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

Fiscal Court will revamp policy for animal shelter

During Tuesday's regular meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, County Judge/Executive Doug Bishop told the magistrates that he would like for the court to come up with a uniform policy that would get animals in the shelter spayed/neutered before they are adopted.

Bishop said there was already a policy in place that animals adopted from the shelter must be spayed/neutered but that people were not following through after adopting the animals. "We have a fund that gives people a discount to take the animal and have them spayed/neutered but they are not doing it," Bishop said. "I think we have a

School Board votes on amended school calendar and 2015-16 school meal prices

The Rockcastle County School Board amended the school calendar and voted to keep school meal prices the same for the 2015-2016 school year at their monthly board meeting Tuesday night.


Director of Pupil Personnel Becky Isaacs told the board that district personnel had analyzed the food services data and that she spoke with a Kentucky Department of Education consultant about the issue of school meal prices. She said they came to the conclusion that the prices set this year are

enough to "sustain" the food services budget.

The breakfast meal prices for the 2015-2016 school year will remain at \$0.30 for reduced priced student meals, \$1.00 for full priced student meals and \$1.75 for adult priced meals. The lunch meal prices will also remain at \$0.40 for reduced, \$1.95 for full and \$2.95 for adult.

Isaacs said the prices are the same at every school with the exception of a full lunch meal price being \$1.25 for preschool students



Sitting on the front porch glider-swing that Rufus Harrison crafted for Loretta over ten years ago, last Friday morning, enjoying my too-manyth cup of coffee and a bowl full of good English pipe tobacco, waiting for the mail to run, watching the grass grow and, generally, just minding myown business, I heard the rumbling roar, coming from way up the road, a full minute before I saw its cause.

I may never know who owns it nor what it was doing on Charlie Brown Road, but I want the owner of the quintessential, lemon-yellow, "hot rod Lincoln" to know that he absolutely made my day, if not my de+ cade. I had not seen one of these babies since the late 1960's when a few owners would shine them up and drive them in parades in Pikeville, Prestonsburg and

Paintsyille. I believe the popularity of the vehicle was inspired by a band, in the mid 1950's, called Commander Cody and The Lost Planet Airmen. They had a huge hit song, called Hot Rod Lincoln, that received as much radio air play on country music stations as it did on early rock & roll radio, so it may well have been one of the first ever successful "cross-overs" betweenthose genre's., All you have to do to hear the song is google. "hot rod Lincoln" and you will hear why it was so well


received.

The song was still going strong, as late as 1963, on Whitesburg's WTCW, 920 on your AM dial, when Jimmy Branham signed the station on with his country/ bluegrass "show" at 6:00 AM and Ron Statzer shut it down at 6:PMwith his "rock show" "Hot Rod Lincoln" got played at least twice on both programs, along with Bill Monroe and Merle Haggard in the morning and Elvis Presley and Jimmy Gilmer and The Fireballs in the late afternoon.

The hot rod Lincoln was not a Lincoln at all, but a Model-A Ford body and chaises with a V-12 cylinder Lincoln Zephyr motor stuck in the frame where a straight 6 cylinder Ford motor used to be. It was neither practical nor much ingenious because the big Lincoln engine was much stronger, in terms of raw horsepower, than the Ford frame and drive train were made to handle, but it was still a rich boys' favorite toy for a decade or so between 1955 and 1965.

The only one I ever drove and took for a ride was owned by a kid in Pikeville, last name was Coleman, in the summer of 1968. The young man's father had actually built it around 1960 and allowed his son to drive it out to then Boy Scout Camp Shawnee on Dewey Lake, near Prestonsburg,

Grit Magazine

When I was around ten or eleven years of age, the only job I had ever had was moving my grandfather's yard. He paid me fifty cents an hour to complete the job - a more than generous amount for the time. But I mentioned several times to my mother (Bee) that I wished that I could make some extra money. She sawan ad in the Courier Journal deliver a weekly Grit Magazine from door to door. We at least check it out.

Bee called the company in order to find out the particulars of the position. The magazine would be sent on Thursdays so that I could make the sales and delivery it over the weekends. The job did not require any sales pany simply sent me a huge stack of the magazines, and I was to sell them door to

The customer paid 10 cents for each paper, and I was permitted to keep 4. cents for each paper sold not counting tips which usually turned out to be. more than the profit from selling the papers. It is my recollection that I averaged making eight or ten dollars per week. In 1954 that was a HUGE amount of money for a ten-year-old young man. This very profitable position allowed me to visit Helton's Five and Dime and buy all the model cars that I wanted.

