




Local woman arrested for methmanufacturing

A local woman was arrested for manufacturing methamphetamine last Tuesday after police raided a home on Old Slate Road in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Magnolia Lynn Malicote, 20, of Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, officers received an anonymous tip about someone manufacturing meth at g the residence.

Once officers arrived, no one was home and they didn't notice anything suspicious. However, shortly after officers left they received another anonymous tip stating Malicote was walking along a fence row behind the residence and that she was allegedly trying to destroy something.

Officers returned to the home where they found five meth labs and various other drug paraphernalia items in a field behind the residence.

Local woman arrested for **Jackson County** bank robbery

A Rockcastle County. woman was arrested last Saturday for her involvement in a recent bank robbery in Jackson County.

Arrested was Sabrina Nicole Hensley, 29, of Or-

According to state police reports, a woman entered Jackson County Bank in Sand Gap around 3:30 p.m. last Thursday. Once inside, the woman walked up to the counter and demanded money from the teller. The woman left the bank with an undisclosed amount of cash and fled in a gold or silver four door car.

The woman was described as wearing a pink or orange shirt and a light colored hat. She was believed to be unarmed. The vehicle she fled in was last seen heading towards Madison County.

Last Saturday, Mt. Vernon Police Assistant Chief Barry Adams received information about some dyed money that was exchanged at a local business in Mt. Vernon.

After further investigation, officers traced the dyed money back to Hensley and they also discovered the original dye pack that had exploded in a stack of stolen cash. Hensley had allegedly destroyed some of the money she stole from the bank andalso some of the clothing she wore during the robbery.

Officers have also questioned a witness who said Hensley volunteered to perform the bank robbery and that Hensley was the woman who robbed the

The bank robbery is still under investigation by the Kentucky State Police. Officers said Hensley was part of a team that robbed the bank and that more arrest are possible in the future.

Hensley was charged with second degree robbery and tampering with physi-

Renovations being done to Brodhead baseball fields

Major renovations are underway at the little league baseball fields in Brodhead.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis said the county is funding several different renovations to the three baseball fields, all along South Main Street in Brodhead.

Carloftis said that repairs to all three field include: replacing the fences, spreading new infield dirt, replacing foul poles, building a storage building/restrooms near the tee ball field, building covered bleachers for the tee ball field, replacing the backstop at Thacker Field and remodeling the brick bathrooms between the baseball fields and the

"All these renovations were much needed for these baseball fields,' Carloftis said. "Especially replacing the backstop that was about to break because of extensive water damage that was causing it to rust and break apart in some places. That was becoming too danger-

Carloftis said the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court had previously approved the funding of \$100,000 to be used out of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court Recreational Fund and Occupational Tax funds. He said \$50,000 has to be used by July 1, 2014

Well we did it. Last Saturday Loretta and I joined about 25 other members of Team TKO and well over a thousand other people to participate in the annual Step Out Walk To Stop Diabetes in the backwoods at Keeneland Race Track.

The walking trail was purportedly split in two sections; the first being one mile long and the second, two and a half miles long.

Loretta, Mr. Parkinson and I thought we followed the signs for the one mile trail but three days after the fact as I sit here reminiscing the event, I still have my doubts. If, in fact, the trail we followed, was only one mile long, I promise you faithfully that it is easily the longest mile in Kentucky.

Tyler and the rest of our team had finished the walk before Loretta and I topped the first hill. In fact, I'm told that Tyler wanted to start over and come back looking for us. The truth of the matter is that if there hadn't been

some rock walls along the way for me to stop and rest on I probably would not have made it because Mr. Parkinson was doing all he could to hold me down. As it was I spent a lot of the way leaning on Loretta's shoul-

I know for sure that I

have never before seen so many day-glo orange orange and chartreuse running shorts in one gathering nor so many dogs mingled with an otherwise ordinary crowd. There must be something magical about the mutual attraction between dogs and diabetics. One that I will forever remember was a big dog with a lab-like profile except he had a Churchill buildog head and he was on a long leash being led by a slender young woman who was maybe twenty something. She had a bag full of 16 oz. Bottles of water and every few hundred yards the dog would gulp down a whole bottle.

