Bomb threat sent to RCHS on Monday

Tensions were running high at the Rockcastle County High School on Monday morning after a bomb threat was reported shortly after school was in session for the day.

According to Mt. Vernon Police reports, someone notified the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department around 8:30 a.m. on Monday after a suspicious text message was received about a bomb threat at the Rockcastle County High School.

Police immediately notified personnel at RCHS and the school board's central office about the bomb threat. All RCHS students and faculty were taken to the Rockcastle County Middle School gymnasium for their

safety.

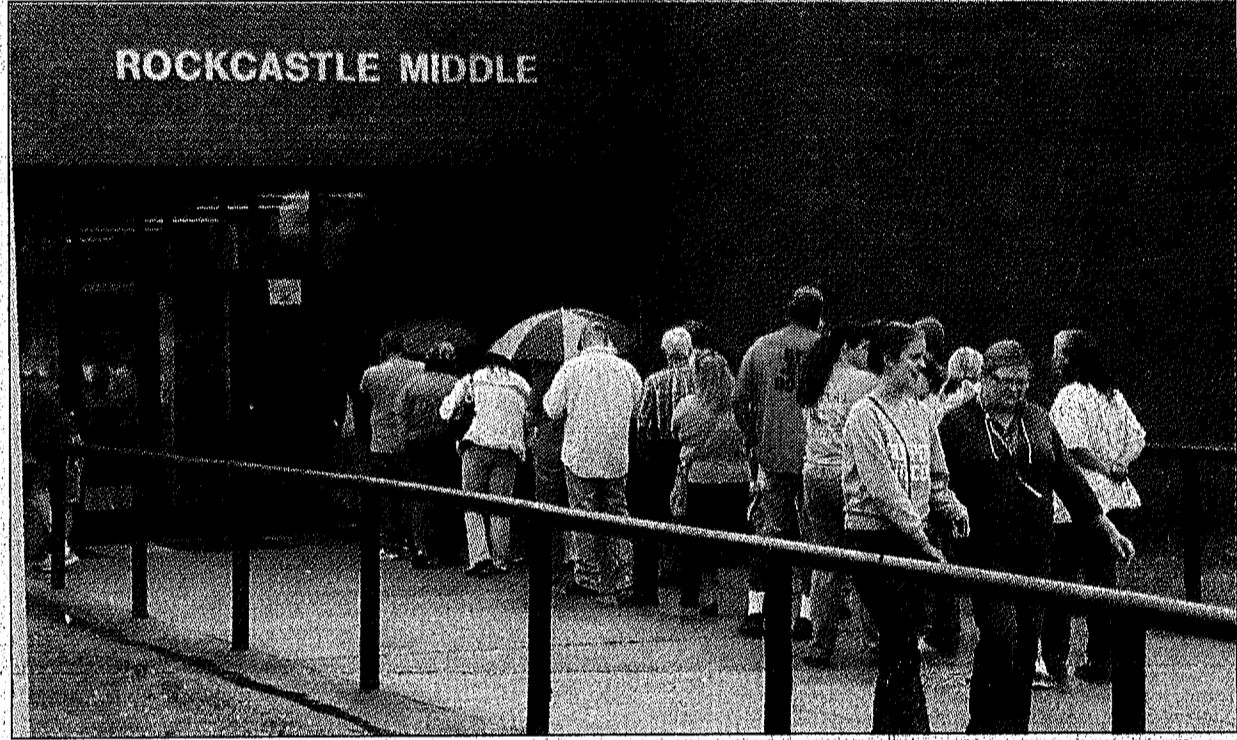
A Kentucky State Police bomb canine was brought to RCHS to search the building and nothing suspicious was found. RCHS students and faculty returned to the building around 1:30 p.m. and school was dismissed at the usual time.

The bomb threat remains under investigation by the Mt. Vernon Police Department and Chief Brian Carter is in charge of the investigation.

Carter said there were currently no suspects or persons of interest and that the origin of the text message and the incident is still under investigation.

Superintendent David Pensol said he was pleased

With LFCUG

Court enters into agreement for 911

Tuesday's agenda for the regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court was unusually light.

One of the main items of business was the approval of an agreement with the Lexington-Fayette County Urban Government to participate in a host system for dispatching 911 calls.

CSEPP Director Hal Holbrook told the court that several counties had entered into the agreement, which covers a five-year period.

The cost of \$70,000 is covered by a grant the county received from Commercial Mobile Radio Service (CMRS) and keeps the county from having to pay out \$250,000 for their own system.

Holbrook said that 911 currently has two trunk lines for each phone prefix in the county and one for each cell service provider. He told the court that the service provided by LFCUG would be as good or better. "Plus, in case of a disaster, other counties will be able to step in and dispatch our 911 calls for us," Holbrook said.

The court now has to pay LFCUG \$35,000 as a first

installment on the system and the remaining \$35,000 when the system is completely installed with reimbursement to the county coming from the CMRS grant.

Holbrook also presented the court with photos of the

Burdette resigns from school board

 Several items of business were discussed at the monthly school board meeting Tuesday night including the resignation of a school board member and the school district's facilities plan.

Superintendent David Pensol said Burdette has already turned his resignation in to Kentucky Education Commissioner Terry Holliday. Pensol said Burdette resigned as a result of a family member who wanted to apply for a position in the Rockcastle County School system.

"Being a school board member keeps your family from being able to work in the school system. Mike has a brother that wanted to apply for a bus driver position in our district," Pensol said. "His brother wanted to be a substitute driver and then possibly be hired as a bus driver. Mike knew he couldn't stay on the board if his brother was hired as a bus driver so he decided to resign."

Pensol said that he hated to see Burdette resign from the board but that he understood his reasons.

"I understand the position the board members are in and we understand why

that is but it still makes it hard on the board members," Pensol said. "Burdette was a good board member and he was much appreciated by the school district and our community."

Brodhead council passes readings of franchise agreement and ordinance

 It was a light agenda at the Monthly Brodhead Council meeting Monday night as the only two items of business consisted of readings for the Kentucky Utilities franchise agreement and the property tax ordinance.

Kentucky Utilities Area Retail Operations Manager Jackie Gumm Bennett attended the meeting for the second reading of the ordinance that allows Kentucky Utilities to continue to supply electricity to the city.

The current agreement between Kentucky Utilities and the city ends in December. Bennett said the franchise will be let for a twenty year period and that the city receives 3% of the gross sales in payment for the franchise.

The council unanimously passed the second reading of the agreement.

City Clerk Becky Bussell also held the first reading of the property ordinance which calls for the city to keep its current property tax rates of 24 cents per \$100 of assessment or \$2.40 per thousand.

The council approved the first reading of the property tax ordinance.

She said, "Honey, it looks to me like over two thirds of it is already gone."

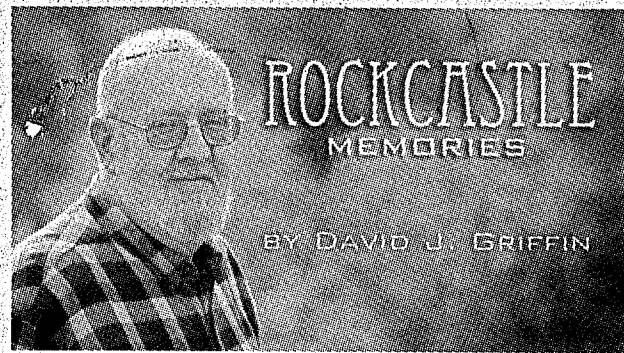

Recollections on Canning

Every year about this time I am reminded of my grandmother's (Mommie Katie) dedication to the restocking of our family cellar. Even after 50 years, I can still picture the small, dark, concrete room under the smokehouse at the back of the house. It had the delightful aroma of cedar when filled with potatoes, onions, and a wide variety of canned food. That little room sustained our entire family during the long winter months. We always had plenty of food on our table because of my grandparents' precise planning.

I suppose the longest wall inside the cellar was filled with a vast number of quarts of half-runner green beans. Everyone in our family loved Mommie Katie's canned green beans. They were the best I have ever tasted, even after all of these years. My memories linger of my mother (Bee) and Mommie Katie sitting in the swing of the front porch while breaking one bushel of beans after another. Occasionally, they even let me help.

As soon as the beans were ready, the two ladies moved their operation into the kitchen, where the beans were washed and made ready for the mass of Ball canning jars sitting on the kitchen table. I vaguely remember them canning 80 quart jars one summer when the beans were perfect.

