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

A former Rockcastle County Middle School boys basketball coach was recently arrested on a warrant for criminal solicitation of a minor.

The whole situation began last month when the Anderson County Sheriff's Department in South Carolina issued an arrest warrant for Christopher C. Evans, 24, of Mt. Vernon for criminal solicitation of a minor. According to the Anderson County Sheriff's Department, an arrest warrant was issued for Evans after they determined in their investigation that he knowingly solicited, contacted and communicated with a female juvenile in Belton, South Carolina between the months of June and October of this year.

## Carloftis loses bid as write-in candidate for re-election

By: Doug Ponder Incumbent County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis lost his re-election bid as a write-in candidate. to challenger Doug Bishop in Tuesday's General Election. Carloftis received 1,744 write-in votes to Bishop's 3.077 votes.

Bishop led Carloftis in 13 of the 15 precincts. Carloftis received 130 votes to Bishop's 108 votes in the East Livingston precinct and won the West Livingston precinct 81 to 50.

This was the second race between the two Republicans this year. After Bishop defeated Carloftis in May's primary election by 428

votes, Carloftis filed October 17th as a write-in candidate to run against Bishop again in the General Election.

Republican jailer candidate Carlos McClure defeated his democrat challenger Rick Brummett 3,589 to 1,301. McClure led Brummett in all precincts.

In the highly anticipated U.S. Senate race, incumbent republican Mitch McConnell led Rockcastle County with a total of 3,803 votes compared to his democrat challenger Alison Grimes' 1,122 votes and David Libertarian

Bryant received 399 and Potter's 139. Bryant also carried all four city pre-

There will be a new member on the Mt. Vernon City Council in January after current council member Shelley Raines Lewis received the least number of votes in Tuesday's election. There are six seats on the council and there were seven candidates on the bal-

**Incumbent Jamie Bryant** led all council candidates with 504 votes, incumbent Sharon Saylor was next with 445, incumbent Clifford Mullins got 434, incumbent Wayne Bullock was fourth with 390 votes, newcomer Jackie Weaver was fifth with 365 votes, Adams Bales was sixth with 359 votes and Lewis was last with 344 votes.

There will also be a new Brodhead commissioner in January as well. Incumbent

Ronnie Cash led the vote with 171, incumbent Keith Graves was next with 158, newcomer Ricky Kirby was third with 125 and incumbent Dallas Todd was next with 93 votes. Challenger Kenneth Ray Owens lost his bid for a seat after comvotes to Kirby's 264 votes / ing in last place with 91 votes. Unopposed incumbent Brodhead Mayor

### Two arrested for manufacturing



Contrary to forecasts by The Old Farmer's Almanac and a host of other so-called expert prognosticators who are predicting extreme coldconditions even worse than the winter of 13-14, NAWWWWW says it simply is not going to be that bad and certainly not as severe nor as long-lasting as the last time around. Overall the conditions will be milder than normal but they will also be somewhat wet-



Patterson's 172 votes.

McConnell went on to win his seat by a 15 point margin statewide,

Incumbent republican Harold "Hal" Rogers won in overwhelming fashion with 4,375 votes compared to his democrat challenger Kenneth Stepp's 579 votes.

Incumbent republican state senator Jared Carpenter easily won Rockcastle County with an almost 3,000 vote margin of 3,948 over democrat candidate Michael Cope's 1,000 votes

Debra Hembree Lambert won her race for first division court of appeals judge, unseating incumbent Michael Caperton 2,945 to 1,465 votes. Incumbent Court of Appeals Judge James Lambert won his race by a large margin, defeating his challenger Paul Henderson 3,238 to 844 votes.

Incumbent Family Court
Judge Marcus Vanover defeated challenger Bruce
Wayne Singleton 2,386 to
1,032 votes.

Other unopposed incumbent Judges winning their races were: Chief Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette got 3697 votes, Circuit Judge David Tapp 3,162 votes, Chief District Judge Jeff Lawless got 3,032 votes and District Judge Katie Wood 3,456 votes.

