RCIDA passes amended budget for 2013-2014

At a special called meeting of the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority last Thursday, the main item of discussion was on amending the IDA's budget for fiscal year 2013-14.

The IDA had submitted their budget to the fiscal court at their regular meeting in May and changes were made by the court. They included eliminating \$63,870 from the group's reserve for transfer, which would lessen the court expected contribution of \$148,000; \$12,708 listed in appropriations for retirement benefits for Executive Director Holly Hopkins since this expense is paid through the fiscal court's general fund and lowering the allocation for travel and training by \$1,000 to \$3,500.

Three magistrates: Bill McKinney, Ralph Allen and Lee Earl Adams, along with County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis and County Treasurer Joe Clontz were all present at the called meeting. McKinney had brought up the reduction in the travel and training account at the fiscal court meeting, saying he didn't feel all the trips made by Hopkins during the year were "beneficial to RCIDA."

RCIDA board member Corey Craig made an impassioned plea for leaving the travel and training budget at

An RCHS senior is collecting school supplies for elementary school students who were affected by the recent Moore, Oklahoma EF5 tornado.

Kelsey Mattingly, 17, of Mt. Vernon said she was devastated after hearing about the destruction of the two elementary schools in Moore as a result of the tornado and that she wanted to help those affected.

"I know that for the children affected, their summer break from school isn't going to be such a fun time since this terrible thing happened," Mattingly said. "I immediately thought that it's going to be very easy for those kids to delve into negative practices and I found myself wanting to help them out in some way."

After discussions with family and friends on what she could do to help, Mattingly said they came up with the idea to collect at least 200 backpacks filled with supplies and send them to affected students. She said that she wants to provide a "little something" to the students to let them know that someone cares about them and wants to help them in their time of need.

"I wanted to send them something that would possibly keep their heads held high even though they are struggling with a lot right now," Mattingly said. "Not only could they use these things at school but they could also use them over the summer for entertainment if their family lost everything in the tornado. They could use them to draw, write and read or anything that would keep them from being bored."

Mattingly is coordinating her backpack drive through her non-profit organization "Room 4 Me" which she founded last July. Her organization's goal is to give elementary school children hope for a better future and ensure that they are all given the opportunity to be successful in life.

"It's always been my goal in life to help others who cannot help themselves," Mattingly said. "Elementary school children are more impressionable than other students so that is why the organization is focused on them in particular."

Mattingly said she eventually decided to follow through on her dream of creating the organization after working at a little league basketball game during the winter where she overheard some other people saying that certain kids wouldn't be successful because of their negative home life and families.

Livingston completes final assessment of becoming a Trail Town with trial run

The City of Livingston completed their final assessment to become a Trail Town last weekend.

Livingston was opened up for the final "trial-run phase" of the Trail Town application process last Saturday and Sunday as tourists came for horseback riding, canoeing, tubing, kayaking, hiking, and bicycling.

By completing the final trial-run phase, Livingston is now in the home stretch of becoming the second town in Kentucky, behind Dawson Springs, to be a part of the Trail Town program.

The Trail Town program was created as a designation and assistance program by the Kentucky Office of Ad-

venture Tourism for towns along the Sheltoewe Trace and Daniel Boone National Forest. The program was

created to increase tourism and economic development for each town in the area.

The trial-run phase was

implemented by the Adventure Tourism Office to make sure everything works as planned as far as the design of the trails, directions, maps, designated visitor center and amenities which include food, lodging, entertainment, sidewalks, parking, etc.

As part of the trial run phase, tourists were required to fill out a survey on how well they got around on the trails and in town. Any problems experienced during the trial-run are to be identified and fixed before Livingston is granted certification from the Adventure Tourism Office as an official Trail Town.

Once the certification process is officially completed, Livingston will be identified on state maps and

Film shoot held at Brush Arbor Cabins

An independent film production company held a film shoot last Saturday at the Brush Arbor Cabins at Hummel.

Showhouse Productions of Jackson, Kentucky used the cabins to film part of their latest documentary "Bad Tom." The documentary portrays the life and hanging of one of Kentucky's notorious outlaws Thomas "Bad Tom" Smith.