The next largest stock of vegetables in the cellar was made up of a variety of canned tomatoes. Both of my grandparents loved tomato juice, so Mommie Katie always "worked her magic" with the fine tomatoes and made the best tomato juice you ever put in your mouth. She also canned many quarts of cut tomatoes that had been cut into pieces to use for cook-

ing. Both Bee and Mommie Katie prepared several dishes that required canned tomatoes. My favorite was Bee's vegetable soup, which she served with a "pone" of cornbread -- cooked, of course, in her 9" cast-iron skillet. (That skillet is still used every time that I attempt to make her wonderful cornbread.)

On our small, hilltop farm we raised a wide variety of fruit. There were several types of apple trees, pears, and a grape arbor. The cellar was a standing testament to our love of fruit. The wall opposite from the green beans housed a host of canned fruit, ranging from blackberries, grape juice and grape jam, apple jelly, pears, strawberry jam, and my favorite, apple butter. We raised each of these with the exception of the blackberries, which we either purchased or walked to the woods to find.

One other item that was found on the wall of Mommie Katie's cellar was a few pints of pickled beets. Mommie Katie, Pop, and Bee loved beets with their meals, but I could never tolerate the taste of them. My wife, Kathy, loves pickled beets, and we usually have a small jar in the refrigerator, but I am never tempted to even open the jar.

Once I asked Mommie Katie why we spent all this time canning so much stuff for our cellar, and she replied, "Because I love to cook for my family, and if it is home-canned, I know that it is made right, is fresh, and is made with love." That answer satisfied me. She was the best grandmother a boy could have, and I miss her still today.

Both Bee and Mommie Katie could prepare a delicious meal in just a few minutes using the stock of supplies from the cellar. A mul-

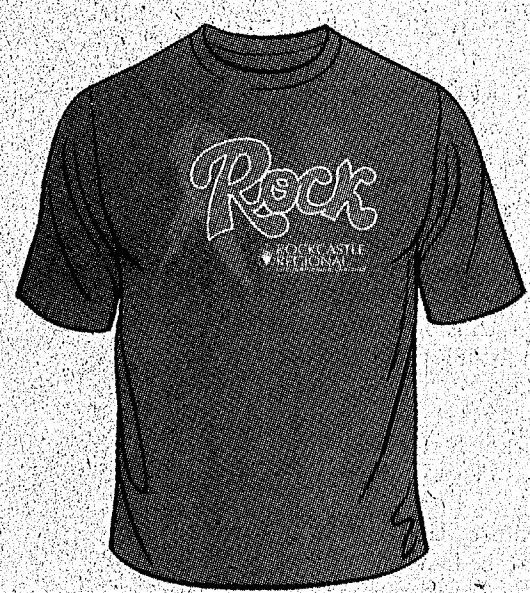

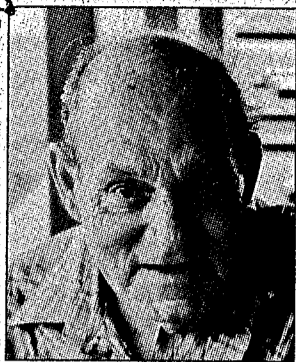

The family of Mr. Abrams will hold memorial services Saturday, October 18 at 10 a.m. at the Conway Missionary Baptist Church.

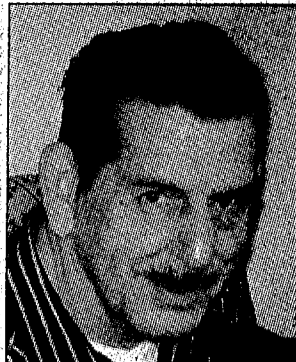

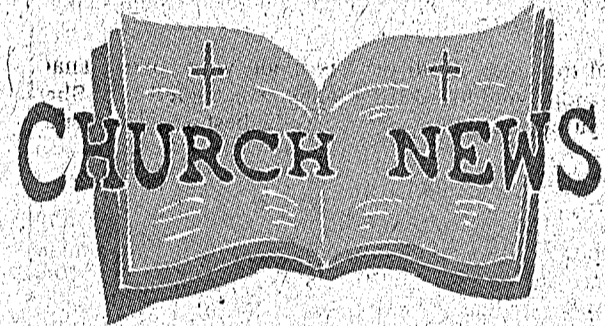

Drug testing kits...

Dear Editor
Rockcastle County designation to be the first county to receive drug-test-

ing kits for parents is both an honor and, unfortunately, a tell of the times in which we live.

First, the honor that we have a very strong UNITE coalition of clubs and volunteers led, chiefly, by John and Nancy Hale who have worked tirelessly to help the community understand the terrible consequences of drug abuse and addiction. Our thanks to them for their dedication to helping parents and children realize the grave dangers of these drugs that are used indiscriminately by so many unsuspecting people. I remember when Coroner Billy Dowell told me of the explosion in the numbers of deaths in Rockcastle County attributable to drug overdoses over the past ten years.

Second, the unfortunate commentary on our community and county attributable to the illegal use of prescription and street drugs. The misery affecting local families who suffer from such abuse is truly unfathomable - both in terms of financial stress and mental anguish. Unfortunately again, the user is not in a world of his or her own, but adversely affects the entire family and the community. To those of us who, blessedly, don't have such burdens within the family, we should remember and take note that their drug abuse does, indeed, affect all of us. Just ask me and the magistrates on the fiscal court who are required, by state law, to support a local jail. This past year alone the fiscal court had to transfer well over a half million dollars from our county's general fund account to the jail fund to help support its operations. Now, read carefully: When I asked the fiscal court years ago to expand the jail from 27 beds to 82 beds, our jail housed, on average, only 17 local inmates (for which we receive no state funding to support

them in the jail) and we had approximately 50 inmates from other parts of the state for which we receive approximately \$32 per person per day to support the local jail. This kept the fiscal court from using your local tax money from maintaining, to a big degree, the jail.

Today, due mainly to the explosion and convictions of drug use, those local inmate numbers have increased from the average of about 17 to around 45, which lowers the number of state (paying) inmates we can house.

The one thing the fiscal court has absolutely no control over is the expense of our inmates. Only in Kentucky and Louisiana are the local governing bodies absolutely required to maintain, house, and provide medical care for local inmates with local tax dollars. But our fiscal court has been pro-active in trying to provide help to such inmates, having hired a full-time social worker liaison to work closely with the family, circuit and district courts to get treatment for those suffering from addictions. This, in turn, should help save your local tax dollars in the future - and present.

And it is working.

Let Me Tell You About My Surgery

Dear Journal,

Several days ago, back on July 21st, I suddenly began experiencing what I supposed to be a stroke on my left side. My left hand, arm, and face suddenly were numb and had a tingling sensation. My left arm and hand grew weak. My vision grew dim and I felt really bad. It was about 1:15, just after lunch, so I called Stanley to come home to take me to see Dr. Arvin who suspected a stroke as well, and sent me to the local hospital for tests. A little after 5 PM that afternoon, he called me with the news. "The tests revealed that you have a brain tumor on the right side about two centimeters in size."

Stanley was out walking the dogs, so I stood here in the quiet, alone, letting the gravity of the situation sink in. This is something that always happens to someone else, but not you or anyone close, right? No, not in my case. It is real and now, how are you going to handle it? Well, you aren't going to panic, but work through it daily, rely on faith and see what the doctors want to do. I told Stanley the news and he was surprised, as well.

The doctors suggested surgery, but that was a rather scary option but I came to accept the idea and gradually came to a peace with it. This was in part to a dream that I had. I dreamed that I was at a church service and taking notes and jotting down scripture. The last scripture I noted was Colossians 3:3-4: "For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory."

After several tests to see if I could tolerate the brain surgery, I passed, even with an aortic abnormality. The day of the surgery came, and I was to be at UK at 7:30 a.m. My surgeon was Dr. Thomas Pittman, a professor of neurology, and reported to be about the best neurosurgeon in the state.

The waiting and the pre-op nerves were extended due to an emergency surgery Dr. Pittman was performing on a baby. The baby's family was on hand with bottles, blankets, and stuffed animals. We gathered the sur-

titude of my good friends were always eager to have a meal at our house because they knew they would be served a scrumptious meal (with as many extra servings as wanted). I believe that they, too, could tell that it was all "made with love."

gery went well. I quietly wondered what had prompted an emergency brain surgery at this hour on a baby. Was it an accident or abuse? I'll never know for sure.