Other state and county candidates who were unopposed on the ballot and still received votes were State Representative Jonathan Shell with 3,838 votes, County PVA candidate Janet Vaughn received 4,423 votes, County Attorney Billy Reynolds got 3,976 votes, County Clerk Danetta Allen had 4,410 votes. Sheriff Michael Peters received 4,309 votes and county coroner candidate Marvin E. Owens got 3,343 votes.

All the magistraterial candidates were also unopposed. Magistrate Shannon Bishop received 767 votes, William Denny got 670 votes, Bill McKinney 1,003 votes, Gary Burdette 738 votes and Michael McGuire 815 votes.

The only constable candidate facing opposition was third district constable Frank Maples who defeated his write-in opponent Kevin Begley 817 to 73 votes. Other unopposed constable candidates receiving votes were: Joe Bussell 785, Delno McClure 601, Donnie Cope 737 votes and Chris Mason 787;

Three school board candidates were unopposed and their vote totals were: Angie Stallsworth Mink 491 votes, Tina Cain Hasty received 718 votes and Carrie E, Ballinger 233 votes.

to pass the old homesteads, old growth trees and interesting natural features and natural communities."

The county will be responsible for the trail's design and construction, interpretive signs along the trail, which will educate trail users about the history and ecology of the landscape and its maintenance.

The NFS will be responsible for approving the trail's design, conducting an environmental analysis, approving the construction, routine inspection of the trail and approving the interpretation Education Plan developed by the court.

On question, Asst. County Attorney William Leger told the court that he did not foresee any liability issues for the county. "Since the court will not be constructing anything on the trail and are not the owners of the property there is no liability assumed by the county," Leger told the court.

To get to the trailhead, hikers will cross the bridge at Brush Creek, turn right, go to Ravenwood Lane and follow that to the parking area.

Carloftis told the court that the process for the plans and construction of the trail could take six months to a year. The agreement can also be canceled on thirty days notice by either side.

On a motion by Carloftis, seconded by Magistrate Allen, the court approved the agreement unanimously.

In other business before the court, several fire department representatives presented their wish lists.

A spokesman for the Western Volunteer Fire Department told the court that they needed a brush truck because the one they were using was too big to take off pavement into areas where brush fires occurred.

Chris Mason and ??? representing the Livingston Fire Department spoke of their department's need for a pumper truck, and

David Bales, Chief of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department which also administers the Rockcastle Fire Department, needed another tanker truck because their present one was not safe.

The total of the three pieces of equipment at Wynn's Fire Equipment in Corbin is \$154,000.

However, the court has also been made aware that the Brodhead Fire Department feels they need another tanker and this could push the total to over \$200,000.

No action was taken at the meeting with the decision being made to have magistrates and the county judge review the department's present equipment and travel to Corbin to view the proposed equipment purchases.

The court also discussed the security of the empty Anchor Packaging building. Anchor was paying \$18,000 per month for security personnel but the court decided to contact Storm Security and Modern Security for options available to secure the building at less cost.

Sheriff's Department also determined that Evans did arrange meetings with the female juvenile in order to engage in sexual activity and that Evans' intent was to perform a sexual activity with the female juvenile.

The Anderson County. Sheriff's Office then issued an extradition declaration to extradite Evans for the felony crime of criminal solicitation of a minor that is punishable by one year or more, according to South Carolina law section 16-15-342. The projected pick-up date was scheduled for Monday, November 3rd,

Evans was arrested last Saturday at the Mt. Vernon Police Department.

Evans appeared in Rockcastle County District Court last Monday and his bond was set at \$10,000 surety with conditions of house arrest with no movement except for work release or medical emergencies.

However, the court documents stated that he had to report to the Rockcastle County Detention Center within thirty minutes of being notified that he would be extradited.

