

Relay for Life event raises over \$34,000

The Relay for Life event was held Friday, June 23, at RCMS and officials are touting the event as a huge success.

The event and pre-event fundraisers raised \$34,843 of this year's \$36,000 goal and Relay for Life officials say if they raise the additional \$1,156 before August 31, the goal will be met.

The overall top fund raising team for the event was Rockcastle Regional Hospital who raised \$9,209.

The Team spirit Award and the Best Decorated Campsite Award went to the Brodhead Baptist Church, while the Best T-Shirt Design went to the Bittersweet Cloggers.

The top church fundraising team was Brodhead Baptist who raised \$5,557 and second place went to Macedonia Baptist Church raising \$236.

Top business fundraising team was Ace Hardware/IGA of Mount Vernon with \$1,070 and second place went to Snack Shack with \$316.

Top bank fundraising team was Citizens Bank with \$2,059 while second place went to Community Trust with \$1,370.

Top healthcare fundraising team went to Rockcastle Regional with \$9,209 and second place went to Rockcastle Family Wellness with \$4,411.

Fiscal Court approves almost \$7M budget in special session

At a special called meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Tuesday, a budget of almost \$7 million was approved for the 2017-18 fiscal year.

The court had also held a special session on Monday during which they went over the budget to make any necessary last minute changes.

According to County Treasurer Joe Clontz, the most significant change

made in the work session was to increase the amount of surplus from the 2016-17 budget for the Rockcastle Detention Center from \$5,000 to \$50,000, due to a late-arriving check from the state corrections department. The court also had to increase the amount to be allocated to the detention center from the county's

Hayes death investigation is still underway

The badly decomposed body of Billy Hayes, 31, of Mount Vernon, was discovered Monday, June 12 off Mullins Station Road near the rock quarry.

Hayes had been missing since June 2 and a search was being conducted by police and family and friends.

The body was apparently found by some family members and then transported to the state medical examiner's office for an autopsy. That preliminary report indicated that no foul play was involved and Hayes apparently fell from a cliff..

However, some family members say the circumstances surrounding the death are very suspicious and they are urging

Former Rockcastle Sheriff, Jailer found dead in his home

Rockcastle Former County Sheriff Henry Lee Abney, 81, was found dead Sunday at his home on Red Hill Road.

Rockcastle County Sheriff's Deputy Matt Bryant was called to Red Hill Road by Melvin Gibbons, who was apparently looking for a home to rent, when he looked in a window at the residence and saw the body, according to Bryant.

Bryant said Abney was found in his recliner inside his home and he had been

dead for several days. According to Bryant, nothing about the scene indicates foul play at this time but Abney's body was sent for an autopsy and the case will be open until that report

Abney was elected Sheriff of Rockcastle County in 1977 and served in that capacity until 1981. Upon leaving his office as Sheriff, Abney was elected Rockcastle County Jailer and served in that capacity from 1981 to 1985.

It was just the way it

We didn't have a bathroom. The outhouse was out back on the other side of the fence that kept the cattle out of the yard. It was so cold in the winter but it just seemed normal. It was just the way it was.

There was a hand pump right outside the back door for water. When we needed water we took the bucket out there and hand pumped it. It was very cold and pure and tasted better than water does today.

If we needed hot water, we put the bucket on the kitchen stove and heated it up. It took a while but we didn't really complain. It was just the way it was.

Our coal burning stove was in the living room. It got red hot on the coldest days and kept the room warm and cozy. But, the other rooms didn't have any heat.

After we got out of the tub, we had to run to the living room to dry off or the water would freeze in our

Crawling in the bed was a very cold experience but soon those old quilts would warm us right up. But we never really thought about

it. It was just the way it was.

I know it sounds old fashioned, but I walked to school every day. On the trip home, I usually took a detour and wound up playing in the barn.

There were usually bales of hay stacked to the roof and I could climb them and make forts and tunnels and play till mom or dad got home from work. I was alone for the afternoons and I had the chance to explore the neighborhood.

But we didn't really think much about it. It was just the way it was.

Sometimes, we neighborhood kids would hike to the old country store. Mary, the lady who ran the store, knew who we were and we could get a bottle of pop and a candy bar as long as we drank it there at the store so she could have the bottle back.

Then dad would pay the 13 cents that we owed the next time he was there. The pop was a dime and the candy bar was a nickel but we got 2 cents back because we left the bottle. We knew we could only do that once or twice a week or we would get in trouble.


But, that was just the way it was.

When I was a little older, dad bought me a bicycle for \$5. He had to put a chain on it and fix the peddles and the brakes. And then we painted it.

I was the king of the neighborhood tooling around on that bicycle. About six or seven of us neighborhood kids would ride through the old dirt alleyway that led to another road.

