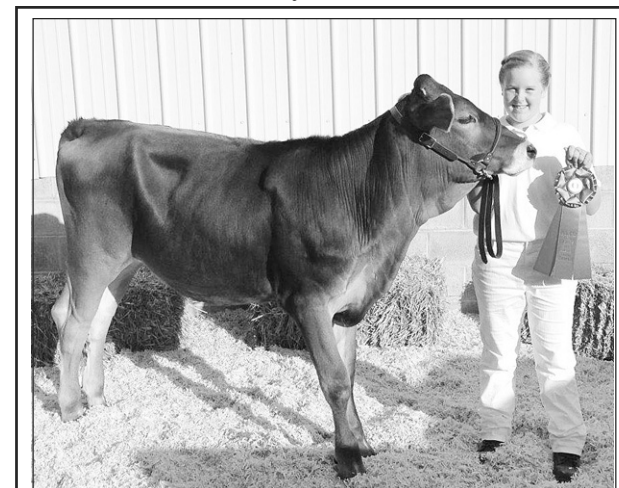

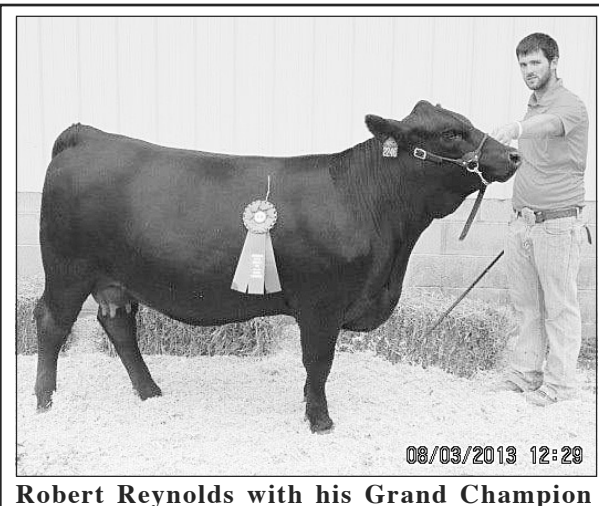

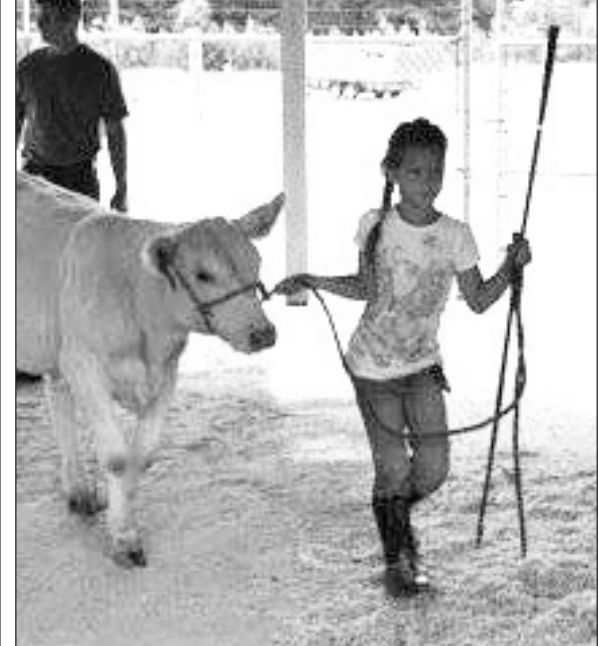

Scaring Children 101

Back in the day, when children got unruly and the parents tried to gain control, they would say something like, "You'd better behave or 'the booger man' or 'the sack man' or whatever 'man' of the day was going to get you". In some cases, it was a dual pair of horrid creatures known as "Raw Head" and "Bloody Bones".

Today, something like this wouldn't have any effect. You could tell them Satan himself was at the door to no avail. I remember watching the Wizard of Oz once a year on television. Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission recommends license and permit increases

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission recommended modest increases in license and permit fees on select non-resident licenses, senior-disabled licenses and resident permits for deer and elk.