All of the pre-op poking, gouging, and questions came and went and I was on the way to the operating room for the anticipated surgery. The surgery went well with no problems other than my heart rate and blood

pressure dropping lower than they liked. Then I was off to the recovery room for four hours. While waiting, I was in pain and trying to gain focus. I was getting hungry, and finally got to eat. I expected Jell-O, broth, and clear juice, but I got a nice roast, steamed broccoli, and whipped sweet potatoes and a dessert.

There was a young 20-30 year old man in the cubicle next to mine who had been in a motorcycle accident. He was in quite a bit of pain and already had had several shots of morphine with little relief. I was lying there with my skull sliced about seven inches and in pain, too, with nothing but some Tylenol

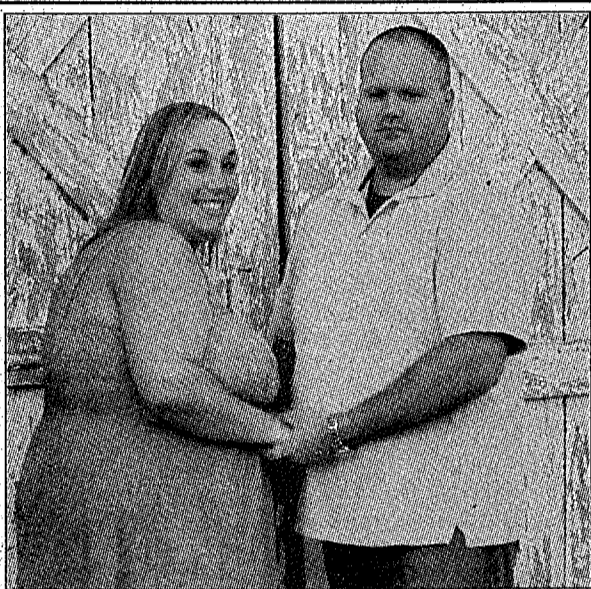

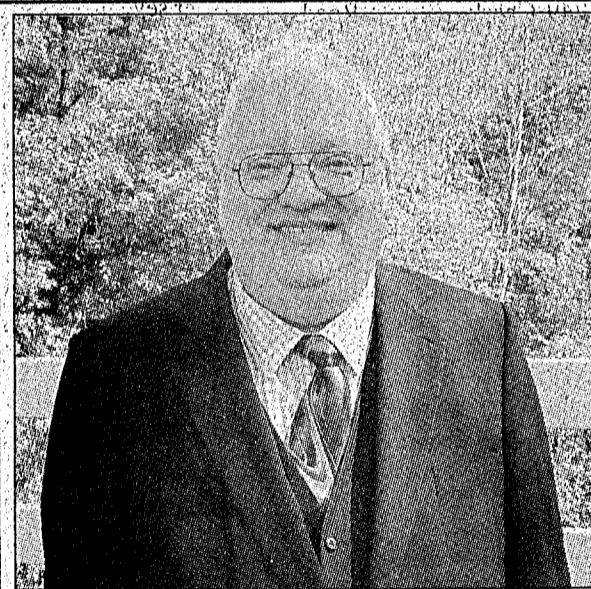

Four people arrested for manufacturing

Four people were recently arrested for manufacturing methamphetamine in two separate meth busts.

In the first incident, two people were arrested for the offense last Thursday after police raided a home on Dogwood Lane in Orlando.

Arrested at the scene were Bobby Joe Hensley, 32, of Orlando and Ronald Lee Durham, 20, of Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, State Troopers Adam Hensley and Brian Maupin responded after receiving a complaint of a possible meth lab at Hensley's residence.

Once officers arrived, they noticed a trail near the residence leading into the woods near the residence and several items lying on the ground that are commonly used to manufacture meth.

After following the trail, Hensley noticed the officers and started to run up a hillside in the woods. Officers told Hensley to stop several times and pursued him.

During the pursuit, officers came upon Durham laying against a log near the trail. Officers apprehended Durham, then they caught up with Hensley moments later and apprehended him as well.

Upon further investigation, officers found a mason jar containing meth oil, a HCL gas generator in a 20 ounce bottle, a one-step meth lab in a 20 ounce bottle, Coleman fuel, lithium batteries, rubber tubing and four containers of drain cleaners.

Durham told officers that he was not "cooking" meth and that he was only there to sell Hensley a pair of shoes.

Hensley and Durham were both charged with manufacturing methamphetamine, unlawful possession of a meth precursor and tampering with physical evidence. Hensley was also separately charged with two counts of fleeing or evading police and drug paraphernalia.

Both men remain lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Hensley's bond was set at \$25,000 cash/property and Durham remains lodged on a \$10,000 cash/property bond.

In the second incident, two people were arrested for manufacturing meth last Friday after police raided a home on Copper Creek Road in Brodhead.

Arrested at the scene were Anthony Gabriel Martin, 35, of Crab Orchard and Branden Dee Saylor, 33, of Brodhead. State Troopers Adam Hensley and Brian Maupin responded after receiving a complaint that Martin and Saylor were manufacturing meth at Martin's residence.

Once officers arrived, they noticed Martin through a bedroom window trying to hide something in a jacket. Martin gave consent for the officers to search the residence and said there was no meth lab inside his home.

After searching the residence, officers found Saylor inside the living room and they also found a pop bottle containing several items consistent with a one-step meth lab inside a jacket in a bedroom at the home.

Officers also found coffee filters on Martin at the time of his arrest. Martin told officers that the one-step meth lab belonged to him.

Martin and Saylor were both arrested for manufacturing methamphetamine. Martin was also separately arrested for drug paraphernalia and tampering with physical evidence.

Both men remain lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center, Martin on a \$30,000 cash/property bond and Saylor on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.

Medley said that the Division of Water is helping the city look for ways to replace the whole thing. "We only have 190 water customers and there is not enough revenue to finance the project," Medley said adding that it would take \$25,000-\$30,000 or more in equipment just to bring the system up to snuff. He added that he had been talking to everyone - Cumberland Valley Area Development District, Rural Water Assn. and the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority to find funding for the project. Medley will meet with the KIA on October 27th to go over funding possibilities, he said.

Even though part of the problem is that the system was neglected for years, "there is nothing to worry about what is going into the river," the mayor said.

The commissioners also discussed the upcoming "Trunks of Treats" scheduled for Friday night, October 31st in the Green Acres Feed Store's parking lot on Main Street. There will also be a Haunted Hay Ride the same night.

Medley told the commissioners that he hopes the city's fitness center can be opened sometime in October. "We had to come up with consistent staffing and Chris Bengel will be managing the facility," Medley said that plans are for the center to be open 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. City Clerk Trish Doan will oversee the center from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. weekdays and a community-based service volunteer has been secured (at no cost to the city) to work from 2 to 9 p.m. On weekends, local volunteers will be used to staff the center.

Membership fees will be \$15 per month.

Joe Grider, an engineer with the design firm for the sidewalk project, told the commissioners that the state has given their approval of the project and the plans are now in federal hands for approval, after which funds for the project will be allocated. Grider said he hoped to advertise for bids soon.

Medley said he would prefer that the project not begin until early Spring and Grider concurred saying that it would be December before everything was ready for construction to begin.

Grider also presented the commissioners with color charts for the light poles, benches and trash cans.