Smith was born in 1859 in Knott County. He is noted for becoming involved in the infamous French-Eversole feud in Hazard during the 1890s. During the feud, Smith sided with Fulton French and was said to be responsible for the murders of numerous Eversole supporters.

Throughout his career, Smith escaped prosecution for the murders by threatening or killing witnesses to his crimes. However, he was eventually arrested and convicted for the murder of Dr. Robert Raider in 1895.

While in jail for the murder of Dr. Raider, Smith confessed to the murders of seven people including Raider. Smith requested to be baptized while in jail and was baptized in the Ken-

tucky River near Jackson before being hanged in front of 4,000 to 5,000 people.

"Bad Tom" Director and President of Showhouse Productions Charles Shouse said he chose Brush Arbor Cabins as a place to shoot parts of the documentary because of the primitive cabins that were available.

"Brush Arbor Cabins had post Civil War buildings which fit the time period of Hazard during the French-Eversole feud," Shouse

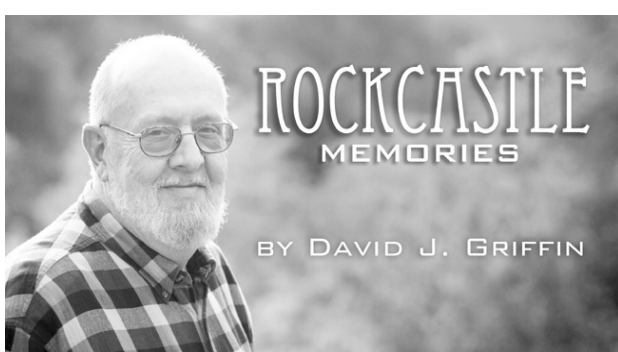

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My 1954 Chevrolet 210 Delray

Sometimes, dreams really do come true!

Last weekend Kathy and I were returning home from a visit to the Smokies, which included seeing a car show in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. On the way home, we were coming into Maryville, Tennessee, when – just out of the corner of my eye – I spotted a baby blue and white '54 Chevy. It was on a small dealer lot along the road which also contained several other old cars. Immediately, I turned our Explorer around to go back for a better look.

As we strolled past some of the other cars making our way toward the Chevy, I think my heart started beating just a little bit faster. You see, this is the same model vehicle that my grandfather let me drive for the very first time, and the memories came flooding back. I remember Pop letting me take the car up and down the gravel road in front of our

house when I was only a 14-year-old teenager. There it was...a two-toned '54 Chevy 210 in Robin's Egg blue and white. This was also the car in which I used to take my driver's test when I turned sixteen. Furthermore, and maybe most importantly, it was the car that I drove on my first date in an automobile.

Because it was late on a Sunday afternoon, the lot was officially closed, but a lone salesman wandered up to us and struck up a conversation. He asked if I was interested in the car, to which I replied merely by detailing my history with that particular model. We discussed some of the details about the car, and he then explained that it had been restored by an older gentleman for his wife to drive. Upon opening the hood and the trunk, we were amazed at the care that had been taken with its restoration.

Even though the original '54 did not have the op-

tion of a V8 engine, this baby had been equipped with a new (in crate) Camaro 350-cubic-inch engine as well as a new Camaro rear end. It has automatic transmission and a dual-exhaust system. Converted to a 12-volt electrical system, with front disk brakes, it is air-conditioned, and the chrome trim has been fully restored. The paint job appears in superb shape as did the interior "tuck and roll" upholstery. It even has fender skirts like I had installed on my '58 Chevy which I owned in high school.

When we checked out the interior, we noticed new carpet, headliner, AM-FM radio with a CD player, and fully functional gauges. The car fit the bill with me. I have dreamed of owning a classic car for most of my adult life; what more appropriate vehicle could ever be found for me? I could hardly pull myself away from this vehicle. Finally, she suggested that I give the salesman a call to see if we could arrive at an acceptable price. The negotiations went better than expected. And, to our astonishment, he offered to bring the car to us if we accepted his very fair offer. We made a bid that he accepted. He then remarked, "You have purchased one of the finest cars we have ever had on our lot."

The car will be delivered in about 3 days – and I am on pins and needles till it arrives.