I kept wondering when


he'd have to stop and pee. He never did. And I'm still wondering where he put it.

We have a "measured mile" beginning at the end of my driveway, going out the end of Charlie Brown Road, Up Old Rail to a designated turnabout, then back down down Old Railroad to the other end of Charlie Brown and Back to the end of my driveway. Four different cars, my pickup and two bicycle odometers show the distance to be exactly one mile. One of the cars was a BMW owned by an arrogant numbskull who believes nothing is as accurate as German engineering.

When the weather and Mr. Parkinson permit, I am fond of walking my measured mile and photographing wildflowers in the weeds and gardens along the way. I can tell you, for sure, that the Keeneland mile was much longer than mine, plus a lot of it was up hill.

Of course I tell my grand children that I had to walk over a mile to school on Blair Branch and it was all up hill. Both ways. Actually I did walk a measured mile and one tenth to Blair Branch Grade School. The distance was measured at one time or another by practically every car on the

Taking Care of Each Other When I was young, my

mother and I lived with my grandparents, who both were very elderly before they passed away. My grandfather (Pop) was in his eighties, and Mommie Katie lived to be 100 years old.

I remember them having conversations about taking their medications in the evenings before going to bed. I can hear Pop saying, "Katie, did I take my Milk of Magnesia tonight?" Her reply would always be, "Gene, I can't keep up with my own medications, let alone yours!" This give and take would occur almost every evening. Neither of them had any of the daily medication boxes that are available today, and they continued to inquire of each other about their daily doses. At the time, I thought it was quite amusing.

In addition to his antiacid medication, Pop usually took daily doses of Bayer aspirin, had a glass of prune juice in the morning for his regularity, and applied liniment to his aching muscles. I do not ever remember him having his breakfast without first drinking a glass of prune juice, something that I found to be a thoroughly ill-tasting concoction. I tried it once, and it seems to me that I could not get rid of the taste until it was time for lunch.

Mommie Katie had her own remedies and medicines that she consumed on a daily basis. Hers included Bufferin, Castor Oil, and several other non-prescrip-

Now that my wife and I have reached such a stage our lives, I find that we often ask the same questions of one another. On an at least

semi-weekly basis, Kathy will say, "Dave, did I take my morning pills?" I have to simply reply, "Honey, I don't remember," It is almost a one-way banter because I do not take any prescription medications; I do, however, take Advil for my arthritis and Pepcid AC for my occasional acid reflux. She, on the other hand, has pills for allergies, blood pressure, and a plethora of other non-life threatening conditions. We have now reached the age that we have a difficult time remembering when, or if, we have taken our daily pills. I'm finding that we regularly we have the same kind of conversations that used to take place between Pop and Mommie Katie.

"Dave, did I take my pills today? I can't remember if I took them this morning or not. I think I did, but I am not sure. But maybe I didn't. I remember taking my evening pills last night, but I cannot recall whether I took my pills this morning. Do you remember me taking them? It seems like I did. Can you remember me taking them?"

My answers make about

as much sense as her questions, "Kathy, I cannot say for sure if you took your pills this morning or not. 1 think you might have taken them while I was getting ready this morning, but I am not positive. Didn't I see you in the kitchen getting your pills out of the cabinet? You usually take yours just before you give the dog his pills, so did you give him his? Did you take them after giving the dog his pills? I really cannot be sure that you took them. I wish you would keep a record if you took them or not. You simply cannot rely on me to know if you took them. Sometimes I can't remember if I took my own or not. so how can I be sure if you took yours?" Someone suggested that we get tattoos on our arms to list the pills that we need to take on a daily basis. RIGHT!

