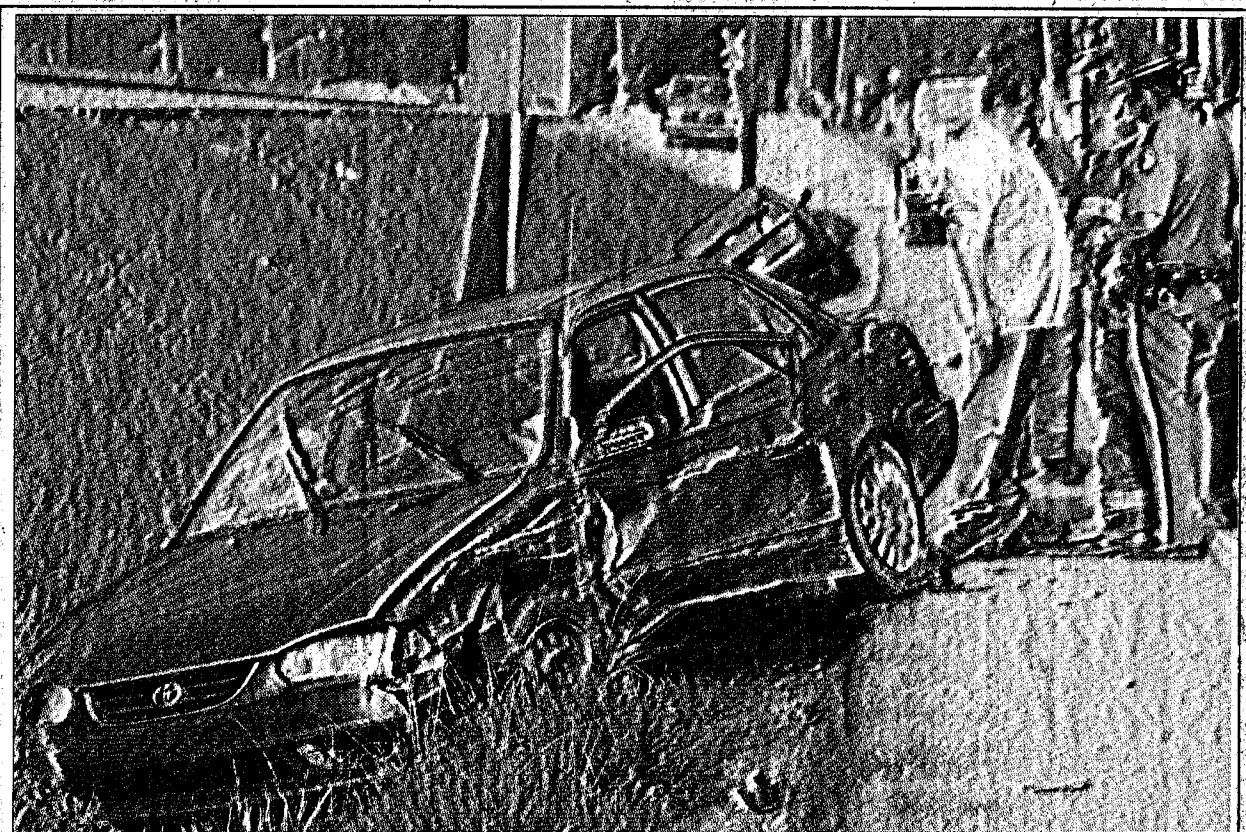

Mt. Vernon Council approves personnel ordinance and new healthcare plan

The Mt. Vernon City Council passed the second reading of their personnel changes ordinance and approved changing the employees' healthcare plans which saves the city almost \$100,000.

The meeting got off to an awkward start when councilmember Cliff Mullins voted "no" on the minutes from the March council meeting. Mayor Mike Bryant asked Mullins if he had an issue with them and Mullins replied "yes." Bryant asked if it was something that could be discussed and Mullins replied "yeah" but that he would like to discuss it "behind closed doors."

The second reading of the ordinance to change the personnel policy was the first item of business during the meeting. The policy rearranges several city positions and creates a new po-

sition.

The policy renames the former tax administrator position as the city administrator. The policy also calls for several changes to, and rearrangement of, positions in the public works department. The former superintendent of public works, assistant superintendent of public works, chief sewer plant operator and chief water plant operator have now all been combined into wastewater superintendent and water superintendent positions. The policy also creates the position of Lake Linville Manager which oversees the city's marina, restaurant, RV park, park and other recreational centers at Lake Linville.

After no discussion or questions about the personnel ordinance, the council unanimously approved the second reading of the ordi-

Man injured in hit and run

A Lincoln County man was the victim of a hit and run accident around 4:30 p.m. last Thursday on Hwy 150 near Citizens Bank in Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, Homer R. Hendrickson, 70, of Crab Orchard was traveling west on Hwy 150 when another

vehicle, traveling east on Hwy 150, crossed the center line and collided with Hendrickson's vehicle. The collision sent both vehicles in the ditch along the roadway.

Hendrickson was transported to Rockcastle Regional Hospital where he was treated for non-life threatening injuries. Witnesses told officers that the driver of the other vehicle fled the scene and was picked up by another motorist.

The accident is still under investigation by the Kentucky State Police and Trooper Delzie Kelly is in charge of the investigation. Kelly said they have a suspect in the accident but their name has not been released.

A Laurel County man was arrested on meth charges last Thursday after police found more than five grams of crystal meth inside his vehicle.

Arrested at the scene was Clemous R. Tabor, 46, of London.

According to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, Deputy Brandon McIntosh responded to several calls received by Rockcastle 911 about a reckless driver near I-75 exit

59 in Mt. Vernon.