In 1954, the Series 210 Delray had revised styling and a sleeker look. The Robin's Egg paint was complemented with matching blue and white interior and was exceptionally clean

and different from any car Chevrolet had produced until that time. The 210 Series was actually the best-selling Chevrolet model during 1954, offering a balance of style and luxury appointments unavailable in the base 150 Series.

For the next couple of days, I could hear in my mind the V8's mellow sound flowing through the dual exhaust system. The fact that it is air-conditioned makes it over-the-top of my "dream car." I find that I am as excited as a teenager about making this great ride my own. It will truly be a dream come true for me to be able to "cruise" the roads in my '54 Chevy listening to old rock and roll. Oh, yea, and I'll let you know if my new baby ever wins any awards!

LEMON TART PIE
2 medium lemons
6 eggs, lightly beaten
2 and 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
1/2 cup butter
1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell
Grate rind from lemons; set aside grated rind. Remove and discard pith from lemons. Quarter and seed lemons. Combine lemon quarters, grated rind, lemon juice, eggs, and sugar in container of electric blender; cover and process 1 minutes or until smooth, stopping once to scrape down sides. Add butter; cover and process 30 seconds. Pour into pastry shell. Bake at 350 for 40 to 45 minutes or until slightly firm in center. Cool on a wire rack.

PINEAPPLE SHEET CAKE
2 cups all-purpose flour
2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 cup butter
1 can (15 ounce) crushed pineapple
1 cup pineapple juice (reserved pineapple juice plus enough water to make one cup)
1/2 cup sour cream

2 large eggs, lightly beaten
1 teaspoon almond extract
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup coconut
Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 9 x 13 baking dish. In a large bowl, combine flour, sugar, salt, and baking powder; set aside. Drain pineapple and reserve juice. In a small saucepan, combine butter and pineapple juice; bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Add to flour mixture, stirring to combine. Stir in sour cream, pineapple, eggs, and almond extract. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 22 to 25 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Spread warm cake with Butter Frosting (recipe below). Sprinkle with chopped pecans and coconut.

BUTTER FROSTING:
1/2 cup butter
1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
3 cups powdered sugar
In a medium saucepan, combine butter and milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Whisk in almond extract. Gradually whisk in sugar until smooth. Pour over warm cake.

Money Tips for Students

Students should learn about credit scores

Your credit score is a three-digit number that has a long-lasting effect on your buying power. When you apply for credit, your credit score will be checked. The higher your credit score, the better the chances you will be approved. This information from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) will help you understand more about your credit score.

Although there are several scoring methods, the most widely accepted form comes from the Fair Isaac Corporation, or FICO. Your FICO score ranges from 300 to 850. The exact formula that Fair Isaac uses is proprietary information, but these items make up your credit score:

- 35 percent of your score is based on your payment history. Early payments will have a higher number than on-time payments, which will have a higher score than late payments.

- 30 percent of the score is based on outstanding debt. This outstanding debt is how much you owe on car loans, mortgages, credit cards, etc. The number of credit cards you have and if those cards are near the maximum borrowing limit will hurt your score.

- 15 percent of the score is based on the length of

time you have had credit. The longer you have been borrowing money and paying it back in a timely manner, the better your score.

- 10 percent of the score is based on new credit. If you have opened several new accounts, that will have a negative effect on your score. Also, the more inquiries on your credit report in a year, the lower your score.

- 10 percent of the score is based on the types of credit you currently have. It helps to have a mix of loan types. If you have a credit card, an installment loan will even the credit out.

KHEAA is the state agency that administers Kentucky's grant and scholarship programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES). It provides free copies of "It's Money, Baby," a guide to financial literacy, to Kentucky schools and residents upon request at publications@kheaa.com.

interstate signs on I-75 with a specific icon that indicates their status to tourists as a Trail Town.

Rockcastle County Development Board Director Lynn Tatum said they received approximately thirty visitors during the trial run last weekend and that all the canoes and kayaks were rented out each day. She said twenty-two visitors filled out a survey but that another large group accidentally left before filling one out.

“We were told by the Adventure Tourism Office that we should have thirty to fifty tourists during the trial run,” Tatum said. “But they said that with the Memorial Day weekend those numbers were liable to be lower.”

