

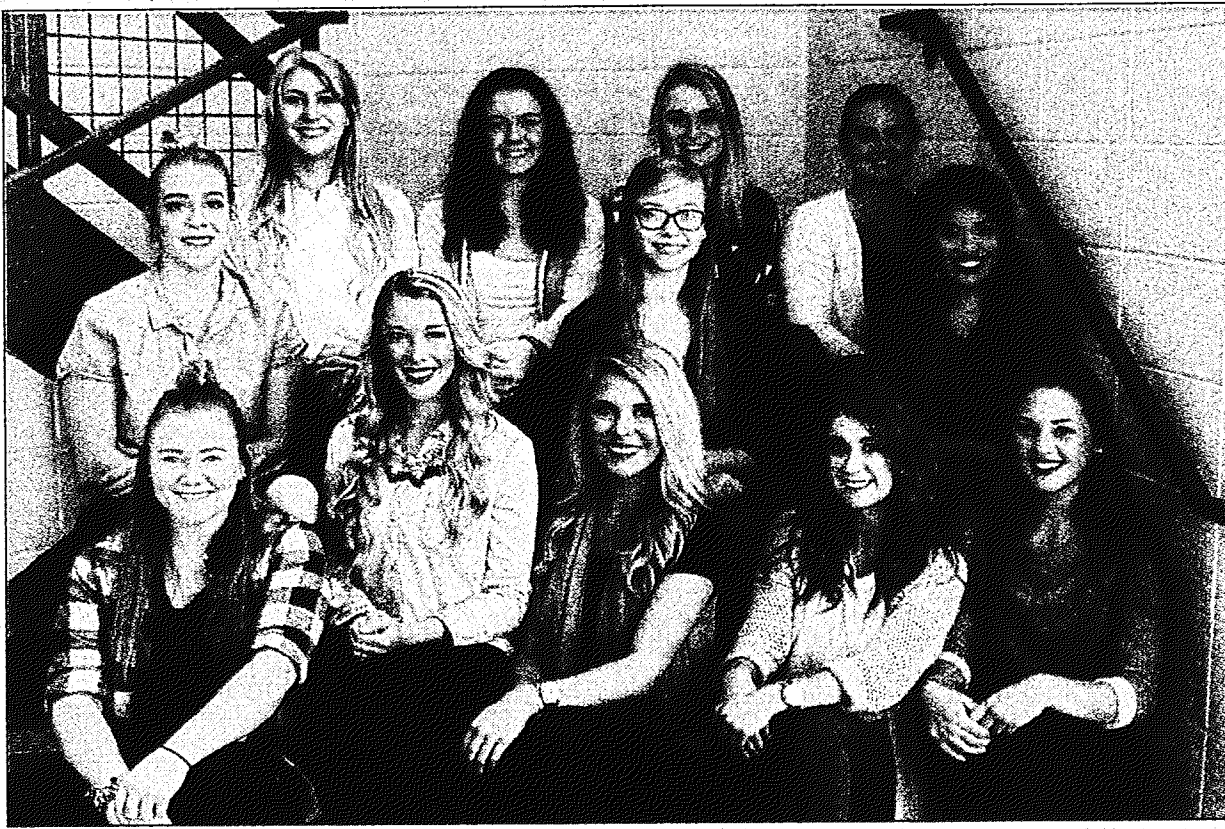

City to purchase new water pump

Officials in the City of Mount Vernon may have found a solution to the aging water pump issue.

Two weeks ago, one of the two pumps that provide water to every home and business in Rockcastle County, broke down and city officials began a dash to avoid a possible water emergency.

Originally, officials planned to repair the pump immediately but that was going to take six to eight weeks, according to estimates and was thought to cost as much as \$30,000. The cost of a new pump, at that time, was estimated to be \$250,000.

However, this week city officials found a new water pump with a warranty for less than \$50,000, according to City Administrator Josh Bray.

"Our water plant can produce all the water in the

world and it doesn't help a thing if we can't pump it," said Bray. "This new pump will be a huge benefit to our county and greatly increase reliability and performance."

Bray said the city received the bid for the new pump from Straser Pump Company in Indiana and Mayor Mike Bryant immediately began the process of purchasing that pump.

"It looks like we can roll some funding out of the water project and be able to secure this brand new, greatly improved pump for our city," said Bray.

The city has a \$2.6 million "Water Plant Project" in the budget with includes a grant of over \$1 million and Bray says the city may be able to pay for the new pump from that funding.

Bray said officials are now looking into the legalities of using the grant funding from the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority to purchase the new pump, but since the funding is for water plant infrastructure improvements, he believes the new pump will fit into that

Kentucky State Trooper Scottie Pennington conducted an investigation Friday that resulted in the confiscation of methamphetamine and the arrest of Ashley L. Tharp, 35, of Crab Orchard, according to a KSP report.

After receiving information of suspected drug activity, Trooper Pennington conducted a "knock in talk" at 108 Wallin Street in Brodhead and, according to the report, discovered a camper trailer in the back of the residence where Tharp was staying.

According to Pennington, "knock in talk" is a method used by police

story weaves the twisted relationship between Aunt Beck, her niece, old Carl, Freddie and a host of other caricatures.

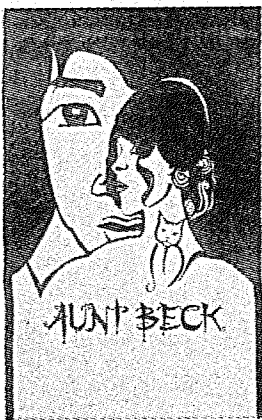
It also looks at the behavioral health

Home schooling on the increase

Though enrollment in public school is strong, over 150 Rockcastle County students are now enrolled in home school. There are 2,890 students enrolled in the school system.

"Home schooling is having an effect on our enrollment numbers," said Superintendent David Pensol. "But the main goal is to help each student reach their highest potential."

Pensol said there are

some good home schools in the county and probably some that may not be, but there is really no way to know the difference.