During an extradition hearing in Rockcastle County District Court last Wednesday, a motion made by Evans' lawyer to dismiss the charge on "insufficiency" of the South Carolina arrest warrant to comply with, terms of kRS. 440.180 was overruled. He was once again ordered to report to the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

However, Evans turned himself in to the Anderson County Sheriff's Department on Wednesday morning and is currently lodged in the Anderson County Detention Center in South Carolina without bond.

Aside from being a former RCMS boys basket-ball coach, Evans was also a middle school boys basketball coach and an Americorp worker at the Garrard County Middle School. He resigned from both positions last week.

Sally J Road after they received complaints of drug activity at the home.


Once officers arrived, Reber told them that she was the only person in the home. However, officers saw Jackson walk out of a bedroom inside the home.

After receiving consent to search the residence, officers found several items used to manufacture meth including Coleman fuel, drain cleaner, rock salt, rubber tubing and a coffee filter containing a white powder residue. Officers also found an active one-step meth lab and HCL gas generator inside the home.

Reber told officers that she rented out rooms at her home and didn't know there was an active meth lab inside the residence. Jackson also told officers he didn't know about the meth lab and that he was only there to ask about fixing a broken door at the home.

Both Reber and Jackson were charged with manufacturing methamphetamine, unlawful possession of a meth precursor and drug paraphernalia.

They were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Reber remains lodged on a \$20,000 cash/property bond and Jackson remains lodged on a \$35,000 cash bond.





## Watch for deer on Kentucky roadways

Cooler temperatures and shorter days bring out the fall colors that paint warm hues before winter

arrives. At about the same time, the breeding instinct in whitetail deer stirs, putting them on the move and more frequently into the paths of

motorists. About half of all collisions between vehicles and deer in Kentucky occur over the last three months of the calendar year, according to statistics compiled by Kentucky State Police. More of these collisions are reported in November than in any other month.

"October, November and December make up the main breeding season for whitetail deer," said Gabe Jenkins, deer and elk program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "The peak is in November."

Deer are most active around dawn and dusk as they look for mates, he said. State police data from 2009-2013 shows most vehicledeer collisions in November occur from 5-8 a.m. and 5 p.m.-midnight.

'Be aware of the timing and time of day and your surroundings," Jenkins said. "Think about where you see

deer and keep that in mind." Kentucky's landscape in identify deer crossing hot spots. Stay alert and be cautious as you drive through these areas. At night, use! high-beam headlights when appropriate. High beams can help a driver see twice

> Should you encounter a deer in the road, slow down but only steer to avoid hitting the animal if it can be done safely. Swerving can confuse the deer even more and increase the likelihood of a crash, Jenkins said. Allow the deer to leave the roadway but keep in mind that other deer may be in the

> immediate area. Above all, remember to wear your seat belt. It's the law in Kentucky. Most people injured or killed in vehicle-deer collisions were not wearing a safety belt, according to state police.

> The 2,985 vehicle-deer collisions reported last year accounted for less than 3 percent of all vehicle collisions statewide, according to state police data. There were no fatalities resulting from vehicle collisions with deer in the state in 2012 or 2013, and the number of people injured in these types of crashes in Kentucky has decreased every year since

We've worked with the Yellow highway signs Kentucky Transportation Cabinet over the years to identify high-risk areas Jenkins said. "Transportation crews have cleared areas along the roadways to give motorists a better field of view to see deer and to be more aware of their surroundings.'

Biologists estimate Kentucky has about 1 million deer and attribute the increased movement in fall to breeding activity, not hunting pressure. Hunting lowers deer density.

Some of the highest collision rates are found in counties with high deer densities. Boone County led the state the previous five years with an average of 154 vehicle-deer collisions per year followed by Hopkins (116), Campbell (103), Jefferson (100) and Hardin (95) counties, according to state police data.

