Local schools receive report cards for 2013-2014 school year

Every school in the Rockcastle County School District recently received their statewide test results for the 2013-2014 school year.

The district's percentile rank went from 57th statewide to 66th. They received a 67.1 overall score out of 100 compared to the 65.8 overall score they received the previous year. The district is also classified as "needs improvement/progressing."

Mt. Vernon Elementary School made the largest improvement in the district with a 6.9 gain from the previous year. They received an overall score of 62.5 compared to the previous score of 55.6 and they are currently labeled as "needs improvement/progressing." They also increased their percentile ranking from 18th to 39th.

Brodhead Elementary School still had the highest

RCIDA discusses website and vacant manufacturing facility at meeting

Several items of business were discussed at the monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority Monday, including the status of the vacant manufacturing facility and the organization's website.

RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins updated the board about the recently vacated manufacturing facility in the Rockcastle County Industrial Park. She said Anchor Packaging recently paid their \$300,000 penalty to opt out of their lease for the manufacturing facility and that the company was officially moved out as of Monday.

Hopkins said that several brokers have contacted her saying they have potential companies interested in the facility. However, Hopkins said she informed them about the fiscal court deciding not to sign with a brokerage firm at this point and she said she hasn't heard from any of them since then.

However, Hopkins said she has several other leads and has also met with one potential manufacturer who is extremely interested in the facility. She said there is a Japanese automotive manufacturer that is local-

Fiscal Court discusses Anchor Packaging building security issues

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court held a special meeting Tuesday to discuss urgent issues at the manufacturing facility in the Rockcastle County Industrial Park recently vacated by Anchor Packaging.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis said Anchor Packaging is "completely gone" and the building is

now empty. Anchor Packaging recently paid their \$300,000 penalty for exercising their option to break their lease of the facility.

"They said they were completely moved out as of Monday. They took everything they had purchased and left everything that belonged to us," Carloftis said. "They really cleaned it up and left it the way they got

it, just like they agreed to do."

Anchor Packaging announced in June that they were relocating to Arkansas because of cheaper utility rates. Carloftis said the electric and water bill will now have to be put into the county's name.

"We will have to keep the electric turned on for the sump pumps because rain water gets in the system and can overflow onto the main floor if we don't have sump pumps," Carloftis said. "We will also have to keep the water turned on for sprinkler protection in case of a fire. They have to be charged with pressure on them."

Carloftis said the heat will also have to be kept on in the facility to keep the water lines from freezing during the winter.

Magistrate Bill McKinney agreed and said they can keep the thermostat at 38 or 40 degrees to keep everything from freezing without having a more expensive heating bill.

"The facility is insulated well and will hold heat. The lower we can get the tem-

Series of storms pass through Rockcastle

A severe storm system moved across the state on Monday and Tuesday bringing severe thunderstorms, heavy rains, high winds and hail to Rockcastle County.

During the storms on Monday and Tuesday, the National Weather Service reported approximately quarter inch sized hail in several areas of the county.

The NWS also reported high rainfall totals for both storms. They reported 2.11 inches of rain in Mt. Vernon, 2.67 inches of rain in Brodhead, 2.08 inches in Livingston, 2.68 inches in Climax and 3.52 inches of rain in the Roundstone community.

CSEPP Director Hal Holbrook said several funnel clouds were reportedly spotted throughout the county. Fortunately, he said no tornadoes touched down.

Local group planning to restore historic Boone Gap

A local group is planning to restore and enhance the highway wayside at Boone Gap on Hwy 25 near the Madison and Rockcastle County line.

The Friends of Boone Trace has organized a restoration plan for the site at Boone Gap. Members of the group met with several officials from Rockcastle County, Madison County, Rockcastle County Daughters of the Ameri-

can Revolution and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet last Tuesday to discuss the proposed cleanup at the site.

According to the proposal packet, Boone Gap was an important landmark and access point on Boone Trace. Daniel Boone and a party of thirty men established Boone Trace in the spring of 1775.

Boone Trace started in Martin Station, North Carolina and ended at Fort

Boonesborough which is located north of Richmond on the Kentucky River. The trace was used by thousands of people in the late 18th century to move from North Carolina to Kentucky.

People traveling Boone Trace had three primary natural barriers they had to overcome as they pushed westward to settle new lands in Ken-

The place to be, this coming Saturday morning, is downtown Paint Lick where Friends of Paint Lick (FOPL) will be hosting what I believe may be our 31st consecutive Village Fest. The show will go on, come rain or shine, though rain might put a damper on the number of vendors and exhibitors who may show up.

Actually, we never know who is going to show up to show or sell until about 9:00 AM on the Saturday of the event, but there has always been good, live music, lots of raffles, and camaraderie galore. It's a celebration that has a mind of its own.