However, Tatum said the Adventure Tourism Office is more concerned with the comments on the surveys than they are with the number of tourists. She said every one of the surveys were positive in nature.

“All the horseback riders commented on the beauty of the Wilderness Road Trail. One mountain bike rider took the Sheltoe Trace Trail and said he would return soon to try some of the other trails,” Tatum said. “Several groups also rented kayaks, canoes and tubes to

use on the Rockcastle River. They all said they had a great time as well.”

Tatum said that one of the biggest milestones of Livingston’s Trail Town project was remodeling one of the classrooms in the former Livingston Elementary School and using it as a visitor center for tourists. She said the classroom will be used to provide maps, trail information, coordinate equipment rental, lodging and information on many other amenities in Livingston.

Tatum went on to say that many tourists and Livingston citizens were impressed with the use of the remodeled LES classroom as a visitor center.

“You could tell by the tourists’ reactions that the old Livingston Elementary School classroom made a great impression on them,” Tatum said. “We also had many locals stop in to see the remodeled classroom. They all agreed and said that they were glad to see a fine building put back into use.”

Livingston Mayor Jason Medley agreed that one of the most triumphant moments of the city’s Trail Town project was using the remodeled classroom as a visitor center.

“The school was closed in 1994 and the only thing that has been used in the building since then is the gymnasium,” Medley said.

“I had many people in the community tell me that it means a lot to them to see the front doors open again. Around here, we have always treasured the Livingston School building and for it to be used as a visitor center is a huge milestone.”

Medley said Livingston will continue to make improvements and that they are also planning on remodeling more rooms in the building for meeting, training, lodging, and retail space. He said for those interested in the remodeling and clean-up of the old school to contact City Hall at 606-453-2061.

Medley went on to say that he is also proud to see Livingston closing in on their overall goal of becoming a Trail Town.

“A lot of people have been working hard these past few months to establish everything that is needed to be a Trail Town,” Medley said. “To see everything we have worked for come to life will be an astonishing moment for many of us.”

Governor Steve Beshear was originally scheduled to come to Livingston for a Trail Town designation ceremony on June 14th. But due to scheduling conflict, the Governor’s Office cancelled the ceremony and said they would announce the rescheduled date once it is confirmed.

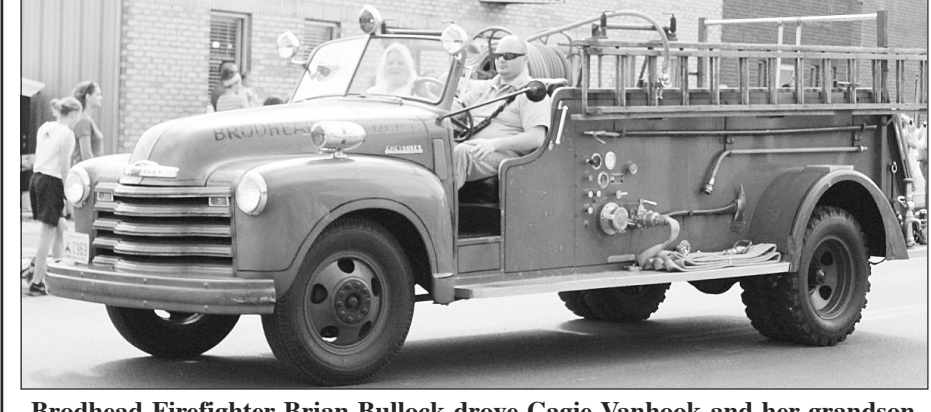

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Katie Hensley wins long jump title, breaks state record

RCMS girls' track team places 3rd at Middle School State Championships

The RCMS girls' track team finished 3rd out of 139 schools that competed in the KTCCCA Middle School State Track and Field Championships at the University of Louisville this past Saturday. The girls missed state runner-up by only 2 points to a very good North Oldham team. Last year's defending state

champions, Murray Middle, took the team title for the second straight year. Ranked 30th coming into the event, the RCMS girls' 4 x 800-meter relay team got the meet off to a great start with an incredible 8th place finish overall. Running out of a slower heat and posting some very fast individual times, the

girls knocked one minute and ten seconds off their entry time and finished with an awesome season's best time of 11:11.45. Team members included 8th graders Taylor Bullock, Arie-anna Lawson, Lanna Prewitt, and Sierra Mercer. Next up for RCMS came 8th grader Jennifer Mercer in the 100-meter

hurdles. After working really hard on her hurdle form and technique this past week, the hard work obviously paid off. Jennifer placed an amazing 5th overall with a blazing fast career best time of 17.41 seconds, easily her best race ever.

