Storm causes damage and brings large hail to county

An unusual storm system moved through the state last Saturday, bringing golf ball size hail to several sections of Rockcastle County.

Holbrook went on to say that Rockcastle County was spared from the worst of the storm that rolled through the state.

The National Weather Service issued a thunderstorm warning and a tornado warning for Rockcastle County last Saturday afternoon as the storm blew through the county.

The NWS reported .25 inch hail in Mt. Vernon with larger size hail in northern Rockcastle County. The largest hail was reported in Boyle County at 3 inches in diameter, which is considered baseball size.

Several Rockcastle Countians posted pictures of the hail and hail damage to their vehicles on social media sites. Some Rockcastle Countians even shared pictures and videos on social media sites of what they believed to be funnel clouds. The NWS reported no tornadoes in the county but recorded winds of up to 40 mph.

CSEPP Director Hal Holbrook said he visited areas of northern Rockcastle County and didn't notice any major damage. He said Rockcastle 911 only received one report of hail last Saturday night on Copper Creek Road in northern Rockcastle County.

"I drove through the Conway area and other areas in the northern end of the county on Sunday," Holbrook said. "People have been reporting hail damage to cars but I didn't notice any major damage."

Commonwealth Attorney announces thirteen cases resolved in March

Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery's office recently announced that 13 court cases were resolved in Rockcastle Circuit Court during the month of April.

According to Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley, 13 cases were resolved during motion hour on Friday, April 10th.

Cases resolved were:
Terry Cromer, 50, of Mt. Vernon pled guilty to trafficking in a controlled substance. Bartley recommended a sentence of five years to run consecutive with other charges for a total of eight years imprisonment.

Aaron Blackburn, 37, of Owensboro pled guilty to

third degree burglary. The commonwealth attorney's office recommended a sentence of four years and sentencing was set for Friday, May 8th.

Robert Christoffel, 66, of Brodhead was sentenced to one year imprisonment for theft.

Lavin Deborde, 34, of Mt. Vernon and Josh Howard, 27, of Crab Orchard were each sentenced to one year imprisonment for a probation violation.

Steve Dooley, 49, of Mt. Vernon was sentenced to three years imprisonment for a probation violation.

Blade Rader, 24 of Mt. Vernon pled guilty to theft. The commonwealth attorney's office recommended one year imprisonment and sentencing was set for Friday, May 8th.

Andrew Romans, 28, of Irvine pled guilty to possession of controlled substances and was sentenced to one year imprisonment.

Bradley Wesley, 29, of Livingston was sentenced to one year imprisonment for cultivating marijuana, third degree burglary and possession of a controlled substance.

The free event is at the EKV Campus in Manchester and everyone is invited to attend. The event will begin at 11 a.m.

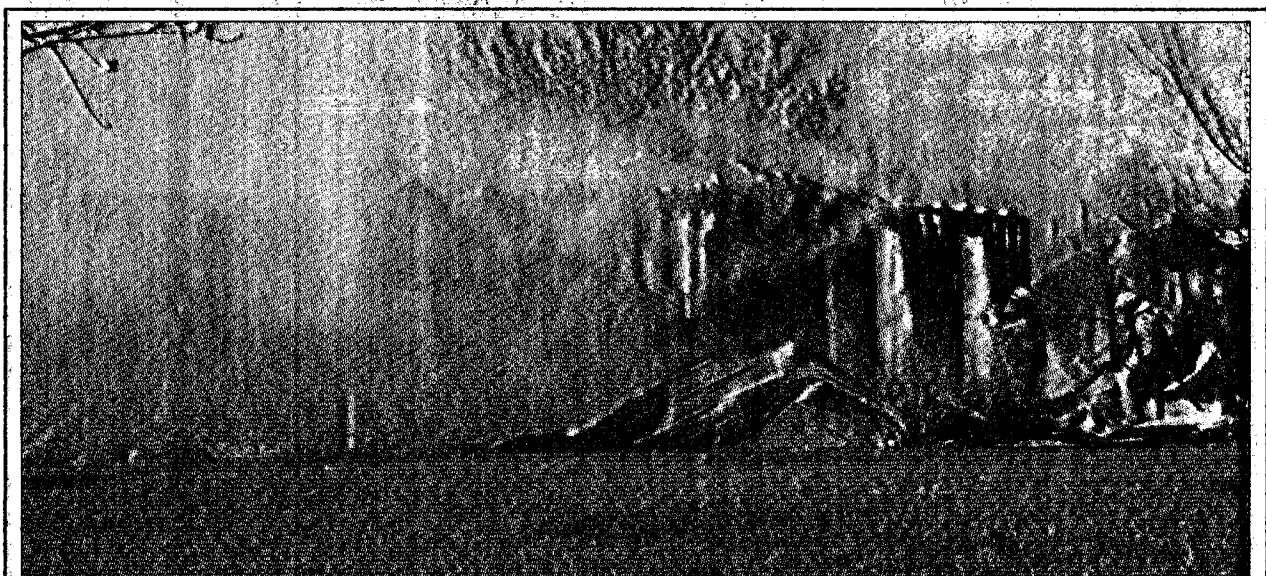
The White House ONDCP is often known as the "drug czar" throughout

The strategy places an emphasis on community-based prevention programs, diverting non-violent drug offenders into treatment instead of jail and expanding access to substance abuse treatment.

I believe in supporting law enforcement and I also believe that 99.9% of our law officers are in the profession primarily because

they want to help people, to make a difference. Are there some bad apples? Of course there are just as there are bad apples in every profession.

But that doesn't excuse mindless lawlessness, egged on, no doubt, by Baltimore's mayor saying that rioters would be given "space to destroy" to vent their anger. She later emphatically denied saying it but she was on tape. Perhaps she misspoke but why not just say, "I misspoke" instead of doubling down with a denial?

I would be of no help whatsoever in resolving this situation since I have no experience with dealing with this kind of anger and lawlessness but I do know I was raised by parents who taught me respect for the law and for my fellowman which would keep me from ever acting out in this manner.