Of the 10 counties with the highest average of vehicle-deer collisions from 2009-2013, according to state police data, more than half are classified by Kentucky Fish and Wildlife as Zone 1 counties. The department sets deer hunting season dates and bag limits by zone. In a Zone 1 county, a hunter may harvest an unlimited number of does (female deer) so long as they have purchased the appropriate additional deer per-

"A Zone 1 county is where we're trying to get a reduction in the deer herd," Jenkins said. "We realize there are too many and we're trying to give our hunters ample opportunity to take as many antlerless deer as they can. Does are what drive the population the more does our hunters can take in Zone 1, the better we do with population control.'

It is best to explain everything in a letter so you have a written record. Before writing the letter look at your finances to come up with a payment amount you can handle. That lets your creditor know you still plan to pay what you owe and will pay as much as possible during your, financial

Most companies will work with you if you are up front about your difficulties. Ask if your creditor will waive any penalties and will extend your payment period if you are temporarily in a tight money situation.

## Rockets lose last season game to Wayne, 28-14

The Rockcastle County Rockets finished their regular season 6-4 after a 28-14 loss to the Wayne County Cardinals last Friday night.

The Rockets offense produced 288 total yards, 284 rushing yards and 4 passing. 262 yards came from freshman tailback Brent Lovell with the rest of the Rockets team having only 22 yards on offense.

However, several stalled offensive drives, and the inability to get the ball into the end zone, proved to be the deciding factor in the Rockets loss. One of the momentum shifting drives throughout the game came in the first quarter when the Cardinals held the Rockets on the goal line preventing them from scoring on fourth down.

The first quarter proved to be a defensive battle between the two teams as neither offense put any points

on the board.

The Cardnials scored first in the game when running back Dalton Garner ran the ball into the end zone on a 16 yard touchdown run. The extra point was good giving the Cardinals the early 7-0 lead at the beginning of the second quarter.

The Rockets answered on their next offensive drive when Lovell broke free for a 74 yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt by senior Tyler Langford was good tying the game at 7-7

On the Cardinals next possession, tailback Austin Garner punched the ball into the end zone on a 2 yard run. The extra point was good giving the Cardinals the 14-7 lead.

The Cardinals would score again before halftime when running back Dalton Garner scrambled over the goal line from the five yard line. The extra point was no good but the Cardinals led

20-7 at the half.

In the third quarter, Lovell found his way through the Cardinal defense and scored on another, 75 yard touchdown run. The extra point by Langford was good cutting the lead to 20-

The Cardinals would put the game away in the fourth quarter when Austin Garner found his way into the end zone on a 5 yard touchdown run. The two point conversion was good making the final score 28-14.

The Rockets offense was led by Lovell with 27 carries for 262 yards and two touchdowns.

Other Rockets picking up rushing yardage were sophomore running back Devon Robinson with six carries for 20 yards, senior wide receiver Kyle Denny got 7 yards on one carry, senior fullback Chance Ansardi had two carries for 6 yards and freshman full-

back Holdan Barnett got three yards on two carries.

The Rockets were led on defense by Robinson with 9 tackles and one fumble recovery. Lovell also had a big night on defense with 10 tackles.

Other Rockets with tackles and assists were: sophomore linebacker Austin Mills and Denny with 9 tackles each; Ansardi had 7; sophomore defensive lineman Logan Coffey was credited with 5; sophomore defensive end Lucas Jones got 4; Barnett had 3 and sophomore defensive end Tommy Benge got 2. Langford and Adams were credited with one tackle each.

Head Coach Scott Parkey said they knew last Friday night's game would be physical and aggressive


be physical and aggressive.

The Rockets next game is this Friday night at home when they take on the Marion County Knights in the first playoff game. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.


Parkey said Marion County has a good group of athletes who try to get the ball into space.

"They are big and physical on the line of scrim-



### Five questions with Deer and Elk Program Coordinator

deer season opens statewide year. October's harvest is on Nov. 8. When it does, right in the middle when Gabe Jenkins will have been in his new role as the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources? deer and elk program coordinator for a little more than a month.

'It's been exciting," he said.

