City faces second lawsuit this month

 For the second time this month, a lawsuit has been filed against the City of Mount Vernon, Mayor Mike Bryant individually and in his official capacity and council members Clifford Mullins, Wayne Bullock, Jamie Anderkin Bryant, Sharon Saylor, Shelly Raines Lewis, and Jackie Weaver each in their official capacity only.

The suit was filed Monday by the Eastern Rockcastle Water Association, Inc. by their attorney Jerry J. Cox.

The lawsuit is asking for \$35,000 in overpayment for water supplied to the water association by the City of Mount Vernon, along with punitive damages of up to \$25,000.

The lawsuit claims a dispute has risen over whether the plaintiff owes the defendant for water allegedly sold to the plaintiff. It also claims the city failed to test the master meters delivering water to the plaintiff.

The suit continued that the city failed to maintain existing meters and did not install new meters correctly. It also says the city failed to provide water to the plaintiff on several dates.

The lawsuit further states "The City of Mount Vernon, has received numerous citations from the Division of Water, some of which affect the quality of water sold to plaintiff by defendant and the defendant failed to notify plaintiff so that it could notify its customers to boil water."

The lawsuit stems from the time between January of 2014 and October of 2015 when the water company claims it overpaid the city for water due to alleged faulty meters.

City lowers property tax rate once again

The Mount Vernon City Council held their regular monthly meeting Monday evening at City Hall.

After members of the council approved the monthly budget report, the first reading of two ordinances were held

Ordinance 2016-3 set the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles and motorboats at 16.7 cents per \$100 of value. According to Mayor Mike Bryant "nothing changed in the motor vehicle tax rate this year."

Ordinance 2016-4 set the real and personal property rate at 16.1 cents per \$100 of value. This is a drop from last year's 16.4.

However, according to Mayor Bryant, the tax rate drop will still yield more income for the city due to the increase in property values since last year.

"We are once again able to lower everyone's tax rate while still providing for the city and the people of Mount Vernon," he said.

In other action, members of the council heard from concerned citizens who have had some trouble with water pressure and the need to inform local residents when there is a boil water advisory.

Some local residents told the council that there have been boil water advisories and many people did not know anything about it and may have drank contaminated water.

Members of the council discussed making certain that an announcement is placed on the city's website and Facebook page, but resi-

dents suggested that wouldn't help.

"How would we know to check the Facebook page every few hours to see if there is a boil water advisory," said one resident.

Members of the council then discussed looking into a notification system that would automatically send a text to all who were affected by such an advisory.

Mayor Bryant also signed a proclamation designating the month of October as Roadside Pride month. The proclamation encourages local residents to volunteer during roadside

pride cleanup events and to get involved in keeping the community clean.

Mayor Bryant told members of the council and those present that the water pump issue has been resolved. "Everyone should be aware that the potential emergency situation is over. We have a new pump installed now and the other pump is working perfectly."

The council also heard department head reports.

The All American Club reported recently picking up 37 bags of trash, two old tires and a yard sale sign.

The Mount Vernon Po-

lice Department reported 397 calls for service in August with 48 total arrests and 10 indictments.

The Mount Vernon Fire Department reported making 41 runs in the month of August and used 3,050 gallons of water. Among those calls were 25 vehicle accidents and two automatic aid calls.

Bryant also discussed several local sidewalk projects that are finished or near completion. He also discussed the upcoming Bittersweet Festival and the many activities planned during the event.

"Dollie was raised in Rockcastle County and has three daughter, six grandchildren, four great grandchildren, six great-great grandchildren and four great-great-great grandchildren," Edgington said.

Dollie ran a clothing store for many year in Mount Vernon and one of her favorite past times is to read her Bible.

One of the biggest pieces of Dollie's life has been the fact that she was a Holiness preacher. "We've been back in some hollers that I didn't think we'd ever get out of," said Edgington while describing her grandmother's visits to churches to preach. "She has blessed a lot of people in her life."

In fact, according to Bullock, during the induction into the Center's Hall of Fame last year, Dollie started remembering those days. "She started preaching right here," said Bullock.