We would ride through fields and graveyards and church parking lots for hours at a time. Until it started to get dusk outside. Then we all knew we had to get home or trouble

I Love Radio

I was born at a time when radio was needed and enjoyed. It was needed in order for the adults to keep abreast with local and national news. It was necessary for my grandparents so that they could listen to good, old-fashioned preaching. For my brother and me, radio was entertainment: either music or radio dramas. Remember, we did not have television.

The era that I am describing was probably from '48 to '54, and the family gathered around one of our radios for evening entertainment or to provide background music by which the ladies of the household performed their daily tasks.

My grandfather (Pop) had a large, wooden, floor model in his den. (Now an antique that resides in my living room). Pop sat in his wooden rocking chair, which was always positioned extremely close to his radio, listening to "Amos and Andy," "Fibber McGee and Molly," "Dragnet," and especially "Lowell Thomas and The News." He always resumed that within-reach position early on Sunday mornings while listening to ministers who were preaching. If listeners were asked to place their hands on the radio, Pop would do just that for special guidance or for

healing. My mother (Bee) had her own radio sitting on top of the refrigerator in her kitchen. (It is now also a part of my personal collection.) I assume that the radio was in that room because that is where she spent most of her time, either cooking, cleaning, or doing our laundry. As she completed these various tasks, the radio provided some entertainment and allowed her to stay caught up with the daily and local happenings.

Bee usually cooked dinner while Lowell Thomas reported on the news of the day. Her radio was typical

for the time: brown in color, with a large speaker in the center of two knobs. The sound filled the kitchen as Bee prepared supper and I played with my Matchbox-like cars on the linoleum. If Thomas was reporting on "breaking news," Bee would walk over and stand in front of the radio just to make sure that she caught all of the details of the report.

I remember well listening to the radio with Bee at night. Our den was adjacent to the kitchen, so we could sit on the couch and hear broadcasts: "The Perry Como Show," "The Grand Old Opry," "Red Skeleton," and music – mostly country.

When I was about six years of age, Bee placed a radio beside my bed in my room. I went to sleep every night listening to music, and Bee would come in before she went to bed and turn it off. She was my modern day equivalent of a "sleep timer."

By the time that I turned eight, rock and roll music was being birthed. And it wasn't long until I was able to get my very own radio—the newest thing on the block—a transistor radio! For years after that, I was almost as attached to that small, pocket-sized jewel as kids today are to their cell phones.

When it came time for my first automobile (junior year of high school at Mt. Vernon), it already contained an AM radio; that baby was never turned off. No matter the reason for my being in the driver, sisear, the radio was always blaring. It was oftell accompanied by multitudes of teenaged voices singing along to the tunes of the day.

Over my lifetime, I cannot count the number of automobiles that I have owned, but I can say with full confidence that I never owned a car without some kind of radio. If I bought one that was not already equipped, my first step





general fund by \$54,000 to \$559,934.97, bring the jail's total budget for the next fiscal year to \$1,437,902.

The increase in the county's supplemental allocation to the jail came primarily because the state corrections department recently required Rockcastle County Jailer Carlos McClure to hire two additional full-time deputies because of the number of inmates housed in the jail.

During the meeting, the court discussed a contract with Binswanger Realty to market the former Anchor Packaging building.

County Judge/Executive Doug Bishop told the court that the contract had been received from Binswanger there was discrepancey in the document between the written out asking price of \$3M for

the building and the amount listed numerically. Also, Bishop told the court that it had been his understanding that \$3.2M had been the agreed on asking price and Magistrate Billy McKinney said this was his understanding also.



Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Consider the Daylily

In your landscaping, or in your flower or vegetable garden, consider the tough but lovely daylily. It's versatile, comes in about every color but blue, and is super easy to grow. You should definitely consider growing this hardy perennial.

The Latin for daylily is Hemerocallis. They are reated to other lilies. Most hemerocallis species are from Asia, but hemerocallis fulva is a wild orange daylily found over much of America. There are over 60,000 registered daylily cultivars in the world now, and about 12,000 are available for purchase from lots of daylily growers and roadside markets, as well as by mailorder. The American Hemerocallis Society is the certifying organization in the US.

The daylily plant is generally propogated by dividing an existing clump. One or more 'fans' are planted to begin a new plant. Part of a dormant root can also be planted. And, from seed, you might get an entirely new variety altogether if you have the patience.

Growing in moist or very

dry conditions, in sun or part shade, in poor or rich soils, the daylily is one of the easiest plants for the beginner to have succes with. From a small plant or clump, the clump gets bigger as the years go by. Like all perennials, eventually it will do better if dug up and divided. (Sell, give away, or eat the extras, anyone?) Blooms come in spikes of a dozen or more buds, one flower opens and is in bloom for just one day. For several weeks a plant will bloom. And if it is a 'rebloomer', more shoots will come and there will be more blooms right up until cold weather.