"Our teachers are highly trained professionals and it's difficult to get that level of education from someone who is not trained," Pensol said. "Don't misunderstand, we do have some very strong home schools. But not all of them are, and the goal here is to provide the best possible education for

each student."

In fact, though Kentucky has an attendance law, anyone who wishes to home school their child can do so with a simple letter to the school board. According to Becky Isaacs, Director of Student Services, the requirements are simple, "Anyone who wants to home school their child simply has to submit a letter of intent to enroll their child in

Ford to represent Kentucky at Oakmont

Conner Ford, 6, recently won the Kentucky Drive, Chip and Putt Championship (7 to 9 year old division) held at Persimmon Ridge Golf Course in Louisville, after winning the local qualifier at Gibson Bay Golf Course in Richmond.

Kentucky had four qualifying sites where the top three golfers at each site advanced to the championship in Louisville.

He will now represent Kentucky in competition at Oakmont Golf Course in Pennsylvania, the site of this year's U.S. Open. If he wins at Oakmont he will compete for the U.S. title at Augusta National in Georgia. Augusta National is the most prestigious golf course in the world and is the host of the Masters Tournament.

The Drive Chip and Putt Championship was started by the PGA of America, United States Golf Association and the Masters Tournament as a national skills competition to encourage and reward young golfers who participate in the game of golf.

This year in Kentucky approximately 500 young golfers participated in the competition and over 20,000 nationally have competed.

Of course, they didn't do it right. At least it doesn't suit me. But it was the only option before cutting it for

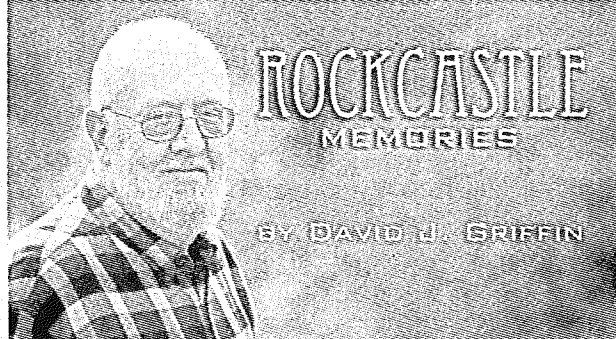
hay. Anyway, I've learned my lesson. The next time I pass an unkept yard I will assume the owner just had horrible timing this year. He's probably not a slob after all.

Boards of Education

For the past eight years, I have been proud to be a member of the Powell County Board of Education. My two terms were unique to Powell County because I was the first retired educator to seek the office. I was twice elected chairman of the board. Mt. Vernon Independent Board of Education.

Pop was elected to the Mt. Vernon Independent Board when I was approximately five years old. I am pretty sure of my age because I had not yet entered the first grade. Pop had me accompany him to one of his monthly meetings. I think he wanted me to see firsthand how much effort was being spent in order for Mt. Vernon's children to be properly educated.

Education was extremely important to Pop because he personally had to leave school after the eighth grade. His family needed him to get a job to help with his family's needs. He must have been disappointed because he was a very bright individual. Most of his mathematical calculations were solved in his head.

I can recall other members of that board, with possibly one exception. Pop served with: Bob McKenzie, N. M. Smock, and Logan Bryant. I believe Wayne Jasper might have been the fourth member. In those days, boards of education usually held to the "good old boy" philosophy. These men were somewhat different, and all were held in high esteem in Mt. Vernon because of their business reputations.

Because I lived with Pop and Mommie Katie, I was aware of the number of phone calls that he received on a regular basis. People called looking for jobs as educators, custodians, bus drivers, and cooks. It is my opinion that Pop never promised anything until he had conferred with the other members of that board and, of course, the Superintendent.

If my memory serves well, I believe that Clyde Linville was the Superintendent and that Bill Landrum was the high school principal. When I entered the first grade, I felt like everyone knew I was Pop's grandson. My teachers frequently asked how Pop was doing. Pop took his position on

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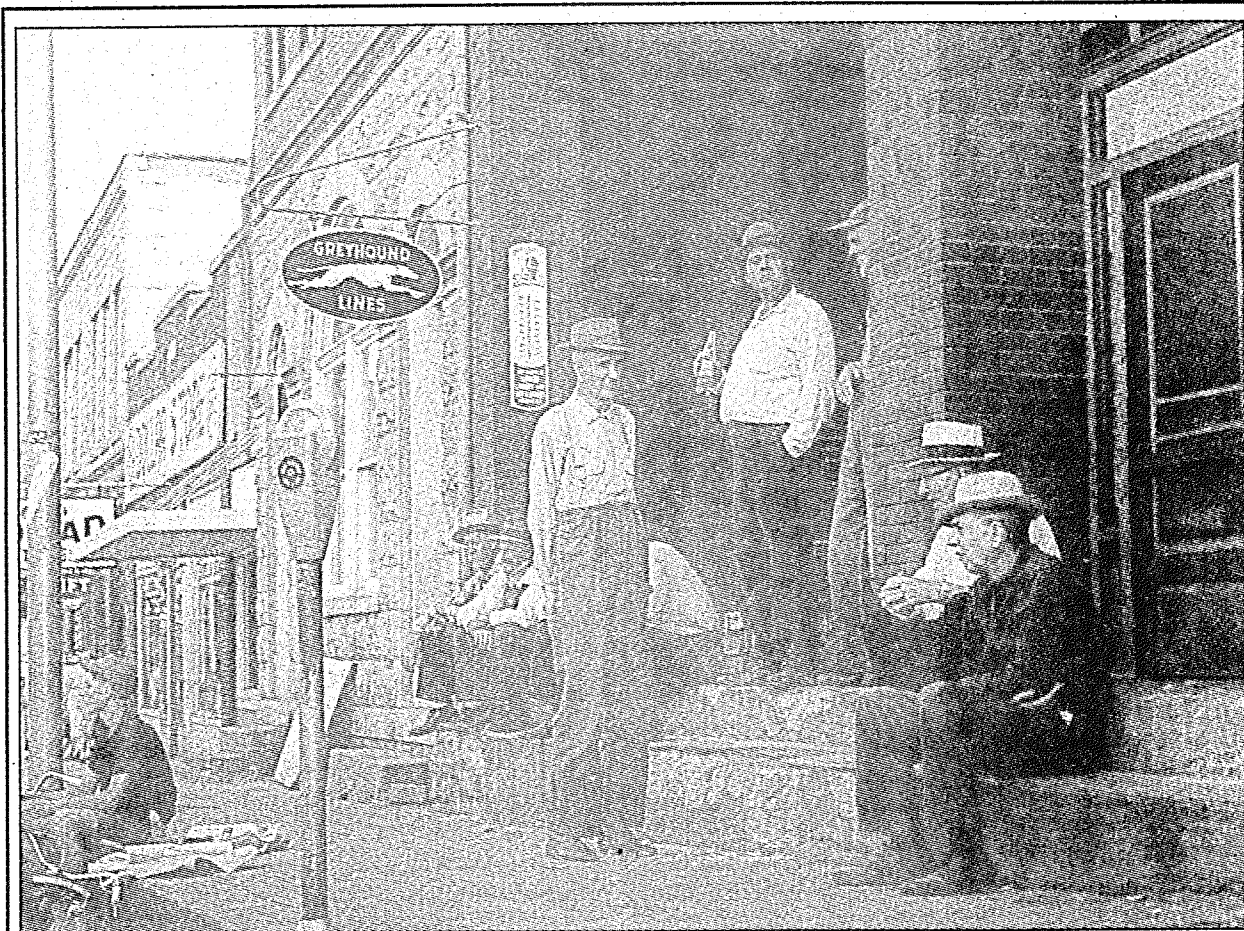

