## 2014 General Election is next Tuesday

 Rockcastle County voters will have several decisions to make when they go to the polls next Tuesday. Polls for the 2014 General Election will open next Tuesday at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. Rockcastle Countians will cast their votes for several races including United States Senator, United State Representative, state senator, family court judge, court of appeals judge, county judge executive, jailer and constable. United States Senator Mitch McConnell (R) is facing opposition from Kentucky Secretary of State Alison Lundergan Grimes (D). Fifth District United States Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers (R) is being challenged for his seat by Kenneth S. Stepp (D). Incumbent state senator Jared Carpenter (R) has opposition from Michael S. Cope (D). Doug Bishop (R) is once again facing opposition from incumbent County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis. Carloftis filed as a write-in candidate after Bishop defeated him in the Primary Election in May. In the county jailer race, Carlos McClure (R) and Rick Brummett (D) are squaring off against each other for the jailer position. All constable candidates are unopposed with the exception of constable candidate Frank Maples who faces opposition from write-in candidate Kevin Begley. Other candidates who are unopposed in their respective state and county races are state representative Jonathan Shell, incumbent County Attorney Billy Reynolds, incumbent Sheriff Mike Peters, county PVA candidate Janet Vaughn, incumbent County Clerk Danetta Allen (R), and County Coroner candidate Marvin E. Owens. All magisterial candidates are unopposed on the ballot as well. Incumbent Court of Appeals Judge Michael O. Caperton is being challenged by Debra Hembree Lambert and Incumbent Court of Appeals Judge (Cont. to A16)

 A local man was arrested for meth possession last Thursday after police noticed him walking along the roadway on Hwy 25 in Conway. Arrested at the scene was Rodney Lee Spoonamore, 31, of Berea. According to state police reports, trooper Scottie Pennington noticed Spoonamore walking along Hwy 25 and he knew that Spoonamore had a warrant for his arrest. When Pennington turned his cruiser around, Spoonamore was howhere to be found. After searching the area for several minutes, Pennington later spotted Spoonamore on Bluegrass Lane in Mt. Vernon. During a search of Spoonamore, several needles, several small empty plastic baggies and three plastic baggies containing suspected methamphetamine were found. Spoonamore was charged with possession of a controlled substance (Methamphetamine), drug paraphernalia and giving an officer a false name or address. He remains lodged on the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$5,000 cash bond.

## City of Livingston awarded grant for law enforcement supplies

The City of Livingston was recently awarded a state Law Enforcement Protection Program grant of \$1,040 for a patrol rifle and ammunition. The Livingston Police Department was one of 30 law enforcement agencies across the state that was awarded funding in LEPP grants. The 30 grants, totaling \$170,832, are being administered by the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security to provide certain items that are needed in performing police duties. In conjunction with the Kentucky State Police, KOHS receives income from the sales of confiscated weapons. The KSP also conducts periodic auctions to federally licensed firearm dealers which generates funding for the LEPP grants. KOHS assesses the needs of each law enforcement department and provides available funds for the procurement of body armor, weapons, ammunition, etc. LEPP support goes to police agencies of cities, counties, charter counties, unified counties, urban counties, consolidated local governments, sheriff's departments and public university police departments.

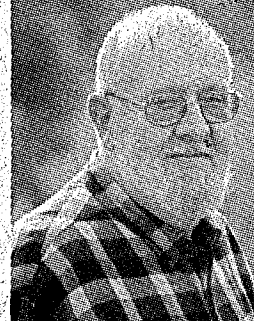
Since the last big, overblown shopping season that took up most of the last three months of 2013, I have discovered and read six amaz-

## Mamaw's Kitchen

**BBQ CHUCK ROAST**  
3 pounds chuck roast  
1 small onion, finely chopped  
1/3 cup vinegar  
1/4 cup catsup  
1 tablespoon vegetable oil  
2 tablespoons soy sauce  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire  
1 teaspoon mustard  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
Place meat and onion into crock pot. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over roast. Cook for 8 hours on low. Remove meat from juices, discard any fat, and shred meat. Place back into crock pot until ready to serve.

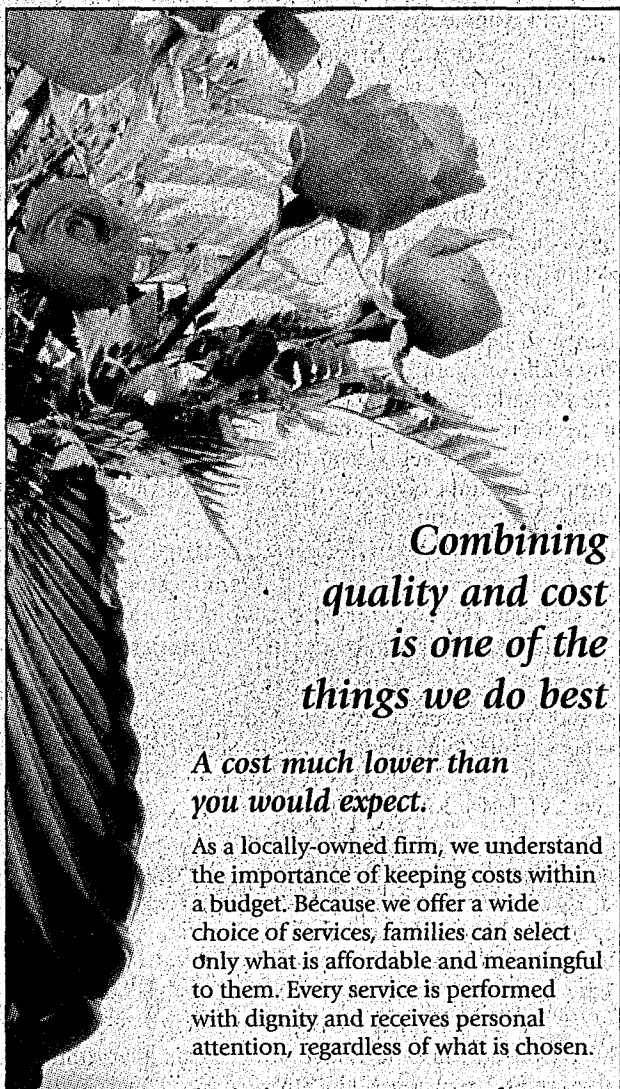
**CROCK POT VENISON ROAST**  
1 venison roast  
3 tablespoons cold butter, cut into 10 pieces  
1 teaspoon garlic powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon black pepper  
1 teaspoon paprika  
1 teaspoon oregano  
2 cups water or vegetable  
1 medium onion, diced  
10 small potatoes, quartered  
3 to 5 carrots cut into 1-inch pieces  
With sharp knife, cut 10 deep slits in the roast; push a piece of butter into each slit. Mix the garlic powder, salt, pepper, paprika, and

oregano; rub onto roast. Place roast in crock pot and add remaining ingredients. Cook on low 10 hours or high 6 hours.

