
It's worth the trip. You need more than two days however to really explore all the activities available...

The Great Saltpetre Cave All throughout my life in Rockcastle County, I was enthralled by caves. As a young boy, I began my spelunking adventures by playing in and around Big Fill Cave, which was located near my mother's house in the Pine Grove section of the county. Many of my friends and I spent numerous hours investigating the miles of rooms and caverns in that old cave. It would be hard to name all of my friends who have explored that cave with me.

The awesome beauty of Kentucky's rolling hills is more than meets the eye. you scratch Kentucky's surface, you will find an incredible underground world just waiting to be discovered. According to the internet, there are more than 130 caves located in Kentucky – four of which I have spent a great deal of time exploring. They are: Big Fill, Carter Caves, Mammoth Cave, and Saltpetre Cave.

One of the most attractive features of caves in Kentucky is the constant temperature, which is approximately 58 degrees Fahrenheit. I have also always been enamored by the vast rock formations located it caves. The formations that hang from the ceiling are called stalactites, and the stone developments from the floor to the ceiling are referred to as stalagmites. I first learned of these stone monuments from my brother, Al, when he initially introduced me to cave struc-

Al taught me the names and how they were formed. It was he that initially took me to the "secret room" inside Big Fill Cave. When we first entered the room, Al showed me his initials that he had burned into the wall when he was a young boy. He also assisted me in putting my own mark on the wall there.

I have also been interested in the wildlife found in Kentucky's cave system. Al first showed me the bat population that was found in Big Fill. I have also seen several animals that use the cave for their homes.

My second cave that we explored was SaltPetre Cave just a few miles from Livingston in Rockcastle County. I cannot recall who first introduced me to that particular cave, but I remember that I was only a young boy when I first explored its huge caverns and passageways.

My wife and I were watching a program on KET recently, and we learned that occasionally Saltpetre Cave is used for shows from Renfro Valley. The cave has a storied past. It was originally discovered by Robert Baker in 1798 not far from Livingston. By 1804, the cave was used for mining saltpetre, which was shipped to powder mills where it was blended with sulfur and charcoal to produce gunpowder. By 1815, it became uneconomical to commercially mine there. The cave settled back into obscurity and was only visited on a limited basis. I believe that it is occasionally opened for



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

trict and districts across the Commonwealth to make significant cuts to their budgets and to personnel, compelling school boards to increase property taxes in order that districts might continue to operate and serve the students.

The Resolution ends by challenging the House of Representatives and Senate to "take action, putting the students of the Commonwealth of Kentucky first, reinvesting in their future and fully funding the mandates of Unbridled Learning to ensure that Kentucky's public education system can offer students the path to college and career readi-

Dr. Tina Cain Hasty brought the matter before the board saying that the Kentucky School Board Association was considering adopting the Resolution, or a similar one that other school boards have written, and she wanted the local board to consider its adoption. Dr. Hasty is a member of the state school board.

The resolution was adopted unanimously.

Also during the meeting, the board went into closed session to discuss the sale of some board property. After about a half hour, members returned and voted unanimously to sell land in Houston Point to Jason Wood for \$7,000. The land had been donated to the board by Ed Buis.

The board heard an update from finance officer Melanie Lyons. Ms. Lyons began by telling the board that the fiscal year began with \$234,000 less in the general fund, and expenses had been more in September than in September of last year but finances were "holding their own" even though the general fund has \$627,000 less than at the same time a year ago. "Revenue should pick up in November, "Lyons said when revenue from property taxes begins coming in. She said the board had received less in the food service fund in September and that the federal government needed to pass a budget soon because their inaction was beginning to "trickle down" to local boards. The finance officer said that the local board receives \$60-\$70,000 monthly from the federal government.

Supt. David Pensol gave the board an update on the progress toward district delivery targets, including student proficiency for combined reading and math, college and career readiness, graduation rate and closing the achievement gap.

According to a hand-out to the board, the elementary schools surpassed their target of 45.7 with a 47.5 for student proficiency for combined reading and math primarily because of Brodhead and Roundstone schools exceeding their target goals. However, the middle and high school fell

trict is working with elementary schools to unify and improve reading and math instruction and a new math series, aligned to state standards, has been purchased to unify and improve math instruction across the district.

The high school fared well on the college and career readiness rate, exceeding the target of 52.4 by 10 points. The school also met the target goal of 92.1 for the graduation rate. Pensol said it was due to a plan implemented during the 2012-2013 school year to improve the graduation rate. The plan involves working with students at risk on an individual basis to address specific issues impacting the student's ability or decision to stay in school. The rate of 92.1 is based on the number of incoming freshmen and has improved over 10 points from the rate for 2012 of 81.3.

The elementary schools improved their achievement gap by almost 10 points from 34.1 in 2012 to 43.3 in 2013 and surpassed their target of 40.7 for 2013 because of Brodhead and Roundstone elementary schools exceeding their target goals for the gap group. However, the middle school and high school both missed their target goal. The middle school's target was 38.9 and they achieved 32.1 and the high school had a target goal of 41.1 but achieved only 30.7.

The board has held workshops focused on a balanced budget during which a line by line analysis of expenditures and revenue has been completed to ensure a balanced budget and inform decision making. Available funding has been prioritized to maximize student instruction and learning, according to the handout.

During the meeting, the board also voted to hold the November meeting as a Special Meeting at 4:30 p.m. on November 12th, in order for the board to attend the Fall Regional Meeting at East Bernstadt Independent. Pensol said the regional meeting would cover such issues as superintendent evaluations and contracts, ethics, etc.

The Superintendent's Personnel Actiions Report for Sept. 11 thru Oct. 8th, showed certified personnel hirings including Herbie Brock as Head Academic Coach at RCMS and Hannah Weckman as substitute teacher.

