

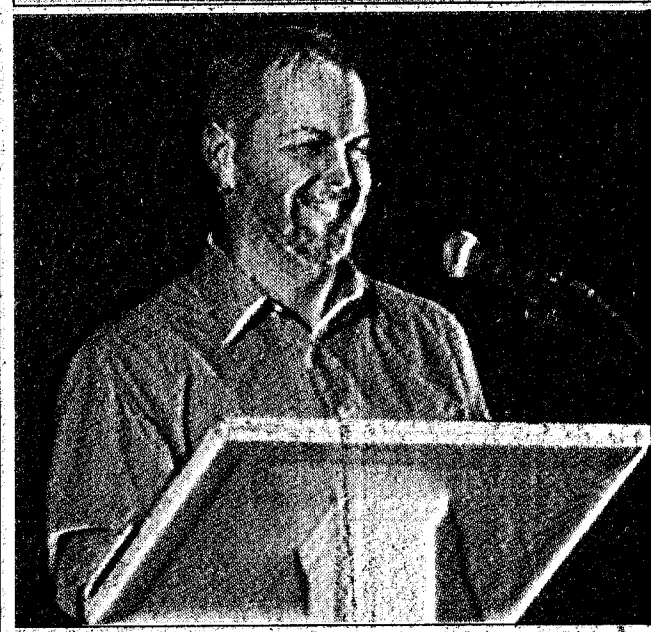

Brodhead Elementary School will have a new principal next school year. Superintendent David Pensol said that BES principal Caroline Graves recently announced her retirement. He said BES physical education instructor Charles Bullen has been the interim principal since Graves took sick leave at the beginning of April.

Pensol said Graves was principal at BES for 14 years. He said the principal position has been posted and they are currently in the interview process for the position.

Rumors have been circulating that Graves was fired from her position. However, Pensol said that Graves was not fired and that she chose to retire due to "health issues."

Local man arrested for sodomy

A local man was arrested last Friday after a Jackson County Grand Jury handed down an indictment against him for two counts of sodomy.

Arrested was Willard Franklin Durham, 76, of Mt. Vernon. According to state police reports, Durham engaged in deviate sexual intercourse with two juveniles who were under 12-years-old. Investigators said the incidents occurred in Jackson County between March, 2000 and March, 2002.

on Monday night that dealt with beautification projects in the city.

Mayor Walter Cash told the council that they needed to decide if they wanted to purchase flowers for the large flower pots along Main Street. He said there were 25 pots and that the flowers would cost approximately \$300 to \$400.

However, Mayor Cash said the main problem with the flowers is that they will have to be watered on a

daily basis to keep them alive.

"We can get the flowers and put them in the pots. But someone has to water them," Mayor Cash said. "If we don't water them every day then we are wasting our time because they will dry up."

Mayor Cash said that he recently talked with someone who was willing to water the flowers daily for \$8 an hour. He said it would take approximately two

hours to water the flowers and that they wouldn't need to be watered on days that it rains.

Councilmember Keith Graves said that they had approximately 90 days or three months left in the watering season. At \$8 an hour, Graves said it would cost the city \$1,440 and with the cost of the flowers the total cost would be between \$1,700 and \$2,000.

"We all want flowers, that's not the issue. The issue is, is it feasible," Graves said. "But the people want flowers and want the city to look nice. So the people should have flowers."

Councilman Ronnie Cash agreed with Graves and said that people have always commented on how

Lawson indicted by Grand Jury

Several indictments were returned by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury last Friday, including an indictment against the former executive director of the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame.

According to state police reports, Robert Wayne Lawson, 40, of Mt. Vernon allegedly stole over \$28,000 from three accounts he was managing for the KMHF, the Rockcastle County Cystic Fibrosis fund and the Rockcastle Tourism Taskforce.

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury indicted Lawson on three counts of theft by deception which charge him with writing three checks in his name from the Rockcastle County Cystic Fibrosis account without authority. Those checks totaled \$3,150.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said Lawson's embezzlement cases for the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame and the Rockcastle Tourism Taskforce is still ongoing and remains under investigation by the Kentucky State Police. He said that he recently spoke with investigators and the theft charges for those two accounts will be presented to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury on Friday, June

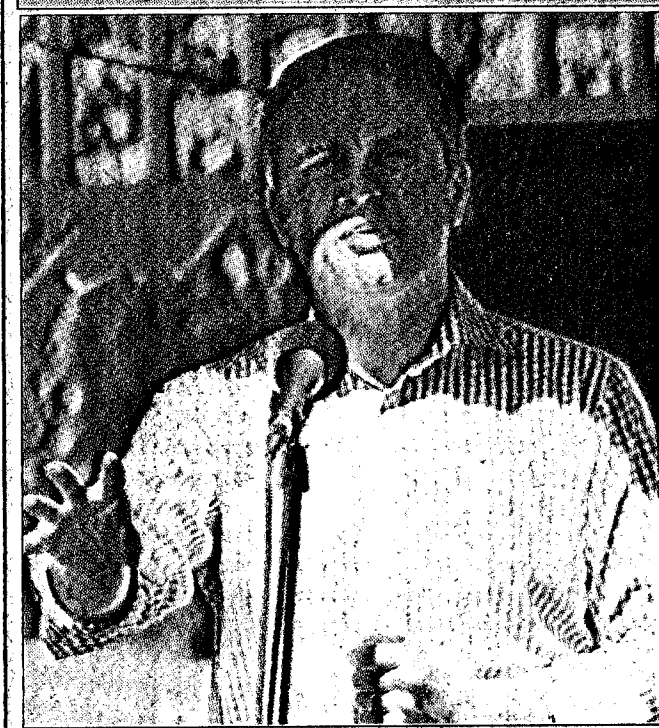

There is absolutely no way to segue into my usual political rant so I will just have to start it cold.

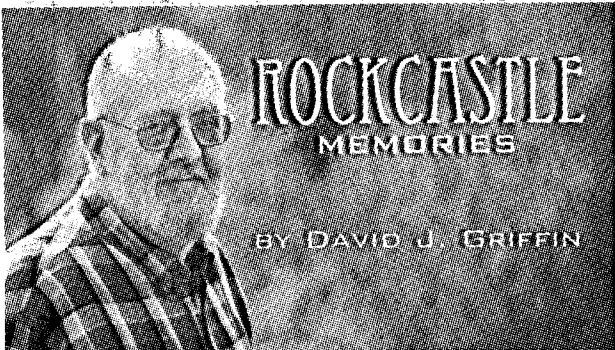

Hits On The Air

In 1950, I was six years of age when the television program called "Hit Parade" made its debut on national television. My mother (Bee) had been listening to the radio show of the same name for years before it hit the black-and-white television screen. We had just purchased a small, wooden TV when she noticed the program on a Saturday night lineup.

At that time, Bee and I

were mostly alone on the weekends because my brother, who was ten years my senior, was always out with his friends. Bee and I decided to keep a record of the songs' progression over a period of time. She bought a small ring binder in which we could maintain our lists of songs each week. (She actually kept that notebook for her entire lifetime. I found it after her death—a sweet memento of our times alone together.)