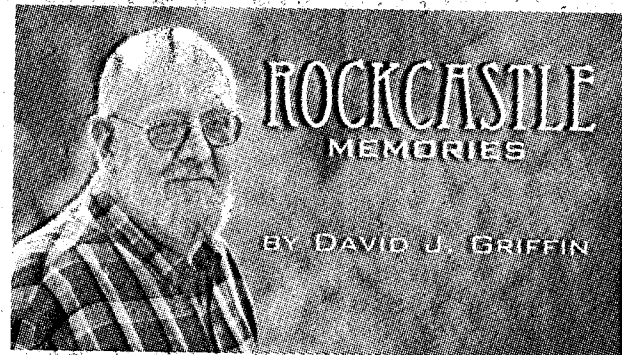


My Trip to Lexington Dear Journal,

I noticed that quite a few customers knew each other. They chatted and greeted others as they entered.



Ride Away

Have you seen the TV commercial where a chicken hops into a railroad boxcar and heads west? The "free-ranging" chicken sends photo postcards home to his owners. Kat and I find it an amusing advertisement, a rarity it seems. Anyway, during the ad, I also heard a familiar sound in the background that was most distinguishable. I remarked to my wife, "Is that Roy Orbison singing on that commercial?" She replied, "It has to be!"

As I have likely mentioned a dozen times or more, there is probably no

bigger fan of Roy than I am. But there was something amiss. Neither of us recognized the song that he was singing in this ad. Wow. You've got to be kidding. There is a song by Roy Orbison that I have never heard? Surely not. I was certain that my music collection contained them all.

It began when I was a teenager, of course. Roy (Yes, I call him "Roy." I may not have known him personally, but I certainly feel as if I did.) has always been my favorite early rock-and-roll star. My most preferred song of his is "Only the Lonely," which was released in 1960. I sang that song through all my days at Mt. Vernon High School. Even the music critics of the time recognized it as something special. They referred to it as an operatic rock ballad because of his unique voice and that particular sound which had yet to be heard in rock music.

Once we determined that the name of the Orbison song in the Geico commercial must be "Ride Away," I had to do a music search on iTunes to be able to find out if it was available. (It is. Yeah!) It was released as a single from his album called There Is Only One Roy Orbison, which released in July of 1965. I could not believe that there was an Orbison song that I did not recognize or have in my collection! I have had all of his music for a very long time -- or at least I thought I did.

I was shocked to learn that the song had climbed the Top 100 charts in 1965, reaching the number 25 slot. I know that my mind is slipping these days, but I generally have a very good memory. And yet, I would have sworn that I had never heard that tune. Just goes to show that you don't always know what you think you know.

Of course, I downloaded "Ride Away" onto my computer almost immediately. I have been listening to it for days and days. (My wife

Elaine Adams tells me she has only found 230 morels (dry land fish/mushrooms) this year and doesn't really expect to find anymore there in her secret patch of woods in Laurel County. My little Brother, Steve, says that he has found 30, mostly around the edge of his yard there at Hotspot in Letcher County.

Steve said he'd actually found 31 but that he had left one standing "for seed." I told Steve that I'd bet good money that Elaine could come on his place, walk over where he'd already hunted, and find at least 30 more. The only other human with whom I've hunted dry land fish who was probably as sharp-eyed as Elaine at finding them was the late William McClure in Rockcastle County.

I have stood, elbow-to-elbow, deep in the early spring woods beside both of them and had them ask, "How many can you see from right here, right now?" Usually I could not see a single one while either Elaine or William would tell me they could see up to a dozen or more and then they would proceed to pick them. I have accused both that they were willing them to come up on the spot just to spite me.

One fellow, whose first name I have temporarily forgotten, but his last name was Linville and he lived in eastern Rockcastle County near

the corner horn where it borders with both Jackson and Rockcastle County once had them (late 1970s-early 80s) coming up by the hundreds all over his yard and orchard.

Every year he would let half a dozen or so stand for a few days until they started to dry up. Then he would pick them, making sure he got the entire plant, bottom and all, freeze them hard as rocks, wrap them in a paper towel, still frozen, and pound them to smithereens with a butcher knife handle. Then he would scatter the tiny crumbs around his place and even tear the towel to shreds he hid under leaves in his fence row and in the orchard.

I'm not sure if that's the reason he had his own little dry land fish plantation but I do know that he repeated the process, year in and year out because I've watched him do it. I also know that he had far, far more in that one little acre spot than I've ever seen found in a 400 acre forest after an entire day of hunting with a team of experts.

William McClure, however, was dubious about propagating morels. William always told me to pick every one you can find because there's going to be that many more that you don't find and they're the ones that will make sure there's more in years to come. He believed that Mr. Linville

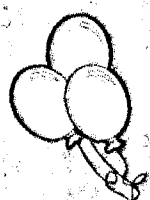

asked me if I was going to “wear it out.” I find it astonishing that I do not remember these lonely verses:

 I’ll leave a story untold
 Pretty girls behind me but pretty girls are everywhere
 Big motor wind up, ride away from here ...
 She thinks she needs me, she cries for me
 But I know she’s lying, crying for others to see
 What can I say, I’ll just ride away
 Big motor run run ... ride away
 Ride on away from
 Heart-ache and misery
 I’m bound to wander, Way over yonder
 Someone be waitin’ just for me
 True love to cling to, I need a dream to share
 Someone to know me, someone to show me they care
 Ride away, ride away from tears and sorrow
 Like there’s no tomorrow
 Tonight I’ll ride away!*

After purchasing the song, I could not stop hitting “repeat” on my music player. After hearing the song multiple times, Kathy said, “Are you going to play that song all day?” I almost could. The story it tells is daunting and keeps playing in my mind. It is so easy to picture him sitting astride

his Harley as he rides into the sunset looking for that particular girl:
*I’m bound to wander

Whenever I think about Roy Orbison, it brings back another bittersweet memory. I could never forget the day that Roy died. It was a Tuesday, December 6, 1989.