Meanwhile over at the long jump venue, 8th grader Katie Hensley was rewriting the record books in the long jump competition. Leaping over 16' on her first attempt and pretty much sealing the state championship title, Katie would qualify for the finals in first place. On her final attempt of the afternoon, Katie put it all together and jumped an incredible 16'8" securing the individual state title in the event and giving her the all-time state record by half an inch.

Over at high jump, Rockcastle 5th grader Autumn Courtney competed against some very tough competition. Autumn entered the meet with a personal best jump of 3'10". After several great jumps and very close attempts, Autumn just missed clearing the opening height of 3'10".

Half a mile or so away at U of L's throws venue, 6th grader Samantha Douglas competed in the discus competition. She came through with an incredible new personal best throw of 69'11". Samantha finished the season as the top ranked 6th grader in the state in the event.

Back on the track, 8th grader Taylor Bullock prepared to compete in the 100-meter dash against some of the fastest competition our state meet has ever seen. With a terrific start out of the blocks, Taylor blazed her way to a great new personal best time of 15.21 seconds in the event.

The girls' 4 x 200-meter relay team competed next in a very competitive event. The team of 8th graders Mikaela Sadler, Arie-anna Lawson, Jennifer Mercer, and Sierra Mercer had an awesome season's best performance of 1:56.15 and placed 11th overall, well over a second better than their previous best.

After the 4 x 200 came the girls' 1600-meter run. 8th grader Lanna Prewitt ran a fast-paced race and finished with a great new season's best time of 6:39.97 in the event, narrowly missing her personal best by less than one second.

The girls' 4 x 100-meter relay team of 8th graders Mikaela Sadler, Courtney

Vanhook, Taylor Bullock, and Arie-anna Lawson finished 34th overall against some stiff competition with a great race and a time of 59.12 seconds, one of their best this season.

At the pole vault venue, Mikaela Sadler put on a great performance. Only having recently started working on the event and with no equipment to practice on at home, Mikaela worked diligently to learn the skills necessary to be competitive and got most of her practice at actual competitions. At state, she placed an impressive 6th overall, tying her personal best with an awesome vault of 6'6".

Over at triple jump, Katie Hensley looked to continue her impressive jumping and did so with several outstanding attempts. She finished 5th overall against a stellar group of jumpers with an impressive season's best jump of 32'7.5", only 1.25" away from a career best for Katie.

Sierra Mercer, quite possibly the most consistent runner for RCMS all season, competed in the 400-meter dash finals against an incredible field of competitors. Sierra came through with a great performance and placed 6th in the event, nearly establishing a new personal best with an awesome time of 1:03.6. She was only three hundredths of a second away from 5th place and less than a second away from 4th.

Jennifer Mercer followed her 100-meter hurdle race with an even better performance in the 300-meter hurdles. Jennifer got off to a tremendous start in the race and finished as state runner-up with an awesome career best performance of 49.23 seconds, nearly three seconds better than her season's best time. Jennifer missed winning the state title and breaking the all-time state record by mere tenths of a second.

7th grader Alysa Goodman competed next

for RCMS in the 800-meter run. Alysa performed exceptionally well and knocked more than 5 seconds off her state meet entry time, finishing with a new career personal best time of 2:55.99 in the event.

At the throws venue, 7th grader Autumn Davidson had an awesome performance in the turbo javelin competition, placing 14th overall with a very impressive throw of 55'11". Autumn also placed 32nd in the shot put competition with a great throw of 25'4.75".

Katie Hensley followed up her impressive jumping performances with a great race in the 200-meter dash. Despite spraining her ankle doing a pre-race start out of the blocks, Katie sprinted her way to a 17th place finish with a very fast time of 27.98 seconds.

