There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight: A Story of Spontaneous Human Combustion

During my junior or senior year of high school I remember having a teacher who was captivated by an unusual supernatural event and spoke of it quite often. I didn't give it much thought at the time, but since have wondered about it myself. The strange occurrence is "spontaneous human combustion". SHC is the mysterious phenomenon of a person just bursting into flames for no apparent reason. The flames burn very hot and are extremely localized. The body is usually totally consumed, leaving only the extremities on most occasions. Objects near the charred body are relatively untouched by the intense heat. It is a rare occasion in that only about two hundred cited cases have been noted around the world over three hundred years as of 1995.

Some of the natural explanations that may give some insight to the cause of this phenomenon is abnormally high or raised levels of blood alcohol. Others include smoking, not consuming enough fluids or an external source of ignition such as dropping a cigarette. Ketosis is a possible factor caused by alcoholism or low-carbohydrate dieting that produces acetone, which is highly flammable, in the body.

Other explanations are

supernatural and biblical. Numbers 11:1 refers to the anger of the Lord being kindled and a fire consuming some of the ancient Israelites because they complained. Some say it may be the result of high-energy particles or gamma rays, or even ball lightning from a thunderstorm.

The torso is the focus of the fire. There is no accelerant noted and damage is limited to the body, leaving the surrounding objects almost untouched. The victim is usually alone at the time of death, and is thought to be alive when the fire started. Some other characteristics in common with each victim is that they are people with low mobility due to age or obesity and poor health.

SHC has proven to be a popular topic in literature. Authors such as Charles Brockdere Brown, Nikolai Gogol, Charles Dickens, Jules Verne, Bob Shaw, and Michael Scott have written about it. It has been the focus in film and on TV shows such as CSI, Dead Like Me, Fringe, NCIS, and video games by Playstation.

1 package (16 ounce) mini bow tie pasta

A former RCHS graduate experienced the Boston bombing events firsthand this past week.

Josh Nation, 24, of Mt. Vernon is attending graduate school at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, which is situated directly north of Boston across the Charles River.

When the two bombs exloded during the Boston Marathon last Monday afternoon, killing 3 people and wounding 282 others, Nation said he was playing basketball with some friends at an MIT gymnasium when a friend came inside and told them he had heard what sounded like two explosions coming from downtown Boston.

"A friend of mine was taking a break from playing

basketball and had stepped outside the gym for a few minutes," Nation said. "By some crazy coincidence, the bombs were actually detonated during the time he was outside and he heard the explosions from across the

Shortly after, Nation and his friends learned that two bombs had exploded near the finish line of the Boston marathon and that some people had been killed during the explosions. Nation said he was immediately concerned about the safety of some of his friends who were at the marathon.

"I had several friends who were downtown volunteering for the race and I was immediately worried about them," Nation said. "Thankfully, they were all safe and none of them were at the finish line during the time of the explosions but they were certainly close enough to be frightened."

Nation said that last Monday was a day he will never forget for the rest of his life. He said police were "racing into the city" and that all modes of transportation were shutdown in Boston and surrounding areas. He also said that the cell phone towers were experiencing technical difficulties due to the high volume of calls they were receiving from people who were concerned about loved ones in Boston.

Nation said he was able to contact his family and let them know he was alright. However, he said everyone was on high alert as the people responsible for the bombings hadn't been cap-

"Everyone felt uneasy knowing the terrorists were still out there and probably in our city as no one knew who they were or where they were," Nation said.

"Did they have more targets? Were they going to place bombs on a college campus next? No one knew for sure and that was very frightening.'

Boston and surrounding areas remained on high alert last Tuesday and Wednesday. Last Thursday, the FBI released pictures of the two suspects and asked the public to help identify them.

A few hours after the photos were released, the two suspects killed an MIT police officer during a gunfight on MIT's campus around 10 p.m. Nation said he was still on campus when the shootout erupted.

"Some friends and I were on campus working on a project late last Thursday night when all of the sudden we saw probably twenty cop cars speeding down the street outside our building," Nation said. "One of my friends had a police scanner

Facilities Plans details renovations and construction projects needed

Over \$36 million in needs for new construction and renovations to Rockcastle County Schools was detailed in the District Facilities Plan adopted at a special meeting of the board of education Tuesday night.