Part of this banter is based on the directions listed on each pill bottle. If you take regular medications, I am sure that you are more than aware of the multiple instructions that the pharmacists list on the containers, such as: take one pill three times per day, take one pill in the morning and one at night, take once a day before eating, take two pills in the morning and one at night, take this pill three times per day with food. take this tablet on an empty stomach, or take this pill three times per day and avoid exposure to the sun. It would take a Master's



<u>Hidden Among Us</u>

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

By Karen Hamm Adams

To celebrate and honor the county's American Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I have complied highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years 1818 and 1842. All information was taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. More information can be found on each patriot at the local library or the Rockcastle Historical Society. (Copyright pending). > Edward (Dehouse) Dyehouse

Virginia

Edward Dehouse was born about 1752 in Virginia (thought to be Louisa County) and died in 1813 during the War of 1812. According to the widow'spension application, Polly Dehouse, Edward's widow gave the following account of his service on 24 December 1849 in Rockcastle Co. KY:

She was the widow of Edward Dehouse, a soldier of Cavalry in the American Revolutionary War who enlisted under CaptainRead in Prince William Co. Virginia. He acted a portion of the time as aid to General George Washington and that he was

at the surrender of Cornwallis and also at the Battle of Gilford Courthouse. He was in other various battles and continued in the service until its termination. Edward received a discharge from his Commander which was burned up by the burning of Jas Dehouse's house in the year 1816. Polly stated she was married to Edward in Louisa County, VA on 19 June 1782. She stated that Edward died in the service of the War of 1812 near the lakes of Canada in the year 1813 at Colonel Dudley's Defeat near Maumee, OH near Lake Erie, 5 May 1813. (This date is disputed by the information given on the company

roll in which he served).

A muster roll from 1776
lists Edward Dehouse- a musician in Lieutenant.

Colonel Charles Dabney's Legion. A document in the file states that Edward Dehouse received bounty land for serving as a private for three years.

On 19 January, 1850, Polly Dehouse amended her declaration, adding that she was married to Edward Dehouse by Rev. John Todd, and that Edward served in "Captain John Yantis Company of footmen a drum major commanded by Colonel Dudley & General William Henry Harrison" [War of 1812]. According to the rolls of Captain John Yantis' company, Edward died 26 September 1813 at Fort Meios

Meigs.

Polly received a widow's pension in the amount of one hundred dollars annually. She died 24 February 1850 of Dropsy in Rockcastle Co. KY. In her application, Polly states that she had eleven children with Edward. Edward also received a land grant for two hundred acres 15 May 1792. Although Edward and Polly are said to have had eleven children, only four are known. The known children of Edward

and Polly are: George Dyehouse (1784VA-26 1869) Lincoln Co. KY) married Mary Polly Adams (1789-1839) on 30 December 1810. He is buried at the Ephesus Baptist Church Cemetery in Lincoln Co. KY. They had ten children: Lucy, Malinda, Sophia, Anderson, George, John, James, David, Nancy and Lucinda. Sarah Dyehouse (VA-16 April 1832 Lincoln Co. KY) married Jesse Carter (1774 NC-24 April 1853 Lincoln Co. KY) on 7 November 1814 Lincoln Co. KY.He is buried at Gum Sulpher Cemetery in Rockcastle Co. KY. They had at least ten children: unknown daughter, Elisha, James, Vincent, Matthew, William Chandler, Elijah. Mary, Zachariah and Jane. James Dyehouse (14 January 1786-2 October 1867) married Margaret Adams (1789-1869) on 14 December 1814. They had at least five children: Willis, Eliza, Elizabeth, David and James.

Elizabeth

Co. KY) married Austin Adams (1791-1853) on 24 December 1817 Garrard Co. KY. They had two children: Elizabeth and Samuel. George, James and Elizabeth married the siblings Mary, Margaret and Austin Adams.

Time to address misleading information...

This is a letter to the readers of *The Mt. Vernon Signal*. This is written post primary election as I did not wish it to be construed as an endorsement for any candidate since I am a democrat and could not vote in any county election. The sole purpose is to address the many misleading ads run by the organization, which Gary Mason represents, and to offer some rebuttal and condemnation for failing to provide sufficient information to substantitate their allegations.

