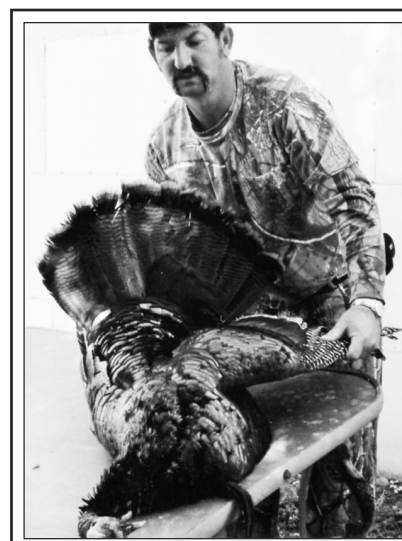

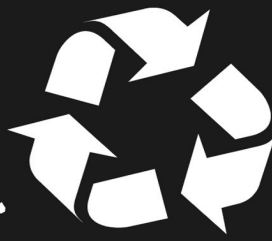

An encouraging word:

Something More Important

Soon after arrival in Milan on a beautiful August afternoon, we were taken to Cathedral Square,

the center of Milanese traffic, to view the famous cathedral for which the Square is named and for

which Milan is known. That visit was most interesting, and it became a time for serious reflection about some serious and important things.

The cathedral in Milan, begun in 1386 and completed in 1813 after 427 years by order of Napoleon, was magnificent to behold. Built of brick and encased in marble, the cathedral is ornate in style, and it is described as being "very elaborately gothic." Huge in size, it is the third largest cathedral in the world, only St. Peter's Basilica in Rome and the cathedral in Seville, France are larger. We were told by the guide that the cathedral contains 126,000 square feet of floor space, and that it can hold 40,000 people. Now, that's a big church. With 4,440 turrets, pinnacles, and statues of various styles and periods, the cathedral is reputed to be the most elaborately decorated and the most beautiful cathedral in the world.

Following a tour through the cavernous Cathedral, we were taken to the west end of Cathedral Square to view the cathedral from a different perspective. That experience led to some serious contemplation about the significance of things.

We do, and should, build beautiful building for worship, and that is a good thing. But there is something more important. There is a temple that is greater than any physical structure that may be built. Almost two thousand years ago, a man writing to his friends in the Greek city of Corinth reminded them of a significant fact: "Your body is a temple," and the Spirit of God dwells in it. Therefore, "you are not your own." Care must be taken so that that temple is maintained in a way that its true beauty is always evident, and at all times, it is worthy of its intended purpose.

Tapp chairman of Circuit Judges Education Committee

Circuit Court Judge David Tapp was recently appointed chairman of the Circuit Judges Education Committee.

Tapp was appointed chairman by the president of the Kentucky Association of Judges, Circuit Court Judge Paul F. Isaacs.

The Circuit Judges Education Committee plans educational programs for circuit judges and is responsible for ensuring that all 146 of Kentucky's circuit judges meet the continuing education requirements for their position.

Circuit court judges are required to obtain at least 25 continuing education hours per biennium. They receive education hours on topics such as courtroom technology, substance abuse, evidence and procedure, family dynamics, security, decorum and conduct, sentencing theory, access to justice, translation services and legal writing.

Tapp said that he is thrilled to lead this important committee and he will ensure that the committee will continue to provide the quality education that circuit court judges have been fortunate to receive in the past several years.

"It can be difficult to provide sufficient training given the many rapidly developing and novel legal issues that confront circuit judges," Tapp said. "We provide continuing education to circuit judges in so many different areas. We've done a good job up to now and I expect us to only get better in the coming years."

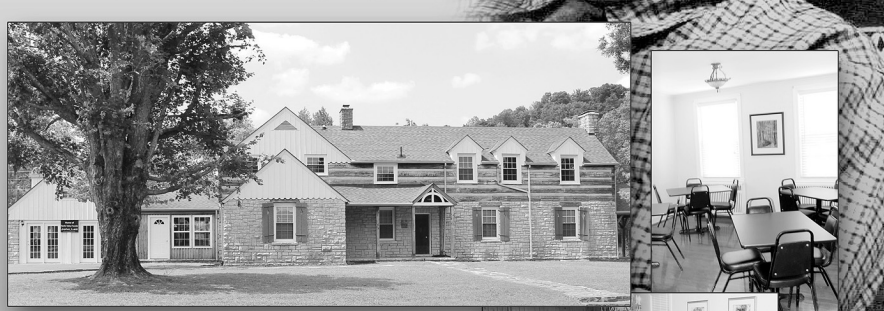

Money Tips for Students

Students should follow budget

One financial goal for students is to have money at the end of every month. These tips from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) may help you set up a budget to track the money you make versus the money you spend.

Knowing how and when you get your money and where you spend it is the foundation of financial planning. You create a budget by estimating how much money you'll make each month and how much you'll spend. It's a great way to avoid running out of money when you need it most.