Rates for basic hunting and fishing licenses for adult Kentucky residents are not affected by the proposal. The new rates are proposed for the upcoming license year which begins March 1, 2014.

The commission also proposed the 2013-2014 waterfowl seasons at its quarterly meeting, held Aug. 14.

The commission recommends all hunting, fishing and boating regulations for approval by the General Assembly and approves all expenditures by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. All recommendations must be approved by two legislative committees before they become law. Commission members proposed increasing the fee for 13 non-resident licenses and permits, six resident permits and the senior-disabled license. Commission members also voted to create separate fees for cow and bull elk permits for both residents and non-residents.

Proposals include raising the deer permit for residents from \$30 to \$35; senior/disabled licenses from \$5 to \$11; deer permit for non-residents from \$60 to \$160; quota bull elk permit for residents from \$30 to \$100; and non-resident quota bull elk permit from \$365 to \$550; among others.

The commission also proposed the creation of two new licenses for Kentucky residents: a senior lifetime sportsman's license for \$82 and a three-year fishing license for

\$55. A list of all the proposed changes will be available online at fw.ky.gov, the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife website.

In other action, commission members acted upon waterfowl seasons for 2013-14.

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission must place waterfowl seasons within the framework mandated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service because all migratory game birds are under federal control.

Last year, the 2012-13 duck season was split into two segments. The 2013-14 season will run continuously because of the late Thanksgiving date this year and the early closing of the federal framework. The calendar shift from 2012 to 2013 created this situation.

The next Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission meeting will be held at 8:30 a.m. Friday, Dec. 6. Meetings are held in the Arnold Mitchell Building, located at 1 Sportsman's Lane in Frankfort.

Persons interested in addressing the commission must notify the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife commissioner's office in writing at least 30 days in advance to be considered for placement on the meeting agenda. People who are hearing impaired and plan to attend the meeting should contact Kentucky Fish and Wildlife at least 10 days in advance and the agency will provide a translator. 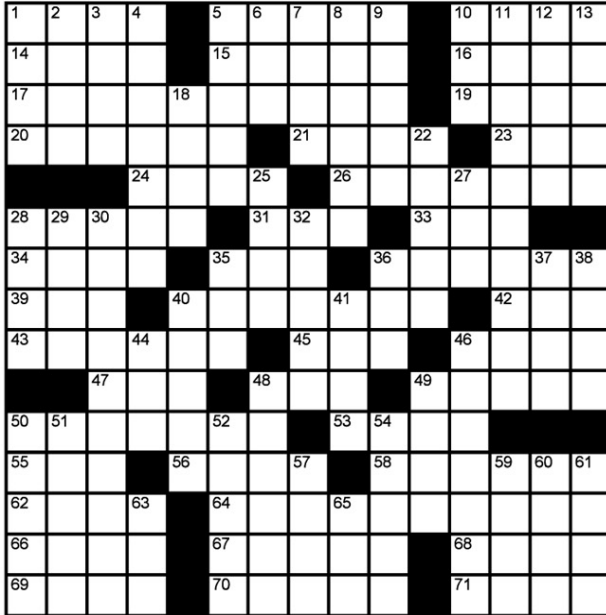

Newly proposed state house redistricting plan has Rockcastle County in 71st district

A special legislative session is underway in Frankfort to redraw state legislative districts for both the Kentucky Senate and House of Representatives.

The newly proposed redistricting plans still has Rockcastle County placed in Senate District 34 with Madison County and a southern portion of Fayette County, represented by Senator Jared Carpenter.

However, the proposed redistricting plan for the State House of Representatives has Rockcastle County moving from House District 80 to House District 71, meaning Rockcastle County's new representative would be Jonathan Shell instead of David Meade. House District 71 will also include Garrard County and a portion of northern Laurel County.

The redistricting plans for the house and senate are being hashed out in a special legislative session in their respective legislative chambers at the state capitol in Frankfort. The special session started Monday and is suspected to end this Friday.

