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

Things were vastly different then; there was much activity The walks were crowded with people, and they were rushing from store to store. Every parking space was occupied, and persons were driving around the square

It is a fact of life; things do not stay the same. Time passes, and things change. Sometimes, that change is dramatic. Heraclitus, who died 1,372 years ago, said,"There is nothing permanent except change." Then, about a hundred and fifty years ago, Anatole France wrote, "We are never two minutes the same."

Change is everywhere.

"I always saw a lot of cans in the ditches so I just simply started picking them up," Baron said. "Picking up cans helps me as I enjoy seeing and meeting people. It also helps control the litter in the ditch lines along the county as well. So it helps me and it helps my community too."

Baron said he originally

started picking up aluminum cans along Richmond Street and, after moving Ito Barnett Road, he now has a new route.

Approximately three to four days a week, Baron said he starts his adventure around 6 a.m. with an empty trash bag. He says he picks up aluminum cans along Barnett Road and Purr Rigsby Road before coming to the West Main Street and Hwy 461 intersection in Mt. Vernon. He then said he travels along West/East Main Street and Hwy 25 collecting cans and then sells them to the Rockcastle County Recycling Center.

"I start out in the morning around 6 a.m. with an empty trash bag," Baron said. "At the end of the day my bag is always half-way or completely full, depending on how many cans I find along the way."

As the years rolled by, Baron said he has met several different people and business owners in Mt. Vernon who learned about what he was doing and he said that many of them started giving him their aluminum cans as well.

"A lot of people leave their cans on their front porch or front yard for me and a lot of businesses give me the cans they save as well," Baron said. "It's a really good thing because a lot of people would throw them away with their trash and the cans would just end up in landfills taking up more space with the other garbage."

Baron has received numerous awards and recognitions from the City of Mt. Vernon as well as businesses and churches in Mt. Vernon. Baron said he

Jessica Hailey Robinson, 22, of London is charged with murder, manufacturing methamphetamine and first degree

A jury was seated for Robinson's murder trial on Monday and the prosecution started presenting their evidence to the jury Tuesday morning.

For the prosecution's first witness, Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery called Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant to the stand. Bryant, who was in charge of the murder investigation, said that Bullock was at a home on Lone Oak Drive in Mt. Vernon on December 1, 2011 before he was murdered

Bryant said that Bullock's death started out as a vehicle accident investigation after he and other law officers found Bullock dead in the driver's seat of his vehicle after it had

Nearly 30 marijuana plants seized in Brodhead last week

Brodhead was buzzing with activity last Tuesday and Wednesday as several police cruisers, military vehicles and helicopters were present within the city limits because the Kentucky Governor's Marijuana Eradication Detail were searching for marijuana plants in the area.

The Detail is a division of the Kentucky State Police Cannabis Suppression Branch.

According to Detective Darren Allen, the detail responded after receiving information, from an aerial spot by helicopter, about marijuana growing in a wooded area off Old Hwy 150 in Brodhead near the Dollar General Store.

Allen said around 30 marijuana plants worth approximately \$2,000 each were found, cut down and later destroyed.

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
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Don't Blink


Baron went on to say that he plans on collecting aluminum cans in the county for the rest of his life and that he considers it his contribution to society.

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

Special Needs Route

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

- 1. Arrive at a bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
- Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
- Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
- Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating
- arrangements.
- Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
- Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
- Do not block aisles in any way.

- 10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
- 11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a
- complete stop. 12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
- 13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
- 14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the principal. Parents
- must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop. 15. Report any damages to the bus.
- 16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
- 17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
- 18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal
- announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
- The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language. b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus.
 - c. Fighting on the bus.
 - d. Destruction of bus property.
 - e. Defiance of driver's authority. f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
- 20. Disciplinary Action: Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.

rolled approximately 300 yards down a hill off Lone Oak Road and smashed through a fence. However, Bryant said it turned into a murder investigation after discovering a gunshot wound in Bullock's side.