Ample rain means promising outlook for dove season

The generous rains combined with abundant summer sunshine spurred excellent growth for sunflowers planted on the public dove fields across the state. Hunters should find excellent conditions for the opening of dove season on the traditional date of Sept. 1.

"Across the board, our dove fields have done well this year," said John Brunjes, migratory bird coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "It was just dry enough for planting, but wet enough to grow well."

Three segments comprise dove season. The first segment closes Oct. 26. The second segment opens Nov. 24 and closes Dec. 4, while the third opens Dec. 24, 2016, and closes Jan. 15, 2017.

Dove population monitoring using leg bands show good numbers of young birds in the Kentucky population. "We have a lot more young birds this year than in the last two years," Brunjes said. "We had two fairly poor reproductive years for doves due to bad weather during nesting time. The increased number of young birds will lead to better hunting this year."

Pre-season scouting places a hunter into an advantageous position when time comes to pick a dove field to hunt. "Find fields that have birds during your pre-season scouting," Brunjes said. "If there are no birds using a field prior to opening day, there are likely not going to be any birds on opening day

either. It sounds simple, but hunt where you saw birds prior to opening day."

Doves aren't as wary during the first few days of the season as they are later after hunters educate them. As a result, the first few days of the season produce the easiest shots. That being said, that doesn't mean hunters should wear a white T-shirt or a bright cap on opening day.

"I recommend wearing at least a camouflage tee shirt for early season dove hunting," Brunjes said. "The later in the season you hunt; the more you need to camo up."

Safety is another important consideration for dove hunters. The dove season opener is many hunters first time in the field since last winter. Anxiety and excitement often bait a hunter into taking a risky shot.

"Shooting at low birds is a serious problem," Brunjes said. "Think about where you are shooting before you pull the trigger. There is no shame in passing on a shot if you are unsure."

Avoid shooting near dwellings or other buildings where your shot might land on them. Be careful hunting around livestock. They often spook when they hear a shotgun's blast, exposing themselves to injury or escape.

"Always wear eye and ear protection as well," Brunjes said.

Those who plan to hunt public fields should pack out what they bring into the field. "If you want public dove fields in the future, pick up after yourself," Brunjes said. "We lose fields regularly

because of littering."

As a common courtesy to the landowner, hunters should pick up their spent shell hulls and ammunition boxes and clean their doves at home, not at the field. "Think about how you would like someone to treat your land and do the same," Brunjes said.

Dove hunters must have a valid Kentucky hunting license, their Kentucky migratory game bird - waterfowl permit along with their Harvest Information Program (H.I.P.) confirmation number recorded on either this permit or their hunting license.

"Last year, our law enforcement officers reported 90 percent of hunters they checked had their H.I.P. confirmation number," Brunjes said. "We've had excellent compliance."

To get your H.I.P. number, visit the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife website at www.fw.ky.gov, click on the "My Profile" tab. Then, answer a few questions about last season's harvest of migratory birds and get your confirmation number. Again, remember to record your H.I.P. confirmation number on either your Kentucky hunting license or Kentucky migratory game bird - waterfowl permit.

The fog now common in the morning foreshadows the coming of fall. Get out and enjoy the excitement of dove hunting this year.