(1) Mr. Mason apparently takes issue with people accumulating wealth and possessing some degree of influence without which our county would be in much direr economic condition than it is. A reference to a bailout of such individuals is totally inaccurate. The recreation center was experiencing financial difficulties; however, the fiscal court was given the opportunity to purchase the property, in perhaps the most attractive area of Rockcastle County, for pennies on the dollar as to value. This was not the only property being considered. If the purchase had been consummated, not one person or group of persons would have received one cent of compensation or return on investment. The individuals who presently own the facility have the financial wherewithal to support the debt and do not require a bailout. There is a mention of a study, which the Attorney General required to be provided, detailing a \$19.7 million dollar cost, but Mr. Mason does not make this available either. It should be noted a challenge was issued to members of the fiscal court to find a property better suited for their objective, but, as of this writing, they have failed to answer that challenge. Studies have shown the lack of recreational facilities is a contributing factor in failing to attract industry.

(2) Payment of \$1,000 for a swanky dinner with celebrities is relatively cheap promotion of Rockcastle County. The dinner was to promote the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame, situated in Renfro Valley, which provides tourist dollars for the county. This facility could very well have been situated in far eastern Kentucky, which strenuously lobbied for it.

(3) I, for one, have never seen any evidence the Rockcastle Fiscal Court has ever claimed to cure cancer or turn water to gold. If Mr. Mason was denied access to fiscal court records, which are presumed to be open records, he should have contacted the Kentucky Attorney General's office or retained his own attorney to pursue his quest. Given the number of ads run by his organization, money does not seem to present a problem.

(4) Mr. Mason rails about the largest tax increase in coounty history; however, he fails to provide the numbers to support his claim. I believe by law all real estate must be reappraised on a regular basis and purchase of real estate must be placed on the tax rolls at full purchase price. Personal property taxes, I believe, are assessed at the state level, school taxes are levied by the school board, city taxes by the city council and the library tax is an election decision in Rockcastle County. All of these together may account for tax increases, not just those determined by the fiscal court. One item worthy of note, Rockcastle County's library tax, is the lowest in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, something I am sure that makes Mr. Mason and his associates proud.

(5) Without knowing the circumstances surrounding the Lower Eagle Creek Road, and nothing being provided to justify the claims, I am unable to address this issue. One thing stands out though, it would appear that several fiscal courts provided service to this road, according to Mr. Mason, and may have done so without the knowledge it was indeed private property.

(6) Planning and zoning is indeed a double-edged sword. The fiscal court was criticized for attending a seminar on this subject. If that is accurate, then I compliment them on taking the initiative to become better informed. I believe if Mr. Mason, and members of his group, would take the same initiative, they would see both advantages and disadvantages to planning and zoning. Planning and zoning provides protection for both individuals and businesses and generally helps improve property values all around rather than violating property rights. It can be as strict or liberal as desired. Planning and zoning is generally one of the first things industry, wishing to locate in an area, requires.

(7) Every county in the Commonwealth purchased a chair for that display. There were no complaints I noticed when the fiscal court provided many thousands of dollars for construction of new fire houses, improving the baseball facilities or creating parks.

(8) I am sure Judge Carloftis's, and the fiscal court's, contribution to the national debt is miniscule, at best. As for the national debt, it is obvious that Mr. Mason is unaware who actually holds that debt. The social security trust fund holds almost 17% of the national debt with the Federal Reserve Bank, and other governmental agencies hold 24%. Foreign governments hold approximately 35% and state and local governments, mutual funds and individuals, businesses and trust accounts hold the remaining 25%. China only holds 8% of the national debt, with the largest holder being the Federal Reserve Bank. Becoming citizens of China appears unlikely, without the military overthrow of our country.

(9) As for the \$12,000 raise, Mr. Mason again fails to provide the circumstances surrounding this action. It may indeed be exorbitant, but it may have been well deserved. Mr. Mason goes on to insinuate this largesse was being perpetrated by all county politicians and their pals, which I have sincere reservations about as I have never met anyone who has received funds of this nature. I can assure you I have not and I am a pal to several politicians in the county.

