

Bevin coming to **Mount Vernon**

Kentucky Governor Matt Bevin is coming to Mount Vernon and will hold a ceremonial bill signing for HB 304. The bill involves the annual transportation budget and includes funding that will be used toward widening I-75 in Rockcastle County.

The stretch of highway in Rockcastle County has involved an unusually large number of traffic accidents and traffic jams.

Bevin will be joined by

State Representative Johnathan Shell and State Senator Jared Carpenter who both led the charge to make the funding a part of the final version of the bill.

"The I-75 problem has negatively impacted the Rockcastle community, along with travelers from all over the country for too long," said Shell.

"It's also a source of concern in terms of economic development and Senator (See "Bevin" on A10)

RCIDA approves budget, discusses several issues

Members of the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority held its regular meeting this Monday at the Courthouse.

Among the items on the agenda was the approval of the May 2, 2016 budget. The

budget summary shows revenues at \$30,001.71 and receipts and cash at the same amount.

Under Appropriations, operations were listed at \$9,374.03 and debt services listed at \$27,000.

The budget summary says the shortfall needed from the County Government is \$6,372.32.

In other action Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Doug Bishop told members of the board that he may have another party interested in the Anchor Packaging Building in the Business Park. "We are hoping for some good news anytime

now," said Bishop. Vice Chairman Corey Craig also told board members that the water and sewer line work at the park is expected to begin this week and he thinks the work will only take a few days once

started. The board was also visited by Jamie Shepherd, **Jackson Energy Community** relations Coordinator, to introduce herself to the members of the board.

Shepherd said she will make herself available to the board in any way she can.

> The school board maintained leadership and control of issues such as budget. but the SBDM makes internal policy decisions, according to Becky Isaacs, Rockcastle County District Supervisor.

Local schools are nominating and electing their SBDM council members this week who will take the office of SBDM board member on July 1.

"SBDMs have grown and developed over the years and have become a very important part of student education," said Isaacs. "The biggest benefit is to each student who now has a voice in policy that effects their education."

According to RCHS Principal Jennifer Mattingly, some of the duties of the SBDM council include selecting a principal, how staff time is used, how space in the school is used, scheduling classes and staff time, curriculum and instruction, classroom management, extra curricular activities and many others.

"This is an opportunity for the schools to govern themselves with the support of the school board. Our SBDM policies can't overstep the School Board, but we work together to give parents and teachers and the students themselves a voice," said Mattingly.

According to Mattingly, the school board gives each school a budget and then the SBDM council and budget committee decide how to use those funds. If there is a need that may not have been allowed for in the budget, the SBDM council will ap-

The Development Board is working with volunteers and the City of Livingston to create a local museum room in the former Livingston school


The City of Livingston is making repairs to the space, which will become an educational stop for the Boone Trace project and will be an interactive museum space to attract children.

The first phase of the museum room space will be a twenty by eight foot mural depicting local pioneer history events. Rockcastle High School art teacher Les Scalf will be heading up the creation of this mural with the help of students and graduated art students.

Following the mural, which will be presented to the public on May 25th at 1p.m., other pioneer vignettes will be installed in the room.

This project is funded by an Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) Flex-E-Grant through the Kentucky Department for Local Government and administered by Brushy Fork Institute at Berea College. Flex-E-Grant funds are made available to economically distressed ARC counties in Kentucky for projects that




Early last week my favorite computer keyboard died. I changed batteries twice, tried every available USB port, slapped it a few times, cussed it out and finally gave it up for dead.

I'm trying to give a voice to those people left out of the political process."

Wilder also touched on the country's need to rebuild infrastructure. "Infrastructure includes tech education and providing high speed internet and tech and trade education to build a better 21st century economy," he said.

On the Second Amendment, Wilder said he believes Republicans and Democrats agree on more than people think. "We all agree that a 6 year-old should not be allowed to purchase a handgun and that high school students shouldn't be allowed to bring an assault weapon to school," Wilder said. "The debate is where to draw those lines. I believe it is reasonable to restrict firearms to convicted felons and the only way to do that is universal background

Wilder said his goal, if chosen as the nominee, is to hold a public debate on the issue of gun control. "We need to find common ground and ways to improve public safety and prevent mass shootings," he said.

As for the Presidential candidates, Wilder said he prefers Bernie Sanders' platform. "The central premise of his campaign is that we have a nation that values power and profit more than people," said

Wilder identifies himself as a "Progressive" Democrat. "For me, being a progressive means I am a little more focused on the needs of people over corporate."