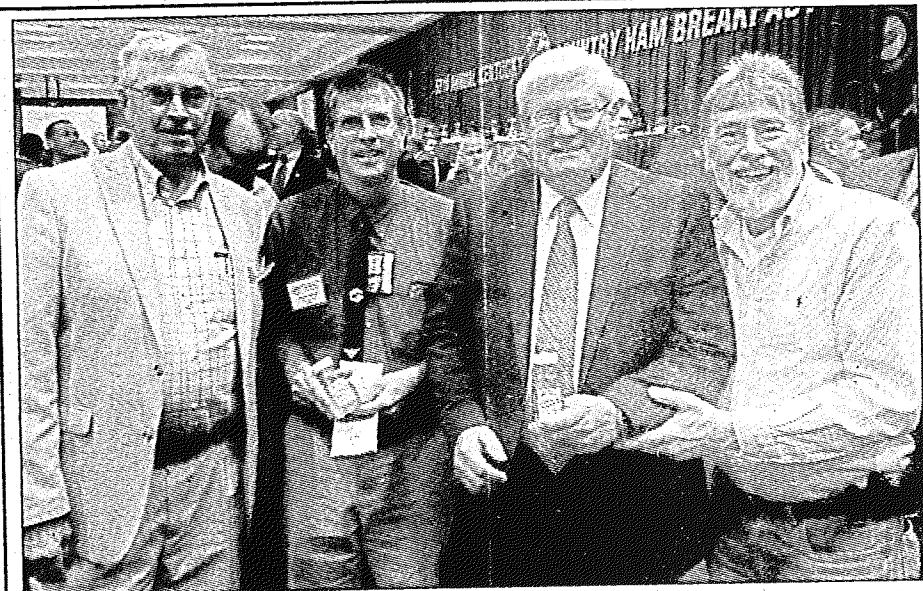

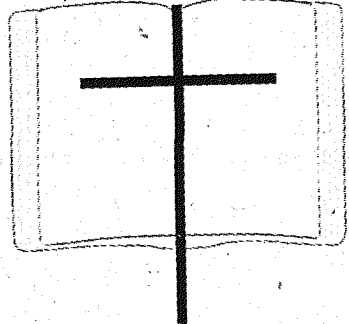

Bible Talk

Our study this month we would like to look at the three crosses of Calvary.

A Cross of Rebellion - On one of the crosses next to the Lord, was a rebellious sinner who was punished justly for his wrongs. Proud and arrogant, he railed and blasphemed the Lord. "And one of the malefactors which were hanged railed on him, saying, If thou be Christ, save thyself and us." Luke 23:39. This man symbolizes humanity in general, rebellious and sinful. He can only think of saving his own neck, not his soul; carnally minded unto the end. Most people have this mind set: selfish, sinful, defiant and will be lost in eternity. "Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat." Matt.7:13.

A Cross of Repentance - On the other side of Jesus was another thief had joined in the railing the Lord. As the gravity of the situation began to sink in, he repented. "But the other answering rebuked him, saying, Dost not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation? The Colonel kicker shanked the punt and the Rockets took over on Bourbon's 32, ten plays later, which included two first downs, on fourth and goal, Brent Lovell took the ball up the middle for the TD. Dalton Rowe kicked the first of his four extra points in the game and it was 7-0 Rockets at the 5:48 mark.

The next score for the Rockets came just a minute and 45 seconds later when the ball was hiked over the Colonel's punter's head. He kicked it into the end zone and the Rockets were credited with a safety making it 9-0 Rockets.

The Colonels also had to kick the ball to the Rockets who started their second series on

Bourbon's 47. On fourth and four, quarterback Chayse McClure ran the ball 40 yards for the touchdown making it 15-0. The extra point attempt failed.

The Rockets failed to score in the second quarter and the quarter ended with the Colonels holding the Rockets out of the endzone from the one yard line.

The Rockets got the ball to begin the second half and had to punt the ball away on their first series.

The Rockets last score of the game was on a six yard pass play from Bishop to Jaden Payne. Rowe's extra point was

again good and it was 38-0 Rockets.

The Colonels only score of the game came, following a Rocket fumble, on a pass at the 4:54 mark of the fourth quarter. The extra point was good for a final score of 38-7.

The Rockets got 263 rushing yards and 47 passing yards and allowed minus 30 rushing yards and 37 passing yards.

Offensively, the Rockets were led in rushing by QB Chayse McClure with 77 yards on eight carries; Holdan Barnett picked up 55 yards on 10 carries; Lovell and Payne each were credited with 35 yards - Payne's on five carries and Lovell's on nine. Rowe picked up 27 yards on nine carries; Robinson got 25 yards in four carries and Roger Hoover one carry for nine yards.

Starting quarterback Chayse McClure was four for five in passing with 14 net yards while Dakota Bishop was one for one for 32 yards net and one touchdown.

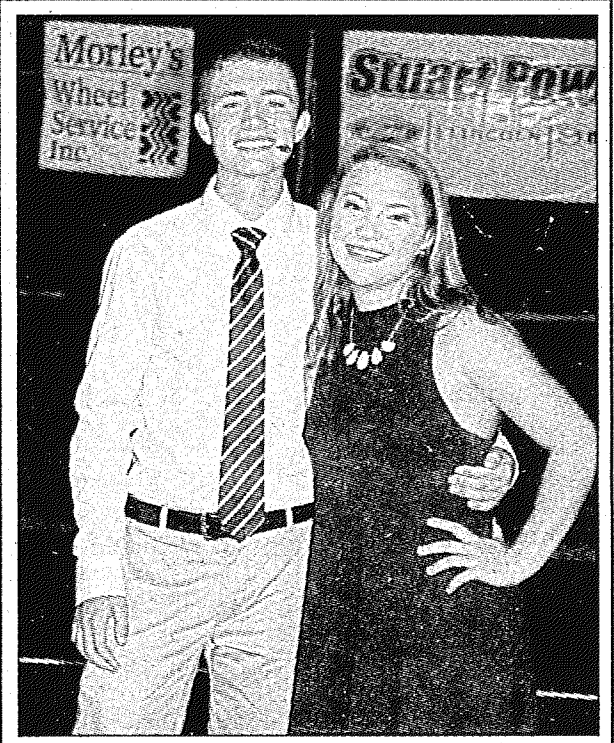

Coffey, Logan Barnett and Noah Prickett were each credited with a quarterback sack.