Scott Noel, of Clotfelter Samokar, was the hearing officer for the meeting and conducted a public hearing on the plan prior to the special meeting. Noel told the board that the most pressing need for the

district at this time was a new roof for Mt. Vernon Elementary and the high school, which would conservatively cost between \$3.5 and \$4 million. "The roof at Mt. Vernon is failing and it is going to get worse," Noel told the board. At the high school, the main concern, besides the roof,

is the eight foot wrap around the entire school at the top of the outside wall. "This was a new concept at the time the school was designed," Noel said, "and was used widely throughout the state. It was less expensive then traditional materials but it has broken down and water is getting behind it and causing damage to the building."

Superintendent David Pensol said Wednesday that he expected work to begin at Mt. Vernon and the high school within the next year.

The middle school came in for its share of discussion since the price tag for renovations needed, according to the plan, is \$14,170,349. Noel said the cost for replacing the (Cont. to A7)

nails, shrapnel, ball bearings and black powder. Personally, it grieves me to know that there are five families who have now lost someone that may have been their child, grandchild, parent, spouse, sibling, significant other, distant rela-

tive or friend. It was also disturbing to hear that there were several amputations of limbs and that some people lost their hearing due to ruptured ear drums as a result of the loud explosions.

Regardless of their circumstances or situations, over 300 lives and the lives of their families have drastically changed as a result of these bombings and the events that followed in the capturing of the suspects.

A lot of people tend to lose sight of this fact in all

Because Pop was able to develop friendships with the owners of each store, I thought he had one of the most interesting jobs in the world. To me, all he did was drive around and talk to people – fascinating people as far as I was concerned. In the summer months when school was not in session, he allowed me to accompany him on his daily rounds.

When Pop took me with him, he gave me permission to get a snack in some of the stores that we visited. If it was almost time for lunch, he and I often chose a baloney sandwich with a RC Cola. That was enough to tide us over until we returned home for dinner. If it was mid-morning or midafternoon, I was still usually allowed to purchase a treat. (You know how growing boys are – always hungry.)

In 1954, I discovered a new treat that had just come out by the Topps Company. It was a small square of bubble gum wrapped in wax paper that also included a miniature comic about the character Bazooka Joe and his Gang. I remember buying my first Bazooka Joe bubble gum at Mr. Chaney's grocery on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

After the purchase, Pop was chatting with Mr. Chaney, while I opened the small package and found the "funny" and told Pop that I wanted to get a few more of the bubble gum packages. He agreed because the cost was only five cents per package. I opened each set and put the bubble gum into one of the wrappers so I could hold the comics together. I found one of the com-

ics on the internet that reminded me of how funny they were. It was a fourpanel comic showing Joe riding his bicycle. He was showing off for his girlfriend. The first panel shows him riding with no hands, saying "Look, no hands!" The second frame showed him standing on the seat saying, "Look, no feet!" The third scene was him riding the bicycle into a tree and smashing his bike into mere pieces. The final frame was his girlfriend saying, "Look, no bike!"

Of course, since the product was bubblegum, the comics were designed for children to read. There were no important lessons to learn or vast amounts of educational philosophy to acquire. It was just good clean fun in the form of miniature com-

The Topps Company also made it completely clear that the patch over Joe's eye was just for him to have fun. He was not injured; nor did not have a medical problem - he was just playing. The company also made clear that the word Bazooka was not related to a rocketlauncher but was instead a reference to the brass musical instrument of the same

The comic strip was written by cartoonist Wesley Morse. He modeled the character Bazooka Joe after his own seven-year-old son, Talley. Talley inspired his father by his own antics, which would then follow a





the news but we must remember to pray for those who lost loved ones or who were affected in a negative

Many Americans shared their condolences on their social media accounts for the families of the dead and wounded. Several other Americans also shared their opinions on their social media accounts about whether or not lawmakers would try to ban bomb making materials just as congress and our President tried to ban assault weapons after the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in Decem-

Quite frankly, I am tired of seeing all the issues of these mass murders being carelessly debated by our puppets (oops, I am sorry) 'politicians'' in Washington

Sure, our politicians can ban guns and pressure cookers. But I often wonder if they can seriously sleep

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easy at night and actually believe that by banning these items, they have prevented other mass murders from happening in the future. What are they going to do when some of these other imbeciles or terrorists use airplanes, trains or automobiles to kill a large number of people? Are you going to ban those next?

After the September 11 attacks, I don't remember anyone blaming the airplanes for the murders of hundreds of innocent people. I often find myself wondering what changed our country's thought process since the September 11 attacks but in every mass murder since then, our country has blamed the weapons instead of the mur-

I have never understood why some of our politicians, as well as other people in our country, want to continuously blame the weapons for the mass murders instead of the murderers themselves.

