

### Four arrested on meth charges

Four people were arrested on meth related charges in three separate incidents this past week.

In the first incident, a local man was arrested for meth possession last Friday night after police made a traffic stop on South Wilderness Road in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Vernon Leon Doan Jr., 38, of Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, officers stopped Doan for not wearing his seatbelt. Once officers approached the vehicle, they noticed that Doan's eyes were bloodshot and that he appeared nervous.

Officers said that Doan

appeared intoxicated while performing field sobriety tests. Doan admitted to officers that he had used meth earlier in the day.

After searching the vehicle, officers found an unmarked pill bottle that contained 12 Gabapentin pills. Officers also found a small sandwich baggie containing suspected methamphetamine on Doan at the time of his arrest.

Doan was charged with possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), illegal possession of a legend drug, drug paraphernalia, DUI and failure to wear seatbelts. He was lodged in the Rockcastle (Cont. to A8)

# Court tells judge to negotiate with Anchor

At Tuesday's fiscal court meeting, magistrates and County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis spent quite a bit of time in discussion on how to handle several items that Anchor Packaging added to the plant they are leasing from the county and want to take with them when vacate the building September 10th.

Carloftis told the court that he went to the facility a week or so ago and told those in charge of moving the equipment, which belongs to Anchor, out to stop moving anything they had added to the building until the court decided what items could be taken and which had to be left.

Among other things, Anchor has added two switch gear systems, which run the machines, a phone system costing \$109,000, a security card access system and a tray system, which carries cables from the electrical boxes to the machines.

Complicating the issue is a clause in Anchor's lease which said that if they installed anything costing \$25,000 or over, the court had to be notified. Anchor failed to do this.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds told the court that Anchor shouldn't be allowed to take anything that was not on the original list of equipment which they purchased at auction "and if they do, I say get a warrant and put them in jail." How-

# RCIDA hears report from Mike Lewis on hemp project progress

At Monday's meeting of the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority board, Mike Lewis, who is spearheading the growing of hemp in the county, asked the board to approve a Letter of Intent which will allow him to apply for grants to finance projects.

/ Lewis told the board that he hemp crop was doing fine and that Patagonia, a processing facility for a clothing line using hemp products, was interested in locating a mill in the county once there was 500 acres in the county producing hemp.

If the mill gets built, Lewis said that there would be 50-125 workers hired at an average pay of \$30-\$35 an hour.

Lewis said that he had 1. 1/2 acres planted in hemp this year and that harvesting the crop would require employing 15-20 seasonal workers who would make \$19.50 hour. He said he hoped to increase the hemp

300 in 2016. He said that three other products can be harvested from the hemp plants, including oil from the seeds and stall bedding from the chaff.

Lewis also discussed creating an art/garden education center on Richmond




I printed Richie's letter, even though it is well over

box near a window so he





colorful fence, explaining, "David Joe, walk slowly and be very quiet so we can watch the birds and butterflies."

Just as she predicted, the hummingbirds were slowly sucking the sweet nectar from the blossoms as they moved from one plant to another. This was the first time that I had witnessed hummingbirds feeding on wild flowers. I was simply amazed at their ability to hover over each bloom and, then quickly move to the next while extracting the honey-like liquid found in each flower. I asked Mommie Katie, "What makes them love these flowers so much?" Her reply was, "Come with me, and I will show you."

She walked up to the fence and carefully pulled a single flower from the vines. I watched as she cautiously removed the green base of the bloom and then she said, "Son, suck the liquid from the plant and tell me what you taste." 🖯

I had never tried this before, so I was reluctant to put it in my mouth. When I did, the taste was almost identical to honey. And again, I was amazed that Mommie Katie knew the secret of how to find the liquid that attracted the birds and insects. Of course, I was ready to pull more flowers so I could get more of this tasty nectar, but she said we should move back and let the birds continue their

So we slowly walked to a shade tree and merely watched as the hummingbirds moved from flower to flower. This lesson confirmed what I had thought about Mommie Katie - she was a genius, especially when it came to flowers.

After a short while, we walked back to the house, and Mommie Katie cautioned me, "David Joe, you should never eat any part of the honeysuckle vine except the nectar in the flowers because the rest of the plant is poisonous." How did she know these things? It just simply amazed me.