Daylily plants are evergreen, semi-evergreen or dormant. (You don't want to plant dormant ones in Florida or Southern California--and you don't want to plant evergreen ones in North Dakota.) Most begin to bloom in either June or July, and produce for several days to a few weeks. Again, rebloomers will continue to bloom sporadically the remainder of the growing season. Most daylilies open in morning and are finished the same day. A few

Rockcastle Co. has been chosen to receive \$8062.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; The Jewish Federations of North America, The Salvation Army; and, United Way Worldwide. The Local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A local board made up of local government and charitable organizations will determine how the funds awarded to Rockcastle Co. are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Rockcastle Co. has distributed emergency food and shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Community Action Agency, Inc. participating. This agency was responsible for helping families with mortgage/rental assistance and utilities. Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and shelter Program Funds must contact Tamara Cox, 105 E. Main Street Box 7, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky 40456 for an application.

The deadline for applications to be received is July 15, 2017.



With modern breeding programs by dozens of plantsmen, you can have about any size or color of daylily you want. Prices for fancy ones, rare ones, or newer cultivars may be a bit steep, but with so many varieties out there, even the most modest homeowner can buy a few from the 'big box' store at a reasonable price (or beg or borrow a start from a neighbor).

Landscapers typically use a common reblooming variety such as Stella d'Oro or Happy Returns. But with so many options, with a little research, there is no reason to limit ones design or planting to just the popular common ones. A massed planting of several complimentary colors with both early and late bloom times, making sure some are rebloomers, a landscaper or homeowner can have flowers constantly from late May until a hard freeze. Specimen or accent plantings where daylilies are used sparingly, but with a dramatic flare, can really put some pizzaz into a garden or landscape.

What other value besides looks is there in a daylily? Well, they are pretty good at erosion control and weed suppression. And the obvious, but usually overlooked, is that they are edible!

In Asian markets, look for 'gum jum', golden needles, or 'yellow flower vegetable'. The flowers are edible, the flower buds are especially delicious, and on most the leaves (blades) and it again. I invite the reader to pick a few large buds from a daylily plant and toss into their salad before they dismiss this notion that they are edible. Try it, I bet you'll like it!Then, there is fried breaded flowers, pickled daylily buds and so on. Best kayaks for flat water fishing

A car, truck or sport utility vehicle with a couple of kavaks on the roof with fishing poles visible through the back window is an increasingly common sight on Kentucky highways.

Sales data shows kayak fishing and related kayak accessories increasing in popularity. Some of this popularity has to do with many baby boomers reaching retirement age and wanting a new hobby.

Price is another aspect of the rise in popularity of kayak fishing. They are a replacement for a fishing boat for many people scared off by the rising cost of power boats.

While many associate kayaks with flowing water, a huge number buy a kayak to fish small lakes, the backwaters of reservoirs, rivers and large farm

"If you want to fish mainly flatwater, the longer, the better for a kayak," said Nathan Depenbrock, co-owner of Canoe Kentucky, an outfitter along the banks of famed Elkhorn Creek near Frankfort. "Length in a kayak gives you speed and tracking. By speed, we don't mean miles per hour. Speed in a kayak how far you go without paddling. It is also called the glide.'

Length is relative to kayaks. Two feet of length makes a big difference in how the boat performs. "The ideal length for Kentucky is 12 to 13 feet," Dependbrock, who's paddled waters from Rio Grande River north to the Great Lakes, explained. "A major consideration is to buy a boat you can get to the water. Make sure it fits in the bed of your truck or on top of your vehicle. A kayak that is too heavy is no good because you won't use it."

As kayaks go longer than 14 feet, they also get narrower. "The long kayaks are designed for paddling long distances, not for stability," Depenbrock said. "They can get squirrely at rest."

This is why for fishing, the 12- to 13-foot long kayak makes the best choice. It is long enough for speed, but short enough for width and stability.

"I really would not go less than 11 feet long," Depenbrock said. "Being in a boat of 10 or 11 feet is a really frustrating way to paddle on flatwater. They don't perform well at all."

He also prefers a sit-ontop or the relatively new hybrid kayaks for flatwater paddling and fishing. "Stay away from the sit in kayaks," Depenbrock explained. "They are not meant to fish out of."

Depenbrock also said anglers fishing lakes, rivers or reservoirs out of a kayak must keep in mind

their low profile and short length makes a kayak hard to see.

"We blend in so much in kayaks, especially on our big lakes," Depenbrock said. "Kayaks can get down in between waves and not be seen. Color is important. Make sure you have a safety flag, a bright paddle or even one of those bright safety vests so other boaters can see you. Always wear something bright."