It wouldn't surprise me to hear in the news that some of our politicians are purposing to ban large pressure cookers like the ones used in the Boston Marathon bombings. Seriously, I really believe a lot of out politicians are ignorant enough to propose such leg-

Sorry to be so dramatic, but I have never been able to comprehend the logic behind trying to ban weapons that people use in mass murders. I understand that they are trying to ban these weapons for the betterment and safety of the people, but I still believe it leaves us spinning our wheels in trying to prevent mass murders from happening in the fu-

For these reasons, I believe the issue of preventing mass murders is not being accurately addressed at the "core" of the problem, which are the murderers themselves.

Studies have shown that the majority of people who think about committing these mass murders often leave clues to people who are close to them.

Before the Oklahoma City bombing in 1995, Timothy McVeigh sent letters to multiple people explaining his plan about the bombing. He also asked one of friends to participate in

the bombing with him. McVeigh's friend declined but he didn't inform the authorities about McVeigh's

Prior to the 2012 Aurora movie theatre shooting, the sole suspect James Eagan Holmes met with at least three mental health professionals, while he was a student at the University of Colorado. During the meetings, Holmes allegedly left drawings portraying someone shooting other people in a room. However, no one reported the disturbing drawings to anyone. Details have already

emerged about one of the Boston bombing suspects giving clues and hints about his plans for the bombings on his social media accounts. I am sure as the investigations continues, officials will eventually discover that one of the suspects told someone about their plans and that they didn't tell authorities. This seems to happen every time in mass murders as people always fail to warn authorities about the threats being

After studying all these cases of different mass murders, I discovered that the majority of the suspects often leave clues of their plans. This is why I believe we must always take their threats seriously if we want to prevent these mass murders from happening in the

When trying to find a solution to these problems, we must remember the simple phrase "weapons don't kill people, people kill people." Instead of focusing on the weapons that murderers use to kill people, we should focus on the murderers themselves and try to observe warning signs in their comments and actions before they commit such atrocities. By doing these things I believe we can possibly prevent other mass murders in the future.

As much as Arbor Day is in the news, now is a good time to ask where does this holiday come from, and A man named J. Sterling

Morton moved from Michigan to Nebraska in the 1800's and found almost no trees. He missed the trees he was used to, and came up with the idea for a tree planting holiday on January 4, 1872. So, the Nebraska legislature took the idea and passed the first Arbor Day law. Arbor Day was celebrated that year on April 10, 1872, and over a million trees were planted in Nebraska on that day.

Today the J. Sterling Morton Arboretum in Nebraska City, Nebraska commemorates and continues the legacy of Mr. Morton. The Arbor Day Foundation, a 501 (3) c charitable organization, was founded on the centennial of the first Arbor Day. Arbor Day has spread to many nations. In the United States the date is the last Friday in April each year. (Many communities choose to celebrate on other days.) Arborday.org or a search on the web for the Morton Arboretum will give those interested a more in depth history.

City" program that most people seem to be aware of. I suppose this is because of all the "tree city" signs as one crosses into the city limits of many towns across the

No matter where you live or if you live in the Plains where hardly any trees once existed, adding some lovely trees to your landscape at this time of year can be an interesting adventure, contribute to the improvement of your world, and do a bit of good in the big scheme of things as more trees are cut and more land is dozed for development.

(Interesting Fact: You don't think the Plains Indians would have burned 'buffalo chips' for fuel if there was wood readily available

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

Former Rockcastle County resident now offering meditation classes dicts take meditation classes

A former Rockcastle County resident is now offering meditation classes at the Rockcastle Regional Hospital Wellness Center every Friday at 6 p.m.

A man named J. Sterling Morton moved from Michigan to Nebraska in the 1800's and found almost no trees. He missed the trees he was used to, and came up with the idea for a tree planting holiday on January 4, 1872. So, the Nebraska legislature took the idea and passed the first Arbor Day law. Arbor Day was celebrated that year on April 10, 1872, and over a million trees were planted in Ne-

braska on that day. Today the J. Sterling Morton Arboretum in Nebraska City, Nebraska commemorates and continues the legacy of Mr. Morton. The Arbor Day Foundation, a 501 (3) c charitable organization, was founded on the centennial of the first Arbor Day. Arbor Day has spread to many nations. 

and he turned it on so we could figure out what was going on. We actually heard the officer down call come

over the scanner." Shortly after the shooting incident, Nation said they received emergency texts from MIT alerting everyone to stay at home or if they were on campus to stay inside and away from the area of the shooting.

"We were told to stay inside and stay away from the Building 32 area which was where the shooting occurred. At the time of the shooting, we were in building 35 which is just a few blocks down from building 32," Nation said. "As we were all huddled together listening to my buddy's scanner, we soon realized that someone had shot a MIT police officer just a few blocks down from us. Needless to say, we were in shock and frightened."

