

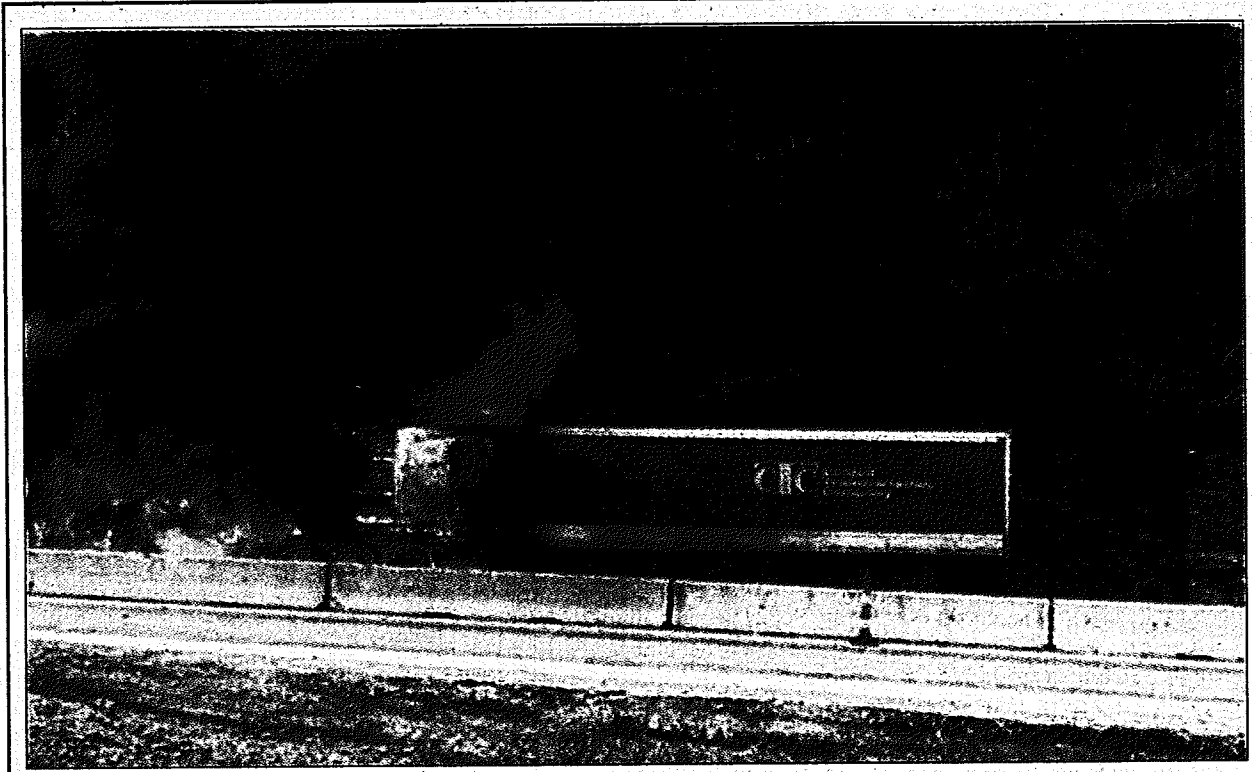

## Fiery crash closes Interstate Tuesday

 In what has become a familiar sight in Rockcastle County, I-75 was once again closed for several hours Tuesday afternoon when a fiery crash blocked the roadway. Around 4 p.m., Kentucky State Police Vehicle Enforcement officers were called to a three vehicle crash near mile marker 68 in Rockcastle County with one person injured. According to the police report when KSP Troopers Christopher McQueen and Mark Scott arrived at the scene in the southbound lane they found 27-year-old Derick Knuckles, of Corbin, had been traveling south in a cargo van when he struck the concrete construction barrier that had been placed by workers for the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet at the start of the I-75 widening project.

The cargo van then collided with a Chevrolet pick-up truck driven by 57-year-old Douglas Bingham of Flat Lick, Kentucky. The cargo van was then struck by a 2016 Freightliner tractor trailer operated by 39-year-old Sean R. Harris of Oneida, Tennessee. A passenger in the cargo van, 22-year-old Kenny Collier of Somerset, was the only one injured in the accident and he was transported to the Rockcastle County Regional Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. The cargo van and the tractor trailer then caught fire, causing a black plume of smoke that was reported visible for over a mile away. Both of those vehicles were listed as a total loss.

## Pedestrian killed in hit and run

 Another crash on I-75 Thursday, April 13th, caused northbound traffic to take Mount Vernon exit 62 and travel north on U.S. 25. Amy Bingham, 37, of Mount Vernon, was walking along the roadway when she was apparently struck and killed by a hit and run driver in one of the vehicles in the bumper to bumper traffic. According to a Kentucky State Police report, Bingham was walking north around 10 p.m. on the edge

of the highway near McCollum Road in Rockcastle County. The report says KSP received a call of an unresponsive female lying in the roadway and Trooper Willie Cowan responded to the call. The report says Cowan found Bingham deceased and she was later pronounced dead at the scene by the Rockcastle County Coroner's Office. An autopsy has been scheduled at