The show's premise was to showcase performances of the top seven songs of each week by regular top vocalists, including Dorothy Collins, Russell Arms, Snooky Lanson, and Gisele MacKenzie. As the show proceeded, the top three songs were named as the finalists, with the number one song as the finale.

The songs for each program were chosen from a compilation of lists from the bestselling sheet music, the songs most played on air, and the most played on jukeboxes. According to my research, the top five songs that played on that show over the years from 1950 until 1959 were: "Some Enchanted Evening" (21 weeks), "Too Young" (22 weeks), "Because of You" (23 weeks), "I'll Be Seeing You" (24 weeks), and "White Christmas" (38 weeks).

In 1957 the show aired for the first time in color. The NBC peacock also made its debut on that show. That night the peacock's tail feathers spread in the familiar black and white and then gradually bloomed into the

Have you ever owned a vehicle that you knew needed a brake job because it didn't stop nearly as well as it used to and then it started to pull real hard to the left or right because one set of pads on the front end had worn out faster than the other side? But you still refused to go to the garage and get new ones because you were determined to make the old ones last until they started screeching like someone raking their fingernails over a chalk board?

I don't know about you, but that screeching will send me running to the garage faster than a starving turkey trying to catch a low-flying fater bug. About the only thing worse, in my opinion, is to hear some gritting their teeth.

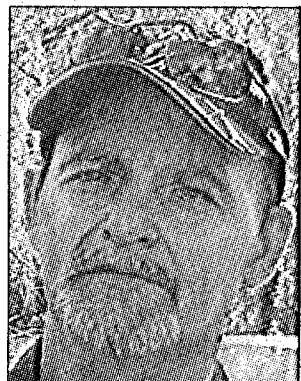
Doris Gail Gabbard

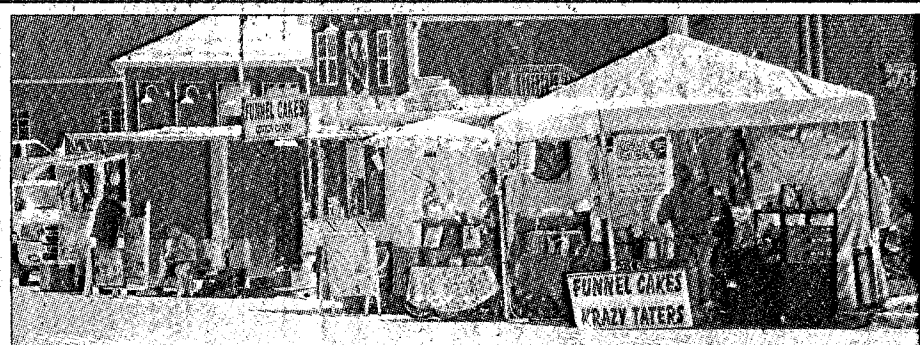

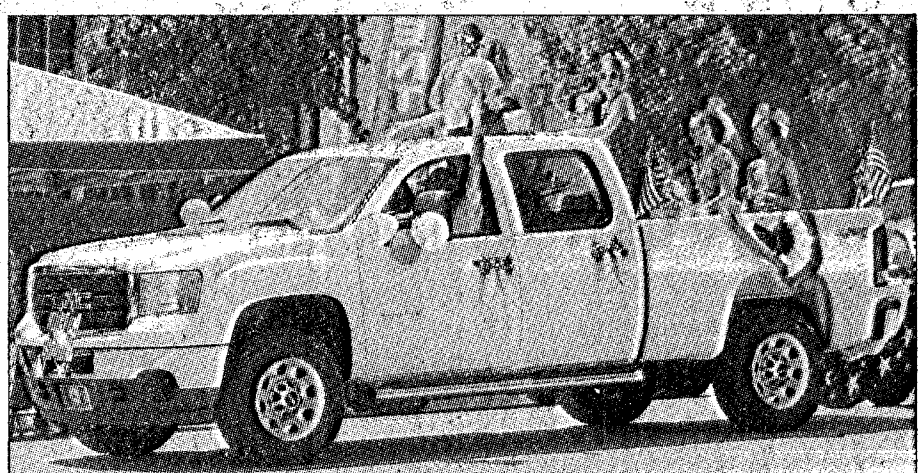

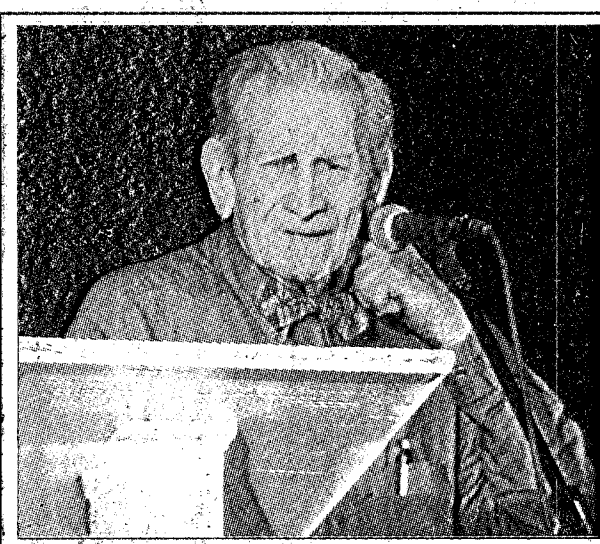

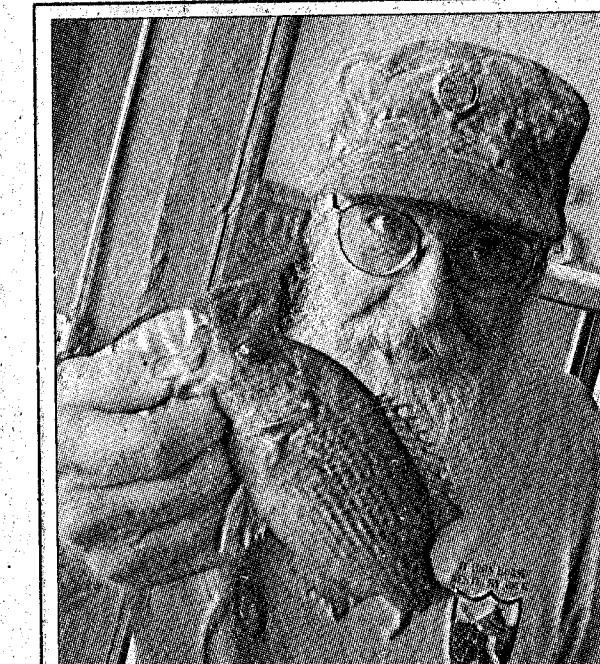

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Hidden Among Us

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

This series comes to a close with patriot, Charles Woodall. I hope that the reader found these articles on the county's patriots both enjoyable and informative. Although the purpose of this series was to highlight the military service of Rockcastle's Revolutionary Patriots, these men and women also played an important part and instrumental role in the development of the county. More information can be found about their contributions at the local library or the Rockcastle Historical Society. Approximately 53 known Patriots from nine of the thirteen colonies were featured but that is not to say they were the only ones living in Rockcastle. Many moved out of the county or died before applying for a pension.