The special legislative session came as a result of a federal court order entered by a panel of three federal judges last Friday that said the state legislature could no longer use legislative district lines drawn in 2002 which had been declared unconstitutional.

The special session costs taxpayers a total of \$60,000 a day. However, some lawmakers believe the session could last longer than the expected five days, meaning costs could well exceed \$300,000 of taxpayers' money.

Senate President Robert Stivers unveiled a redistricting plan for members of his chamber that wouldn't pit any incumbents against each other in upcoming elections. The senate redistricting plan was met with little opposition and is expected to be finalized by Friday.

Things are not going as smoothly in the House of Representatives as the latest plan, proposed by Speaker

Greg Stumbo, has four democrat and four republican incumbents running against each other in upcoming elections. However, the House State Government Committee approved the plan Tuesday and the redistricting plan is expected to come up for a vote on the House floor Wednesday afternoon.

The redistricting process is revisited every ten years to account for population changes based on census figures from the U.S. Census bureau. In the 2010 census, Kentucky showed major population shifts between 2000 and 2010 which required a reconfiguration of the legislative districts in both the senate and house.

Seth T. Taylor, 24, of Todd Road, Brodhead, was indicted for the offense of theft by unlawful taking. His bond was set at \$25,000 cash/property.

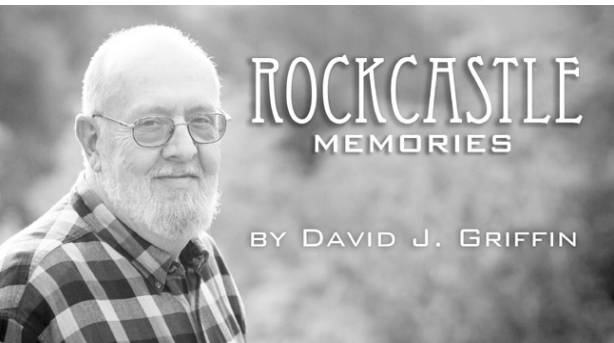

My Dad as Justice of the Peace

When I was a mere child, my father, G. H. "Hobe" Griffin, was elected to the office of magistrate in Rockcastle County. He was also the manager of the Mt. Vernon Hotel on Main Street. At that time, magistrates were called Justices of the Peace, and they had certain legal duties, including: performing marriages, presiding over misdemeanor cases such as traffic violations, and handling other petty criminal infractions. In addition, some Justices had authority over cases involving small debts and tenant disputes. The qualifications for this job were minimal, requiring little or no training in the law.

For many different reasons, Daddy delighted in being the one in authority in ruling on these common rites or trivial disputes.

Because my parents were divorced, I occasionally spent a weekend with him in his apartment in the hotel. One of the most frequent duties of my father was to rule on traffic violations that occurred during the evenings when the courthouse was closed. Daddy knew

most of the officers of the State Police who were assigned to Rockcastle County. And – just as is depicted in movies about a small town – he took pleasure in giving a traffic ticket to someone from out of state.

I recall many times when we were awakened by sound of the hotel's office bell; it was usually late at night when a cop would bring in some stranger who had been awarded a speeding ticket. If my memory serves, Daddy would look up the citation and then pronounce the maximum fine (most especially when it was someone from another state).

One particular night, he listened to the State Police Officer detail the circumstances of the speeding ticket and leveled a fine that seemed extremely high to me. The gentleman began to protest and quickly lost his temper. I can still see the look on Daddy's face as he then proceeded to direct the Officer to just haul the man to jail. In a flash, the man pulled out his wallet, dug out the bills, and paid the fine. After that guy left the hotel, Daddy said to the po-

Points East

I enjoy writing book reviews in this column from time to time, particularly if the book is by a Kentucky author, focused on eastern Kentucky and so interesting that I found myself propped up in bed, still reading, three hours after I should have gone to sleep.

The Strange Case of Jonathan Swift and the Real Long John Silver by Robert A. Prather met all those requirements and then some!

Robert Prather and his wife, Karen, have run his own commercial business in the Meade County community of Garrett for more 40 years. He is also a historian active in numerous historical and archaeology societies and a field editor for Acclaim Press.