McIntosh caught up with the reckless driver, later identified as Tabor, as he was merging on I-75 southbound at exit 59. McIntosh attempted to make a traffic stop on Tabor's vehicle but Tabor did not stop his vehicle until he reached the 55 mile marker on southbound I-75.

Once McIntosh approached the vehicle, he asked Tabor to step out of

Police chase leads to arrest for meth

A local man was arrested for manufacturing meth last Thursday after he attempted to flee police on North Wilderness Road in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Joseph Alexander Dawson, 39, of Berea.

According to state police reports, Troopers Scottie Pennington and Ben Graves noticed Dawson speeding on North Wilderness Road in the Conway area. When officers attempted to make a traffic stop, Dawson fled at a high rate of speed and officers lost sight of Dawson's vehicle.

After searching the area, officers found Dawson's vehicle abandoned on nearby Little Clear Creek Road. The vehicle's driver-side door was open and officers could also see several items used to manufacture meth inside the vehicle.

Upon further investigation, officers received infor-

mation that Dawson was at a residence on Little Clear Creek Road near the area where they had found his abandoned vehicle. Officers

The free event is at the EKV Manchester Campus in Manchester and everyone is invited to attend. The event will begin at 11 a.m.

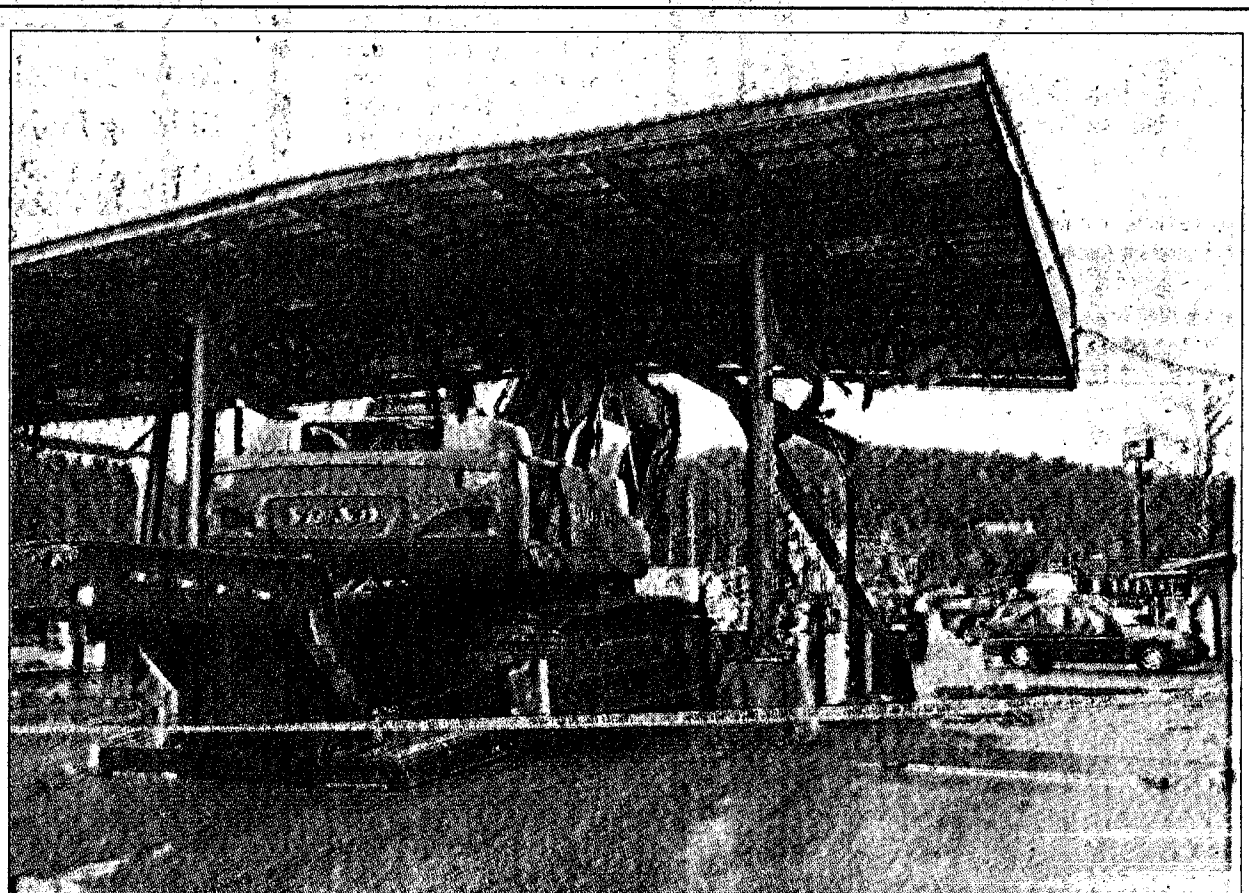

This is probably way too much information for you

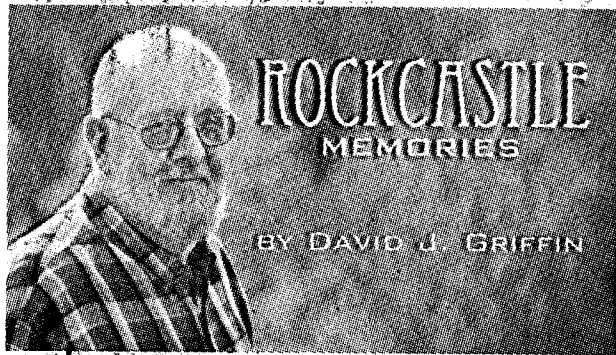
readers but I was truly astounded because it's one of the few times that I have been felled with one of the "bugs" that traips through the community with regularity.

