Boys And Their Pocketknives

There was a time when young boys carried pocketknives with them everywhere they went, including to school and even to church. It was just standard operating procedure to have your knife in your pocket. You simply never knew when you would need to sharpen a pencil, cut a piece of string, remove a splinter, open a box, or just play a game of mumble peg. Every boy I knew in elementary school had a knife with them in their jeans pocket.

And do you know what? I never saw anyone even threaten to use a knife to intentionally hurt someone. They were our pocket tools, and we knew how to use them effectively. Our fathers, grandfathers, and even our older brothers taught us how to handle a pocketknife in the safest way possible. And we did.

Some may think that we were obsessed with our knives, and I suppose in some ways that we were. That is, we never left home without one in our pockets. Most of us had several different knives that we used for a variety reasons. I had one that I carried most of the time. Actually, it was not very sharp because I always used it to stick in the ground when playing our favorite game, mumble peg.

We usually played that game in my grandfather's (Pop) yard under one of his huge shade trees. I can remember countless times when Kenneth Hansel, Paul Carter, Earl Benton Cromer, Billy Ramsey, Paul Hansel, and I sat in a circle taking turns sticking our knives in the ground hoping to make the looser of the game "chew the peg."

There were other times when I took my sharpest knife with me, especially if I was going fishing in one of the local farm ponds. You could not even attempt to "gut" and clean a fish with a dull knife. In those days, we did not even subscribe to the principle of "catch and release" because our mothers were home anticipating our return with dinner in our buckets. We fished to eat our catch! My grandparents had a special place next to the smokehouse where we were supposed to do our fish cleaning. That is why we carried our sharpest knives on those days. I still remember that remarkable taste of bluegill, fried potatoes, and home-made cornbread straight from an iron skillet. Now that, my friends, is a fabulous feast!

When I think of the knives that we had back then, I immediately remember some of the specific knives that my friends and I owned and carried with us. One of my favorites was a Tree Brand Boker with stag handles. Our first knives were not stainless steel, so we had to be diligent in keeping them adequately oiled and free from dirt and dust. I had a small can of 3in-1 oil that I kept in my dresser drawer to use on my knives in their regular maintenance.

Some of the most prized of our knives were those named after "gun companies," such as Winchester and Remington. Those brands were kept in our homes and were never used for our games. Pop taught me about some of these "collectibles" and made sure that they, too, were kept in good shape.

During the 50's, "nostalgia knives" were promoted to be sold to young boys. Some of these were named after our TV heroes, such as Roy Rogers, Hopalong Cassidy, The Lone Ranger, and even Rin Tin Tin. We purchased them from cereal

boxes and from advertisements on television. But they were merely promotional trinkets, and they lacked the precision of

finely crafted brands.

Pop's favorite brand was a Schrade Walden, and he kept it for years and years. When he died many years ago, my mother gave me his knife. I had it restored to its original condition. I replaced one of the blades and even had a new stag handle attached to one side of the knife. I would not take anything for this antique pocketknife because it once belonged to Pop.

I am so glad that I was in elementary school when it was alright for a boy to carry and use a pocketknife as a normal part of our lives. I still put a pocketknife in my pocket every day before leaving home. I am never without a trusty knife in my possession. The uses that I regularly find for my knives are countless. Boys carrying







Fresh off an impressive 3rd place performance at the Class 2A Region 5 Championships last Saturday at Boyle County, the RCHS girls' track team qualified 8 athletes for the Class 2A State Track & Field Championships at the University of Louisville this past Friday.



The RCHS girls' 4 x 800-meter relay team finished 20th overall with a new season's best time of 10:52.17 at the Class 2A State Track and Field Championships held at the University of Louisville this past Friday. Their time was an improvement of over 10 seconds from the regional championships. RCHS senior Amy Johnson finished as state runner-up in the discus competition with a new career best throw of 115'1. Her throw was also her best ever in state championship competition, improving by an impressive 7' over last year. Her great effort this season and at state also earned her 1st team all-

state honors.

Attempting to overcome the loss of nine high school athletes since the end of their very successful indoor season which saw them win their 6th indoor state title, the team finished 15th overall and were only a couple strong performances away from finishing in the top five teams at state.

The RCHS girls' 4 x 800meter relay team got the meet started with an impressive team performance. With a group assembled for the race the week of region, freshman Ashley McKinney started the race with an awesome2:38 lead leg. Sophomore Rachel Cain turned in an impressive leg of her own, finishing in a fast season's best 2:49. 8th grader Arie-anna Lawson, a relative newcomer to the event having only competed in it once before with almost no practice, ran a great 3rdleg in 2:49. 8thgrader Sierra Mercer blistered the anchor leg with an exceptional time of 2:35, despite not having competed at that distance since the start of the season. The team finished 20th overall with a new season's best time of 10:52.17. Their time was an amazing improvement of over 10 seconds from the regional championships.