### CROCK-ROASTED VEGETABLES

This method is so much easier than roasting vegetables in the oven or on a grill. Just put them in the pot and forget about them until ready to serve. Sweet potato works well in this recipe also.

1 pound small turnips, peeled  
2 pounds tiny new potatoes, washed  
2 pounds baby peeled carrots  
3 or 4 small yellow squash  
10 cloves garlic, peeled  
6 baby green zucchini  
1/2 pound pearl or boiling onions, peeled  
3 tablespoons olive oil  
1 tablespoon coarse salt  
1 teaspoon black pepper

lationships, etc. These things don't happen by solely relying on fate, they happen with hard work, faith and having patience when things aren't going well.

Well-known rock band Guns N' Roses' number one hit in 1987, their song "Patience." The band's guitarist Izzy Stradlin is credited with writing the music and lyrics for the song.

The lyrics of the song are reportedly about a troublesome relationship between lead singer Axl Rose and his ex-wife Erin Everly. But then others have said it's about Stradlin's relationship with an ex-girlfriend. Who knows which relationship the song was really about but the song is definitely about having patience in relationships.

I know the members of Guns N' Roses are viewed by a lot of people to be "rough around the edges." But maybe they were on to something here with a message that goes farther than a relationship but also applies to life in general. Because sometimes in

life, "all we need is just a little patience."

Pikeville, Shelbiana, Virgie and Dorton, while the third and last is set in Harlan County in the city of Harlan, Cawood and the forest surrounding Martin's Fork Lake. Readers, like myself, who are familiar with the geography, will know exactly where they are at all times. I have had feedback from several readers, without that familiarity, who tell me that they quickly gained a sense of place.

The main characters are so realistically developed that I think most of them are based on some of my close friends and relatives.

The books combine successfully combine science fiction, horror/terror, suspense and murder mystery but I could argue that they are in a genre all their own. My first reaction to Satan's Breath was an audible, "Wow!" that woke up my wife. I could hardly wait to get into the subsequent titles. I have now read all three twice and I can count, on the fingers of one hand, the number of books that have so quickly demanded a re-read.

Looney's style is more journalistic than prosaic. If you are looking for the shallow, flowery metaphors, cursing and vulgarity all too common in most modern best sellers, you are not going to find it here. Nor does he do a great job with dialogue. You will find yourself thinking, "hillbillies don't talk like this", because almost all his work inside quotation marks is grammatically proper and correct. However, what he lacks in style is more than compensated with the substance of fast action, adventure and gripping suspense.

If you order only one

title, be sure to start with Satan's Breath. It will make you want the others.

My other big discovery is Julia Keller, a West Virginia native of the coal fields who is already enjoying huge commercial success and critical acclaim. She is destined to hit all the big best seller lists, if she is not already there.

Keller's three titles to date are Bitter River, A Killing In The Hills and Summer Of The Dead. All three are murder mysteries featuring Belle Elkins, a tenacious county prosecutor and a supporting host of relatives and law enforcement personnel.

All three are set in economically-declining, Acker's Gap, a fictional coal town in the West Virginia hills that makes Kentucky's coal towns look prosperous by comparison.

Keller is the best new crime-fiction writer to come along in many years. That she is an Appalachia simply adds to her allure. As with Looney, readers familiar with the geography and culture will rapidly feel at home with the geographic settings.

The titles do build on each other and it is important to read them in order.

All 3 of Looney's books and the first two Keller's are in the 300 page range and sell for \$21.00 per title, including first class S&H, from Heritage Nook. Keller's most recent, Summer Of The Dead, ships for \$26.00.

I continue to tout my friend and Jenkins native, Roberta Webb's, A Dark And Bloody Ground, (reviewed here last year) as one of the finest works of fiction ever to come out of the mountains. DBG is a much lengthier title that ships for \$24.00 from Heritage Nook.

Another title that I tremendously enjoyed and previously reviewed here, is Eastern Kentucky Short Stories, a nearly 500 page compilation of several dozen photographs and as many tall tales, both fact and fiction, by Letcher County native, Maynard Adams that are set in eastern KY and Wise County, VA. It ships for \$31.00.

Heritage Nook Books, operated by Brenda and Larry Salyers, started out in a corner of their little grocery store in Pound, VA in 1988. History buff and local lore collector, Brenda, set out to create a market outlet for local writers and readers. The grocery store is now closed but the Salyers have created an incredible collection of central Appalachian writers whose work they sell, primarily, through their online catalog/mail order business.

If you are interested in eastern Kentucky, east Tennessee, southwestern Virginia or West Virginia literature, Heritage Nook is, easily, the best place that I know

of to start looking.

Brenda has become a dear friend and inspiration to me because she copes with a more seriously disabling disease, far better than I do in contending with my personal nemesis, Mr Parkinson. However, Heritage Nook deserves your business simply because the service is efficient, ultra-friendly and beyond excellent in all regards. Brenda is going to be mad at me for even mentioning her physical limitation and I do so, only because I so admire the fact that she doesn't allow it to hinder anything she sets her mind to. As I tell every body, the best little book store in Kentucky is actually in Pound VA.

one trying this fun past-time. At around the age of six, my grandfather (Pop) took me on a walk to John D. Henderson's pond, a place where we often fished. That day we took no fishing gear so I just thought we were simply taking a walk through the woods. It did not matter to me because I loved spending time with Pop no matter what we were doing.

