Arrest made in burglary at Mt. Vernon gas station

A local man was arrested last Thursday and charged with burglary after he reportedly robbed the Kwik Mart gas station in Mt. Vernon and stole over \$500 in cash, lottery tickets and cigarettes.

Arrested was Thomas Wayne Daugherty, 32, of Mt. Vernon.

According to Mt. Vernon Police reports, officers Ryan Messinger and Ed Robinson responded after an employee called Rockcastle 911 when he opened the gas station and noticed the store's phones weren't working and that all the money was missing from the cash drawer.

Once officers arrived, they noticed that the drive-thru window had been busted out and that glass was lying on the ground near the window. Officers also noticed a \$1 bill lying on the ground near the propane exchange rack and a tire tool was stuck in the grass behind the building.

Officers also noticed that all the phone lines had been cut and the phone wire connection box was lying on the ground. Officers also determined that approximately \$582 in cash, lottery tickets and Marlboro cigarettes were stolen in the burglary.

After observing the surveillance video, officers saw that the suspect was wearing blue jeans, a blue jacket and a gray or blue cap. The

same suspect was also shown on the video surveillance camera, the day before the burglary, making a purchase while wearing the same cap and blue jeans. Chief Brian Carter and Assistant Chief Barry Adams watched the video surveillance recording and identified the suspect as Daugherty.

The officers later saw Daugherty walking on Joyce Street in Mt. Vernon and noticed he had several cuts on his hands and arms. Daugherty told officers he received the cuts earlier in the week while trying to open a window at a home in Berea.

After receiving consent to search Daugherty's residence, officers found twelve packs of Marlboro cigarettes and several lottery tickets. Officers also found the same cap, blue jacket and blue jeans that were worn by the suspect in the video surveillance recording.

Daugherty later admitted to officers that he saw the tire tool on the ground and that gave him the idea to break into the gas station. He also told officers that he was under the influence of drugs while burglarizing the gas station and that he couldn't remember what all he had done during the burglary.

New FM radio station set to launch in September

A new FM radio station is scheduled to go on the air next month in Rockcastle and several other surrounding counties.

WKUR 94.9 FM "Your Country Road" is a 24/7 country music radio station that will cover Rockcastle County and the surrounding counties of Jackson, Laurel, Pulaski and Madison. The station's playlist will include both modern country and classic country music.

Josh and Destiny Kesler of East Bernstadt are the owners and operators of the new radio station. Josh Kesler said he and his wife saw a need to create a radio station that covers all types of country music ranging from the music genre's beginning in the early 1900s until now.

"We wanted to create a station where people didn't have to hear the same old songs that gets played over and over," Kesler said. "On our station you may hear Jake Owen and then Merle Haggard. It will be a great country music mix instead of just having only modern country or only classic country."

The station also has a

translator station 104.9 FM that people can tune in to whenever they don't receive 94.9 on their radio. Kesler said they also plan on obtaining more translator stations in the future to broaden the station's coverage area.

"104.9 FM will benefit anyone in the northern parts of our coverage area such as Madison and northern Rockcastle counties. So if people are traveling from London to Berea on I-75 and 94.9 suddenly has a lot of static, they can tune into 104.9 and hear us just fine," Kesler said. "People around the world can also go online at www.wkurfm.com and listen to us or they can also purchase a ROKU box and view our live studio stream."

The radio station will also feature other radio programming such as sports, news, morning shows, etc. He said they have hired some local DJs who grew up in the area including Micah "Tank" Owens, Dan Hadrather, Avery "Slim" Bradshaw and many more.

"We will have some good programming that will also include sports coverage of local college teams where

athletes from our coverage area are currently playing," Kesler said. "We will have news, weather, music requests, morning shows, talk shows and several other specifically targeted shows for people who are interested in a variety of different things. Once we are up and running people can check out programming list on our website or social media to find shows that peak their interests."

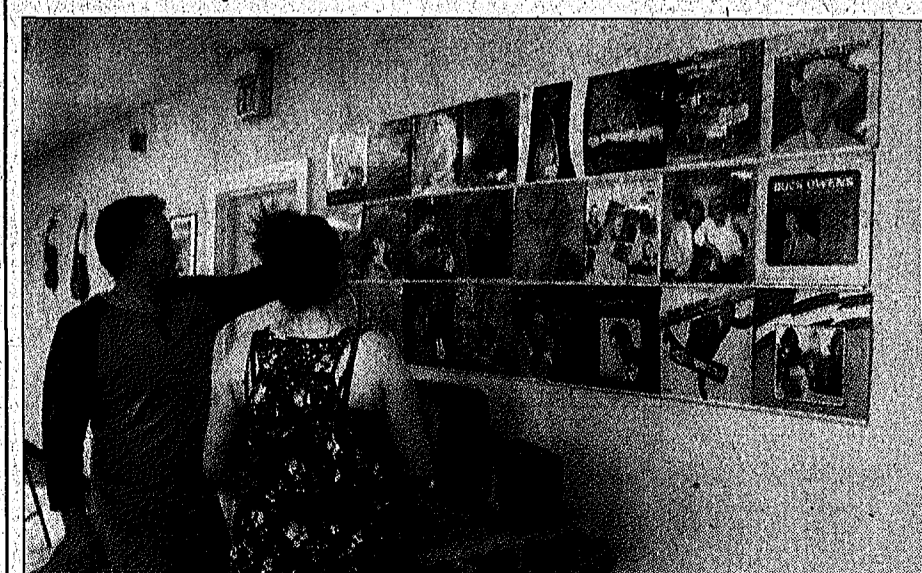
Kesler said that they are also looking to give back to the communities of their station's coverage area and give local artists a chance to perform live on the radio.

"My wife Destiny is always looking for ways we can help others with things like backpack clubs, food drives, donation benefits, scholarship opportunities and several other different programs. We have a huge passion for wanting to help people and just simply touch the hearts of as many people as we can," Kesler said. "We also want to give local artists a chance to shine by performing live on our studio stage. That way people can listen in and also hear mu-

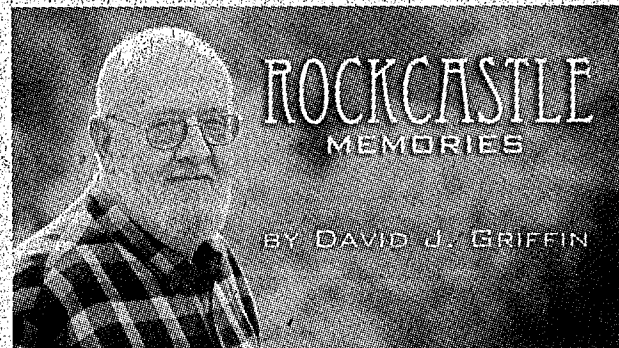

And, while it is true that I wobble more than walk and frequently don't know what day it is and sometimes forget the dog's name, none of that stuff really hurts, so I rarely feel like I "suffer". I've always been impatient and normally aggravated about something so that's

Quilting Bee
I was cleaning out the top of my closet when I came across a stack of homemade quilts which were made by my mother (Bee) when I was a young boy. Bee gave me these quilts when she moved into an apartment in Lexington -- right after she sold the small farm. We had lived there from the time that I was six years of age until I left for college at the University of Kentucky. She had continued to reside in Rockcastle County until both her parents had passed away.