As it turns out, I should not have been stunned because the woman knew more about plants than anyone that I ever met. She was a walking encyclopedia of knowledge concerning flowers, vines, shrubs, and house plants. She always kept her home windows filled with flowering African violets. I think she had every color of blooms

known to mankind. Everyone in the neighborhood said she had the most beautiful flowers in Rockcastle

County. I am so glad that she taught me about "honeysuckle nectar." I shared my new-found knowledge with all of my friends, and they were equally impressed. That summer, the boys from my neighborhood were sucking honeysuckle vines

all over the area. Honeysuckle - it's not just for the birds and the bees. It's for kids, too. And for warm childhood memo-

ever, Magistrate Bill McKinney told the court that some of the items installed, including the switch gear system, were of no use to anyone but Anchor. "They are of no use to us. If we scrapped them we wouldn't get \$50 for it."

McKinney also went on to point out that if the court played hardball and another manufacturer was interested in the facility and contacted Anchor as to their relationship with the county, the reference from Anchor would not be favorable. "I think we should let Buzz go out there and use common sense and make trade-offs," McKinney said.

The court gve Carloftis authority to swap the security card access system and phone system, in its entirety, for other items that have been installed by Anchor and were custom-built for their operation.

A commercial appraisal of the building is in the process of being compiled so the county will know more how to price the facility for sale or lease. That report is expected by July 15th.

RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins told the court that there has been interest expressed in the building.

Hopkins also told the court that another air conditioning unit needed to be worked on or replaced at SourceHOV. Hopkins said this was the second unit, of the 12 installed, that had gone down and could be either repaired for \$3,200, with a limited warranty, or replaced for \$6,800 with a 5 year full warranty.

McKinney expressed aggravation with the expense, telling Hopkins, "from the day that place was built they (the air conditioning units) have been nothing but trouble." He asked how much it would cost to replace all the units (11) and Hopkins said that price would be around \$90,000 but there were no grants available to help with the cost. The court voted to buy a new unit.

The court also approved payment of \$7,922.60 to Roger Rucker to replace a fence in front of his property on Lambert Road which was taken down when the road was widened. The court had originally capped the payment at \$7,900 and rescinded that motion when Rucker refused to pick up the check because of the \$22.60 difference.

The 2014-15 budget for the Rockcastle County Board of Health was approved by the court.

The budget shows increased revenue from real property taxes to \$322,549 from \$208,137 in the 2013-14 fiscal year which indicates that the board has raised their tax rate for the coming fiscal year.

Carloftis said he thought the board of health did not have to have a ballot issue in order to raise their tax rate. The *Signal* could not contact anyone on the board for comment before publi-

A Summary of Real Property Tax Roll Changes was submitted to the court. The summary shows a total real estate assessment of \$375,461,003 which includes \$229,065,537 for residential assessment, \$79,600,160 farm assessment and \$65,560,706 for commercial, industrial, telecommuniation and leasehold interests. The real property assessment decreased by \$2,935,600 from last year's assessment.

In other action, the court:

• approved a \$2,500 donation to the 8UKnights traveling team at the request of coaches Kevin Rader and Marcus Reppert. The coaches did not ask for a certain amount, just a donation to help with expenses. Magistrate Lee Earl Adams' made a motion to give the team \$1,200, seconded by Magistrate Gary Burdette. However, this motion failed to garner further support and a motion by Carloftis, seconded by Magistrate Ralph Allen to donate \$2,500 was unanimously passed:

• approved payment of one-half of the match for a grant for the Brodhead VFD of \$3,107;

• approved utility payments to Climax VFD of \$3,376 for November thrulune and Livingston VFD of \$5,738;

• approved additional program suport for Sheriff Mike Peters of \$309.75 for interest on a loan and \$740 for the salary of Brandon McIntosh who is in training at the police academy in Richmond;

• accepted an agreement with the Administrative Office of the Courts for lease payment of \$203,528 for 2014-15 fiscal year (down about \$50,000 from fiscal year 2013-14) and

• approved payment of claims for work at Livingston School of \$2,025 to Morgan Plumbing and \$2,520 for final payment to Sparks Electric.

School, if the board approved the proposed arrangement with the local health department. He said the school board would fund the nurses at Roundstone Elementary. School, Rockcastle County High School and Brodhead Elementary School.

"By only contracting two nurses with the local health department that left a spot open at Brodhead Elementary School," Pensol said, "With this agreement we are recommending you all create a nurse position at the Brodhead Elementary School which will allow us to continue having a nurse at every school."