My attention to the book was first drawn when I heard that Robert was from Garrett. I wrongly assumed that he was from Floyd County. Turns out there are two Garretts, Kentuckys which, I suppose, is another good reason for zip codes. Prather's Garrett is located just a few miles from Fort Knox but that doesn't mean that doesn't know his eastern Kentucky history.

The book is focused on the lost treasure of Jonathan Swift and his silver mine, legends of which have run rampant in eastern Kentucky for more well over 200 years. In fact, Wolfe County KY has a historical marker regarding Swift's Silver Camp that used to sit in front of the old Courthouse in Campton. I assume it's still there. Wolfe County even has a Swift's Silver Mine Festival over Labor Day Week-end every year. I'm sure it'll be happening this year, too.

Prather's book tries to separate fact from fiction and I promise you faithfully that you will not find a more thoroughly documented accumulation of information about the life and times of Jonathan Swift and his supposed treasure than what is contained in this book. Nor will you find a more intriguing set of questions as to where the mine and/or treasure is actually located.

I am not a treasure hunter and I have always been skeptical that the legend was nothing more than old wife's tales. As Prather points out, there are no fewer than 40 documents hanging around that are purportedly the original or hand copies of the original journals on which the legend are based.

Prather suggests that, the treasure mine or mines did exist, but not necessarily in eastern Kentucky.

He documents, beyond doubt, several large land holdings owned by Swift in both eastern and north central Kentucky as well as northeastern Virginia. He makes a most convincing case that the same Jonathan Swift mined for silver in at least 4 different locations, including eastern KY and that he was, indeed, a frequent visitor to the state during the 1790's.

The final section of the book devotes 75 pages to a strong case that Robert Louis Stevenson's famous novel, *Treasure Island* was based the same Jonathan Swift's lost treasure.

But I was gut hooked by the book because it contains several hundred excerpts from historically accurate documents including newspaper articles, letters, deeds, indentures, and references from many other books and published articles on the subject. Treasure seeking, notwithstanding, If you are remotely interested in Kentucky history, this book is a must read because you will discover many facts you've never before heard about.

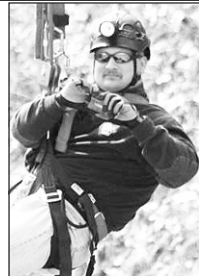

I was recently asked how I do what I do. How do I cope with seeing what I see? I was asked this because this person had seen a very bad wreck on the news and they wander if I was there and I replied yes I was there. This person was certain there were serious injuries just by seeing the condition of the vehicles involved and they wanted to know how serious. I said there were obvious broken bones and other potential life threatening/traumatic injuries. A shiver went down there back and they uttered, wow I don't know how you do it.

Going into this career you know at some point you will see and possibly smell certain things that some people may not be able to handle. The training you receive does not fully prepare you for what you will encounter in the real world setting. A mental preparation has to occur when you go on certain calls. As an individual you see a firefighter

and you may think it would be cool to ride in a fire truck or have lights and sirens in your vehicle or you may think it would be cool to be able to walk around in bunker pants all day. You see a firefighter as being tough physically buy people seldom think about firefighters being tough mentally.

I have seen a lot of gruesome scenes in my short 13 years in the service and because of that I have developed a sensory that allows me not to dwell on horrific injuries. When I arrive on a scene that has the potential to be a scene full of serious injuries, I focus on my training. For example, on a vehicle accident that involves people trapped, I focus on how I can get them out as quickly and efficiently as possible so they can get to the hospital. I focus on using the tools properly and safely. I don't stare at what may be sticking out of a person's leg; I just treat the

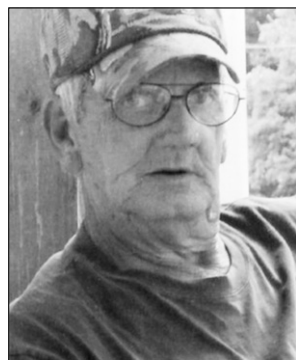

BAKED REUBEN DIP
1 jar (32 ounce) sauerkraut, rinsed and well drained
10 ounces sliced deli corned beef, chopped
2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese
2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
1 cup mayo (I used Miracle Whip®)
1/4 cup Russian salad dressing
Preheat oven to 350°. Grease 13 X 9 glass baking dish.

what to expect. I do know that my brothers and sisters in the fire service are there for each other. We take care of our own. After a traumatic run we sit down and talk about what we saw and make sure everyone is alright. If someone needs help, we get them help. Even firefighters, as tough as we are, need help every once in a while. After all we are still human.