These events were first organized by the late Dean Cornett and Kevin Brown in the mid 1980s. Dean had recently retired from a long career in community action work and Kevin was a pre-teen elementary school student here in Paint Lick. Kevin is now a successful attorney and Dean has crossed over to the other side where she is, most likely, telling St. Peter how to run Heaven. In the meantime her vision is alive and well. Our spring and fall festivals as well as our "Christmas in the Village" festival still go on and we feel Dean Cornett's spirit there almost as strongly as it was when she was alive.

Anyway, Dean and Kevin got to talking about the fact that there was nothing going on in our little village and wouldn't it be wonderful if we could have a place where folks could get together to help each other out, to socialize and maybe organize some activities for our youth and thus, FOPL was born.

Somehow they managed to acquire an old, deserted building, in fact the first building you see when you cross the bridge on 52 coming into Paint Lick from the east. In short order, story hours and art classes were

arranged for young kids and a host self-help endeavors were begun for adults. People began dropping off clothing, books, household furnishings and even food and winter heating fuel.

Dean scurried about the village and its environs, in an old, faded-green, '61 Chevrolet pickup truck that was about 6 inches higher on one side than it was on the other. The truck smoked pretty heavily, but she managed to keep oil in it and tires with at least a few more miles left in them on it. She had emblazoned, in bold black script on both doors the motto "PRESS ON REGARDLESS".

She convinced Eastern Kentucky University to offer night classes to local folks who wanted college educations. I'm not sure how many students completed one or more of these classes over the years, but I'm sure it would number in the dozens. I know, for sure, that my wife completed over 60 credit hours.

Shortly after opening the doors, Dean talked the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) into offering GED classes in our building. I have lost track of the actual number of people who earned their high school equivalency diplomas at FOPL, but again the number would be in dozens. She also managed to talk CAP into making several \$5000.00 grants to repair the roof, replace the sewage system and replace the relatively ancient hvac system. In fact, there was no air conditioning and very little heat in the building when it first opened.

Just after the turn of the century, she convinced Dr. John Belanger that he was the answer to her dream of having a primary care health clinic in our community. The FOPL building had

Yards to Paradise

BLAZING COLORS:
Colorful Autumns to Come

With the changing of seasons, we anticipate fall colors as the days get shorter and the temperatures gradually go lower. Some of us may take a drive or a mini vacation to the mountains to view the most blazing colorscapes. How about appreciation for the colors in your yard and neighborhood? (And if the brilliant colorations are not part of your landscaping—they could be in future years. There is no better time to begin than right now!)

How many homeowners, gardeners, or landscapers make fall color the priority when they buy and plant? Not too many. Flowering trees, shade trees and trees whose shape fills a certain spot are more apt to be the discriminating factors. Shrubbery is usually chosen for function, such as hedges or foundation plantings. Often its evergreen (think yews). For the moment let us consider how special our yard could be in future autumns if we set out with that very objective today.

Part of the fun of leaf peeping is seeing how different colors and shades wow us from the same trees and shrubs with a variable look year to year. The weather has a lot to do with one year being super for fall color and another not so much. Allowing for variation in nature, we can still do much to incorporate attention grabbing fall colors into our landscapes.

The two most admired colors in the autumn are red and yellow. Yet, I want to emphasize that there is an even more important one, and that is green—for evergreen trees and shrubs and green lawns and groundcovers make the bright reds and glowing yellows 'pop!' We will cover red and yellow first. Then some trees and shrubs with multi-colored leaves or variations in fall colors.

Yellow first. Yellow is the autumn color of the following trees and shrubs. Sweet birch, the native *betula lentago*, colors up yellow and has bark resembling a cherry. The sap of this native is where birch tree syrup comes from. The Norway maple colors a glowing yellow, sometimes with an orangish tint. The ginkgo tree is a glorious yellow in fall, and most leaves drop all at once for easier cleanup. The aspen tree colors yellow. So does yellowwood (pendulous clusters of May flowers too) and paw-paw trees (fruit dessert a bonus), plus the 'silk hope' cultivar of the mulberry tree. The little leaf linden, *tilia cordata*, is about as large as a red maple, but with excellent yellow fall color. There is the rare native golden hop

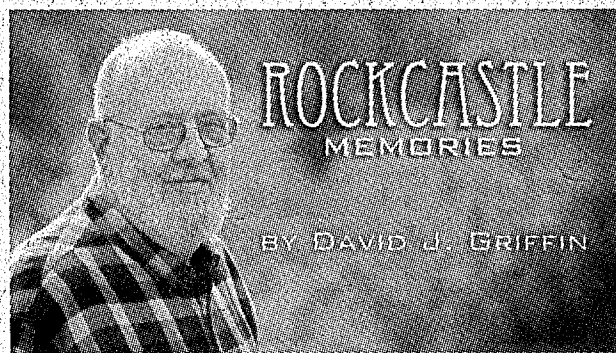
tree. And, for a shady spot, the spicewood bush. In planting zone 7, try Chinese wintersweet shrub.