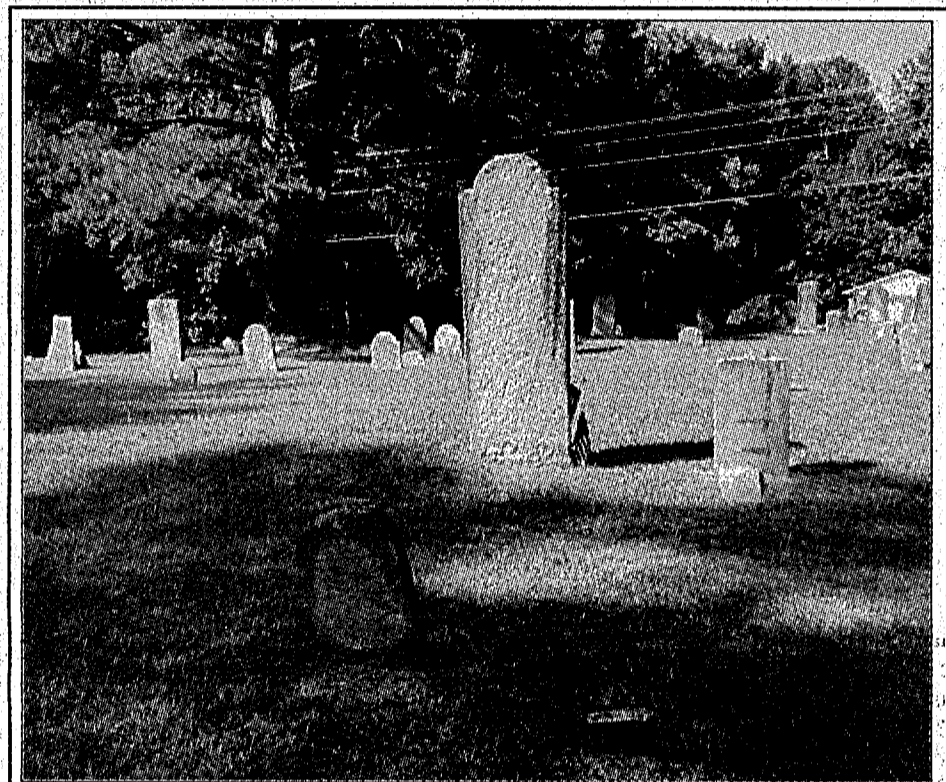
Medley recommended to the commissioners that the trash cans be deleted from the project and more benches added. "We have people using the trash cans for their personal garbage and it becomes unsightly," the mayor said. The commissioners agreed.

Medley also said he would like to see a town clock added to the plans and the commissioners agreed.

During the meeting, Medley also told the commissioners that the owner of Green Acres Feed Store had received approval to install aboveground gas pumps for both unleaded and diesel. He said the pumps should be installed by Spring.

Academy and Adult Education Center included an entrance canopy for \$8,250, ramp access with steps for \$13,750, new entrance parking lot for \$82,379 and repaving the middle school driveways and parking lot for \$205,016.

“Middle school parking lot is in poor condition and needs to be repaved,” Pensol said. “A parking lot is also needed at the entrance of the Adult Education Center.”

At Rounstone Elementary School, the proposed improvements included kitchen renovation for \$495,000, kitchen equipment for \$137,500, cafeteria modifications for \$56,250 and library addition for \$702,000.

The plan also included restorations at the Athletic fieldhouse and restroom facilities at the football field at the middle school. Those proposed renovations were a home fieldhouse renovation for \$161,875, home fieldhouse addition for \$296,400, visitor locker room renovation for \$84,263 and visitor locker room addition for \$91,260.

“We are not promoting to not build or repair schools so we can build sports buildings,” Pensol said. “But our fieldhouses at the football field are falling down. We will either have to knock them down and build new ones or remodel.”

The final proposed facility renovations was at the high school which included a new roof for \$1,210,163, new insulation for \$1,000,000 and HVAC controls for \$525,000.

Pensol said the details of each plan will be available in the near future and that they obviously need to prioritize the list to which facility renovations are most needed. He said he is asking the board to authorize an architecture team for the facility plan.

“We know for sure that we will have to start addressing some of these issues. In order to start in the spring we need approval for the superintendent to authorize an architecture design team,” Pensol said. “We will come to the meeting next month with architecture recommendations and proposals of which projects need to be first on the list.”

The council unanimously approved authorization for the superintendent to begin the procurement for facility needs in the school district.

In final business, the school board also approved the purchase of three 66 passenger school buses and two 34 passenger school buses for \$467,000.

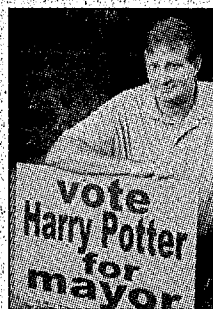

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Rockets move to 5-2 on season with win over Russell, 40-13

The Rockcastle County Rockets football team are now 5-2 on the season and 1-0 in the district after they opened up district play in big fashion last Friday night beating the Russell County Lakers 40-13.

The Rockets offense produced 475 yards on offense from 417 yards rushing and 58 yards passing. The Rocket defense held the Lakers offense to a measly 115 total yards with only 94 rushing yards and 21 passing yards.

The Rockets scored first on a 19 yard touchdown run by freshman tailback Brent Lovell. The extra point attempt was no good giving the Rockets the early 6-0 lead.

In the second quarter,

sophomore running back Devon Robinson punched the ball in from the one yard line. Lovell ran the ball into the end zone for a two point conversion giving the Rockets a 14-0 lead at the half.

After halftime, Lovell scored again on a 9 yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was no good and the Rockets lead was 20-0.

The Rockets scored again on their next offensive drive when senior fullback Chance Ansardi took the ball into the end zone on a one yard touchdown run. The two point conversion was no good making the score 26-0.

The Lakers would finally make it on the scoreboard in the third quarter when senior running back Jordan Ratliff

scored on a four yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was good, cutting the Rockets lead to 26-7.

The Rockets scored again late in the third quarter when freshman fullback Holdan Barnett broke free for a 25 yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was good extending the Rockets lead to 33-7.

The Rockets put the game away in the fourth quarter when junior running back Dylan Rowe ran the ball in the end zone on a 15' yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was good making the score 40-7.

The Lakers tried to save face late in the fourth quarter when Ratliff scored again on a 12 yard touchdown run. The extra point

attempt was no good for the final score 40-13.

The Rockets were led on offense by Lovell with 18 carries for 114 yards and two touchdowns. Robinson also had a big night offensively, with seven carries for 118 yards and one touchdown.

Sophomore quarterback Dakota Bishop was 2 of 5 passing for 58 yards. Bishop also had six carries for 34 yards.

Sophomore tight end Isaiah Mercer led the receiving corps with one catch for 31 yards. Senior wide receiver Kyle Denny also had one catch for 27 yards.

The Rocket defense was led by sophomore defensive end Lucas Jones with six tackles and two sacks. Mercer also had a big night on defense with two tackles, a fumble recovery and a sack assist.

Other Rockets with tackles and sacks were Robinson with seven tackles and an sack assist, sophomore defensive lineman Logan Coffey with 5 tackles and one sack, sophomore defensive back Isaac McClure had three tackles, Ansardi had two tackles and a sack assist, senior defensive back Tyler Langford had two tackles and senior defensive lineman Hunter Hines had one tackle and one sack. Barnett, Denny, Lovell, sophomore defensive back Tommy Benge, senior defensive lineman Levi Coffey, sophomore defensive lineman Austin Saylor and sophomore defensive back Michael Tomlinson were all credited with one tackle each.

Parkey said the quarterback position and offensive line also had a great game last Thursday.

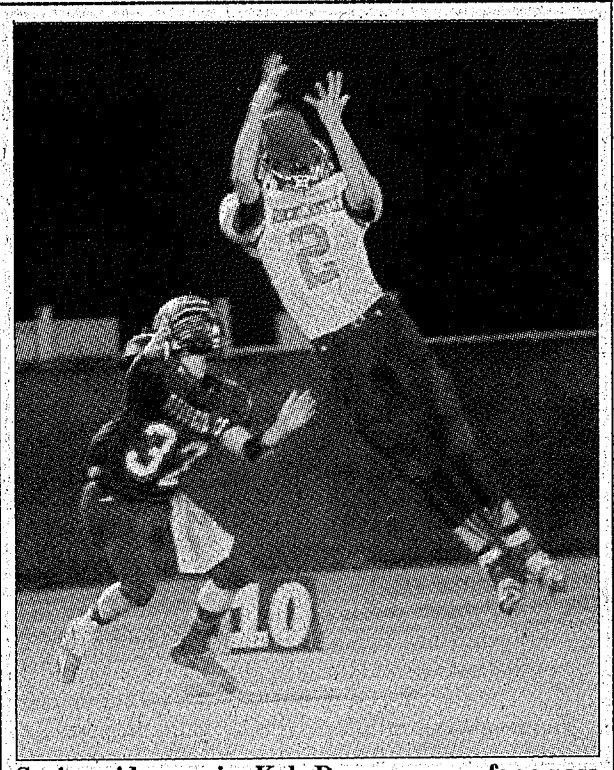

Parkey went on to say the defense also did an outstanding job pressuring the quarterback and holding the Lakers running game in check.