You must be honest with yourself when completing your budget. If you write down everywhere you spend money over a month's time, you will get a clear picture of your wasteful spending. Once you know where your weaknesses with money are, you can work on correcting them. If you have more expenses than

you have income to cover, your income will have to go up, or your expenses will have to go down.

Having a budget in place will also help you save for a vacation, a new car or college. Determine how much you need to set aside to reach your goal, and build that into your budget. Move the money into a savings account so you won't be tempted to spend it before you meet your goal.

The thought of doing a monthly budget scares people, but they aren't difficult. The difficult part is being deliberate with your spending. Once you budget an amount for an expense, stick to that amount. If you spend more in one category, you will have to take that money from another category.

PARENT SBDM NOMINATION FORM April 2013

Parent members of the SBDM Council must be the parent, stepparent, or foster parent, of a child who will be enrolled at the school during the term of office. Legal guardians are also considered parents if the child lives with them. Parent members may not have a conflict of interest as defined by KRS Chapter 45A, which deals with doing business with the district. They must not be Brodhead Elementary School or Central Office employees, relatives of Brodhead Elementary School or Central Office employees, and members of the district school board or spouse of district school board member. Parents employed at other schools in our district and their relatives may serve as parent members of our council. For this purpose "relative" is defined as either a "father, mother, brother, sister, husband, wife, son, daughter, aunt, uncle, son-in-law, or daughter-in-law."

The Parent Teacher organization shall oversee the election of two parents to serve on the council. These parents shall be selected during the month of May each year. All parents (except those previously excluded) who will have children attending Brodhead Elementary School during their term shall be eligible to be elected to serve on the council. All parents who will have children attending the school are eligible to vote in the parent elections.

The term of office begins on July 1, 2013 and ends on June 30, 2014. All terms of office for teachers and parent council members shall be for one year with re-election permitted as long as they meet the eligibility requirements. No term limits shall be imposed on members who are nominated and elected to consecutive one-year terms. (KRS 160.345)



Complaint leads police to four one-step meth labs

Three people were arrested for manufacturing meth last Wednesday after police responded to a social services complaint at a residence on Maple Grove Road in Orlando.

Arrested at the scene were Donald Charlton, 18, of Somerset; Sherry Lee Miller, 47, of Mt. Vernon and William Glenn Mink, 54, of Brodhead.

According to state police reports, troopers Scottie Pennington and Ryan Loudermilk received a complaint from a social services worker about a couple manufacturing meth and using drugs in the presence of two

children at the residence. Once officers arrived, they were greeted by the couple, Miller and Mink, at the front door. While the four were talking, Charlton jumped out a back bedroom window and fled on foot into the woods behind the home. Pennington pursued Charlton on foot for several minutes and was unable to locate him.

Upon further investigation, officers noticed that Charlton had dropped a duffel bag containing an HCL gas generator, which is used in the production of manufacturing meth.

After searching the residence, officers found two active and two inactive one-

step meth labs. Officers also found numerous other items associated with methamphetamine including lithium batteries, burnt aluminum foil, salt, coffee filters and a blue snorting tube.

During the search, Charlton came back to the residence to reportedly "look for his duffel bag" and was apprehended at the scene.

Officers also found five Clonazepam tablets on Miller at the time of her arrest.

While Mink was sitting in the police cruiser, Pennington overheard him telling a neighbor to "take care of his dogs" and "get that shotgun out of the house." Officers later located a shotgun inside the master bedroom and discovered that it was reported as stolen from KSP Post 7 in Richmond. Miller told officers that she had bought the shotgun from a man in Brodhead for \$50.

All three admitted to cooking meth inside the residence around the two children. They also admitted to "smoking meth" earlier in the day.

The two children and the three suspects had to be decontaminated by the Mt. Vernon Fire Department and Rockcastle EMS. After the decontamination, the two children were taken into protective custody and social services placed them with foster parents.

All three were charged with manufacturing methamphetamine, drug paraphernalia and controlled substance endangerment to a child, third degree.

Charlton was separately charged with fleeing or evading police on foot. Mink was separately charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and Miller was

separately charged with possession of a controlled substance, third degree. Both Mink and Miller were also charged with receiving stolen property (firearm.)

All three remain lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.

Orlando woman arrested for drug possession

An Orlando woman was arrested for drug possession Tuesday morning after police made a traffic stop on Big Cave Road in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Ashley N. French, 26, of Orlando.

According to state police reports, Trooper Scottie Pennington made the stop after observing French's vehicle traveling 66 mph in a 55 mph zone while driving in the middle of the roadway.

When French saw Pennington was trying to initiate the traffic stop, she pulled off on the left side of the roadway and attempted to flee on foot into the woods. Pennington pursued French on foot and arrested her at the scene.

Pennington observed French was acting like a "wild animal" and that she appeared extremely intoxicated while she was performing field sobriety tests. He also reported that French appeared to be under the influence of a controlled substance after noticing a white residue around her nose.

When Pennington asked French her name she told him to "find out his own self" and "she wasn't telling him anything."

After searching the vehicle, Pennington found a bag containing several needles and a spoon that was burned on the bottom. He also found a snorting straw and a pill bottle containing eight Ultram tablets.