I remember how Bee loved to make quilts back when I was a child. I recall her sitting in a double rocking chair while cutting small pieces of cloth which would eventually become the patchwork tops of her quilts. One quilt was especially unique and distinctive to me because it was made from pieces of material taken from my very own clothes. That quilt was used on my bed for many years. My wife, Kathy, loved that quilt so much that I gave it to her as a present even before we married. Now that we have been together for 35 years, she still cherishes it because of its history. It's the one in the cedar chest.

Bee had a small quilting frame that was carefully placed in the corner of our den so that she could pull it into the middle of the room near the Warm Morning stove. It was there that she would pass the time by making her special quilts. On occasion, Bee would invite some of her neighbor ladies to socialize while quilting. Along with my grandmother (Mommie Katie), I can specifically recall Charity Barnes and Juanita Davis; there were others whose names I cannot recall. I do remember the scene of them sitting and sipping coffee

and telling tales as they were quilting.

The quilts made by Bee and Mommie Katie were not the types to be hung on the wall or on frames to be showcased; they were made to be used on our beds for warmth. My bedroom was in the corner of our house far from the only stove that heated the entire building. On very cold evenings, Bee would stack a number of quilts on my bed in order to keep me warm throughout the night. Occasionally, the weight of the quilts would be so substantial as to prevent me from turning over but I did stay warm. When it was frigid, she placed bricks that had been warmed on top of the stove at the foot of my bed under the covers to keep my feet warm. I distinctly remember one night when a glass of water sitting by my bed formed a "skim" of ice on top during the night. That night I was glad that I had all those quilts to keep me warm.

Bee, like most women of that time, had two methods of sewing the three layers of a quilt together. The layers included: the bedding (or the top pieces sewed together) the batting, and a backing. Most quilts were made by sewing small precise stitches through the layers to hold them together. Bee, however, used another technique for securing the quilt layers together, which was called tying. Using this method required passing a course thread or yarr through all three layers and then tying a knot in the thread to hold it in place. My collection of quilts contains both types. The quilts that are tied appear to be more rustic than the quilts sewn together using regular stitches with a sewing needle.

Bedtime Stories of Long Ago, But Not So Far Away.

As a child, the hour or so just before bed was some of my very favorite time of the day. I remember, especially in the winter, there would be a big fire going in an old wood-burner in the middle of the living room. I still can recall the hum or whistle as the cold, icy wind would blow around the corners of our little house and then across the chimney, making a most distinct sound. Mom usually had a tea kettle simmering on the stove in the kitchen, making a low monotone whistle. So, altogether the house sounded quite musical. Just the thought of this today can bring a kind of peace to the soul.

All of this was accompanied by a bedtime snack; first a warm bottle of milk when I was a baby, later a sippy cup when I was a toddler, and finally a mug of hot cocoa when I was about school age. Sometimes a cookie or special treat was involved. While I enjoyed these "comfort foods", Mom

would read various stories, fairy tales, and poems designed for children.

Recently, I've read a collection of Native American children's stories as compiled by local Kentucky author, David Owens. These are retold stories that have been passed down through his family from his great-grandmother, Elizabeth Lovell-Bell (1852-1939) who was a Cherokee. The book is called, "Tales of the Thunderbolt People". It contains several stories about the "animal people" and how they got their distinguishing characteristics. Woven into the theme of these fascinating stories is a good lesson in character-building that is needed to be taught to young children.

I can just imagine the Native American mothers and the fathers who lived and hunted here in the very area we now call home gathered around the campfires in the evenings after supper. They would relax and gather their children close and tell these stories as they taught moral lessons to the children.

However, for the adults, especially those who are a bit of a historian and interested in the culture of an ancient people, this book gives an excellent insight as to how these people lived and educated their children. It's a piece of living history.

Although it has been many years since the time of the bedtime story, this unique book helped me walk down memory lane to a time and place that brought a lot of peace, a time and place that only now exists in memory and in an old story that is retold.

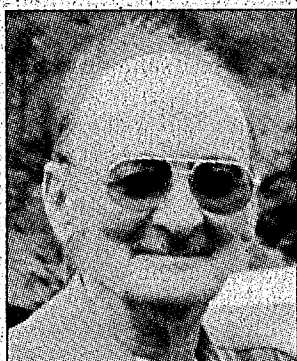
Laura F. Hopkins

Summer of 2010 my husband and I hosted a recipe tasting party for people on our block. I told our neighbors I would do all the cooking, but I would like one thing in return—their honest opinions about the nineteen new recipes I was trying out for my second book. With people's different tastes, I didn't expect everyone to like everything, BUT these three recipes got nothing but raves from everyone!

CAPRESE PASTA SALAD
1 package (16 ounce) mini bow tie pasta
2 cups grape tomatoes, halved
7 ounces fresh mozzarella cheese, cubed
1 medium sweet yellow pepper, chopped
1 small red onion, chopped
1 cup pickled banana pepper rings, chopped
1 can (3.8 ounce) sliced ripe olives, drained
Cook pasta according to package directions; drain and rinse in cold water. Combine with remaining ingredients in a large bowl.

DRESSING FOR PASTA

SALAD:
1 cup red wine vinegar
1 garlic clove, minced
1 teaspoon salt
1 to 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
1 cup olive oil
1 garlic clove, minced
In a jar with a tight-fitting lid, combine the dressing ingredients; shake well. Pour over salad and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour before serving.

CUCUMBERS WITH DRESSING
1 cup mayonnaise or Miracle Whip®
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup white vinegar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon chopped fresh dill, optional
4 cups peeled sliced cucumbers
In a large bowl, combine mayonnaise, sugar, vinegar, dill, and salt. Add cucumbers; toss to coat. Cover; refrigerate for 2 hours.

CREAM CHEESE MINTS
1 package (3 ounce) cream cheese, softened
1/4 cup all-vegetable short-

ening
1/3 teaspoon peppermint oil
4 cups powdered sugar
Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or foil. In a medium bowl, beat cream cheese, shortening, and peppermint oil with a mixer until smooth. Gradually add powdered sugar, beating until well combined. (Dough will be soft and elastic.) Roll dough into small balls, and place each ball on prepared baking sheet. Press fork into each ball to flatten. Cover baking sheet with plastic and chill overnight.

not new. My kids will tell you that I've been grumpy as long as they've known me. Mr. Parkinson simply gives me a whole new set of stuff to grump and be impatient about.

The fact of the matter is that getting old is not for sissies, no matter what disease or infirmity we may have and complaining, long and loudly, hardly ever solves the problem or makes things any better.

If anything, I'm a lot luckier than a lot of folks I know. While it's true that there is no cure for Parkinson's Disease, the medications that I am taking sure do relieve the most severe symptoms. My neurologist tells me that he has never had a patient respond as well to Sinemet, the Parkinson's miracle drug, as I have.

While I sure don't want to have to do it again, he is also baffled that I keep bouncing back from massive strokes.

The reason I feel lucky is because I have several friends who have had hip replacement or knee re-

placement or big time shoulder surgery and they are in constant pain. Several have had cancer, in one form or another. And, from my observation all of them are far more qualified to tell you about suffering than am I.