6th grader Kensie Sheffield handled the difficult task of competing in the 3200-meter run for RCMS. Despite only competing in the event a few times this season, Kensie continued to show great improvement and knocked more than 11 seconds off her state meet entry time. She placed 30th in the event with a great new personal best time of 14:37.03.

The final event of the day for RCMS, the 4 x 400-meter relay, came with the added pressure of knowing that the team needed a great performance to secure a top-five overall team finish. The team had already posted some amazing times this year and placed themselves in the record books as one of the all-time best 4 x 400-meter relay teams in Kentucky history. The team of Mikaela Sadler, Arie-anna Lawson, Jennifer Mercer, and Sierra Mercer did not disappoint and came through with an awesome team performance. They finished a very impressive 4th overall with an amazing time of 4:31.53. Their finish secured the team's 3rd place position in the final team standings.

"I love the team we have assembled next year. Angie is our last piece and a very good one."

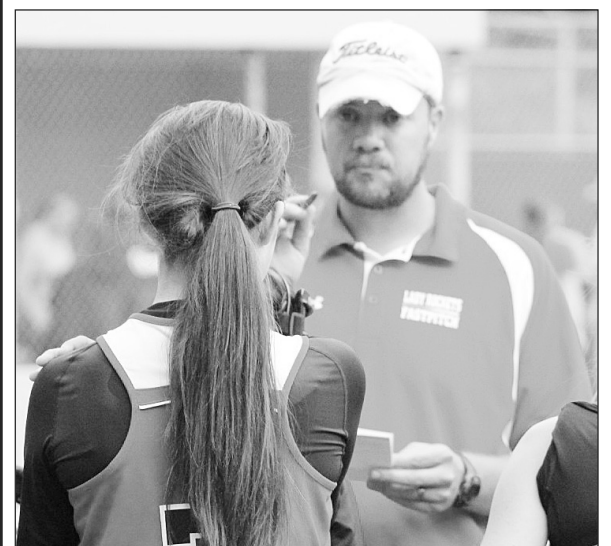

and they said he didn't have a chance because of his home life," Mattingly said. "I hate that mentality and I want to rid it from people's minds completely. Unfortunately, when those children are told that they start to believe it. Room 4 Me was created to change this negative mindset that a lot of people have."

Room 4 Me serves as a mentoring-type organization where children in elementary school can look for advice and receive guidance in hopes of keeping them on a "good path" to help them achieve their goals and dreams. Mattingly said that Room 4 Me also donates supplies to children in need such as those affected by the Moore, Oklahoma tornado.

receive it and have it installed by Thursday.

However, Shackelford said they will have to send water samples to a laboratory to be tested after the new motor is installed. He said the testing process usually takes around twenty-four hours and that the advisory will be lifted once the required test results are received from the lab.

\$4,500. Craig said the board only authorized the trips that were the "right trips to keep the county in front of the right people so we have a chance to reap some harvest in the future. If we want to compete we must be on everyone's radar." Craig told the magistrates present that it didn't any good for the county to approach companies on an individual basis, "we must be part of a cluster to get attention."

Magistrate Ralph Allen commented in support of leaving the allowance at \$4,500, "we are worrying over a few dollars. If we can talk to people to get jobs then it is a small price. I feel like she (Hopkins) has been doing a good job and needs to be there (at jobs conferences)."

However, Carloftis told Craig that the court had made their decision about the reduction but noted "if you feel your board can justify an extra trip, the court will provide funding."

The IDA board passed the amended budget with the only change being the \$1,000 reduction in travel and training. Craig told County Treasurer Joe Clontz that it was necessary to leave the retirement in the board's budget for auditing purposes. He also asked that the reserve for transfer funds not be removed from the budget since the majority of those funds were in a CD and the board would like to have them as a "rainy day fund." Craig told the magistrates that \$18,000, that was sent to the IDA in error by the state over a year ago, was included in those monies and would have to be sent back to the state on their request.