I know this week went in a different direction than last week, so next week I am getting back on track. I will answer last week's question next time. The question was how many layers does the firefighter turnout coat have?

liceman, "That ought to teach him a lesson."

Probably the most frequent duty of the Justices was to perform civil marriage ceremonies. In those days, many couples decided to have a Justice of the Peace perform the ceremony for a variety of reasons. One of the most frequent was because the couple was of different faiths and could not decide on a particular preacher. Others felt that only the blessing of the state was needed to cement their union. Some preferred a ceremony reflecting their own views about marriage rather than that of a particular religion. And, of course, many couples simply wanted the ceremony to be conducted quickly. For whatever reason, Daddy did not question their motivation; he just "tied the knot."

One night in particular, the hotel office bell rang, and Daddy jerked on his clothes to investigate. When we came to the hotel lobby, a couple explained that they wanted to get married. When Daddy told them what the cost would be, they began to argue with him, saying that his fee was too large. So he immediately ordered them to vacate his hotel. That is when the fellow began to threaten Daddy. Such a mistake.

Daddy swiftly pulled his Smith and Wesson 38 Special and brought the event to an immediate close. (I was as nervous as a cat in a room full of rocking chairs.) We stayed in the lobby until Daddy was convinced that they were really gone. There was never a dull moment in the hotel business.

It is from his service as a magistrate that Daddy's name is still within public viewing: he is listed on the bronze plaques which hang in the Rockcastle County Courthouse and in the Rockcastle County Hospital. Ole Hobe, as people called him, must have done a pretty good job as far as they were concerned; he won re-election twice and served for a total of twelve years. Spending time with my dad was rarely dull – for a kid my age, it was practically adventurous.

His efforts with environmental engineers and scientists have improved treatment facilities in South Africa, India, China, Canada, Puerto Rico and South Korea. The cost-effective solutions he promoted and implemented bridged the gap between engineers and environmentalists, while satisfying the demands of regulators and those being regulated."

I further read in the ar-

ticle that he was born at Somerset, KY. and has great expertise in situations such as ours.

I did not find this man in my research but rather he found us while he was at one of our hotels and left his business card. Here is another quote of his from an email I received from him: "...and my years growing up in neighboring counties of Rockcastle County. It is, in my opinion, undrinkable because of its taste, and, therefore, a threat to the public health because it motivates the receiving customers and potential consumers to find another source of drinking water..."

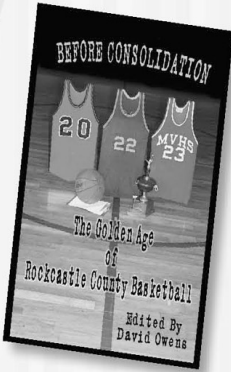

The work for the day was finished, and I was relaxing in the comfort of the den when the doorbell rang. When I opened the door, I was pleasantly surprised. A man, a true friend I had known for many years, was standing there. After greeting my friend warmly, I invited him to come into our home and "sit a spell." He graciously accepted my invitation and said that he would "just like to talk for a while." I directed him to the den where, in a relaxing environment, we, engaged in a most pleasant conversation that lasted well over an hour.

Believing that my friend was a bit lonely, he had lost his wife sometime earlier, I gave him the opportunity to direct the conversation and talk about whatever he wished. During that conversation, the last one we ever had, we looked back over our years of friendship and talked about many good things that we had experienced. Too, we shared some information that was helpful to both of us. One thing characterized that conversation: Everything that was said was helpful, encouraging and uplifting; neither a single negative word nor a single critical word was spoken. Brodhead. According to state police reports, Trooper Scottie Pennington had an active warrant out for Dooley's arrest and he had responded to Shafer's residence on Gum Sulphur Road after receiving information that Dooley was at the home.