Loretta went through rotor cuff surgery last year and then endured months of physical therapy that bordered on torture, from my observation. She complained far less about it than I did about the aforementioned chigger bite. So, now I am trying to emulate my wife when it comes to deal-

ing Parkinson's.

Her style was to make fun of herself and try to convince her family and friends that the necessity for her surgery was her own fault and that, in the long run, it would pay off. I'm not really convinced of that but the attitude seems to work for her.

I've found that it's far more productive to poke fun of Mr. Parkinson than it is to let him wear me down and be a bother to everyone around me. And as far I'm concerned, he has met his match, at least for the time being.

USDA Notifies Producers on Acreage History and Yields

Written notifications from USDA are underway to farmers that provide updates on their current base acres, yields and 2009-2012 planting history.

Please cross check the letter from USDA with your farm records. If the information is correct, no further action is needed at this time, but if our letter is incomplete or incorrect, contact your local FSA office as soon as possible.

Verifying the accuracy of data on a farm's acreage history is a required early step for enrolling in the upcoming Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) program

and the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) program. Later this summer, farmers and ranchers will have an opportunity to update their crop yield information and reallocate base acres.

By mid-winter all producers on a farm will be required to make a one-time, unanimous and irrevocable election between price protection and county revenue protection or individual revenue protection for 2014-2018 crop years. Producers can expect to sign contracts for ARC or PLC for the 2014 and 2015 crop years in the spring of 2015.

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sor-

ghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (includes short grain rice and temperate japonica rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed, and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity. Visit www.fsa.usda.gov or the local FSA office for information about FSA and the 2014 Farm Bill programs.

Reporting Losses Reporting Losses

Storms which swept across Rockcastle County Wednesday, August 20, 2014, may have damaged some crops and/or buildings.

USDA reminds producers faced with questions on crop losses to contact their crop insurance companies and local USDA Farm Service Agency Service Centers, as applicable, to report damages to crops or livestock loss, and not to destroy or discontinue care for your crops.

Producers who have purchased NAP insurance from the local Farm Service Agency are to report losses within 15 days of apparent damage.

Farmers with damage to buildings may report the damage to the local FSA office for consideration of the county being declared a disaster county. If Rockcastle Co. is declared an eligible disaster county persons have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

Do you own a farm?

If you own or operate a farm (10 acres or more) in Kentucky it is important for you to keep your records current at your local FSA Service Center office. As farm ownership or farm operators change, it is important to notify FSA immediately for our records to be current.

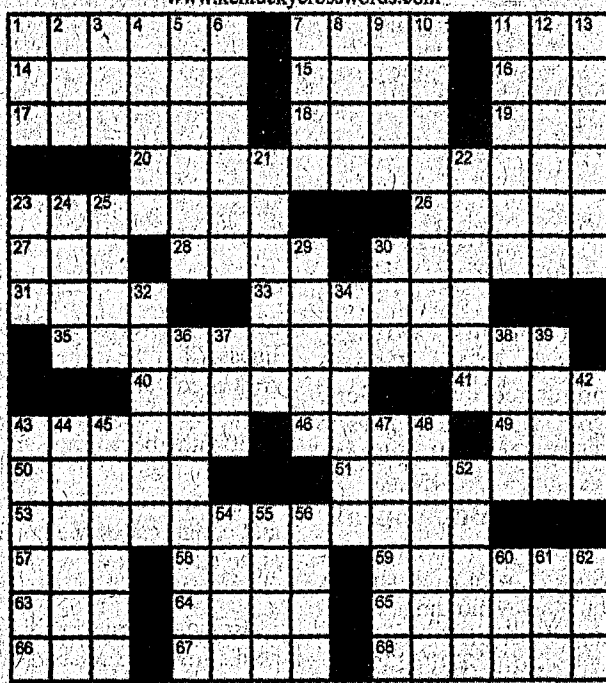

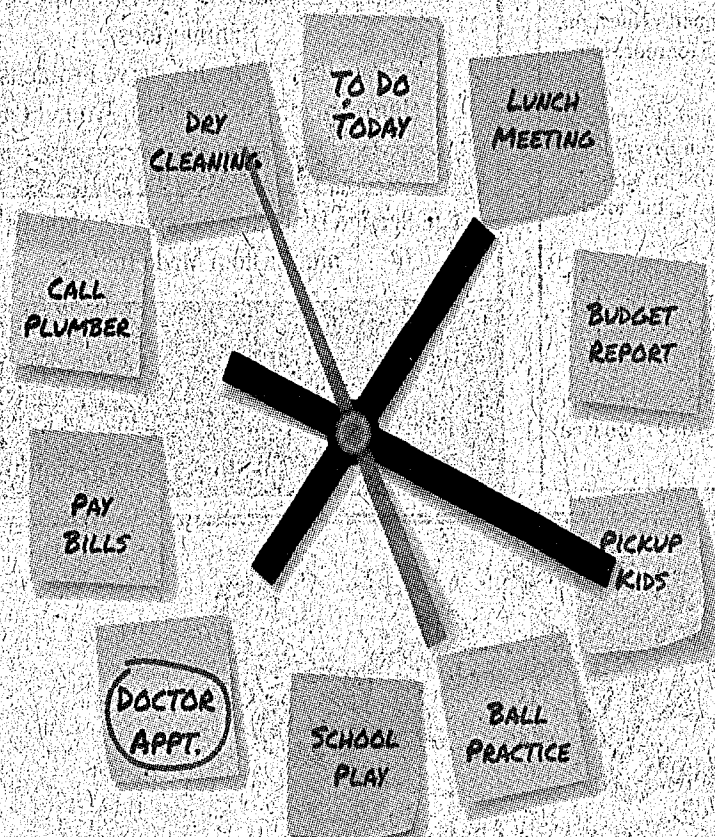

Necessary Labor Brings Dignity and Worth

The calendar on the desk is a reminder of an important fact: The end of the summer season is near. Labor Day, always observed since 1894 on the first Monday in September, is almost here. In one way or another, it will be observed—or celebrated—by everyone.

For some, Labor Day has little meaning. It is little more than a legal holiday that provides a day free from work with pay to mark the coming of the fall season. Therefore, it gives them one last opportunity to enjoy some pleasurable outdoor activity before the fall season with more unpleasant weather begins. So, they relish the time to go to the golf course, to the lake, or to some other enjoyable outdoor place for recreation.

But for others, Labor Day is more serious. It is a time to reflect seriously upon the meaning of labor and its significance and to recognize a basic fact: All necessary labor is beneficial and honorable.

When seen from this perspective, labor is an ac-

tivity that brings dignity to human life. Regardless of one's profession, it has been recognized for two thousand years that all who engage in necessary work "are partners working together." Well over a hundred years ago, Booker T. Washington, Principal of Tuskegee Institute, said it well: "No nation can prosper until it learns that there is as much dignity in tilling a field as in writing a poem."

Since the dawn of time, it has been understood that labor, know as "the sweat of your brow," is the way to earn a livelihood. Then came the idea that, regardless of the profession, "the laborer is worthy of his hire." That was followed by the principle of "a fair day's work for a fair day's wages," a principle that places equal responsibility upon both the worker and the employer.

While "idle hands (may be) the devil's workshop," all necessary labor that is well done benefits everyone, and it brings dignity and worth to the laborer.