Wilder said he wants voters to understand his values during his campaign. "I want people to know that I care about their needs and am willing to take difficult political positions to help them. My goal is to have a completely open hearted and truthful campaign and let the chips falls where they may," he said.








Seventh grade center fielder Madison Yates makes a big defensive play in the top of the sixth inning in the RCMS game against Garrard County Friday night.








Hunter Spivey slides safely into second base in the middle school's 9-3 win over Russell County last Friday night. Spivey was also on the mound for the Rockets.


"We have a wonderful working relationship between our SBDM councils and our school board. The Superintendent (David Pensol) and school board members trust us and we are all on the same team. And that's the team whose goal is to provides the best possible education for our students,"

Mattingly said there isn't really a downside to having SBDM councils. "We don't want council members who rubber stamp everything we say. We want members who care and speak up and provide input and help us be a better school system," she said.

However, Mattingly said one of the biggest challenges is to find parent members for the SBDM council. "Parents are very busy these days and being on the SBDM Council is a commitment. There is only one regular meeting per month but issues develop and there are special called meetings and research to be done on issues," she said. "It can take up some valuable time for a parent. But it is such a rewarding thing to take part in your child's education and that of the entire school.'

In the early 1990s, criticism of the SBDM Councils made headlines across the state. But over the past 25 years, SBDM Councils have become a staple in the educational system in Kentucky.

"We have refined and improved the system greatly now and students across the state enjoy a better education experience partly because of the caring people who sit on an SBDM Council," Mattingly added.

British Parliament in 1765, this new tax required all colonists to pay a tax on every printed piece of paper they used. The Stamp Act was viewed by the colonists as "taxation without representation." Each writer was to describe a colonial family's discussion about the new Stamp Act and what

The National Society of role it played in organizing the colonists against the British King and Parliament. Writers were challenged to write a 500-1000 essay (depending on grade level). Each essay submitted was judged by the local DAR chapter. One essay winner from each grade level was eligible to be submitted by the local chapter for state competition. State winners will be judged on national district level and finally district winners will be eligible for the national competition in Washington this June. National winners will be awarded at Continental Congress and presented a medal, certificate and monetary award.

Operation UNITE funding included in state budget

The final version of a two-year state budget approved by lawmakers and Governor Matt Bevin provides funding for Operation UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education) and signals a commitment to continue Kentucky's national leadership on reversing this country's opioid epidemic.

"This opioid abuse problem is resulting in a life being lost every 20 minutes in this country," said Nancy Hale, president and CEO of UNITE. "It's tearing apart families and devastating communities. Governor Matt Bevin and the Legislature are to be commended for understanding the importance of this issue and making it a priority."

"UNITE's strategy of getting key advocates, treatment providers, policymakers and law enforcement to work together to create a multi-faceted solution to this troubling epidemic is positively impacting the region and serving as a national model."

Currently UNITE's prevention and treatment initiatives include:

• "On The Move!" - a one-of-a-kind initiative targeting students in 7th and 10th grades. Provided in partnership with Appalachia HIDTA (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area), this mobile prevention program utilizes five interactive components related to distracted and impaired driving, and provides real-time data collection aligned with the Kentucky Core Curriculum. More than 12,000 students from 131 schools in 32 counties have completed this program through April 15, 2016.

• UNITE Service Corps A nationally recognized AmeriCorps initiative with 44 full-time members providing math tutoring and drug abuse prevention education at elementary schools in 13 southern and eastern Kentucky school districts. During the 2014-15 school year, student test stores increased 42.12% for the 1.760 students receiving (Continued on B3)



SLOW COOKER ROSEMARY GARLIC **POTATOES**

1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil 4 medium red potatoes, cubed into 1/2" pieces 3 cloves garlie, minced 1 tablespoon chopped fresh rosemary

1 teaspoon salt • Add oil to the slow cooker, turn to high and allow to heat up while preparing potatoes, about 15 minutes of preheating is good.

After preheating, place remaining ingredients in 5-to 7-quart slow cooker. Toss to coat all potatoes with the oil. Cook on high 2 to 3 hours or low 4 to 5 hours on low, or until potatoes are tender and browned.

BAKED POTATOES WITH GRAVY 4 medium baking potatoes

1/2 pound bacon 1/3 cup flour Salt to taste 3 cups milk Chopped chives, optional About 10 minutes before

potatoes are baked, make the gravy. Pan-fry bacon over low heat until brown and crispy. Remove from skillet. Pour off all grease except for about 1/3 cup. Blend flour and salt in remaining fat. Gradually add milk; cook and stir un-

til thickened and smooth. As you take the potatoes out of the oven, squeeze them between thick folds of cloth to crack them open and make them fluffy.