When we reached the pond, Pop squatted on the bank and began to pick up some small rocks. I watched, not having any idea what he was going to do with them.

After he had gathered a good handful, he stood up and said, "David Joe, I want you to watch me and then see if you can do what I am going to try." He then bent over and threw one of the flat stones along the surface of the water, causing it to skip nearly to the other side. I could tell he was pleased, and he tried it again. This was the first time I had witnessed anyone trying to make a rock skip on the surface of water, and I was impressed.

Pop taught me to carefully select the correct size and shape of the rocks in order to give it a try. He said, "Remember, the rocks need to be small and flat in order to skip the longest distance." I bent down and retrieved some rocks that fit the description he had made. He added, "Watch me one more time, so you can see how it is done." He took another flat stone and skipped it several times to reach the opposite bank. I was captivated.

Then I began to skip my own stones - without much success. After a few more tosses, I was able to make the rocks skip three or four times before sinking to the bottom of the pond. Pop coached me until I could get the objects to stay on the surface. Each time one skipped, Pop would praise me. Finally, after many trials, one of my rocks reached the opposite bank. Pop clapped! I had accomplished an amazing feat - at least in my mind. I had. I thought to myself, "Pop knows everything that anyone needs to know." I was so very glad that he was my Pop!

Sometimes it amazes me how many things Pop eventually taught me. I certainly hope that I will get to thank him properly someday. And it certainly seems to me that heaven must have a pond for skipping stones. If so, that is the most likely place you'd find me - alongside Pop, of course.

**USDA Expands Access to Credit to Help More Beginning and Family Farmers**

**Changes Increase Eligibility and Financing Options for Hard Working Families**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7, 2014 – Agriculture Deputy Secretary Krysta Harden today announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will improve farm loans by expanding eligibility and increasing lending limits to help more beginning and family farmers. As part of this effort, USDA is

raising the borrowing limit for the microloan program from \$35,000 to \$50,000; simplify the lending processes; updating required “farming experience” to include other valuable experiences; and expanding eligible business entities to reflect changes in the way family farms are owned and operated. The changes become effective Nov. 7.

“USDA is continuing its commitment to new and existing family farmers and ranchers by expanding access to credit,” said Harden. “These new flexibilities,

created by the 2014 Farm Bill, will help more people who are considering farming and ranching, or who want to strengthen their existing family operation.”

The microloan changes announced today will allow beginning, small and mid-sized farmers to access an additional \$15,000 in loans using a simplified application process with up to seven years to repay. Microloans are part of USDA’s continued commitment to small and mid-sized farming operations.

In addition to farm related experience, other types of skills may be considered to meet the direct farming experience required for farm loan eligibility such as operation or management of a non-farm business, leadership positions while serving in the military, or advanced education in an agricultural field. Also, individuals who own farmland under a different legal entity operating the farm now may be eligible for loans administered by USDA’s Farm Service Agency (FSA). Producers will have an opportunity to share suggestions on the microloan process, and the definitions of farming experience and business structures through Dec. 8, 2014, the public open comment period.

FSA is also publishing a Federal Register notice to solicit ideas from the public for pilot projects to help increase the efficiency and effectiveness of farm loan programs. Comments and ideas regarding potential pilot projects will be accepted through Nov. 7, 2014.

Since 2010, USDA has made a record amount of farm loans through FSA – more than 165,000 loans totaling nearly \$23 billion. More than 50 percent of USDA’s farm loans now go to beginning farmers. In addition, USDA has increased its lending to socially-disadvantaged producers by nearly 50 percent since 2010.

These programs were made possible by the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past

five years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for taxpayers. Since enactment, USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America. Thursday is the last day to turn in orders for fall pictures.

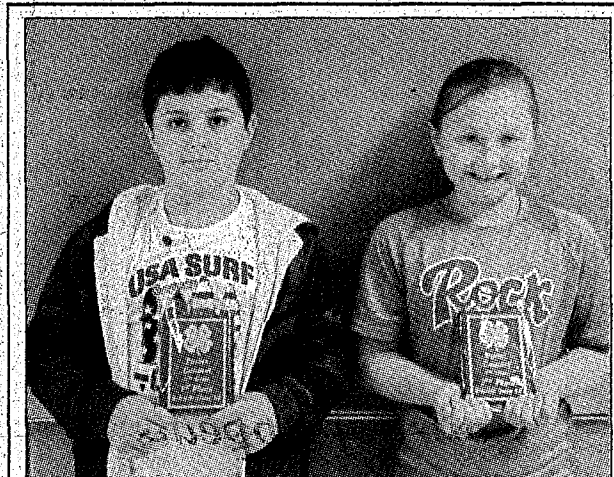

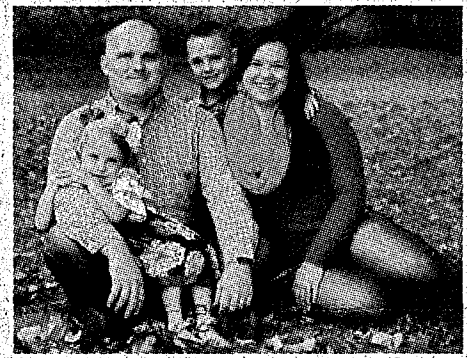

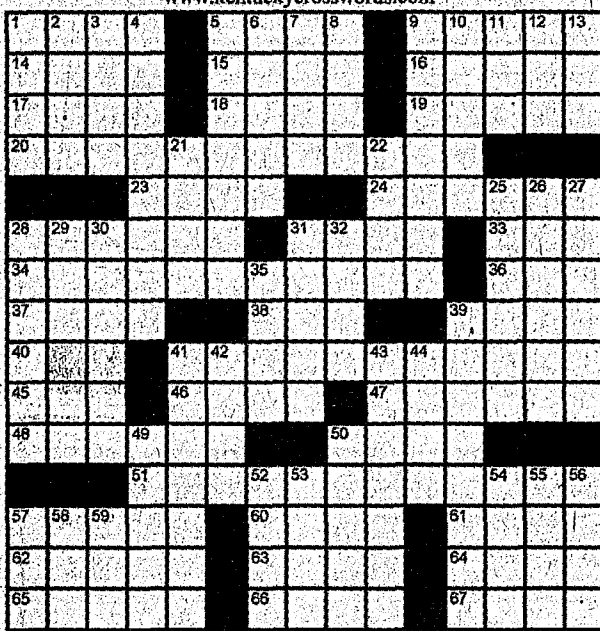

### Financial Aid Tip of the Month

## Student financial aid comes in many forms

High school seniors and their parents beginning the college financial aid process will find there are many types of aid available. This list from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) provides short descriptions of the most common types.