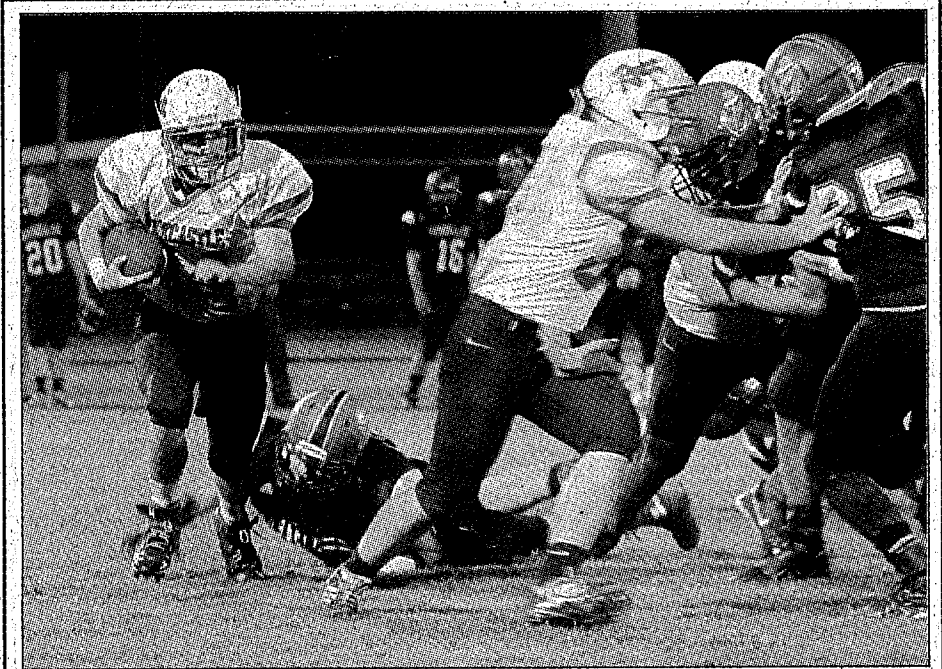

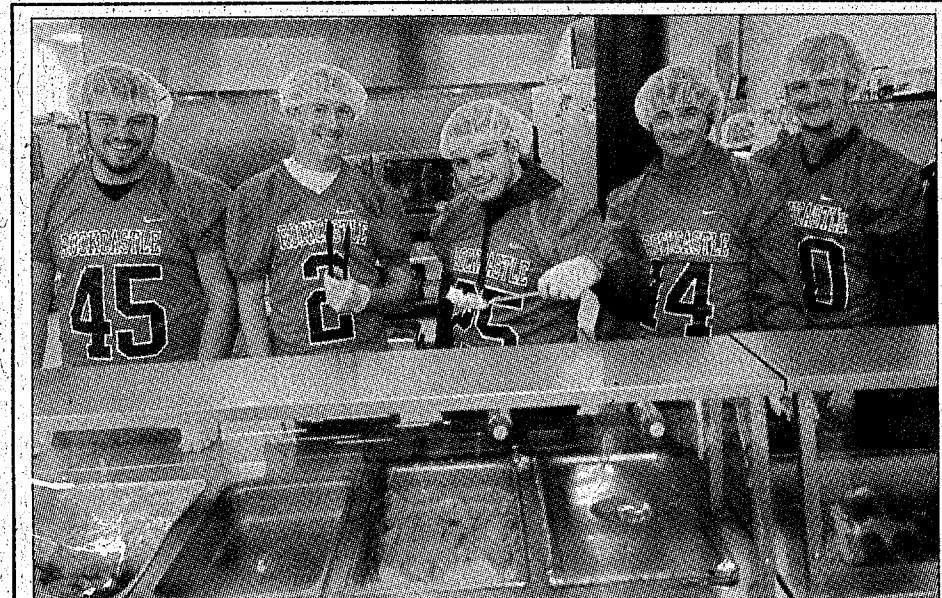
Freshman fullback Holdan Barnett gets a block for sophomore running back Devon Robinson during last Friday night's 40-13 win against Russell County.

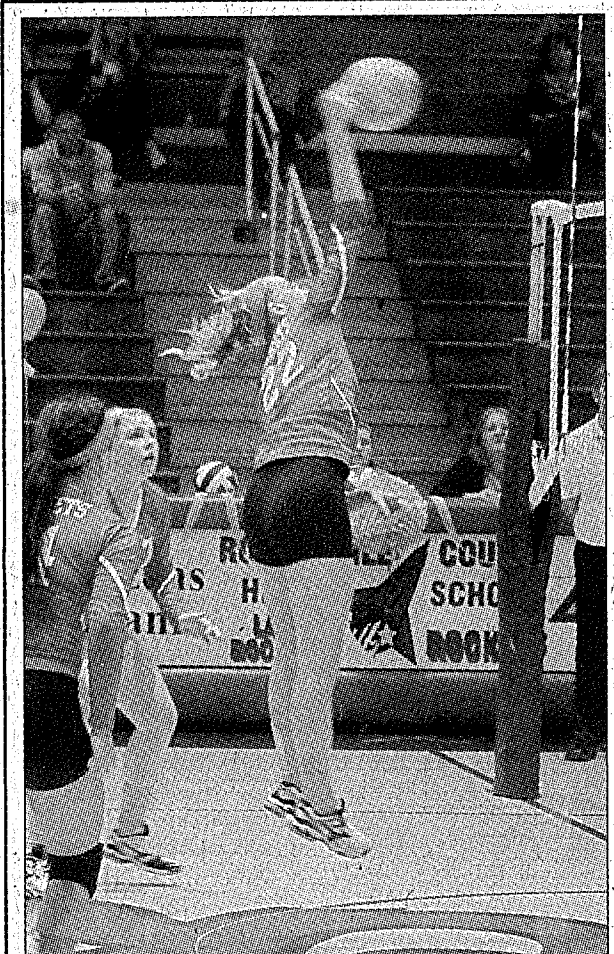

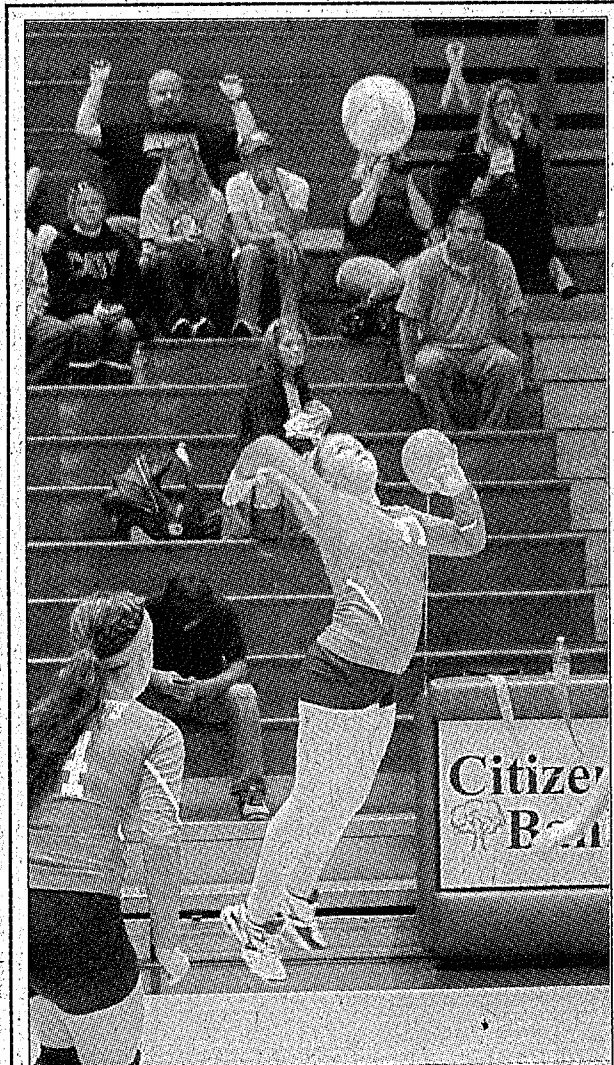

Chelsea Barnett serves during the JayVee game against Boyle County last Thursday night. The JayVee Rockets won 2-0.