The residents of the local center participate in many activities including Senior Olympics, a safari, fishing trips and on September 30th they are planning to perform a live play at the local high school that the residents wrote themselves.

sisters and seven brothers and her parents. "My daddy raised everything we had and we had plenty of food. Mom was a good cook and daddy was a good farmer. None of us was ever hungry," she said.

Looking back, Jalie says she is pleased with her 103 years. "We weren't ever mean growing up. If we was, daddy would wear us out," she said.

Jalie said her father killed hogs and eating and playing was about all there was to do in 1913. "Daddy killed hogs and I didn't like that. But we had good old country foods. We were all so skinny but my grandparents were fat people cause they only ate bread and milk. We wouldn't do for that. We wanted good country cooking," she said.

Jalie continued to tell the story of a neighbor with "running water."

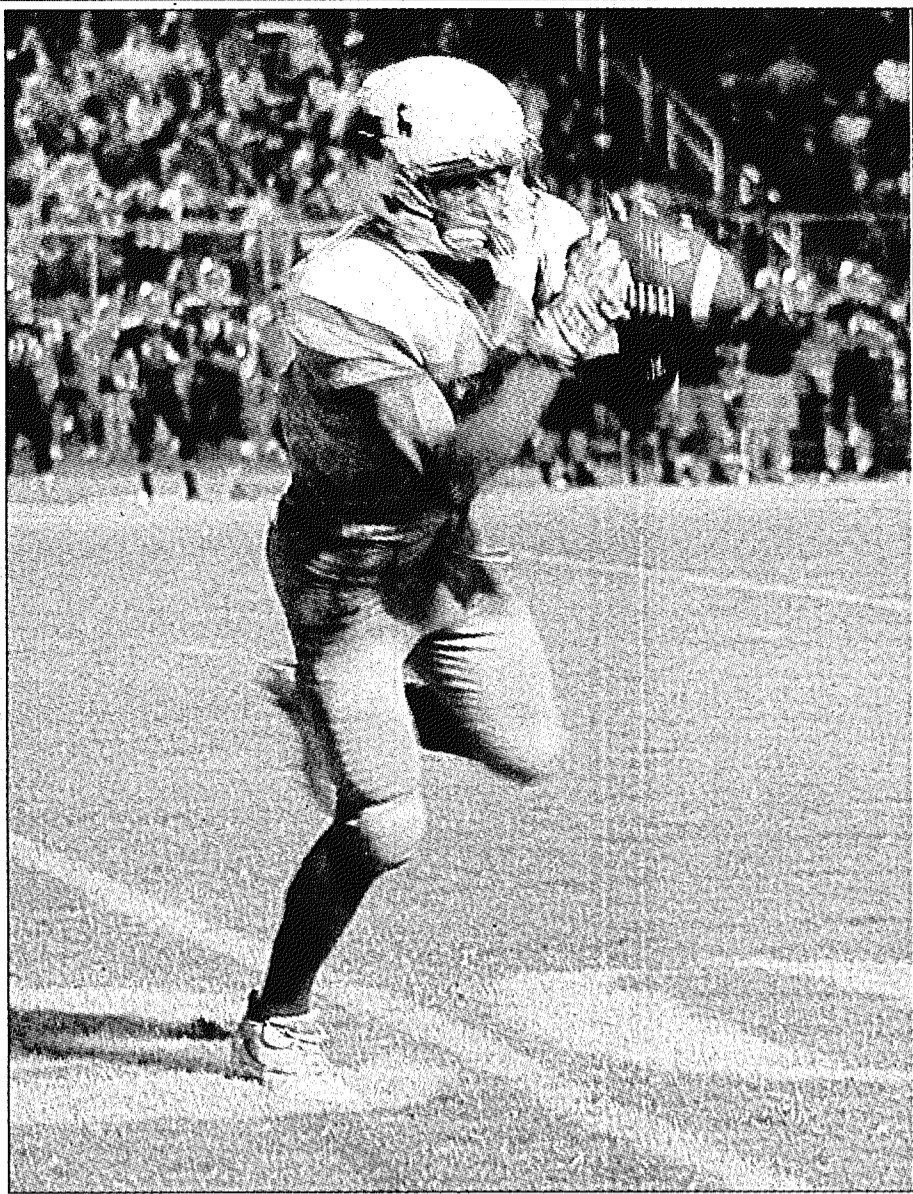
"We didn't have running water at our house. We had

to pack it up from the spring every day. But they had a bucket on a rope and when they let it go, the bucket rode that rope down to the spring and filled up with water and they just pulled it back to the house with the rope. It was a right smart piece away," said Jalie. "Now that was something."