For red fall colors, it's hard to say who should go first. I'll start with a shrub, the chokeberry. Red fall colors, white spring blooms, and either black or red fruits for the birds (and you if you like a somewhat bitter fruit that is extremely nutritious). Scarlet and red oaks are late coloring red trees, strong trees that also attract wildlife. It's hard to beat the fall color of a paperbark maple (or its peeling cinnamon colored bark). Many of the Japanese maples offer super fall color, the 'Bloodgood' cultivar is probably best known for the brilliant red fall display. Sumac shrubs offer good fall color. Black gum trees some years lead the list of most impressive reds. And especially at higher elevations, the sourwood tree offers wonderful red displays. Some years and some locations they can be pinkish or orangish. Red maples are over used in most yards and municipal or commercial plantings, but certainly they can impress with their colors. Autumn Blaze is probably the best fast-growing hybrid with dependable red fall color (and almost seedless). I will close with three shrub selections for wonderful fall red displays: the burning bush euonymous (much over used and out of place in a landscape of natives), the sweetspire or itea, and the new mahoberberis (a cross between barberry and its native relative the Oregon grape holly).

For color variations from season to season, or plant cultivar to plant cultivar (cultivated variety), here is a listing from which you could pick some fine plantings for your autumn color display. Try the yellow color of Parrotia, which is sometimes orange, and sometimes a mix of purple and pink and orange and green. *Stewartia* is orange-red. *Fothergilla* shrub (native mountain witch alder) is orange or red. *Sassafras* is the best choice probably if one strictly wants an orange fall display. Serviceberries are yellow, but sometimes burgundy or orange. Blueberries are very colorful in the fall, and a few keep leaves through part of the winter—study up on which varieties you plan to plant (it usually takes two to pollinate and have a fruit crop).

Sugar maples may grow

Have you ever done silly things that remind you of your parents when they were older? Well, a few weeks ago my wife, Kathy, pulled another of her stunts that make me think of my grandmother (Mommie Katie). I was so amused that we laughed nearly all the way home.

We were having dinner at the Outback Steakhouse in Richmond, and as we were leaving, Kathy tried to get into a black SUV that was being driven by someone we had never met. He simply looked at her like, "Do I know you?" She was so embarrassed, and I couldn't help but laugh.

If we are in a parking lot of nearly any kind, she never pays any attention to the make and model of the cars; it only has to be a black SUV (like our current Ford Escape) for her to head for it. The first time that she did this was at our local Kroger store. Kathy reported that the gentleman behind the wheel of that vehicle looked absolutely stunned.

Mommie Katie was so actively involved in the church services at First Baptist in Mt. Vernon that she had few other things on her mind. She always arrived early and stayed until everyone else had left. (We accused her of staying to clean the sanctuary.) Because she was a Sunday school teacher for the adult ladies, she loved to chat with members of her class after the worship services. She also always had a conversation with the Pastor; she was late leaving every church service.

My grandfather (Pop) left the church building as

soon as the services ended. He then retrieved our car and pulled up to the front of the church so that Mommie Katie only had to walk down a few steps in order to actually get into the car. One particular evening, the service ran late. Pop did his usual chore and pulled our Chevrolet up to the front of the church, but someone else had the same idea and had taken "Pop's spot" directly in front of the steps.

Norma Damrell

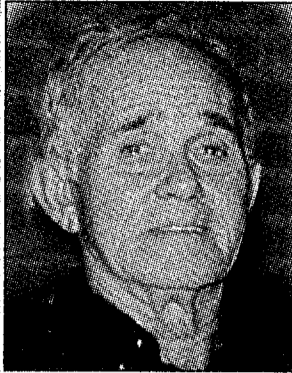

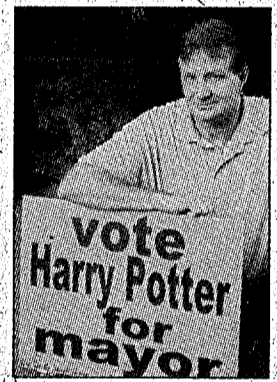

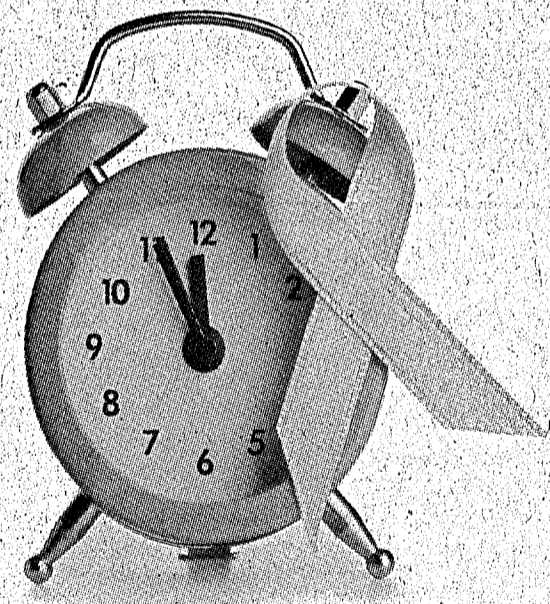

Sweet gum trees can be yellow, and a few trees over they may be red, and a little ways from there a mixture of burgundy and yellow or all deep burgundy. Mountain ash is a great understory tree with excellent fall color. And the Jessamine vine, gelsemium, offers good fall color. I'll close with a mention of the viburnums, deciduous, azaleas and enkianthus.