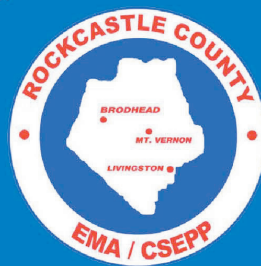

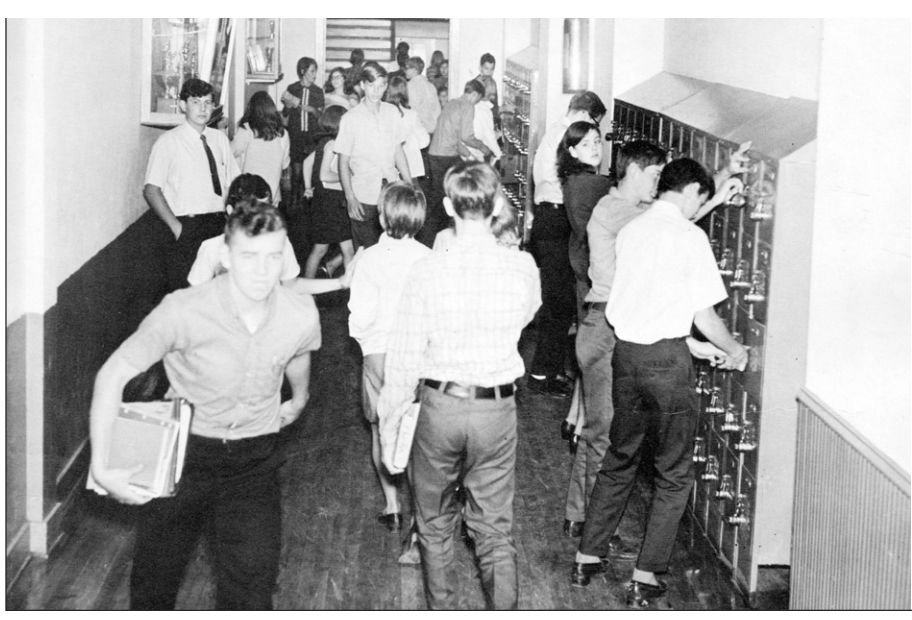



Union College is a four-year liberal arts college related to the United Methodist Church.