- Conversion scholarship/loan. This type of financial aid requires recipients to provide certain services or pay back the funds with interest. An example would be the KHEAA Teacher Scholarship.
- Grant. Grants are usually based on financial need and generally don't have to be repaid. These include the Federal Pell Grant.
- Institutional aid. This

term refers to the scholarships, grants and other financial aid programs provided by the college.

•Scholarship. A scholarship, like a grant, usually doesn't have to be repaid. Scholarships are usually based on grades, athletic ability, artistic ability or criteria other than need.

•Student loan. Loans have to be repaid. The most common is the Federal Stafford Loan, sometimes referred to as a Federal Direct Loan.

•Waiver. A waiver lets a student attend college without having to pay tuition and certain fees. For example, Kentucky public colleges and universities provide waivers to state residents 65 or older.

•Work-study. These programs let students work on or off campus to earn money for college. Examples include Federal Work-Study and KHEAA Work-Study.

KHEAA is the state agency that administers Kentucky's student financial aid programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES).

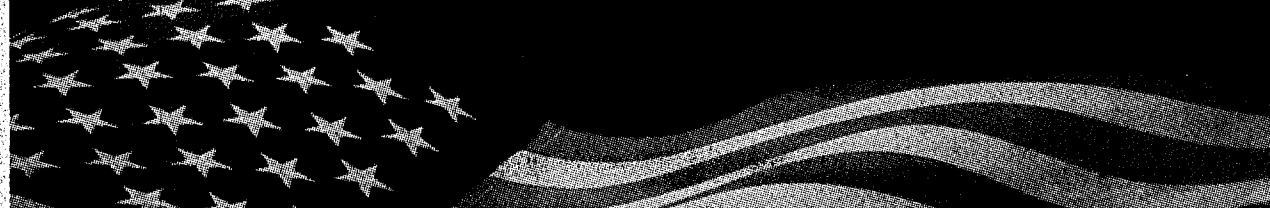

# Rockets beat Clay County, 42-26; now 2-1 in district

The Rockcastle County Rockets picked up a much needed district win last Friday night, beating the Clay County Tigers 42-26.

The Rockets are now 6-3 on the season and 2-1 in the district. The Rockets finished the regular season second in the district behind Knox Central. The only game left is with Wayne County this Friday night, a non-district game.

During last Friday night's game, the Tigers were first to get on the scoreboard after senior running back Sam Carr punched the ball into the end zone from three yards out. The two point conversion was no good giving the Tigers an early 6-0 lead at the beginning of the first quarter.

The Rockets scored their first points in the game when freshman tailback Brent Lovell broke free for a 44 yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was no good tying the game at 6-6.

The Tigers scored on their next offensive possession when senior quarterback Will Sexton connected with Carr on a 46 yard touchdown pass. The two point conversion was no good and the Tigers regained the lead 12-6.

The Rockets answered in the final seconds of the first quarter when sophomore quarterback Dakota Bishop threw a 39 yard touchdown strike to senior tight end

Isaiah Adams. The two point conversion was no good tying the game once again at 12-12.

In the second quarter, the Rockets scored first on a 3 yard touchdown run by Lovell. The two point conversion was good with Lovell punching the ball in the end zone giving the Rockets the 20-12 lead.

The Tigers put together a successful drive ending with Sexton scoring from one yard out. But their two point conversion was once again no good and the Rocket lead was 20-18.

The Rockets scored on their next offensive drive when Bishop scrambled into the end zone from one yard out. Freshman fullback Holdan Barnett then took the ball into the end zone for the two point conversion extending the Rockets lead to 28-18.

But the Tigers scored again before halftime when Sexton connected with junior wide receiver Wes Wolfe for a 47 yard touchdown pass. The two point conversion was good making the score 28-26 at the half.

After halftime, Barnett found his way into the end zone for a 5 yard touchdown run. The two point conversion by Lovell was good and the Rockets led 36-26.

The Rockets put the game away in the fourth quarter when senior fullback Chance Ansardi scored on a two yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was

no good making the final score 42-26.

The Rockets were led on offense by Lovell who had 19 carries for 164 yards and two touchdowns. Lovell also had one catch for 10 yards.

Other Rockets picking up rushing yards were Barnett with 10 carries for 72 yards and one touchdown; sophomore Devon Robinson had 11 carries for 49 yards; Ansardi three carries for 34 yards and one touchdown; Adams had 3 carries for 28 yards; junior wide receiver Dylan Rowe got six yards on two carries junior fullback Dalton Cole had one carry for 2 yards.

Bishop was 5 out of 11 passing for 84 yards and one touchdown. Bishop also had one carry for one yard and one touchdown.