Bryant said he originally arrested and charged Mt. Vernon residents Gary Lee Kirby, 19, Joshua Duane Cameron, 25 and Bobby Peters, 36 with Bullock's murder. Upon further investigation, Bryant said he also arrested Mary Hannah Hunsucker, of Mt. Vernon and charged her with murder. He said Robinson was later arrested on an arrest warrant after she had was indicted by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Bryant told the jury that Kirby, Cameron, Peters and Hunsucker all pled guilty to murdering Bullock during their respective court dates in 2012. Hunsucker was sentenced to 20 years in prison while Kirby, Cameron and Peters were all sentenced to 25 years in prison, due to their separate charges for manufacturing methamphetamine.

During the investigation, Bryant said he received a call on December 2nd from the Pulaski County Sheriff's Department saying that Robinson and her stepmother had come to their office to report a murder.

In a tape recording of the interview with Bryant at the Pulaski County Sheriff's Department, Robinson told him that she was at her boyfriend's house at the intersection of Hwy 39 and Hwy 70 in Willaila on Wednesday, November 30, 2011. Robinson said her boyfriend was at work and that she had forgotten her hair straightener at Peters' and Hunsucker's house on Lone Oak Drive. Robinson said Peters and Hunsucker were in a relationship.

Robinson said Bullock came to her boyfriend's

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house to pick her up around 10 or 11 p.m. on the night of November 30th. She said her boyfriend didn't mind Bullock picking her up because he was a family friend whom her boyfriend trusted.

On the way to the house on Lone Oak Drive, Robinson called Hunsucker to let her know they were coming to get the hair straightener. However Robinson said Hunsucker kept asking her if Bullock had any "pills" to which she replied "I don't know." She admitted that Hunsucker and Peters knew that Bullock had just returned from a pain clinic in Georgia with his prescription pain pills.

When they arrived, Bullock and Robinson met Hunsucker and Peters inside the house. During this time, Hunsucker reportedly told Robinson that Kirby was inside the upstairs bathroom and that he was sick.

Robinson said that she got her hair straightener out of the downstairs bathroom and walked upstairs to say goodbye to Kirby. However, she said Kirby was nowhere to be found.

While she was upstairs, Robinson said she heard a commotion coming from outside in the driveway. When she walked toward the open window in the upstairs bedroom, toward the front of the house, Robinson said she could see the silhouettes of two masked men standing on each side of Bullock's car while he was in the car trying to leave.

Robinson said that's when the man on the driver's side shot Bullock and she could instantly tell that he appeared dead as he was slumped over the steering wheel while his car continued rolling down the steep driveway and down the embankment off Lone Oak Drive.

Robinson said she panicked and asked Hunsucker and Peters what had happened and they told her to calm down and be quiet.

After the murder. Robinson said the two unknown men came inside the

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back door of the residence and she identified them as Cameron and Kirby after they removed their masks. She said they both appeared extremely "high" and dis-

Robinson claimed that all four people told her to get inside the Peters' vehicle with them. She said they dropped Cameron off on an unknown country road and that Peters and Hunsucker dropped her and Kirby off at her boyfriend's residence. However, Robinson later said that her boyfriend "ran Kirby off" from his residence and that he left walk-

Robinson admitted that she followed their commands because she was afraid they would kill her. She added that Cameron told her that if she said anything about the murder "he

After Robinson's first interview, Bryant told the jury that Kirby didn't provide any statements about the incident but that Cameron, Hunsucker and Peters did provide statements. In their interviews, Bryant said that there was several inconsistencies between their testimonies and Robinson's tes-

Bryant said that the view from the upstairs window of Peters' house, where Robinson claimed she witnessed the murder, the view was obstructed by a large flower pot outside. He said that he had to press his head up against the window to look outside when he was trying to reconstruct the incident.

In the second tape recording with Robinson, Bryant confronted her with the conflicting information she had given him previ-

Robinson told Bryant that she still witnessed the murder from the upstairs window and that she was about a foot away from the window, which Bryant didn't find feasible.

Jackson Energy petitions to raise customer's charge on their bills

An electric company, servicing parts of Rockcastle County, has recently asked the Kentucky Public Service Commission to raise the rate charged for their service.