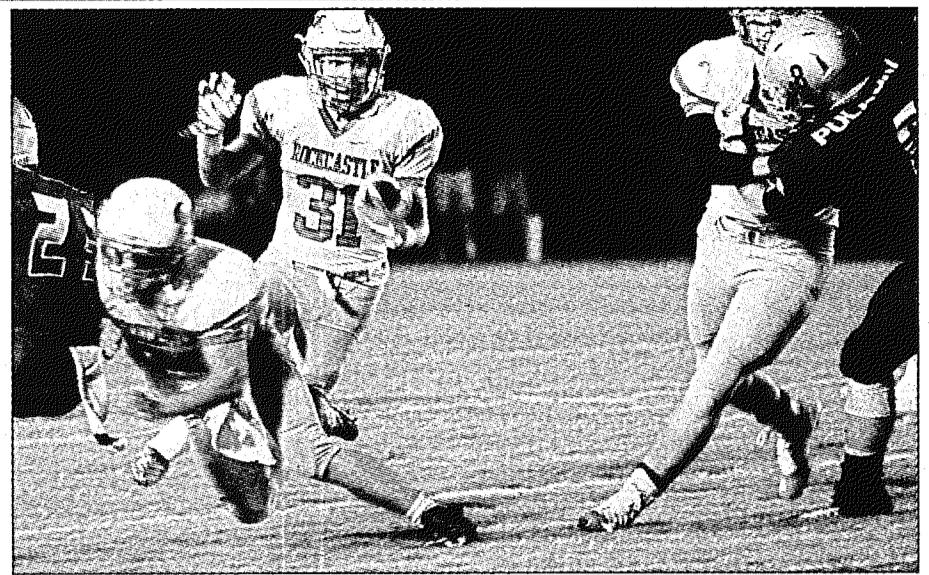
Jalie says her old homeplace has long been torn down now, but her memories of it are as clear as ever. "Oh we would play all the time. We loved to go for a ride in the horse and buggy and go visit grandpa's house. That would just tickle us to death," she said.

Another of Jalie's favorite activities was to attend Providence Church of Christ. "Oh I've spent many a day on those pews. But we sure had to whisper. If us girls got to talking in church, oh, daddy would straighten us out quick," she said. "I'd sure like to go back there now and sing

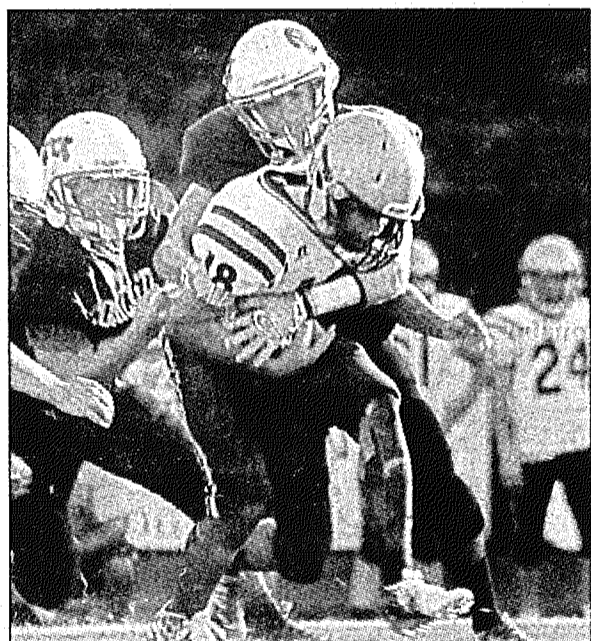

In the third, head coach Scott Parkey said his team "had a lapse and didn't move the ball as well as we would have liked." During