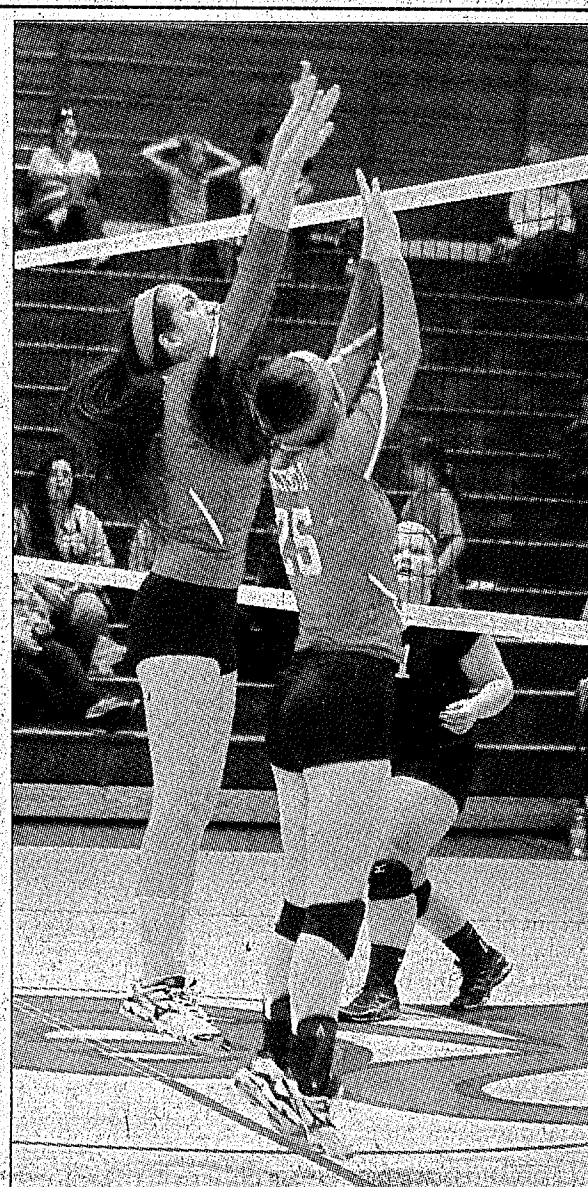

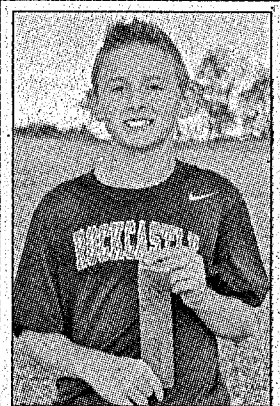

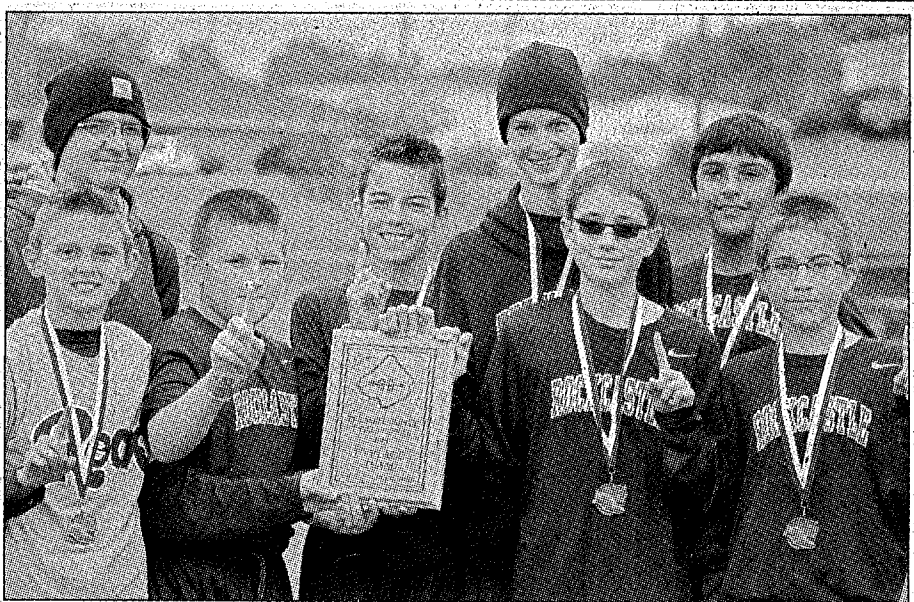

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A homemade bomb was brought to the Mt. Vernon Police Department Wednesday afternoon. with the way the RCHS faculty and staff handled the situation. Pensol said he made the decision to take the students to the middle school because of the weather.

"The high school staff evacuated the building with no problems and implemented the safety plan as they were trained to do. They did an excellent job monitoring and supervising students continuing to provide a controlled and caring environment," Pensol said. "It was starting to rain so I made the decision to take them to the middle school. I'm aware a lot of people didn't like that decision but I didn't way them to stand out in the rain for a long period of time."

Pensol said the high school students were taken to the RCMS gym after the evacuation. He said the high school students were given lunch in the RCMS cafeteria while the middle school students were given lunch in their classrooms.

"I was really amazed and proud at how well our high school and middle school lunchroom staff worked together to handle the situation without notice," Pensol said. "They

worked together and fed approximately 1,600 students in a short amount of time. It was amazing how they handled everything."

Pensol went on to say that the delay in returning to the high school was waiting on the arrival of the

KSP bomb canine. He said their main concern was safety and that they wanted to make sure the building was deemed safe before anyone returned.

"Our main concern throughout the entire situation was the safety of our

students," Pensol said. "I'm so proud of the conduct of our students and the manner in which they conducted themselves throughout the entire day. Our safety plan was executed without any problems."

Rockcastle part of pilot program

Federal program provides free drug test kits to parents

A federal program will provide Rockcastle County parents with free drug testing kits for the 2014-2015 school year.

The Appalachia High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas is providing free drug test kits to parents in Rockcastle County as a part of their pilot program "Give Me A Reason." Appalachian HIDTA recently asked UNITE to help market the availability of their drug test kits throughout Rockcastle County.

The free drug test kits are a SalivaScan test that usually cost around \$40. The drug test is a non-in-

vasive swab of the mouth which can then be compared on a color bar chart, included in the kit, to determine if it is positive or negative for certain substances.

The kit will test for a variety of drugs including amphetamines, ecstasy, Xanax, valium, roofies, cocaine, marijuana, methadone, methamphetamine, codeine, heroin, morphine, oxycodone, hydrocodone, phencyclidine (PCP) and barbiturates.

No personal data will be collected on the number of drug kits administered by parents and all drug tests will be admin-

istered at the student's home.

If a child tests positive for drug use, parents or caregivers are asked to contact their family doctor, family resource and youth service center, local hospital, local health department or other local professional to determine the next course of action to take.

The launching of the "Give Me A Reason" program was officially announced by U.S. Representative Hal Rogers at a live press conference on Tuesday morning to the student body at the Rockcastle County High School.

Rogers said the drug test kits are a way for parents to hold their children accountable to not misuse drugs. He also said the goal of the "Give Me A Reason" program was to help children make positive life choices when faced with peer pressure to use drugs.

"This program gives you every possible means to help you succeed in life. In order to succeed in life you have to stay off drugs. Almost every one of you will likely be offered drugs by a so-called friend and this will help your parents know you aren't using drugs," Rogers said. "This is not a matter of a trust issue between you and your parents. This is a way to help you and not punish you."