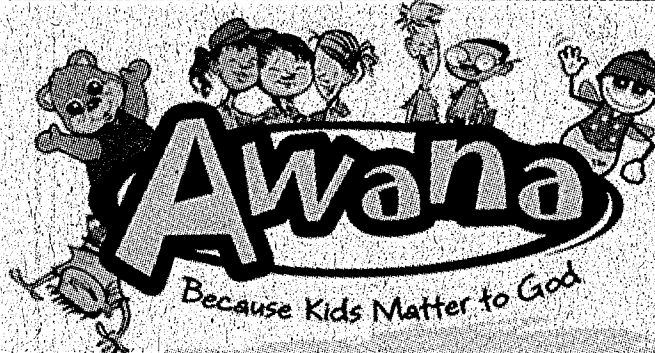

Bad weather shortens game as Rockets lose 24-7 to Southern

The Rockcastle County Rockets football team lost their season-opener to the Madison Southern Eagles last Friday night 24-7. The game was called off

in the third quarter due to lightning and thunderstorms. Officials also delayed the game in the first quarter for thirty minutes before calling off the game after halftime.

Madison Southern's win was largely due to their five-star running back Damien Harris, who had a total of seven carries for 123 yards and two touchdowns. The win also added

to Madison Southern's 2-0 win streak over the Rockets. However, the Rockets still lead the series 18-2.

The Rockets were the first to get on the scoreboard, early in the first quarter, when senior fullback Chance Ansardi punched the ball into the end zone for a 2 yard touchdown run. The extra point, by kicker Dalton Rowe, was good to give the Rockets the early 7-0 lead.

The Eagles answered late in the first quarter with a 27 yard touchdown strike from quarterback Aaron Slone to wide receiver J.D. Dean. The extra point was good tying the ballgame at 7-7.

The Eagles went on to dominate the second quarter, putting up an unanswered 17 points that included a 29 yard field goal from kicker Garrison Watts and a 75 yard touchdown run by Harris. Harris would put the game away before it was called off when he scored again on a 56 yard touchdown run.

The Rockets offense was led by freshman tailback Brent Lovell who had 13 carries for 73 yards. Other Rockets who picked up yards on the ground were: sophomore tailback Dalton Rowe with 69 yards on 14 carries; sophomore running back Devon Robinson rushed for 34 yards on six carries and Ansardi had two yards for one carry for a touchdown.

Sophomore quarterback Dakota Bishop finished the game 2 out of 3

passing for 9 yards. Senior tight end Isaiah Adams was on the receiving end of Bishop's passes catching two passes for 9 yards.

Defensively, the Rockets were led by sophomore defensive lineman Logan Coffey and sophomore Austin Mills who had three tackles each.

Other Rockets picking up tackles and assists were Ansardi and Adams with two tackles each. Lovell, Robinson and sophomore defensive end Lucas Jones were all credited with one tackle each.

Head Coach Scott Parkey said he believed last Friday night's game was an overall good game for his team and that he was still impressed with the team's performance despite the loss.

"Our overall game plan was to keep the ball away from the offense. We accomplished that plan for the most part but we had some penalties and mistakes that stalled several of our offensive drives,"

Parkey said. "Mistakes and penalties are often seen in the first game of the season with young players. We will be working to resolve those things to prevent them from happening in the following games of the season."

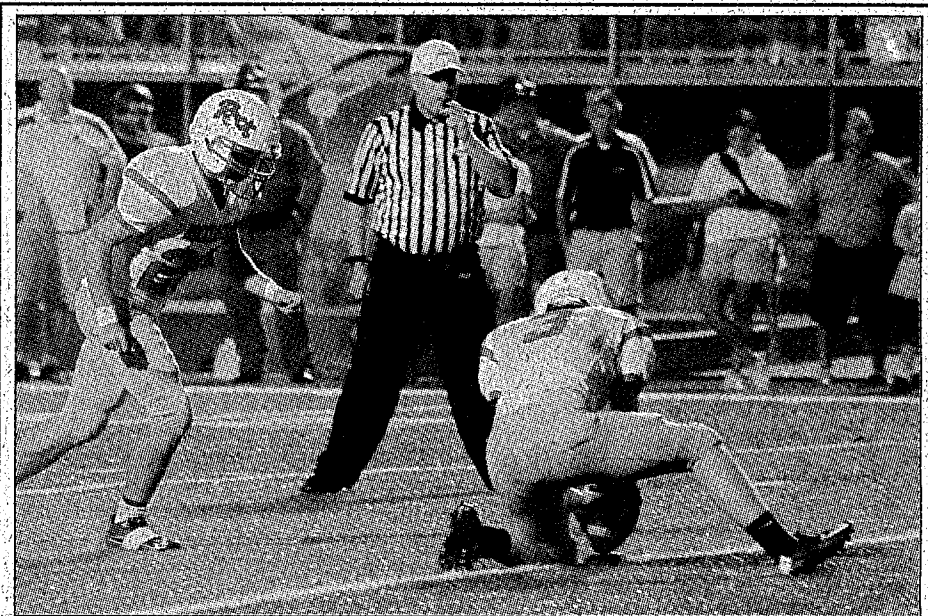
Defensive Coordinator Josh Martin said he believed the Rockets defense played hard and did a decent job keeping Harris in check for most of the game.

"The defense kept Harris in check but when he was put in the wildcat formation, he broke the two long touchdown runs basically due to his superior talent," Martin said. "Our players were in the right spots to defend him but were just a step or two behind. With a player of that caliber, a step or two is all he needs."

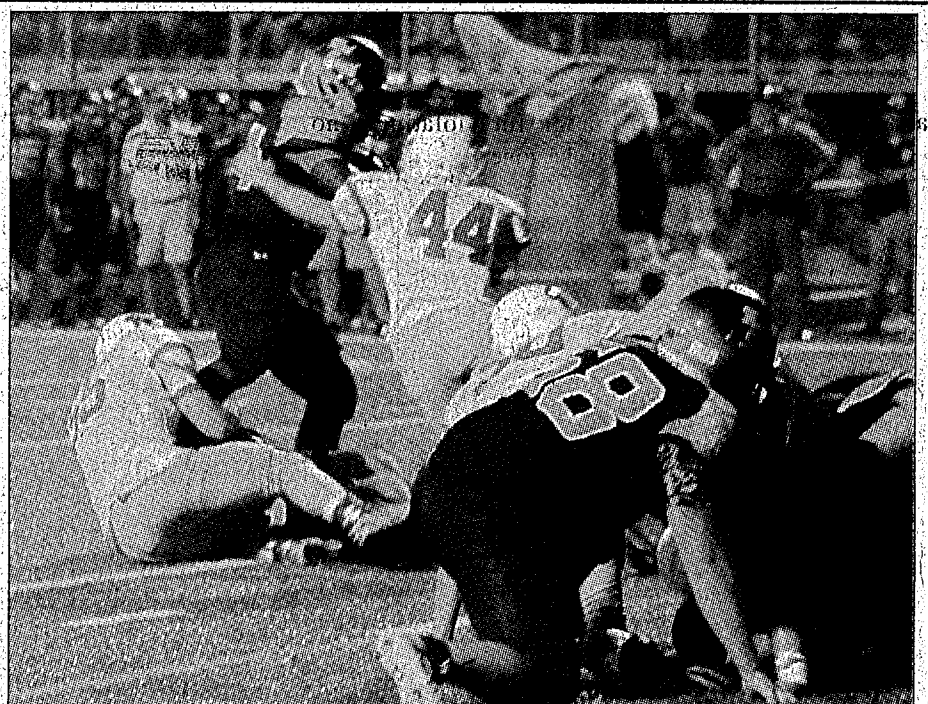
The Rockets next game will be this Friday as they travel to Nicholasville to play the West Jessamine Colts. Kick-off is at 7:30 p.m.