With a smart plan of action at this time, your yard can be the one everyone envies and raves over in a year

or two when the leaves turn in the autumn. And since fall is the best time to plant most trees and shrubs, there's no time like now to get started, while it's fresh in mind.

Here's to your colorful autumns of the future!

originally housed at least two businesses and our organization only occupied about half of it because the other half leaked. Dean managed to get a \$35,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation's Rural Health Initiative to perform the necessary repairs that would renovate and turn the building into a clinic. That grant is significant in that the foundation had a firm policy of not making capital (building and equipment) grants. But, as with many other organizations and funding sources, she was tenaciously able to convince them that their policies were not as firm as they thought they were.

In the spring of 2014, after just over ten years of operation, it became painfully obvious that the Paint Lick Family Clinic (PLFC) could not afford the technology required to keep a modern health care clinic financially afloat. But just as we were about to vote to shut it down, Richmond, KY-based White House Clinics, which already operated 5 affordable health clinics in adjacent or nearby counties, agreed to take over PLFC. Not only

that, but White House also let us keep our beloved, Dr. Belanger. As far as we residents are concerned, this development is nothing short of a miracle, but Dean is, most likely, looking down from the Pearly Gates with a grin but with no surprise, at all on her face.

I really wanted to be in Letcher County, for Blackey Days, this weekend because it's like a giant community homecoming and it is home to me. If anyone knows when Blackey Days is scheduled for 2015, would you please pass that information along to me.

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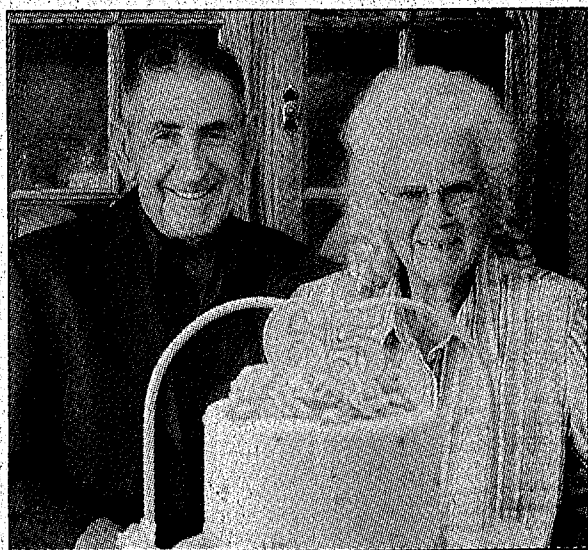
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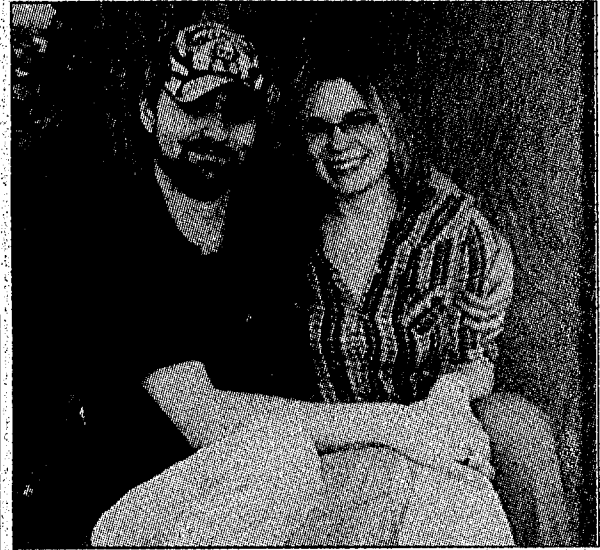

Local artist demonstrates oil painting techniques

On Saturday, Oct. 4, artist Carl Von Fischer, of Mount Vernon, will demonstrate his oil painting techniques from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea. Von Fischer grew up in Cincinnati, and absorbed creativity directly from his parents. Von Fischer's mother was a basket maker and weaver and his father was a painter and a designer for Gibson cards. Von Fischer can remember taking a bus or streetcar to the Cincinnati Art Museum as a youngster.

"Almost every week, I would spend hours going from painting to painting. The ones that really caught my eye were the great Western paintings. I knew early on - that one day I would paint - where and when I didn't know," he said. At age 16, he worked in Glacier National Park, affirming his love of the Western landscape. After graduating from high school, Von Fischer joined the military and was deployed to Germany. Upon his return to Cincinnati, he attended the Central Art Academy, studying commercial art, and graduated with top honors. Von Fischer then worked for advertising agencies in Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Denver, and Greenville, S.C., before opening his own advertising agency. After five years running his own business, he sold it to his partner and moved out west to Missoula, Mont. There he began to teach himself to paint in earnest, often painting in the open spaces of the west.