An avid hunter, Jenkins grew up on a farm in the small southeast Ohio village of Rutland. After earning his bachelor's and master's degrees from Eastern Kentucky University, he was hired by Kentucky Fish and Wildlife in 2007 to work in the deer and elk program.

'All of my predecessors have done a fantastic job and I'm here to continue that course," he said.

Jenkins, 30, recently sat down for an interview at Kentucky Fish and Wildlife headquarters in Frankfort. The following are excerpts from that interview.

What are the duties and responsibilities of the deer and elk program coordina-

Jenkins: "The deer and elk coordinator conducts statewide management for white-tailed deer and elk. I oversee and conduct biological research, surveys and inventory work on both species. I work with our program's deer and elk biologists and others at Kentucky Fish and Wildlife to make recommendations for the promulgation of regulations that address problem issues associated with deer and elk. It's my goal to manage the deer and elk herds in the state to provide ample hunting opportunity, yet strike a balance between hunters and non-hunters alike."

How would you sum up the deer season so far, and what are your expectations for the remainder of it?

Jenkins: "Our September harvest has been increasing and we have been breaking our September harvest record every year. Unfortu-

Kentucky's modern gun nately, we didn't break it this comparing it to previous. years. Our youth firearms season was good considering the less than ideal weather. It was our secondhighest harvest in the past eight years. The early muzzleloader hunt is very weather dependent. The weather was decent across the state and our harvest was

average this year. "We're coming off of two record harvest years. We have made a dent in some of the deer numbers. I look for our harvest to be down to where it had been prior to 2012 and 2013."

What is your assessment of the state's deer herd, estimated to number about 1 million going into this sea-

Jenkins: "We stopped stocking deer in 1999. That's not all that long ago. We have places where the numbers are good. We have places where the numbers are too high. And we have places where we need to grow the herd a little more. Especially in the southeastern part of the state; how can we get that needle to move a little to get a few more deer in that area? I think our hunters would appreciate that. The habitat can't support a huge increase but I would like to see it bump up some. That's definitely an interest of mine."

Can you foresee any potential adjustments to the zone strategy down the

Jenkins: "One thing that I definitely want to open up is a dialogue with our hunters. We need to have some discussions about ways to better manage our doe herd in Zone 1 counties, and how we can get hunters to be better managers of our resources in those counties. They are tasked to manage the resource. We could do a better job of management in many places in Zone 1. So how can we encourage, or make it better, for more

hunters to take more does? The population needs to come down a little bit. We're planning to go on the road and talk with our hunters about ways to deal with deer numbers in Zone 1 counties. We're going to meet with the public and run some surveys. We hope to take what we learn from our discussions and come up with a new strategy to harvest more deer in Zone 1, specifically female deer."

You're a biologist but also an experienced hunter. What do enjoy most about hunting?

Jenkins: "I enjoy going after something new. It could be a new species. It could be a new place. I love to climb up in a tree and shoot a deer, but maybe I want to shoot one with a crossbow this year or go to Colorado and shoot an elk with my bow or tackle turkeys with my bow or a fall turkey with a shotgun. My favorite thing to hunt is whatever's in season. I might try new tactics, a new place, a new style, but I love to hunt. I'm not one that prefers one weapon over the other. I've got a bow. I've got a crossbow. I've got a shotgun, a muzzleloader, a rifle. I value each one of them. You learn something different and new each time you're out there.'

Kentucky hunters took a record 144,409 deer during the 2013-14 season, and modern gun season accounted for 72 percent of that harvest total.

This year, modern gun season for deer opens Nov. 8 and continues through Nov. 17 or Nov. 23, depending on the zone. Hunters are reminded to purchase the appropriate licenses and permits and encouraged to review the 2014-15 Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide - recently updated online at fw.ky.gov - before going into the field.