(10) Finally, the allegations of the local affluent banker and the institution he works for receiving thousands of dollars in profit in the foreclosure of one of the industrial facilities in the county. Without the bank providing financial backing, it is doubtful if any industry would be willing to locate in the county. I was a bank examiner for 27 years and rarely have I witnessed a bank realizing a profit on foreclosed property. Although the bank is held silent on this topic, I am not and I know, with the attorney fees, unpaid taxes and liens and the sale of equipment and property at fire sale prices, the bank sustained substantial losses, all in an effort to promote industry and employment in Rockcastle.

I know there are some who will take exception to this discourse, but I felt there was a need to address what I perceived as a campaign of disinformation. The disclosure of the mission statement of concerned citizens for a fair government would appear to be directed to the national level rather than local government. I am not sure if this group wishes to revert to the good ole days of the fifties or to move forward in improving the local economy through progressive ideas and their implementation. I do know not one positive endeavor or accomplishment was mentioned by the ads placed by this group, although there are many resulting from fiscal court actions presided over by Judge Carloftis over the past twenty plus years.

Castle Village Apartments under boil water advisory


The City of Brodhead has issued a boil water advisory for customers on Castle Village Drive and adjoining side roads until further notice.

Brodhead Water and Sewer employee Bryan Mullins said contractors, working for the county, were replacing the fence for the coach pitch baseball field when they accidently busted a six inch water main while drilling around 9:30 a.m. on Monday.

Mullins said they didn't receive any complaints from their customers about not having water only received reports from customers that they were losing some water pressure.

"We calculated it and we only lost around 60,000 gallons of water. With a gallon amount that low I don't think anyone was without water," Mullins said. "Some customers did tell us they were losing pressure and we explained to them what happened. We got the water main break fixed in about four hours and everyone had normal water pressure again."

Mullins went on to say the water department had to send water samples to a laboratory to be tested after the water main break was repaired. He said the advisory will be lifted once the required test results are received from the lab.

Campbellsville University honors 166 teachers for excellence in teaching

writer Campbellsville University honored 166 teachers from 58 school districts. throughout Kentucky, including three from Rockcastle, by receiving the Campbellsville University Excellence in Teaching Award Saturday, May 10th at the Ransdell Chapel on

the CU campus, Bill Goodman, host of 'Kentucky Tonight" and "One to One" on Kentucky Educational Television, spoke to the approximate 400 teachers and their guests by discussing "What is a teacher for?"

Goodman told several stories of successful people including Jesse Stuart, Pearl Arredondo, Ramsey Musallam, Adam Braun and Marina Keegan, all of whom brought their talents to make the world a better

Goodman said these people had inspiring teachers in their lives who taught them to write, to "get it right" instead of "getting it wrong," were driven and had passion, had curiosity, life changing experiences and intense reflection.

One story was of Adam Braun, who made the world his classroom by going throughout the world asking one child per country he visited, "If you could have anything in the world, what would you want most?" The children from Hawaii. to Beijing and Vietnam; wanted to dance, to have a book and to have their mother be healthy.

But one little boy, a street beggar in India, wanted a pencil. Braun gave him a No. 2 yellow pencil, and Braun thought, "Could. something as small cil, the foundation of an education, unlock a child's potential?"

Today, his non-profit organization has built schools in Africa, Asia and Latin América and delivered over 5 million educational hours to children in poverty. In 2012, he was named to the Forbes "30 Under 30 List."

Goodman quoted Jesse Stuart who said, "We are fortunate to be born in America. Teaching is a calling in the old fashion pulpit sense...teaching is spiritual and has to do with values, with how we choose to live our lives

"As a teacher, I have tried to go beyond the textbooks into the character stressing honesty, goodness and make each life count for something."

Goodman told the teach-

ers that our children and grandchildren depend on them every day, and "You are to be honored and congratulated much more than you are."

In conclusion, he asked all the teachers to stand and recite together: "I am a teacher! I am to be honored and lifted up every day! I am to be celebrated! I am a teacher."