My late son, Todd, was 13 years old when called me from Nashville and said, “Dad, did you know that Roy Orbison died? I am so sorry! I know how much you loved him.” That was the kind of sweet and thoughtful child he was. He knew that, for me, this was like a personal loss, and he wanted to express his condolences. He was a good boy.

Roy collapsed at his mother’s home just before midnight. He had been preparing to issue his new CD called “Mystery Girl.” It was released posthumously a few weeks later. Roy was only 52. He did indeed “ride away.” But his music lives on forever.

had such an abundance because they had found a patch of ground they really loved and that they would

keep coming back even if Mr. Linville hadn’t done a thing to help them along in the regeneration business.

Anyway, about 1990 or 91 or so, about this time of year, I went back to the Linville place and discovered that he had gone on over to that great dry land fish patch in the sky. His old house, little barn and orchard were long gone and a pretty little double-wide with a white picket fence sat on a graded-flat lot where his place had been. I didn’t even bother to stop and ask whomever was living there if they’d found any mushrooms because the mushrooms would have had to sprout through several feet of disturbed soil. I doubt that they can do that.

My first experience with morels happened when I was in first or second grade. Mom’s cousin, McKinley (Kinley) Adams, his wife Ruth and only son, Ronnie, (my age) had just moved back to Blair Branch from rural, southern Indiana and our families had hiked to the top of the mountain for an Easter picnic/walkabout.

A mine road dead-ended at the edge of Pap’s (my Grandpa Mose Adams) old mountaintop apple orchard where the trees were all dead and rotting and Kinley spotted a morel (he called them cow teats). Somehow he convinced my parents that these things were not only good to eat, but, in fact a delicacy that could only be had in late March and April.

Mom had to watch him eat a couple to make sure they didn’t kill him before she was willing to try them, but once we found out how delicious they were, hunting mushrooms was my brother’s and my favorite thing to do this time of year.

We later discovered that just about everybody, besides us, on the holler knew about “cow teats” but kept the information to themselves because they didn’t want any competition when it came time to hunt for them.

I do know that on that Easter Sunday in 1954 or 55, Ronnie Adams and I lost all interest in hunting colored eggs because hunting the mushrooms was infinitely more fun than any sport the eggs had to offer. Only a day or two later I discovered that they tasted way, way better too.

I had never heard morels called dry land fish until I moved “down here” which is actually “up here” if you look at a map, but the hills aren’t nearly as high even when you can find one. But I soon caught on the fact that William called them by that name and I’ve gotten used to it even though Elaine looks at me sort of crooked when I say “dry land fish” because they are simply “morels” to her and need no nickname.

Still, if you slice them in half, roll them in corn meal and fry them golden brown, they do taste remarkably like a bluegill fillet.