## **USDA Farm Service Agency County Committee elections**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is encouraging farmers and ranchers to make their voices heard by voting in the upcoming Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Committee elections. FSA Administrator Val Dolcini announced the beginning was Monday, Nov. 3, 2014, USDA will mail ballots for the 2014 elections to eligible producers across the country. Producers must return ballots to their local FSA offices by the Dec. 1, 2014, dead-line to ensure that their vote is counted.

"The role and input of our county committee members is vital as we implement the 2014 Farm Bill," said Dolcini. "New members provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of FSA programs. We have seen promising increases in the number of women and minority candidates willing to serve on county committees, helping to better represent the diversity of American agriculture."

FSA County Committee members provide an important link between the local agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity support programs; conservation programs; indemnity and disaster programs; emergency programs and eligibility. County committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. Agricultural producers in each county submitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended on Aug. 1, 2014.

Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week may pick one up at their local USDA Service Center or FSA office. The deadline to submit ballots is Dec. 1, 2014. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than Dec. 1, 2014. Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2015.

Nearly 7,700 FSA County Committee members serve in the 2,124 FSA offices nationwide. Each committee consists of three to 11 members elected by eligible producers. Members serve 3-year terms of office. Approximately one-third of county committee seats are up for election each year





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## Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps "Sending Autumn Leaves to Landfill?"

There are positive and useful things you can do with leaves when it comes to disposal of the fallen autumn leaves. In October and November there are always leaves to be dealt with. Even if you have no trees on your property the wind will distribute some on your yard or parking place anyhow. It may be routine to burn or bag your leaves for the garbage man: However, there are better choices than sending them to the landfill. Some are obvious, but there may be some things you can do with leaves you've not considered. Let's take a look at options.

Throwing your leaves away, then buying organic fertilizer for your plants is a bit akin to buying lottery tickets with grocery money and then asking for charity because you're hungry. Leaves and leaf litter is better for plants than mulch or commercial fertilizers, and cheaper than store-bought organics; it just takes a little effort to recycle and reap wonderful benefits.

So, you have lots of leaves. What are the choices about what to do with them?

Some municipal governments will collect leaves, either in bags or by giant vacuum trucks if you rake them into the street. One presumes they will compost or recycle what they collect this way. Either using on city trees and beds, or selling composted materials back to the citizens at a reasonable price.

With small quantities, a mulching mower can chew up and leave them on the lawn. Consider this if your

leaf fall isn't too heavy. If you feel you must remove the leaves, do you have a compost bin you could put them in? Could

den? Could you grind them and put the resulting mulch around your trees and shrubs? And though it causes air pollution, even raking them onto your garden and burning them will kill all the weed seeds and add substantial potash to the spot and raise the pHthereby saving on chemicals and fertilizers you will need to buy and apply next sea-

The very worst use of your fallen leaves is to bury them with household garbage between large sheets of polyethelene for years and years in a landfill. Look for alternatives if you need to get rid of a lot of leaves.

No garden and no compost heap, maybe you have a neighbor or gardener or farmer who would accept a donation of your leaves? Even an ad in the paper or a flyer on a utility pole advising you have "free leaves to a good home" might work!

More thoughts: Make a path of leaves (then top with mulch or gravels) to keep weeds at bay. Ground leaf litter is the best mulch—at least from the viewpoint of your trees and shrubs.

Can you mix and bury leaves in your own soil? Perhaps bag and save some for next season? Could you make a leaf pile for kids to play in? Layering, such as described in Pat Lanza's Lasagna Gardening book is also an option to consider as an option for what to do with your fallen leaves.

One doesn't have to be into extremes like hugging trees to keep bulldozers away-isn't it just sensible that if you recycle aluminum cans or separate bottles and paper at curbside on garbage day that you might want to do something helpful and positive with your autumn leaves other than sending them to the dump? The Kentucky Music Hall of Fame announced their 2015 induction class at their kick-off event last Wednesday.

The 2015 induction class consists of: Montgomery Gentry, The Moonglows, Doctor (Doc) Howard Hopkins, Pete Stamper, Larry Cordle, Clarence Spalding and Backstreet Boys.