Of course, most of my sales were made in my own ... neighborhood, However Bee also took some of them to the Greyhound Bus Station (where she was the ticket agent) and helped me sell a few to her tellow employees. I also took the routes of my friends' streets in Mt. Vernon in order to sell a few copies on Saturday afternoon. That turned out to be a great idea because most of them would not say no to me!

I think the company initially began by sending me 50 copies of the paper. By the end of the first month, I was ordering double that: amount. The contents of the magazine actually appealed to many. Most of the articles were on a national basis with a few that were just funny. For example, the paper in 1954 had five sections included in the 44-page magazine: News, Comics, Family, Women's, and a personal Story section. Ordinary

Grit was sold across the country by children and by teenagers, many recruited by ads in comic books and newspapers. I have discovered that during the 1950's, approximately 30,000 children were delivering the publication's 700,000 copies per week.

The paper had a good reputation for strong family encouraging young boys to values and for telling the truth in its articles. Its first issue was dated "Saturday discussed the possibilities of evening, December 16, the position and decided to 1882," and it is still in publication after 133 years. Today, its format is a glossy, full-color version, although I have not seen one in a very long time.

No one seems to know how the name Grit came to be; however, it is said that it took sheer grit to keep it on of subscriptions. The com- its feet in the early days. One reason for its success was because it was being distributed by children, and families found it almost impossible to say "no" to young boys who were trying to earn some money.

I was an employee of Grit for a period of about two years. I finally stopped when I was old enough to work for my Dad at his service station.

In some ways, it seems like I have come full circle in the domain of publication. After teaching high school chemistry for 38 years, I retired in 2003 and began working as a reporter and photographer for the Clay City Times. That position lasted approximately six years. And my last job was as editor of a locally owned magazine called Focus, which covered ten central and eastern Kentucky

counties. I cannot help but note the irony that my first and my last jobs were for magazines. Maybe selling those Grit newspapers planted something in me that did not come to fruition until my latter years - seems fitting, doesn't it?

It has been quite a journey. The soaps ares one reason I hate having to die. You die and never know how the story line ends.







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

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

Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Amelanchier: The Serviceberry is Pretty and Practical

Attention grabbing white blossoms in the hills and woods edge, and in many a home landscape, are a clue that winter is past and spring arrived. amelanchier or service berry bush or tree is such a versatile native plant, it blooms ahead of Bradford pears, dogwoods or redbuds, and bears delectable purplish blue or reddish purple fruits. Called sarvis, shadbush (named after the little fishes), Juneberry, and Saskatoons, There are some 33 listed species in the world, but probably several are natural hybrids as they are hard to tell apart. This cute, adorable bush (or small tree, depending on species and how many trunks or stems it has) is native to all the United States except

The serviceberries make wonderful low-maintenance trees for the yard. Somewhat the size or a redbud or dogwood in time, the serviceberry grows pretty slow. A few native ones have reached 70 feet in the wild, but that requires a hundred plus years. Some varieties never seem to get much bigger than blueberry bushes. There have been several named cultivars that have been selected and are available in the landscape trade. Autumn Brilliance is one an amelanchier x grandiflora with very good fall color.

A multi-stem serviceberry may make you think of a crepe myrtle, except the blooms are white in March or April and the trunks are smooth until they are old, but don't peel like the crepe myrtle. Think of putting one in your yard as a substitute for a dogwood or crepe myrtle or forsythia.

Sarvis or serviceberries are also edible, and really, fasty (if you beat the birds to them)! They make a won- fairly good yellow orange derful contribution to the pink or red fall color. Con-

sustainable, edible landscape. Plus they are wellbehaved, colorful, are a good host for some butterfly species and are loved by most all birds. I often recommend one in a landscape plan, you can hardly go wrong with this lovely little tree. You don't even have to plant two for pollination as. they are self fruitful—but I'd plant several so the birds don't eat all of them.