Pensol said that the nurse at the high school would also serve as the district health coordinator. He said Emily Dyehouse was hired for that position and that she is a four-year registered nurse.

Pensol went on to say that the drawback to the proposed nursing plan was having to provide two health services assistants at RCMS and MVES. He said this was necessary because the health services assistants could provide health services to the students that the health department contract doesn't cover.

"There is a lot of things we have to do that isn't in the health department's contract for their RNs," Pensol said. "But we still save money by supplying two health services assistants to be with them instead of supplying two actual nurses ourselves."

The board approved the contract with the Cumberland Valley District Health Department for the 2014-2015 school year. The board also approved the creation of a school nurse position at Brodhead Elementary School with a pay rate of \$16 per hour.

Director of Special Education Jason Coguer presented the board with the mileage reimbursement rateplan for the months of July, August and September.

Coguer said the mileage rate is reviewed quarterly and he proposed the current rate of 48c per mile for school-related travel expense. He said the figure was calculated based on the American Automobile Association Daily Fuel Gauge Report for Kentucky for regular unleaded gasoline.

The board unanimously approved the recommended mileage reimbursement rate.

The Superintendent's Personnel Actions Report showed two certified hirings of Eric Wright as RCHS Assistant Girls' Basketball Coach and Brittany Kincer as a RES Preschool Teacher. Classified hirings were Cody Brown as substitute custodian/lawn care, Stephen Hale as a substitute

bus monitor, Kimberly Hines as a substitute cook/baker, Gina Sigmon as a substitute cook/baker, Cindy Johnson as a MVES cook/baker and Emily Dyehouse as RCHS register nurse and district health coordinator.

Street where the community garden and farmers' market are currently located. This would involve a washing/packaging and cold storage facility and a pavilion for the education programs and community events.

Lewis also invited the RCIDA board and the fiscal court to tour his farm in the near future.

Also during the meeting, Holly Hopkins asked the board for approval for a food truck to set up at lunch time at SourceHOV. The food truck must have a permit from RCIDA and the board approved the request.

Hopkins also told the board that while there were presently 500 employees at SourceHOV and six other related companies in the building; the companies were still needing more employees. She also said there was a potential to double the number of employees with additional federal contracts.

County Detention Center where he was later released on a \$7,500 unsecured bond.

In the second incident, a local man was arrested for trafficking meth last Wednesday after police raided a home on Club View Drive in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Cole Tyler Hammond, 28,

of Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, officers responded to Hammond's residence after receiving information that he had been selling meth.

After receiving a warrant to search the residence, officers found several items used to sell meth including plastic baggies, scales, cash in various denominations and suspected drug ledgers

Officers also found three small containers containing a white crystal substance that was believed to be methamphetamine. The substances in the three containers also field tested positive for meth.

Hammond was charged with trafficking a controlled substance (methamphetamine.) He was lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center where he was later released on a \$10,000 cash/property bond.

In the third incident, two Jackson County residents were arrested for meth possession last Wednesday after police made a traffic stop on Hwy 150 in Mt. Vernon,

Arrested at the scene were Candace Camille Chasteen, 32 and Gerald Eaton, 42, both of McKee.

According to state police reports, officers made the traffic stop after observing a blue Nissan Frontier cross the center line and drive into the path of oncoming traffic.

Once officers ap<sub>1</sub> proached the vehicle, they noticed Eaton and his passenger. Chasteen were acting nervous.

Officers also used a police canine which alerted officers to the vehicle. After searching the vehicle, officers found approximately two grams of crystal methamphetamine.

Chasteen and Eaton were both charged with possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine.)
They were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center where they were later released on separate \$7,500 unsecured bonds.



assistance to federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement agencies that operate in areas deemed as critical drug trafficking areas in the United States.

Hale said Appalachia HIDTA has asked UNITE to help them market the availability of the drug test kits throughout Rockcastle County and that the kits will be free to UNITE or parents.

The program was presented to the Rockcastle UNITE Coalition during their monthly meeting at noon on Wednesday. The Coalition's decision was not known at the time of publication but Hale said if the coalition approved the motion that they plan on marketing the drug test kits to the local school system, health care organizations, churches, businesses, law enforcement agencies, etc.

Hale said the drug kits are a 12-panel saliva drug test kit that usually cost around \$40. She said they believe the saliva drug test kits will be more effective than the urine drug test kits.