Lifelong Photographer
Now that I am retired, I have a lot more time to surf the Internet looking for information on things in which I have an interest. I typed the following into my Mozilla search engine: "100 Best Photographs of All Time" and was overwhelmed by the results. Photos displayed twelve at a time appeared on my screen, and I was highly impressed by the profes-

sionalism of them. Included in the selections were: portraits, nature scenes, animals, and children.

Photography has always been one of my life's passions. As I have probably mentioned before, I received a nifty Brownie Hawkeye camera as a gift when I was in elementary school. In those days, black-and-white photographs were used most because of the prohibitive cost involved in processing color.

I remember sitting in the rafters at Memorial Coliseum when the Mt. Vernon Red Devils made it to the state tournament. I could barely see the basketball court, so I held my Brownie high above my head and snapped a shot. When the film was developed, I had a wonderful picture of one of our guards making a jump shot. That photo, along with the fact that I had my own camera, set me on a path that I have followed in one form or another until this day.

After I began my teaching career in 1965, I purchased my first 35 mm camera, a Ricoh with interchangeable lenses. Once I began using it, I was truly hooked. Of the 38 years that I taught high school, 35 of those years I was also the Yearbook Advisor at two different schools -- Mt. Sterling High and George Rogers Clark High in Winchester, Kentucky. In 1976, the Mt. Sterling yearbook was awarded a National First Place Award by Columbia Scholastic Press Association. I was elated.

I was not only pleased for myself, that year was the school's final one. The following year, it was consolidated with the local county school. Therefore, it seemed somehow appropriate that our yearbook staff ended things on such a high note. I found it quite gratifying.

I soon decided that I needed a better camera. I chose a Nikon F2S, which was the camera that the United States took to the moon in 1969. Because of my love for photography, I

During my earliest years, there in the head of Blair Branch, my Dad would get the itch to trade off the mule he had fed all winter and get one better suited for spring plowing. Which, of course, brings into question, why on earth he had kept the mule all winter to begin with? I suppose it was so he could have something besides the cow and chickens to feed all that corn and fodder that he'd slaved to raise and get into the barn the previous year. And Heaven knows he couldn't have done that without the mule.

That, plus the fact that mules didn't fetch nearly as much, price wise, at the fall stock sale and if he'd sold him then, he wouldn't have had anything to trade on come spring. My Dad, at that time in his life, fancied himself a muletrader from way on back. He was proud of the reputation that you couldn't trade nickels with him without throwing in a penny to boot. He would often trade milk cows so frequently that they didn't even have time to get used to their new names. Sometimes mules only lasted on our place for the week between Saturday auctions at the Isom, Kentucky "Stock Sale."

He'd bring one home and discover that he or she walked too fast or too slowly or that it was bad to "take the studs", meaning it would "balk" and simply stop right in the middle of whatever he had it doing and just stand there walling its eyes and swishing its tail and refusing to move its feet. Sometimes he'd discover that it didn't know gee from haw, gidup from whoa, that it was blind in one eye or couldn't hear thunder.

In other words, it took one heck of a mule to suit my Dad. But the truth of the matter is that he didn't mind bringing home a "plug" because that gave him an excuse to go back to the Stock Sale and, in essence, try to trade up to a better model.

But all that was before he brought Ole Dock home one spring in the late 50's.

Dock was not a mule. He was a 1600 pound Percherondraft horse that

Dad purchased for logging timber. He dwarfed any mule that I had ever seen and nobody at the time, Dad included, would have ever believed he had any utility when it came to plowing a garden because he was about a thousand pounds too big and either one of his front feet would have covered at least 4 mule tracks.

During the first two or three years that we had Old Dock, Dad also kept a plow mule on the place. Unlike most mules, Old Dock was very loveable, possessed a friendly disposition, thrived on affectionate petting and, to this day, I believe he thought he was a dog. I know, for sure that my Mom loved him better than any dog we'd ever had on the place. Suffice to say that the merest hint that he might sell or trade Ole Dock generated enough ire that Dad, very rapidly dropped the notion.

Dad also discovered that he could turna bottom under with Ole Dock in about half the time required with a mule. A bottom turning plow is about 4 times heavier and as many times harder for a draft animal to pull than a bull tongue plow that was used to prepare most gardens for plowing. Mules have to stop and rest very frequently and they are notorious for doing just that. The old saw, "stubborn as a mule" is well earned, even though most things, other than my wife, aren't.

But pulling a turning plow was scarcely more strenuous to Dock than a leisurely stroll around the pasture because he was accustomed to pulling saw logs that more than a ton.

I'm not exactly sure how it happened but one spring somebody offered Dad more than twice as much cash for a little chestnut mare mule, than he thought she was worth. Her name was Mertand she turned out to be the last mule we ever had on the place because her absence enabled Dad to discover that Dock was just as nimble at plowing a garden as a mule and far better at the chore than most.

opened a professional studio on Main Street in Mt. Sterling. I continued teaching, but I operated my own studio for over ten years. With the help of an assistant/secretary and occasionally an additional photographer, we concentrated on portraits, weddings, and commercial photography.

It was hard work but I loved it. Even though it has been years and years since I ceased doing professional photography, I still get the occasional inquiry as to whether I still shoot weddings. (For the record, I do not.)

During this time, one day I was driving my automobile on a backroad in Mt. Sterling, and I saw the most beautiful sunset that I had ever witnessed. I immediately stopped my car, pulled out my trusty camera and began taking multiple shots as the sun slowly disappeared over the horizon. It was a spellbinding beauty. One of those photographs was entered in a national Professional Photographers of America (PPA) contest and won second place. That photo, now mounted on canvas, hangs in my home today.