Space2Create to hold grand opening Oct. 23

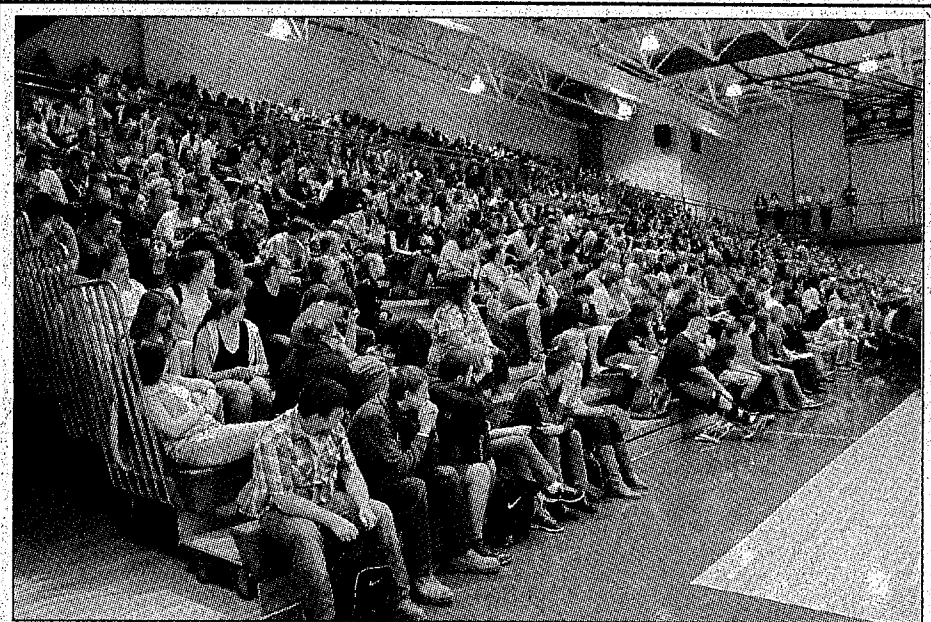

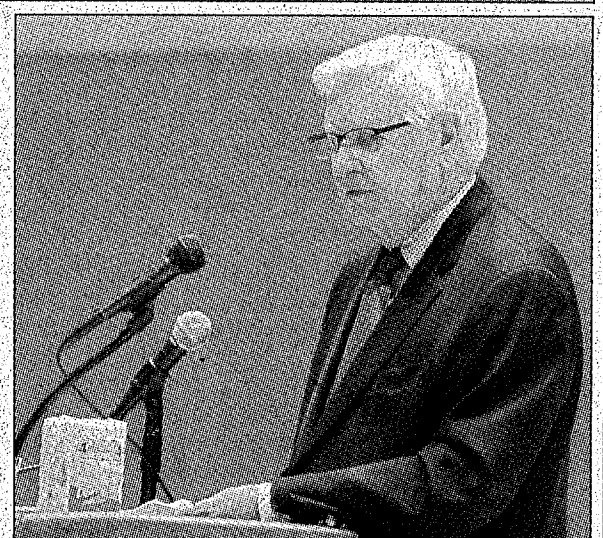

Last school year there

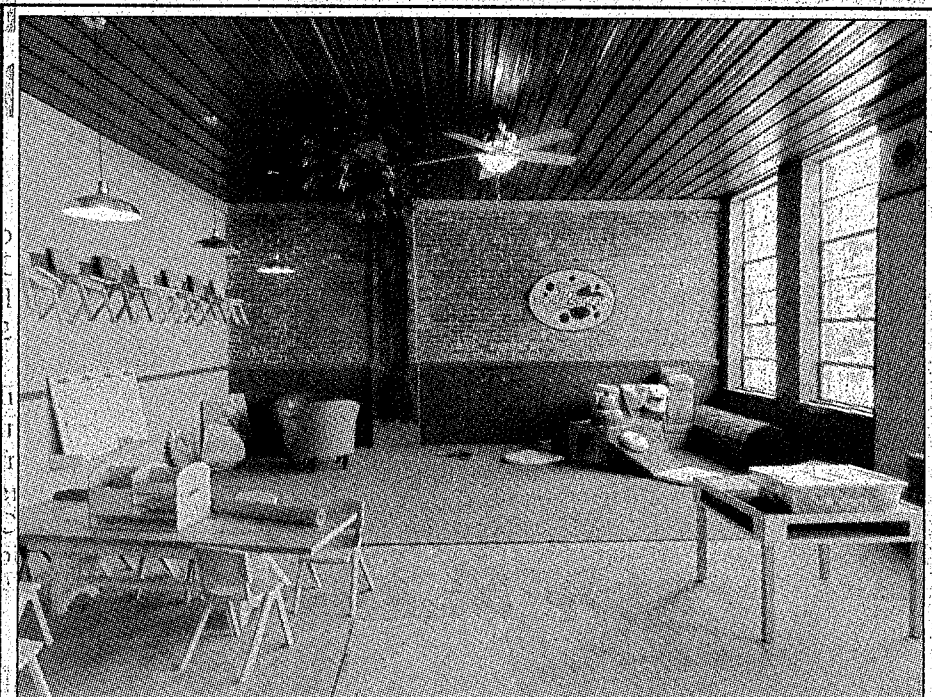
were 105 registered UNITE Clubs in 26 counties with a total of 8,639 student members - the second highest number of students since clubs were first established during the 2005-06 school year.

Insect home invaders

Dropping temperatures force insects to start seeking shelter, which means Kentucky homeowners are already getting some unwanted visitors.

While it's only the first part of October, entomologists with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, Food and Environment are receiving complaints about brown marmorated stink bugs inside and outside homes across Kentucky, said Ric Bessin, UK extension entomologist.

The native of Asia is a major nuisance along the East Coast since it was first found in packing material in Allentown, Pennsylvania, in 1998. The stink bug was first found in October 2010 in Kentucky and is now in more than 40 Kentucky counties including Rockcastle being found in 2013.

Once inside homes, the stink bug releases an odor that smells like cilantro as a defensive mechanism.

The best thing homeowners can do to prevent stink bug problems is to pest proof their resi-

ences. This includes sealing off openings into the buildings where wires and pipes come in and any cracks or tears in window or door screens.

Homeowners may also want to spray an insecticide around the exterior perimeter of their home. Those wanting more information about how to pest proof their home can refer to UK Entomology's ENTFACT 641, which can be found online at <http://www.ca.uky.edu/entomology/entfacts/entfactpdf/ef641.pdf>.

Homeowners who find stink bugs in their residences should vacuum them rather than sweep or crush them. Sweeping or crushing them may cause them to emit an odor or leave a stain. Placing a knee high in the vacuum hose will make collection and disposal much easier.

Hidden Among Us

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

To celebrate and honor the county's American Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I have compiled highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years 1818 and 1842. All information was taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. *Eli Peterson
Virginia*

Eli Peterson was born in 1760 in Pennsylvania about twenty five miles from Philadelphia and died after 1842 in Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, Eli gave the following account of his service on 24 August 1835 in Rockcastle Co. KY: In the spring of 1780, he was drafted as a private for three months to go out after the Indians. They rendezvoused at one Pepperson New River and marched down the river to Paris' Fort. He was marched to the fort by a man named Davies, Ensign of the militia and was stationed at the fort about a month. He was then ordered by Colonel Parris to march. Davies took command of the group as Captain and marched to the head of the Sandy River and scoured the country there and on to Guy, Wolf Creek and Pine Creek and then back to New River below Culberson's bottom and up the river again to the fort. He was stationed there until his tour was out and fifteen days over and he was discharged by Colonel Parson.

In the fall of the same year, he was called out again and marched and served this tour under Captain Burns. They rendezvoused at New London on the New River and marched up the road to-

wards Wythe Co., but turned into North Carolina and scoured the country about the Yadkin River until the two months were up. During this tour, they were engaged with Banastre Tarleton's horse and foot soldiers. They had to run through the Yadkin River and find their way back. After this, his group was discharged having been in actual service not less than two months.

In the latter part of the following winter, he was drafted for three months and rendezvoused at the house of Captain English, who went out with them as their Captain. Eliserved under Lieutenant Wall and Colonel Cloyd. He marched to Surry Co. North Carolina and scoured the county and then onto Smith's and Davidson's after the British and Tories. He was never stationed at a place but a day or two until the three months were out and was discharged on the Charleston road by his Colonel having been in actual service for three months.

In the summer of the same year, Eli was drafted again for three months service. He rendezvoused at Stoney Battery with Captain English and Colonel Cloyd. They marched through Surry Co. NC again and traveled over much of the same country in defense of the frontiers. During this tour, his group surprised and captured seven or eight British at a still house and sent them with a guard to General Nathaniel Greene. They scouted on the waters of Davis and Smith and through Surry Co. until the tour was over. Eli was discharged by Colonel Cloyd at a tavern house on the Charleston Road having been in actual service not less than three months.

In September of 1781 just before Cornwallis was taken (19 October 1781), Eli was again drafted for three months to guard the lead mines on the New River and went out under Captain Jenkins and was stationed there as a guard but was discharged by his Captain after having served about six weeks.

Eli was born about twenty five miles from Philadelphia, PA from there

he moved to Montgomery Co. VA, where he lived when he entered the service. He remained there until the end of the war. Then he moved to Kentucky where he was living at the time of his application. Originally,

The cost of home heating is a problem for many low-income Kentuckians.

Your Community Action Agency, **Daniel Boone Community Action Agency**, may be able to help. If you live in Rockcastle County, you may apply at the Daniel Boone Community Action Agency located at 105 Main St., Mt. Vernon, Ky. for the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). Applications will be taken by the last name of the head of the household from November 3 through December 11, 2014. See the list below for your assigned day.