Currently, there are approximately 4,262 Patriots that have been verified by the DAR who died in the state of Kentucky. This number does not include the ones who lived here and moved out of state. There are many more that have not been verified because a descendant has yet to join the Society. Charles Woodall
Virginia

Charles Woodall was born 18 August 1732 in Goochland Co. VA and died 12 April 1837 Garrard Co. KY. According to his pension application, Charles gave the following account of his service on 20 November 1832 in Garrard Co. KY at the age of one hundred years. He was drafted in Hanover Co. VA to go to Williamsburg in 1776 and marched from Hanover under the command of Captain John Anderson to New Kent Church. He was then transferred to a Company commanded by Captain Dabney under Colonel William Dandridge and General Charles Scott. He served six months and was discharged.

In June 1779, he was again drafted under the command of Captain Stokely Towles of Goochland Co. VA. He was stationed at Mackey's Mill on the James River not far from Norfolk. He remained there for three to four months. Their purpose was to prevent the British from landing in the area. From Mackey's Mill, the troops were marched up the river about three miles. Mackey's Mill was a sickly place and the troops were moved to a healthier area. There was a Company of Light Horse commanded by Captain Duval that passed from Mackey's Mill to where the troops were stationed every day for the purpose of watching the maneuvers of the enemy, who were lying in the river above Norfolk. Charles was discharged after serving a six month tour of duty. In August of 1781, Charles was again drafted for a six month period to pursue Cornwallis to Yorktown. After traveling about one hundred miles, he was taken sick and directed by his commanding officer, Captain Harris and Colonel Thomas Johnson to return home. It took him about twenty days to return

to his home.

Charles was awarded a pension in the amount of \$40.00 annually commencing 4 March 1831 for service as a Private for one year in the Virginia Militia. He did not mention a spouse or children in his application. He married Elizabeth Black (1735) on 10 October 1765 in Goochland Co. VA. Charles and his family moved from Virginia and settled in Kentucky sometime in the period of 1806 and 1810. They first settled in Rockcastle (1810 Census) and later in Garrard County. Charles died on 12 April 1837 in Garrard Co. KY. His final resting place is unknown.

The probable children of Charles and Elizabeth were: Jehu Woodall (27 June 1767 Goochland Co. VA-1864IN) married three times. First wife unknown. Second wife was Sarah Foster on 10 October 1794VA. They had at least 11 children: Jehu, Elizabeth, James, Mariah, Diana, John, Perry, Mahala, George, Suzanna and Joel. Third wife was Mary J. Simms in 1833. Jehu served in the War of 1812 in the Battle of the Thames and received 80 acres of land in IN for his service. William Woodall (30 April 1768 Goochland Co. VA-4 November 1850IN) married Sarah Thomasson (1780-1850) on 30 April 1797VA. They had five children: Stephen, George, Rebecca, William and James. John Woodall (17 March 1773 Goochland Co. VA-About 1815VA). The 1810 Census shows that the sons were already married and living separately from Charles and Elizabeth and there were two unnamed girls living at home.

Currently, no descendant of Charles Woodall has joined the Daughters of the American Revolution. Charles would be considered a new Patriot for the society.

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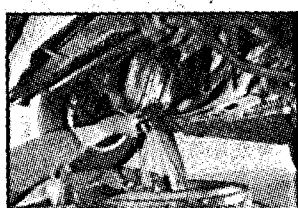
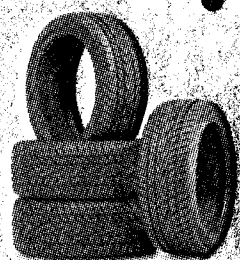


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RCCHS Archery Team competes in National NASP Tournament

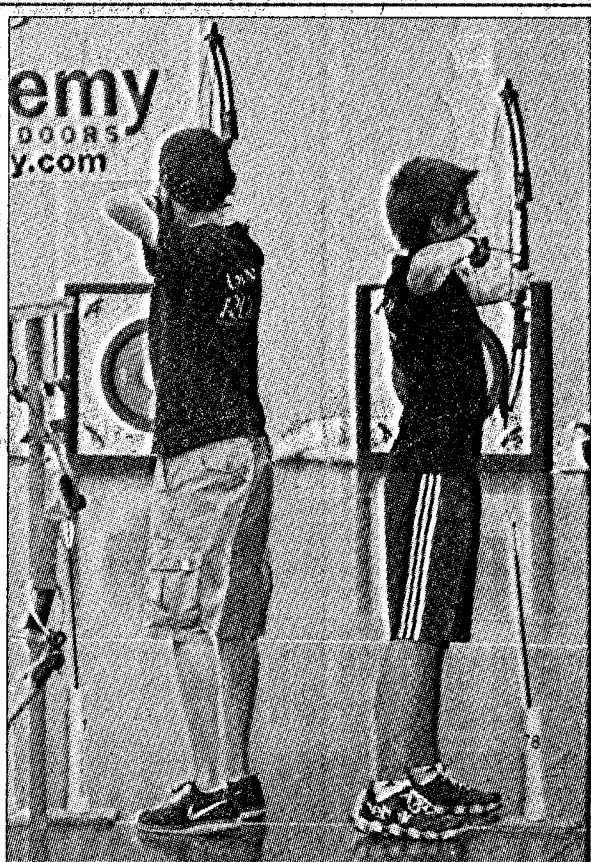

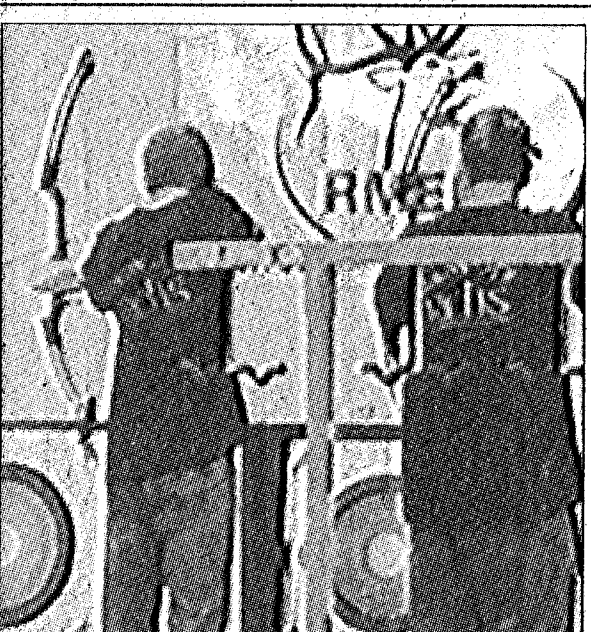

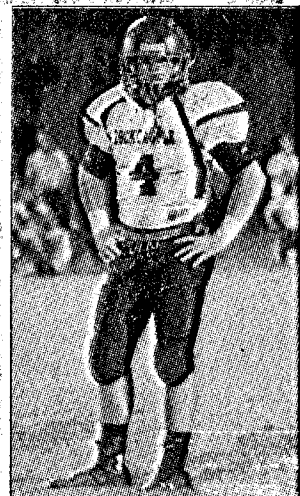
Payne will compete in Future Stars Classic