Paintings by Von Fischer are regularly available at the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea, 200 Artisan Way, just off Interstate 75 at Berea Exit 77. The center's exhibits, shopping and travel information areas are open daily, year-round, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and the cafe is open from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Admission is free. 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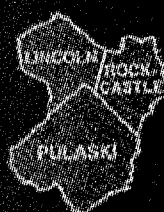

they will have to sign a contract agreeing to keep them at least a month.

McKinney said he thought \$18,000 was too high for security at the facility and suggested the fiscal court consider other options.

“That’s almost \$200,000 a year for security at the place. You could suffer quite a bit of damage or loss to make up for \$200,000,” McKinney said. “We need to get quotes from other companies or look at other options.”

Carloftis also reminded the court that the facility had a security system alarm on all doors at the facility.

Magistrate Lee Earl Adams asked if the security system would work if someone got into the facility without using a door. He asked if the security system had any motion sensors placed throughout the facility.

Carloftis said they would check on the security system and assess its capabilities. He said he was also asking for quotes from other security companies as well.

Magistrate Ralph Allen wanted to know how long the county would have to upkeep the facility before another company moved in it. He asked if there were any companies that had shown an interest in moving into the facility.

Carloftis said RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins said there had been several inquiries and that a Japanese automobile manufacturing company was interested in the facility. However, he said the court needs to plan for a worst case scenario in case the facility isn’t leased before this winter.

The Fiscal Court agreed to transfer the facility’s utility bills into the county’s name, set the facility’s thermostat to 38 degrees, assess the capabilities of the facility’s security system and receive quotes for security from other security companies.

In other action, the court:

- Approved the purchase of a 1995 International firetruck from Wynn Fire Equipment in Corbin for \$55,100 for Climax Fire Department. \$30,000 of the truck will be paid for by coal severance grant money and the remaining \$25,100 will be paid by the county.

- Approved the purchase of a brush truck and an 1800 gallon GMC tanker truck from Wynn Fire Equipment in Corbin for a total of \$39,000. The county also agreed to trade a nonoperational firetruck from the Climax Fire Department as a part of the deal. The brush truck and tanker will be placed at Climax Fire Department to officially put them in full operation.

- Approved the following county roads to be repaved or resurfaced: Luther Road, Blackburn Lane, Sand Hill Cemetery Loop,

Bushner Lane, Happy Lane and part of Possum Kingdom. Carloftis said the road projects will be paid out of county road fund.

overall score in the district with 75.6, which is down from their previous overall score of 81.7. Their percentile rank went from 99th to 91st but they are still labeled as a “distinguished” school.

Roundstone Elementary School is also ranked as a “distinguished” school and listed as a high performing school in the state. They received an overall score of 75.5 compared to 70 in 2013 and now have a 91 percent ranking up from 72 last year.

Rockcastle County Middle School made a small improvement with an overall score of 65.4 compared to the previous year’s score of 63.3. They are still labeled as “needs improvement/progressing.” They increased their percentile ranking from 54th to 63rd.

The Rockcastle County High School received a negative score on their 2013-2014 report card with an overall score of 65.3 compared to an overall score of 66.7 in 2012-2013. Their percentile ranking decreased from 50th to 42nd. RCHS is currently classified as “need improvement” and is listed as a focus school in the state.

The test scores are a result of students who are tested annually in a complex testing system called the Kentucky Performance Rating for Educational Progress. The three year old KPREP testing system reveals how well students are doing in basic academic areas.

The KPREP test also academically compares each school’s students to students in other school districts. At the high school level, the test calculates graduation rates as well as college and career readiness.

The high school graduation rates, college readiness and career readiness scores are expected to be released later this month.

several calls of power outages across the county on Tuesday and Wednesday morning. He also said there were reports of downed trees and limbs in yards and on roadways.

Holbrook said that electric was restored to areas with power outages on Wednesday morning and there were no reports of damage to homes or buildings as a result of the storms.

Holbrook went on to say that the county was fortunate to not receive the

amount of hail and storm damage that was reported in surrounding counties. He also said there were not any reports of injuries due to the storm.

“We were fortunate that we didn’t get the brunt of the storm, like Madison County, which had enough hail to cover the ground and rooftops,” Holbrook said. “We are always prepared for the worst but glad that we didn’t have any serious damage or injuries.”

giving everyone high-fives behind him.

Moments later, witnesses said Durham slipped and lost his balance while his back was toward the field. Witnesses said he started falling backward into the railing and several people tried to grab onto him to no avail as he tipped over the railing and fell over the wall.

UK officials said Durham fell approximately 35 feet and that he didn’t land on anyone when he hit the section below him. He was rushed from the stadium to the UK Medical Center where he remains in stable condition and is being treated for several broken vertebrae, a broken wrist and a broken arm.

Durham was an offensive lineman for the Wildcats from 2007-2011. Durham is also a 2007 graduate of Rockcastle County High School where he starred as an offensive lineman for the Rockcastle County Rockets.