## Council discusses park improvements

 The Mount Vernon City Council had a short agenda for Monday evening's regular monthly meeting but still discussed several issues. One of the discussions concerned the Lake Linville Park and Recreation area. "There isn't much doubt that this year's income from the park and campground and lake are going to greatly surpass our budgeted predictions," said City Administrator Josh Bray. "The park is doing extremely well. Even better than we had hoped." Bray said most any day of the week, he sees boats, rented pontoons, fishing and other activities going on at

the lake. "One of the things I notice is that most license tags are from out of our county," he said. "We are bringing in people from all over the state and other states as well to our facility." Bray said this is a big benefit to the local economy. "These guests are enjoying our park and spending out-of-town dollars at our restaurants and shops and helping support the local economy." The city has many plans to improve the area and make it even more attractive to vacationers, both local and out of town. Bray said workers are looking at ways to stop the erosion taking

place on the hiking trails in order to keep the trails safer and neater. The city administrator

also said the city is looking at fixing up the ball field on

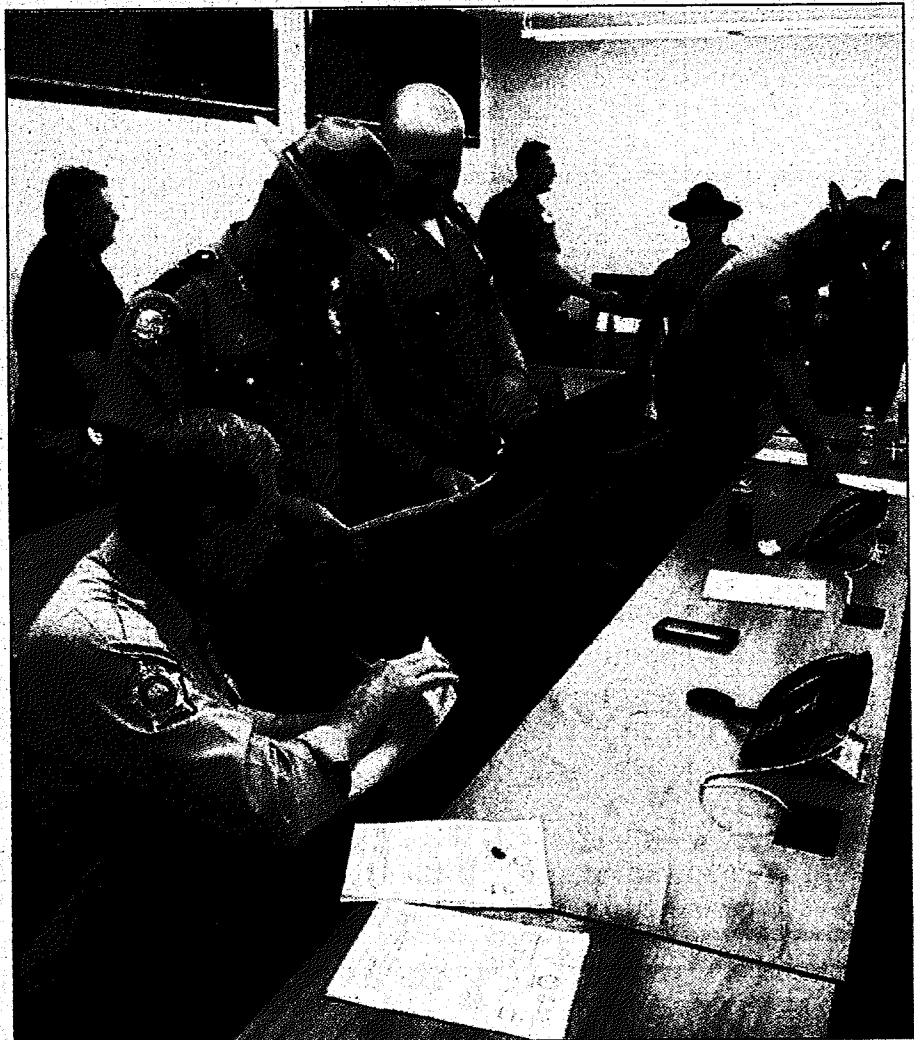
## Local child support roundup yields well over 300 warrants

 Police from all local law enforcement agencies gathered at the Rockcastle 911 Center Tuesday morning to prepare to begin arresting 250 people who are behind on child support payments. In March, the County Attorney's office offered an amnesty period to everyone behind on child support payments. The offer was to let offenders come to their office and make arrangements for payment thus avoiding arrest. However, according to Assistant County Attorney William Leger, only two people took advantage of that offer. Now those who did not accept the amnesty offer are being arrested, Leger said. The room, at the 911 office on Tuesday morning, was filled with Kentucky State Police Troopers, members of the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office, the Livingston, Brodhead and Mt. Vernon Police Departments and the County Attorney's Office, where the 250 warrants that had been prepared for the "child support roundup" were parceled out. According to Leger, well over 300 warrants will be issued by the time

his office is done going through complaints filed.

The 250 given out Tuesday were warrants that had already

been prepared. (See "warrants" on A5)

After sitting beside the pond, for more than fifteen minutes, attempting to tie on a fish hook the way she once could, blindfolded, in a matter of seconds, she finally gave up.

She muttered in disgust, "No wonder the blanket-blank license are so cheap. There's no danger of me actually catching a fish!"

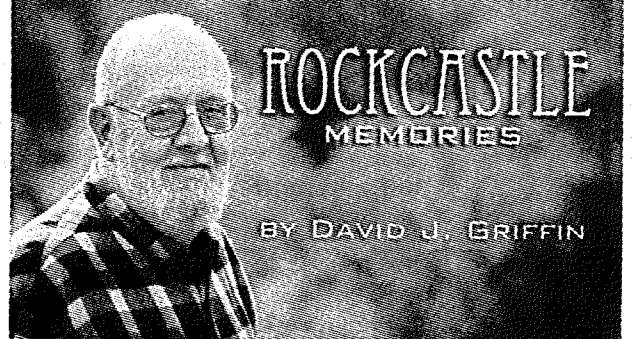
For the record, there's no such thing as a senior fishing license in Kentucky. Any Kentucky resident age 65 and up or totally disabled can purchase a Kentucky Sportsman's License for 5 bucks. The license includes all hunting privileges, deer tags, turkey permit, trout stamp and seniors even get extra deer tags.