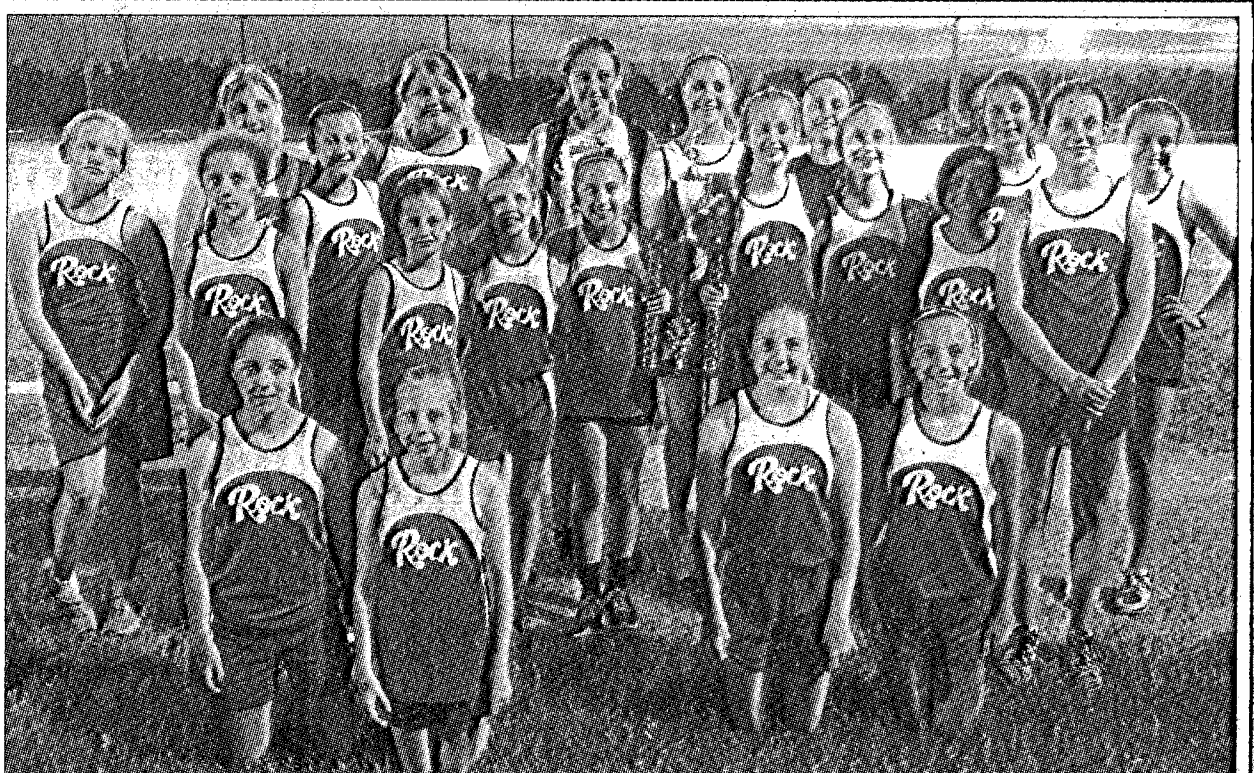

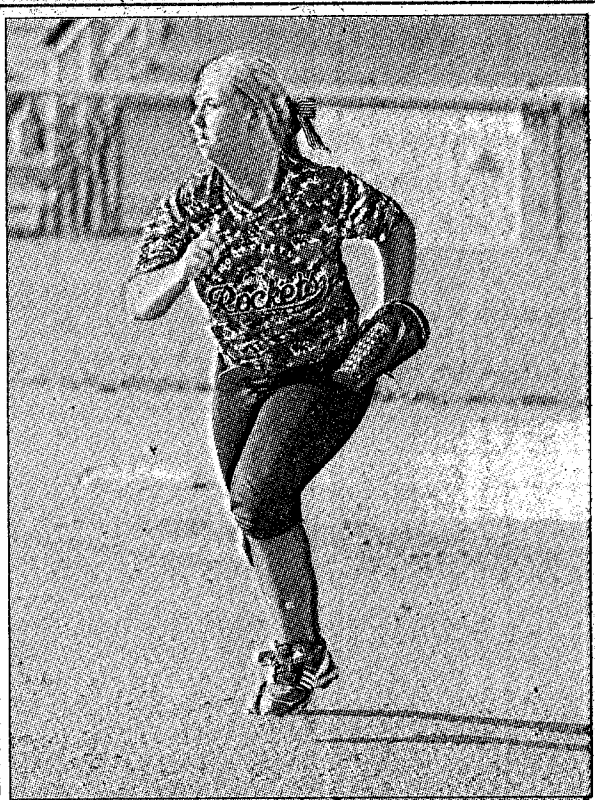
RCCHS girls' track team places 5th at Boyle County...

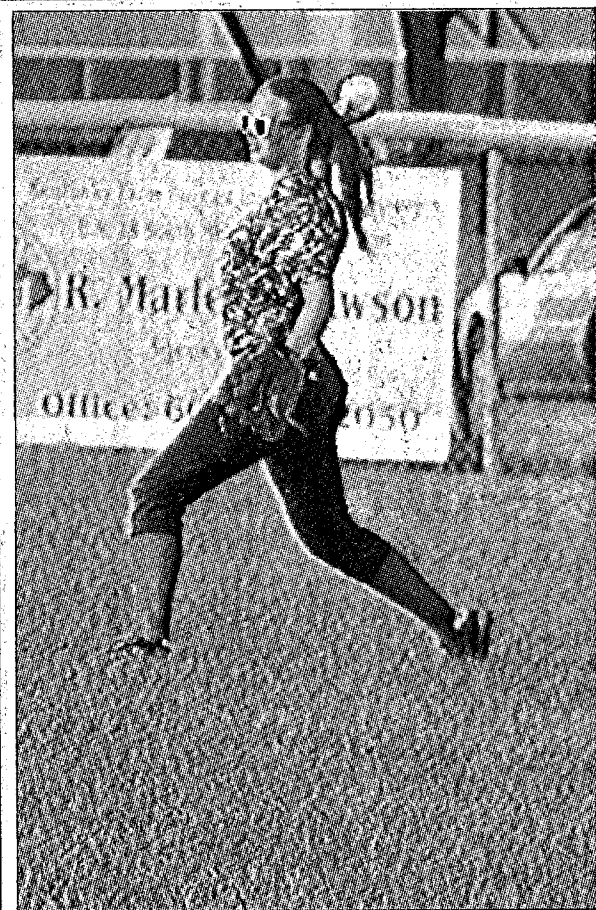


RCMS girls' track team wins Commonwealth Conference Track and Field Championship...