Some of the common species in the Appalachian area are: Amelanchier lavies or Allegheny serviceberry; a. arborea perhaps the largest of the trees as I know where there are a few 60 to 70 feet specimens; a. Canadensis, hardy from Georgia to the Hudson Bay in Canada; a. grandiflora, "Autumn Brilliance" being a common patented variety; a. alnifolia, or downy serviceberry, is also know as a Saskatoon, and has larger fruit and more rounded leaves and seldom reaches more than ten feet or so; a. stolonifera is a dwarf; and amelanchier Lamarckii is probably a natural cross made centuries ago in North America. This one is also called Apple Serviceberry, and has probably the best fruit for snacking. It has been widely planted and has naturalized in England.

The hybrids, such as amelanchier x grandiflora and amelanchier Lamarckii are more adaptable to all kinds of soils. They like moisture rather than drought, but they won't tolerate standing water in the planting hole or frequent flooding. In the wild they often

survive on the poorest hillside and light up a grey world before the leaves of most trees come out in the spring. This is a useful shrub or small tree that I highly recommend for landscape plantings. Even if it didn't bloom or have fruit, it would still be a good little tree that Isn't fussy and has some sider it next time you want a new small tree for your

It was a little thing, hardly noticeable, when it occurred, but it was of sufficient importance to remind me of a few lines of verse that I remembered from many years ago. In that yerse, a little child opined, "We have the nicest garbage man, he empties out our garbage can. He's just as nice as he can be, he always stops and talks with me." After that observation. the the little child continued to opine, "My mother doesn't like his smell. But mother doesn't know him well."

Although we have been reminded for centuries that we should not "make a habit of judging others, if you don't want to be judged yourselves," it often occurs in everyday life that value judgments and character assessments, that is, rendering an opinion or an estimate, based on first impressions and insufficient information are made on a regular basis. 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



problem with people adopting pets then getting tired of them and turning them loose for them to breed again and we have more animals to pick up."

Bishop said he would like to see a uniform system that would include animals being spayed/neutered before being put up for adoption. "That is being more humane by not having to euthanize so many animals."

The court also agreed to come up with a policy to deal with all the requests they get for donations to traveling sports teams in the county.

Tim McIntosh was at the meeting to ask for a donation for a traveling girls softball team he coaches but Magistrate Bill McKinney said that since the team had no affiliation with leagues in the county he felt it might not "be legal" for the court to make the donations.

On Bishop's recommendation, the court agreed to work to set a uniform policy to deal with these requests.

The court was fairly generous during the meeting on several requests before them. They made a \$1,000 donation to Katha Carpenter to be used for the Founders Day activities planned for May 8 and 9 at Livingston. They also donated \$1,000 to the City of Brodhead for their Dix River Festival and, they agreed to donate \$1,000 for field rental for the Southplanned for October 2, 3 and. 4 at Renfro Valley and to furnish a dumpster for the

The court also was asked for a \$7,200 donation by Hospice Care Plus which represents \$100 for each patient Hospice cared for in 2014 from Rockcastle County. However. McKinney said that the county's donation to Hospice last year was \$10,000 and he felt this should be the amount donated since Hospice "serves a great purpose. for this county." The motion

passed unanimously The court also agreed to pay \$4,600 for two historical markers to be used to help mark the Daniel Boone Trace in the county. The payment was made at the request of the Kentucky Historical Society.

Donations were also made to the Kentucky Sheriff's Boys and Girls and the Special Olympics of \$250 and \$300, respec-

The court also agreed to front expenses for Kimberly Gibson to attend four days DOC MRT Training in West Virginia. The training is necessary for Gibson, a social worker with the Rockcastle County Detention Center, to administer the "Road to Justice" program which is mandated to be in effect in each county by 2017.

Gibson told the court that a grant will be applied for to reimburse the court for the \$1500 in expenses through County Attorney Billy Reynolds' office.

The court also approved the payment of the court's audit of \$16,902.19 and the audit of the jail commissary of \$6,676.67, along with unemployment insurance premium payments for the sheriff (\$3,000.53) and the fiscal court (\$3,609.80).

The court also found out the premiums for their property/liability insurance and their workmen's compensation for 2015-16. The county's premiums had been locked in for three years but that contract expires as of June 30, 2015. The premiums increased by \$15,775 for property/liability and \$21,000 for workmen's compensation

for a total of \$252,878. Judge Bishop noted that the county was paying insurance on 38 total vehicles and he said an inventory needed to be done so that any unnecessary vehicles could be taken off the insurance plan.