Once Pennington arrived, he discovered that Dooley was inside so he scanned the rest of the home for his own safety.

During his scan of the residence for other people, Pennington noticed that there was a two-year-old boy inside the residence and he also noticed a plastic zip-lock bag lying in plain view that contained an unknown white powdery substance he believed to be methamphetamine. He also observed several glass smoking pipes and snorting straws lying in plain view throughout the home as well.

After receiving consent from Shafer to search the residence, Pennington found a zip-lock bag containing suspected meth inside a dresser drawer, another large plastic bag containing suspected meth inside a laundry basket and a plastic bag containing a bottle of liquid Drano inside the kitchen closet.

Dooley and Shafer were

arrested for possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), drug paraphernalia and second degree wanton endangerment. Dooley was also separately charged with receiving stolen property and third degree burglary on two other separate arrest warrants.

Both Dooley and Shafer were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Dooley remains lodged on a \$5,000 cash/property bond and Shafer was later released on a \$5,000 unsecured bond.

In the second incident, two people were arrested for manufacturing methamphetamine Monday night after police discovered four one-step meth labs at a residence on Snowflake Lane in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Donna McHone, 29, of Berea and Lindsay York, 27, of Crab Orchard.

According to state police reports, Trooper Adam Childress responded to the residence after receiving a complaint of a possible meth lab inside the home.

Once Childress arrived, McHone answered the front door and Childress could smell a strong chemical odor coming from inside the home.

After searching the residence, he found various items associated with manufacturing meth, including a bottle of Drano, bag of rock salt, coffee filters, Coleman

liquid fuel, rubber tubing and lithium batteries. Childress also found four one-step meth labs inside a freezer.

McHone and York were arrested for manufacturing methamphetamine and they both remain lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on \$25,000 cash/property bonds.

hiding something underneath a vehicle in the parking lot and then walking away. Officers were quick to notice that the vehicle and the man matched the descriptions given by the employees.

After searching underneath the vehicle, officers found four fake traveler's checks. Officers also found several other fake traveler's checks on Newland at the time of his arrest.

Newland admitted to officers that he had used a fake traveler's check at the Pet Sense store moments before being arrested.

Newland was charged with second degree criminal possession of a forged instrument and police said that other charges are pending. Newland was lodged in the Pulaski County Detention Center where he was later released on bond.

sioner for Rockcastle County and he served as Rockcastle County Attorney from 1969 to 1973.

The Judicial Nominating Commission is led by Kentucky Chief Justice John D. Minton Jr. and includes two lawyers, elected by all the lawyers in their circuit/district and four Kentucky citizens (two democrats and two republicans) appointed by Governor Steve Beshear.

The Kentucky Constitution requires that the Judicial Nominating Commission submit three candidates to the governor. The governor then has sixty days to fill the vacancy.

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UNITE's 'Hope Wall,' education classroom unveiled

Last Friday, 10 years after the launch of Operation UNITE, elected officials and community volunteers gathered to celebrate two new reasons for Hope in the fight against drugs: a wall celebrating those who have overcome addiction and a state-of-the-art mobile education classroom that will be used in schools across southern and eastern Kentucky.

"It is time to start celebrating the lives that have been forever changed through your treatment and recovery efforts," Fifth District Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers told the nearly 250 people gathered for the announcement.

"In the midst of those cries for help we're beginning to hear more tears of joy and triumph," Rogers said, noting that for the first time in a decade Kentucky drug-related overdose deaths declined last year. "It is because of your efforts."

"Today we celebrate victories, celebrate recovery and celebrate hope," noted Clay County Pastor Doug Abner, whose efforts helped spark church involvement in the anti-drug fight a decade ago.