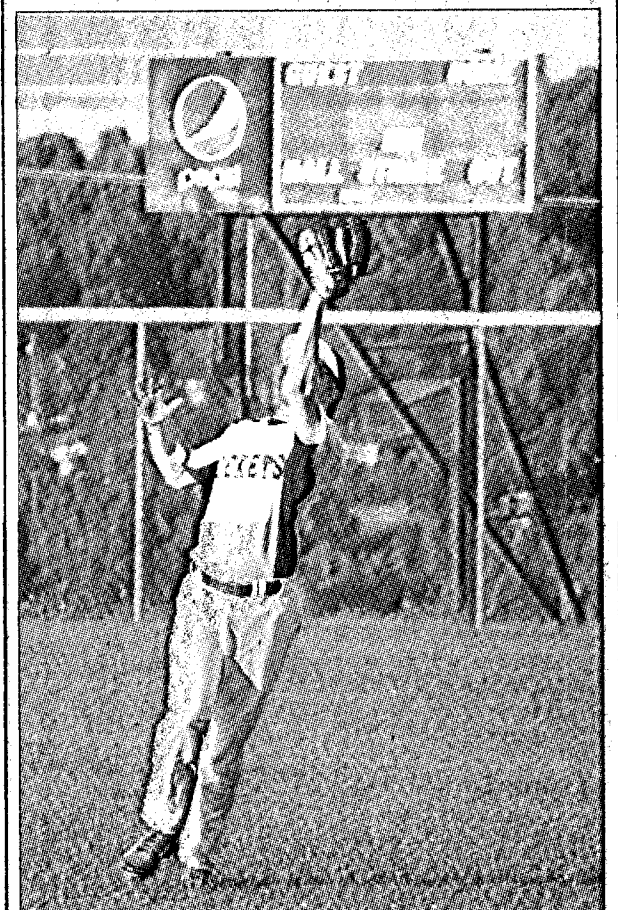

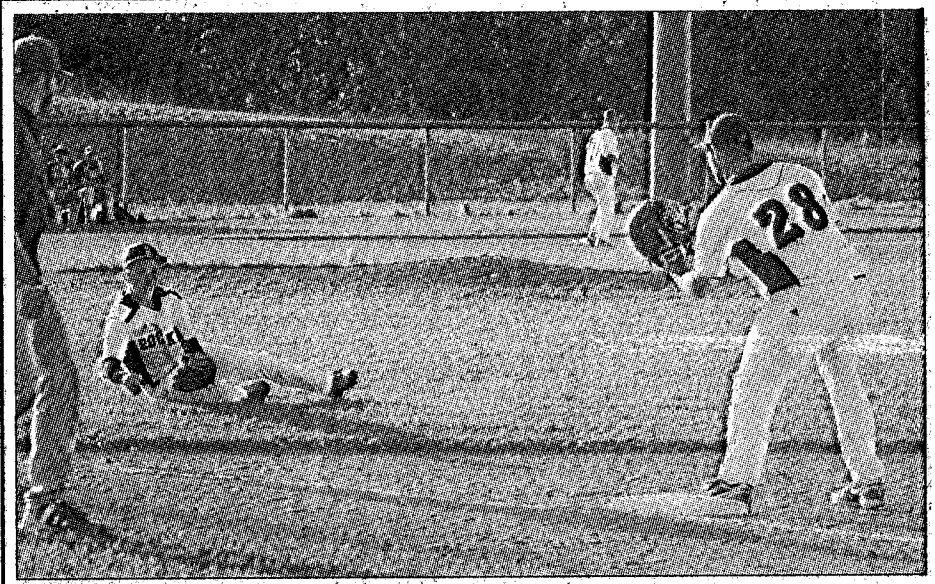

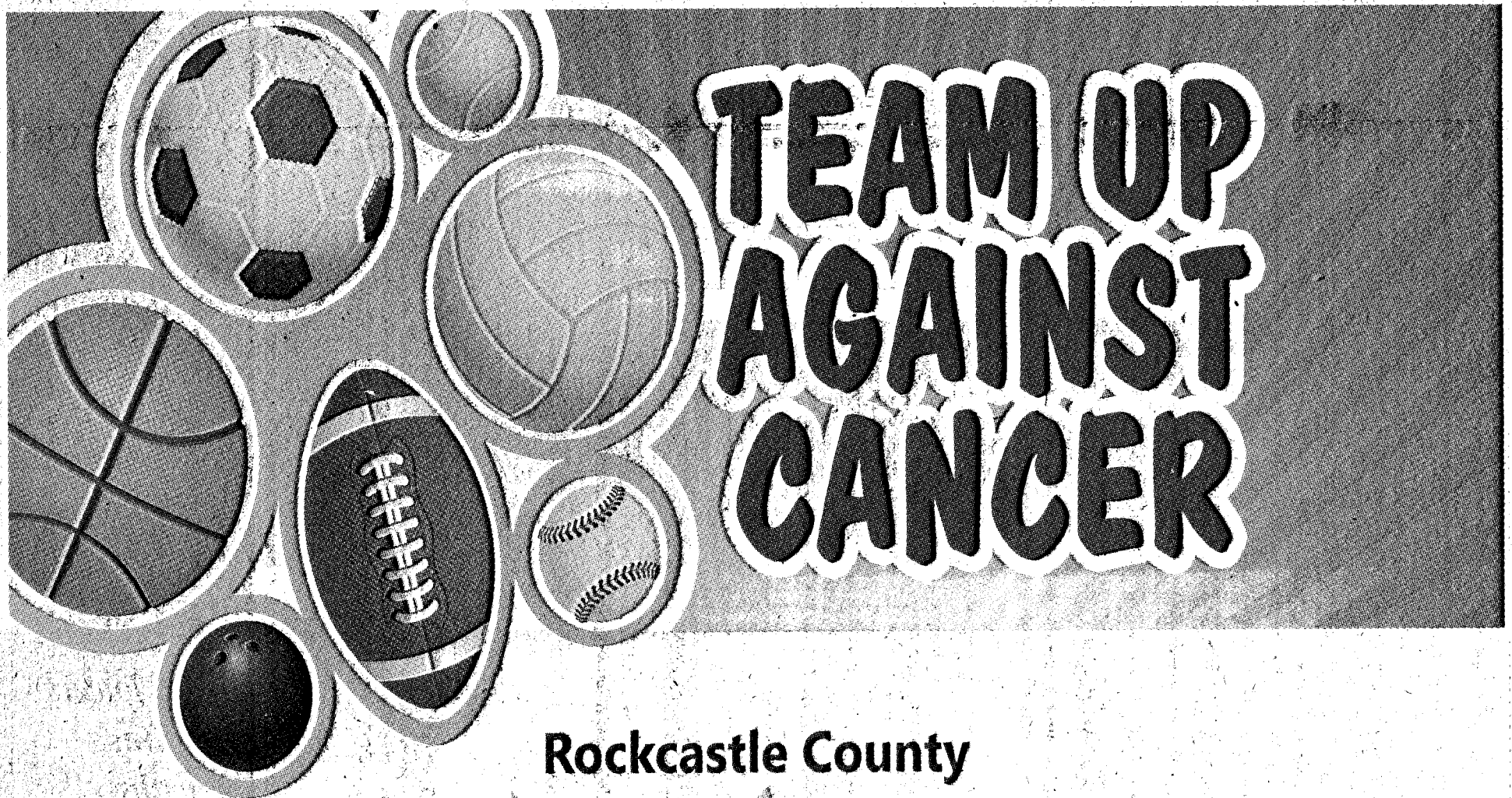

nections and their primary concentration on "smalltown" America.

James Medbery, senior vice president for Binswanger, who along with Lawrence Spinelli, president of Binswanger's national sales group met with the court last Thursday, said that his company had sold plants all over Kentucky.

He listed the building's selling points for the court, including dual rail, heavy power, on site silos, HVAC, its location on I-75 and its excellent condition.

The only thing Medbery said might have to be remedied would be raising some part of the ceiling in the bay area to accommodate certain industries.

Of course, the court was interested in the cost to them for these companies to market the property and that was about the only place where the two companies diverged.