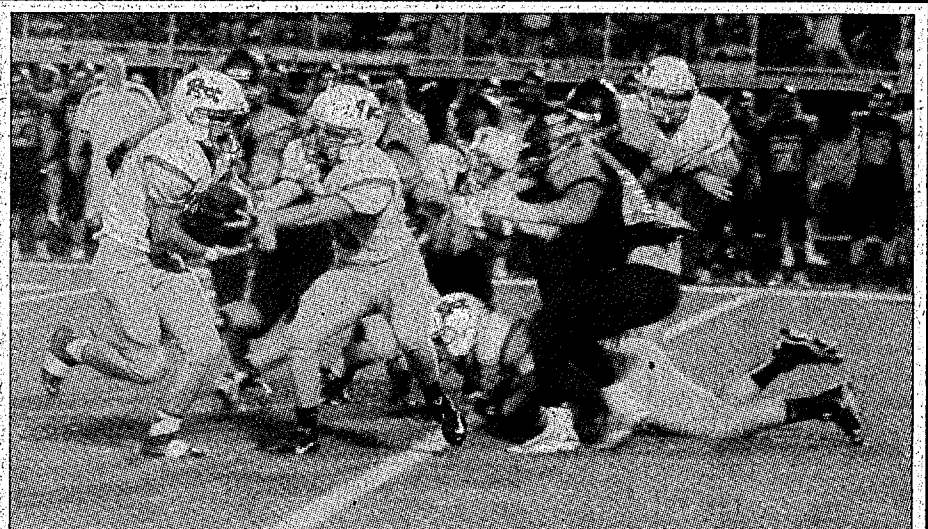

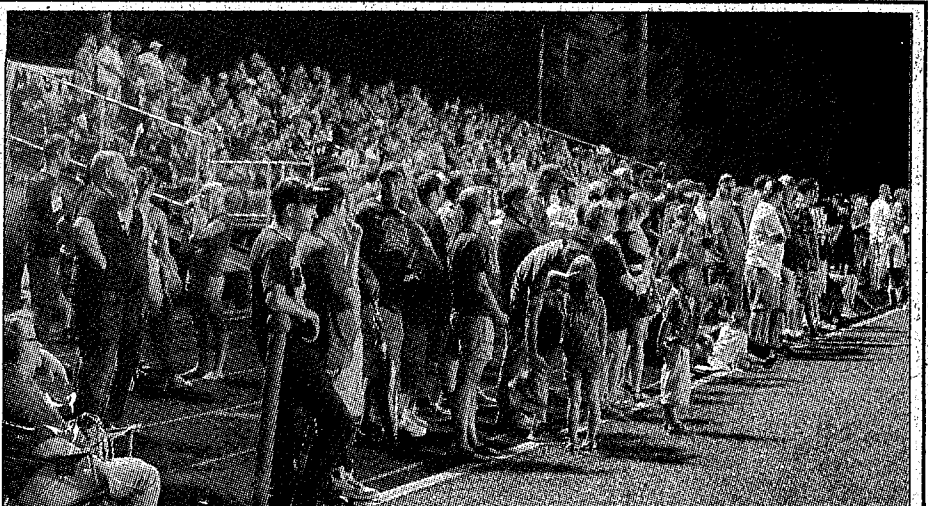

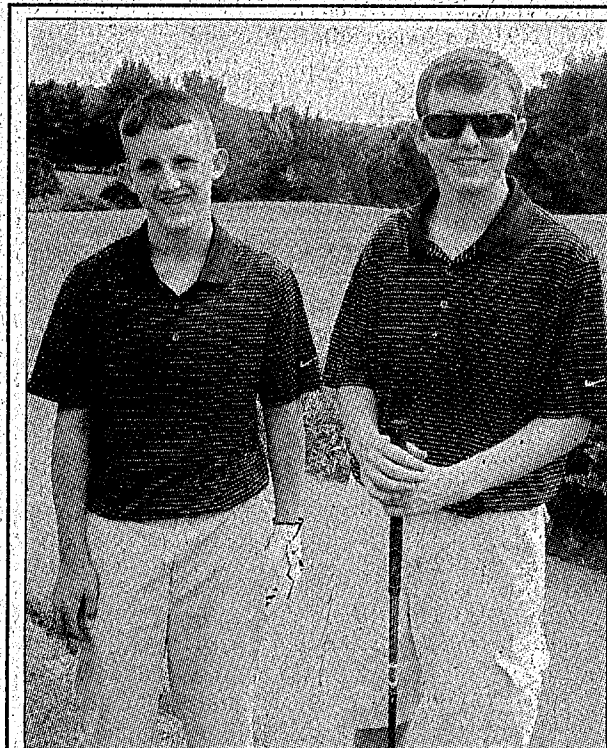

The designation honors the late state Sen. Jeff Green of Mayfield, who served in the Kentucky General Assembly from 1992 to 1997.