Rockets Head Coach Scott Parkey said Durham has always volunteered to work in youth league camps and lineman camps in Rockcastle County and is a member of the Rockcastle Football Hall of Fame.

“He absolutely loves being with the kids. He always stopped by after he graduated, continuing to stay in touch and cheer the Rockets on,” Parkey said. “The Rockcastle football family send their love and prayers in this time of need for Brad and his family.”

Independent Auditor’s Report

Report on the Financial Statement
We have audited the accompanying statement of revenues, expenditures, and excess fees - regulatory basis of the County Clerk of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statement.

Management’s Responsibility for the Financial Statement
Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of this financial statement in accordance with accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the laws of Kentucky to demonstrate compliance with the Commonwealth of Kentucky’s regulatory basis of accounting as described in Note 1. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of a financial statement that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor’s Responsibility
Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. The procedures selected depend on the auditor’s judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity’s preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity’s internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles
As described in Note 1 of the financial statement, the financial statement is prepared by the County Clerk on the basis of the accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the laws of Kentucky to demonstrate compliance with the Commonwealth of Kentucky’s regulatory basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The effects on the financial statement of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note 1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material.

Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

ing to Corbin and that they are interested in the facility as a branch of the company.

Hopkins said she will continue to work with the Japanese company.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis was also in attendance at the meeting and was asked to provide the board with an update about the Anchor Packaging situation.

Carloftis said a special meeting of the fiscal court had been called to discuss security issues, utility issues, etc. The details about the Anchor Packaging situation can be found in this week's article about the fiscal court's special called meeting.

Hopkins also addressed the board about updating or redesigning RCIDA's website. She said she had some former colleagues, who operate a site selection and website management firm, look over their website.

Hopkins said they designed a free proposal that recommended the RCIDA "start from scratch" with a new website. She said the website was designed years ago and that it's no longer user-friendly.

"I manage the website and it's pretty cumbersome. They are asking for \$19,500 to totally rebuild a website as well as provide hosting based on different needs," Hopkins said. "They also designed Paducah's website which cost around \$60,000 and you can tell the difference. They have won award after award for economic development."

RCIDA Chairman Corey Craig said when they created the website five years ago they created it in

a way for people to be able to divert off the homepage to individual subpages of RCIDA, Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, Rockcastle County Tourism, etc. However, he said the problem was a few months after the website was created it was no longer updated.

"It's important to have a person or group that manages a website. Someone who keeps it fresh and worthwhile," Craig said. "If you don't have someone doing those things then you just don't need to have a website at all. In today's world, it's better not to have a website at all than it is to have a web presence and it look stale."

Craig said smartphones are important too and that it is now important to have a mobile site. He said their current website was built before smartphones and that it isn't designed for them.

"Right now our website hurts us more than helps us," Craig said. "But I don't know if it needs to be totally started from scratch. It just needs to be prettied up and made fresh."

Hopkins said that the website has turned her into a 411 office. She said she receives phone calls all the time from people trying to contact the clerk's office, sheriff's office, etc.

"The way it's designed it doesn't read in a manner that lets you know which entity is which. I get calls about property taxes, registering to vote, etc.," Hopkins said. "It's a never-ending list of names and numbers. When people get tired of looking for something after seven pages they just call me because my number is on every page."

Craig agreed and said they need a plan to keep the website updated and determine what kind of message they are sending to the rest of the world. He said they

also need to contact the other Rockcastle County organizations before they make any decisions.

"Before we spend \$20,000 we need to have a plan on how we are going to keep the website updated. If we don't do that then we will be in the same predicament five years from now," Craig said. "If you design it for RCIDA then a lot of information would have to go away and those involved would have to be informed. I don't think it's good to give up the domain name."

The rest of the board agreed to look into updating or replacing their current website and designing a detailed plan.

In other business, Hopkins said that a lot of rumors have been spreading at SourceHOV in the Rockcastle Industrial Park South. She said SourceHOV recently merged with a bank and that U.S. Representative Hal Rogers is visiting the building soon with a group of people on a tour.

Hopkins went on to say that employees at SourceHOV have heard about these two things and started thinking something was going to happen to the contract or their jobs.

"None of those two things are affecting the contract. They had a merger with a bank which had nothing to do with the contract," Hopkins said. "Rogers is bringing a SOAR group to the facility and they are also touring five other places in southeastern Kentucky. It's just a tour and nothing else."

Hopkins is also currently working with Growing Warriors to write a federal grant for a piece of property on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon across from Richmond Street Eyecare. The property is the current site of the Farmer's Market.

The project will include a kitchen, education center and pavilion for the Farmer's Market.

tucky. The first barrier was the Cumberland Mountains, which were traversed by using the Cumberland Gap, the second barrier was another area of the Cumberland Mountains which was overcome by using the Cumberland Ford on the Cumberland River and the third was at an area called the Knobs which were passed through by using Boone Gap.

Boone purposely routed his trace between the ridges of two of the region's smaller mountains which became known as Boone Gap. The knobs are a horse-shoe shaped formation of

small mountains and several of them are cone-shaped.