Pour gravy over the potatoes. Crumble bacon and sprinkle over the gravy. If desired sprinkle with chives.

HASH BROWN CASSE-**ROLE**

This is a wonderful potato dish that works for breakfast, lunch, or dinner. The first time I tasted it was at a breakfast potluck at Bank of Oak Ridge when I worked there in 1980. 2 pounds cubed frozen hash browns, thawed 1/2 cup melted butter 1/2 cup chopped onions 2 cups shredded Cheddar

Cheese 1 can cream of chicken soup 1 carton (8 ounce) sour **èream**

1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 teaspoon salt 2 cups corn flake crumbs 1/4 cup melted butter Preheat oven to 350°. Spray 13 X 9 baking dish. Layer potatoes in bottom of pan and pour 1/2 cup melted butter over them. Sprinkle with onions and cheese. Mix soup, sour cream, salt and pepper. Pour over potatoes. Mix crushed corn flakes and 1/4 cup melted butter. Sprinkle over top. Bake one hour or until bubbly and golden on top.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure

Fluoride varnish treatments can help prevent tooth decay

Healthy gums and teeth are important in a child's early development. This is why talking to your child's doctor about good dental habits even before your child's first tooth appears is important.

"Good oral health is an integral part of a child's overall health," says Dr. Sarah Oliver, pediatrician at Rockcastle Pediatrics and Adolescents. "Giving your child the best start in life in terms of oral hygiene is vital for them to prevent tooth decay and to have healthy teeth and gums into adulthood."

Recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), fluoride varnish is one method pediatricians and dentists are using to help their patients prevent tooth decay, slow it down, or stop it from getting worse. Fluoride varnish is made with fluoride, a mineral that can strengthen tooth enamel, the outer coating on teeth.

Once your child has a tooth, your doctor may recommend that your child receive fluoride varnish treatments two to four times per year. The number of treatments depend on how likely your child is to get a cavity.

Because many young children do not have access to a dentist until they are older, the AAP now recommends that pediatricians perform this procedure in clinics visits for children when teeth first begin to appear through age six. Providers at Rockcastle Pediatrics and Adolescents have completed training in fluoride varnish and are now offering this service to their patients.

During a fluoride varnish, your child's pediatrician will paint the top and sides of each tooth with a small brush. The painless process is very quick. The fluoride hardens soon after it is applied and is brushed off after four to 12 hours.

While studies have shown that fluoride varnish helps to greatly reduce the risk of cavities, it cannot completely prevent them. The treatments are most effective when a child is also brushing their teeth using the right amount of toothpaste with fluoride, flossing regularly, getting regular dental care, and eating a healthy diet.

Dr. Oliver says that this new service is yet another resource parents can utilize to insure the overall health of their children. "By implementing the fluoride varnish program, not only are we following the most recent AAP guidelines, we also hope to emphasize the importance of good dental health to our patients that will carry them throughout their lives."

Bible Talk


Where will you live in eternity, in Heaven or in Hell? How you live today will affect your destiny.

Early Childhood & Kindergarten REGISTRATION & SCREENING



There are two programs in Rockcastle County that offer free early childhood education services to qualifying four year old children. (Three year old children may be eligible with an identified disability.) The programs are: The Rockcastle County Public Preschool and Kentucky River Foothills Head Start.

WHAT TO BRING FOR REGISTRATION

Please bring your child's state birth certificate (hospital copy will not be accepted), social security card (optional), immunization certificate, proof of income and proof of medical coverage (i.e. medical card or insurance card) to register. Call your school with any questions and to make an appointment to register your child.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

The following health requirements must be met in order to enroll in the early childhood program and kindergarten.

- Physical exam
- Blood pressure and lead screening
- Dental exam
- Vision exam Immunizations.

To be eligible for Rockcastle County Public Preschool, your child must be 4 years old by August 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

ELIGIBILITY

- 1. Be eligible for Free Lunch
- 2. Have a disability
- 3. Three year olds may be eligible with an identified disability.
- Non-qualifying four year olds may attend
- the Early Childhood program as space

To be eligible for Head Start, your child must be 4 years old by August 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

- 1. Meet Federal Income Guidelines
- 2. Have a disability
- Be eligible for Public Assistance (SSI, K-TAP, Child Care Subsidy)
- Meet guidelines for being considered a homeless family
- Reside in a foster home

What is a disability? A delay in one or more of the following areas is considered a disability:

- 1. Speech and language
- 2. Large and fine motor
- 3. Cognitive skills 4. Social and emotional
- 5. Self-help skills