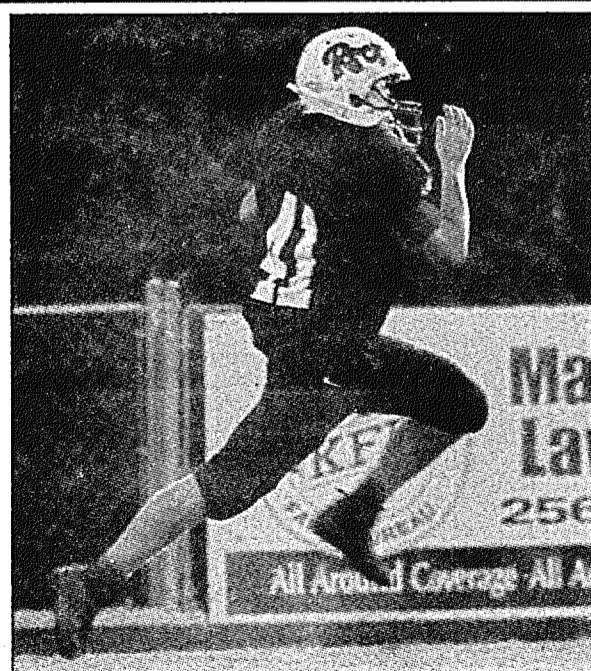

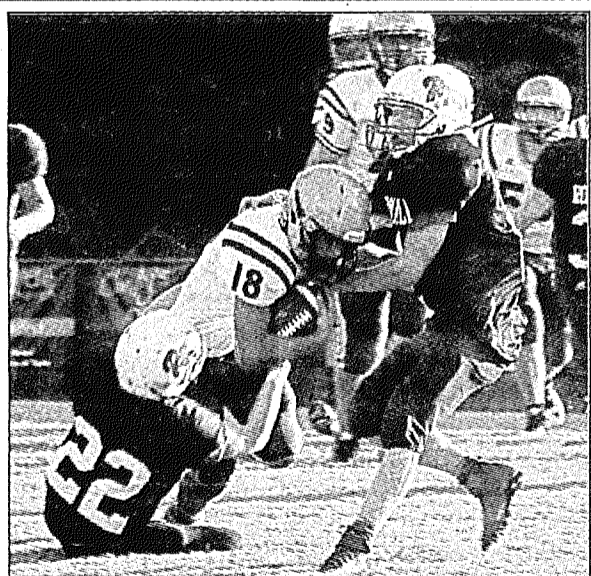

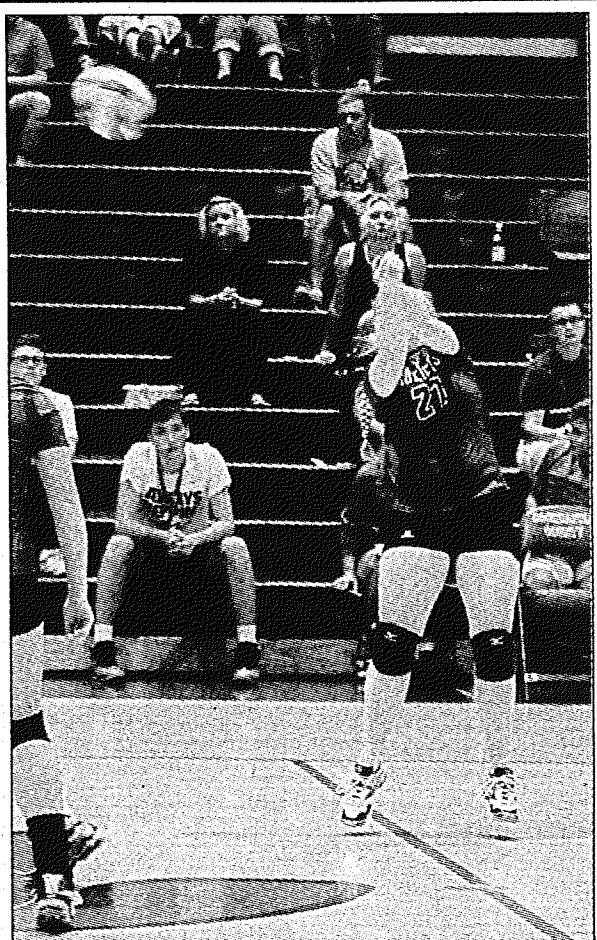

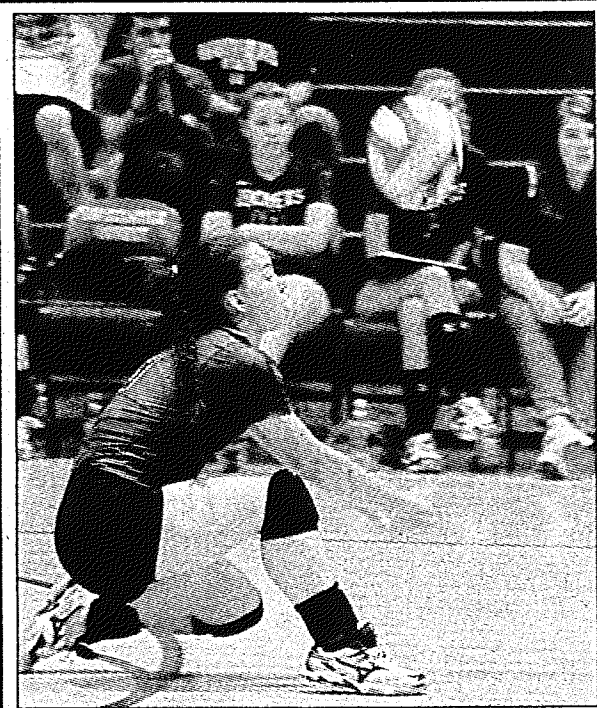

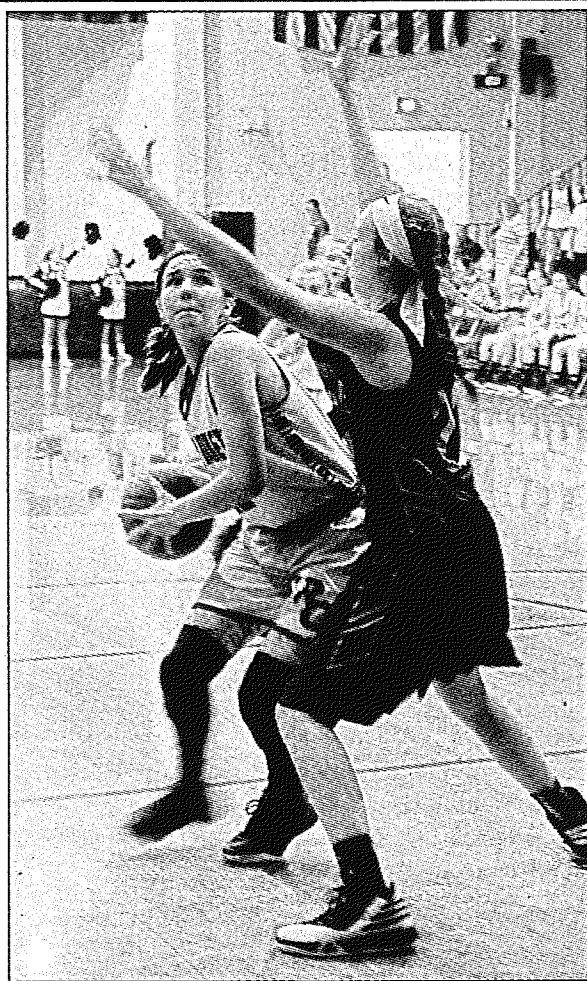

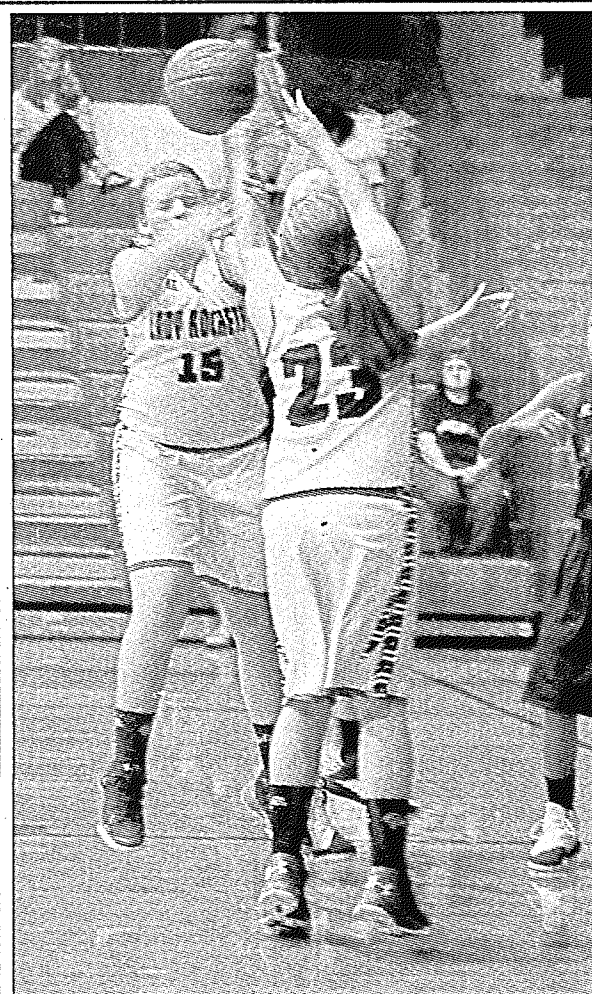

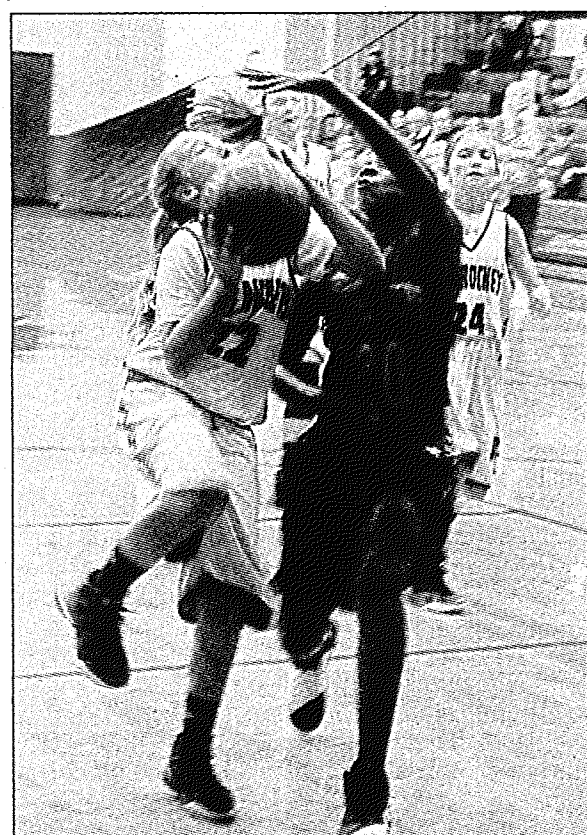

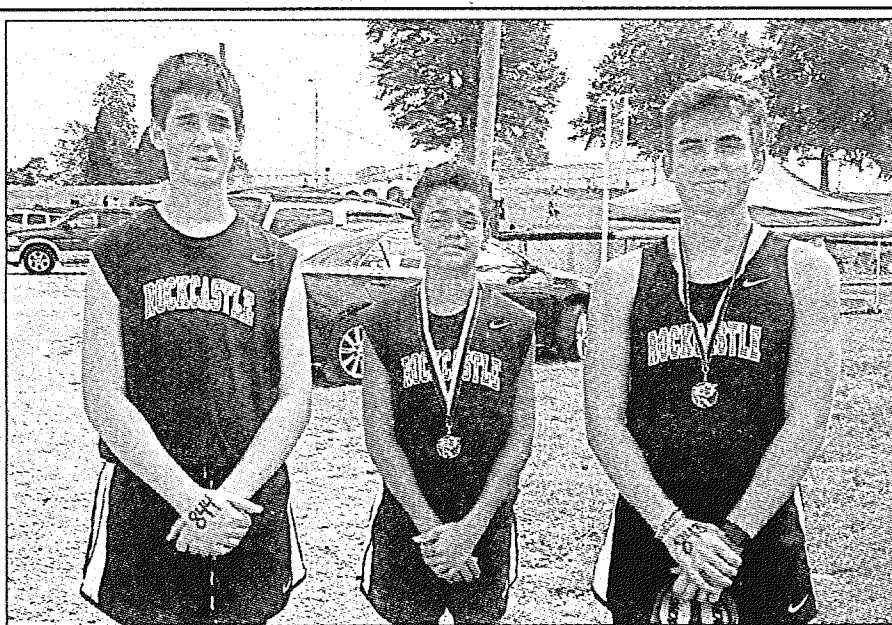

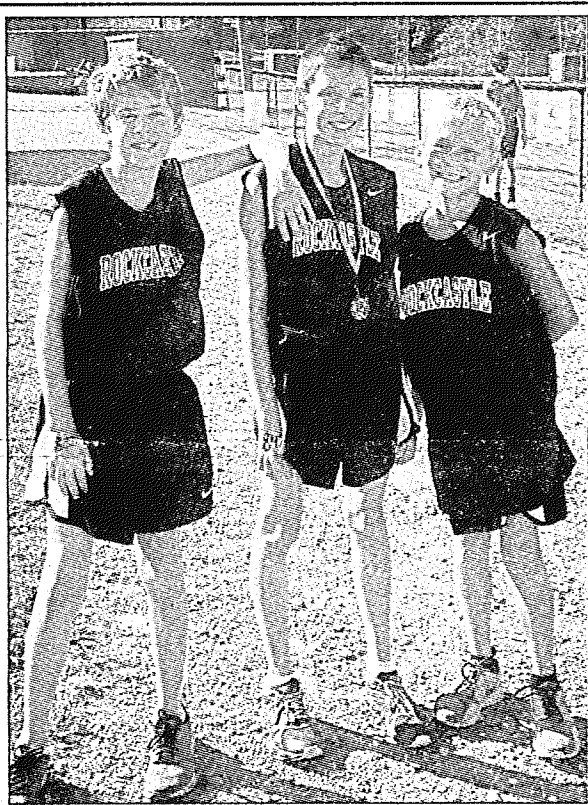

Bloodhound search and rescue training held in Rockcastle County

Mother of overdosed son fighting to raise awareness in county