At the time, Nation said they had no idea that the shooting on their campus was connected to the Boston Marathon bombings. He said he and his classmates listened to emergency personnel and locked themselves inside there room at Building 35 on MIT's campus for approximately three hours.

Around 1 a.m. Friday, while they were still locked inside their building, Nation said they heard on the scanner that a robbery had occurred at a gas station in Watertown and that dispatchers were warning the police officers that the two robbers were indeed the bombing suspects.

"It became clear that police were caught in the middle of something much worse than a campus shooting and a 7-11 robbery," Nation said. "We all stayed huddled together in our building and heard the radio call on the scanner warning officers that the two suspects were armed and throwing explosives."

After the shootout, following the gas station robbery, one bombing suspect was killed and the other suspect escaped. During this time, Nation said he was able to leave campus and return safely to his apartHowever, a major man-

hunt was launched to find the escaped suspect and all public transport in the Boston area was brought to a standstill, schools were closed and residents were told to stay inside their homes and keep their doors

"My roommate and I followed instructions and stayed inside our apartment all day last Friday. We spent all of our time glued to the TV, watching the news in anticipation of what would happen next," Nation said. "Like everyone else, we wanted to do our part by letting the police officers have control of Boston and the surrounding areas so they could capture the other sus-

Then around 8:30 p.m. last Friday, Nation and his friends received the news that the escaped suspect had been captured and the manhunt was over. He said they then joined everyone in celebration as they could once again go outside their homes.

"Once the other suspect was caught, you could sense the entire city finally breathe a sigh of relief after a week of tension and fear," Nation said. "I definitely joined my friends at MIT last Friday night to relax, celebrate and also reflect on the tragic events of the week."

Nation went on to say that none of them expected something like the Boston Marathon bombing events to happen to them or their city. He also said that he was proud to call himself a Bostonian after the tragic

"I'm so proud to be a new member of the City of Boston and the performance of law enforcement was nothing short of excellent," Nation said. "This city united together, prayed together, conquered together and now we all mourn together over the lives who were lost last week. We are a strong community and nothing will ever change

However, Nation said that he is also thankful for the thoughts and concerns from his hometown in Mt.

"Words cannot express how touched I was by the thoughts, prayers and support I received from those I know in Mt. Vernon," Nation said. "Everyone's support during those trying times meant so much to me and I am truly blessed to have such a wonderful extended family in Rockcastle

Peters said the agreement has been beneficial to his office in many areas of law enforcement as they have been able to make arrests, seize property, deliver subpoenas and perform all other duties in the service areas of the departments in the agree-

"It has allowed our department to be more effective on meth busts, burglaries and mutual aid to accidents," Peters said. "A lot of times, items stolen from burglaries here are sold to pawn shops in other counties. With this agreement, we can seize property from burglaries without having to jump through a bunch of hoops."

Peters said the agreement also increases the safety in the communities that are served by each department as they can patrol in the areas of the police departments listed in the

"If I am transporting someone to a correctional facility in Hazard and I see a DUI driver weaving all over the roadway on Hal Rogers Parkway in Clay County," Peters said, "I can now conduct a traffic stop and arrest the driver, getting them off the roadway before they hit someone.'

Peters went on to say the county's deputies still answer only to him and that they would only be used in certain situations. He also said another benefit of the agreement is that if the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office or Fiscal Court wanted out of the agreement, all that is required is a 90 day written notice but he said the department plans on staying in the agreement as of right now.

"It's been a huge benefit for us so far and we have no intentions of quitting the agreement," Peters said. "But it's nice to know there is no penalty if we or the Fiscal Court wanted out of the agreement."

classrooms at the middle school would be around \$19 million and, if this were ever considered, his recommendation would be that the cafeteria, kitchen and gymnasium be retained. "If you decided to replace the gymnasium," Noel said, "you could only get one about half the size you have now." However, Pensol also

said Wednesday that the pri-

ority at this point was the roofs at MVES and the high school. "We have to replace these two roof systems and then we'll step back and look at what would be the best and most conservative way to take care of the middle school. We might decide to keep the shell and remodel what we have. We would just have to look at options given us by architects." Pensol said the middle school's ranking by the state as to its need for replacement or major renovation was high.

The construction of an Early Childhood Center, with a 200 student capacity, was included in the plan at an estimated cost of \$4,860,141. This facility would enable the district to offer all-day kindergarten for students. Rockcastle is one of the few districts in the state not providing allday kindergarten.