French was charged with possession of a controlled substance, drug paraphernalia, fleeing or evading police on foot, DUI, reckless driving, driving on a DUI suspended license, speeding and failure to wear seatbelt. She remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$3,500 cash/property bond.

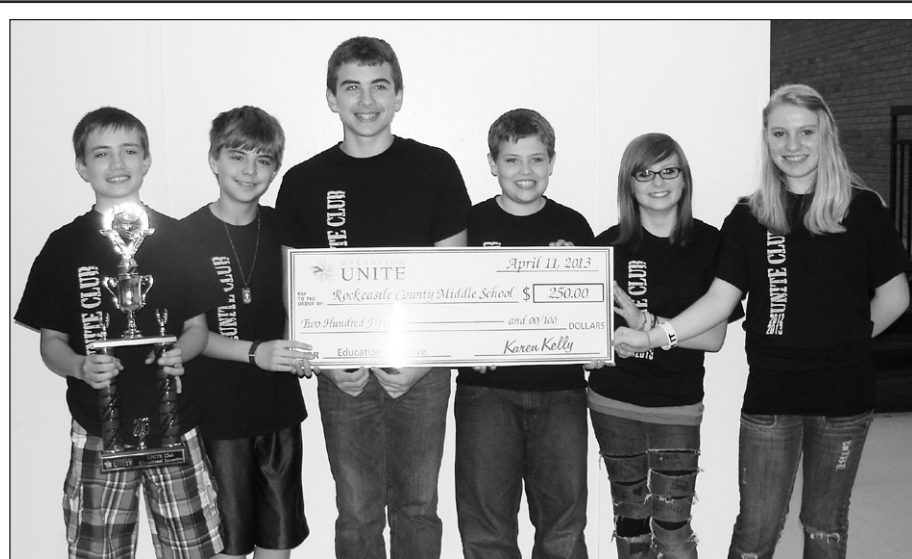
GRANNY BURTON'S POTATO CROQUETTE

This is my favorite way to use up leftover mashed potatoes. A couple of years ago while visiting Rhonda, some of her friends from church dropped by. Rhonda had told them so much about these very tasty croquettes; they asked me to make them some. They agreed that these were as good as we always thought they were. 1 large egg, divided 25 saltine crackers, crumbled and divided 1 and 1/2 cups cold leftover mashed potatoes 4 tablespoons vegetable or

canola oil
1/2 onion, chopped fine
Divide egg and put yolk in a large bowl. Put the egg white in a smaller shallow bowl. In another small shallow bowl put all but 1/3 cup of the cracker crumbs. Add potatoes to the large bowl with the egg yolk. Add onions and 1/3 cup of the crumbled crackers. Mix thoroughly. Set back in refrigerator to cool for about 15 minutes. This makes the croquettes easier to shape. Beat the egg white with a fork until frothy and doubles in volume. Shape the potato mixture into 6 triangle shaped tubes (or into patties). Roll each croquette in the egg and then in the cracker crumbs. Press cracker crumbs in to the mixture until evenly coated. Put oil in large non-stick skillet. Heat on medium-high. When hot, carefully place the croquettes in skillet. Let brown, about 3 minutes. Turn with spatula so the second side is in the oil. Brown. Turn again so the third side gets brown. This process should take about 15 minutes. Serve hot.

SALMON PATTIES

1 can (15 ounce) salmon
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 eggs (or egg substitute equivalent)
1/2 cup cornmeal
Drain salmon; discard bones and skin. Place salmon in small bowl; add onion, eggs and cornmeal. Mix well. Form into six patties. Spray skillet or small indoor grill like the George Foreman® with Pam or use vegetable oil to coat skillet. Heat and add patties. Cook 10 minutes on medium high heat for each side. NOTE: You can also add 1/4 cup chopped green bell pepper or celery.

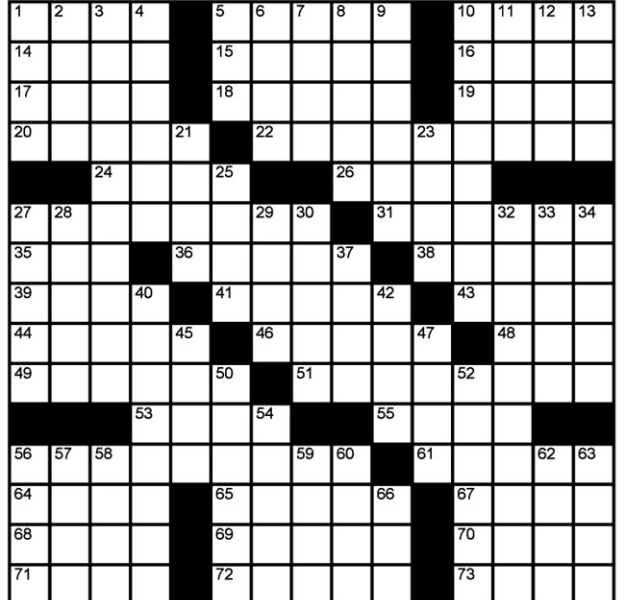