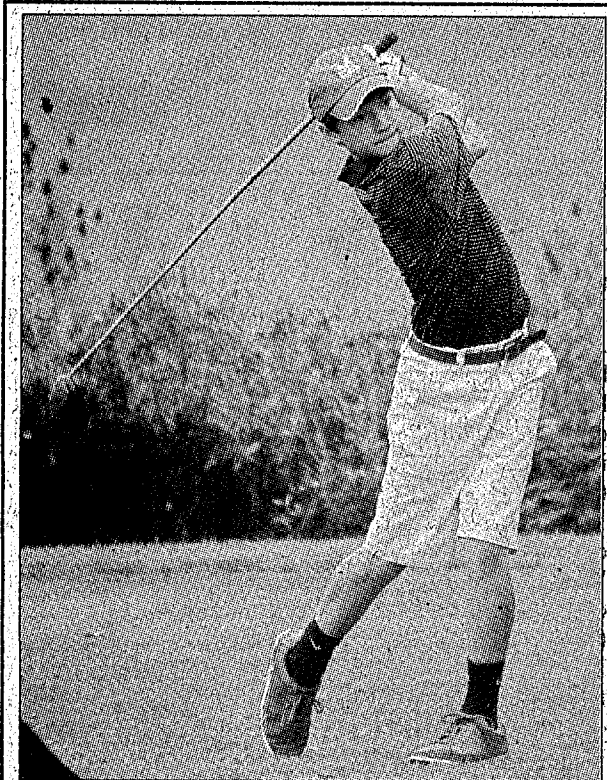

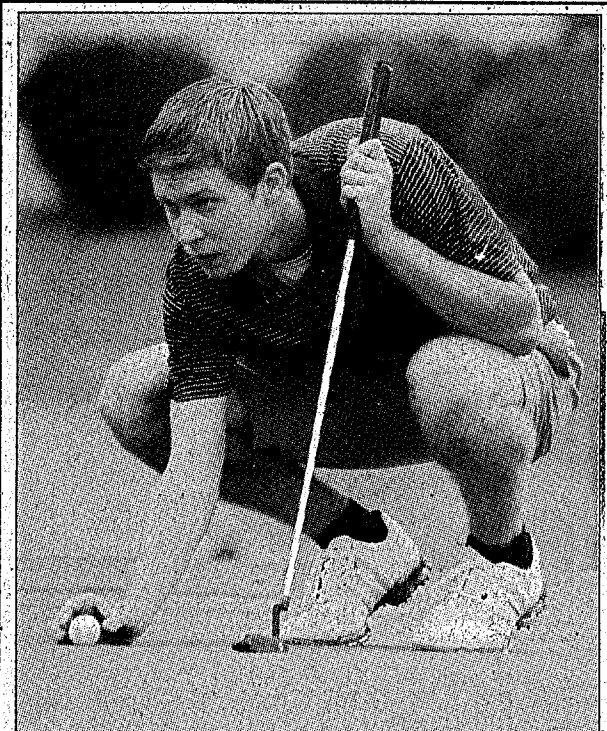

Yards to Paradise

A Swale Idea

I want to begin today's discussion by first mentioning the story title is not misspelled. When I'm finished I do hope the reader thinks this is also a swell idea!

A swale is probably understood best if you will imagine a sloping area of land, then imagine a depression coupled with a small ridge to the downhill side of the depression. Dictionaries might aid in other meanings, but for now, this is the only definition that we'll investigate and explain.

A number of times I've suggested a swale to a property owner as a way to deflect water away from the home or some other area where natural run-off is troublesome. Sometimes, a turning plow behind a tractor (or mule) can make a quick but crude swale. Heavy machinery can make big swales to carry away large amounts of water. And if done correctly, you can still use your mower on the rise and dip of the swale. The swale in the yard that is almost invisible can still work effectively to direct or deflect storm water from where it's not wanted.

But, what if we want the water to stay where it falls rather than run off? As you all know, rainwater runs off steep slopes very rapidly, eventually cutting rills and gullies and eroding much of the topsoil, gradually producing a ruinous situation. To create swales that will contain rather than direct away water you first need to determine the contour of the land. Contour tillage and contour plowing are concepts taught to future farmers to help them be good

stewards of the land.

Once you ascertain the lay of the land, dig (or plow, etc) a furrow and flip the soil upside down a couple feet or more below (down hill from) the furrow or ditch. This creates a little berm that holds water—and it runs neither left nor right if you got the contour of the land figured right.

Now, if you have a long slope hundreds of feet up and down, you will probably need to have your contours actually drain ever so slightly, so as not to have a 'dam break' during heavy rain where one little swale erodes, and the one below washes out, and the one below that washes out...and so on.

This concept of creating a swale to hold or retain water helps keep whatever rain actually falls where you need it—which is in your soil. You plant the little ridges (hilling up soil around potato plants should illustrate this) and the rainfall is all captured in the trench or swale and slowly soaks into the soil. And at the bottom of the little ridge is the roots of your potatoes, or whatever the crop may be.

From potatoes to flower beds to beets and carrots to strawberries, this "raised bed" with a little trench uphill to catch the water so that it does not rapidly run away can enable a person to grow a garden even in the desert.

What rain comes down stays where it's needed. And if irrigation is used, all that water stays put and penetrates the bottoms of the little raised beds or lower side of the swale.

I discovered many years ago this phenomenon when

growing strawberries on a slope of poor clay soil. People discouraged me...or tired to. But I dug dirt from the higher side of my strawberry row so that my berries were on a little raised bed, and the little ditch then caught the rain and kept it off my berries. Yet, the water soaked into the raised rows from the bottom and kept the plants sufficiently moist. A couple times I did irrigate. But it consisted of running the garden hose to the high end of the row of berries, and just letting the water run for awhile. The entire matted row of plants all got the drink they needed. A little fertilizer in September and poor clay subsoil yielded hundreds of gallons of delicious berries for four years or so.

Another practical experience came when using a sod cutter to remove lawn grass for a path/walkway. The pieces of grass were placed uphill from the path and also turned upside down. Several of these chunks or strips of grass were stacked to create a raised planting bed. Once the grass died and began to decompose, what a wonderful planting medium. I can testify that the flowers and other plants really liked their raised beds, and that the water from the slope was captured by the swale above the flowers, keeping it off the path and away from the home.

Perhaps you can think of ways to employ this swale concept at your place. If you snap out of a dream or wake from a daydream with a plan to create some swales in your yard or near your home, you just may discover this is a wonderful practice. Try it on a small spot at first if you are skeptical. Or do a little additional research on the subject and do some wonderful gardening or farming on a small hilly or stony plot. If you're not concerned about mowing or driving over the swales, you can probably make them more productive and also be able to utilize steeper slopes for growing some great vegetables, fruits or flowers.

Reminders for Labor Day boating safety

The Labor Day weekend is the last hurrah of the boating season. Boaters, kayakers and canoeists will swarm waters all over Kentucky during the holiday weekend, squeezing the last bit of fun out of what many consider the last weekend of summer.

Boaters who plan to hit the water should keep in mind some important considerations before they launch their motor boat, canoe or kayak over the holiday weekend and the upcoming fall fishing season.

"There are more non-motorized boats, such as kayaks and canoes, on the water every day," said Zac Campbell, boating education coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Their low profile makes them easy to overlook by motor boat operators."

Sales of non-motorized boats, especially fishing kayaks, rose dramatically over the past decade as more people found their low cost, simplicity of operation and ease of transport appealing.

"A canoe or kayak has much less maneuverability to avoid danger than a motorized boat," Campbell said. "Those using non-motorized boats should wear their lifejacket at all times while on the water."

Campbell also recommends canoeing or kayaking in a group as wakes from motor boats can upset a canoe or kayak. "It is a good idea to bring a square, throwable personal flotation device to help friends in case of trouble," Campbell said. "People in canoes and kayaks on our waters should stay close to shore and out of congested areas."

Boater's fatigue is another challenge for boat operators. The combination of sun, dehydration and the

movement of the boat along with the concentration required to safely operate a boat takes its toll and can induce an almost trance-like state.

"Stabilizing yourself while driving the boat requires energy," Campbell said. "The pounding your body takes while riding in a boat also drains energy."

These stressors dull the senses and slow the reaction time of someone operating a boat.

"When you add consuming alcohol on top of these other factors, it makes for a potentially dangerous situation," Campbell said. "Boater's fatigue affects you without alcohol. Consuming alcohol makes it worse. Don't consume alcohol if you plan to operate a boat."

Navigational buoys often cause confusion for boat operators, especially inexperienced ones. "The red and green buoys mark the channel and keep boats from running aground in shallow areas," Campbell said. "Buoys are the traffic signals on our waterways and guide operators in a safe manner."

An easy to remember phrase, "red, right, returning," helps boaters navigate these buoys correctly. When the boat is moving upstream on a river or up the lake (away from the dam) on a reservoir, keep the red navigation buoy on your right.

The reverse is true when the boat is moving downstream on a river or down the lake (toward the dam) on a reservoir. Keep the green navigation buoy on your right: "red, right, returning."