The three natural obstacles on Boone Trace were recognized in the early 1900s with historical markers and highway overlooks. However, the Boone Gap site was abandoned in the early 1950s, when the new Hwy 25 was constructed. The new highway bypassed the Boone Gap site and it was abandoned.

The original Boone Gap historic site was built by the state in 1915 when the original Hwy 25 was constructed through Rockcastle County. The Boone Gap site had a small parking lot with an overlook and a stone wall in remembrance of the historic site.

Remnants of the stone wall can still be found at the Boone Gap site and it has an empty niche that is believed to have contained a plaque put there by the DAR. Boone Gap was one of 14 markers that was originally placed by the DAR in 1915 which followed Boone Trace from Cumberland Gap to Fort Boonesborough.

The Boone Gap historic site lies within the state's right-of-way of the original Hwy 25. The plan calls for a small pull-off site from the new Hwy 25 in order to provide a scenic overlook with

parking and walkways for viewing Boone Gap.


The plan also calls for landscaping, restoring the DAR stone wall, developing a maintenance and mowing plan, building a picnic area with tables, and placing signage explaining the historical significance of Boone Gap.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis has formed a local committee to aid with the restoration plan and Rockcastle DAR mem-

ber Debbie Brown was named chairman of the committee.


Carloftis said the project won't cost the county any money and that county workers will assist in the clean-up. He said Brown has already applied for Boone Gap history markers from the Kentucky Historical Society.

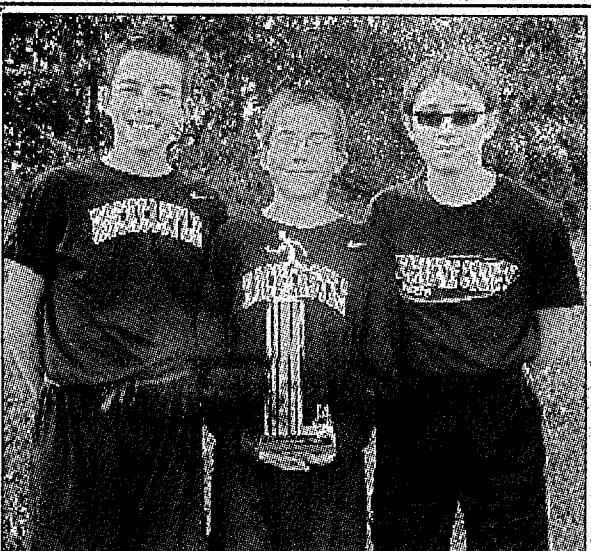

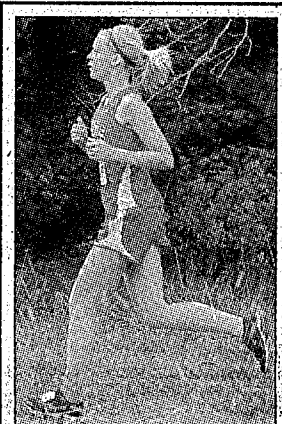

After obtaining her master's degree she moved to Dallas, Texas where she was Professor and Chairman of the Department of Medical Technology at the University of Texas Health Science Center and Parkland Hospital.

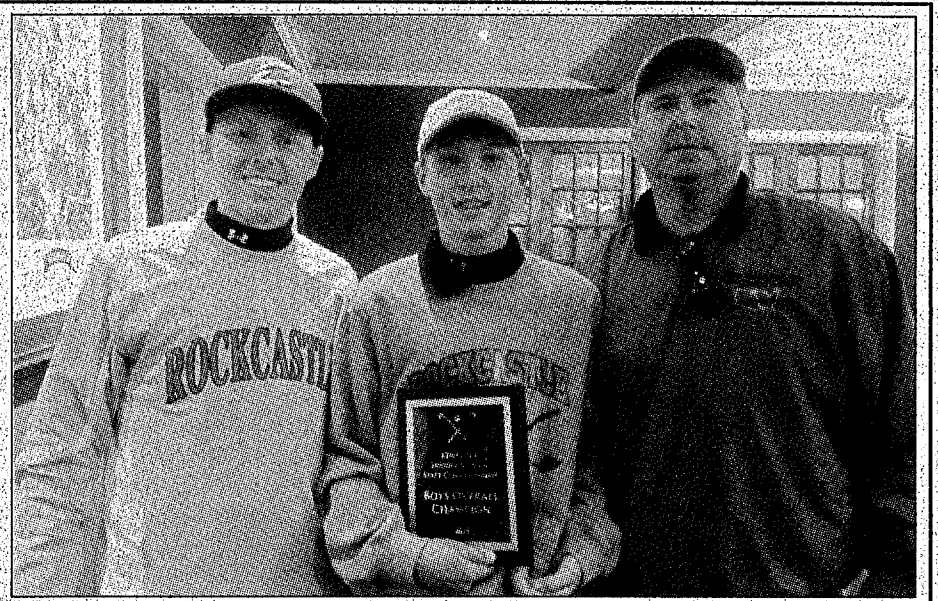
In 1981 she and her husband Bryan relocated to Chicago where Barbara accepted the position as Vice President of the American Society for Clinical Pathol-

ogy Board of Certification (ASCP). She held that position until 1999 when she and her husband moved to Rockcastle County. After returning to Rockcastle she was a substitute teacher in the county school system for 10 years.