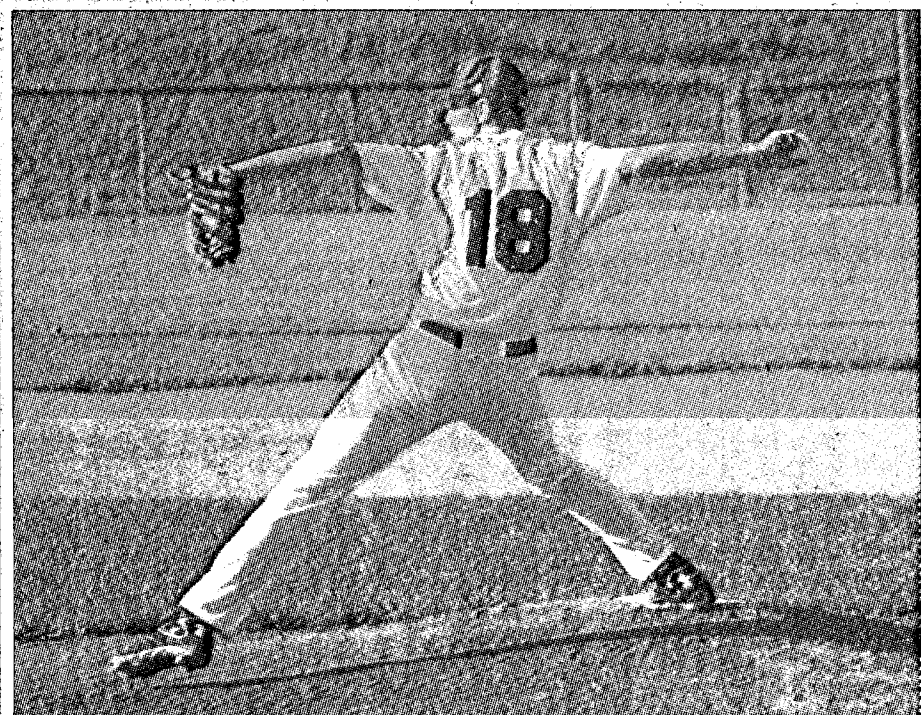

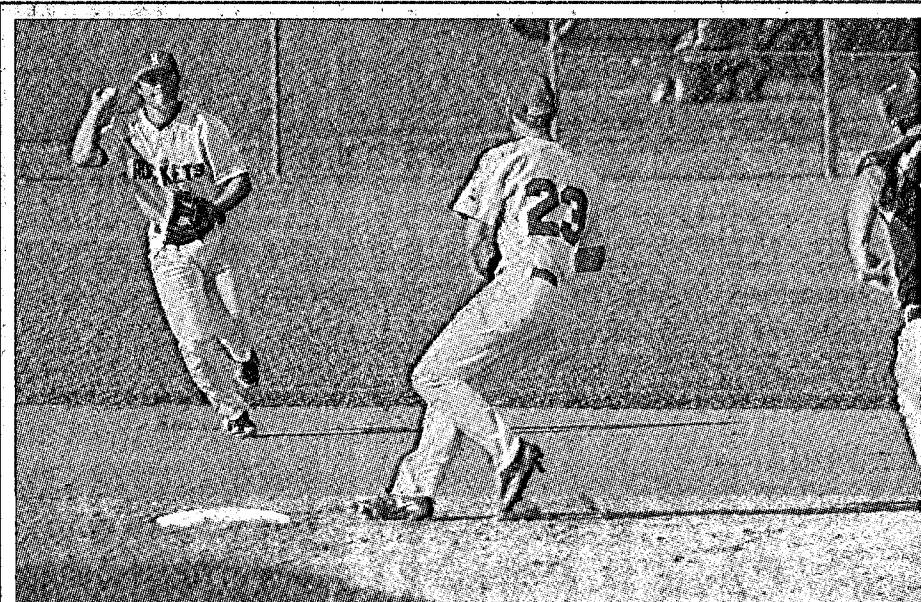

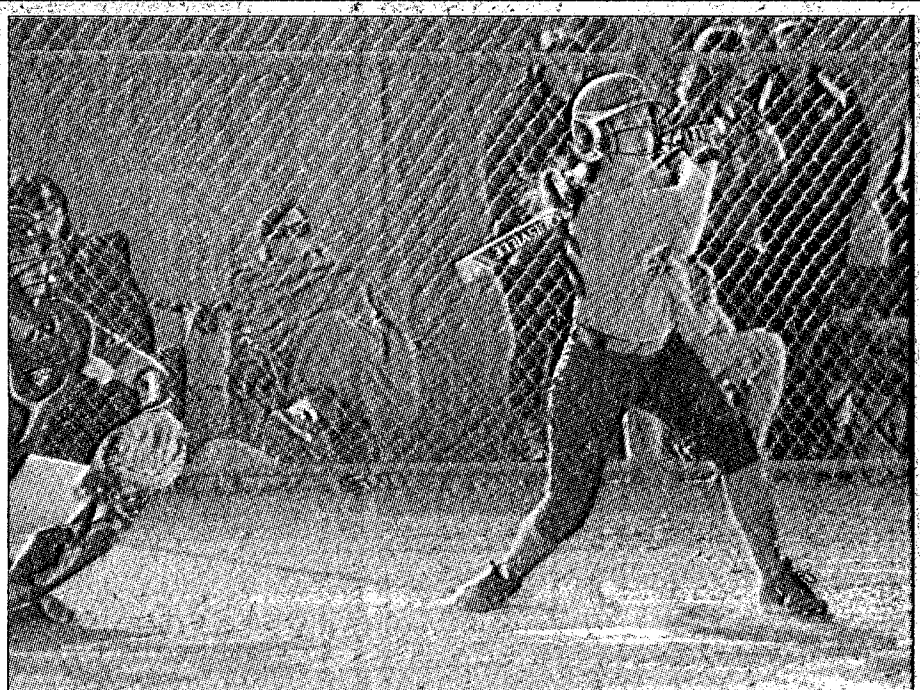

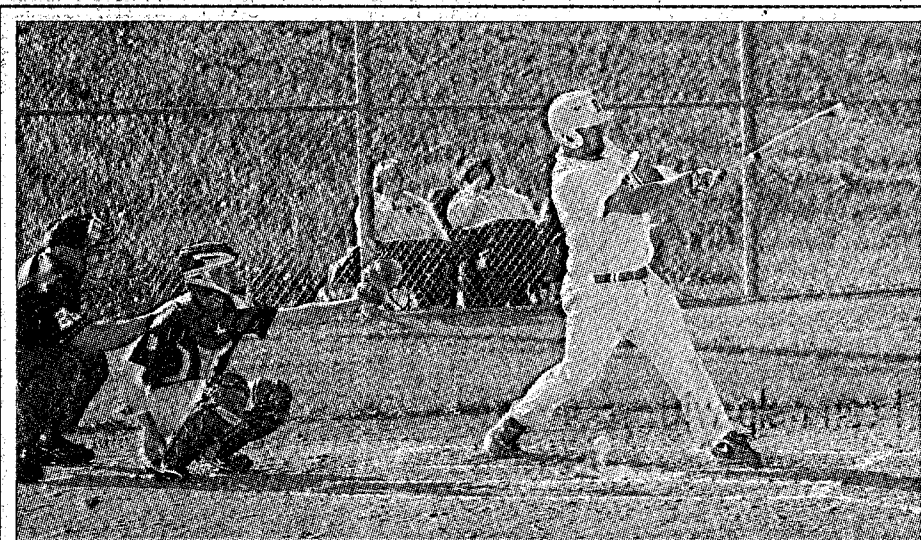

Shoot Hoops Not Drugs camps provide basketball skills instruction in conjunction with anti-drug and self-esteem messages.

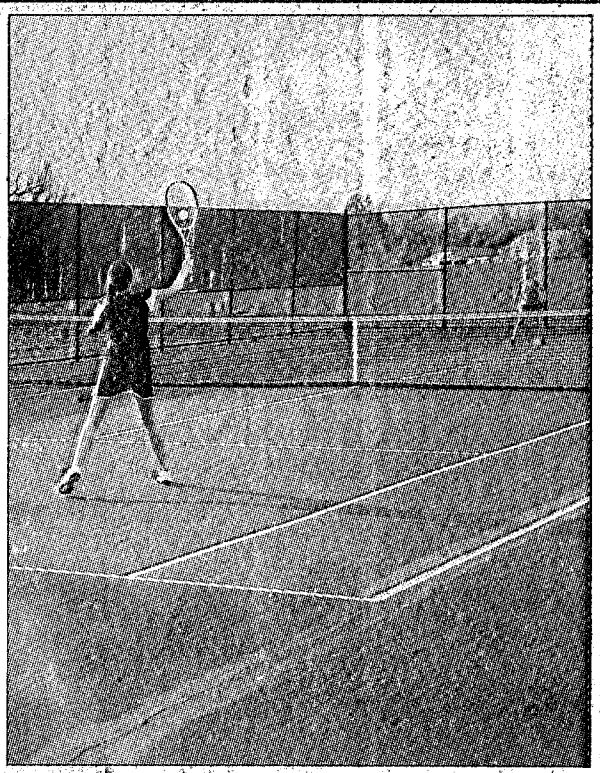
For safety and comfort while participating, youth are asked not to wear open-toe shoes or sandals.