Members of the Chad's Hope Teen Challenge Recovery Center, a faith-based recovery program located northwest of town, unveiled the new UNITE "Hope Wall," which features photos and brief statements about the individuals' journeys to sobriety. Through "the word of their testimony," Rogers noted, maybe others will realize there is a way out of the shackles of addiction.

An example of a family's struggles was shared by long-time educators John and Nancy Hale of Rockcastle County. Their son - a model student and athlete - became addicted to medication that had been prescribed for an injury. Through many ups and downs he eventually turned his life around, recently graduated from law school and has gotten married.

"One of the things we've learned in the middle of the pain is that we are not alone," Nancy Hale said, referring to their steadfast faith throughout the years-long process. "We had to choose life" to make sure no other parent goes through what their family has endured.

Recovery is just a part of the picture.

"I think we all agree that the best way to save our children from suffering through the pains of withdrawal, relapses in recovery,

and the trials of drug addiction," Rogers said, introducing UNITE's new "On The Move" mobile classroom.

This latest initiative - funded through a three-year competitive Rural Health Outreach grant awarded through the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration - features an interactive drug prevention program tailored to elementary, middle and high school students. In addition, youth will participate in three interactive training modules that focus on the consequences of distraction and impairment from alcohol and other drugs.

"Education is vitally important, but the love of one person can make a huge difference," said Dr. Michael Benson, president of Eastern Kentucky University, who shared his own family's story of dealing with addiction.

"I'm proud to be associated with this cause," Benson said, pledging ECU's support. "We want to be a part. We want to bring the power of education to the fight against drugs."

The interior of the mobile classroom features colorful hand-painted murals. Rogers presented the artist, Rebecca Arvin of Rockcastle County, with a "Difference Maker" award for donating her time and talent to the project.

State Senate President Robert Stivers, whose 25th District covers western Eastern Kentucky counties, credited Rogers for giving him "a lot of political courage" to take on the drug fight in Frankfort.

Kentucky is frequently taking the lead in efforts to prevent and curb the effects of substance abuse, noted Mike Barry, director of People Advocating Recovery (PAR) in Kentucky.

Speaking about the "joys of recovery," Barry emphasized that it is important to remove the stigma and discrimination of addiction and recovery.

Families "are afraid to reach out and ask for help (because of what others may think)," Barry commented, adding, "There is help. There is hope. And, there is healing."

"UNITE is now a national one of you," Rogers said. "It is the grassroots efforts and your individual courage of conviction that has helped save countless lives through the partnerships you have committed to the three branches of Operation UNITE - law enforcement, treatment and education."

Brief Battle Description:

In Maj. Gen. Kirby Smith's 1862 Confederate offensive into Kentucky, Brig. Gen. Patrick R. Cleburne led the advance with Col. John S. Scott's cavalry out in front. The Rebel cavalry, while moving north from Big Hill on the road to Richmond, Kentucky, on August 29, encountered Union troopers and began skirmishing. After noon, Union artillery and infantry joined the fray, forcing the Confederate cavalry to retreat to Big Hill. At that time, Brig. Gen. Mahlon D. Manson, who commanded Union forces in the area, ordered a brigade to march to Rogersville, toward the Rebels. Fighting for the day stopped after pursuing Union forces briefly skirmished with Cleburne's men in late afternoon. That night, Manson informed his superior, Maj. Gen. William Nelson, of his situation, and he ordered another brigade to be ready to march in support, when required. Kirby

Smith ordered Cleburne to attack in the morning and promised to hurry reinforcements (Churchill's division). Cleburne started early, marching north, passed through Kinston, dispersed Union skirmishers, and approached Manson's battle line near Zion Church. As the day progressed, additional troops joined both sides. Following an artillery duel, the battle began, and after a concerted Rebel attack on the Union right, the Yankees gave way. Retreating into Rogersville, the Yankees made another futile stand at their old bivouac. By now, Smith and Nelson had arrived and taken command of their respective armies. Nelson rallied some troops in the cemetery outside Richmond, but they were routed. Nelson and some men escaped but the Rebels captured approximately 4,000 Yankees. The result(s): Confederate victory