Jackson Energy is seeking approval to increase the average monthly bill by 1.5% each year in 2014, 2015 and 2016. The cooperative asked for permission to raise the monthly customer charge to cover the costs of their rising operating Jackson Energy President and CEO Carol Wright said

the company's last rate increase was in 2008. But since the last increase, Wright claims, their operating expenses have increased dramatically. "Our employees and managers have worked to trim our

operating budget," Wright said. "But our reductions haven't been enough to keep up with the five year inflation rate of Wright said the company has reduced the number of vehicles in their fleet, trimmed operating expenses and used modern technology to streamline day-to-day operations. But

even with these efforts, Carol said the company's expenses exceed their revenue. The proposal for a rate increase asks for a 4.5% increase

to be phased in over a three year period. "By requesting the adjustment to the customer charge over

three years, rather than all at one time, our co-op members can better plan for the increase," Wright said. "The change will be a flat \$2 per month for residential customers and will not affect their per kilowatt hour charge which is based on how much electricity they use each month."

Wright went on to say that they also want to help customers lower their bills by reducing the amount of electricity they use each month.

"Jackson Energy offers several rebate programs that can help pay for adding extra insulation and other improvements that will help our members use less electricity." Wright said.

Jackson Energy currently serves over 51,000 customers in seven counties which include Clay, Estill, Jackson, Laurel, Lee, Owsley and Rockcastle. Wright said their territory is largely a rural area which means they have fewer customers per mile of electric line than electric companies that serve larger towns and cities, meaning that they also have higher maintenance expenses.

The review of the rate case by the Kentucky Public Service Commission will take approximately six months and, if approved, the rate increase would probably go into effect in March 2014.

Jerry Cox sworn in as President of National Criminal Defense Bar

Jerry J. Cox, of Mount Vernon, was sworn in on Saturday, July 27, as President of the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers (NACDL) at its 56th Annual Meeting in San Francisco, CA. Mr. Cox has previously served the Association as its President-Elect, First- and Second Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Parliamentarian, as well as on the Association's Board of Di-

Mr. Cox is a sole practitioner based in Mount Vernon, where he has been practicing criminal defense law for over 40 years. Throughout his career, Mr. Cox has published and lectured extensively on criminal law issues. He is deeply committed to the defense bar and has served on the faculty of the Kentucky Department of Public Advocacy's (DPA) Trial Practice Institute for many years. In 2002, the Kentucky DPA recognized Mr. Cox's commitment to criminal defense by awarding him the Nelson Mandela Lifetime Achievement

Award. Mr. Cox is also a Past President of the Kentucky Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers and a member of the American Bar Association (ABA) and Kentucky Bar Association (KBA). He has served on the KBA's Unauthorized Practice of Law Committee, Criminal Rules Committee, Legislative Committee, Prescription Drug Abuse Task Force and as Chair of the KBA's Criminal Law Section. In 2004, he received the President's Special Service Award from the Kentucky Bar Association. He also served on the Kentucky Criminal Justice Council's Drug Strategy Committee, is chair of the Public Advocacy Commission, and served as president of the Kentucky Bar Foundation. Mr. Cox is certified as a Criminal Specialist by the National Board of Trial Advocacy (NBTA) and, in 2004, he served on the NBTA Board of Examiners.

Mr. Cox is a Life Member of NACDL and in numerous recent years, including 2009, Mr. Cox received NACDL's President's Commendation for outstanding service to the goals and objectives of the criminal defense bar and for outstanding service in fighting for the rights of all persons. Mr. Cox has been AV rated by Martindale-Hubbell since 1985 and was recognized in the March 2010 issue of Louisville Magazine as being selected by his peers as

1968 graduate of the University of Kentucky School Of Law and a 1965 graduate of Berea College.

Speaking to the at the annual meeting of the NACDL Membership and Board of Directors in San Francisco, Mr. Cox outlined several goals for the Association and defense bar during his term, including:

•"We must expand our advocacy and our commitment to elevate the advocacy of the defense bar on behalf of our returning vet-

•"I am determined to continue NACDL's efforts to address disparity in the criminal justice system. I am proud that last year NACDL, with support from the Foundation for Criminal Justice, co-sponsored a major symposium on disparity. It is great timing that the publication of that report coincides with this meeting. That report provides a solid platform for new project and initiatives."