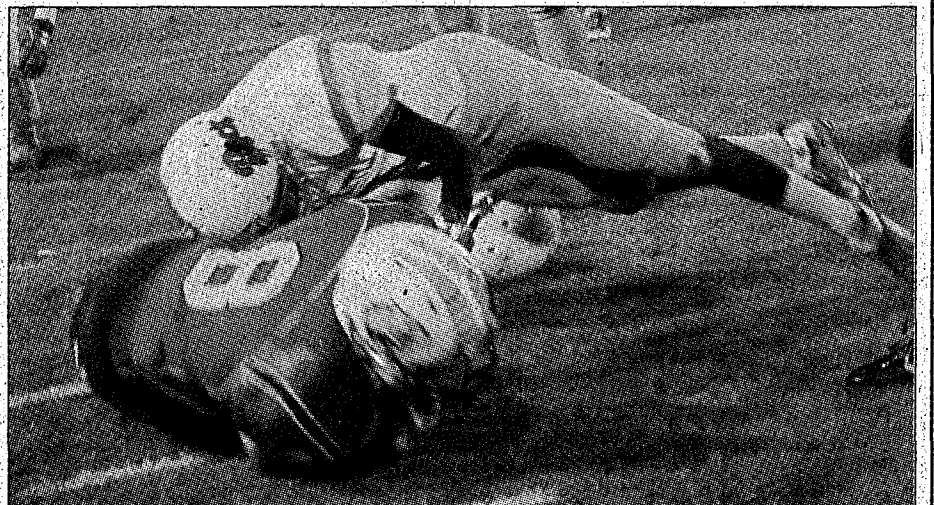

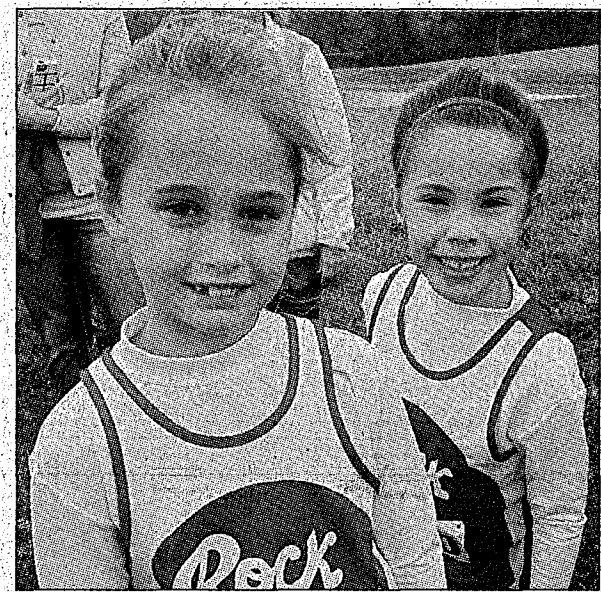

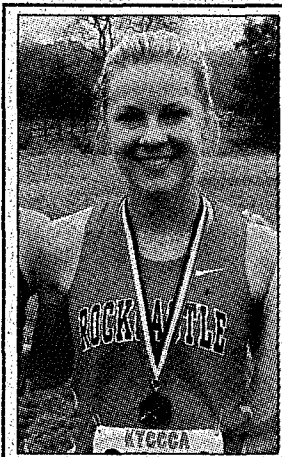

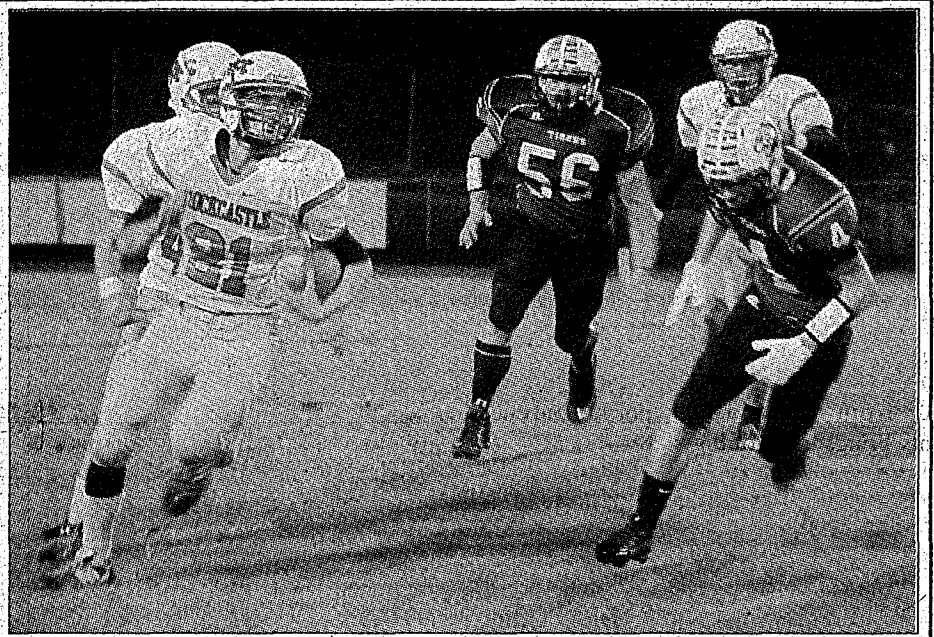

## Sara Hammond takes leader role for U of L

After the departures of Shoni Schimmel and three other super seniors, University of Louisville women's basketball coach Jeff Walz left little ambiguity last week about the leadership role he expects for Sara Hammond this season.

"Sara knows this is her team now," he said.

As the Cardinals seek a new identity in the post-Shoni era, the opportunity is there for Hammond to emerge as the new lady of Louisville and establish herself as one of the top players in the country.

"Sara wants to go out on a high note," Walz said. "Sara wants to make sure that when her senior year is finished, she's put it all out there."

The senior power forward from Rockcastle County brings loads of big-game experience after a couple seasons as a No. 2 option, and Walz believes she has the increased confidence to be the Cards' go-to player.

"I'm ready to take that leadership role, and I'm thankful that he has that trust in me to lead this team," Hammond said. "It boosts my confidence in knowing how I can contribute to this team and that my teammates look up to me and look to me when we get to critical points in the game."

"I need to step up and lead this team through my actions and by what I say. I've been trying to do that since last season ended."

Hammond was third on the team in scoring (10.4 points per game) and second in rebounding (5.9 per game) last season, and the Cards will need increased production from her.

Last year's seniors — Schimmel, Asia Taylor, Antonita Slaughter and Tia Gibbs — contributed 54 percent of the team's scoring (45 ppg) and 43 percent of the rebounds (19.1 per game).

To help fill the void, Walz said he won't be surprised to see Hammond's scoring average rise to 14 to 18 points per game.

She has been primarily a low-post threat her first three seasons while possessing the ability to shoot occasional jumpers.

Hammond's trying to expand that perimeter game.

She worked on ball-handling for 30 minutes every day during the summer, and she must make 100 throws every day this preseason before she leaves practices.

Hammond went 10 of 36 from beyond the arc last season. Schimmel, Slaughter and Gibbs were the Cards' best shooters by far.