"Other buoys must be obeyed as well," Campbell said. "You may receive a citation for violating a no wake zone."

Buoys with a diamond indicate a hazard or underwater obstruction while

those with a crossed diamond mean the area is closed to boating. Buoys with a square relate non-regulatory information such as directions.

Boaters should double check their boats for the required safety equipment such as a U.S. Coast Guard approved lifejacket in good working order and readily available for all occupants of the vessel.

Persons under 12 years of age must wear their lifejacket at all times in the open portion of a boat that is underway. Boats operating on Kentucky waters must have a working fire extinguisher that is not expired located for immediate use and signaling devices such as a loud whistle or horn. All boats must also have a Type IV personal flotation device designed to be thrown such as a ring or a square that resembles a seat cushion.

Keep these things in mind before hitting the water over the Labor Day weekend and during fishing season this fall.

Waterfowl blind drawing dates set for several WMAs in state

The dates are now set for the annual waterfowl blind drawings for Doug Travis, Lake Barkley, Barren River Lake, Green River Lake and Sloughs Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs).

Hunters interested in participating in the waterfowl blind drawing must be at least 18 years of age and possess a valid Kentucky hunting license, a Kentucky migratory game bird - waterfowl hunting permit and a federal migratory bird permit (also known as a duck stamp) at the time of the drawing.

The waterfowl blind drawing for Doug Travis WMA in Carlisle and Hickman counties will be 10 a.m. (Central) Saturday, Aug. 30. The drawing will be held at the WMA office, located one-half mile south of Berkley on KY 123. Registration begins at 9 a.m. (Central).

The waterfowl blind drawing for Lake Barkley WMA in Trigg and Lyon counties will be 8 a.m. (Central) Monday, Sept. 15. The drawing will be held at the shelter on the east side of the Cumberland River at Lake Barkley Dam, located off U.S. 62 near Lake City. Participants should use the Power House entrance then turn right toward the drawing location.

The waterfowl blind drawing for Sloughs WMA in Henderson and Union counties will be 7 p.m. (Central) Wednesday, Sept. 24. The drawing will be held at Union County Middle School located off U.S. 60 west in Morganfield. Registration

begins at 6 p.m. (Central)

The waterfowl blind drawing for Green River Lake WMA in Taylor and Adair counties will be 10 a.m. (Eastern) Saturday, Sept. 27. The drawing will be held at the Green River Lake, Corps of Engineers office, located off KY 55 approximately seven miles south of Campbellsville. Registration begins at 9 a.m. (Eastern).

The waterfowl blind drawing for Barren River Lake WMA in Allen and Barren counties will be from 7 to 9 a.m. (Central) Saturday, Oct. 4. The drawing will be held at the Barren River Lake Corps of Engineers office, located at the Barren River Lake dam off KY 252.

Hunters drawn for blinds on Doug Travis, Lake Barkley, Green River Lake, Barren River Lake or Sloughs WMAs must locate, prepare and maintain the blind site for the duration of the 2014-2015 waterfowl seasons. Each drawn hunter may select a co-owner of the blind site for use in the absence of the hunter drawn. The co-owner must be present at the drawing.

Hunters may construct a permanent blind or use a boat or portable blind, but each blind site must be permanently pinned with a permanent marker identifying permit holders for the site. Those hunters selected hold first rights for use of the blind site, but these blind sites are open to public use if the selected hunters are not in the blinds by 30 minutes before shooting time.

Campbellsville University has praying hands carved from 100-year-old oak tree

A 100-year-old oak tree on Campbellsville University's Stapp Lawn is now an eight-foot, 2,000-3,000-pound set of praying hands.

Rob Peterson, a Louisville chainsaw artist, carved the praying hands for the university. It will be placed outside the pergola between the Administration Building and Stapp Lawn.

Rob Roberts, CU's director of grounds and landscaping development, came up with the idea of the praying hands carving. The project has been in the works for several months.

The oak tree was cut down this summer due to its being over 70 percent dead, and Roberts said, "It was time to take it down because of safety issues." The state Forestry Division had examined the tree and made that conclusion.

Roberts found Peterson after a Google search for wood carvers.

"His pictures and website just looked so detailed, and he was very helpful with ideas and suggestions," Roberts said.

Roberts said he priced this project with another artist, but "Rob's ideas and price stood out, and we chose him."

Roberts said Campbellsville University president Michael V. Carter and Otto Tennant, vice president for finance and administration, loved the idea and said to check out Peterson's availability.

"Turns out he was the right artist, and I do mean 'artist' for our project," Roberts said.

Peterson has done other religious carvings such as angels and Jesus and has done some praying hands on a church mission trip in Honduras. This is the first time he has done such a large praying hands piece.

He is a longtime collector of carvings and other artwork, and he decided to try out the art form of chainsaw carving with several tree stumps from the ice storm of 2009.

In Louisville, you can see his carved fish in front of Middletown Christian Church and an eagle in the St. John Lutheran Church courtyard. He is a juried artist in the Louisville Artisans Guild and received a second place award for his "Old World Globe," a scrimshaw map on an antique ivory cue ball.

Peterson has worked in residential construction since 1974 and has carved many pieces of art and jewelry. He has done scrimshaw on bone, antler, horn, ivory, fossilized mastodon, ostrich egg and tagua nuts.

His artwork has been on display in many states from Texas to Minnesota to New Hampshire to Florida.

Roberts said as he was looking at images he saw elsewhere around the country and saw two or three praying hands and thought that image would be perfect for a Christian university.

Roberts has another project in mind - a Tiger, after the university's mascot, but that project, as is the praying hands, is waiting on a donor.

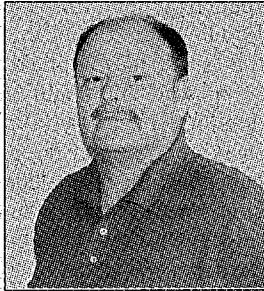

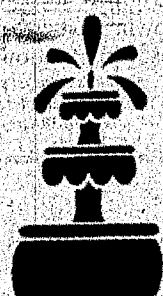

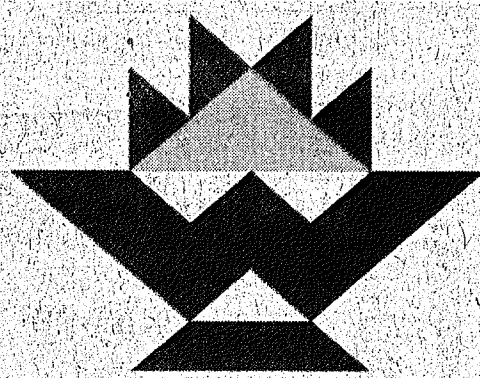

Hidden Among Us

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

To celebrate and honor the county's American Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I have compiled highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years 1818 and 1842. All information was taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. More information can be found on each patriot at the local library or the Rockcastle Historical Society. (Copyright pending). George Harlow Virginia

George Harlow was born in 1756 Hanover, VA and died on 13 August 1846 in Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, George gave the following account of his service on 12 September 1833 in Rockcastle Co. KY:

George volunteered in the militia of the line of the State of Virginia in the Army of the United States for three months in the year before General Burgoyne surrendered at Saratoga (October 7, 1777). He volunteered at Charlottesville, Albemarle Co. VA in the Company commanded by Captain Mark Leake, his son Lieutenant in the regiment commanded by Colonel Holt Richeson. He was marched to old Richmond, then to Cabin Point and finally to Petersburg where he was discharged by his Captain after faithfully serving out his tour of three months.