You will need to bring with you **(1) Social Security cards for everyone living in the household; (2) proof of your household's income for the preceding month. You must present award letters, NO copies of checks etc.; documentation from the local DCBS office will not be accepted, with the exception of zero income households receiving food stamps and KTAP; (3) Your most recent heating bills or verification from your landlord that the heating expenses are included in your rent. All customers that apply for assistance must present an electric bill at the time of application. If electric bills are in someone else's name other than the applicant, documentation will be required from the person whose name is on the utility bill.** Dwellings that are not connected to a meter ARE NOT eligible for assistance. All eligible households that apply will receive assistance. Gross monthly income must be within the guidelines listed below, and with limited liquid resources. Households not receiving food stamps with no income will be required to fill out a self-declaration form prior to sign up date. DBCAA will assure that persons who are working or commuting during the agencies typical business hours 8:00 - 4:30, may apply for LIHEAP. Call 606-256-5315 for more information. JROTC competes at ECU

The Rockcastle County Raider Team traveled to Richmond on September 27th to compete in the 10th Annual ECU Cadet Stakes. Out of 41 schools, Rockcastle County had both Varsity and Junior Varsity Raider Teams in attendance. Each team competed in six events over the course of the day.

The first event was the Modified Army Physical Fitness Test. Ten members of each team have to perform the maximum number of push-ups and sit-ups in one minute. Then, each cadet completed a cross country timed one mile run.

The next event of the day was the one rope bridge. A ten person team had to construct a one rope bridge across a muddy ditch, and then, each member with given equipment had to cross the one rope bridge, trying to get the fastest time as possible without any penalties.

The third event of the ECU Cadet Stakes was the boat operations. In this event, each team of ten cadets had to navigate a metal raft in a pond around an obstacle and return to the starting point by pulling the boat out of the water up a steep embankment and crossing the finish line.

After the boat operations segment of the competition, the cadets had to navigate a Cross Country Rescue Course. There were three segments for this event. For the first segment, cadets had to buddy up and carry each other in a fireman's carry approximately 100 meters. During the second segment of the course, the team had to wade across a pond to get to the final segment of the course. In the final segment, the cadets had to carry a field litter with a dummy on it and cross the finish line.

The second to last event of the day was the Mystery Event. Cadets do not know the given tasks they must perform until arriving at the given site for this event. Team members had to fill up

a water jug only using cups and running to the given jug and dumping the water in it. There was a ping pong ball in the bottom of the jug and the task was to get the water level up until the ping pong ball could float freely. Then, cadets took pieces of PVC pipe and transferred the ping pong ball without dropping it onto the ground to a designated "injured" team mate. After that, one member was tasked to carry the "wounded" team mate to a

waiting field litter. Upon arriving at the field litter, all but one cadets were blindfolded. The blindfolded cadets could not speak and the team had to navigate a simulated mine field. The one cadet who was not blindfolded guided the team through the given obstacle. Then, all cadets took their blindfolds off and had to carry a section of a telephone pole about 100 meters

Eli was rejected for a pension, but was later allowed his pension for a six month service. He was allowed a pension at a rate of twenty dollars annually executed on 4 March 1831. Eli and his wife are in the 1840 Census in Rockcastle Co. KY and the Eli received a pension up until September of 1846. It is assumed that he died sometime between September 1846 and March 1847.

Eli Peterson married Mary Tornes on 6 June 1785 in Montgomery Co. VA. He does not mention any children in his pension application, but the Daughters of the American Revolution have established at least one child as a descendant of Eli and Mary and that would be Eli Peterson Jr.

Eli Peterson is a recognized patriot of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

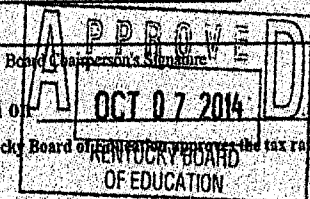

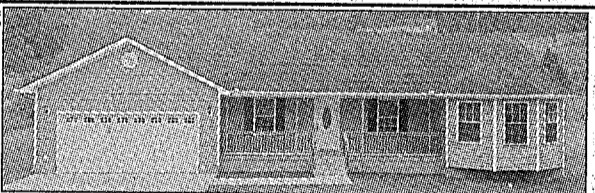

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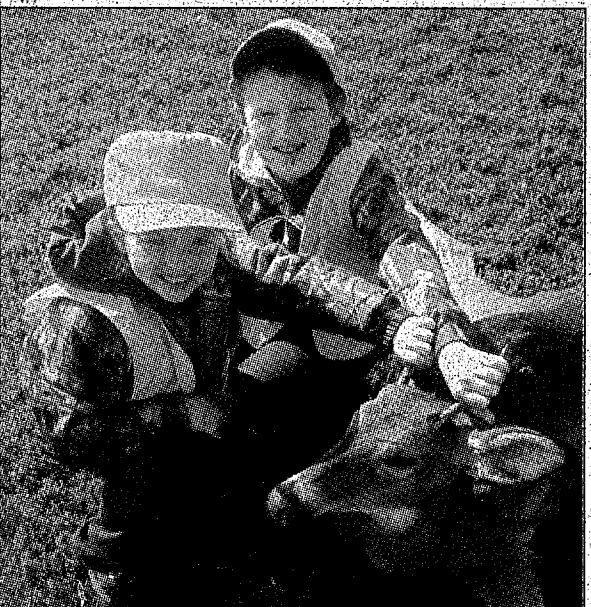

ORDINANCE NO. 9-8-14

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A FRANCHISE FOR THE ERECTION, LAYING AND MAINTENANCE OF ELECTRIC FACILITIES AND APPURTENANT FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT IN, ALONG AND ACROSS THE PUBLIC WAYS, ROADS, STREETS, ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY; FOR FURNISHING AND SELLING ELECTRICITY BY MEANS OF SAID FACILITIES; AND PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF SAID FRANCHISE.

WHEREAS, the City of Brodhead ("City") wishes to ensure that electric service continues to be furnished to its citizens in a reliable and efficient manner;

WHEREAS, the City is aware that the provision of such service requires the continued use of public streets, ways, alleys and other public places;

WHEREAS, the franchise granted to and acquired by Kentucky Utilities Company on December 12, 1994, under which that utility provided such service, will expire by its terms; December 12, 2014

WHEREAS, the City wishes to provide for the sale of a new franchise for the benefit of its citizenry, giving effect to Section 96.010 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED as follows:

Section 1. An exclusive franchise ("Franchise") to use the City's public rights-of-way, as described in the Franchise Agreement attached to this Ordinance, is hereby created.

Section 2. The Franchise created by this Ordinance shall be bid in accordance with the applicable requirements of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Chapter 424 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, as well as any applicable City ordinances.

Section 3. The Franchise created by this Ordinance shall be awarded to the highest and best bidder as shall be determined by the City in its sole discretion. In awarding the Franchise, the City shall consider the technical, managerial, and financial qualifications of the bidder to perform its obligations under the Franchise.

Section 4. The winning bidder and the City shall negotiate, execute and be bound by a Franchise Agreement with terms identical to, or substantially identical to, the Franchise Agreement referenced in Section 1 above and attached hereto, such Agreement to contain terms "that are fair and reasonable to the City, to the purchaser of the Franchise and to the patrons of the utility" (KRS Section 96.010). Such Franchise Agreement shall take effect no earlier than 90 days after its execution, to allow the City and the winning bidder to develop appropriate procedures for identifying and reviewing the electric-consuming entities within the City's corporate limits.

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. Should any section, clause, line, paragraph, or part of this Ordinance or the attached Agreement be held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the same shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance or the attached Agreement, as applicable.

Section 7. Time is of the essence in carrying out the terms and the provisions of this Ordinance and the Franchise created herein.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage and publication. Read at a meeting of the Brodhead City Council on the 8 day of Sept, 20 14; a second reading was held on the 13 day of October, 20 14; said Ordinance was READ and APPROVED on the 13 day of October, 20 14.

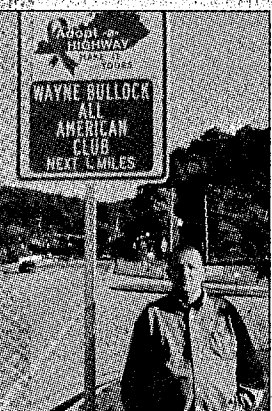