"Coach is really challenging us, 'Who's going to be our three-point shooter this year?'" Hammond said. "And I kind of personally want to take that role of being that outside shooter and being consistent at it — not just making a three and one

game and making another three games later."

The Cards have an interesting roster dynamic with five seniors and five freshmen. The older players will be needed to bring the newcomers along.

Hammond and fellow senior Bria Smith are former McDonald's All Americans. Now they'll help 2014 McDonald's players Mariya Moore and Myisha Hines-Allen acclimate to the college game.

"It's definitely been different in practice because I've been so used to looking for Tia and Asia and Shoni and Nita, and now everyone's looking toward me," Hammond said. "If (the freshmen) don't know what's going on, they're kind of like, 'What do we do?' So everyone is looking at me to step my game up, and I just try to be positive and supportive and encouraging every day."

Hammond has WNBA ambitions after college, and the big stage of the ACC will give her the chance to stand out. To that end, she's worked with U of L's trainers to improve her footwork and become a quicker player on defense.

Walz said he has "no doubt" that Hammond has the goal of being one of the nation's premier players.

"That's kind of an individual goal of mine, to possibly be on that All-American list and by the end of the season people are saying, 'Wow, she really is an elite player,'" Hammond said. "But that doesn't happen unless we have a good team and have great success as a team. That's the No. 1 factor and the No. 1 thing that's important to me."

However, the law goes on to state that any minor misspelling of the candidate's name will be disregarded in determining the validity of a write-in vote as long as the intended candidate can be clearly determined.

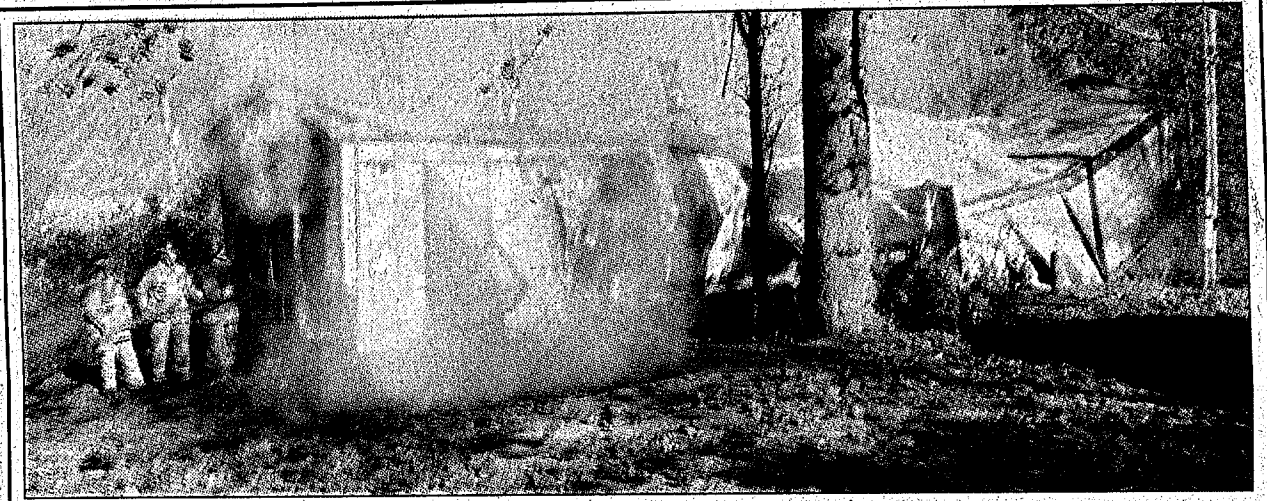

Durham was rushed to the UK Medical Center where he was treated for several broken vertebrae, a broken wrist and a broken arm.