Jerry Wayne Price II (Jed), 34, of Bowling Ridge in Rockcastle County, died of a drug overdose on April 10, 2016, fifteen days before his birthday. But his mother Samantha is attempting to keep the same fate from happening to others.

"People need to know this (heroin and meth) is right here among us. It's not just big cities or on your television set. It's right here beside us and people are going to have to wake up and face it," said Samantha Price.

On the night of April 10th, Price had apparently taken heroin in a massive dose, along with two friends who are now in the Rockcastle County Detention Center, according to Samantha.

Price became unconscious almost immediately, but rather than call for help or take him to the hospital, the two friends drove around Rockcastle and neighboring counties for almost four hours with Price on the rear floor of a van.

"They passed by two or three hospitals but wouldn't drop him off or call for help because they had drugs on them and didn't want to get in trouble," Jed's mother said.

Eventually, the group stopped at a house on Bowling Ridge and neighbors called 911 because they heard arguing.

The friends left and EMS workers, called to the scene, attempted to revive Price, but it was too late.

"He was my only son and he didn't have to die. All they had to do was drop him off at a hospital," said Samantha.

There is a law in Kentucky, known as the Good Samaritan Law, that says anyone who reports an overdose cannot be arrested with small amounts of drugs on them. The law was established so that anyone who sees an overdose, may call for help without fear of being arrested themselves.