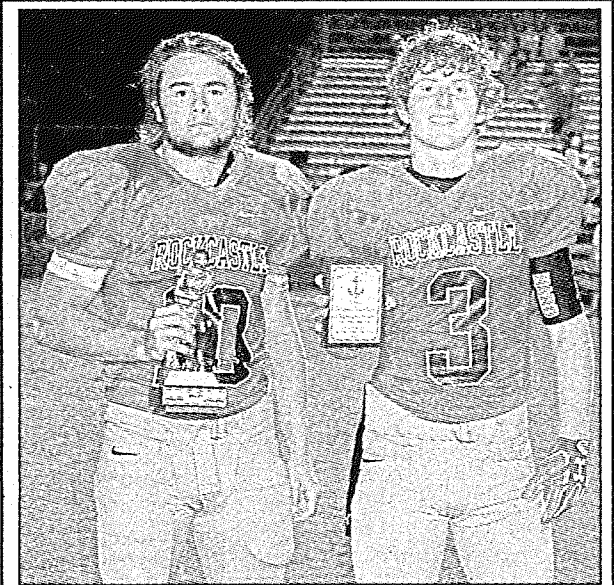

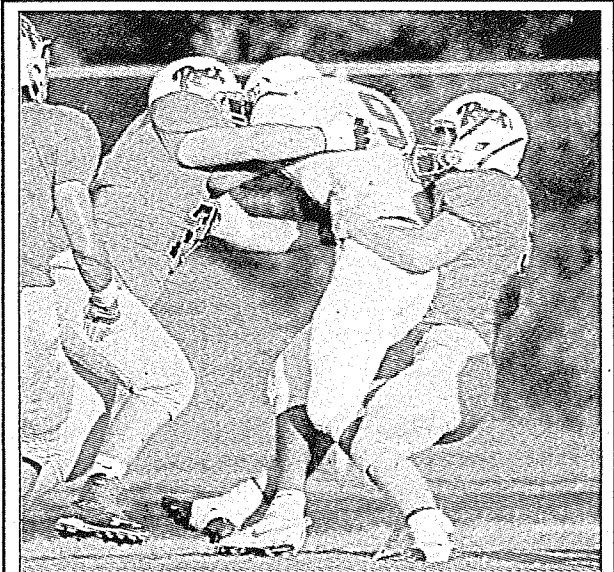

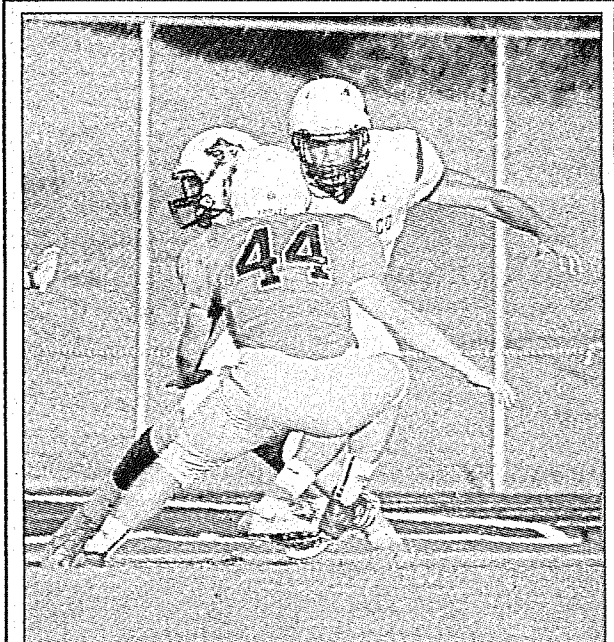

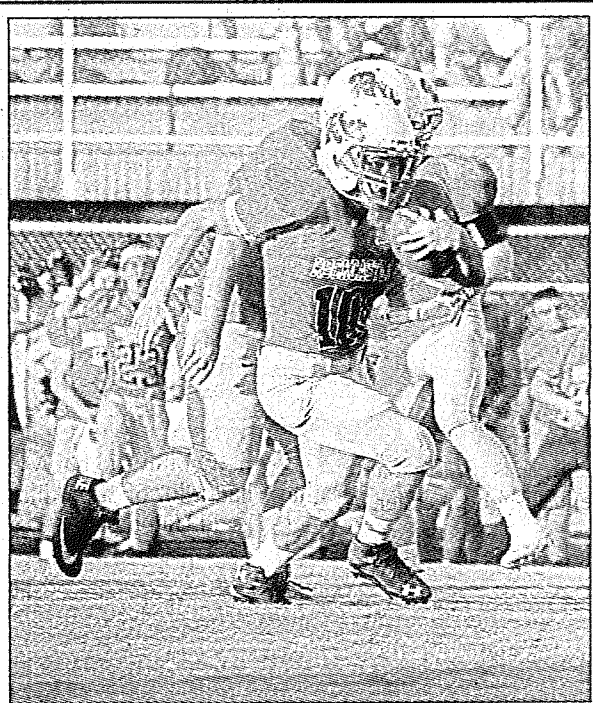
Junior Brent Lovell is shown scoring a touchdown for the Rockets in the first half. Lovell carried the ball nine times on the night.



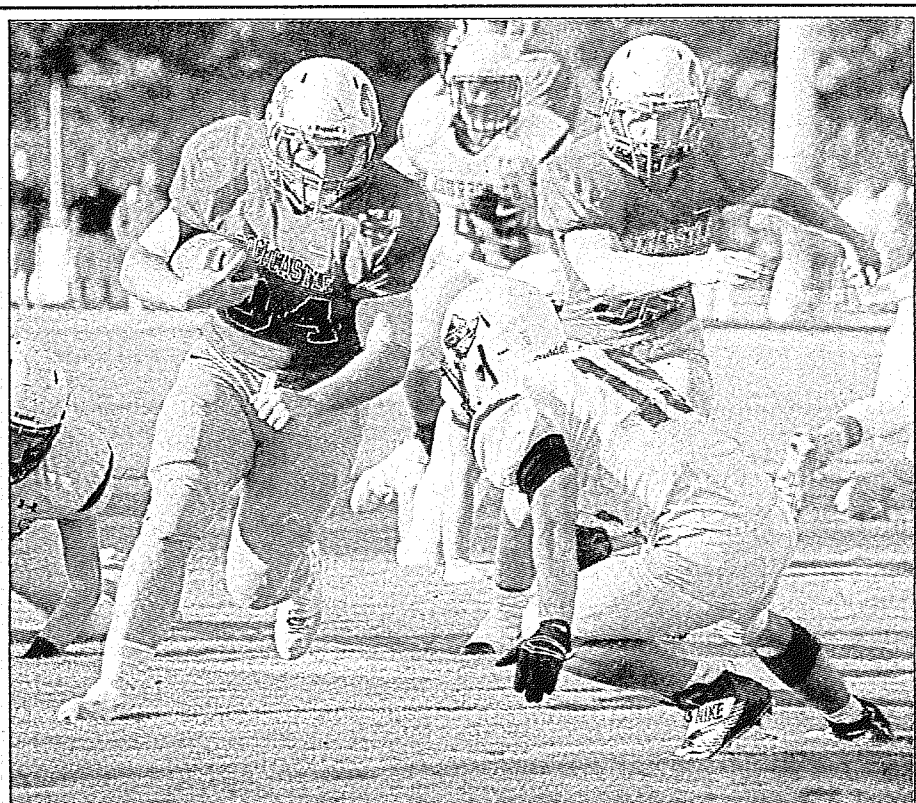
Jarod Robinson and Logan Coffey bring down a Bourbon player in the backfield during the Rockets victory last Friday night.