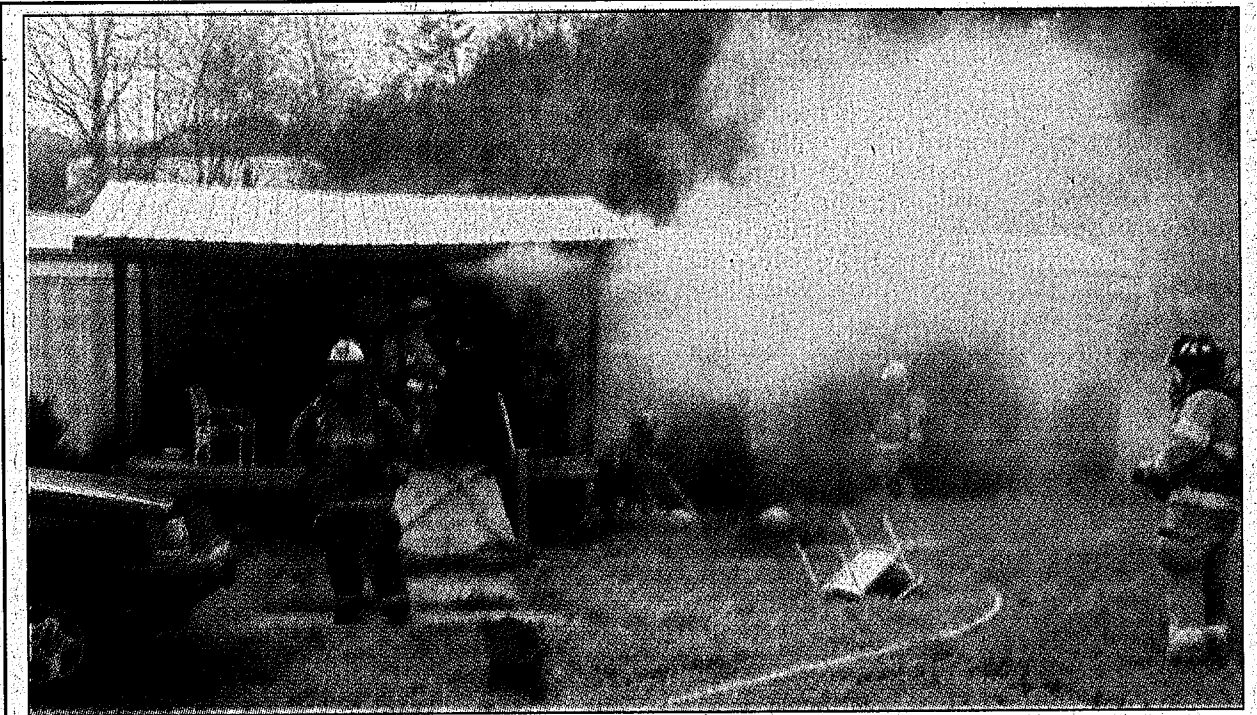

## Ebola risk very low for Rockcastle County

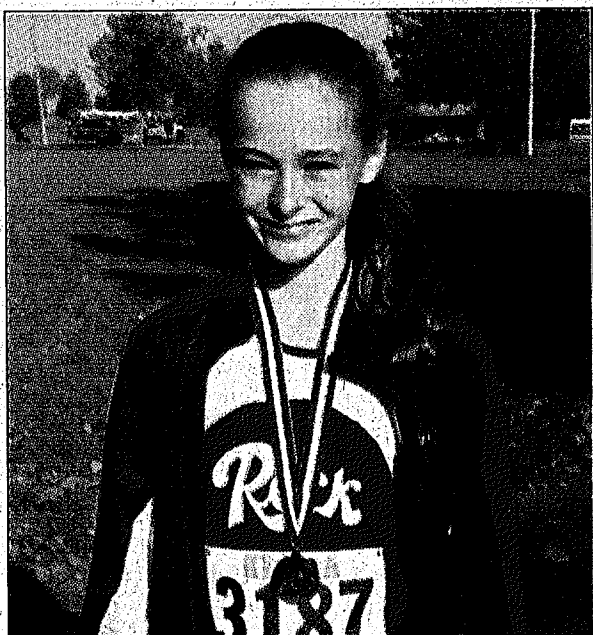

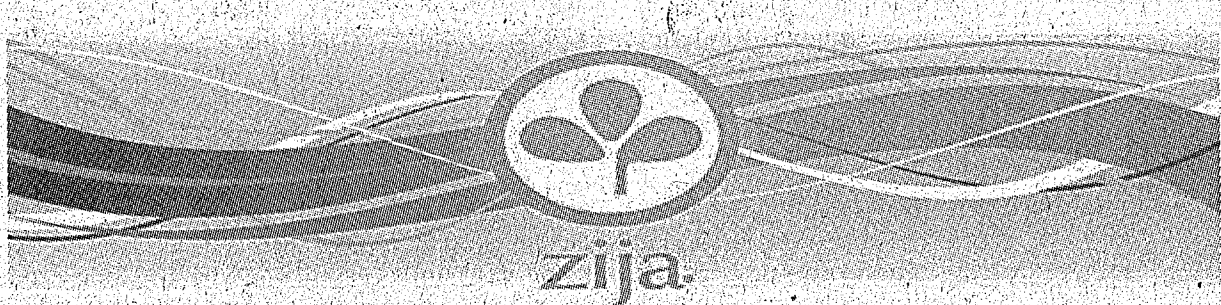
Multiple meetings, weekly conference calls with the Kentucky Department for Public Health, and a tabletop drill have helped the hospital stay current on

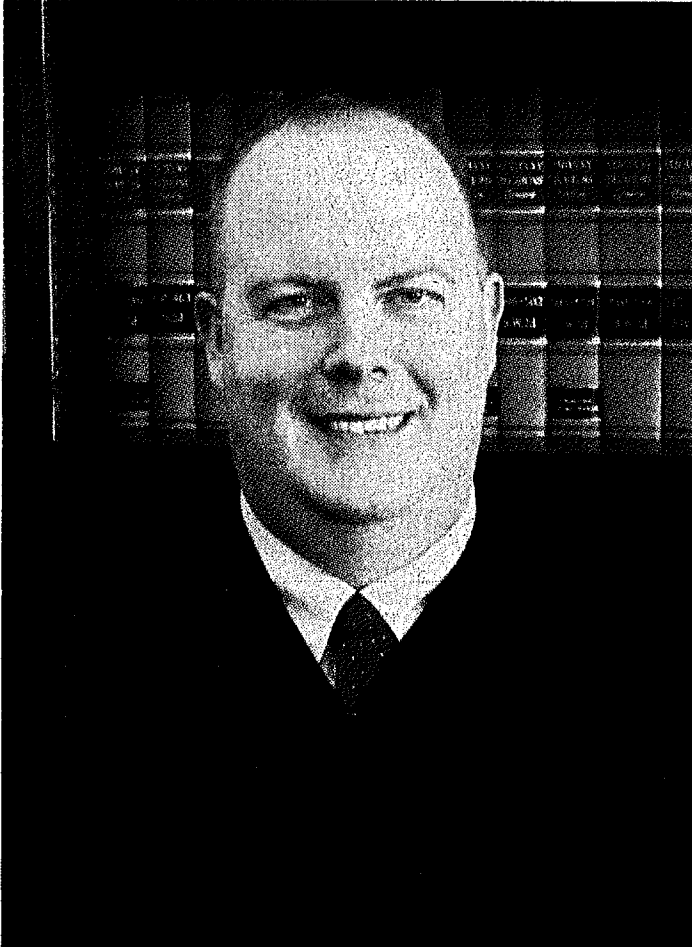

# The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

To celebrate and honor the county's American Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I have compiled highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years 1818 and 1842. All information was taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. More information can be found on each patriot at the local library or the Rockcastle Historical Society. (Copyright pending). **George Proctor**  
*Virginia*

George Proctor was born in October 1742 in Caroline Co. VA and died in September 1838 in Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, George gave the following account of his service in July 1833 in Rockcastle Co. KY at the age of ninety one: He entered the service of the United States in the Revolutionary War in the year of 1779 as a private and was in the militia and held the service as such two years in Albemarle Co. VA. He served six or seven tours of several weeks at a time, pursuing Tories and guard-

ing the Magazine. George's first tour of several weeks was under the command of Captain Matlock. He was marched to Scott's Landing on the James River and remained there until he was discharged.