Roundstone Elementary School was another big ticket item in the plan, \$3,149,948 for major renovations. The facility also came in for its share of praise from Noel who told

the board that maintenance at the school was impeccable and that the school was talked about across the state because of the way it had been preserved. "Roundstone is a testament to how Rockcastle Couonty works," Noel said.

Other smaller items listed in the plan included: \$735,297 for renovations at the central office; \$159,517 for renovations at the Teaching and Learning Center; and \$282,534 for renovations at the central bus ga-

The district presently has a bonding capacity of \$12,8850,000 and Noel said this would increase at about \$1 million each year.

If payment in full, or a payment plan has not been arranged before the delinquent tax bills are sold in August of this year, all bills

will be available for sale to a third party purchaser. The County Attorney's office will then file suit in September against all 2011 delinquent tax bills that have not been sold to a third party or payment arrangements have not been made.

"I'm totally against the practice of selling delinquent tax bills to a third party," Reynolds said "their fees/interest charges amount to usury, but we have no choice, it is the law of the land."

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A Place to Remember, Mourn and Heal

Memorial Dedication set for May 6th

An idea born of one woman's grief will soon become a reality, a place where people can go to remember, grieve and heal over the loss of children to miscarriage, still birth or abortion.

The dedication of the Kentucky Memorial for the Unborn will be held on Monday, May 6th at 5:30 p.m. at Frankfort Cemetery. Most Rev. Ronald W. Gainer, Bisop of the Catholic Diocese of

Lexington and Rev. Wayne Smith, Retired Pastor of Southland Christian Church, will speak at the event. Both Gainer and Smith have spoken in support of the project since its inception and were present at the groundbreaking on September 22, 2009.

Kathy Rutledge, whose own search for healing from an abortion at the age of 18 inspired the project, says the memorial is a place where

mothers, fathers and families can go for healing and to seek peace with the past.

Located in a secluded section of the cemetery, overlooking the Palisades and the Kentucky River, the memorial was deigned by Lexington landscape architects, M2D Design, and based on a modern interpretation of the historic Wailing Wall in Jerusa-

The native limestone and granite wall emerges from the enfolding landscape and sweeps along a graceful arc forming a subtle enclosure like a womb. A biblical passage begiins the experience along the wall where names and messages will be inscribed. At the foot of the wall is a shelf for seating, flowers, notess and small momentos. Within this enclosure is a life-size bronze statue of Rachel, a woman referenced in Jeremiah 31 of the Bible as one "weeping for children" who finds






Community art project


4th District Director speaks at Rockcastle DAR meeting

Rockcastle students meet at Berea Summit

Fifty-five students from Garrard and Rockcastle counties traveled to Berea College Thursday to take part in the Berea College CFES Scholar Leadership

The eighth-graders received training on leadership qualities, what it takes to achieve their goals and what they can do to empower others to succeed. The event was a collaboration between Berea College's GEAR UP Partnership, Garrard and Rockcastle county schools and College for Every Student (CFES), a national organization that works to help every student it serves attend and succeed in col-

Student groups began their training by defining leadership themselves. Using brightly colored markers on large sheets of paper, participants brainstormed and then presented their ideas to the group. Ideas like bravery, choices and being an example made it onto the papers, which were posted up on the wall for all the groups to see. When all the groups' concepts were put together, they showed just how deep and complex leadership could be.

"We had a fun day," said Caroline Coguer, 14, from Rockcastle Middle School. "We were able to learn things that we may not have been able to learn just sitting in the classroom about leadership and how to become a leader in the community and not just be another knot on the log and actually stand out."

Jordan Griffin, 14, from Garrard County Middle School said he felt like he was joining a bigger team. "We found other people from different schools who are doing the same things as us," he said. "We learned all kinds of service lessons, like things we should do in our community and how to help our community." He said he was encouraged by the group effort. "Even if you do fail, at least you

Linda Stone, GEAR UP Service Coordinator for Garrard and Rockcastle counties, says that this is the first meeting of the groups, but certainly not the last. "These students will see each other a lot over the next four years," Stone said. They will continue to meet both at their school during club day, but also at regional events like the one Thursday. When they come together as a region, the students will be ambassadors from their school. "Our idea is, they'll take back the three core practices of CFES: college pathways, mentoring and leadership through ser-

The Leadership Summit is especially effective at encouraging mentoring and leadership through service. "We know that peer mentoring and the posse mentality is much more effective at getting kids to college," Stone said. "If their best friend is going to college, then they're going to college."

"So if we can create an environment where all of the students have the same goal and the same vision and are on the same path, they're much more likely to continue on and complete school.'