Senior linebacker Devon Robinson puts pressure on Bourbon County's quarterback during the Rockets' season opening win last Friday night.



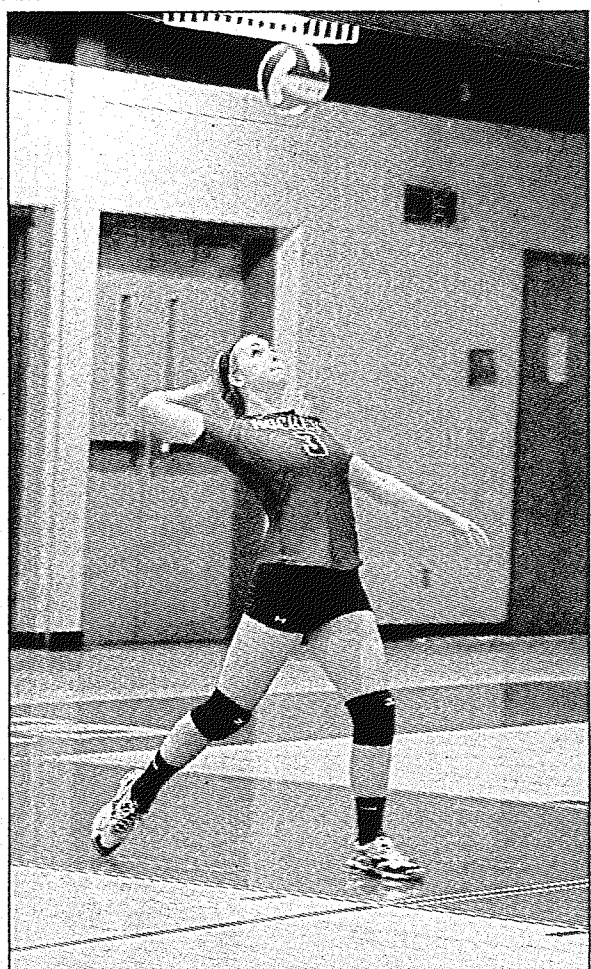

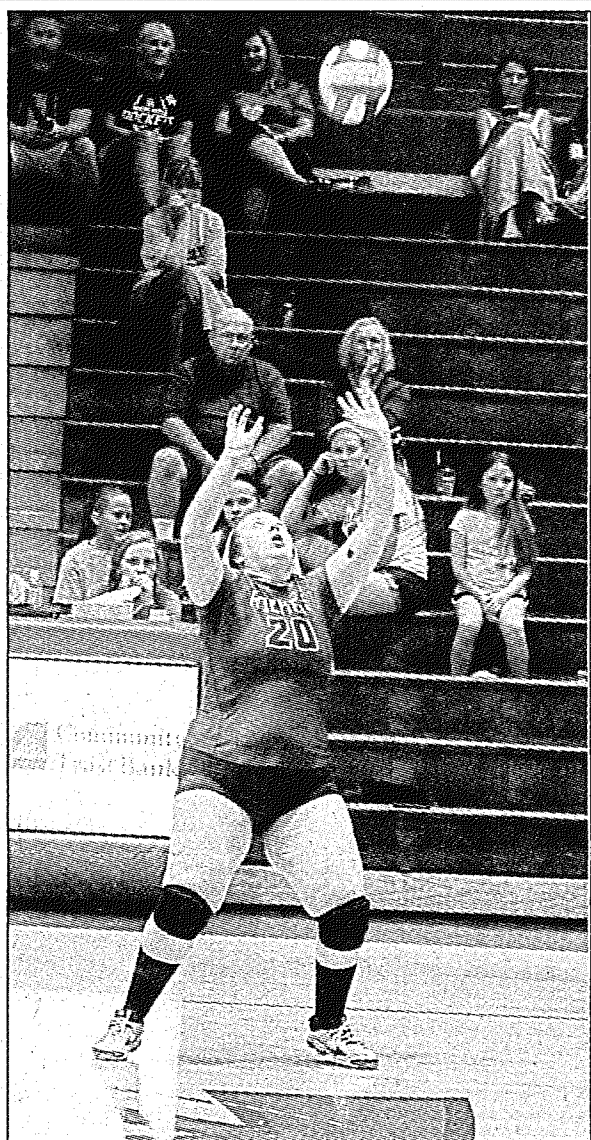

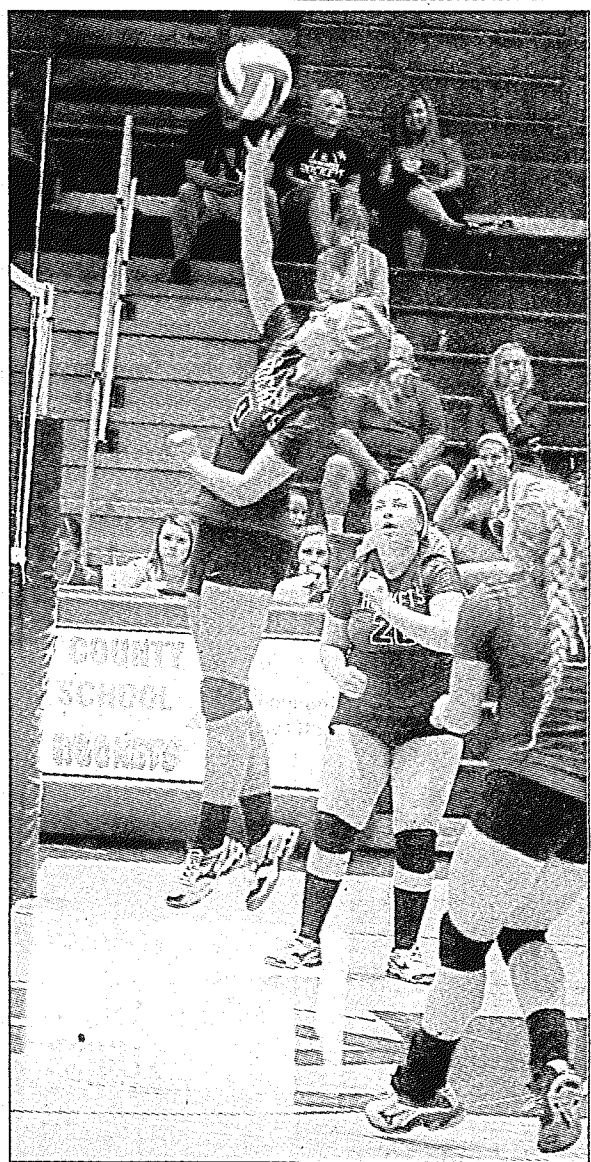

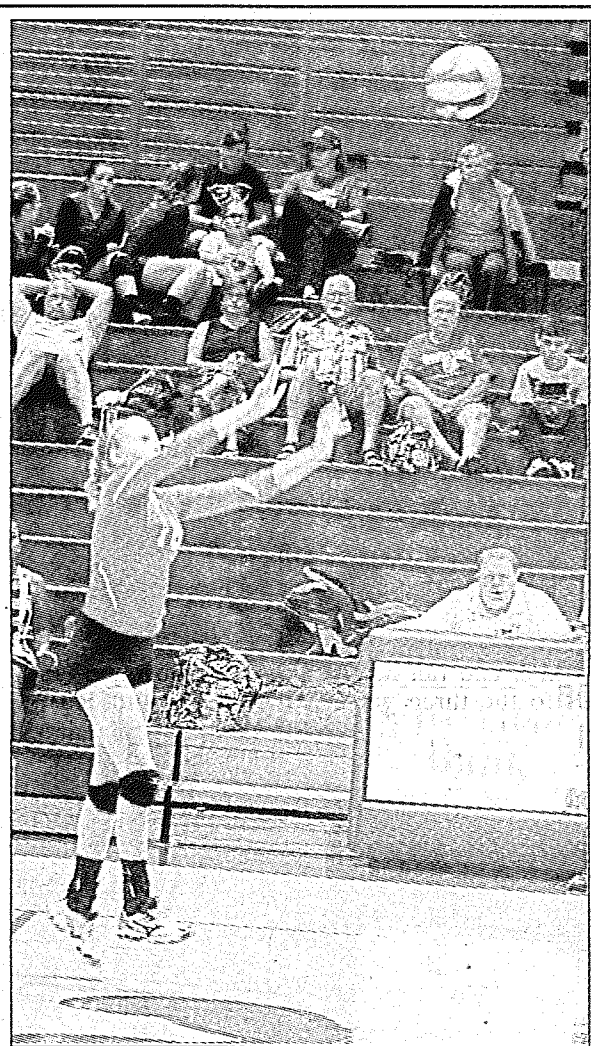

category. "There are a lot of positive things about this new pump. It works differently and provides better service," he said. "Also it has upgrade capabilities that our old pumps didn't have so it provides for our future needs as well."

Bray said there is also discussion of repairing the other old pump soon and keeping the existing old pump as a third back up so that this possible emergency can be avoided in the future.

"If both our pumps had gone down at the same time, it could have been a very serious matter," said Bray.

More good news, accord-

ing to Bray, is the new, improved pump is expected to be in sometime next week. "It was going to take a longer time to repair the old pump than to get this new pump installed. The longer we go with only one pump, the more risk we faced," he said.

Mayor Bryant agreed and said during the last city council meeting that getting both pumps up and running was an imperative issue.

"We aren't in an emergency situation because we have a back up pump. But it is crucial that we move on this immediately and make certain the people of Rockcastle County are served," he said.

home school and then keep attendance and progress records. That's basically it."

According to Isaacs, the school system then is not involved in the child's education. "There are literally no regulations concerning opening a home school," she said. "The curriculum is completely up to the parent and we don't monitor the student's progress."

Also, the school system has no way of knowing if the parent will provide a good education to their child. "We have no authority or method to see if a parent is capable of being a good teacher. A parent does not even have to have a high school diploma to home school," said Isaacs.

One of the biggest negatives to being a home school student is that no diploma is given to the student.

"Once the student graduates home school, they would have to pass the GED to be eligible for a college education," said Isaacs.

"Students today need that high school diploma. In today's world, it can make a big difference in someone's

future," Supt. Pensol said.

Public school enrollment numbers are getting better in Rockcastle County, but this is partly due to students coming to the county from other areas. "It's very satisfying that families want to send their children to Rockcastle County schools," Pensol said.

Isaacs said the number of students enrolled in home school is up slightly this year.