The next service was under the same Captain at the same place and in the same year for two months. George's next service was under Captain William Grissom for a tour of two to three weeks on the James River. He next went as a guard down the James River under Captain Couch, the Captain of the Guard of the Magazine. The balance of his actual service was under Captain Benjamin Jordan at the mouth of Rock River at Irvin's old store. He was discharged from service soon after Cornwallis' surrender on 19 October 1781. George was allowed a pension executed 4 March 1831 at the rate of twenty dollars per year for service as a private for six months in the Virginia militia.

He stated in his pension application that he lived in Virginia, Albemarle, Louisa and Nelson Counties until he moved to Rockcastle Co. KY, where he lived at the time of his pension application and until his death. The date of his death is speculative. Cemetery records show that his death date is September 1838, but NSDAR records and pension payment records show that he received his last payment in March 1840. It is believed that George is buried at the James Proctor

Cemetery on Cove Branch in Rockcastle County.

George married Elizabeth Unknown. They had three known children. George Proctor (1760 Virginia-1835 Fayette Co. KY). Susannah Proctor (1764 Virginia-22 January 1856 Rockcastle Co. KY) married George Harlow (1756 VA-13 May 1846) on 24 December 1781. They had no children. George was also an American Revolutionary War Veteran from Virginia. Their burial place is unknown. James D. Proctor (1774 Virginia-14 August 1858 Rockcastle Co. KY). He was the first jailor of Rockcastle County. He married Mary Magdalena Bränneman (1780-1840) on 20 June 1799 Albemarle Co. VA. They are buried at the James Proctor Cemetery on Cove Branch, Rockcastle County. They had fifteen children: Frances, David, George, Joel, Elizabeth, William, James, John, Bradford, Anderson, Elisha, Sidney, Susannah, Willis and Alfred.

George Proctor is a recognized Patriot of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

what specific actions would be taken should someone with Ebola be diagnosed at the hospital. Preparedness is ongoing via the hospital's daily safety huddles as well as updates from the Kentucky Department for Public Health, the Kentucky Hospital Association, and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

"We are continually assessing our approaches," Bullens said, "and we are ready to adapt to any new CDC protocols as they become available."

Ebola is an often-fatal disease caused by ebolaviruses. It is spread through direct contact with blood or bodily fluids of a sick person or exposure to objects such as needles that have been contaminated. The disease does not spread

through the air. The first reported cases of the current Ebola outbreak occurred in March in West Africa. To date, more than 10,000 cases have occurred in that region, resulting in nearly 5,000 deaths, while four cases (resulting in one death) have been confirmed in the U.S. Three of those were in Texas, one in New York.

No cases have been reported near Kentucky, but given the volume of interstate traffic on I-75, the hospital is taking no chances.

Rockcastle Regional also has:

- Implemented of the CDC's screening procedures to identify patients who might be at higher risk of having the virus.

- Identified and reviewed procedures should an Ebola patient arrive, including the identification of treatment areas and protocol.

- Assessed supplies of per-

sonal protective equipment

- Placed signs throughout the hospital asking anyone who has a fever and who has traveled outside the country to notify staff immediately.

Public awareness of the disease is critical to containing Ebola.

Ebola symptoms, such as fever, muscle aches, vomiting, and diarrhea, can closely resemble those of other common illnesses. The key is whether you have those symptoms and you have travelled to West Africa, specifically to Liberia, Sierra Leone, or Guinea, or you have come into contact with someone exhibiting symptoms who has traveled there, said Cynthia Burton, RN, chief nursing officer. Anyone who suspects having been exposed is encouraged to call ahead before arriving at the hospital.

Though the hospital is taking every precaution, Bullens emphasizes the likelihood of an Ebola case occurring in Rockcastle County is low.

For perspective, she points out that while Ebola has so far claimed one life in the U.S., there are thousands of flu-associated deaths each year.

"While Ebola is in the news more, influenza is a serious, consistent threat to public health," Bullens said.

She added that you can minimize your chances of getting or spreading the flu simply by washing your hands thoroughly and frequently, staying out of public places when you are sick, and getting a flu vaccine.

"In the case of any infectious disease," Bullens said, "we have a better chance of containment if the public is aware and active in preventing its spread."

**Fall lawn care**

Farm and Home News

Fall is a great time to prepare your lawn for next year. Contrary to popular belief, late fall is the best time to apply fertilizer to your cool season turf. In response to fall nitrogen, the turf develops a better root system, becomes very dense, and has much better color in late fall and early spring. By eliminating or minimizing spring fertilization, you prevent the heavy

flush of growth that occurs with it, develop a better root system, and develop a more heat-tolerant, weed-free turf.

There are many types of fertilizer available and understanding the basic terminology is important. The first number on the bag is the percentage nitrogen, the second number is the percentage phosphorus, and the third is the percent-

age potassium. Most soils in Kentucky will require some "maintenance" nitrogen every year to maintain good color. Phosphorus and potassium should always be applied based on a soil sample. Now is a great time to get a soil sample, so stop by your local extension office for information on how to properly sample.

Typically, fall weed control is not an issue. Crabgrass and goose grass are often our biggest problems and they are warm season weeds, so consider applying a pre-emergent in late spring to help control these weeds.

The theme of this year's field day was Farm to Plate:

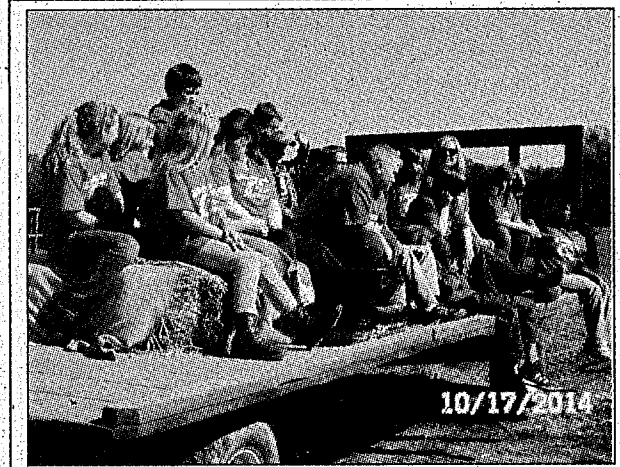
Where Your Food Comes From.