Once the digital age arrived, I purchased a Canon EOS 6D and began storing my photos on my PC and on my laptop. That involved a significant learning curve for me because all of my photographic knowledge revolved around using negatives or slides and storing them in a physical location. Now I use "flash drives" to store my most important photos. That Canon also came equipped with software which enables me to alter my photographs even after I am away from a shoot. That, I must say, seems almost magical to me.

I am now also using my iPhone to capture images that do not need to be of a professional nature. I believe that I have a bank of more than 700 photos on my phone. Old habits are hard to break.

As the processes of photography evolved, so did I and my equipment. These days, shooting good photographs is not anywhere near as demanding as it was with film. When I am trying to capture a vision that is important to me, I simply vary my exposures and shoot oodles of images. Then, when I am at my computer, I select the ones that are worthy and discard the remaining frames.

That was never a feasible approach using film because it would have cost a fortune. Today, once you buy the

camera, you have most everything that you need. Additionally, having an instant view of each shot located on the backside of a camera saves so much time, not to mention money.

From big blue flashbulbs to digital strobe lights, photography has come a long way. And so have I. And I must admit that, with my increasing age, I'm very happy that getting the shot that you desire is so much easier!

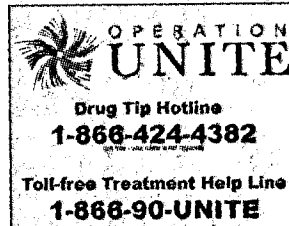

story short, Ole Dock taught all three of my younger brothers and me to plow. He was patient with us too. During the learning process, when we would accidentally let the plow run out of a furrow or a tad too deeply into unplowed ground, he would stop, turn his big head and stare us down until the plow was righted. If we got to the end of the furrow and needed to turn right but, in-

stead, commanded "haw" instead of "gee", Dock would stop and turn his head as if to ask, "Are you sure about that?" I'm reasonably sure that I'm not the only person who has frequently apologized to a horse.

By the time my brother, Keith, was 9 and I was 11 we were plowing most of the gardens on Blair Branch and even Doty Creek and Spring Branch after school and on Saturdays. If the ground stayed dry enough we could earn more money in a week in April, than Dad did shoveling coal for 50 hours in a deep, dark mine.

My old Troybilt horse tiller has finally bit the dust and it pains me to no end that a new one is going to cost me about 3 times as much as my Dad paid for old Dock. I probably don't need to be telling you which one I'd rather have even though my little garden would not come close to getting Ole Dock through a hard winter.

Yards to Paradise

Arbor Day and Tree Planting

As much as Arbor Day is in the news, now is a good time to ask where does this holiday come from, and why.

A man named J. Sterling Morton moved from Michigan to Nebraska in the 1800's and found almost no trees. He missed the trees he was used to, and came up with the idea for a tree planting holiday on January 4, 1872. So, the Nebraska legislature took the idea and passed the first Arbor Day law. Arbor Day was celebrated that year on April 10, 1872, and over a million trees were planted in Nebraska on that day.

Today the J. Sterling Morton Arboretum in Nebraska City, Nebraska commemorates and continues the legacy of Mr. Morton. The Arbor Day Foundation, a 501 (3) c charitable organization, was founded on the centennial of the first Arbor Day. Arbor Day has spread to many nations. In the United States the date is the last Friday in April each year. (Many communities choose to celebrate on other days.) ArboDay.org or a search on the web for the Morton Arboretum will give those interested a more in depth history.

Basically, it's the "Tree City" program that most people seem to be aware of. I suppose this is because of all the "tree city" signs as one crosses into the city

limits of many towns across the nation.

No matter where you live or if you live in the Plains where hardly any trees once existed, adding some lovely trees to your landscape at this time of year can be an interesting adventure, contribute to the improvement of your world, and do a bit of good in the big scheme of things as more trees are cut and more land is dozed for development.

(Interesting Fact: You don't think the Plains Indians would have burned 'buffalo chips' for fuel if there was wood readily available do you?)

This spring I invite you to plant a tree. Maybe a shade tree. Maybe a fruit tree. Maybe a flowering tree. (Or all three in one tree for that matter.) And if you don't own a place, maybe you could donate a tree to a city or factory or school near where you live.

Just like the small bare root trees the Arbor Day Foundation sells, you can go small. You don't have to plant a big expensive tree in order to participate.