Bishop also told the court that the road department needed several pieces of equipment and he felt they could be purchased cheaper through the state contract.

The court approved up to \$150,000 to be set aside for new equipment.

The court also discussed with RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins payment due the county for damage to the former Anchor Packaging building when the company moved out. Inglinebi. - gang I

The court was originally told that Anchor would repay the county for damage to two doors and to the concrete floor while Anchor was in the process of moving out.

However, when the bills for the repairs were submitted to Anchor, the county was told they would have to recover damages from the third party involved in providing moving services for Anchor.

McKinney also reminded Hopkins that there are still several lights out in

the industrial park that had been pointed out to her some time ago. Hopkins said she had called her contact at Jackson Co. RECC twice about the lights but had not received a call back.

and \$1.70 for kindergarten through fifth grade students.

Board member Angela Stallsworth Mink asked if the proposed 2015-2016 meal prices would keep them in compliance with the federal law that requires meal prices be raised at least \$0.10 every year until a full paying student is paying

Isaacs said that she asked the KDE consultant about that particular federal law and she said they told her that they are no longer using that model for food services. She said the KDE consultant assured her that they wouldn't be reviewed on that model and that the data collected from food services showed that this school year's prices were sufficient.

The board agreed unanimously to keep the school meal prices the same for the 2015-2016 school year.

Isaacs also updated the board about the possibility of all students receiving free meals under the Community Eligibility Provision. The CEP program allows high poverty schools to offer both breakfast and lunch to all students regardless of their parents' or guardians' income.

Isaacs said they have submitted the required information to KDE and that they are already reviewing their data and making suggestions. She said KDE consultants told her that the number of students receiving free meals are high, enough for the school district to consider the CDE program.

Isaacs asked the board to give permission for the district to start the application process for the CEP program while district personnel continues to weigh the "financial feasibility" of the program. The board granted permission to begin the CEP application process.

Isaacs went on to propose an amended 2014-2015 school calendar to the board.

Isaacs said that the state legislature passed the same provisions as last school year for inclement weather days. She said the state legislature removed the required 170 school days but kept the required 1,062 school hours in place, which ultimately gives school districts more flexibility with amending their calendars.

Rockcastle County Schools have missed 17 days because of inclement weather. She said the amended calendar calls for school to be dismissed for Election Day on Tuesday, May 19th and Memorial Day on Monday, May 25th.

Isaacs said that the last day of school will be Friday, May 29th and that the Rockcastle County High School graduation will be on Thursday, May 28th at 6

The superintendent's personnel action report showed three classified hirings of Kathy Owens as RES cook/baker, Mikhael Shaffer as RCMS assistant baseball coach and Zackary McClure as a lawn care worker.

Resignations were Sarah Hasty as RCHS girl's assistant basketball coach and Lee Tran as a RCHS math teacher.

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





and make the best option for smallmouth bass right now.

"This is a time when you can catch some of the biggest stream smallmouth of the year as they prepare to spawn," Baker said. "They are a little more accessible and easier to catch."

Wading is an excellent way to fish smaller streams for smallmouth bass, especially after the recent high water events likely undercut many streamside trees, tip ping them over into the stream, providing potentially dangerous impediments to paddling.

The streams in southcentral Kentucky near Bowling Green in the Barren River drainage such as the Gasper River and the Drakes Creek system are good places to try.

"The Gasper usually will come down pretty quickly," Baker said. "We do see smallmouths up to 18 inches and we get reports of 20 inchers from Gasper.".

Baker said the Drakes Creek system drains a large geographical area in karst topography and takes longer to flow out, but contains a healthy population of smallmouth bass from 12 to 16 inches long, with a few in the 18-inch range.


The Drakes Creek sys-

tem and Gasper River are part of the Warren County Blueways, a cooperative project from governmental. agencies, Western Kentucky University and other groups to provide access to streams in south-central Kentucky. website The www.trailsrus.com/ blueways/ contains good information on access points with a detailed map. Baker said those streams

flowing through public land in eastern Kentucky provide productive wading fishing opportunities 5 for smallmouths. The Middle Fork of the Red River inside Natural Bridge State Resort Park in Powell County holds a decent population of smallmouth bass with good access.