Medbery with Binswanger told the court that he felt the building's base value was \$2.5 million but he then added 2% for access to the interstate, 5% for the building's condition, 5% for the dual rail and 20% for negotiation room bringing the top value of the building to \$3.6 million, which Medbery said was fairly close to the building's appraisal, with expectation of a \$3.0 million sale +/-.

James Belcher, Executive Managing Director of Newmark Grubb Knight and Frank (Hart Industrial Group) told the court at their meeting on Tuesday, just before the regular fiscal court meeting, that his company felt the court could expect to sell the building for \$2.6 million. As of March 31, 2015, the county still owes \$2,678,223 principal on the Anchor building. The payment each month is \$15,000 besides several thousand each month for utilities, security, etc.

Both companies' commission on the sale or lease of the building was the same, 6%, with Binswanger asking for a \$15,000 expense budget for promotional materials and Hart asking for \$16,000. The expense money would primarily be used by both companies for full color brochures to be sent out to major national and international companies. Both also said they would also market the building over their website and other internet resources such as YouTube advertisements.

Medbery with Binswanger told the court that it could take up to two years to sell the building, although he didn't think it would. Belcher asked the court for a one year contract.

The court took both proposals under advisement. RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins could not be at the first presentation on Thursday because of a death in her family but has been given a review of the proposal.

A decision will be made,

by the court, at a later date as to whether they will use this method and which firm they will retain.

in recent times.

Renner said that besides base funding cuts by the state of over \$13 million a year, the department has also been hit with an increase, to 38.1%, to retirement benefits for employees, decreased federal funding of \$10 million a year and, Renner said, there has been a 45% loss in funding over three years that was diverted to the Obamacare expansion of Medicaid.

The increased retirement contribution, Renner said, can be attributed to the Kentucky Retirement System "not being in good shape and the legislature not dealing with long term issues."

When Renner took over as director of the district three years ago, she said there was a 2.5 million hole in their budget which has been converted to the district being \$60,000 in the black now.

The number of health department employees in the three departments have almost been cut in half from 115 three years ago, she reported. However, she said with 64% of employees salaries having to be paid in benefits, there is a need for an increase in the local health department tax by 1% or 1 1/2% not to mention a \$300,000 bill still due KACo for insurance.

Renner said that increasing the local tax by 1% would garner \$145,000 more in revenue for the district and 1 1/2% would bring in \$217,000 more for operations. She said that the 1% increase would still cause the departments to have to "make adjustments," but that she did not expect there to have to be employee furloughs this year as in the past two years. The current tax rate is 6/10 of 1% or 60¢ per \$100 assessment.

Renner said the district was trying to change their business model to cope with increased expenses. They are always looking for new revenue streams, she said, and are pursuing grants.

She also told the court that employees haven't had a raise in five years and that some employees work for \$8.10 an hour while RNs only make \$15 an hour. "Our health department staff are committed to service," she told the court.

Raising the local tax rate is not a ballot issue, Renner said. The local health department board will have to set and approve the increase and then it will have to be approved by the court.

In other action, the court approved the 2015-16 budget for the Rockcastle County Development Board of \$23,868. They also approved the budget for the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority of \$565,157. RCIDA board member Corey Craig told the court that payments on the loan for the SourceHOV building were "8-10 months

ahead of the amortization schedule." The building was built in 2009 for a total loan of \$2.7 million. That principal balance is \$1.266 million as of March 31st of this year, Craig said, with an expected payoff within 6 to 7 years. The RCIDA puts the total rent received from SourceHOV each month toward the loan.

RCIDA's shortfall for April was \$13,883 but reflected a \$5,000 payment to CSX for non-usage of the rail spur into the park. Hopkins told the court that this was the first time RCIDA had received a bill from CSX for this purpose, even though the SourceHOV building set idle for over a year at one point without the charge being imposed. She said the charge was noted by CSX as an annual charge but wasn't sure if CSX would bill the charge annually.

County Judge Executive Doug Bishop told the court that he would like to set up a Parks and Recreation Board, consisting of five members, with staggered terms. Bishop said that setting up the board would provide an opportunity for a "better and brighter future for our children" and adding "We are already spending more on parks and recreation than most people realize."

Magistrate Shannon Bishop agreed saying that he felt the board was a "step toward planning for the future."

Newly appointed RCIDA board member Sam Hampton also agreed, telling the court that the board was an "investment in the future" and would better the lives of people who live here.

Among other ideas, during a discussion of about more utilization of the fairgrounds, Hampton said that Friday night movies with concessions was one thing that would benefit citizens of the county and that the board could study where the needs are and how to utilize what money is available better.

No action on forming the board was taken at the meeting but will be brought before the court again at a later date.

One bright spot of the meeting was the repayment to the court by Ken Holt, with the Climax Volunteer Fire Department, of \$3,200 as partial repayment for money advanced by the court for a thermal imaging camera for the department.

Holt also told the court that members of the department would be meeting with the state officials soon and hoped to get the area's ISO rating lowered which would mean a reduction in fire insurance rates for property owners.

The court also approved the purchase of two 2015 Chevrolet Silverado, 3500 series, one ton, 4WD, double cab trucks for the road department. The trucks, priced at over \$40,000 regularly can be bought by the court for \$29,638 on a state bid.

The court also approved the next fiscal year's lease agreement with the Administrative Office of the Courts for \$246,428, an increase of \$26,000 over last fiscal year's lease.

The court also approved a salt bid with Detroit Salt Company for \$87.90 a ton, a decrease from \$101.90 from last year's per ton price.

As a final item of business, the court approved the transfer of \$450,800 from the occupational tax fund. \$300,000 will be transferred to the general fund, with \$125,000 of that going to the detention center. \$150,000 will be transferred to the road fund to repay monies borrowed by the general fund last year and \$800 will be transferred into the forestry fund.

The court also was happy to learn that about \$8,000 a month will be saved at the jail with the recent switch to Kellwell Foods as the main food supplier for the jail from Sysco Foods.

beautiful the flowers are on Main Street every year. He said that if the council wanted to purchase flowers that they needed to do it now because the spring growing season would be ending soon.

The council agreed unanimously to purchase the flowers and hire someone to water them daily for \$8 an hour.

Mayor Cash also said that the council needs to decide if they want to purchase American flags to hang on the electric poles and lamp posts along Main Street. He said that they would need 32 flags to hang on all the poles and posts along Main Street and he said each hanging flag set cost \$8 each.

Graves said that Woodmen of the World often donate American flags to city governments for such purposes. He said he could check with them to see if they would be willing to donate all or some of the flags.

The council agreed to check with Woodmen of the World on donating the flags and purchasing the remaining flags to hang on electric poles and lamp posts along Main Street.

Mayor Cash also brought up the issue of the city's nonfunctioning dump truck that is currently taking up space at the city's water and sewer plant. He said that the city has no insurance on the dump truck and that it wasn't costing the city anything.

"It's not doing nothing but killing a little grass where it is sitting at," Mayor Cash said.

Mayor Cash said the city advertised for bids to sell the dump truck last year for a minimum bid of \$1,500. However, he said they re-

ceived no bids for it.

Councilman Cash said that people told him that they didn't bid on it because the minimum bid was set at \$1,500. However, Councilman Cash said that they needed to set it at a minimum bid so they could "get more than \$100 out of it."