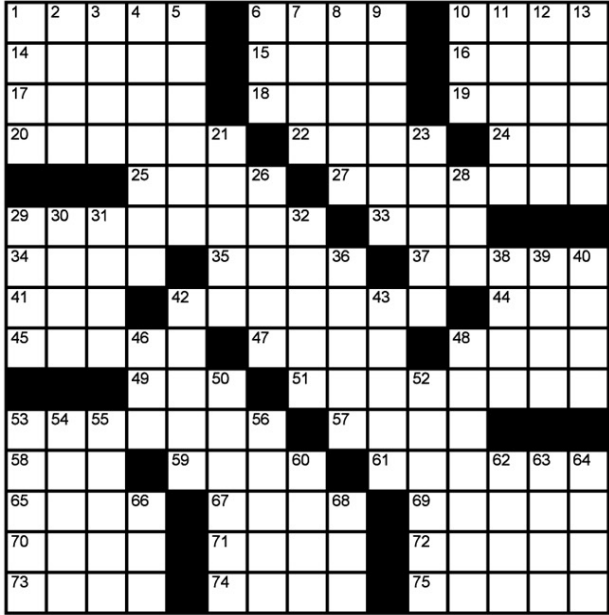

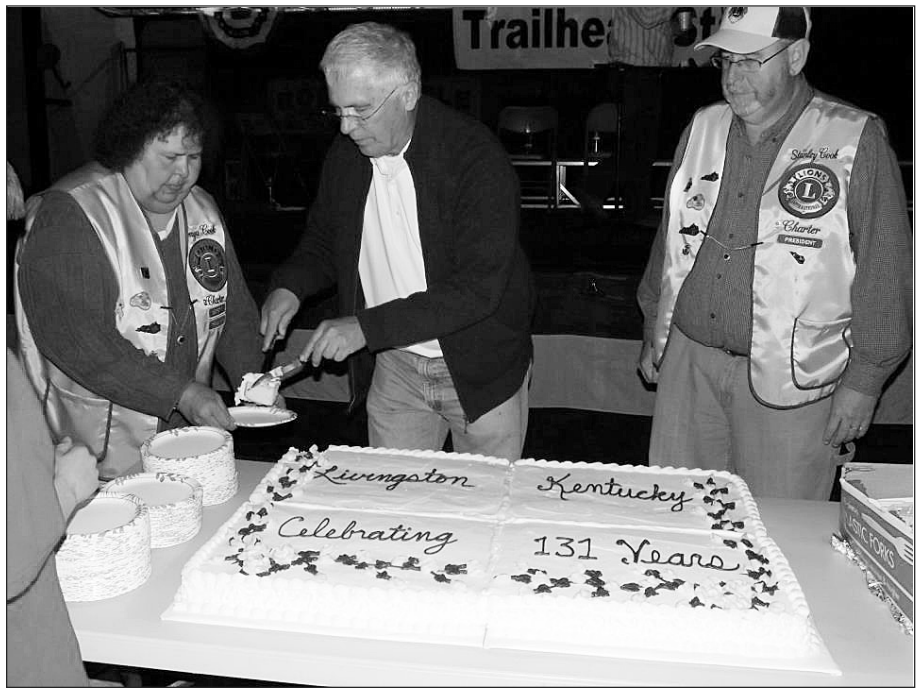

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Four students selected as Rogers Explorers

Thomas Burdette, Andrew Ponder, Mikaela Sadler, and Mahala Saylor from Rockcastle County Middle School have been invited to enhance their leadership, math, science, and technology skills this summer as a participant in The Center for Rural Development's 2013 Rogers Explorers youth leadership program.

Thirty rising ninth-grade students will attend each of the four summer sessions of Rogers Explorers making this the largest class of participants in the history of the program.

"We look forward to this year's Rogers Explorers Program, as students will get to experience one-of-a-kind opportunities in the fields of math and science," said Delaney Stephens, Youth Programs Coordinator and Community Liaison for The Center. "As they prepare to enter high school in the fall, students will have a better understanding of the many career possibilities that await them if they excel in math and science."

This report is designed to inform the public about the quality of water and services provided on a daily basis. Our commitment is to provide our customers with a safe, clean, and reliable supply of drinking water. We want to assure that we will continue to monitor, improve, and protect the water system and deliver a high quality product. Water is the most indispensable product in every home and we ask everyone to be conservative and help us in our efforts to protect the water source and the water system.

Our water is purchased from Mt. Vernon Water Works, that is located at Renfro Valley, Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water from Lake Linville. The source water assessment has been performed to identify land uses which may impact the water supply. This assessment indicates that the susceptibility of the Mt. Vernon water supply to contamination is generally moderate. Contaminants present in source water may include microbial contamination, pesticides, and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. The primary source of contamination are agriculture, onsite septic systems, and roadways. Activities and land uses upstream of this water can pose potential risks to your drinking water. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mt. Vernon Water Works. The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. The table enclosed is results of our Monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2012, it can be obtained at Brodhead City Hall, 7 West Main Street, Brodhead, Kentucky.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects may be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and may pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, (sewage plants, septic systems, livestock operations, or wildlife). Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, (naturally occurring or from stormwater runoff, wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming). Pesticides and herbicides, (stormwater runoff, agriculture or residential uses). Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, (by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, or from gas stations, stormwater runoff, or septic systems). Radioactive contaminants, (naturally occurring or from oil and gas production or mining activities).

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water to provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some or all of these definitions may be found in this report:

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Below Detection Levels (BDL) - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Not Applicable (N/A) - does not apply.

Parts per million (ppm) - or milligrams per liter, (mg/L). One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) - or micrograms per liter, (µg/L). One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per trillion (ppt) - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

Parts per quadrillion (ppq) - one part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Millirems per year (mrem/yr) - measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Million Fibers per Liter (MFL) - a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.

Variances & Exemptions (V&E) - State or EPA permission not to meet an MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions.

Action Level (AL) - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system shall follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Information About Lead:
If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Your local public water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. 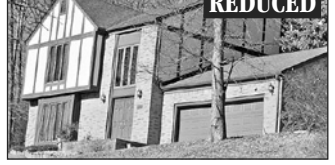