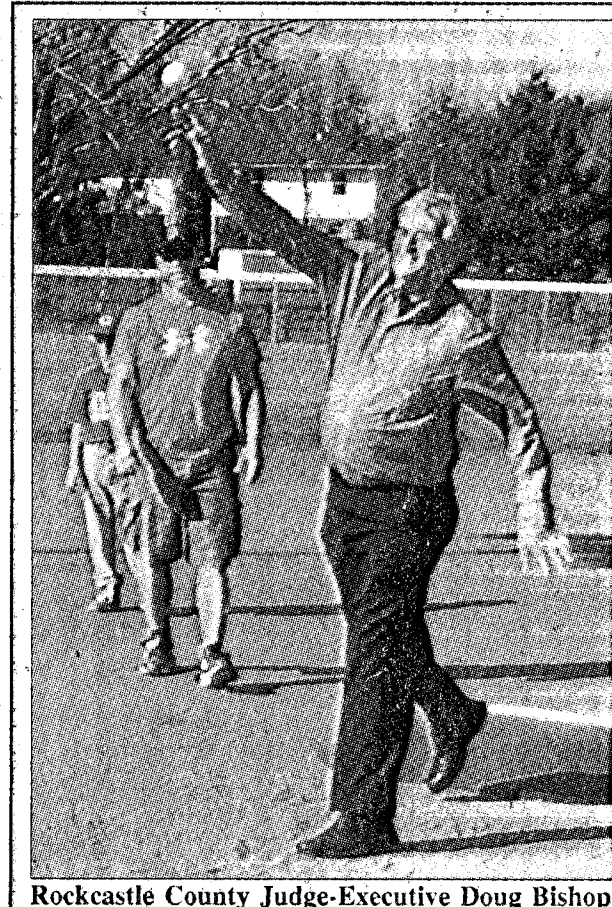

Mamaw's Kitchen

PEACH COBLER

This is one of Will's favorites. Whenever Judy knows that he will be coming to Mt. Vernon with me, she usually makes this for him. Don't tell her, but, it is one of my favorites also. 3 cups canned peaches, sliced, undrained
1 cup milk
1 cup sugar
1 stick butter or margarine
1 cup self-rising flour
Pour peaches in medium saucepan. Heat until bubbles form around edges of pan. Do not boil. Turn off heat. Preheat oven to 350°. Put butter into a 9 x 13 cake pan. Put in oven until butter melts. In a bowl, mix sugar, milk, and

flour together until smooth. Slowly pour batter over melted butter. Spoon peaches on top of batter and gently pour juice over peaches. Do not stir. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes. As it bakes, batter will rise to top and fruit will be on the bottom and peeking up through the batter.
NOTE: Can also use fresh peaches, hot sweetened blackberries, blueberries, or cherries.

STRAWBERRY CAKE

For most of my young life, Mum bought my birthday cake from Burke's Bakery in Danville, Kentucky. After we moved away from Danville, I started asking Mum to fix this cake as my

birthday cake.
1 box white cake mix
1 box (10 ounce) frozen strawberries, thawed
1/2 cup vegetable oil
1/2 cup water
2 eggs

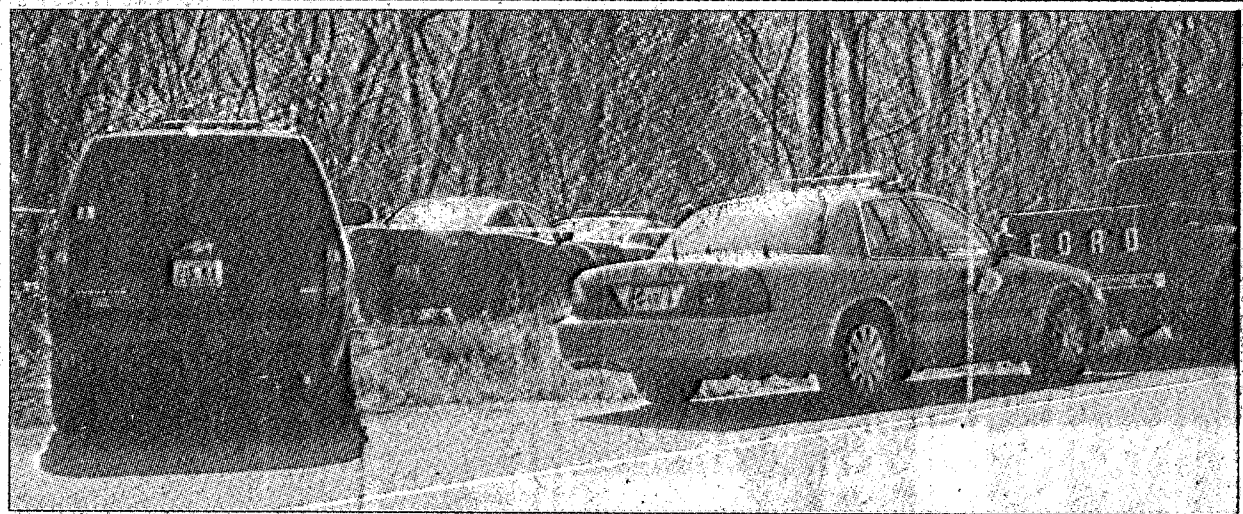

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL
 The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 4 through May 18, 2015. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.
 This is the January 1, 2015 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2015 will be due about September 15, 2015.

 Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

 The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.
 The appeal must be received in the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.
 A taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.
 Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.
 The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.
 (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.

 (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
 (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

State Auditor Report:

Rockcastle Regional example of financial strength among Kentucky's rural hospitals

State auditor Adam Edelen's special report last month on the financial strength of Kentucky's rural hospitals highlighted Rockcastle Regional Hospital and Respiratory Care Center as a success story.