Graves suggested that they include a phrase in the advertisement that placed the minimum bid at whatever the estimated scrap price was at the time. The rest of the council agreed.

Graves also told the council that the Brodhead First Baptist youth group agreed to adopt the Brodhead Depot Park to clean and maintain. He said the youth group said they were willing to clean up the trash and maintain the park while the city workers still mowed and maintained the landscaping at the park.

Graves went on to say that the youth group would like to have a picture at the park with Mayor Cash to announce that they had adopted the park for cleanup. Mayor Cash agreed and Graves said he would check with the group to schedule a time for the announcement.

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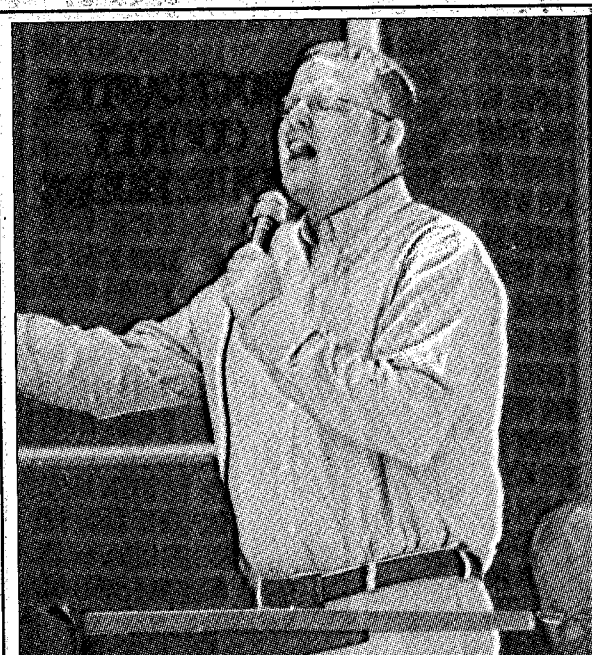
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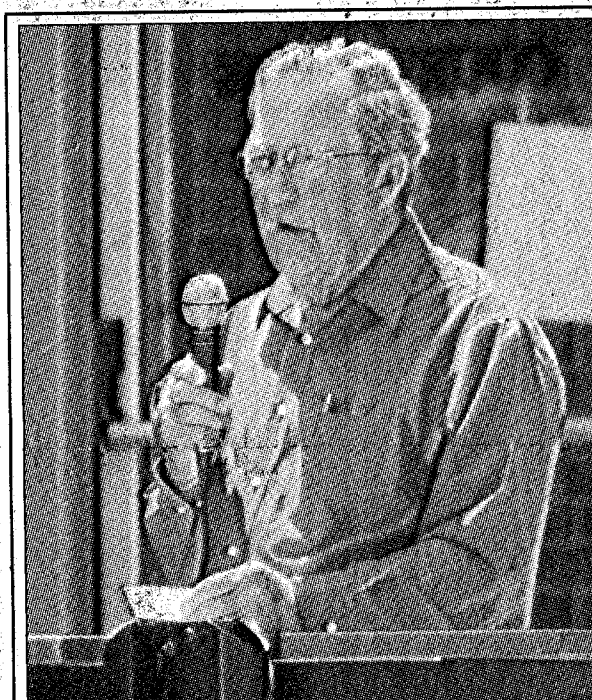

Rockcastle County High School students Addison Atkin and Avery Bradshaw were among 24 high school seniors presented "I Am UNITE" scholarships totaling \$36,000 for being champions for anti-drug efforts during a dinner celebration held Tuesday, May 5, at the London Community Center.

Atkin will be attending Eastern Kentucky University while Bradshaw will be attending Somerset Community and Technical College.

Michael Botticelli, director of the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy, joined Fifth District Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers in recognizing the youth. Each scholarship is worth \$1,500 toward post-secondary expenses. Funding for the scholarships comes from proceeds of the National Rx Drug Abuse Summit, which Operation UNITE has hosted for the past four years.

said the increase will cost the district approximately \$400,000.

The board unanimously passed the 2015-2016 salary schedule.

Coguer also proposed a 2015-2016 auditor contract with White Associates for \$16,000. He said White Associates was the same auditors they used last year and that he was satisfied with their work.

"The feedback we received from them was really good," Coguer said. "They understand our financial situation and they are very good to work with."

The board agreed to hire White Associates as the 2015-2016 auditors.

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Rockcastle Regional gets Quality Award for seventh time

The Kentucky Hospital Association (KHA) announced that Rockcastle Regional Hospital and Respiratory Care Center has received the prestigious KHA Quality Award for hospitals with fewer than 100 beds.

Rockcastle Regional earned the award because of its performance improvement program, a multi-faceted approach to improve patient safety and quality care throughout all levels of the organization.

"Creating an obsession with safety requires it to be the center of all that we do," said Stephen A. Estes, president and CEO of Rockcastle Regional Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "It must be at the heart of every decision we make and how we care for each patient."

A key component of Rockcastle Regional's performance improvement program is the daily safety huddle. In 2013, Estes implemented the practice of having safety meetings

seven days a week to give managers the chance to bring up safety concerns. A loose hand rail, the need for better lighting in a certain area, a patient injury - anything that involves safety is discussed.

When all departments have reported, smaller teams gather to resolve issues brought up in the huddle.

"These huddles allow us to begin every day discussing what is most important: patient safety," Estes said.

Departments across the organization have benefited from this practice.

"Safety huddles have impacted our clinics by allowing us to better communicate with each department," said Wendy Sowder, LPN, of Rockcastle Regional's Rural Health Clinics. "We know each morning how other departments will impact our patient care, and they know what they can expect from our providers. They have allowed the organization to truly work together as a team to help us keep our patients informed, providing them the care and safety they deserve with our respect and compassion."

Another component of the performance improvement program is leadership education and development. Leaders receive regular training on things such as patient and employee communication, managing staff, and goal alignment. These are all key drivers to ensure safety remains a priority throughout the entire organization.

Tammy Brock, RN, MSN, CPHRM, Rockcastle Regional's quality and patient safety director, said the performance improvement program emphasizes that quality is the responsibility of everyone in the organization.