Dr. Michael V. Carter, president of Campbellsville University, told the teachers he was proud of them and that education is the "most powerful force on the planet."

"Teaching is the first of all disciplines," he said. "Thank you for the outstanding job you do for us."

He quoted Titus 2:7 that says: "Show yourself in all respects to be a model of good works, and in your teaching show integrity, dignity, and sound speech..." He said the teachers being honored embody those traits

Dr. Donna Hedgepath, dean of the School of Education, quoted; "Teaching is a profession that creates all others." She said she taught 10 years in the public school system, and "I really do respect your work."

Cyndi Crowder Chadwick, a 2006 graduate of CU, led her 3rd grade Campbellsville Elementary Choir in two songs.

Dr. John Chowning, vice president for church and external relations and executive assistant to the president, told the teachers he "commended" them before he introduced Goodman.

Dr. Frank Cheatham, senior vice president for academic affairs, Dr. Chuck Hamilton, associate professor of education and chair of the undergraduate program at CU, and Hedgepath presented the certificates to the teachers before a luncheon in Winters Dining Hall.

Campbellsville University began the Excellence in Teaching Awards Program in 1987 with assistance from Earl Aaron and the Ward, Cundiff and Aaron Memorial Fund. The purpose of the program is to recognize the quality teaching and learning taking place in the school systems throughout Kentucky.



Anderkin gives keynote address during UNITE year-end celebration

Members of Operation UNITE's Service Corps (AmeriCorps) program were lauded for their excep-. tional work to keep youth on a drug-free path during an end-of-the-year celebration on Friday, May 23

"The brilliance of the UNITE Service Corps is (that they are able) to take a proactive approach," said Aaron Anderkin, who served as chairman of the Kentucky Commission on Community Volunteerism and Service (KCCVS) from 2010-12. "You help, not for recognition, but because you realize the urgency of the moment."

KCCVS is responsible for coordinating the AmeriCorps program across Kentucky.

"UNITE has been the catalyst in this region," Anderkin stated. "They are able to activate the power of its greatest resource - it's people."

Anderkin, a 2003 graduate of Rockcastle County High School, was appointed

in 2005 by then-Gov. Ernie Fletcher as KCCVS Youth Commissioner and was reappointed two more threeyear terms to an at-large Commission seat by Gov. Steve Beshear. In addition to serving as chairman, he has spent the past seven years on the Commission's Program Committee.

Youth here have as much of an opportunity to live the American dream as anyone else in the country,' Anderkin told the Service Corps members, but noted the drug epidemic has been a big hurdle.

The work you do "is emotional," Anderkin said. "I've seen some pretty dark clouds. Addiction cost my father his life. I truly learned what real empathy looked like."

Operation UNITE employed 44 full-time AmeriCorps members to serve 42 schools in 11 counties as part of its Service Corps initiative during the 2013-14 school year.

AmeriCorps; members provide math tutoring, teach the "Too Good for Drugs" and "Healthy Futures/Take 10" wellness curriculums, and coordinate anti-drug UNITE Clubs. In addition, members provide thousands of hours of volunteer service and recruit volunteers for school prevention activi-

Although the final numbers are not yet available, this year UNITE Service Corps members have tutored approximately 2,800 students in math and taught drug resistant education to more than 2,500 fourth and fifth grade students.


Eugene Newsome, who oversees the UNITE Service Corps initiative, said mid-term reports indicate

significant growth in the number of students being tutored in math and that 83.5 percent have improved at least 30 percent since the start of the year.


In addition, average drug education knowledge increased by 40 percentage points, Newsome said.





INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from June 9 through June 23, 2014. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the

This is the January 1, 2014 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2014 will be due about September 15, 2014.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 and

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

After the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be received in the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

A taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

(1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.

(2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.

(3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.

(4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.