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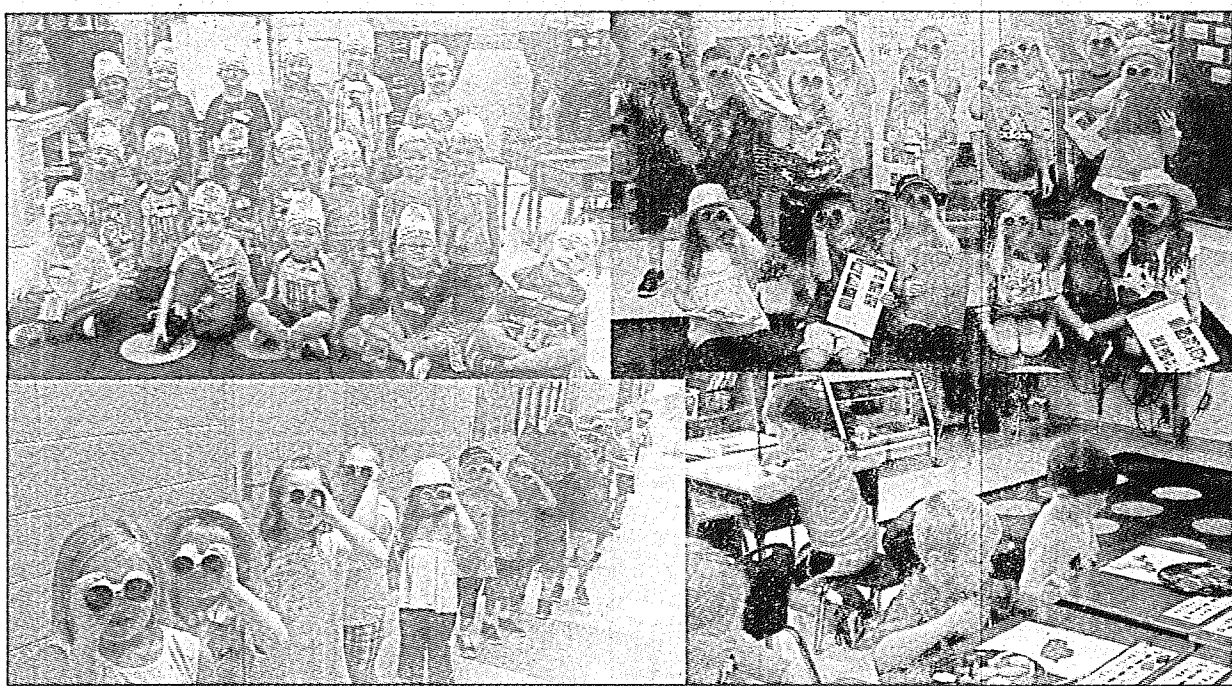
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Tiger Pause...

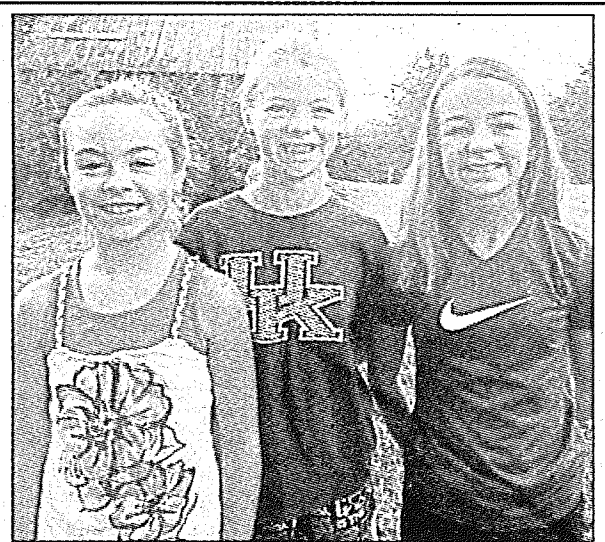
Kentucky State Fair winners



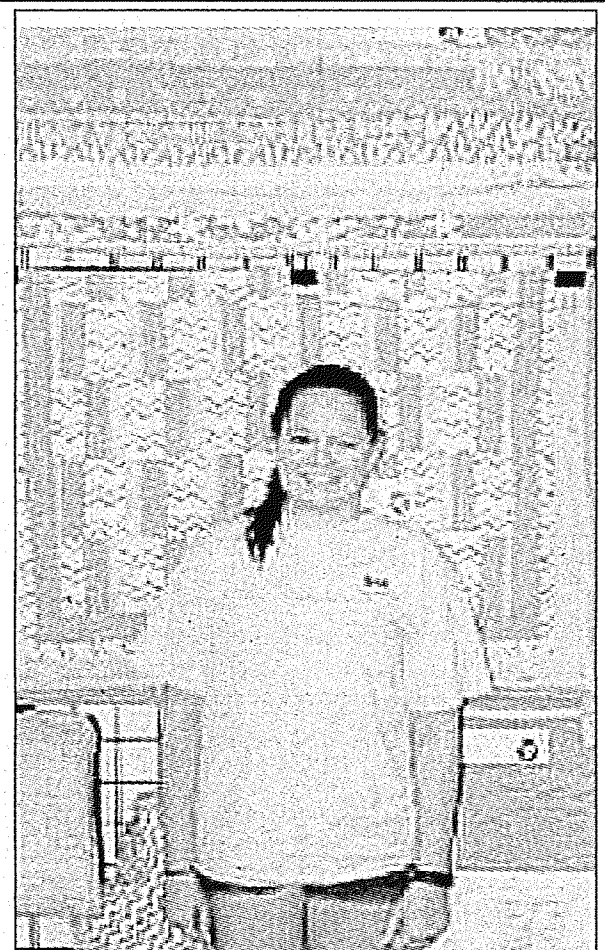

Paula wanted Hannah to have an activity to build her self-esteem, and she says Girls on the Run was the perfect fit.

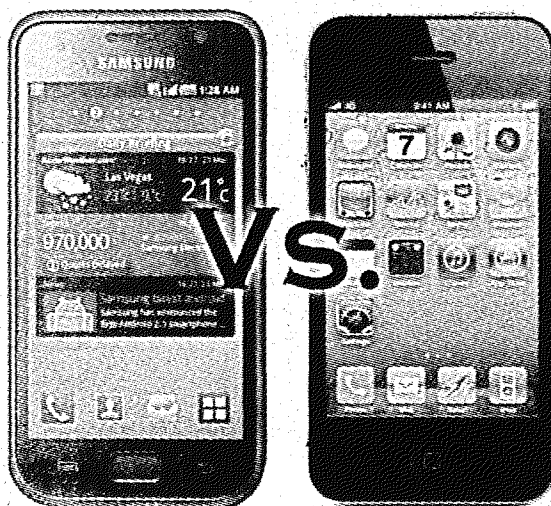
"There was never anything negative said to the girls," Paula said. "The class part was more inspiring than the running activities. So uplifting."