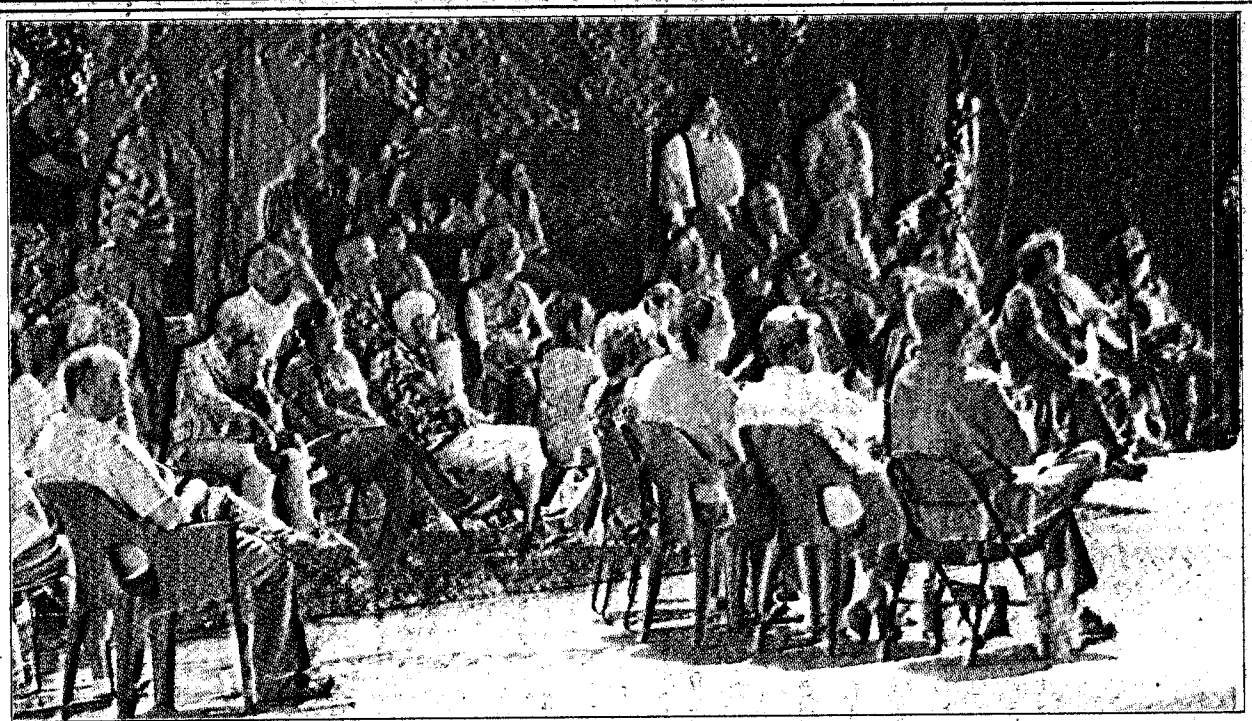
"We have been successful as an organization because we have created a culture that encourages our people to be vigilant about safety, where every person is encouraged to 'stop the line' if they see safety issues arise," Brock said. "This allows us to examine our processes, make necessary changes, and ultimately prevent harm from coming to our patients."

Rockcastle Regional has seen great improvement in patient safety since the program's inception, such as an increase in patient satisfaction scores regarding safety and an 18 percent reduction in patient falls.

But the journey has just begun.

"Sustaining a culture obsessed with patient safety requires consistency," said Estes. "We are creating a true change in the way we

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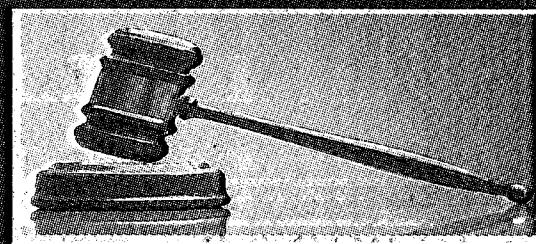

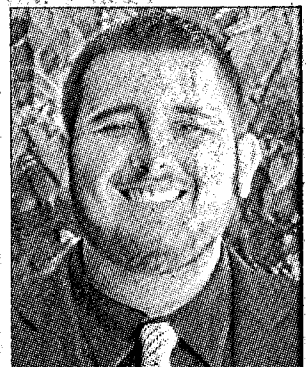
Cameron named National Delta Tau Alpha President

Cameron has held many leadership roles. He was state FFA reporter 2012-13 and represented EKU in the

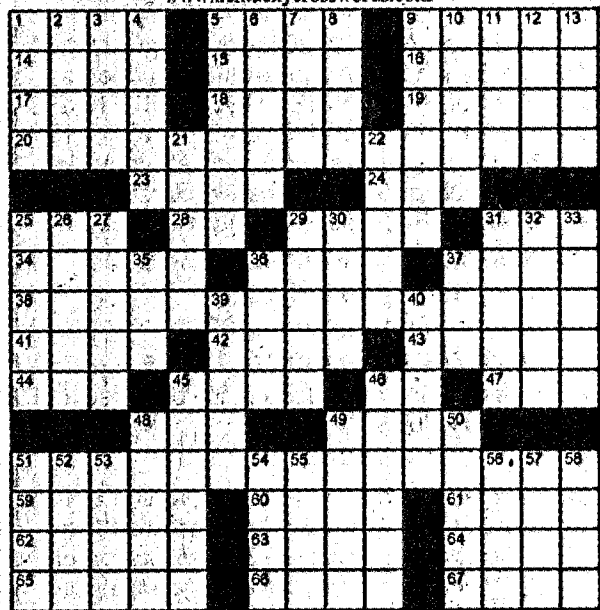

CORN PUDDING

Growing up we called an ear of corn "roashenears". I was in my teens before I realized they were really roasting ears. Once when cousin Joyce was visiting, we ate at a restaurant that had corn on the cob. She ordered her meal with an "ear of cob" as her vegetable. The waitress asked, very politely, if she meant an ear of corn. All Joyce could do was nod her head in agreement.

Most of time we just had the home made creamed corn that we had put in the freezer over the summer. Occasionally we would use store bought canned corn and make a pudding out of it to give it more flavor.

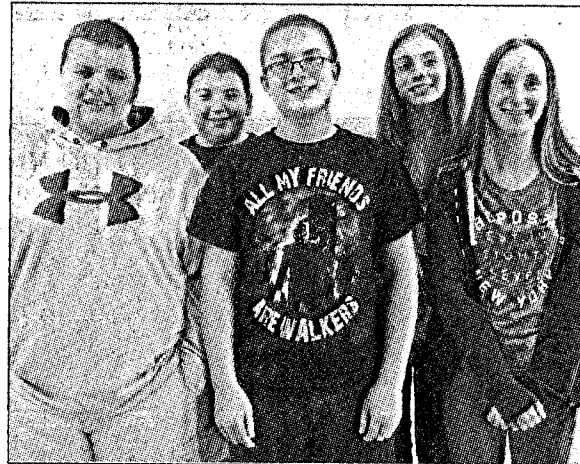
4 tablespoons flour.
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons sugar
2 cans (14 ounce each) whole kernel corn
2 beaten eggs
2 tablespoons melted butter.
2 cups milk
Preheat oven to 350°. Mix flour, salt, sugar, and corn. Combine eggs, melted butter, and milk. Mix with corn mixture. Pour into greased baking dish. Bake for one hour. Stir from bottom 2 or 3 times during the first 30 minutes of baking.

CORN PUDDING SQUARES

This is sister Rhonda's favorite way to fix corn. 1 can (15 ounce) whole kernel corn, undrained
1 can (14 ounce) cream style corn
1 cup sour cream
1/2 cup butter, melted
1 box (8 ounce) Jiffy® cornbread/muffin mix
2 eggs
Preheat oven to 350°. In a large mixing bowl, combine all ingredients; stir just until combined. Pour into greased 9 x 13 baking dish. Bake for 40 to 45 minutes or until wooden toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool slightly before cutting into squares to serve.

SOUR CREAM CORNBREAD

Rhonda's sister-in-law Rita gave us this recipe, one of her favorites.
1/2 can (14 ounce) cream style corn
1 cup self-rising cornmeal mix
1 container (8 ounce) sour cream
2 eggs
1/2 cup oil

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