If you are able bodied and younger than 65, the license costs 95 dollars. And

if fishing is really all you wanted to do, that license, alone, would cost you \$20.00 if you are young and able-bodied.

Total disability must be determined by The Social Security Administration and I can tell you, from direct experience, that even then, unless you are extremely patient and time is totally worthless to you, it is far more efficient to go ahead and shell out the \$20.00 for a regular fishing license than it is to obtain a disability Sportsman's License. If you are Social Security disabled and plan to deer hunt/live on venison, shoot some turkeys, and catch trout nearly every day, it might be worthwhile to pursue a 5 buck

## Greatest Two Minutes in Sports

The first Saturday in May, that is when all eyes turn to the Kentucky Derby, an event that is often described as "The Greatest Two Minutes in Sports." My wife and I like to watch a lot of the Keeneland spring races before we ever get to the Derby itself. She actually keeps up with several of the earliest events at various tracks that are prep races for the Derby.

Even as an old codger, I remember the first Kentucky Derby that I ever saw portrayed on television. I know for a fact that my mother (Bee) purchased our first TV in 1951, when I was only seven-years-old. Over the next several years, I kept up with my favorite sporting events on the television screen and by reading the daily Courier Journal.

When I was ten-years-old (1954), my grandfather (Pop) got his first TV set. I recall that event because he lived in a house near ours on a small hill-top farm in Rockcastle County.

Along with Pop and my Uncle Charles, I got to watch several different sports on television. Pop was interested in wrestling, football, and horse racing. For some time during early 1955, Pop kept showing me articles in the Courier Journal about the up-coming Kentucky Derby. One day he informed me that the Derby was going to be telecast on CBS and that we could watch it together on his set. I had, of course, listened to that race on my portable radio, but I had never actually seen the competition before.

The '55 Kentucky Derby was the 81st, and it took place on May 7. Pop and I were positioned in front of his 21-inch, floor-model, black-and-white set and drinking Mommie Katie's wonderful ice tea. I do not recall any specific details of that race, but I can say that Swaps, ridden by jockey Bill Shoemaker, won the prized event. Although I do not remember, the facts reveal that Nashua came in second, and Summer Tan ran third.

Since that time, I do not think I have missed a single Derby on television. Both

## Easter Memories

Dear Journal,  
The dogwoods and red-buds would usually be in bloom. The daffodils had on their yellow bonnets and other early bloomers were at peak. There was a single bunch of daffodils that bloomed in the field next to our house. I'd always wait to pick them on Easter morning to give to my mother, and they would be the centerpiece on the Easter dinner table. These are some of my early childhood memories of Easter.

Grandma always had a big Easter dinner; ham and fried chicken from a cast iron fried in lard skillet, sweet potatoes, mashed potatoes with gravy, biscuits, peas, deviled eggs and other

sides and probably a big old cobbler pie with ice cream for dessert.

It was a lot of fun for a kid. I always got a pretty new outfit of clothes for church. I even remember some of them. One dress was daffodil yellow with a matching cape, one was a navy blue sailor dress which was popular at the turn of the century, another was grey with a yellow sash and white collar another was a green jumper with matching blouse. Before then Mom dressed me up. She always put me in some little pastel frilly number with crenolin slips, white patent leather shoes and anklets...and a little hat most of the time. I remember the shoes had slick soles and the crenolin was itchy. It made for a totally miserable experience. People would say, "Oh, you have a little doll there", which was the desired effect. I had waist length curly hair that completed the look.

My uncle and I would drive a mile or two and get about three dozen eggs at the Jones farm. It was a little unpaved road and a cloud of dust followed us all the way there. They had cows, chickens, horses and other farm animals. At the bottom of a gently sloping yard was a pond. I guess that over the years I've thrown enough rocks in that old pond to build the Empire State Building.

information printed above and drove over to the Berea Walmart where I picked up a free copy of the 2017 Kentucky Boating and Fishing Guide, found the information within 30 seconds, and brought it home with me.

In the meantime, when it comes to fishing, I'm pretty much in the same boat (no pun intended) as the elderly lady who inspired this column. I can still tie an improved clinch knot in a little less than an hour by clinching a corn cob between my knees to hold the hook while I jerkily go through the motions of manipulating the line through the various twists and loops necessary to achieve this basic fishing maneuver.

I've also discovered that a quadruple hard knot, far, far easier than a clinch knot,

using braided line also works just as well and is not apt to come undone the way it will on regular monofilament. I can still manage the hard knot in less than 5 minutes and I don't even have to have a corn cob.

I haven't bought fishing line that isn't braided in nearly 10 years. My brothers hate it but it's the price they pay if they want to use one of my fishing rods.

In fact I spent most of the day, between daylight and dark, last Saturday, cussing my way through re-spooling three fishing reels. Before Mr. Parkinson came along, the job would have taken less than 30 minutes. I may not catch 5 dollars worth of fish but I do hope to have the full license price worth of fun trying before the year is out.