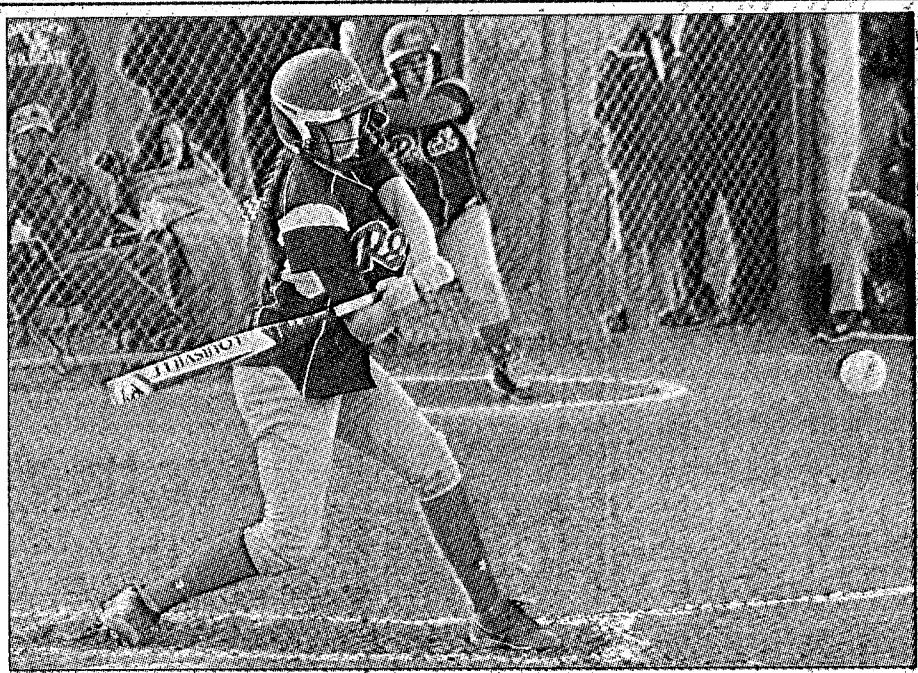

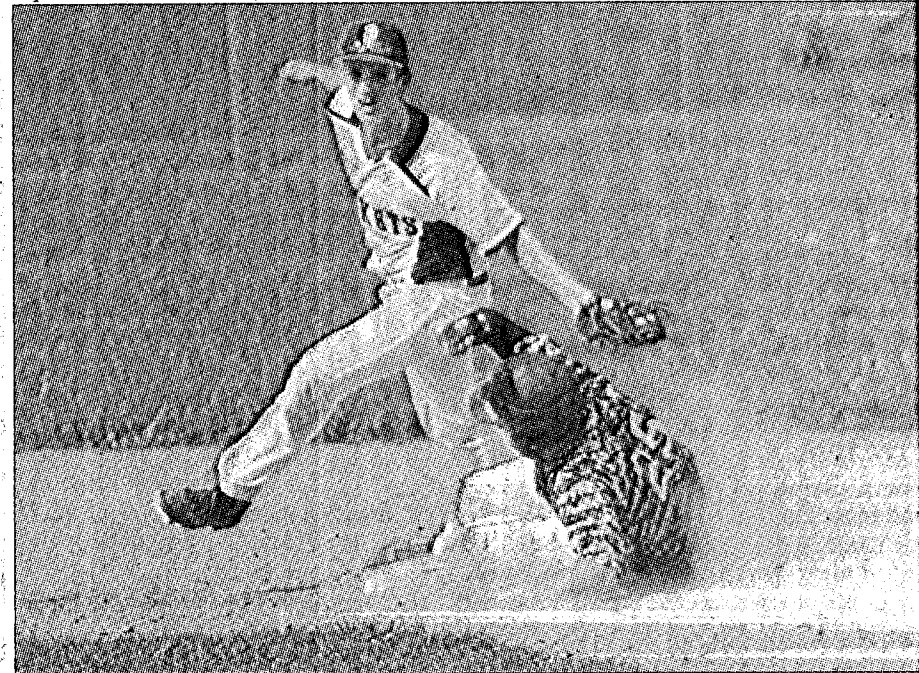

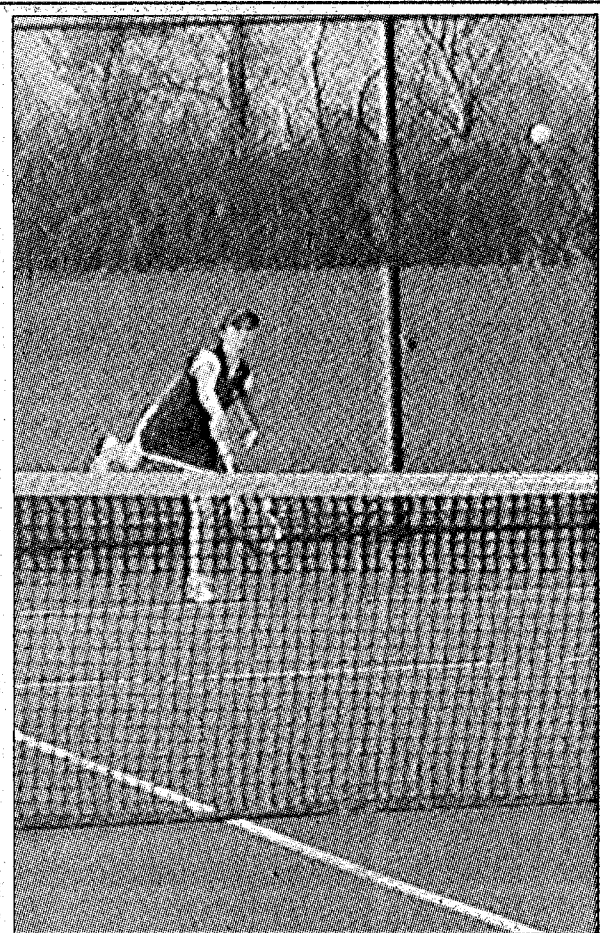

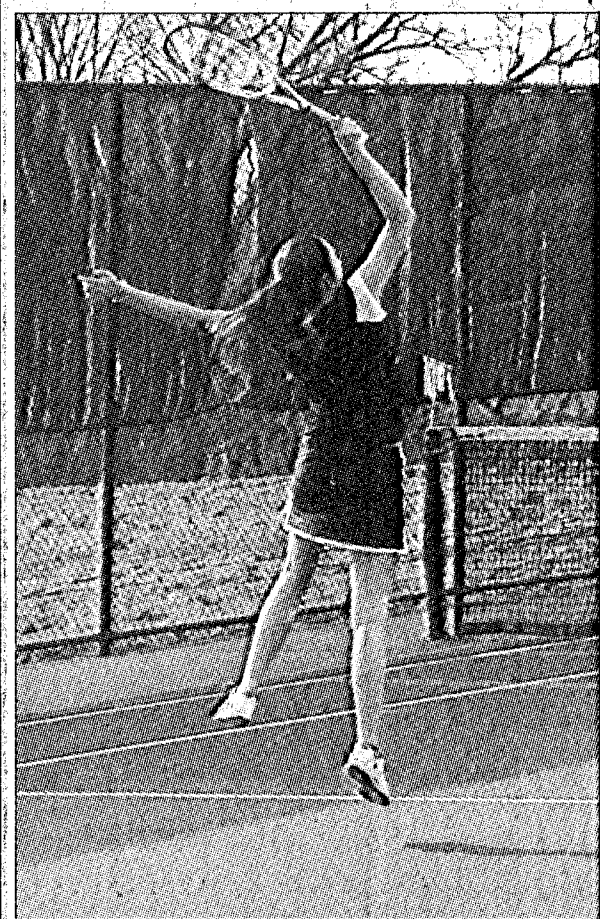

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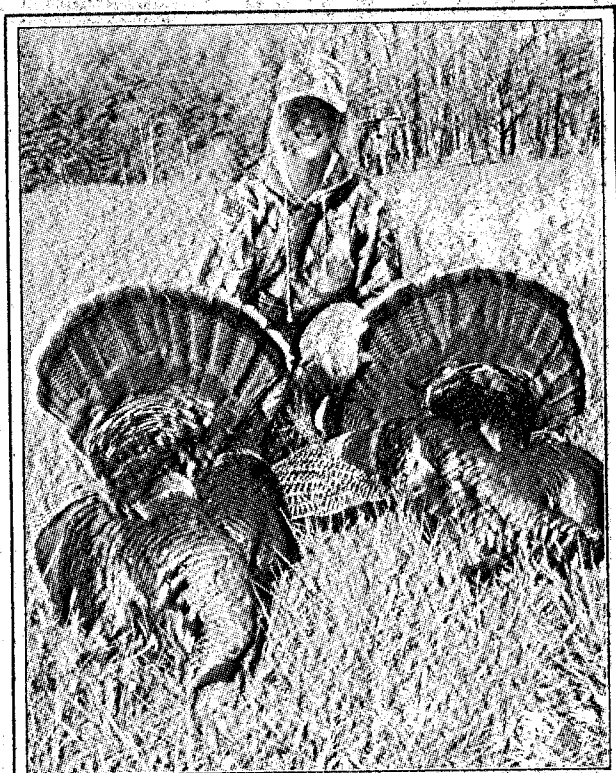
TJ Comer attending meet-and-greet Thursday at National Heritage Inn

nance.

A representative from the Kentucky League of Cities attended the meeting to propose a new health plan for city employees that would save the city around \$8,222.73 a month or \$98,672.78 a year.

Bryant said that the KLC plan has increased benefits for employees at a reduced price. The KLC representative told the council that the lowered premium for better benefits is a result of a "stable and healthy group of employees."

The council, unanimously passed the new healthcare plan with the Kentucky League of Cities.

Bryant also said that Bible Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon had asked for permission to use the city's parking lot for a fundraiser. Bryant said the city ordinance states that approval from the council is needed for people, groups or organizations to use the city parking lot for yard sales or fundraisers.

Bryant said that Bible Baptist requested the use of the city parking lot so they could have a fundraiser in order to raise money for a mission trip. Everyone on the council voted yes with the exception of Mullins

who voted no. The motion passed with a majority vote.

A concerned citizen, who recently had a water leak at her residence while she was gone for approximately two weeks, was also present at the meeting. She said the leak left her with around a \$900 water bill. She was concerned about how she would pay the large bill and asked if the ten percent penalty would be applied to the unpaid balance each month.

Mayor Mike Bryant said every government or utility organization has a "penalized" system and he said the city approves payment plans for "good-paying" customers who aren't trying to "beat the system." He also said that the penalty is just applied one time as long as the customer contacted them and agreed to a payment plan.

The concerned citizen also asked if there was a device that could be hooked to a water meter to alert homeowners if they had a leak. Bryant said that the city is always trying to stay updated with the latest technology and that water employees check the meters once a month.