ORDINANCE NO. <u>5-13-14</u>

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING A LEASE FOR THE FINANCING OF A PROJECT; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT AND SECURITY OF THE LEASE; CREATING A SINKING FUND; AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF VARIOUS DOCUMENTS RELATED TO SUCH LEASE.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the County of Rockcastle, Kentucky (the "Lessee") has the power, pursuant to Section 65.940 et seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes to enter into lease agreements with or without the option to purchase in order to provide for the use of the property for public purposes;

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Lessee (the "Governing Body") has previously determined, and hereby further determines, that the Lessee is in need of the Project, as defined in the Lesse hereinafter described; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body has determined and hereby determines that it is in the best interests of the Lessee that the Lessee enter into a Lease Agreement (the "Lease"), to be administered by Kentucky Association of Counties Leasing Trust (the "Program Administrator") and funded by the bank, financial institution or finance corporation offering the best interest rate and terms (the "Lessor"), as selected by the Judge/Executive upon the advice of the Program Administrator, for the leasing by the Lessee from the Lessor of the Project.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF THE COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals and Authorization. The Lessee hereby approves the Lease Agreement (the "Lease"), in substantially the form presented to this Governing Body. The recitals to this Ordinance are incorporated herein as if set forth in this Section in their entirety and are hereby found and determined to be true and correct. It is further found and determined that the Project identified in the Lease is public property to be used for public purposes, that it is necessary and desirable and in the best interests of the Lessee to enter into the Lease for the purposes therein specified, and the execution and delivery of the Lease and all representations, certifications and other matters contained in the closing memorandum with respect to the Lease, or as may be required by the Lessor prior to delivery of the Lease, are hereby approved, ratified and confirmed. The Judge/Executive and Fiscal Court Clerk of the Lessee are hereby authorized to execute the Lease, together with such other agreements or certifications which may be necessary to accomplish the transaction contemplated by the Lease.

Pursuant to the Constitution of the Section 2. General Obligation Pledge. Commonwealth and Chapter 66 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, as amended (the "General Obligation Statutes"), the obligation of the Lessee created by the Lease shall be a full general obligation of the Lessee and, for the prompt payment of the Lease Payments, the full faith, credit and revenue of the Lessee are hereby pledged. During the period the Lease is outstanding, there shall be and there hereby is levied on all the taxable property in the Lessee, in addition to all other taxes, without limitation as to rate, a direct tax annually in an amount sufficient to pay the Lease Payments on the Lease when and as due, it being hereby found and determined that current tax rates are within all applicable limitations. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same officers in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof; provided, however, that in each year to the extent that the other taxes of the Lessee are available for the payment of the Lease Payments and are appropriated for such purpose, the amount of such direct tax upon all of the taxable property in the Lessee shall be reduced by the amount of such other taxes so available and appropriated.

There is hereby established, or it is acknowledged that there has heretofore been established, with the Lessee a sinking fund (the "Sinking Fund"). The funds derived from said tax levy hereby required or other available taxes shall be placed in the Sinking Fund and, together with interest collected on the same, are irrevocably pledged for the payment of all obligations issued under the General Obligation Statutes and all Tax Supported Leases, as defined in the General Obligation Statutes, including the Lease herein authorized, when and as the same fall due. Amounts shall be transferred from the Sinking Fund to the Lessor at the times and in the amounts required by the Lease.

Section 3. Administration of the Lease. The Kentucky Association of Counties Leasing Trust is hereby acknowledged to be the program administrator under the Lease.

Section 4. <u>Severability</u>. If any Section, paragraph or provision of this Ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such Section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 5. Open Meetings Law. This Governing Body hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the adoption of this Ordinance were taken in an open meeting of this Governing Body, and that all deliberations of this Governing Body and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with applicable legal requirements.

Section 6. <u>Conflicts.</u> All ordinances, resolutions, orders or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail and be given effect.

Section 7. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication of a summary thereof, as provided by law.

INTRODUCED, SECONDED AND ADOPTED, at a duly convened meeting of the Governing Body, held on 2, 2, 2014, after first reading held on 13, 2014, signed by the Judge/Executive of the Lessee, attested by the Fixed Court Clerk, filed and indexed as provided by law.