The study's purpose was to assess the financial strength of the state's hospital network to understand the challenges these organizations face in "an era of unprecedented transformation."

Each hospital's financial health was evaluated and given a score based on their

performance in four key areas: profit margin, cash on hand, debt financing, and depreciation. The study found the financial condition of 68 percent of the rural hospitals in the state scored below the national average.

Rockcastle Regional was given a financial health rating of "good," ranking 12th in the state. There are 66 rural hospitals in the state, 22 of which either declined to participate in the study or didn't provide the type of information requested.

The auditor's report spe-

cifically mentioned Rockcastle Regional multiple times as an innovative rural hospital creating a niche for itself to maintain its financial strength.

"Other innovative solutions appear to play a role in hospitals that are not in poor fiscal shape. Rockcastle Regional Hospital, for example, serves a small community but has developed a specialty by providing ventilator-dependent care to patients with spinal cord injuries, genetic

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

Jesse Williams
Maryland/Virginia
Jesse Williams was born 9 June 1750 in New Castle Co. Delaware and died 29 September 1835 in Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, Jesse gave the following account of his service on 28 August 1832 in Rockcastle Co. KY at the age of eighty two. He entered the service of the United States in the summer of 1776 while living in Baltimore Co. MD as a Private in the 9th Battalion of the

Maryland Militia serving under Captain James Gittings and Colonel Walter Tolly. He rendezvoused at Baltimore and served a tour of about three weeks and then was discharged.

In the fall of 1777, Jesse served as a Private under Captain Zachariah Union's Company and Colonel Darby Lux's Regiment for about five weeks and was again discharged. In the spring of 1778, Jesse was promoted to Sergeant and served five weeks under the same officers and was later promoted to Ensign in 1779 and served four more weeks. His main duty during his tour was to defend the city of Baltimore against attacks from a squadron made up of British soldiers,

Tories and Negroes who were led by Old Dunsmore (John Murray, 4th Earl of Dunsmore), the former Governor of Virginia.

In 1781, Jesse was called again into service in Culpepper Co. VA under Colonel Slaughter, Major Beal, Captain Lillard and Lieutenant Triplett. They marched to Malvern Hills on the James River and continued from there to Blackwater on the Chickahominy, New Castle and finally to Claiborne Ferry. This was in General Steven's Brigade directly in the rear of General Lafayette at or near Claiborne Ferry, where he was discharged shortly before the Siege of Yorktown. Jesse had served a tour of two months.

Jesse stated in his pension application that he was born in New Castle Co. Delaware and lived in Baltimore Co. MD when he entered the service. He lived there until 1780 and moved to Culpepper for eleven years and then moved to Stafford Co. VA. He later moved to Orange Co. VA and from there, he and his family moved to Garrard Co. KY. They lived in Garrard County for about ten years until they finally settled in Rockcastle County.

He was awarded a pension in the amount of \$21.26 annually commencing 28 August 1832. Jesse does not mention a spouse or children in his application with the exception of one child, David Williams, who was living in Franklin Co. KY at the time. Jesse married Elizabeth Rachel Gott (3 May 1754 MD-10 October 1794 Culpepper Co. VA) on 24 November 1774 in Baltimore Co. MD. He died 29 September 1835 in Rockcastle County and is buried in a marked grave at the Phillips Cemetery near Wildie, Rockcastle Co. KY.

The children of Jesse and Rachel were: Joseph Williams (16 October 1775 Baltimore Co. MD-14 June 1855 Fleming Co. KY) married Elizabeth Settle (11 February 1778 PA-9 May 1853 KY) on 21 May 1795 Culpepper Co. VA. They are buried at Locust Grove Cemetery in Fleming Co. KY. They had thirteen children: Edward, Nancy, Frances, Elizabeth, Jesse, Lorenzo, Lewis, Louisa, Beverly, Alonzo, Mary, Lemuel and Belleville. Elizabeth Williams (16 March 1778 Baltimore Co. MD-1878 Knox Co. KY) married Levi Vale (1770-1860 AL) in 1794 VA. They had three children: Rachel, Daniel and Elizabeth. Susan Williams (1781 Culpepper Co. VA).