•"We must work to implement NACDL's policy that no person should ever stand before a court when liberty is at stake or when a conviction may be entered without the assistance of a fully qualified, adequately resourced lawyer."

In addition to the critical issues of fairness and justice for U.S. military veterans, racial disparity in the American criminal justice system, and the funding and independence of the constitutionally-mandated defense function, newly-installed NACDL President Jerry J. Cox spoke to the need to continue to work to address the ongoing problems of draconian sentencing, including for juveniles; pre-trial justice issues; the innumerable collateral consequences of a criminal conviction and the importance of post-conviction restoration of rights: the disproportionate leverage of prosecutors, its causes and the resulting 'trial penalty' that has led to a criminal justice system overwhelmingly administered via the 'plea bargain'; and the critical importance of support for the Foundation of Criminal Jus-





interest in the department and vote on your membership. When you return to the meeting room we inform you about your membership to the department. We almost always accept anyone who has the eagerness to join our department. The first six months is

your probationary period. During which time you cannot have lights and sirens in your vehicle, you cannot vote but your opinion is always welcome and your gear must remain at the station. We try to outfit everyone in gear if we have it available. Many volunteer fire departments are not as fortunate as Brodhead. Many departments' gear is scarce and only those who actively fight fires have gear and even then it may be outdated and unfit for service. Brodhead has been fortunate in receiving grants for gear and try to maintain serviceable gear for new members. Our probationary members are fitted for gear and are given a yellow helmet signifying they are on probation. These six months are used to evaluate their performance and activity within our department.

When you join, the training begins. Being a firefighter takes dedication, dedication to training. There is so much that you will need to learn about firefighting. Later I will go

more in depth into the training it takes to be a firefighter but for this week I will stick to a broad view. As a volunteer you will need to obtain 150 hours of training to become a certified volunteer or level 2 firefighter in the state of Kentucky. At my department we allow two years to achieve your certification. Once certified you have to maintain a minimum of 20 hours per year. Brodhead, however, asks our members to maintain 30 hours of training per year for firefighters and 40 hours per year for officers.

Finally, since most volunteers rely heavily on fundraisers to raise money for equipment and expenses, need to mention Brodhead's annual fundraiser coming up next

the Little World's Fair. Brodhead fire department has been doing the fair for several years now and your support has been most appreciated. Just so you know that half of the gate fee you pay goes towards the fire department with the other half used to pay for the fair company. We have two concession stands in the fairgrounds, the big stand by the concrete bleachers and the little stand at the end of the metal bleachers. All proceeds for these two concession stands go to the fire department with all the proceeds from the fair goes towards buying gear and equipment. So buying coming out and enjoying the fair, you support the fire department at the same time. Thank you very much in advance.

Students should check their **KEES** accounts for accuracy

Kentucky high school students and 2013 graduates should check their Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES) accounts for accuracy.

KEES allows students to earn money for college by getting good grades in high school and for qualifying scores on the ACT or SAT. Students eligible for free or reduced lunches may also earn awards for good scores on Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate exams. KEES is administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA).

To check awards and personal information, students need to use the MyKHEAA function on www.kheaa.com. If they do not already have a MyKHEAA account, they can easily set one up from the KHEAA home page.

Students may verify their KEES GPA is correct by taking the letter grade for each course taken during the year and converting it to a 4.0 scale on which an A =4.0, B = 3.0, C = 2.0, D =1.0, and F = 0. AP and IB course grades receive one

extra point of weight in the calculation, making an A = 5.0, B = 4.0, etc. The GPAis calculated by adding all the points together and dividing the total by the number of credits earned during the year.

Students who need to have GPAs or other information corrected should contact their high school's counselor.

If students experience problems with their MyKHEAA account or cannot see their KEES information, they should call the KHEAA College Access Team at 800-928-8926.

Students do not have to apply to receive their KEES awards. If they attend an eligible college or university, KHEAA will send their award to their college once the college verifies enroll-