Master Musicians Festival releases McFerron painting

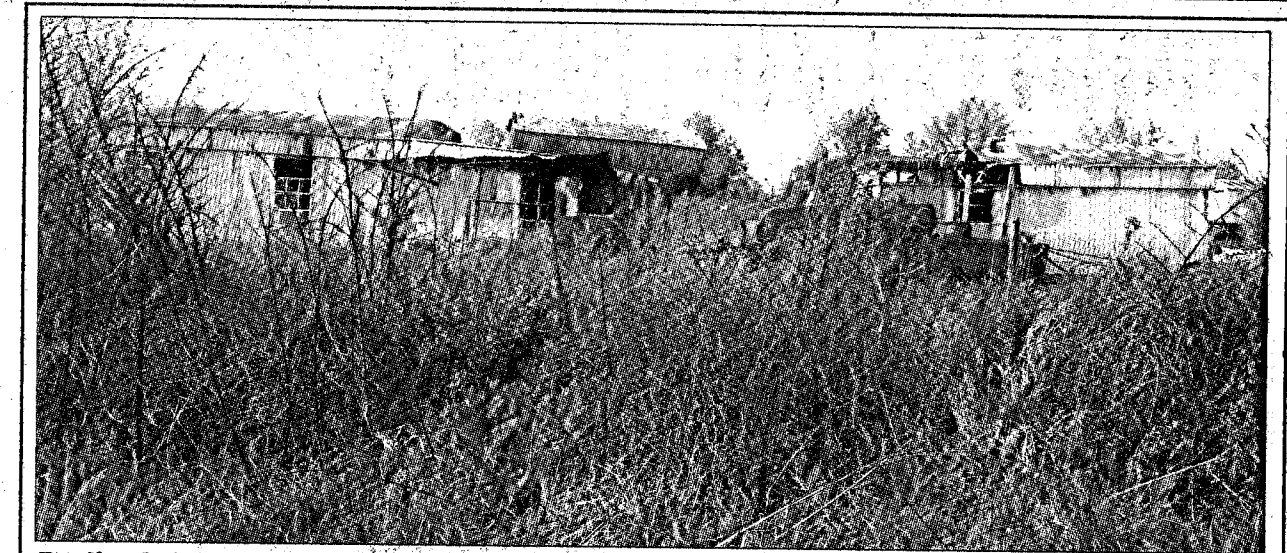

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I have compiled highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years of 1818 and 1842. All information was taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. Joel Watson - Virginia

Joel Watson is somewhat of a mystery. There are very few records of any kind about this man. The only record of his service during the American Revolution is found in the pension appli-

cation of Rockcastle County Patriot, John Ham. In 1824, Mr. Watson gave an affidavit on behalf of John Ham stating that he was acquainted with John in the Continental Army in Virginia. He served under General Greene in North Carolina and was a soldier in the Army under Colonel Daniel Morgan's Rifle Regiment. He is not in the muster rolls nor did he apply for a pension of his own.

It is believed by some researchers that he was born about 1764 in North Carolina. He would later move to Virginia. Joel is listed in the 1810 Census living in Washington Co. VA with his wife and four sons and four daughters. After the Revolution, Joel migrated to Kentucky. He is listed in the 1819 Tax List of Rockcastle, owning one horse with value of \$40.00. In 1820, Joel is listed owning 80 acres on Negro Creek and three horses listing total value of \$250.00. He is listed in the tax records of Rockcastle through 1825. The only Joel Watson in the 1830 Census is Joel's son, Joel Jr. living in Rockcastle County.

Joel's death date and final resting place is unknown to this researcher.

Joel and his unnamed spouse produced at least eight children. Only three names of those children have been found, Mary Watson (1790 VA-23 March 1857 Rockcastle Co. KY) married Samuel Carson (1783 VA-1847 Rockcastle Co. KY) in 1827. Samuel was the grandson of Patriot, James Dysart. She died from cancer. Samuel is buried at the Rock Springs Church Cemetery in Rockcastle Co. KY. It is thought that Mary is also in that cemetery in an unmarked grave. They had at least three children. William Watson (1795 VA-October 1852 Rockcastle Co. KY) was married and had at least nine children. Joel Watson Jr. (1801- Garrard Co. KY) was married and had at least six children (listed in the 1840 Census living in Garrard Co. KY).

As to date, no descendant of Joel Watson has joined the Daughters of the American Revolution. He would be considered a new Patriot for the Society.

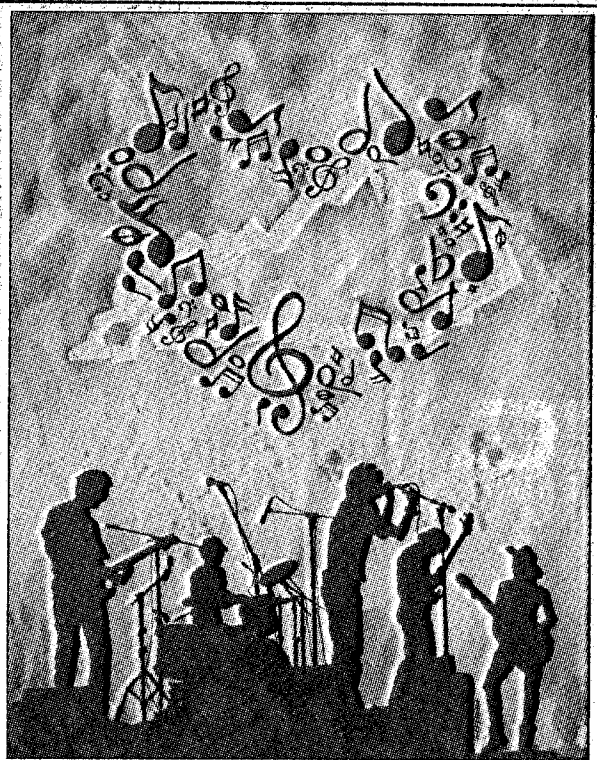

The council is still working to increase student access to technology and plans on doing so until there is full

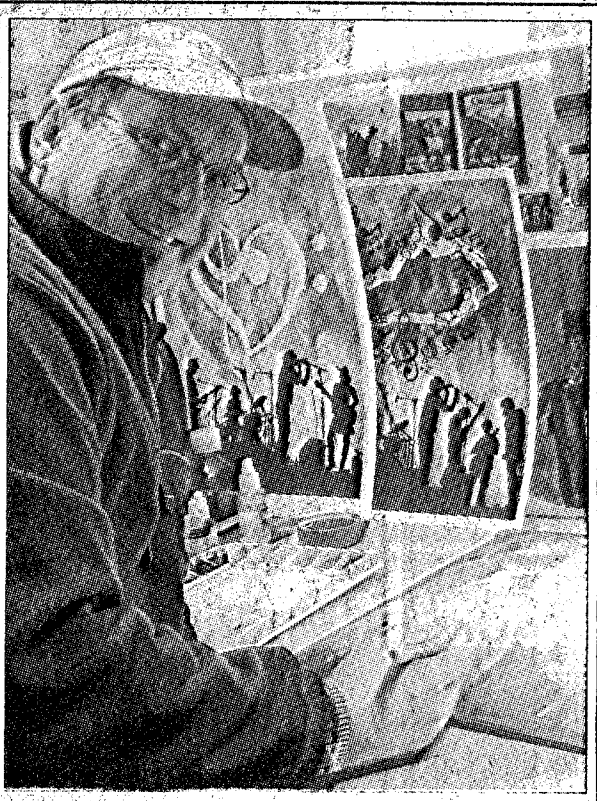
access to technology in the classroom.