Retirements included: Janice Davidson and Leon Davidson's retirement, as teacher and principal, respectively.

In the classified hirings, Cole Abney was hired as an assistant football coach at RCHS, Courtney Brock as an assistant academic coach at RCMS, Trina Bustle as a substitute teacher and Morgan Smith as an assistant basketball coach.

Hopkins told the board that ways to use the remaining \$116,000 of a Department of Transportation grant were still being discussed. \$100,000 of the grant has already been used on improvements on the CSEPP site and Hopkins suggested that one use of the remaining funds be used to finish the parking lot, begun originally for additional parking for SourceHOV. Anything remaining could be used toward the \$120,000 changeorder involving needed electrical lines for the CSEPP building, she

Hopkins also reported that the government shutdown had not affected operations at SourceHOV and subsidiaries because funding had already been allocated by the federal government. "Unless the shutdown lasts a lot longer, work on the backlog of veterans claims should not be affected," Hopkins said.

As to Anchor Packing, Hopkins said that Anchor was "very happy," with their facility and that she was confident that a new \$5,000,000 piece of machinery would be installed in the Mt. Vernon plant although Anchor has not made an official announcement as to its placement as yet. She said that Jackson Energy was "working hard" with Anchor to get their electrical rates cheaper.

As to the food hub, scheduled to be installed at the former IGA building in Brodhead, things are "moving along very well," Hopkins said. A \$150,000 contract has been awarded to the distribution center which will be located in the IGA building. She also said that a \$350,000 grant to the Growing Warriors/ASPI Food Hub through the Kentucky Department of Agriculture was virtually assured though the grocery part of the project was "three years down the road." The distribution center is expected to open in the spring of 2014.

Mrs. Snyder said that since she has been working 6 or 7 days a week at Hitachi in Berea, her work in bake sales has been limited and she has come to have to de-

Cursed Car Kills Actor, James Dean, Part II

James Dean lived much less than an ideal childhood, with his mother dying when he was only nine years old. This forced his father to send him to live with an aunt and uncle where soon he was sexually abused by a minister. Dean came back to California after high school graduation to attend UCLA, majoring in Drama, after deciding against pre-law.

Dean registered as a homosexual, avoiding the draft, and was said to have had relationships with men as well as women during his brief but iconic days as an actor. He also dabbled in the occult and is said to have been cursed by a girlfriend that was involved in black magic, whom he spurned.

This briefly recaps the background of actor James Byron Dean as noted from last week's column of "Strange But True?". This week, we will look at his love of fast cars and racing, and his untimely death.

Dean loved to race and bought fast sports cars. The most famous car being a rare 1955 silver Porsche Spyder, one of only ninety ever made. The car is now almost as famous as James Dean, himself. Dean had a rather explicit nickname around Hollywood, as it was said by some directors that he was difficult to work with. His nickname was "Little Bastard", which he had painted on the back of his Spyder, and the number 130 on the front.

Several of his friends said that the car was trouble, and actor Alec Guinness even went so far as to say that it would probably be his death. "Giant", Dean's last film, had just been finished filming, so James Dean and his racing crew headed for Salinas, California, for an upcoming race. A Porsche factorytrained mechanic, Rolf Wutherich, rode along with Dean.

The morning of the day of his death began simple enough. They all had coffee and donuts in Hollywood, with James Dean wearing his favorite red jacket, as he wore in "Giant". The day wore on, with Dean being stopped for speeding at 3:30 PM by Officer O.V. Hunter. By 5:45, James Dean would be fatally injured.

About 5:45 PST, the Spyder was going an estimated 85 miles per hour when a Ford coupe driven by 23-year old Donald Turnupseed made a left turn, and the Ford and Spyder collided almost head-on. The Spyder flipped, but landed on its wheels. The Ford was 39

feet away as a result of the

Donald Turnupseed was only slightly injured with a few bruises. The other passenger in the Spyder, mechanic Rolf Wutherich, had some broken bones. James Dean was extracted from his car yet alive, but he had internal injuries and a broken neck, along with other fractures. He was pronounced dead on arrival at the Paso Robles War Memorial Hospital at 6:20 PST by Dr. Robert Bossert. James Dean's last words are thought to be, "That guy's gotta stop...he'll see

Both drivers, Turnupseed and Dean, were neither charged with any crime. Turnupseed granted only one interview after the crash, and has remained silent concerning the incident since. He did say that he had killed Dean and lived with a lot of remorse. Donald Turnupseed died from cancer at age 63 in 1995. James Dean is buried in Fairmont, IN, in Park Cemetery, about a mile from where he grew up on his aunt and uncle's farm.

Now, for the fate of the silver Porsche 550 Spyder. To stress the importance of safe driving, the California State Highway Patrol had the car taken to various high schools. The transport wrecked, throwing George Barkhuis from the vehicle and the Spyder landed on him, killing him.

On the one year anniversary of Dean's accident, a fifteen year-old boy looking at the car on display was run over by the car. The bolts securing the vehicle suddenly snapped as if by unseen hands, crushing the boy's legs.

In transportation again, the car slid from the bed of a truck, causing a fatal accident. A boy stole an emblem from the car, resulting in a serious gash on his arm. Two tires from the car were bought by a doctor, and both tires blew out at the same time resulting in a non-fatal accident. Another accident occurred when parts of the engine were used in another car. Death, accidents, and a trail of bad luck follow this car.


The most mysterious of all is that the car was en route from California to Florida, but seems to have vanished "into thin air".

Famous car customizer, George Barris, has built a replica of the Spyder. He said, "The car took off by itself and ran into a building. It hit the wall and broke a light. I don't know how it happened. It's mystifying."