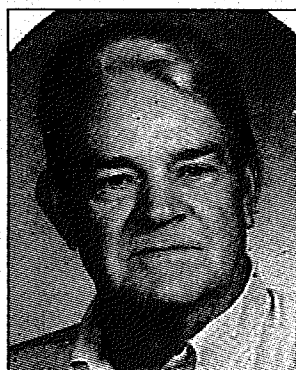

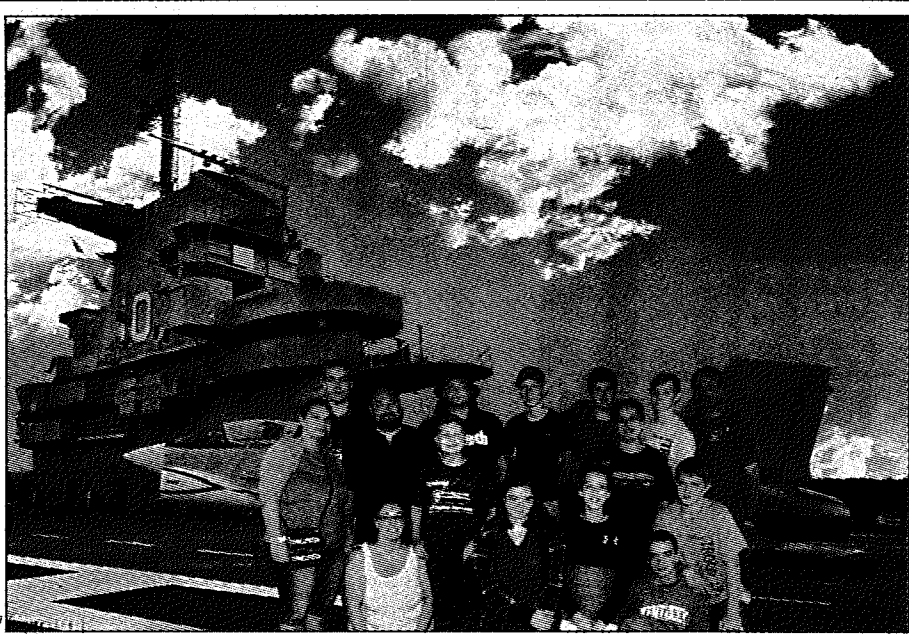

As of press time Wednesday, 51 of the warrants had been served and each person arrested taken to jail. Some have since bonded out of jail already and that money goes directly towards the delinquent child support owed and Leger says this was the goal. "Some child support got paid yesterday and that's what we are after," he said. "We got about 20% of them served in one day and that's not bad. We will keep going until we get them all."

Leger said each and every one of the 300+ warrants will be served eventually and everyone of the offenders will go to jail.

"One of the issues facing

law enforcement is that there is not nearly enough room in the local jail to hold this many people," Leger said. According to Carlos McClure, Rockcastle County Detention Center jailer, there are already 119 inmates in the jail and the most that has ever been housed there is 164.

However, Leger said he hopes there will not be that many people who will actually go to jail.

"Our goal here is not to put people in jail. Our goal is to get these kids the money they have coming so that they may live the life they deserve," said Leger. "I have talked with the judges and we are going to make bonds very reasonable so that people can pay their bond and not have to go to jail," said Leger. "Then we use that money as payment towards the child support that they owe."

The warrants also include offenders in Berea, Crab Orchard and other surrounding areas.

Leger, as well as the local radio station, rode along with police on some of the arrests. "These are not dangerous arrests like some of the drug arrests we have been doing recently," he

said.

However, Leger reminded officers not to take that for granted. "But I do recognize a lot of names on these warrants and you may find more than you plan when you go in on some of these people," he said. "I suspect you may get more than just child support arrests in some cases."

Officers from all departments left the 911 center around 8:45 a.m. Tuesday to begin the arrests. A Rocket Docket is expected on April 27 to deal with those arrested.

The County Attorney's office offered a word of praise to all the local agencies involved who are working on the operation.

"This is a good example of agencies working together for the common good," said Leger. "We want to thank the Kentucky State Police, the Sheriff's Office, Mount Vernon Police Department, Livingston Police Department, Brodhead Police Department, the judges, the jail staff and clerks who have worked diligently to make this operation a success. We are very pleased with the hard work and dedication these people have demonstrated."

### Census of Agriculture Countdown Begins for America's Farmers and Ranchers

America's farmers and ranchers will soon have the opportunity to strongly represent agriculture in their communities and industry by taking part in the 2017 Census of Agriculture. Conducted every five years by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), the census, to be mailed at the end of this year, is a complete count of all U.S. farms, ranches, and those who operate them.

The Census of Agriculture highlights land use and ownership, operator characteristics, production practices, income and expenditures, and other topics. The 2012 Census of Agriculture revealed that over three million farmers operated more than two million farms, spanning over 914 million acres. This was a four percent decrease in the number of U.S. farms from the previous census in 2007. However, agriculture sales, income, and expenses increased between 2007 and 2012. This telling information and thousands of other agriculture statistics are a direct result of responses to the Census of Agriculture.

Producers who are new to farming or did not receive a Census of Agriculture in 2012 still have time to sign up to receive the 2017 Census of Agriculture report form by visiting [www.agcensus.usda.gov](http://www.agcensus.usda.gov) and clicking on the 'Make Sure You Are Counted' button through June. NASS defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold, or normally would have been sold, during the census year (2017).

### Update Your Records

FSA is cleaning up our producer record database. If you have any unreported changes of address or zip code or an incorrect name or business name on file they need to be reported to our office. Changes in your farm operation, like the addition of a farm by lease or purchase, need to be reported to our office as well. Producers participating in FSA and NRCS programs are required to timely report changes in their farming operation to the County Committee in writing and update their CCC-902 Farm Operating Plan.

If you have any updates or corrections, please call your local FSA office to update your records.