In 2011 the ASCP established the annual Barbara M. Castleberry Lecture for Laboratory Professionals in recognition of her contributions to laboratory medicine and for her efforts in promoting and exemplifying the high qualities of a laboratory professional. The lecture is presented each year at the national ASCP annual meeting to recognize an individual whose career mirrors the achievements of Dr. Castleberry.

She was recently appointed to serve as a public member of the Pathology Residency Review Committee of the Accreditation Council on Graduate Medical Education of the American Medical Association.

Barbara and her husband, Bryan enjoy farming in the Climax area and fishing the Florida Keys.

Hidden Among Us

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

To celebrate and honor the county's American Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the

Daughters of the American Revolution, I have compiled highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years 1818 and 1842. All information was

taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. More information can be found on each patriot at the local library or the Rockcastle Historical Society. (Copyright pending). Thomas Owsley Virginia

Thomas Owsley was born in 1752 and died on 3 November 1825 in Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, Thomas gave the following account of his service on 26 June 1821 in Rockcastle Co. KY: He stated that he served as a regular soldier in the Revolutionary War in the Continental Line between two and three years and about two years as a minute man. He enlisted in the month of September 1776 in Loudoun County Virginia and served as a Sergeant in Captain Charles Morgan's Virginia Company and in Captain William Smith's Company, Colonel Daniel Morgan's "Eleventh" VA Regiment in the Brigade commanded by General Woodford. He marched from there to Philadelphia and from there to the White Plains (New York). He was in the battle of Germantown, in which engagement he was wounded and taken prisoner by the British. He was held prisoner for twelve months and was later exchanged. Thomas continued in service until the year 1783 at the end of the war at which time he was honorably discharged in Loudoun Co. VA.

Thomas was allowed a pension executed 25 November 1818 at the rate of eight dollars per month, at which time Thomas lived in Garrard County. In 1821, he was residing in Rockcastle Co. KY. He names his wife, Dianna and his four children still living with him at the time of his pension application as: Sally, Henry B., Nancy and Betsey. It is thought that Thomas and Dianna had more children, but they were married and living on their own. Their burial place is unknown.

The known children of Thomas and Dianna were: Sally Owsley (About 1799); Henry B. Owsley (about 1801); Nancy Owsley (1804) and Betsey Owsley (1805).

Thomas Owsley is a recognized Patriot of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Rabies vaccination clinic scheduled

The Rockcastle County Health Department along with Dr. James Chism, DVM are sponsoring a rabies vaccination clinic for dogs and cats. The clinic will be held (today) Thursday, October 16 at the Brodhead Fire Department from 5:00-6:00 pm. The cost will be \$7.00 per vaccination. All animals must be on a leash or other appropriate restraint. Dog and cat owners are encouraged to bring pets to have them vaccinated for the first time or to receive a booster vaccination. Booster shots are required every year or every 3 years depending on the vaccine that is used.

No animals sent to the state lab for testing from Rockcastle County have tested positive this year.

State law requires dogs, cats and ferrets at least four months of age to be vaccinated against rabies (902 KAR 2:070). Rabies is spread by wild animals, such as: skunks, foxes, raccoons and bats. Any mammal can get rabies including dogs, cats, horses, cows, and humans. Animals that are not mammals, such as birds, snakes and fish, do not get rabies.

Rabies is caused by a virus and is spread by contact with the saliva of an animal with the disease. Symptoms of rabies in animals may include a change in behavior, sickness, unable to eat and swallow, increased drooling or salivation, or aggression. Wild animals may appear to be tame or sick. Some rabid animals appear to be normal especially in the early stages of the disease. There is no cure or treatment for rabies. Usually death will occur within ten days of symptoms.

To prevent rabies, people should have their pets vaccinated and avoid contact with stray or wild animals. Stray cats and dogs may not have been vaccinated against rabies. Report stray animals to an Animal Control Official. In Rockcastle County, contact the Animal Shelter at 256-1833.

If an animal bites a person, wash the wound with soap and water for at least five minutes. Then seek medical assistance for additional treatment. Report the incident to the local Health Department. Officials from the Health Department will quarantine the animal for ten days or order the animal to be tested for rabies. If the animal that has bitten someone cannot be found, then the victim is referred to a medical doctor. The physician will determine if the victim should be treated to prevent rabies.

The first line of defense to prevent rabies is to have your pets vaccinated. If your dog or cat needs a rabies vaccination, bring your pet to the Rabies Clinic on October 16 at the Brodhead Fire Department. No appointment is needed. If you cannot attend the clinic, contact a veterinarian for an appointment to have your animal vaccinated.