Rock Creek inside the Daniel Boone National Forest in McCreary County offers wading anglers easy access with roads paralleling the creek for most of its length. The best fishing is upstream of Rock Creek's junction with White Oak Creek. Rock Creek is known





The Russell Fork in Pike County offers several productive public wading spots for smallmouths. The public river access at Ratliff Hole (also known as Potters Ford) inside the boundaries of Breaks Interstate Park on KY 80 south of Elkhorn City makes one of the most scenic wading spots in Ken-

Wading anglers may also access the Russell Fork at Carson Island Access via Carson Island Road off KY 80, just east of Elkhorn City. The Elkhorn City Park in downtown Elkhorn City grants anglers public wading access to a productive stretch of the Russell Fork.

Elkhorn Čreek in ranklin County fishes welk [even when the water is up a bit. Anglers may wade fish the Elkhorn at T.N. Sullivan Wildlife Management Area off KY 1262 and at the two Voluntary Public Access spots near the junction of Peaks Mill Road (KY 1900) and KY 1262.


All the lures you need for a successful wade easily fit inside a cigar box. A pack of 1/8-ounce leadheads, some black finesse worms, a bag of green-pumpkin tube baits along with a bag of 4-inch Senko type soft plastic jerkbaits in the same color all catch stream smallmouths, Add a floating/diving minnow lure like a Rapala and you're set.

"Look for gravelly bottoms adjacent to the current," Baker said. "A lot of times you can see the smallmouths in spring. Pitch a fube or soft plastic bait rigged on a leadhead near them and they will attack. Also, work areas adjacent to current with a soft plastic jerkbait or a floating/ diving minnow for .. smallmouths. The thing I love most about smaller streams is that any cast can be a good one."


Livingston Community Lions and Leo Club to host Red Bud Ride Stop


Livingston begins in London, goes through Rockcastle and Jackson counties before ending back in London, its host city.

WonsleyBaker was born 1762 in Frederick Co. Maryland and died sometime after 1840 in Laurel Co. KY. According to his application, pension Wonsleygave the following account of his service on I October 1836 in Rockcastle. Co. KY at the age of seventy four. He was drafted out to Captain Brashear's Militia in the county of Frederick, state of Maryland in the fall of the year or rather he was drafted he thought in the last of August and went to service about the first of September. He could not remember the date of the year, but it was in the year that General Burgoyne was taken by General Gates and about six weeks before as he believed (October

He marched out under Captain Abraham Huff as a guard and was stationed about one mile and one half from the town of Frederick in the state of Maryland where he remained a guard in actual service until sometime in March following and until his term of service had expired. He was well

1777).

Gates, Captain Shreeker and Captain Bell and played the fife at the militia musters for and to enlighten the com-munity about the service He received a discharge from his Captain but had lost from his Captain but had lost it long since. He had no documenting evidence of his service but offered to the testimony of Bazel Baker

and PL Parker. After the Revolution, Wonsleymoved to Virginia and from there to Kentucky in Madison County and from there to Laurel. He applied for his pension in Rockcastle County because he lived too far out in the country in Laurel County and it was too difficult at his age to make the journey to court in his county. It was closer to file his papers in Rockcastle. Wansley's pension application was rejected by the government on the basis that he served less than six months.

Wonsley was married to Charity Phelps (1766-1853) and had at least eight children according to census records. Their names are not listed in his pension papers or in the census. The possible children of Wonsley Charity were: WonsleyBaker (1784 NC-1850 Madison Co. KY) married Letty Henderson Wonsleylli. Wonsley Jr. Baker served in the 2ndRegime (Jennings) KY Volunteers as



Rockcastle, Russell, Scott, Shelby, Spencer, Taylor, Whitley and Wolfe.

Volunteers are not required to reside in the county where a board meets.

The Kentucky General Assembly created the state CFCRB in 1982 as a way to decrease the time children spend in foster care, CFCRB volunteers review Cabinet for Health and Family Services files on children placed in out-of-home care and work with the cabinet and courts on behalf of the state's foster children. The volunteer reviewers help ensure that children receive the necessary services while in foster care and are ultimately placed in permanent

All volunteers must complete a six-hour initial training session and consent to a criminal record and Central Registry check. A recommendation is then made to the chief judge of the Dis2 trict Court or Family Court for appointment.







Yards to Paradise