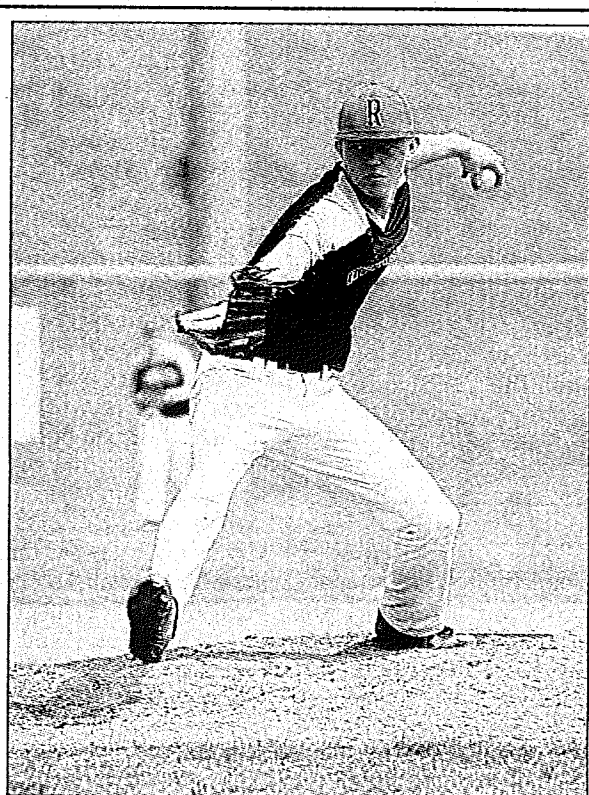

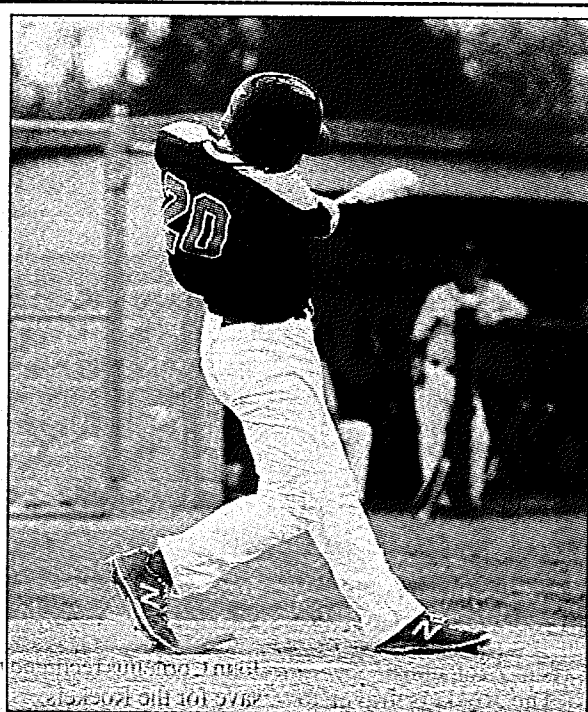

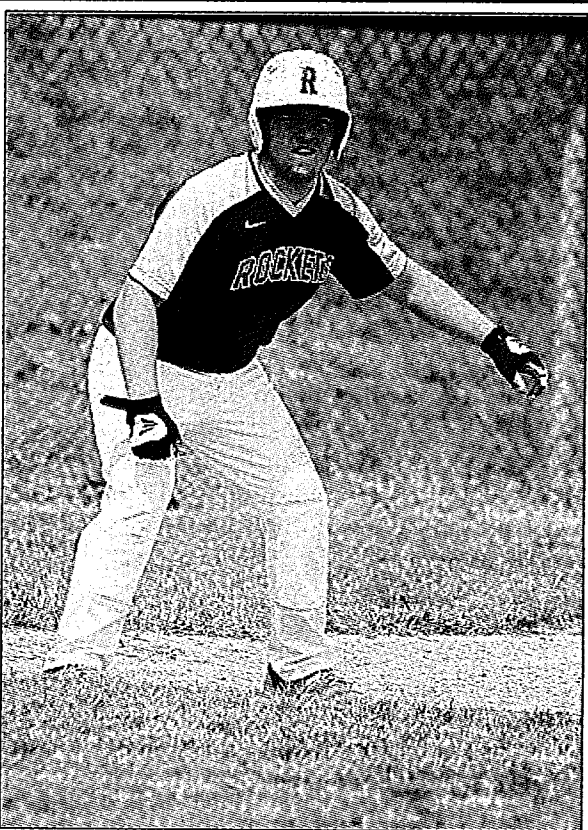

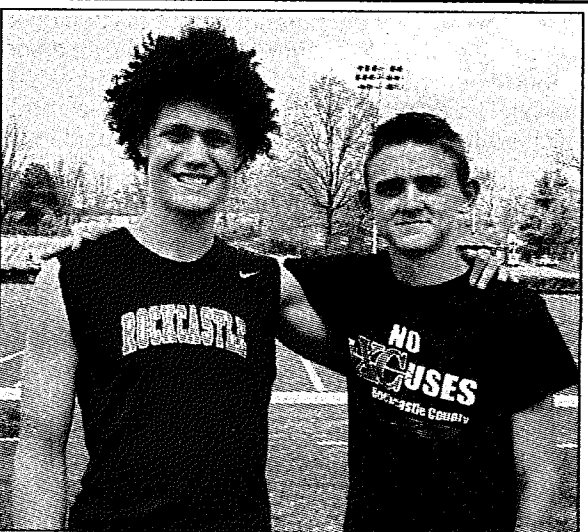

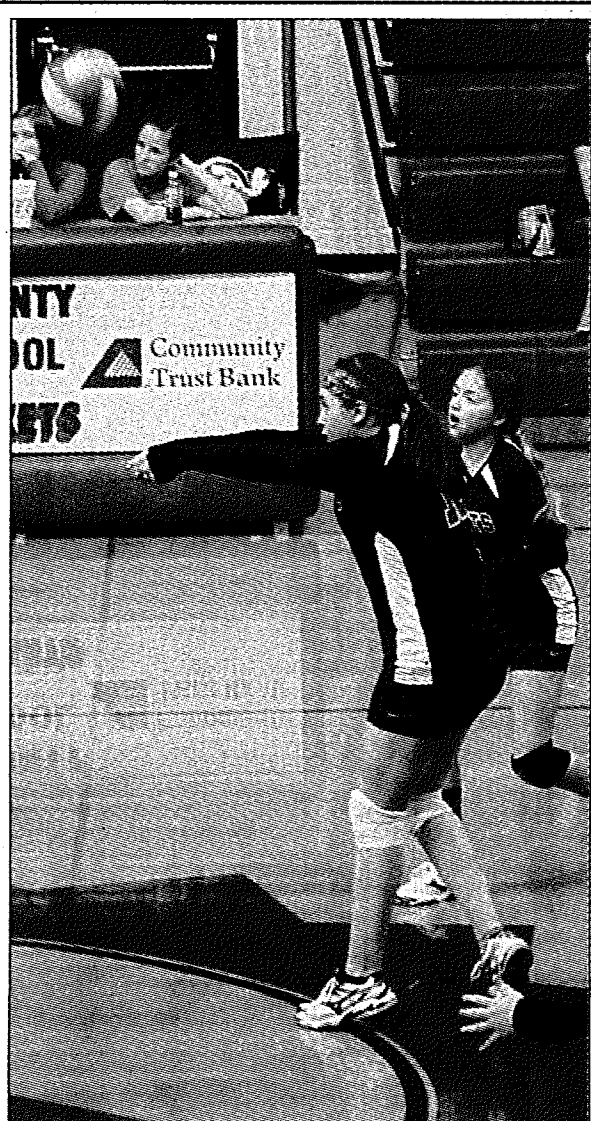


Eighth grader Megan Ellis passes to a