Practice getting back into your kayak from the water before launching. "On bigger lakes, it is reimportant," ally Depenbrock said. "You have to be able to get back in the kayak if something happens and are far from the bank."

Depenbrock enjoys flatwater kayaking on several spots in Kentucky. 'Grayson Lake is one of my best places to paddle," he said. "The scenery is unbelievable. A lot of the rock grottos and other really cool spots are only accessible by kayak."

He also loves the Kentucky River. "Every pool in the Kentucky River has its own unique features, Depenbrock said. "Everywhere on the Kentucky River is beautiful, but Pool 6 upstream to Pool 10 is some of the most spectacular scenery in Kentucky. The area in Pool 7 around Camp Nelson is unbelievable. The Kentucky River has a ton of access for paddlers to use as well."


In fall, Depenbrock moves down river to Pool 2. "There is good wildlife in Pool 2," he said. "We see bald eagles, coyotes, white-tailed deer, wild turkeys, waterfowl and other kinds of birds."

Depenbrock is also exploring the forks of the Kentucky River. "The forks of the Kentucky are really looking good, especially the North Fork of the Kentucky River," he said. "They are really improving. The cleanups are starting to show. I am going to enjoy exploring more of the forks in the coming years."

No matter which of these scenic spots Depenbrock is paddling, he always wears his PFD (personal floatation device), commonly called lifejacket. "No matter what time of year, I never paddle without my PFD," he said.

Summer is a time of enjoying water sports. Keep these tips in mind if you plan to get a kayak to fish the many smaller stateowned lakes, reservoirs and rivers in Kentucky.





watch for signs of credit card skimmers at fuel pumps Kentucky Department Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles reminds motorists to watch for signs of tampering on motor fuel pumps as credit

card thieves gear up for the Fourth of July and the traffic-heavy summer travel season. "The Kentucky De-

partment of Agriculture and the law-enforcement community are on the lookout for credit card skimmers, but we depend on you to be vigilant when you fill your gas tank," Commissioner Quarles said. "If you suspect that a pump has been tampered with, please notify the attendant and call law enforcement or call the department."

of Agriculture (KDA) inspectors have discovered four card skimmers while inspecting more than 20,000 motor fuel pumps across the state so far this Commissioner year, Quarles said.

For the second straight year, KDA inspectors are looking for evidence of tampering with fuel pumps in addition to their regular duties, at no additional cost to taxpayers. KDA inspectors check gas pumps to make sure they are in proper working order and test them to ensure that the amount of fuel dispensed matches the amount shown

on the pump. Jason Glass, assistant

the director department's Division of Regulation and Inspection, said consumers can help themselves by looking for signs that a pump has been tampered with, such as locks that appear to have been compromised or have a key broken off in the lock, doors that may have been pried open, and security tape that is broken or doesn't adhere to the pump.





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

2017 Acreage Reporting

In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements, all producers are encouraged to visit the Rockcastle County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline.

The following acreage reporting dates are applicable for Rockcastle County:

July 15, 2017

All other Crops and CRP
The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting dates:

If the crop has not been planted by the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.

If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendars days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing," or "seed," then the acreage must be reported by July 15th. Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP covered crops is the earlier of the dates listed above or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.

USDA Farm Service
Agency 2017 County
Committee Election
Every eligible agricultural producer should par-

ticipate in Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees elections-whether you are a beginning or a longtime producer, historically disadvantaged producer, or whether you have a large or small operationbecause FSA county committees are your link with the U.S. Department of Ag-

riculture (USDA).

Farmers and ranchers who are elected to serve on FSA county committees apply their judgment and knowledge to help with the decisions necessary to administer FSA programs in their counties, ensuring the needs of local producers are met. FSA county committees operate within official federal regulations and pro-

vide local input on:
1.Income safety-net loans and payments, including setting

County average yields for commodities;

2.Conservation programs;

3.Incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities;

4.Emergency programs; and

5.Payment eligibility.
This year, nominations and elections will be held in LAA 3, which includes areas for the eastern section of Rockcastle County bound by Garrard, Madison, Jackson and Laurel County. Highways include HWY 25,

I-75 and Little Hurricane

To be eligible to serve on the FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the Local Administrative Area (LAA) where they are nominated. All producers, including women, minority and beginning farms and ranchers are en-

couraged to participate in the nomination and election process

June 15, 2017-The nomination period begins. Request nomination forms from the local FSA county office or obtain online at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in an FSA program may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as a candidate. In addition, organizations representing underserved (minority and women) farmers or ranchers may nominate candidates.

To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign nomination form FSA-669A. The form includes a statement that the nominee agrees to serve if elected. Nomination forms are filed in the FSA office that administers a producer's farm records and is available at the FSA county office of online at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.

Nomination forms for the 2017 election must be post-marked or received in the local FSA county office by August 1, 2017.