According to Executive Director Robert Lawson, the country music band "Montgomery Gentry" was formed in 1999 by Kentucky natives Eddie Montgomery and Troy Gentry. The duo went on to release six studio albums that produced more than twenty singles on the "Billboard Hot Country Songs" charts.

Montgomery Gentry's albums also included number one singles "If You Ever Stop Loving Me," "Something to Be Proud Of," "Lucky Man," "Back When I Knew It All," and "Roll With Me." The band is still together and currently performing on tour throughout the country.

The R&B group "The Moonglows" originated in Louisville and lead singer Harvey Fuqua is also a native of Louisville. Fuqua moved to Cleveland in 1951 where he formed a band called "Crazy Sounds" with Bobby Lester; Danny Coggins and Prentiss Barnes.

The Crazy Sounds later evolved into The Moonglows which would also later include Pete Graves and Billy Johnson. The Moonglows famous singles included "Sincerely," "Most of All," "See Saw" and "Ten Commandments of Love."

Country music singer Doctor Howard Hopkins (AKA Doc Hopkins.) whose first name is 'Doctor" is a native of Wallins Creek, Kentucky. He performed on the WLS National Barn Dance and the WJJD Supper Time Frolic country music programs.

Pete Stamper, a well-known musician, song writer, comedian and author, has been featured on and a part of several Renfro Valley shows, Red Foley's Ozark Jubilee, the Porter Wagner Show, Dolly Parton's Road Show, the Grand Ole Opry and many more.

Stamper is a native of Dawson Springs and a resident of Mt. Vernon. He also wrote and published "It All Happened in Renfro Valley."

The fifth inductee will be country and bluegrass entertainer Larry Cordell. Cordell is a native Kentuckian and most famous for his song "Murder on Music Row," which was recorded by Alan Jackson and George Strait.

Cordel has written songs for Garth Brooks, Ricky Skaggs, Loretta Lynn, Trisha Yearwood, Alison Krauss and other notable musicians. He is currently performing on tour throughout the country.

Clarence Spalding, who is a native of Lebanon, has managed well-known musicians including Ronnie Milsap, Eddie Rabbitt, Brooks & Dunn, Rascal Flatts, Jason Aldean and many more. He has also served as president and chairman of the Country Music Association.

Also inducted will be the well-known pop band The Backstreet Boys. The band consists of Nick Carter, Brian Littrell, Kevin Richardson, A.J. McLean and Howie Dorough.

### Avoid these common student financial aid mistakes

Many students spend more for college than they should by making some common mistakes when seeking financial aid. Follow these tips from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) to make sure you get the help you need.

Some people don't bother to apply for financial aid because they don't think they'll qualify. But they should submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to find out if they're eligible for state and federal student aid programs. Not filing may hurt their chances of getting more free money for col-

Another common mistake is waiting until the last minute to apply for financial aid. Some programs have deadlines, while others have limited funds. Students and families should submit the FAFSA as soon as possible after Jan. 1 of each year,

Colleges send each student who has applied for student aid a financial aid package. Students and their families should look it over caréfully. They should compare offers if they have received offers from more than one


school to see which one is the best deal. Of course, students should also consider other factors, such as whether a school offers the academic program a student wants or if it meets other expectations.

Students who need loans to help pay for college must be good consumers. They should apply for federal student loans before applying for private loans. Not all private lenders offer the same rates and benefits. Borrowers should pay close attention to what lenders call the back-end benefits: the interest rate and principal reductions offered when repaying








### KSP receives reports of scam/fraud on internet

Victims are reporting that they were sent a fraudulent check by mail to deposit in their bank account in order to purchase pre-paid crédit cards at various local businesses in the area. Victims are told this is part of a private company that evaluates employee performance and reports back to their supervisors. After the cards are purchased, the victims are asked to text the card information to different phone numbers that were provided to them by "Esteemed Secret Shopper". For the victim's participation, they are told to keep a portion of the money only to find out days later that the original check provided was

• Never give personal information out over the phone or internet unless you have initiated contact and know who you are speaking

• Immediately call or visit your bank to report suspicious activity on your account that appears concerning or questionable.

