Fiery crash closes **Interstate Tuesday**

By: Mike French In what has become a familiar sight in Rockcastle County, I-75 was once again closed for several hours Tuesday afternoon when a fiery crash blocked the roadway.

Around 4 p.m., Kentucky State Police Vehicle Enforcement officers were called to a three vehicle crash near mile marker 68 in Rockcastle County with one person injured.

According to the police report when KSP Troopers Christopher McQueen and Mark Scott arrived at the scene in the southbound lane they found 27-yearold Derick Knuckles, of Corbin, had been traveling south in a cargo van when he struck the concrete construction barrier that had been placed by workers for the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet at the start of the I-75 widening project.

The cargo van then collided with a Chevrolet pick-up truck driven by 57-year-old Douglas Bingham of Flat Lick, Kentucky.

The cargo van was then struck by a 2016 Freightliner tractor trailer operated by 39-year-old Sean R. Harris of Oneida, Tennessee. A passenger in the cargo van, 22-year-old Kenny Collier of Somerset, was the only one injured in the accident and he was transported to the **Rockcastle County** Regional Hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

The cargo van and the tractor trailer then caught fire, causing a black plume of smoke that was reported visible for over a mile away. Both of those vehicles were listed as a total loss.

Pedestrian killed in hit and run

Amy Bingham, 37, of Mount Vernon, was walking along the roadway when she was apparently struck and killed by a hit and run driver in one of the vehicles in the bumper to bumper traffic.

According to a Kentucky State Police report, Bingham was walking north around 10 p.m. on the edge

of the highway near McCollum Road in Rockcastle County.

The report says KSP received a call of an unresponsive female lying in the roadway and Trooper Willie Cowan responded to the call. The report says Cowan found Bingham deceased and she was later pronounced dead at the scene by the Rockcastle County Coroner's Office. An autopsy has been scheduled at

Local child support roundup yields well over 300 warrants

911 Center Tuesday morning to prepare to begin arresting 250 people who are behind on child support payments.

In March, the County Attorney's office offered an amnesty period to everyone behind on child support payments. The offer was to let offenders come to their office and make arrangements for payment thus avoiding arrest.

However, according to Assistant County Attorney William Leger, only two people took advantage of that offer. Now those who did not accept the amnesty offer are being arrested, Leger said.


The room, at the 911 office on Tuesday morning, was filled with Kentucky State Police Troopers, members of the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office,

After sitting beside the pond, for more than fifteen minutes, attempting to tie on a fish hook the way she once could, blindfolded, in a matter of seconds, she finally


She muttered in disgust, "No wonder the blanketblank license are so cheap. There's no danger of me actually catching a fish!"

For the record, there's no such thing as a senior fishing license in Kentucky. Any Kentucky resident age 65 and up or totally disabled can purchase a Kentuky Sportsman's License for 5 bucks. The license includes all hunting privileges, deer tags, turkey permit, trout stamp and seniors even get extra deer tags.

If you are able bodied and younger than 65, the license costs 95 dollars. And if fishing is really all you wanted to do, that license, alone, would cost alone would cost you \$20.00 if you are young and able-

Total disability must be determined by The Social Security Administration and I can tell you, from direct experience, that even then, unless you are extremely patient and time is totally worthless to you, it is far more efficient to go ahead and shell out the \$20.00 for a regular fishing license than it is to oba disability Sportsman's License. If you are Social Security disabled and plan to deer hunt/ live on venison, shoot some turkeys, and catch trout nearly every day, it might be worthwhile to pursue a 5 buck

I do not recall any specific details of that race, but I can say that Swaps, ridden by jockey Bill Shoemaker, won the prized event. Although I do not remember, the facts reveal that Nashua came in second, and Summer Tan ran third.

Since that time, I do not think I have missed a single Derby on television. Both

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

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


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DAR presents Signal with Media Award

Census of Agriculture Countdown Begins for America's Farmers and

Ranchers America's farmers and ranchers will soon have the opportunity to strongly represent agriculture in their communities and industry by taking part in the 2017 Census of Agriculture. Conducted every five years by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) **National Agricultural Statistics** Service (NASS), the census, to be mailed at the end of this year, is a complete count of all U.S. farms, ranches, and those who operate them.

The Census of Agriculture highlights land use and ownership, operator characteristics, production practices, income and expenditures, and other topics. The 2012 Census of Agriculture revealed that over three million farmers operated more than two million farms, spanning over 914 million acres. This was a four percent decrease in the number of U.S. farms from the previous census in 2007. However, agriculture sales, income, and expenses increased between 2007 and 2012. This telling information and thousands of other agriculture statistics are a direct result of responses to the Census of

Agriculture Producers who are new to farming or did not receive a Census of Agriculture in 2012 still have time to sign up to receive the 2017 Census of Agriculture report form by visiting www.agcensus.usda.gov and clicking on the 'Make Sure You Are Counted' button through June. NASS defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold, or normally would have been sold, during the census year (2017).

Update Your Records

FSA is cleaning up our producer record database. If you have any unreported changes of address or zip code or an incorrect name or business name on file they need to be reported to our office. Changes in your farm operation, like the addition of a farm by lease or purchase, need to be reported to our office as well. Producers participating in FSA and NRCS programs are required to timely report changes in their farming operation to the County Committee in writing and update their CCC-902 Farm Operating



"We wanted to give our youth an experience that would impact them," Hicks said. "When we came for the first time, they had such a great experience that they went back and told everyone about their time here."


Amanda Evers was one of those students. She attended YouthFest with Youth Go as a teenager and returned this year as an adult volunteer.



that truth many times. On

some occasions, I have been

words, and on other occa-

We cannot escape the fact:

Words, however spoken, do

have a powerful effect. A

long time ago it was put this

way: "The tongue is a small

can do." On the other hand,

good. With words spoken,

A brief note, part of which is illegible, that I had written to myself, and forgotten for a long time, came to my attention unexpectedly. That poorly written note mentioned a meeting with two friends, each of which had come from a recent encounter with their friends. One was exceedingly downhearted, and the other one was positively upbeat. A brief conversation with those individuals was revealing. One of them re To I ported a bad experience in which some unkind words had been spoken, and the other one reported a good experience in which some kind words had been spoken. Each one of them showed, in a very remarkable way, the powerful effect of both unkind words and kind words on the hu-

man personality. As I reflected on that old note and the encounter with my friends that it recalled, some words, much older than that old note, came to my mind. More than twenty-five hundred years ago, it had already become proverbial that "An anxious heart (that may come from unkind words) weighs a man down, but a kind word cheers him up." crumbs 1 stick butter, melted 3 tablespoons powdered

sugar 2 envelopes Dream Whip®

POUND CAKE 1 package (8 ounce) cream cheese

1 and 1/2 cups butter 3 cups white sugar 6 eggs

3 cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Preheat oven to 325°. Grease and flour a 10-inch tube pan. In a large bowl, cream butter and cream cheese until smooth. Add sugar gradually and beat until fluffy. Add eggs two at a time, beating well with each addition. Add the flour all at once and mix in. Add vanilla.

Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 1 hour and 20 minutes (I baked mine 1 hour 20 minutes and then loosely covered with foil for an additional 20 to be sure it was cooked through-this timing was perfect for me-any less and it would have been undercooked. COOL **COMPLETELY BEFORE** CUTTING!