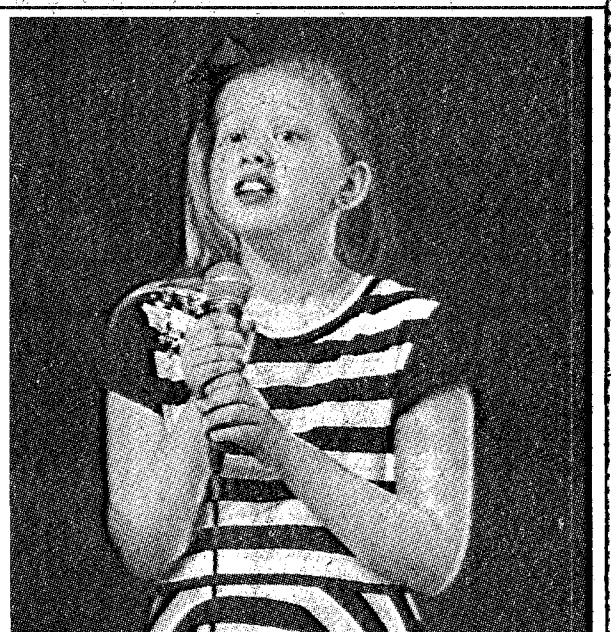

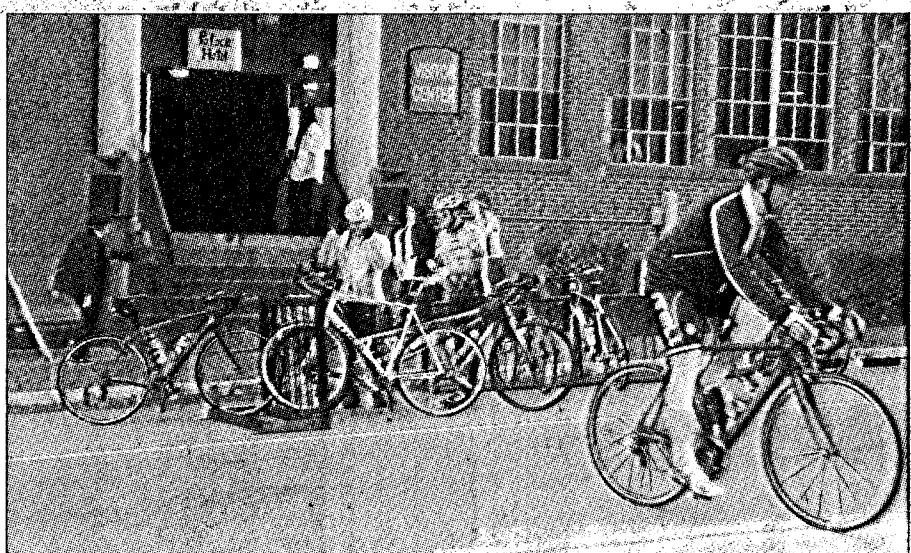

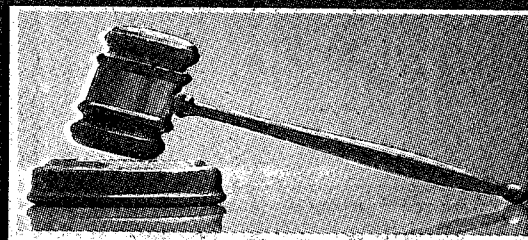

DAR presents local fifth graders with Essay Awards

The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution actively supports historic preservation, promotion of education and patriotic endeavors. One way the Society promotes education is to sponsor every year in the school systems the American History Essay Contest open to all 5th-8th graders.

This year's essay topic was "A Child's Journey through Ellis Island". The year 2015 marks the 125th anniversary of Ellis Island as an immigration station. On a typical day, immigrants arriving on the island could expect to spend up to seven hours in processing activities intended to determine whether or not they were legally and medically fit to enter the United States. Writers were challenged to write a 500-1000 essay (depending on grade level) imagining themselves as a child traveling through Ellis Island in 1892. They were to describe their experience to their cousin who had never seen Ellis Island. Each essay submitted was judged by the local DAR chapter. One essay winner from each grade level was eligible to be submitted by the local chapter for state competition. State winners will be judged on national district level and finally district winners will be eligible for the national competition in Washington this July. National winners will be awarded at Continental Congress and presented a medal, certificate and monetary award.

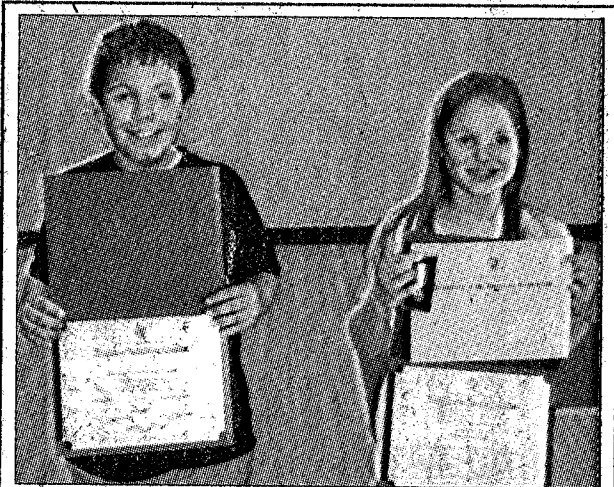

Each writer is to describe a colonial family's discussion about the new Stamp Act and what role it played in organizing the colonists against the British King and Parliament.

USDA Reminds Farmers to Certify Conservation Compliance by June 1 Deadline

Producers May Need to Take Action to Remain Eligible for Crop Insurance Premium Support

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds farmers that the 2014 Farm Bill requires producers to file a Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland Conservation Certification form (AD-1026) with their local USDA service center by June 1, 2015, in order to become or remain eligible for crop insurance premium support.

Most farmers already have a certification form on file since it's required for participation in most USDA programs such as marketing assistance loans, farm storage facility loans and disaster assistance. However, farmers, such as specialty crop growers who receive federal crop insurance premium support, but may not participate in other USDA programs, also must now file a certification form to maintain their crop insurance premium support.

"USDA employees are working very hard to get the word out about this new Farm Bill provision," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "While many producers will not need to take action, we want to help make sure that those who are required to act do so by the June 1 deadline. We want all eligible producers to be able to maintain their ability to protect their operations with affordable insurance."

Producers should visit their local USDA service center and talk with their crop insurance agent before the June 1, 2015, deadline to ask questions, get additional information or learn more about conservation compliance procedures. Producers that file their form by the deadline will be

birth defects, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and neurological diseases like amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) and muscular dystrophy. This hospital is the only one of its kind in Kentucky and serves patients from across the country."

Edelen stressed the importance of rural hospitals to the local economies for which they serve. "Rural hospitals provide care to 45 percent of our population. They tend to be among the largest employers in their community, paying a significantly higher wage than the local average. Their importance to local communities cannot be overstated."

Rockcastle Regional's chief financial officer Nick Bastin said, "Maintaining our excellent financial strength means more than just managing operating costs. The sustainability and growth of our organization is directly related to the growth of our local and state economies."

In 2014, Rockcastle Regional paid nearly \$543,000 in city and county occupational taxes and public school occupational taxes. \$658,000 was paid in provider taxes to the state to help support the Kentucky Medicaid Program. When matched with federal funds, its provider tax supported \$2.2 million in state Medicaid spending.

The Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland Conservation Certification form is available at local USDA service center online at www.fsa.usda.gov/AD1026form. When a farmer completes this form, USDA Farm Service Agency and Natural Resources Conservation Service staff will outline any additional actions that may be required for compliance with highly erodible land and wetland provisions. USDA's Risk Management Agency, through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, manages the federal crop insurance program that provides the modern farm safety net for America's farmers and ranchers.