teammate during the middle school volleyball's win over Northern Pulaski Tuesday night.

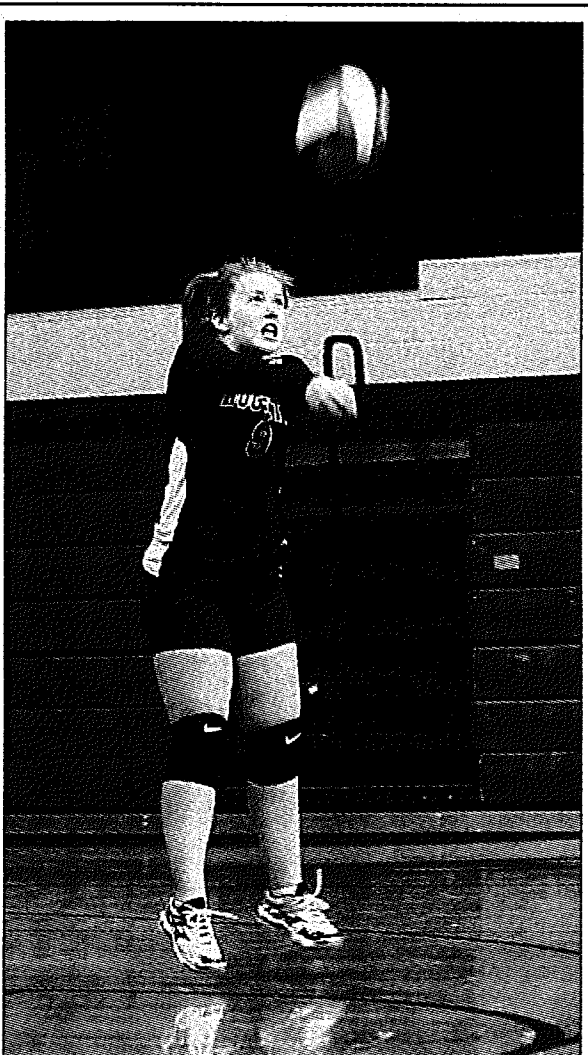


Eighth grader Amy Cornelius goes for a kill during the middle school volleyball's win over Northern Pulaski Tuesday night.