Again before Burgoyne surrendered, he volunteered in Albemarle Co. VA for three months in the militia of VA in the company commanded by Captain Daniel White, names of Lieutenant and Ensign forgotten. He was in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Reuben Lindsay. He was marched to old Richmond, then down the river about sixty miles until his time of three months had expired. He was discharged by Captain White on the James River about sixty miles below Richmond.

Four months had passed when he again volunteered in the militia of VA for three months in the Company commanded by Captain Ivey Hamner, his Lieutenant was Thomas Gaith, the company was attached to no regiment. The Company was marched to Richmond, then to the mouth of Tuckahoe on the James River. From hence conveyed munitions of war in canoes up to Point of Fork in Goochland County on the James River then back to Tuckahoe where his term of service had expired and he was discharged at the mouth of Tuckahoe by Captain Hamner.

About a month later, he volunteered for three months in Albemarle Co. VA in the Company commanded by James Garland, then was marched to guard prisoners in Albemarle surrendered under General Burgoyne. Shortly after they were removed from Winchester, where he was marched as a guard and continued in the service for three months when he was discharged at Winchester by his Lieutenant, name he had forgotten. Captain Garland had been shot by one of his own men.

About six weeks after his return, he volunteered for the last time in Albemarle

County in the militia for three months under Lieutenant Fowler in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Armstrong. He marched to Richmond, then in the neighborhood of Petersburg and back to Richmond. Hemarshed down the river about fifty miles ad back to Richmond then towards Petersburg and he was discharged by his Captain after serving out his term of six months. He remembered on one of his tours seeing General Lafayette and General Thomas Nelson.

George lived in Albemarle County VA when he was called into service and continued to live there until he and his family moved to Rockcastle Co. KY about 1811. He was a resident for sixteen years at the time of his application. George received a pension at the rate of fifty dollars annually commencing 4 March 1831 for service as a private for one year and three months in the Virginia service until his death 13 August 1846 in Rockcastle Co. KY. On 10 October 1849 in Rockcastle Co. KY, Susanna Harlow applied for a widow's pension. On 31 March 1855 in Rockcastle Co. KY, she filed for her bounty land entitlement as the widow of George Harlow.

George married Susanna Proctor (September 1764VA-22 January 1856 Rockcastle Co. KY) on 24 December 1781 in Albemarle Co. VA. There is no mention of children in the pension application or either George or his widow. Both George and Susanna died from old age and are buried in Rockcastle Co. KY. Burial place is unknown. As to date, no person has joined the Daughters of the American Revolution under George Harlow. He would be considered a new patriot for the society.

Melissa Brock recognized for cancer advocacy efforts

Melissa Brock received the "Mission of Hope Advocacy Award" at the eighth annual "Celebrate Life" cancer survivor dinner held on August 21. This year almost 600 people attended the event.

The "Mission of Hope Advocacy Award" is presented by the Southern Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC), and recognizes those who make a difference in their communities through their commitment to cancer prevention, raising awareness, and support of those fighting the disease.

"Melissa is a great example of advocacy in action," said Anna Jones, coordinator of the cancer survivor dinner and assistant director of the Southern KY AHEC. "Her dedication to fighting cancer and helping those who are battling the disease make her a very deserving winner of this award."

An employee of Rockcastle Regional Hospital and Respiratory Care Center since 1997, Brock has served as the oncology service line manager since 2007. The oncology department at Rockcastle Regional opened in 2004 and partners with National Cancer Institute (NCI) designated Markey Cancer Center to provide patients with cancer care that is close to home. The clinic offers oncology appointments and

chemotherapy treatment to patients of Rockcastle County and the surrounding area.

As oncology manager, Brock was extremely instrumental in the vision and establishment of Rockcastle Regional's "Hope Fund" as a cancer patient assistance fund. "The vision of our oncology program is for all Rockcastle County citizens to have access to excellent cancer care," said Brock. "Anyone who has ever had to deal with cancer knows the staggering financial, physical, and emotional burdens the disease poses for both the patients and their families."

Some patients require chemotherapy multiple times a week. Some may still require trips to Lexington for radiation treatment, additional biopsies, or even surgery. Travel costs can add up quickly when undergoing any form of cancer treatment.

"In 2011, we began to notice an increase in the number of patients experiencing access barriers to treatment because of the overwhelming cost for travel," Brock said. "Patients were often struggling to pay for the gas to get them to and from treatment. This was when the idea of the 'Hope Fund' was born."

Brock worked with Dr. David Bullock, Rockcastle Regional Hospital leadership, and Markey Cancer

Center to create the "Hope Fund" in September 2012. Managed by the oncology department, the fund helps to alleviate financial hardships that patients encounter while actively receiving cancer care, primarily through assistance with travel expenses.

The "Hope Fund's" main source of funding is the annual "Strides Against Cancer" horse show, for which Brock and Dr. Bullock continue to serve vital roles in both planning and coordination. The third annual show is scheduled for Saturday, September 13 at the Brodhead Fair Grounds.

She is also very active in other community outreach efforts and health fairs to raise awareness and educate others on cancer prevention, screening, and early detection. Currently, she coordinates and leads a cancer support group that meets quarterly at Rockcastle Regional and is free and open to the community.

In 2004, she began volunteering with the American Cancer Society (ACS) and Relay For Life of Rockcastle County, serving as community chairperson since 2006. The American Cancer Society recognized her for these efforts with the mid-south division "Volunteer of the Year Award" in both 2005 and 2006.

"Melissa is a great asset to the American Cancer Society and Relay For Life of Rockcastle County," said Brooke Whitis, American Cancer Society, mid-south division representative. "She believes in our mission and is the local face for ACS in the community. We appreciate her dedication and hard work in helping to educate people in her community about cancer issues."

even with a disability or other form of adversity if they try hard enough, make good decisions, and set their sights high enough. The sky is the limit."

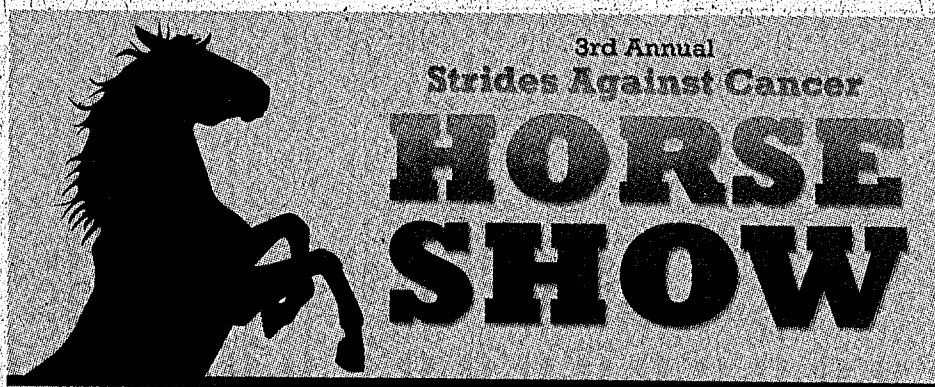