"It's easier for children to cheat on the urine kits. The other good thing is

these saliva kits also detect alcohol," Hale said. "If parents use saliva kits their child will have to take it in front of them. That way there is no way they can cheat on it."

Hale went on to say that the details of the program are still in the early stages but that if everything goes as planned they hope to have the kits available by the end of August.

"We are excited about this possibility of Operation UNITE and Appalachia HITDA partnering together in this program," Hale said. "This program could give us another opportunity to attack the substance abuse epidemic in Rockcastle

# Time for Pickles

There is nothing that sets off a cold cut sandwich better than the taste of a pickle, and with so many varieties, you are bound to find one to suit every palate. So it probably won't surprise you that pickles are a popular home food preservation item.

To ensure safe, tasty home-canned pickles, always follow research-based recipes, such as those offered by Extension, that have been tested for product safety. Follow the recipe and use the proper amounts of the appropriate ingredients to yield the best flavor from your food and to prevent food-borne illness.


Quick-process pickles usually consist of cucumbers or other vegetables, vinegar, spices and seasonings. Always use fresh, firm vegetables for pickling. Discard a one-sixteenth slice from the blossom end of the vegetable to help keep the final product firm. Blossoms contain enzymes that can cause vegetables to soften. Soaking the cucumbers or other vegetables in salt water for several hours before covering with the pickling liquid will allow for easier packing.

When making pickles, use only commercial vinegar that has at least 5 percent acidity. Do not dilute the vinegar unless specified in the recipe, because the acidity is needed for a safe product. The addition of vinegar makes pickles a high-acid food, which allows them to be safely processed using a boiling-water canner. Use canning or pickling salt. Table salt may make the pickling mixture cloudy. Use white sugar unless the recipe calls for brown.

Quick-process pickles are more flavorful if allowed to sit for several weeks after processing. This allows the vegetables to aromatically blend with the seasonings and spices.

If you are new to home canning, a good place to start is with the Extension publication FCS3-578 "Home Canning Basics." More information on pickling and recipes for beginning, intermediate and advanced canners and for individuals with dietary restrictions are available in publication FCS3-582 "Home Canning Pickled and Fermented Foods." 

Moses Farris was born on 3 February1759 in Pittsylvania, Halifax County, VA and died 3 June 1841in Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, Moses gave the

In March or April of 1778/79, Moses entered the service in the Army of the United States as a volunteer in Pittsylvania County, VA for a term of six months in

was discharged at Petersburg, VA by his Captain. He believed that Nelson was his Lieutenant Ensign. Moses stated that he engaged in no battles. In 1780, he served as a volunteer for six months under Colonel

moved to Kentucky and was employed by a man named Charles Shirley in Lincoln County to serve a tour of duty for three months. He was to fight against the Shawnee Indians. He was discharged, but lost it. He served under Captain Morrison. In the years to follow, 1783, 84, 85 and 86, he was engaged as an Indian scout on the Holston River and in Kentucky. He served in this capacity approximately seven months. In scouting, he was often under the command of Captain Estill of Madison Co. KY and Captain Morrison.

After the war, Moses moved to Kentucky about 1782 and settled in Lincoln Co. that would later becomeRockcastle Co. KY. Moses was allowed a pension in 4 March 1831 at a rate of forty dollars per year. He received a land granton 6 May 1828 for fifty acres in Rockcastle County on Brush Creek. He is buried at Negro CreekCemetery, Rockcastle Co. KY. His grave is believed to be one of the field stones between the three large trees in the cemetery

Moses did not mention a wife or children in his pension papers. He married Louisa Coulter (1765-1869KY). The known children of Moses and Louisa are: Elizabeth Farris (1785 Lincoln Co. KY-After1860 Census, Rockcastle Co. KY) married Morton Owens (19 February 1787NCabout1840KY) on 16 January 1806 Lincoln Co. KY. Morton served as a private in the War of 1812, enlisting in Captain William Smith's Company, KY Battalion Mounted Volunteers on 18 September 1812-4 November 1812 and received 50 acres land grant on Crooked Creek in 1827. He was the son of American Revolutionary War patriot, David Owens. They had five children: Wilson, Jordan, Emily, Samuel and Alfred. Mary Farris (1788) KY-1 May 1859 Rockcastle Co, KY) married John Newcomb Jr. (1781VA-9 August 1859 Rockcastle Co.