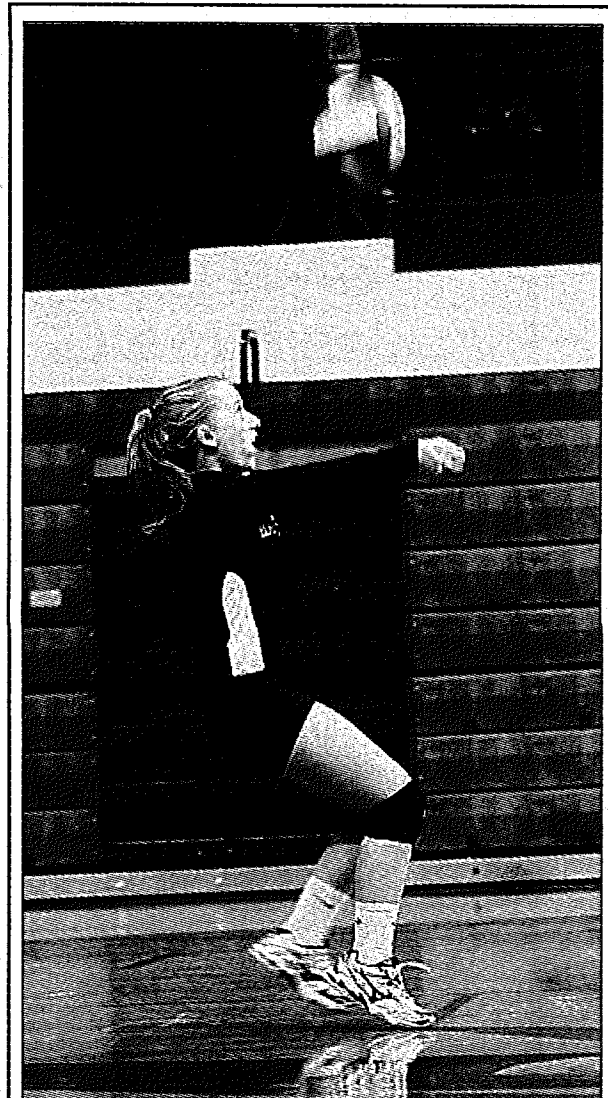

## Influence with Rockcastle teens has ripple effects to Wisconsin and back

Kelly Martin Hicks, executive director of Youth Go, has been bringing teens to Kentucky for spring break since 2006. Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) hosts YouthFest annually as an alternative to traditional spring break options. Hicks is no stranger to serving families in need in Appalachia. After graduating from the College of St. Benedict in Minnesota, she spent two years as a volunteer at the Rockcastle Youth and Teen Center and summers serving at Camp AJ.

"I knew when I left my position at the Rockcastle Teen and Youth Center that I had found what I loved," Hicks said. "Youth Go was the next step of a journey that started with my experiences at CAP. I knew that this felt like what I was supposed to do with my life."

The students from Youth Go in Neenah, Wis. were joined by Sullivan, Ind. high schoolers from Crossroads Community Church. They worked on housing projects for the elderly which included building access ramps and replacing windows and doors on sub-standard homes.

"We continue to bring young people on this trip because it takes them out of their comfort zones," said Hicks. "YouthFest gives them the opportunity to see what a tremendous difference they can make in the life of a stranger with just their hearts and their hands."

Over the years, Hicks and her husband, Drew, have introduced more than 50 students from Youth Go to Eastern Kentucky and many of those teens have participated in the trip mul-

tiplied times. Their group has worked with food distribution, installed new windows, cleaned up Camp AJ, mounted siding, engaged in yard work, painted homes, laid new flooring, and built decks and wheelchair ramps.

"We wanted to give our youth an experience that would impact them," Hicks said. "When we came for the first time, they had such a great experience that they went back and told everyone about their time here."

Amanda Evers was one of those students. She attended YouthFest with Youth Go as a teenager and returned this year as an adult volunteer.

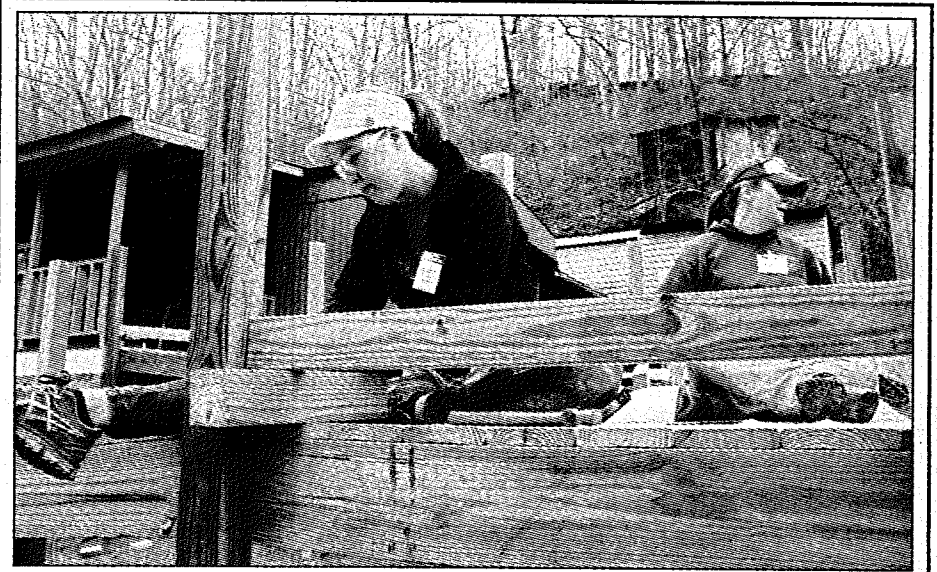
"I absolutely wanted to come back," Evers said. "I hadn't really travelled outside of Wisconsin as a teen and I didn't really understand what people were dealing with. Now, as a single mother with two children, I see how life can happen so fast. You can't prepare for disaster - everything can change in an instant. So now this experience is even more relatable."

Hicks will continue to bring Youth Go teens to YouthFest. She has found her passion and continues to awaken that passion in another generation of young people from Neenah.

"These experiences change the perspective our teenagers have about wants and needs," Hicks said. "That's why we do it - to

give them an opportunity to have their eyes opened. There is so much more that they achieve beyond working on projects. They get to connect the dots about poverty and how individuals can make a difference."

Miller, who aspires to work as a physician, decided to study Spanish to better communicate with Hispanic patients, one of the many factors that also led her to study abroad.