Kentucky artist Mark McFerron's painting, For the Love of Music.

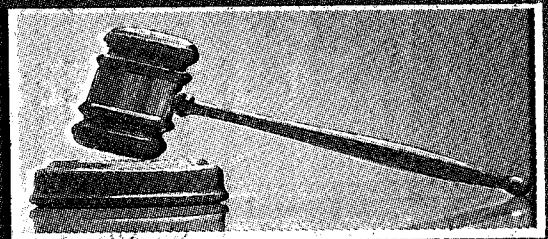

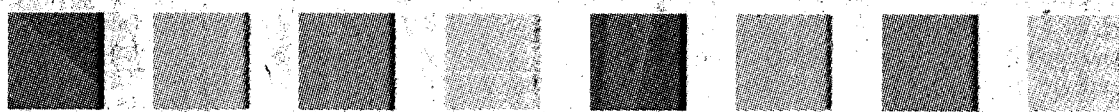

Mulch, mold and fungi

Mulch can be beneficial in many ways on plant beds, around foundation shrubs and other gardening locations in your yard, but mold can threaten its benefits.

In landscape beds and gardens, mulch helps control weeds, prevent extreme soil temperature fluctuation, decrease water evaporation and, improve drainage. Mulch also reduces mower and string trimmer damage on shrubs and trees by suppressing vegetation near their trunks. As it decomposes, mulch produces organic materials to improve soil and otherwise benefit plants.

You need to periodically re-apply mulch to continually get these benefits.

Nuisance fungi occasionally grow on mulch. They include shotgun fungus, slime molds, stinkhorns, earthstars and toadstools.

The shotgun fungus shoots masses of tiny black spore structures onto adjacent surfaces such as vehicles and home siding.

Slime molds are more unsightly than harmful. They don't cause plant diseases and aren't parasitic. Slime mold spores usually appear from late spring to fall. Abundant wet weather stimulates above-ground appearance of these fungi that initially appear slimy but quickly become dry and powdery when converting into spore masses. You'll often see slime molds quickly appear and usually disappear in one to two weeks. They tend to reproduce in the same location every year.

Fungicide use isn't recommended because slime molds aren't harmful. When mulch hasn't been

composted, it might contain fungi that cause plant diseases. This situation is rare, however, and only occurs in non-composted mulch. Plant material fertility problems can arise when fungi in decomposing mulch remove nitrogen from the soil.

Insufficient moisture problems can develop when fungi permeate thick layers of dry mulch creating a surface that's difficult for water to penetrate.

To gain the most benefit, you should use composted mulch with a high bark content and little wood material. Avoid finely ground, woody products that haven't been composted.

If you buy fresh wood chips from a tree-maintenance firm, add water to the chips and allow them to partially compost for about six weeks. If this material doesn't have fresh leaves, you can add some nitrogen to speed up the process. Avoid using fresh or partially composted wood chips near the house foundation because they can provide a food source for termites.

Immediately after you put mulch around plants or trees, soak it with water to enhance bacterial activity to initiate decomposition. Periodically wet mulch during the growing season.

Avoid soured mulch because it tends to injure plants. You can spot sour mulch by its acrid odor.

CABBAGE AND MEATBALLS

SAUTÉ in a large skillet:

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 onion, finely sliced
- ADD to the onion mixture and cook for 10 minutes
- 1 can (10 ounce) tomato soup

- 2 cups chopped tomatoes
- 1/2 cup sliced celery
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley
- 1 teaspoon sugar

- WASH and slice one head of green cabbage. Boil or steam until tender. Add to above sauce. MIX together in a large bowl.
- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 cup cooked white rice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Form meat mixture into balls with a tablespoon. Place into greased casserole dish. Pour sauce over meatballs. Cover tightly. Bake at 350° for 45 to 60 minutes.

KRISTIE'S CABBAGE SALSA

This recipe is courtesy of Jeff Williams and his wife. Jeff and I worked at Atlantic Credit Union in Malvern, Pennsylvania. As a matter of fact, he is the one who taught me all I know about being a

teller. Adjust the amount of jalapeños to reflect your own taste. The quantity of tomatoes varies by size of cabbage.

- Head of cabbage, shredded
- 1 or 2 cloves of garlic, finely minced
- 1 jalapeño finely chopped
- Juice of 1 or 2 limes
- 1 red onion finely chopped
- Plum Tomatoes, seeded and chopped
- Cilantro to taste
- Mix everything together. Add salt to taste.

FRIED CABBAGE

This is my favorite way to cook cabbage. Mum and I both liked this almost burnt.

- 6 slices bacon
- Salt
- 1 head green cabbage, shredded
- Pepper
- 1 t. sugar, if desired
- Wash cabbage and cut in half. Slice cabbage as thinly as possible (as if to make cole slaw). Fry bacon until crispy and fat has been rendered. Remove from skillet. Add cabbage to skillet. Sprinkle with sugar (if desired), salt and pepper. Over medium heat, fry for 10 to 15 minutes, stirring occasionally, until cabbage is tender and browned. Crumble bacon over fried cabbage and serve.