The recent announcement was made possible by the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past six years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for the taxpayer. Since enactment, USDA has implemented many provisions of this critical legislation, providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America. 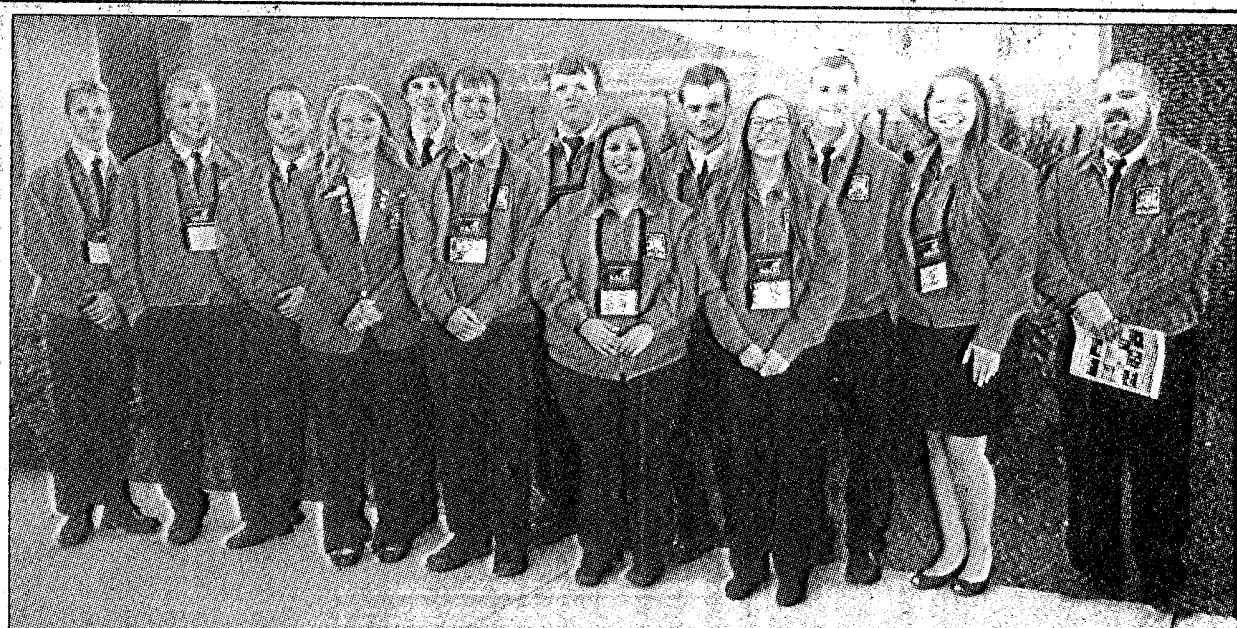

Co. KY) married Catherine Holder on 23 December 1812 Madison Co. KY. They are buried at Elmwood Cemetery in Rockcastle Co. KY. Richard and Catherine both have exciting backgrounds which are too long to share in this article but worth looking up. During the War of 1812, Richard obtained a contract to procure lead for KY Military from the mines west of St. Louis. He also outfitted wagons and transported them to Westport MO on the Santa Fe Trail. It is said that Kit Carson traveled on the trail with the William's Caravan. Richard was later appointed Postmaster in Rockcastle Co. and ran a saddle and harness making business. His wife, Catherine Holder is of the famous Boonesborough settlers. They had thirteen children: John, Frances, Elizabeth, Jesse, Sophia, Rachel, Mary, Jacob, Oscar, Susan, William, David and Harriet.

Jehu Williams (11 Octo-

ber 1788 Culpepper Co. VA-31 March 1849 VA) married Hetty Row (1792-1823) on 25 December 1814 VA. He was a clockmaker and silversmith by trade. They are buried at the Springhill Cemetery in Lynchburg, VA. Jehu married again to Susannah Sanford Tompkins (1802-1843) on 11 September 1823 in VA. His third marriage was to Elizabeth J. Robinson on 2 August 1847 VA. Jehu and Hetty had five children: Sarah, Mary Ann, Amanda, Elvira, and Hetty. Jehu and Susannah had seven children: Ann Elizabeth, Mary E., James, Josephine, John, Martha and Alice. Jacob Williams (29 November 1790 VA-March 1841 AL). David Williams (1 May 1793VA-24 January 1858 Franklin Co. KY) married Elizabeth Row (1789-1853) on 25 September 1817 Orange Co. VA. He was a blacksmith by trade and slave owner. They had six children children: Jacob, Hetty, Elizabeth, Milly, Susan and Urban.

Jesse Williams is a recognized Patriot of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

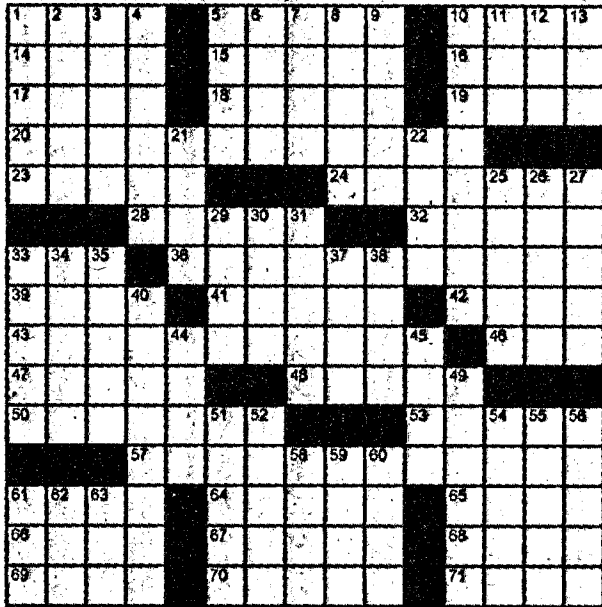