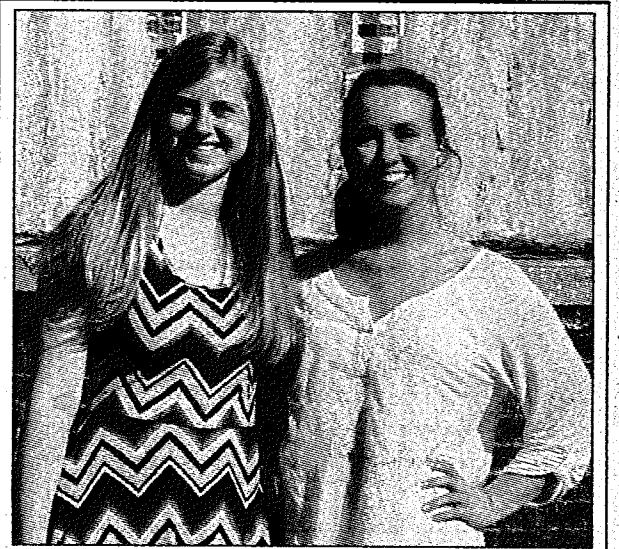
"Communication in general is just so vital to being good, productive citizens," Miller said. "There is no feeling like learning a lan-

Another phone scam is hitting the area according to the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department.

Police are investigating such scam phone calls but many originate in other countries and are difficult to trace.

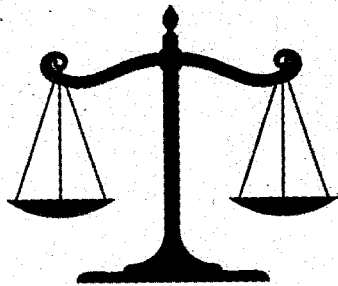

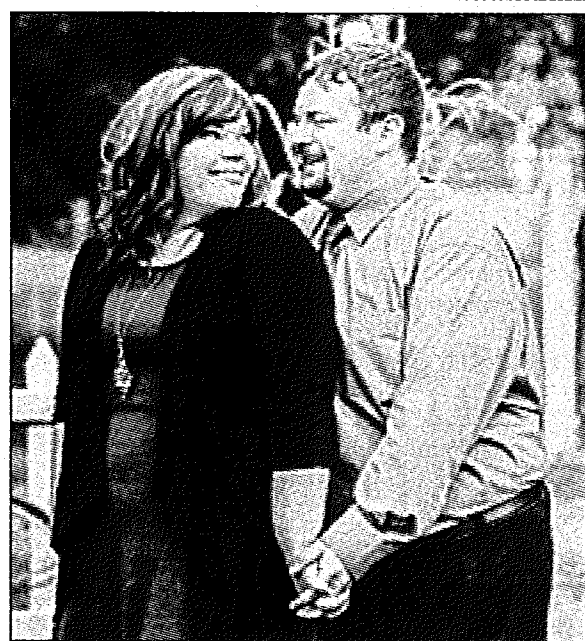

## An encouraging word:

### The Powerful Effect of Words

A brief note, part of which is illegible, that I had written to myself, and forgotten for a long time, came to my attention unexpectedly. That poorly written note mentioned a meeting with two friends, each of which had come from a recent encounter with their friends. One was exceedingly downhearted, and the other one was positively upbeat. A brief conversation with those individuals was revealing. One of them reported a bad experience in which some unkind words had been spoken, and the other one reported a good experience in which some kind words had been spoken. Each one of them showed, in a very remarkable way, the powerful effect of both unkind words and kind words on the human personality.

As I reflected on that old note and the encounter with my friends that it recalled, some words, much older than that old note, came to my mind. More than twenty-five hundred years ago, it had already become proverbial that "An anxious heart (that may come from unkind words) weighs a man down, but a kind word cheers him up." Then, another old proverb of equal age came to mind, "The right word spoken at the right time is as beautiful as golden apples in a silver bowl."

Who of us does not know from personal experience the truth of those words? I do, for I have experienced

that truth many times. On some occasions, I have been hurt by deeply unkind words, and on other occasions, I have been highly elated by kind and uplifting words spoken by a friend. We cannot escape the fact: Words, however spoken, do have a powerful effect. A long time ago it was put this way: "The tongue is a small thing, but what damage it can do." On the other hand, the tongue can do great good. With words spoken, it can either break the human heart or it can lift the human spirit to lofty heights.

## CHERRY CHEESE DELIGHT

2 cups Graham cracker crumbs  
1 stick butter, melted  
3 tablespoons powdered sugar  
2 envelopes Dream Whip®

1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat cream cheese, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon vanilla, and salt in mixing bowl until thick and creamy.

Spread mixture in bottom of pastry shell. Sprinkle with pecans. Set aside. Beat remaining 3 eggs in mixing bowl only until blended. Add remaining 1/4 cup sugar, corn syrup, and remaining teaspoon of vanilla; blend well. Gently pour over pecans. Bake 35 to 40 minutes until center is firm to the touch.

## CREAM CHEESE POUND CAKE

1 package (8 ounce) cream cheese  
1 and 1/2 cups butter  
3 cups white sugar  
6 eggs  
3 cups all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
Preheat oven to 325°. Grease and flour a 10-inch tube pan. In a large bowl, cream butter and cream cheese until smooth. Add sugar gradually and beat until fluffy. Add eggs two at a time, beating well with each addition. Add the flour all at once and mix in. Add vanilla.

Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 1 hour and 20 minutes (I baked mine 1 hour 20 minutes and then loosely covered with foil for an additional 20 to be sure it was cooked through-this timing was perfect for me-any less and it would have been undercooked. COOL COMPLETELY BEFORE CUTTING!