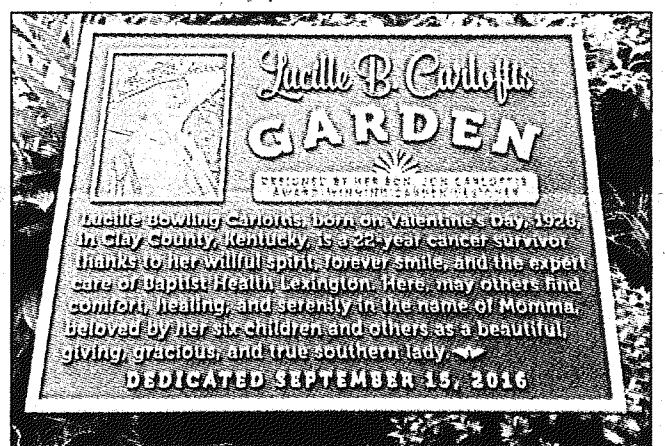
However, Samantha believes the law is not working.

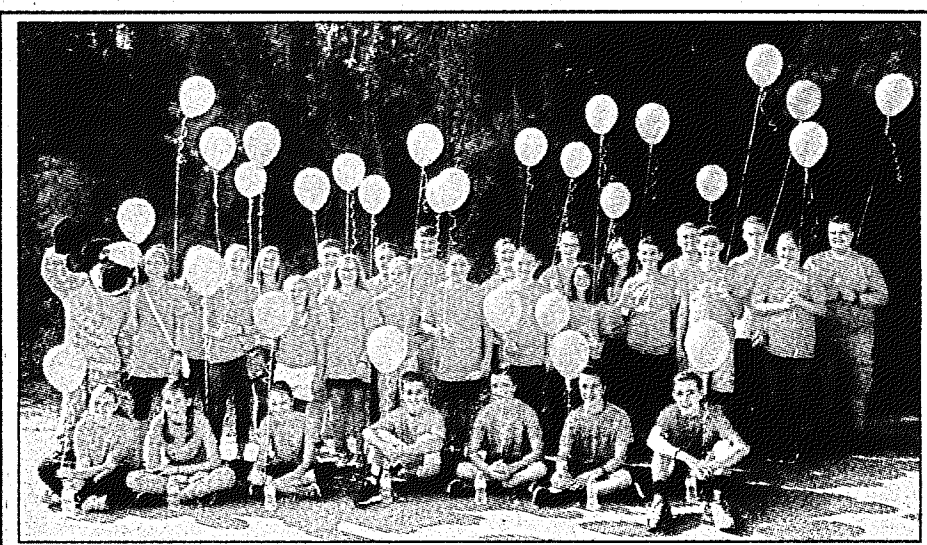

“We are all going to have to put our brave face on and stand up and fight this. It's not going to go away just because of a Good Samaritan Law. We are going to have to face this head on,” she said.

Samantha is looking into starting some kind of group or organization that will help parents band together and help their own kids, but she hasn't decided yet which direction to take. “We are going to have to do something,” she said.

Grave marking dedication for Rachel Lunsford planned

In the interest of historical preservation, the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in collaboration with the Daughters of the Confederacy have planned a ceremony to dedicate the newly purchased headstone to mark the grave of Kentucky's last Confederate widow, Mrs. Rachel Slucher Lunsford (Lunsford).

Rachel was born 16 November 1892 in Pineville, Bell Co. KY and died in 16 October 1978 Rockcastle Co. KY. She was married to William Beatty Lunsford (Lunsford) in 1909, she being 16 and he was 62. Lunsford served in the Con-

federacy as a teamster in the 14th KY Cavalry, where he hauled ammunition regularly from Crab Orchard to the Cumberland Gap and would later be captured near Wildcat Mountain. He served from 1861 to the close of the war. William died in 1927 and Rachel received a widow's pension on 22 December 1943 from the state of Kentucky. She received the sum of \$150 every three months until her death.

The dedication ceremony will be held this Sunday, 25 September 2016 at 3:00p.m. at the Methodist Cemetery in Brodhead. The cemetery is located on West Street, second Brodhead exit.

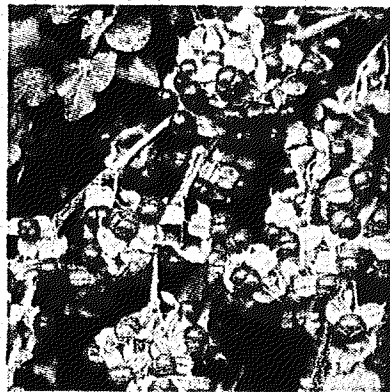