• If you are a victim of this type of scam you should contact à law enforcement agency in your area.

### Mamaw's Kitchen

BAKED POTATO CASSEROLE

8 medium potatoes (about 2 and 1/2 to 3 pounds total weight, peeled and cut into 1-inch chunks)

1 cup evaporated 2% milk 1/2 cup light sour cream :: 1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper 2 cups shredded cheddar

cheese (divided) 6 slices bacon (cooked until crispy and crumbled)

Sliced green onions Place the potato chunks in

a large pot. Fill with enough water to cover the potatoes. Bring to a boil. Cook over medium-high heat for 15 to 20 minutes or until tender.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 3-quart casserole dish. Return potatoes to the pot. Add evaporated milk, sour cream, salt and pepper. Beat with a hand held mixer until smooth. Stir in 1 and 1/2 cups of cheddar cheese and half of the bacon. Spoon the potato mixture into prepared casserole dish.
Bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until heated thoroughly. Top with remaining 1/2 cup

of cheddar cheese, remaining bacon, and green onions. Bake for an additional 3 minutes or until the cheese has melted.

DO-AHEAD GARLIC MASHED POTATOES 9 medium-sized potatoes 6 cloves garlic Salt and pepper 3/4 cup milk 1/2 cup heavy cream 1/4 cup butter

Peel potatoes and cut in pieces. Place potatoes and garlic in a large saucepan. Cover with cold water. Cover and heat to boiling; reduce heat to gently simmer for 20 to 25 minutes. Drain. Shake pan over low heat to dry. Using an electric mixer, mash potatoes and garlic until no lumps remain.

In a small sauce pan, heat milk, heavy cream, butter with salt and pepper over medium heat. Stir occasionally, until butter is melted. Set aside 1/4cup milk mixture. Add remaining milk mixture to potatoes in small amounts until potatoes are light and fluffy. Amount of milk mixture needed depends on type of potatoes

Grease a 2-quart casserole. cover and refrigerate up to


When ready to bake, preheat oven to 350 degrees. Pour reserved 1/4milk mixture over potatoes. Bake uncovered for 40 to 45 minutes until hot. Stir potatoes before serving.

The Kentucky Cattlemen's Association, as the certified entity, made an application to the Kentucky Board of Agriculture requesting a referendum to further beef promotion in Kentucky. The Kentucky Board of Agriculture approved the request and a referendum date of November 20, 2014 has

### **USDA** extends Dairy Margin **Protection Program deadlines**

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack, speaking at the National Milk Producers Federation annual meeting, announced extended deadlines for the dairy Margin Protection Program, Farmers now have until Dec. 5, to enroll in the voluntary program, established by the 2014 Farm Bill. The program provides financial assistance to participating farmers when the margin the difference between the price of milk and feed costs falls below the coverage level selected by the farmer.

'We want dairy producers to have enough time to make thoughtful and wellstudied choices," said Vilsack. "Markets change and the Margin Protection" Program can help protect dairy producers from those

Vilsack encouraged producers to use the online at www.fsa.usda.gov/mpptool to calculate the best levels of coverage for their dairy operation. "Historical scenarios also can be explored to see how the Margin Protection Program would function should poor market conditions occur again in the future," said Vilsack. The secure website can be accessed via computer, smartphone or

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) also extended the opportunity for public comments on both the Margin Protection Program and the Dairy Product Donation Program until Dec. 15.

"USDA is committed to creating strong opportunities for the next generation of farmers and ranchers. When dairy producers bring new family members into the business, these changes could affect safety net coverage," said Vilsack. "If our current rules hinder intergenerational changes or if improvements are needed in these programs, then we want to hear from dairy producers.'