RCHS senior Amy Johnson came into the discus competition as the meet favorite after dominating the event at the regional championships. She also was the defending Class 2A state champion in the event having captured the state title in 2012. Despite some controversy with the digital measuring system which saw another contender add an unprecedented 25' to her best throw from region giving her the title, Amy finished as state runner-up with an awesome new career best throw of 115'1. The throw was originally measured at over 117' but was changed to 115'1" due to some sort of measuring malfunction. 




RCHS freshman Tori





enroll and, two semesters later, heard that the student was doing great. "This is one success story," Isaacs said. If a student was enrolled in the district, dropped out and then obtained their GED, they would not be included in drop-out rate numbers.

Isaacs went on to say that the school realizes that "one size does not fit all in education. We have to focus on each individual student. We are not an assembly line."

Brodhead Principal Caroline Graves noted that her school had been making an effort to recognize problems early and help students with them so that "frustration and a feeling of helplessness doesn't begin in elementary school."

Instead of individual tokens of appreciation to the board members, for School Board Appreciation Week," Pensol told the board that it had been decided to establish, in the board's name, a \$250 scholarship.

During the meeting, the first award of the scholarship was made to Jessica Thacker, who plans to attend the University of the Cumberlands where she will be a pharmacy major.

Finance Officer Melanie Lyons presented the board with the tentative working budget for 2013-14. "This is the first true picture of our financial condition, since we have absolutely no outside money included." Lyons was referring to the \$800,000 which came into the system for several years from federal stimulus funds.

She went on to tell the board that schools, especially Mt. Vernon, would receive more technology equipment from capital outlay funds which, if the board doesn't spend this year, will have to be escrowed for future construction projects. Lyons said that \$148,000 had been set aside for the Kisbet assessment but the board had received word that the amount would not be that high, giving the board the opportunity to use the funds for more technol-

Lyons also said that the board's contingency fund would be between 8-10%, under the new budget. The state mandates a 2% fund and recommends 5% so the board is still in good shape in this area.

She also reported that the board presently has \$3.2 million in the bank. "We have had some reduction in revenue (reduced interest rates and a reduction in tax revenue from \$1.9 million to \$1.8 million) but our expenses have also gone down."

The board has reduced staff significantly and, on question, Supt. Pensol said that he hoped to get staff costs down to 72-75% of the budget instead of 85% as it was during this school year.

Water told Bryant that the taste seemed the same as other city's water supply and the Rural Water representative said it was the best Mt. Vernon's water had tasted in the 17 years he had been personally tasting it.

Bryant did concede that the problem was worse at certain times of the year. "There are transition periods after build up of the algae which thrive in cooler weather. The fall and spring are the most pronounced time for a change in the taste

He said the water department began using a new product last August called Earth Tec and it had been a "wonder product" which improved the taste and allowed the cutback of chlorine and charcoal in the sys-

Bryant emphasized that the water is safe. "We test the fire out of it and never stop working on it," he said.

He also pointed out that the water plant has a "pretty good" infiltration system and the new intake system, installed a few years ago, allows plant operators to draw from the top, center and bottom of the lake, depending on where tests show the wa-

"We're doing all we can everyday. We appreciate the concern of citizens and want people to have a voice. Everyone is welcome to come to council meetings," Bryant said.

During the meeting, the council held the first reading of the 2013-14 budget.

The budget shows \$7,468,615 in total cash and revenues for the coming year with \$6,258,168 in appropriations and a total carryover in all funds of \$1 210 447

The biggest item in the budget is \$2,600,000 in a

loan and grant from the Kentucky Infrastructure for the new water tank system project. At Monday night's meeting, the council approved Resolution #2013-2 which is an Assistance Agreement between Kentucky Infrastructure Authority and the city. This allows the city to access funds to pay for the water tank project. Bills are coming in for preliminary work on the

The city received a grant for over \$900,000 for the \$2.6 million project with the rest repayable in 20 years at 1% interest.

On the revenue side, the city expects to take in \$1,049,000 from taxes, \$2,113,000 from water department revenue and \$480,000 from sewer rev-

Operating costs budgeted for the general fund include \$718,075 for the police department, \$1,325,675 for water department operation and maintenance and \$425,925 for sewer department operation and maintenance.

The mayor gave the council an update on the water tank project. He said the work was actually on a "pretty fast track." During the discussion, the council gave the mayor the authority to negotiate for the purchase of land, near Northside Baptist Church, needed for a new tank. Bryant said the city had offered \$30,000 for the 2.4-2.5 acre site but it was appraised for \$36,000 and the owners, David Bishop and son, Chris, had agreed to take \$35,000. Bryant said geological and core samples had been taken from the site and the results had been received. The engineering company has asked for more time to study the results before purchase of the property. "The engineering firm says the results look good but have asked for time to study them more," Bryant said. "We have to have the greenlight from the engineers before purchase."

The city will have to come up with the funds for purchase of the property from city funds but, Bryant said that money set aside for valve replacement at the water plant, and not used, can be diverted to purchase the property. "We may have enough funds left from the \$2.6 million project to replace the funds," Josh Bray. Tax Administrator said.




